The Role of Planned Childbearing in the Health and Well-being of Children, Women, and Families

Project Summary

The Institute of Medicine has noted with great concern that family planning is often treated as a marginal, controversial activity, caught up in the ruinous national debate over abortion. Rarely is it discussed in a broad, comprehensive way that recognizes the important role that contraception and planned pregnancy play in the lives of men and women, in the well-being of children, and in the overall tenor of communities. In particular, family planning is seldom treated as a central, routine component of preventive health care and education.

The Institute has become especially concerned that, among child and family advocates, the current list of "things that must be done" to help children and families rarely includes family planning. Rather, suggested remedies apply exclusively to later developmental stages (prenatal care, early intervention for families at risk, and developmentally-appropriate day care) or to more general social needs (affordable housing, income supports, job training, safe neighborhoods and improved education). Absent from the list, ever and always, is contraception and family planning - due, perhaps, to a lack of understanding about the relationship of family planning to the health and well-being of children and families; the fear that a vocal minority might object; and a misguided concern that it is too difficult to distinguish contraception from abortion.

To help thaw the deep freeze that has paralyzed family planning, the Institute is in the middle of an 18 month project to document and aggressively disseminate information on the contribution that planned childbearing makes to the health and well-being of women, children, families and communities. More specifically, the Institute of Medicine's Committee on Planned Childbearing will:

- discuss the many benefits - and the few risks - that family planning offers;
- present data on patterns of family planning practices in the United States, emphasizing the high - and increasing - rates of unplanned pregnancy and, as a consequence, the high rates of abortion;

- outline the many reasons that account for these distressing rates, using a comprehensive approach that, for example, covers not only problems with family planning services and methods, but also such broader issues as the inadequate health/sex education available in many schools, the troubling approach of the media to family planning and reproduction, and our failure to draw men into the family planning issue in a meaningful way;

- describe the range of community-based programs that have been organized in the last ten years or so to encourage family planning and, to the extent possible, comment on the effectiveness of various approaches; and

- make conclusions and recommendations for policy, practice and research based on the data assembled and reviewed.

The **audience** for this activity is policy makers at the federal, state and local level; administrators of relevant health and social service programs, including those who are active in the fields of family planning and reproductive health; opinion leaders, including the media; and researchers in a position to act on the committee's research recommendations.

Funding has been provided by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and the U.S. Public Health Service, Department of Health and Human Services.

A **committee roster** is appended. The **Surgeon General** of the United States, Dr. Joycelyn Elders, helped in the initial planning of the project and is following the work of the group closely. She will be attending the group's next meeting here in Washington, February 14 and 15, 1994.
