Dear Hillary:

With a little trepidation, as I read about Millennium toothpaste last week in New York (I thought it sounded great), I want to tell you about a program I am chairing for the ABA in London in July 2000. The purpose of this letter is to set out the basics about the program. I would love to have a chance to talk to you about some of its parts in person and have asked Pam to see if there is a time in January when I might be able to come to DC and talk with you. I am going to be working there a good bit in January and February and hope you can fit me in for a catch up. Barbara Mayden is one of the three committee members and if we can get a time, she will come up to DC too.

At the invitation of the English Bar, the ABA has met in London about every 15 years since the 1920's. The last meeting was in 1985, enormously successful, and precipitated a great desire to go back. The desire to have a major international program celebrating the Common Law during the millennium summer makes this meeting seem very important to us also. American lawyers and our English colleagues will meet from July 15 to July 20 in London to discuss issues of international importance. We expect 11,000 American lawyers and substantial numbers of English and other EU lawyers at the meeting.

You know London well and can understand what a huge logistical challenge this is. The help of the Embassy has been invaluable. But it is the intellectual challenge of the program that is most exciting to me. I want you

to know how much I appreciated meeting Ambassador Lader and hearing his great enthusiasm for participating in and supporting this meeting in every way.

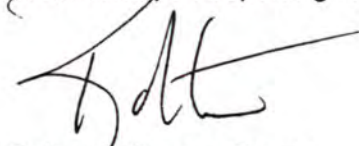
Barry and I hosted a dinner party in London last month and had the pleasure of introducing the Ambassador to the leading figures of the English Bar, including the Lord Chancellor and Lord Harry Woolf who is Master of the Rolls and a magnificent legal mind and very wonderful person.

The English committee is headed by Peter Goldsmith, whom you met briefly in Orlando (that seems a millennium ago), and Cherie Booth is on the English committee. She was to be at our dinner but I think instead chose to have dinner with her children, which only increased my regard for her! Barry and I had dinner with Cherie and her husband during the campaign, and I have presumed upon that to invite him to address our opening assembly. The Prime Ministers have opened every ABA meeting in London. Having a PM who is himself a lawyer is very meaningful to us. I am very hopeful that as the meeting nears, he will be able to accept.

I have also written the President so that in the most general way his schedulers have it in their bin. I have waited to write you until the meeting was a little further along in reality and in conception. I would like to come to discuss several program ideas I have and to get the benefit of your thoughts about the major thrust of the program.

One of the greatest pleasures of my ABA work these last years has been the chance to know many of the major legal figures in London, and I am anxious that our program reaches the heights of their expectations. I hope to talk to you very soon.

Dear Melanne,

We've had several discussions now about Hillary's possible visit. We'd suggest the following tentative programme. Perhaps with the title 'The global third way dialogue: the role of women in social and economic development'?

1. Women's Rights as Universal Human Rights (led by Henrietta Moore and Anne Philips from the Centre for Gender Studies). This topic will address the universal nature of women's rights and the ways to empower women at the local national and global levels.
2. Globalisation and Sustainable Development (led by Professor Lord Desai). The session will address ways to empower ordinary citizens to influence their economic wellbeing in a globalised marketplace including such tools as micro-lending and public-private partnerships. The session also might cover the issue of corporate responsibility for sustainable development especially in relation to multinational companies and how citizens groups relate to these companies.
3. Global Democracy and Citizenship (led by David Held). A discussion about the interaction between globalisation on one hand and the process of democratisation and citizens' rights on the other.
4. Peace and Human Rights (led by Mary Kaldor). Will cover the issue of humanitarian intervention, the role of citizens groups in conflict situations, citizens networking across conflict divides, refugees.

We'd be happy to involve LSE faculty, plus other speakers from across the world. I've asked Mary Kaldor, who drew up the list of topics, to coordinate with you. Please let me know if there's anything else I can do at this point.

I'm just writing a new short book on the third way politics debate – it will contain a strong defence of the achievements of the New Democrats in the US.

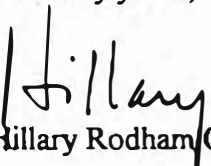

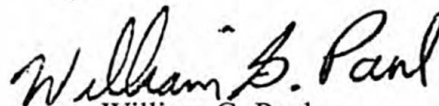

In Jewish tradition, the Torah is referred to as the Tree of Life or *Etz Chaim*. She was educated at the London School of Economics, where she received her PhD in 1969. After nine years as a Lecturer in Social Administration at the LSE, she became, in 1975, a member of the Central Policy Review Staff in the Cabinet Office. She worked there during the Wilson and Callaghan administrations. In 1978 she became Professor of Educational Administration at the University of London Institute of Education, and then from 1983-87 was first Deputy Education Officer (Resources) and then Clerk to the Authority and Director of Education in the Inner London Education Authority.

In 1987 Tessa Blackstone became a Labour Life Peer. She was Chairman of the BDC's General Advisory Council from 1987-91. She is a member of the Royal Opera House Board and, from September 1991, Chairman of its Ballet Board. She is also Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Institute for Public Policy Research. In March 1992 she was appointed a member of the Board of Trustees of the Natural History Museum.

She is the author of many articles on social and education policy, and also of a number of books. Two recent books are Inside the Think Tank: Advising the Cabinet 1971-83 (with William Plowden) Heinemann, 1988, and Prisons and Penal Reform, Chatto & Windus, 1990.

Ruth Evans has been Director of the National Consumer Council since 1 January 1992. She is also a Trustee of the Money Advice Trust and Member of the Central Research and Development Committee for the NHS.

JULIA MIDDLETON
Chief Executive, Common Purpose

Julia was born in London, though her family comes from Bolton. As a child she lived in several European cities and in New York where her father worked in international trade and finance. She was educated at French state schools throughout, returning to Britain at the age of 16 to take her Baccalaureat at the French Lycee in London.

She graduated a BSc (Hons) in Economics from the London School of Economics.

Julia's international upbringing and early perspective on multi-cultural societies had already sown the seeds which were to develop into her future initiatives.

She began her working life in employee relations at the Industrial Society, working within companies across the United Kingdom on their briefing and consultative systems. She is the author of "Quality Circles", "Explaining Financial Information to Employees" and "Making Consultation Work".

After working for Petrofina and then British Home Stores specialising in employee communication, Julia returned to the Industrial Society in 1985 to take it into the new field of training for unemployed young people. She established the Head Start in Inner Cities programme, providing school-leavers from inner city areas with quality training materials and professional advice direct from would-be employers. By 1988 Head Start was running in 20 cities and had trained over 10,000 school-leavers.

In the autumn of 1988, partly influenced by the success of the Community Leadership Programmes in America and in a climate of city leadership development in the United Kingdom, Julia saw that the time was right for something new. She founded the Common Purpose Charitable Trust, transferring her enthusiasm to people with influence and, within the first three months, persuading the Government and private companies to part with half a million pounds' in sponsorship. Julia became Chief Executive of Common Purpose in January 1989.

"Cities are my passion. They are living entities. If you can get the constituent parts to add up effectively, then the entity thrives. The days when any operation could be run in isolation are long gone. We all need to be able to see the bigger picture."

In 1992, with Common Purpose programmes already thriving in 18 cities, Julia was nominated Visionary of the Year. She chairs the Bridge Group (a gathering of Chief Executives of national voluntary sector organisations), is a Trustee of Demos (the cross-party think tank) and of the Media Trust.

Julia is married to Rupert Middleton, managing director of West Ferry Printers. They have four small children and live in Hackney.

Biographical sketch

Judie Newman was educated in Caithness, Scotland, and then at the Universities of Edinburgh and Cambridge. She is Professor of American and Postcolonial Literature at the University of Newcastle Upon Tyne. Publications include *The Ballistic Bard : Postcolonial Fictions*, an edition of Harriet Beecher Stowe, *Dred : A Tale of the Great Dismal Swamp*, *Nadine Gordimer*, *John Updike*, *Saul Bellow and History*, and numerous essays on American and Postcolonial novelists. She is also the Chair of the British Association for American Studies, and the mother of a three year old son.

Director of the Wellcome Trust**

Bridget Ogilvie took her first degree in agricultural science (BRurSc) from the University of New England in Australia in 1960. She obtained her doctoral degrees from the University of Cambridge (PhD in 1963, ScD in 1981) for research in parasite immunology.

Before joining the staff of the Wellcome Trust, she was for 17 years a member of the staff of the UK Medical Research Council at the National Institute for Medical Research, Mill Hill, London. In those years, she travelled widely in both the developed world and the tropics in pursuit of her research interests and as an advisor for bodies such as the World Health Organisation. From 1985 to 1991, she was a Visiting Professor at the Imperial College of Science, Technology and Medicine in London.

Her first post at the Wellcome Trust was a half-time appointment as coordinator of its tropical medicine programme, whilst still running her research group at the NIMR. In 1981 she joined the staff on a full-time basis as Deputy Secretary and Assistant Director. She was promoted to Deputy Director (Science) in 1984 and then to Director (Science Programmes) in 1989, with responsibility for the science funding activities of the Trust overall. At that time she also took a particular interest in schemes for the career development of scientists and medical graduates, and in the veterinary programme of the Trust. In October 1991, on the retirement of Dr Peter Williams, she was appointed as Director of the Trust.

She is an honorary member of the British Society for Parasitology, the American Society of Parasitologists, the Royal College of Physicians and an honorary associate of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons. In October 1993 she was asked to sit on the Government's Council for Science and Technology and is also a Trustee of the Science Museum (National Museum of Science & Technology). On 1 March 1995 she was appointed as a Non-executive Director of Lloyds Bank.
