United States Government Support for Independent Media in the Former Yugoslavia

Since April 1996, USAID's Office of Transition Initiatives (OTI) has awarded 567 grants, valued in excess of \$7.6 million to 158 independent media organizations in the former Yugoslavia. These grants have supported the development of fifty-nine independent newspapers and magazines, eight-two independent television and radio stations, and nine independent journalists associations and centers. OTI has also funded extensive media training, and has been a major supporter of the Open Broadcast Network (OBN) in Bosnia, and ANEM TV and Radio in Serbia.

Collaboration with Soros Foundation:

USAID/OTI has worked closely with the Soros Foundation's Open Society Institute (OSI) in Bosnia, Croatia, and Serbia and Montenegro. In addition to co-funding projects, there is a significant informal working relationship between USAID/OTI and OSI on the ground. In Bosnia, for example, OTI and OSI have directly collaborated and matched funds in twelve projects totaling \$320,000. Almost half of OTI's portfolio in Serbia-Montenegro contains grants co-funded with the Soros Foundation. USAID and OSI have also been the two most consistent and largest donors to the ANEM radio and Television networks.

Response to Media Crackdown:

The USG has taken numerous steps to condemn Milosevic's crackdown on Serb media and to keep independent media voices alive. These have included:

- Issuing State Department and White House statements condemning the crackdown;
- Encouraging similar statements by NATO SYG Solana, OSCE Chairman Geremek, European allies, NGOs and others;
- Demarching FRY authorities regarding the closings;
- Working to enhance indigenous radio capabilities in Kosovo;
- Enhancing indigenous radio broadcast capabilities in the RS and Montenegro, particularly to allow the rebroadcast of VOA and other international programs into Serbia;
- Supporting other forms of expression by banned Serb journalists, including leafleting and postering.
- Further developing internet and e-mail listserve systems to maintain and develop networks to provide reliable alternative information to the population of the FRY;
- Pushing to establish Kosovo Verification Mission (KVM) radio station.
- We have asked Ambassador Elizabeth Bagley to begin seeking programming support for ANEM TV.

Dear Mrs. Clinton:

Thank you for inviting me to this morning's event on Bosnia. I am especially grateful to you for taking a leadership role in children's issues - both here in America and overseas. As you know, I traveled to Bosnia last year and can personally attest to the very real need for humanitarian intervention. The children of Bosnia were the most helpless victims of the four-year long war.

I am also grateful for the President's leadership regarding Bosnian children. His support of the UNICEF initiative to immunize and educate Bosnian children has been essential. It is my understanding that this program is performing exemplary work. I would enjoy discussing the project with you further when more details become available following the February trip to Bosnia by UNICEF Executive Director, Carol Bellamy.

UNICEF is implementing the six-month program to provide the children of the former Yugoslavia with benefits and reestablish normalcy in their lives. The plan aims to immunize 150,000 children against six vaccine-preventable diseases, and initiate sustainable services which will continue to meet immunization needs following the end of the six-month period. In addition, the program authorizes the reconstruction of schools which have been severely damaged during the war, teacher training, and the purchase of school supplies. The teaching of informal subjects such as mine-awareness, and social and psychological assistance will also be of tremendous value to these children. By developing sustainable educational facilities, the program's impact will continue for years to come.

The initiative is a fruit of the peace agreement, and I believe that it will contribute to the maintenance of that peace. Restoring the welfare of the children is perhaps the most fundamental aspect of reconstruction of the Bosnian region.

Project for Increased Immunization Coverage of Children and Women in Bosnia & Herzegovina, Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, Croatia

I. Background

The war in Bosnia & Herzegovina and Croatia, the strain placed on basic services by hundreds of thousands of refugees and displaced persons in Bosnia, Croatia and the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, and the economic difficulties linked to the transition from centrally-planned to market economies have led to a deep crisis of the national health systems of all three countries. As a result, the levels of immunization coverage of women and children against the six main communicable diseases have declined markedly in B&H and threatened to do so in FR Yugoslavia and Croatia if continued support is not provided.

UNICEF has been supporting efforts to re-establish, maintain and expand immunization coverage for all children since it began its programmes in 1991. Past cooperation has focussed on supplies of basic materials and training. UNICEF has also facilitated joint meetings of technical staff from the different sides to agree on vaccination calendar and associated policies.

II. Objectives

- Achieve and maintain a minimum of 90 % immunization coverage of children under one against the six vaccine preventable diseases;
- Develop sustainable immunization services able to function during the recovery period and beyond with decreasing external support.

III. Strategies

UNICEF seeks to strengthen the capacity of national professionals and institutions to improve the health delivery mechanisms.

The main focus will be the restoration of acceptable level of immunization in Bosnia and Herzegovina and more disadvantaged regions of Croatia and the FR Yugoslavia. The following strategies/activities will be undertaken in order to reach the objectives stated above:

- Provision of basic vaccines to health authorities where appropriate and requested;
- Provision of cold chain equipment and training of cold chain managers in order to ensure availability of vaccines even in the most remote areas;
- Support to social mobilization efforts, especially in B&H where "Days of Immunization" will be organized locally;
- Technical support to health authorities for the progressive adoption of more efficient and cost effective immunization practices, including the adoption of a rational calendar of vaccination and new policies on contra-indications;
- Technical support for the restoration of local production of vaccines, in particular in the FR Yugoslavia;
- Technical support for the re-establishment of disease surveillance systems within and between countries;
- Technical support for coverage surveys, in particular in highly vulnerable regions;
- Support to emergency response mechanisms in order to address increased immunization needs resulting from a sudden movement of population. This activity will be part of the overall emergency preparedness effort developed for the region.

Through these strategies, UNICEF intends to support the creation of the necessary conditions for the return of refugees from Bosnia and Herzegovina to their country of origin and the resettlement of internally displaced. Until this repatriation process starts, UNICEF will give the necessary priority to the assistance to the 112,000 refugee and displaced children under 18 living in Croatia and the 215,000 refugee children in the FR Yugoslavia.

IV. Partners

UNICEF will support the efforts of the respective Ministries of Health both at the central and the local level. UNICEF will continue to work closely with other partners; UN agencies, institutes of public health, the European Union and bilateral organizations.

V. Time Frame

The proposal covers a six months time frame. During this period, priority is given to raising immunization rates among poorly covered child populations. However, investment will also be made on long-term activities which can be sustained beyond the six months time frame. On completion of the initial phase of the project, an assessment of its impact will be conducted and further necessary activities will be identified for the future.

Project for the Reconstruction of Educational Opportunities for Children Affected by War in Bosnia & Herzegovina, Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, Croatia

I. Background

The war in Bosnia & Herzegovina and Croatia, the strain put on basic services by hundreds of thousands of refugees and displaced persons in Bosnia, Croatia and the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, the economic difficulties linked to the transition from a centrally planned to a market economy in all three countries have created national education systems in deep crisis. The main difficulties identified are the following:

- Schools destroyed or occupied by refugees, internally displaced and army (it is estimated that 40% of primary school in Croatia and 55% in Bosnia & Herzegovina have been either damaged or destroyed);
- Education authorities and families unable to provide the necessary basic school supplies necessary;
- Teachers killed, displaced or demotivated by low salaries and lack of psycho-social support;
- Lack of training of both teaching and administrative staff;
- The eruption of new problems implying a need for specific teaching skills: mine-awareness, psycho-social assistance to children, conflict resolution and tolerance education.

UNICEF has been supporting efforts to re-establish or maintain the education services through the conflict. This includes support to basement schools in front-line cities and assistance to refugee centers through the provision of basic school supplies and training. UNICEF has also initiated a planning process for the development of more cost effective post-war education systems.

II. Objectives

- Allow full access to primary education with special attention given to refugee and displaced children as well as children in particularly vulnerable areas;
- Improve the quality of education through the introduction of active learning methods and non-formal subjects such as mine-awareness, psycho-social assistance and education for development;

- Develop sustainable education services able to function during the recovery period and beyond with decreasing external support.

III. Strategies

The main focus will be on the restoration of basic education services in the most affected areas of Bosnia and Herzegovina and Croatia as well as on the economically disadvantaged regions of FR Yugoslavia. The following strategies/ activities will be implemented in order to reach the objectives stated above:

- Assistance in winterization of primary and pre-schools and limited refurbishment allowing immediate return of students to classrooms and uninterrupted school year;
- Provision of basic school supplies and equipment with priority to refugee, displaced and other socially vulnerable children;
- Support to the organization of catch-up classes for children recently displaced or living in highly exposed areas;
- In-service training of teachers in more participative, less expensive teaching methods (this activity should include the creation or development of teacher resource centers);
- Provision of psycho-social support to teachers, in particular to refugee or displaced teachers and to teachers working in exposed areas;
- Training of new teachers in order to reestablish an acceptable teacher/student ratio;
- Development of home-based early childhood development activities, in particular to limit the number of street children;
- Support to mine-awareness programmes using all possible channels of communication;
- Support to the development of non-formal channels of education, e.g. radio programmes for children, and non-formal subjects for inclusion in the regular curriculum;
- Technical assistance in long-term planning and the development of cost effective education systems.

Through these strategies, UNICEF also intends to support the creation of the necessary conditions for the return of refugees from Bosnia and Herzegovina to their country of origin and the resettlement of internally displaced.

IV. Partners

UNICEF will support the efforts of the respective Ministries of Education both at the central and local level. UNICEF will continue to work closely with other partners; UN agencies, foreign universities, NGOs, the European Union and bilateral organizations.

V. Time Frame

The proposal covers a six months time frame. During this period, priority is given to guaranteed access of all children to the education system. However, investment will also be made in long-term activities which can be sustained beyond the six-month programme. On completion of the initial programme, an assessment of its impact will be carried out and further necessary activities will be identified for the future.

From the Director's Desk. . .

This issue of the *Woodstock Report* features an exceptionally thoughtful talk by Donald Shriver, past president of and currently professor at Union Theological Seminary in New York. His remarks are based on his recent book, *An Ethic for Enemies: Forgiveness in Politics* (Oxford University Press, 1995).

I must confess to an original feeling of surprise, if not shock, when I first read the title of his book. Forgiveness? In Politics? Forgiveness fits relations between individual people, not between nations or groups, I thought. Between large hostile groups, "conflict resolution" or "peace-making" or "reconciliation of differences" is surely appropriate. But "forgiveness?"

Then I slowly warmed to the idea. First, the more I pondered, the clearer it became that conflicts will really not be resolved unless the unfolding steps that Shriver includes in "forgiveness" are at the heart of it. Failing this kind of forgiveness, resentments still smolder, poised to erupt on yet another day. Second, from the point of view of Woodstock's mission ("bringing *theological* reflection to contemporary social issues"), forgiveness in politics should certainly rank higher on the priority list of our interests. In his desire to heal the wounds and divisions of society, forgiveness distinctively characterized Christ's mission and message. "Forgive them, Father, for they know not what they do," he said from the cross. And he taught us to do the same when he taught us the Lord's prayer: "Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us."

That being said, the prospect of giving and receiving forgiveness remains a daunting challenge for hostile communities. We need only think of Bosnia, Northern Ireland, South Africa, and race relations in our own country. In an effort to figure out what Woodstock might appropriately do in this area, we have held a series of meetings, following up on the forum reported here.

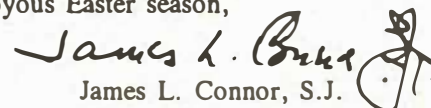
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We have discussed ways of testing Don Shriver's thesis, deepening and refining it, and making it better known and available to others for their practical use. Catching a sharp focus on such a complex and widespread question, finding the funding to support it and the personnel to run it have not been easy. But the great need for forgiveness in the public arena refuses to go away.

By the time you are reading this *Report* we will have held another Woodstock Forum, which will, in its own way, be an instance of "forgiveness in politics." The topic will be welfare reform legislation. The focus, however, will not be on the arguments *per se*, but on the *quality* of the debate about welfare reform. Polls show that many Americans are discouraged at the superficiality of public debate. Are legislators so committed to special interests that they forget the common good? Have 30-second sound bites of vilification replaced well-developed arguments? This forum, an event of the Woodstock program area, "Public Discourse and the Common Good," headed up by Father Randy Rainey, S.J., will address this serious problem.
