Dear Mr. President:

I wrote to your administration recently regarding potential problems the American transportation network may face within the United States in transporting agricultural commodities to the Soviet Union. It is my hope that the Administration will be able to monitor and address any of these potential problems.

However, as you are aware, reports are increasing about the more severe transportation and distribution problems existing within the Soviet Union. Much of this year's Soviet harvest rotted in the fields. Tons of other food commodities are languishing in railcars and storage bins, while food shelves remain bare.

The World Bank and the International Monetary Fund are about to release an in-depth study that reportedly concludes that the Soviet Union's economy is in shambles and that fundamental economic and structural reforms, as well as substantial technical assistance will be necessary for a long-term economic recovery.

It is imperative that the United States help provide the essential technical assistance to the Soviets that will be needed to ensure that these U.S. commodities reach the Soviet people in a timely manner. Therefore, I urge you to provide the necessary information and to send American transportation and distribution experts to the Soviet Union in order to help accomplish this goal. Otherwise, our food assistance efforts may be in vain and the Soviet people will continue to suffer.
