1. This Annual Report is submitted in accordance with AR 40-1005 and covers the period from 1 January 1947 to 31 December 1947.

2. Principal Medical Activities. a. The Station Hospital, 2232nd A.S.U., New Cumberland General Depot, New Cumberland, Pennsylvania renders general medical and dental service to the duty personnel and their dependents and general prisoners confined at the United States Branch Disciplinary Barracks, New Cumberland General Depot, New Cumberland, Pennsylvania. Medical service is also rendered to the enlisted personnel and officers stationed at Indiantown Gap Military Reservation, and one dispensary is maintained for the eight hundred twenty-five (825) civilian employees at this station.

b. Psychiatric service is rendered to prisoners in the Disciplinary Barracks.

c. All routine physical examinations for Army personnel on duty in the Harrisburg area are performed at this hospital.

d. All authorized Medical Department service of the Officer Reserve Corps and the Enlisted Reserve Corps in the Harrisburg area is supplied by this hospital.

(1). It is the hospital's policy to cooperate in every suitable way with local National Guard units; e.g., supplying consultative opinions on questions of medical fitness for enlistments, etc. We covered their hospitalization requirements at last summer's 28th Division Encampment.

e. This hospital is assuming the duties of Central Examining Station for recruiting activities in the Harrisburg area.

f. For details of Veterinary and Dental Service supplied, see attached reports from those services.

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g. Psychiatric Service supplied inmates of Disciplinary Barracks and other personnel is separately reported by Chief of Psychiatric Service.

h. A summary of surgical procedures is attached.

i. A summary of X-ray films made is attached.

j. Obstetrical Service delivered twenty-seven (27) cases, the last delivery occurring 4 October, subsequent to which date the service was discontinued.

3. Organization and Equipment. a. Standard T/O & E of a 100-bed Station Hospital minus obstetrics. Current active bed capacity is 62 with an average daily patient census of about 40.

b. Personnel and equipment are adequate for the work being done. It is believed that an audiometer would be profitable here in view of contemplated increased physical examination activities. (We have requisitioned one.)

c. First echelon maintenance is autonomous. Higher echelon maintenance of non-medical character is supplied by Post Engineers. Higher echelon medical maintenance is supplied by Medical Supply Division, Second Army.

4. Physical and Mental Health of Command. Physical and mental health of the Command is regarded as excellent.

a. Three (3) minor outbreaks of gastro-intestinal disturbance, affecting from 100 to 150 DB inmates, have occurred in a military population averaging in the neighborhood of 2500 people. All have been confined to the Disciplinary Barracks.

b. V.D. control has been energetic and the rate has averaged about 32, monthly incidence being usually two or three cases.

c. Mortality has consisted of two individuals - one newborn dependent infant and one psychiatric patient who committed suicide.

d. No outbreak of infectious or contagious disease has occurred and accidents, both industrial and ordinary, have been very few, one having resulted permanent disability from loss of one finger. There was one fatal accident to a War Reserve Branch employee at Marietta carried by this station. Both were civilian employees.

Attention is invited to the fact that the gastro-intestinal outbreaks were confined to the Disciplinary Barracks. The DB receives the same ration, water and milk supplied the garrison. In the two outbreaks occurring during tenure of office by the current Surgeon, investigation pointed to warmed-over food as the causative agent, both outbreaks being confined to DB companies which

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had eaten warmed-over food not served to the other companies. It is believed that the most probable causative factor was that the mess is large, hence the left-over food was in rather large amount. It was allowed to cool in one mass in a large dixie before refrigeration, thereby remaining at optimum temperatures for bacterial development for an unduly long time. Steps have been taken to correct this factor.

On 25 and 26 December an unknown but very high percentage of the command was affected with a brief but vigorous diarrhea, accompanied in some cases by nausea and vomiting. Apparently no less than 75% of the hospital cadre was affected. Inquiry developed the fact that cases were highly numerous throughout the post and in the civilian population of neighboring towns. No one reported sick and no figures are available.

The Director of Public Health of New Cumberland verified the high coincident prevalence among local civilians and stated that he had encountered it before and that it had been more or less prevalent throughout the state during the past two years, outbreaks occurring here and there and from time to time. It is believed to be due to a virus of unknown character and has resulted in no mortality.

The water supply is common to both the post and the local communities and is regularly and frequently cultured by both. It has been entirely negative for a considerable number of months, both on our examinations and those of the local civilian authorities. No suspicion attaches to the milk or other food supply. The disturbance is apparently always short, sharp, and non-disabling beyond the inconvenience of the diarrhea. Little or nothing appears to be definitely known as to its exact etiology and character.

5. Sanitation. Sanitation is excellent.

a. The terrain is gently rolling, well drained and utilizable, lying between a range of hills and the Susquehanna River above flood levels.

b. Mosquito control. Between the post and the hills is a small, marshy area, potentially a mosquito breeder, a portion of which is on post property. Two years ago the Post Engineer initiated a comprehensive drainage project which was dropped after partial accomplishment. Last summer the area was successfully dealt with by means of oiling. Permanent planning includes a drainage project.

c. Building disinfection is active and satisfactory. For data thereon, see attached WD AGO 5-123 containing consolidated figures on this heading and on items d and e below.

d. Protection of Supplies, Food and Property: Satisfactory.

e. Rodent Control: Satisfactory.

f. Messes and Food Dispensing: The following food dispensing points are operative and are regularly and frequently inspected by a Sanitary

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Sergeant and a Medical Officer who submit a report in writing:

- (1) Mess #1 - Post Duty Personnel, EM
 - (2) Mess #2 - USDB, NCGD, Inmates' Mess
 - (3) Station Hospital Mess
 - (4) EM Service Club
 - (5) Sergeants' Club
 - (6) Officers' Club
 - (7) Hospital EM Club
 - (8) Cafeterias #1 and #2 - essentially for civilian employees.
- Total - 9 points at which food is dispensed.

In addition to regular inspection by the Sanitary Sergeant and Asst Sanitary Officer, the Post Surgeon personally visits all food dispensing points at irregular and unannounced intervals. Beyond occasional minor criticisms of the usual type, the messes and other food dispensing points are found "Satisfactory" to "Superior" as to operations. None are regarded as entirely satisfactory as to equipment and efforts to improve this factor have met with relatively little success.

g. A Memorandum from the Construction Engineer's Office lists sanitary facilities.

6. Incidence and Control of Infectious Diseases. a. Venereal disease is dealt with elsewhere.

b. There have been two (2) cases of lobar pneumonia.

c. Tuberculosis cases totaled three (3) in the calendar year of 1947. There has been some difficulty due to the fact that prison regulations require physical examination three (3) days prior to discharge and cases have been detected on these examinations at the last minute. It is believed that this difficulty is now obviated by receipt and installation of photo X-ray equipment. A survey of all disciplinary prisoners has been made with first attention to those prisoners due to depart within thirty (30) days. Practice of chest X-ray during their last thirty (30) days at this station is projected as S.O.P., the examination to take place sufficiently in advance of final processing to give time for adequate disposition. A brief summary of the results of the Chest X-Ray Survey in the DB is attached. A similar survey of garrison personnel is under way with a like survey of dependents and civilian employees contemplated.

7. Outstanding Clinical Experiences, Improvements in Medical Practice, and Progress in the Field of Research and Development. Nothing deemed noteworthy has occurred other than the outbreak of diarrhea of unknown origin related in Section 4, and an unexpectedly high incidence of pulmonary tuberculosis picked up in the survey noted in Section 6.

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8. Personnel. Personnel allocation at this station consists of eleven (11) Medical Corps officers, including two (2) Psychiatrists; six (6) Army Nurse Corps Officers on a T/O of seven (7), and two (2) civilian registered nurses; three (3) Dental Corps officers; two (2) Medical Service Corps officers; eight (8) graded civilian employees, and six (6) ungraded civilian employees; forty-six (46) T/O enlisted men, three (3) of which are assigned to the Veterinary Service. The officer personnel for this period has been adequate over most of the period. The enlisted personnel has been about ten percent (10%) short at all times. The enlisted personnel now on duty is a decided improvement over one (1) year ago as this station has been able to obtain previous servicemen and also due to being Regular Army.

9. Training. There is a constant training program in effect.

a. Officers. In compliance with Post Directives, the officer personnel attends two (2) classes each week plus weekly staff meetings, plus various meetings with medical clinics and societies in Harrisburg. Negotiations are under way for teaching consultants in surgery, medicine and psychiatry.

b. Enlisted Men. The hospital maintains an on-the-job training program for all the enlisted personnel, plus weekly lectures and discussions by officer personnel and senior non-commissioned officers.

c. Nurses. The nurses attend two lectures weekly on matters pertinent to the nursing profession.

10. Supply. Supply has been adequate and is continuously improving since new changes in the supply catalog have been instituted. Consolidated supply on this post was discontinued on 13 June 1947 and the Medical Supply was taken over by the hospital which now services satellite stations consisting of Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Susquehanna, and Marietta, Pennsylvania, and some items to Indiantown Gap Military Reservation upon request.

11. Construction, Alterations, and Major Repairs of Buildings Housing Medical Activities. The following has been accomplished:

a. Outside of all hospital buildings painted. Interior of hospital painted including, Headquarters, Pharmacy, X-Ray, Surgery, General Clinic, Outpatient Clinic, and Mess Hall.

b. New composition floor coverings were laid in all hospital corridors.

c. All radiators and heating elements repaired.

d. New mess tables placed in Mess Hall; also, new drapes and curtains.

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- e. The following added to Dental Clinic:
 - (1) Venetian blinds.
 - (2) Larger and more efficient dental lathe.
 - (3) Larger casting machine, better equipped.
 - (4) Model trimmer.
 - (5) X-ray viewer.
- f. Drainage adjacent to hospital and hospital area revised and reconstructed.
- g. Shelves built and installed in Linen Room and Surgery.
- h. Officers' library improved and all books cataloged as required by existing regulations.
- i. Photocroentgen X-Ray Unit installed in X-Ray Department.
- j. New and improved electric mess cart conveyors installed in all wards.
- k. All hospital beds being paint-sprayed at present.
- l. Obtained metropolitan ambulance for medical service.
- m. 1st echelon repair and maintenance of hospital and hospital equipment being done by two (2) civilian employees.
- n. New parking lot installed adjacent to Dental Clinic.
- o. New Furniture installed in Nurses' quarters and floors sanded.
- p. New lighting system (fluorescent) installed in Headquarters and Surgery.
- q. Ventilators installed under all hospital corridors.

1. This annual report is submitted in accordance with AR 40-1005 and covers the period from 1 January 1947 to 31 December 1947.

2. The Veterinary Branch, Service Division, New Cumberland General Depot serves both the Class I and Class II installations. It is staffed by one officer whose primary designation is Depot Veterinarian responsible to The Surgeon General through the Post Commander and the Veterinary General. As a secondary duty he acts as Attending Veterinarian to the 2232nd ASU responsible to the Second Army Veterinarian through the Post Surgeon.

3. For the Class I installation the Veterinarian is assisted by three enlisted men, one Sergeant and two S/Sgts. For the Class II installation he is assisted by two civilian employees.

4. For the year 1947 there have been no public animals quartered at this post. Privately owned animals, both dogs and cats, have been routinely vaccinated against rabies and their medical and surgical diseases treated.

5. The primary mission of the Veterinary Branch is Meat and Dairy Hygiene. For the Class I installation all perishable subsistence of animal origin arriving for consumption by military personnel is inspected for sanitation and soundness and for specification conformity with regard to type class and grade. Inspection for soundness is made periodically while in storage and prior to issue to the messes. Recommendations are made to the Sales Officer regarding storage, storage temperatures, keeping qualities, and condemnation of spoiled items. In addition, as ordered by the Market Center System, inspections are made at points of origin or contractors establishments throughout Central Pennsylvania. Daily inspections are also made for all incoming, outgoing, and stored subsistence held for the Accountable Officer, New York Market Center in a privately owned cold storage plant in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Subsistence items purchased by the Post Exchange are periodically inspected for sanitation and soundness. Dairies

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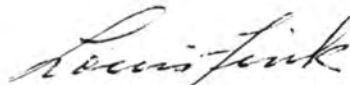

supplying this and nearby stations with milk, ice cream, and other dairy products are inspected monthly and laboratory analyses of their products are performed weekly.

6. For the Class II installation all non-perishable subsistence, both of animal and non-animal origin, which is received, stored, and shipped from the General Depot is inspected continuously. Recommendations for storage, temperatures, insect and rodent control, deterioration and condemnation, are made to the Quartermaster Supply Officer daily.

7. The personnel of the Veterinary Branch at this post are fully equipped with the materiel and knowledge of their work to expand upon themselves manyfold in the advent of a national emergency.

1. This Annual Report is submitted in accordance with AR 40-1005 and covers the period from 1 January 1947 to 31 December 1947.

2. The Dental Clinic is housed in the Station Hospital and consists of:

- a. The main operatory with three(3) operative chairs and units.
- b. An X-ray room with one (1) chair and X-ray unit.
- c. A prosthetic clinic with one (1) operating chair and unit, and an adjoining laboratory.
- d. Two (2) waiting rooms; one (1) for general prisoners, and one (1) for officers, enlisted men, and dependents.
- e. Two (2) private offices; one (1) for the Chief of Dental Service, and one (1) for the Receptionist and Clerk.

3. In January of 1947, two (2) Naval Dental Officers were on duty at this clinic, Lt. (j.g.) P. J. Spector, and Lt. (j.g.) R. A. Keith. In February 1947, 1st Lt. S. F. Kewitt and 1st Lt. J. T. Thompson reported for duty. In March, Lt. (j.g.) Keith was transferred. In May, Lt. (j.g.) Spector was discharged from the Service, and in June, Lt. Col. E. H. Van Dervort reported for duty. For the duration of the year Lt. Col. Van Dervort and Lts. Kewitt and Thompson were the dental officers on duty. The latter two(2) officers were

promoted to Captain in December 1947.

a. Four (4) enlisted men have been on duty in the clinic, working as dental assistants, laboratory technician, and clerk.

4. Dental service is performed for military personnel of the New Cumberland General Depot, Mechanicsburg Naval Supply Depot, Indiantown Gap Military Reservation, Marietta Transportation Corps Depot, and recruiting stations in the surrounding areas. Also, certain limited services have been performed upon the dependents of these personnel.

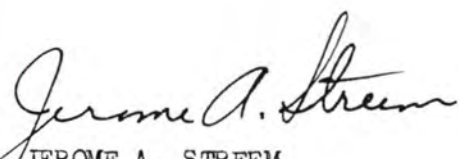
a. A survey was completed during the month of August 1947 with the following results:

1. This annual report is submitted in accordance with AR 40-1005 and covers the period from 1 January 1947 to 31 December 1947.

2. The Psychiatry and Sociology Division is housed in a two story temporary converted barracks inside the compound proper. The Division consists of three psychiatrists, a civilian clinical psychologist, a chief psychiatric social worker with under him a team of four social workers, and a classification officer with a group of enlisted clerical personnel.

a. At the beginning of the reported period there were assigned three medical officers with a MOS 3130, one a graduate of School of Neuro-psychiatry, one with a civilian background of a psychiatric residency, and one with an A. B. degree in psychology. On 1 June 1947 one of these officers was separated from the service. He was replaced with a medical officer from the adjacent station hospital. Medical officers from this station hospital have taken this position in rotation, the average stay being two months.

b. The Division is staffed with a full time civilian psychologist whose background is in educational psychology.

c. The Chief Psychiatric Social Worker is a graduate of the Course of Psychiatric Social Worker assistant (MOS 263) at the MFSS. The other four social workers have had considerable on the job training.

d. The Classification Officer is a member of the Adjutant General's Department and well versed in personnel management. Assisting him are a Chief Clerk, six typists and two filing clerks.

3. The functions of the Division are carried out in accordance with AR 600-395 and AR 40-10 C4.

a. The Chief Psychiatric Social Worker is charged with obtaining social and developmental data in each general prisoner from relatives former company commanders, employers, schools, civilian correctional and other institutions, police departments, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. These data are obtained both directly by writing to these agencies and through the aid of the American Red Cross. An excellent rapport exists with the local chapter. The psychiatric social history is prepared in accordance with TM 12-505. In order to come to a better evaluation of each prisoner's case and consequently to make better recommendations an attempt is made to obtain as many field reports as possible. On occasions the initial classification has been delayed beyond the thirty day limit to obtain valuable outside reports. It is felt that if sixty (60) days were allowed to complete the initial classification a better classification could be rendered and the requirements of Section IV, WD Circular 100, dated 18 April 1947 could still be met without difficulty.

b. The psychologist has added a psychological study consisting of any of the following tests: Otis Intermediate Examination, Weschler-Bellevue Scale, Kent Emergency Oral Intelligence Test, and Weigl Goldstein Scheerer Stick and Color Sorting Tests.

c. The psychiatrist reviews the information received so far, adds the report of physical examination and records his impressions of the general prisoner's adjustment to confinement and mental status. He finally makes appropriate recommendations. Prior to receipt of AR 40-10 C4 he was a member of the Classification Board. Since August 1947 the psychiatrist has been allowed to attend the Classification Boards regularly to orally present his recommendations and advise upon them where necessary. This policy has proven to be fruitful. The psychiatrists maintain a consultation service for military personnel at this post and have conducted some teaching and treatment as far as time permitted. Most of the teaching was done with the enlisted personnel assigned to the Division. Superficial and deep psychotherapy have been used mostly, on ambulatory patients. Treatment has been limited to patients with psychoneurotic reactions or character and behavior disorders. Psychotic patients have been transferred, upon discovery, to a General Hospital. A number of psychopaths with transient psychotic episodes have been treated locally. The local chapter of Alcoholics Anonymous was invited to establish contact with suitable general prisoners. Through the excellent cooperation of the Commandant a small group of inmates is actively engaged with Alcoholics Anonymous. Preparations are being made to have the chief psychiatric social worker undertake group therapy. A library is being maintained consisting of 30 books and periodicals. The U. S. Army Medical Department Bulletin, The American

Journal of Psychiatry, The Journal of Nervous and Mental Diseases, Psychosomatic Medicine, Archives of Neurology and Psychiatry, and Federal Probation are received regularly through the Post Surgeon.

d. The Classification Officer is charged with the administration of the Division. He supervises the collection of psychiatric social data, the typing and filing, and is charged with initiating a periodical rehearing of each general prisoner's case before the Classification Board.

4. The workload of the Division is best reflected in the following statistics:

Physically present at this installation were on 1 January 1947 and 31 December 1947 1283 and 1155 general prisoners respectively.

There were 1058 original admissions to this installation during the year. 430 were transferred from other Disciplinary Barracks.

Red Cross reports were obtained on 1353 general prisoners during the year 1947.

** Included in this group are a number of socially defected individuals who actually scored in the borderline group of mental defectives.

5. The following unusual incidents occurred:

a. A civilian neuropsychiatric consultant visited the installation on 6 and 7 October 1947 and gave many valuable recommendations concerning disposition of the more disturbed general prisoners. A number of case presentations to the consultant was utilized to demonstrate the problems confronting the Division.

b. On 20 November 1947 the building was burglarized. The lock to the medicine cabinet was forced and a bottle with 360 five grain tablets of sodium bromide and a bottle with sodium bicarbonate tablets were taken. These have not been recovered to date.

6. The Annual Report of the Commandant to the Adjutant General for the fiscal year of 1947 is inclosed for additional information.
