Biography -- Congressman Tony P. Hall

Congressman Tony P. Hall, of Dayton, Ohio, has been an outspoken advocate for combatting world hunger, protecting human rights, and promoting humanitarian causes -- including basic education, adult literacy, immunization and other child survival programs, and sustainable agriculture in developing countries.

Congressman Hall has visited numerous poverty-stricken and war-torn regions, including those in Rwanda, North Korea, Bosnia, Angola, Somalia, Sudan, Peru, Ethiopia, Sierra Leone, Bangladesh and Haiti. He has a record of consistently following up on these visits by working to assist the needy people of these nations through legislative and other channels.

Congressman Hall has sponsored legislation to help immunize the world's children against major diseases, and to increase U.S. funding for Vitamin A and other basic health programs. He has supported legislation to expand, improve and extend U.S. programs that provide food assistance to other nations. Most recently, he sponsored a successful amendment to the 1996 Farm Bill to extend U.S. food aid programs until 2002.

He also has worked on numerous domestic initiatives -- promoting micro-enterprise projects that create jobs, gleaning initiatives that provide the needy with food, efforts to ease food-stamp cuts, and the 1997 "Hunger Has a Cure" campaign.

Congressman Hall also has worked actively to improve human rights conditions throughout the world, especially in the Philippines, East Timor, Paraguay, South Korea, Romania, and several countries of the former Soviet Union. In 1994, Congressman Hall joined two others in nominating Bishop Carlos Belo for the Nobel Peace Prize, which Bishop Belo won in 1996. Congressman Hall has led efforts to call attention to the plight of refugees around the world, to secure additional U.S. funding to assist refugees, and to expand the activities of the U.S. State Department to protect civilians during armed conflict.

Congressman Hall is the founder and co-chairman of the Congressional Hunger Center, a non-profit organization. He served as Chairman of the House Select Committee on Hunger from 1989 until it was abolished in 1993, then fasted for three weeks to draw worldwide attention to the scourge of hunger. In 1983, Congressman Hall founded the Congressional Friends of Human Rights Monitors, and continues to serve as its steering committee's Democratic House member.

Congressman Hall was one of four people nominated by President Clinton to be UNICEF's Executive Director in 1994, and has received numerous awards, including:

United States Committee for UNICEF's 1995 Children's Legislative Advocate Award,

U.S. AID's Presidential End Hunger Award,

The Secretary of State's Open Forum Distinguished Public Service Award,

THE BIOGRAPHY OF JOHN LEWIS

Described as "one of the most courageous persons the Civil Rights Movement ever produced," John Lewis has dedicated his life to protecting human rights, securing personal dignity, and building what he calls "The Beloved Community". He has displayed a sense of ethics and morality that has won him the admiration of many of his colleagues in Congress.

He was born the son of sharecroppers on February 21, 1940 outside of Troy, Alabama. John Lewis grew up on his family's farm and attended segregated public schools in Pike County, Alabama. He holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Religion and Philosophy from Fisk University; and he is a graduate of the American Baptist Theological Seminary in Nashville, Tennessee.

At an early age, John Lewis developed an unwavering commitment to the Civil Rights Movement. For more than three decades, he has been in the vanguard of progressive social movements and the human rights struggles in the United States. As a student in Nashville, John Lewis organized sit-in demonstrations at segregated lunch counters in the city.

During the height of the Civil Rights Movement, from 1963 to 1966, Lewis was the Chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), which he helped form. SNCC was largely responsible for the sit-ins and other activities of students in the struggle for civil rights.

In 1961, John Lewis volunteered to participate in the Freedom Rides to challenge segregation at interstate bus terminals. Lewis risked his life and was beaten severely by mobs for participating in the Rides.

Despite his youth, John Lewis became a recognized leader in the Civil Rights Movement. By 1963, he was recognized as one of the "Big Six" leaders of the Civil Rights Movement. (The other Big Six leaders were Whitney Young, A. Philip Randolph, Martin Luther King, Jr., James Farmer and Roy Wilkins.) Lewis was one of the planners and a keynote speaker at the "March on Washington" in August 1963.

In 1964, John Lewis coordinated SNCC efforts to organize voter registration drives and community action programs during the Mississippi Freedom Summer. The following year, Lewis led the demonstrators on one of the most dramatic nonviolent protests of the Movement. Along with fellow activist Hosea Williams, Lewis led 525 marchers across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama on March 7, 1965. Alabama state troopers attacked the marchers in a confrontation that became known as "Bloody Sunday". That fateful march and a subsequent march between Selma and Montgomery, Alabama led to the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Despite more than 40 arrests, physical attacks and serious injuries, John Lewis remained a devoted advocate of the philosophy of nonviolence. After leaving SNCC in 1966, he remained active in the Civil Rights Movement through his work as Associate Director of the Field Foundation and his participation in the Southern Regional Council's voter registration programs.

Lewis went on to become the Director of the Voter Education Project (VEP). Under his leadership, the VEP transformed the nation's political climate by adding nearly 4 million minorities to the voter rolls.

In 1977, John Lewis was appointed by President Jimmy Carter to direct more than 250,000 volunteers for ACTION, the federal volunteer agency. In 1980, he left ACTION and became Community Affairs Director of the National Consumer Co-op Bank in Atlanta.

John Lewis' first electoral success came in 1981 when he was elected to the Atlanta City Council. While serving on the Atlanta City Council, Lewis was an advocate for ethics and neighborhood preservation. He resigned from the Council in 1986 to run for Congress. Elected to Congress in November 1986, Lewis represents Georgia's Fifth Congressional District. He was re-elected by an overwhelming majority to a fifth term in Congress in November, 1994, and was unopposed in his bid for a sixth term in 1996.

Since joining the U.S. Congress, John Lewis has drawn much praise from political observers who have predicted a bright future for him in national politics. In 1990, the National Journal named John Lewis as one of eleven "rising stars in Congress". The Journal stated, "Few House Members, let alone those with little seniority or clout, have had such momentous experiences before coming to Washington that other Members of Congress want to hear about them. John R. Lewis, D-Ga., has that cachet and he has made it a plus in his House service. In so doing, he also has begun to show the reasons for his earlier success."

Living up to expectations, in 1991, John Lewis was selected Chief Deputy Democratic Whip. He continues to serve in that Democratic Leadership position. John Lewis is a member of the U.S. House of Representatives Ways & Means Committee, where he serves on the Health Subcommittee. He also serves on the influential Steering and Policy Committee and is co-chair of the Congressional Urban Caucus, as well as the Congressional Committee to Support Writers and Journalists.

At the 1992 Democratic National Convention, John Lewis was chosen to second the nomination of Al Gore for Vice President. He was one of seven members of the 1996 Presidential Debate Commission, and also served as one of seven honorary co-chairs of the 1996 National Clinton-Gore Campaign. Additionally, John Lewis served as President of the Americans for Democratic Action from 1993 to 1995.

John Lewis' wife, Lillian, lives in Atlanta, Georgia where she is Director of External Affairs, Office of Research and Sponsored Programs at Clark Atlanta University. The Lewises have one son, John Miles Lewis.

The first Hispanic woman elected to the United States Congress, Ileana Ros-Lehtinen was born in Havana, Cuba on July 15, 1952, and came to the United States fleeing communist aggression when she was seven years old. She attended Miami-Dade Community College where she received an A.A. in 1972. She subsequently earned a B.A. in 1975 and M.S. in 1987 from Florida International University. She is a Ph.D. candidate in education at the University of Miami. Before entering politics, Ros-Lehtinen was a teacher and the founder and administrator of Eastern Academy, a private elementary school in South Florida.

In 1982, Congresswoman Ros-Lehtinen began her political career when she was elected to the Florida House of Representatives, becoming the first Hispanic woman elected to Florida's state legislature. She served until 1986, when she became a state senator. As a state legislator she introduced and achieved the creation of the Florida Pre-Paid College Tuition Program. Ros-Lehtinen served as a state senator until 1989, when she was elected to the United States House of Representatives in a special election to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Claude Pepper.

Ileana serves on the International Relations and Government Reform and Oversight Committees. In the 104th Congress, she became the first Hispanic woman to chair a subcommittee (the Subcommittee on Africa). In her tenure in Congress she has become a leading figure in shaping foreign policy especially toward Latin America. In 1992, she was a key player in the approval of the Cuban Democracy Act and in the last Congress was instrumental in the successful passage of the Cuban Liberty and Democratic Solidarity Act (the Helms-Burton Law). She was also a leading voice in Congress warning about the threat of allowing the Castro dictatorship in Cuba complete a dangerous nuclear power plant on the island. Ros-Lehtinen is widely regarded as an international defender of human rights and democracy.

Ros-Lehtinen has also been active on the domestic front primarily in issues concerning education and children. The Congresswoman led the battle in Congress to pressure President Clinton issue an executive order that requires federal buildings to exhibit pictures of missing children.

Her Congressional district includes Little Havana, South Miami Beach, Coral Gables, Key Biscayne and suburban Miami.

KARL FREDERICK Inderfurth

Karl F. (Rick) Inderfurth was nominated by President Clinton to serve as the U.S. Representative for Special Political Affairs to the United Nations, with Ambassadorial rank, on April 20, 1993. He was confirmed by the Senate on May 24 and sworn in by the U.S. Permanent Representative to the United Nations, Ambassador Madeleine K. Albright, on May 28. His portfolio includes UN peacekeeping, disarmament and security affairs. Ambassador Inderfurth also serves as Deputy U.S. Representative on the UN Security Council. During the Clinton/Gore Presidential Transition, he worked on the White House/National Security Council team with Ambassador Albright.

Ambassador Inderfurth was born in Charlotte, North Carolina in 1946. He attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, majored in Political Science and received his B.A. in 1968. He was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Strathclyde in Scotland and earned his M.A. from the Department of Politics at Princeton University in 1975.

Prior to his Presidential appointment, Mr. Inderfurth served in several government positions. From 1975-1976 he was a Professional Staff Member of the Senate Intelligence Committee. From 1977 to 1979 he served on the staff of the National Security Council at the White House, as Special Assistant to Dr. Zbigniew Brzezinski, President Carter's National Security Adviser. And from 1979 to 1981, Mr. Inderfurth was Deputy Staff Director for the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. In this capacity he had primary responsibility for organizing the Committee's examination of the SALT II nuclear arms treaty. He also headed a staff delegation to Taiwan in 1980 to prepare a report on "Implementation of the Taiwan Relations Act: The First Year."

Following the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Mr. Inderfurth joined ABC News, first as a National Security Correspondent with a special focus on arms control. He won several awards for his reporting on the nation's security concerns, including an Emmy and an Alfred I. DuPont-Columbia University Award for his contribution to "World News Tonight's" ten-part examination of U.S.-Soviet relations, "A Balance of Powers."

Mr. Inderfurth was Moscow Correspondent for ABC News from February, 1989 to August 1991. In this capacity he reported on the historic transformation of the Soviet Union. During his two and a half year assignment, Mr. Inderfurth traveled to 12 of the then 15 Soviet republics and broadcast more than 400 reports for ABC News.

Mr. Inderfurth is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations in New York, the International Institute for Strategic Studies in London, the Fulbright Association and the Council of American Ambassadors. Along with Dr. Loch Johnson of the University of Georgia, he co-authored an examination of the history and transformation of the National Security Council entitled Decisions of the Highest Order: Perspectives on the National Security Council. He has been an Op/Ed contributor to the Washington Post, Christian Science Monitor and International Herald Tribune.

The Most Reverend William G. Curlin was appointed by Pope John Paul II as the third Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Charlotte on February 22, 1994. He was officially installed as bishop in April of 1994.

A native of Virginia, Bishop Curlin's moved as a young child to Washington D.C. After attending Catholic elementary and high schools and Georgetown University, he entered St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, Maryland. Following his ordination on May 25, 1957, by Patrick Cardinal O'Boyle in St. Matthew's Cathedral, Washington, Father Curlin received his first parish assignment as assistant to Bishop John M. McNamara. Five additional parish assignments were to follow, the last two as pastor.

During 1967-1983 Father Curlin also served as the Director of Vocations for the Priesthood and as Director and Vicar for the Permanent Diaconate. He was honored by Pope Paul VI with the title Chaplain to His Holiness in 1970 and later as Prelate of Honor by Pope John Paul II in 1978. Both honors carry the title Monsignor. On December 20, 1988, Monsignor Curlin was ordained an Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Washington by James Cardinal Hickey and assigned to assist the Cardinal as his Regional Bishop in Southern Maryland. He remained there until his appointment as the Third Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Charlotte in 1994.

Like many of his brother priests, Bishop Curlin has also served in various church and civic organizations. As a member of the Board of Directors for Catholic Charities, he was instrumental in establishing the first Catholic Shelter for Homeless Women in the Nation's Capitol. Later, as President of the Board of Directors, he encouraged the establishment of The Gift of Peace, a home for people with AIDS and other terminal illnesses. The Council of Black Catholics selected Bishop Curlin in 1983 as their recipient of the Award for Outstanding Service to the Black Community.

During the past thirty years Bishop Curlin has been requested by both clergy and laity to direct the spiritual retreats. This year he will direct his 178th retreat.

Bishop Curlin treasures his friendship with Mother Teresa that began when he served as pastor in an inner city parish in Washington. Their friendship has grown during the past quarter century. When his appointment as Bishop of Charlotte was first announced, Mother Teresa telephoned Bishop Curlin to offer to send her sisters to Charlotte as a gift of service to the poor and as a pledge of friendship for Bishop Curlin. Charlotte was honored with Mother Teresa's presence when she came to our city in 1996 to establish a Home for her Sisters and to participate in an Ecumenical Service that drew fourteen thousand members of many faiths to pray together as brothers and sisters of the one God.

Pastor, Speaker, Author, Motivator

Dr. Schuller's positive messages are a source of strength and hope, motivating people of all nationalities, races, creeds and faiths.

As a pastor, Robert Schuller's positive messages are heard every Sunday all over the world, more than any other person on global television. His audience is estimated at nearly 20 million persons and he is the first Christian minister in history ever to be heard every week on America's Armed Forces Network, one of the only networks that footprints the globe, reaching 184 countries and all 7 continents.

Since 1990, Dr. Schuller has been asked to regularly present a Christmas message and an Easter message on special programs produced for Indian television. These programs have been transmitted every year on the main, Indian government channel at Christmas and Easter. The Indian government has provided the airtime free of charge for these special holiday programs which have each been viewed by an estimated 250 to 300 million people.

As a speaker and motivator, Dr. Schuller is sought for his goal-setting ideas for business conventions and conferences worldwide: Africa, Japan, Korea, South Africa, Switzerland, Norway, Germany, Hong Kong, Australia, The Netherlands, Canada, and throughout the United States.

Born in Alton, Iowa, on September 16, 1926, Robert Harold Schuller knew, since the age of four, that he wanted to be a minister. He fulfilled that dream in 1950 when he was ordained by the Reformed Church in America after receiving his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Hope College, and a Masters of Divinity from Western Theological Seminary, in Holland, Michigan. The Reformed Church is the oldest Protestant denomination in the United States, with a continuous ministry since 1628.

After ordination, Robert Schuller pastored the Ivanhoe Reformed Church in Chicago for five years. During his ministry there, the congregation grew from 38 to over 400.

In 1955 Robert Schuller was called by the Reformed Church in America to begin a new church in Garden Grove, California. With his wife, Arvella, as organist and \$500 in assets, he rented the

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Orange Drive-In Theater and conducted Sunday services from the roof of the snack bar.

Under Robert Schuller's leadership, the first designed "walk-in-drive-in" church building was built. The fast growth of this young congregation dictated the decision to build the internationally acclaimed Crystal Cathedral. The first-ever all-glass church was dedicated on September 14, 1980, "To the Glory of Man for the Greater Glory of God." Today the Cathedral's ministry is all-encompassing with annual audiences approaching one million people attending events which include worship services, Christmas Eve Candlelight Services, Easter morning services, memorial services, The Glory of Christmas and Easter productions, conferences, seminars and workshops, interchurch rallies, civic events, baccalaureate and graduation ceremonies.

In 1968 he founded New Hope, America's first live Christian 24-hour telephone suicide prevention and counseling center. Since the beginning of New Hope it is estimated that over one million people have dialed (714) NEW-HOPE for help, any hour of the day or night. Since its origination, New Hope has been an eye that never closes and an ear that is never shut.

In 1970 he founded the Robert H. Schuller Institute for Successful Church Leadership, which has more than 20,000 graduates from various Protestant and Catholic denominations.

At the age of 70, Dr. Schuller continues to dream dreams and set goals. There is no sign of retirement for him. Author of thirty-one hardcover books, he has just completed his latest book: *If It's Going To Be, It's Up To Me*. Five of his books have appeared on the "New York Times" best seller list.

In 1992, one of Dr. Schuller's lifetime dreams was realized when, through a generous donation of Mr. J.B. Fuqua, the Fuqua International School of Christian Communication was established. Dr. Schuller serves as Chancellor of this interdenominational program which specializes in the art of preaching, where ministers from all over the world study in-depth: the Message, the Messenger, the Method and the Milieu.

Dr. Schuller has been honored with numerous awards, a few of which include: the Horatio Alger Award, presented by the Horatio Alger Association of Distinguished Americans; Freedom Foundation Awards; Clergyman of the Year, presented by Religious Heritage of America; Awards of Excellence for Religion in Media; the Napoleon Hill Gold Medal Award for Literary Achievement; The Golden Plate Award, presented by the American Academy of Achievement; the Outstanding American Award, presented by The Los Angeles Philanthropic Foundation; the 20th Annual Humanitarian of the Year

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Award, presented by the National Conference of Christians and Jews; both Dr. and Mrs. Schuller were honored with The Edith Munger Leadership Award presented by the Munger Center for Psychological Services.

Dr. Schuller's affiliations include: Member of the Guild of Architects of the American Institute of Architects; Board of Counselors of the Y.M.C.A. of the USA; Advisory Board Member, Church Growth International, Seoul, Korea; Honorary Member, National Association of Christian Psychotherapists and Counselors, Inc.; Advisory Board of the Highpoint Cancer Education Center; Advisory Board of the Salvation Army; Board of Director, Horatio Alger Association of Distinguished Americans; Member of the American Academy of Achievement; Founder and Honorary Chairman, Churches Uniting in Global Mission.

His honorary doctorate degrees include those from Azusa Pacific University, Azusa, California; Hope College, Holland, Michigan (his Alma Mater); Pepperdine University, Malibu, California; Barrington College in Rhode Island; Ashland College, Ashland, Ohio, and Hanyang University, Seoul, Korea.

Robert and Arvella Schuller have five children, all of whom are active in Christian ministry. His only son, Robert Anthony, is also an ordained minister of the Reformed Church in America. To date there are seventeen grandchildren.

Eunice Kennedy Shriver

Founder and Honorary Chairman, Special Olympics International

As executive vice president of the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr. Foundation and Honorary Chairman of Special Olympics International, Eunice Kennedy Shriver has been a leader in the worldwide struggle to improve and enhance the lives of individuals with mental retardation for more than three decades.

Born in Brookline, Massachusetts, the fifth of nine children of Joseph P. and Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy, Eunice Mary Kennedy received a bachelor of science degree in sociology from Stanford University, Palo Alto, California.

Following graduation, she worked for the State Department in the Special War Problems Division. In 1950, she became a social worker at the Penitentiary for Women in Alderson, West Virginia, and the following year she moved to Chicago to work with the House of the Good Shepherd and the Chicago Juvenile Court. In 1957, Mrs. Shriver took over the direction of the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr. Foundation.

The Foundation, established in 1946 as a memorial to Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr.—the eldest son who was killed in World War II—has two major objectives: to seek the prevention of mental retardation by identifying its causes, and to improve the means by which society deals with citizens who have mental retardation.

Under Mrs. Shriver's leadership, the Foundation has helped achieve many significant advances, including the following:

- 1961 The establishment of the President Kennedy Committee on Mental Retardation
- 1962 Development of the National Institute for Child Health and Human Development
- 1962 Creation of the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr. Awards in Mental Retardation
- 1963 Establishment of fitness standards and tests for individuals with mental retardation, similar to the President's Fitness Awards program, and research to develop these fitness standards for people with mental retardation
- 1964 The initiation of a five-year public information campaign by the National Advertising Council to promote acceptance and understanding of people with mental retardation
- 1964 Changes in Civil Service regulations that allow persons with mental retardation to be hired on the basis of ability rather than test scores
- 1967 The establishment of a network of university-affiliated facilities and mental retardation research centers at major medical schools across the United States

- 1968 The establishment of Special Olympics
- 1971 The creation of major centers for the study of medical ethics at Harvard and Georgetown Universities
- 1981 The creation of the "Community of Caring" concept for the reduction of mental retardation among babies of teenagers
- 1982 Institution of 16 "Community of Caring" Model Centers
- 1990-
- 1995 Establishment of "Community of Caring" programs in 450 public and private schools

Recognized throughout the world for her efforts on behalf of persons with mental retardation, Mrs. Shriver has received many honors and awards including: the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the Legion of Honor, the Priz de la Couronne Francaise, the Mary Lasker Award, the Philip Murray-William Green Award (presented to Eunice and Sargent Shriver by the AFL-CIO), the AAMD Humanitarian Award, the NRPAS National Volunteer Service Award, the Laetare Medal of the University of Notre Dame, and the Order of the Smile of Polish Children.

Her honorary degrees include: Yale University, Holy Cross University, Princeton University, Regis College, Manhattanville College, Newton College, Brescia College, Central Michigan University, University of Vermont, and Albertus Magnus College.

On March 24, 1984, when President Reagan awarded Mrs. Shriver the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award, for work on behalf of persons with mental retardation, he had this to say:

"With enormous conviction and unrelenting effort, Eunice Kennedy Shriver has labored on behalf of America's least powerful people, those with mental retardation. Over the last two decades, she has been at the forefront of numerous initiatives on behalf of the mentally retarded, from creating day camps, to establishing research centers, to the founding of the Special Olympics program. Her decency and goodness have touched the lives of many, and Eunice Kennedy Shriver deserves America's praise, gratitude and love."

Eunice Kennedy Shriver is married to Sargent Shriver, chairman of the board of Special Olympics International and former director of the Peace Corps and the Office of Economic Opportunity, and former U.S. ambassador to France. The Shriver's have five children: Robert Sargent Shriver III, Maria Owings Shriver Schwarzenegger, Timothy Perry Shriver, Mark Kennedy Shriver, and Anthony Paul Kennedy Shriver.

Kenneth Francis Hackett was born [REDACTED] (b)(6) He [001] received his B.S. from Boston College and has also attended graduate programs at New York University and the University of South Carolina.

After graduation from Boston College, Mr. Hackett joined the Peace Corps and was stationed in Ghana, serving as an advisor to an agricultural cooperative movement and working on a United Nations development project on Lake Volta. Following the Peace Corps, Mr. Hackett joined Catholic Relief Services, the international relief and development agency of the Catholic Church in the United States. Founded in 1943 to address the needs of war refugees in Eastern Europe following the Second World War, today, Catholic Relief Services operates in over 80 countries throughout the developing world with a \$215 million annual operating budget and is one of the largest international relief and development agencies in the world.

Mr. Hackett's first assignment with Catholic Relief Services was in Sierra Leone where he served as Program Director. After spending three years in West Africa, Mr. Hackett returned to the agency's headquarters in New York in 1975 for graduate school and to serve in the Africa Regional Office. In 1978, he was named Regional Director. During this period he traveled extensively throughout the continent. In the early-80's, as Director of this region, Mr. Hackett oversaw the relief operation in Ethiopia which was the largest relief operation undertaken in the agency's history. In mid-1985, Mr. Hackett was named Director of External Affairs, overseeing the fundraising and awareness divisions where he served until 1987, when he returned to the field as Representative in the Philippines. This tour was followed in 1992, with a return to Africa where he served as the Director for East Africa during the Somalia crisis.

Mr. Hackett was named Executive Director of Catholic Relief Services in July of 1993. Under Mr. Hackett's leadership, Catholic Relief Services was awarded the 1996 Milch Award for excellence of accomplishments by Loyola College of Maryland. He currently serves as President and Chairman of the Inter-Faith Hunger Appeal; North American Vice President of Caritas Internationalis, Rome; and serves on the boards of Directors of CIDSE, Brussels, International Development Conference, Washington, D.C., Baltimore Council on Foreign Affairs and as a member of U.S.C.C International Policy Committee.

Mr. Hackett met his wife, Joan Mitchell Hackett, at Catholic Relief Services where she served as an Assistant Program Director in Mauritania and in Ghana. A native of Concord, Massachusetts, Joan Hackett is a graduate of Regis College, Middlebury College (Breadloaf School) and the Asia Institute of Management. Ken and Joan Hackett reside in Columbia, Maryland with their two children, Jennifer Marie and Michael Kenneth.

H. James Towey

Jim Towey is founder and president of the Commission on Aging with Dignity, a privately-funded, non-profit organization that seeks to safeguard human dignity as America ages, and to provide more compassionate care for the seriously ill. Aging with Dignity recently launched the FIVE WISHES Living Will, which was featured on NBC's "Today Show" in August 1997 and has attracted worldwide interest.

Towey grew up in Florida and received degrees in accounting (magna cum laude) and law from Florida State University. He began his professional life in Washington DC, working for United States Senator Mark Hatfield (R-OR), the Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee. At age 27, Towey was the youngest legislative director and legal counsel in the United States Senate, a position he held for four years. He left Capitol Hill in 1988 to work full-time for Mother Teresa of Calcutta for two years, first in the missions of Mexico, and later caring for the sick and dying in her AIDS home in Washington DC. He continues to provide pro bono legal counsel to Mother Teresa and her organization.

Towey returned to Florida in 1991 to work with newly elected Governor Lawton Chiles and later was appointed head of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (HRS) in Miami. Nine months after arriving in Miami, Towey oversaw the largest humanitarian relief effort in America's history in response to Hurricane Andrew in August, 1992. Because of his successful efforts, in July, 1993, Governor Chiles appointed Towey to be Secretary of HRS. With 40,000 employees and a budget of \$4.3 billion, Towey headed the largest state health and social services agency in the country.

During Towey's two years as secretary, HRS began the first "welfare to work" pilot program in state history, settled several federal class action lawsuits, set records for the number of foster children placed in adoptive homes, and brought Florida's food stamp error rate—which prior to Towey's appointment was the highest in the country—back into federal compliance.

Towey left government service in June, 1995, and was a consultant on federal welfare reform legislation to both Governor Chiles and U.S. Senator Bob Graham, before founding the Commission. Towey and his wife, Mary, have three children: James, Joseph and Maximilian.
