Thank you very much for your letter to the President concerning the USSR's request for grain credit guarantees from the United States. Your views were of particular interest to the President as he reviewed this issue.

As you know, the President informed President Gorbachev on June 11 that the U.S. would meet the Soviet request for up to \$1.5 billion in credit guarantees for Soviet purchases of American agricultural commodities. The President specified he would make the credit guarantees available in three tranches -- \$600 million in June, \$500 million in October 1991 and \$400 million in February 1992.

The President decided to grant the Soviet request based on the excellent Soviet record in meeting its official obligations and following very positive discussions with the Soviet leadership and republic officials on this matter. We were also assured that the grains made available by U.S. firms would be distributed fairly among Soviet republics and the Baltic states. The President's decision is consistent with the Administration's objective of a continued, positive evolution in the U.S.-Soviet relationship.

In his letter to President Gorbachev, the President also renewed his offer to work with the Soviet government and the republics on the long-term problem of food distribution, primarily through the introduction of market measures. President Gorbachev has accepted this offer. The Presidential mission on agriculture which visited the USSR in late May reported to the President that inefficiencies in food distribution, particularly the reliance on command methods in most parts of the country, and not food production, was by far the greatest problem in the Soviet food system. We are forming a joint USG/private sector team to work with the Soviets over the coming months and years to tackle this crucial problem.

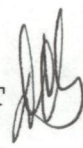

Thank you very much for your recent letter to the President concerning the Soviet government's request for an additional \$1.5 billion in credit guarantees for the purchase of American grain. The President appreciated your thoughtful letter as he reviewed the Soviet request.

As you know, President Gorbachev recently accepted the President's offer to send to the USSR a high-level team of USG experts, led by USDA Under Secretary Richard Crowder. That team is currently in the USSR and will discuss with the Soviets the grain request and ways by which the U.S. government and our private sector might be helpful in resolving problems in food distribution. After the team returns to the U.S. and reports to the President about the food situation in the USSR and Soviet creditworthiness, he will determine how we should proceed.

We appreciate your interest in this issue and will keep your views in mind as we consider the Soviet request.

Dear Mr. President:

I would like to take this opportunity to urge that additional export credits and competitive guarantees for commercial loans be made available to the Soviet Union. Aggressive action on the part of the Administration is necessary if the Soviet Union is to realize any relief from impending food shortages.

As may you know, I met with Soviet grain trade representatives last week. I was struck by the urgent nature of their requests and am convinced that they are in desperate need of our help. We cannot afford to walk away from the Soviet people and our own agriculture interests in this vital market.

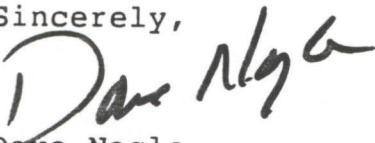
Coming from an agricultural state, I am very interested in seizing this opportunity to meet the immediate needs of one of the world's biggest export customers. In the absence of a timely response on our part to Soviet requests for financial assistance, other countries will move aggressively to capture this market at the expense of U.S. agriculture. A result of this kind will have long-term adverse consequences on our producers.

In addition to enabling U.S. agriculture to compete more effectively for such an important market, providing needed credits and competitive loan guarantees would help address the very real needs of the Soviet people. Recalling occasions when food has mistakenly been used as a weapon in U.S. foreign policy, I believe it is important for the United States to continue efforts to bring the Soviet Union into the world community. Such support would also maintain the improving relationship between our two countries, and would be consistent with actions already taken by other nations for the very same reasons.

In closing, I would like to commend you for waiving Jackson-Vanik and granting agricultural credits to the Soviet Union last December. I hope you will continue this policy and act swiftly to extend further export credits to the Soviet Union for purchases of agricultural commodities and products.

I very much appreciate your consideration of my views.
