RE: POVERTY LEVEL PROFILE FOR HOUSING, MEDICAL AND SCHOOL

Enclosed is an article from the Sampson County Newspapr regarding poverty in the rural area/urban areas of North Carolina. Enclosed is a summary referencing this information for youth, adults, disabled/or handicapped parents, disabled/or handicapped children, disabled elderly or elders for the rural areas in: Sampson, Wake, Bladen, Cumberland, Duplin, Johnston, Pender and Harnet counties. The rural areas expressed to educate the children/also the adult people with a new breakthrough cycle for housing, education and medical.

We want self-independent living, self-incompromising living, positive soluations for problems and improved educational levels for all people dealing with poverty.

Our involvement shows a lack of education--with emphasis on: reading, math, electronic forms, computer technology, trade systems, jobs, academics, physics, chemistry and biology.

Our study shows from the Health Department, problems concerning poverty for health services. Without team effort for educational teenage programs, we have a poverty level that reflects teenage pregnancy that produces out-of-wedlock children for the rural areas of North Carolina to be extremely high. The poverty cycle for teenage pregnancy starts at a early age for the rural areas poverty-stricken in North Carolina. We base this problem on: a lack of education, lack of independent living, lack of team work, social funcitons, community services, lack of proper housing, lack of proper medical care and training programs, lack of jobs/stable employment.

In Sampson county alone, the number of infants with mortality

rates are dropping/failing from 3.9% to 9.3%, according to a study conducted by Dr. Curtis Holloman, Director, Sampson County Health Department.

As far as the poverty rate for the academic students racial and classroom activities are rated poor poverty in North Carolina; which affects the Blacks/Hispanics and other races. With a poor level of poverty for education, housing and medical centers. Under the circumstances, to improve this poverty problem, we must build more housing, more schools such as the Public Charter School. There is a need for more medical centers that will be the mission statement for all families in the rural and urban communities of North Carolina.

The North Carolina Census Department in 1992 gives a survey of 41% population in Sampson County for school students between the age of 5-17 black that has gained no stability for independent living. High teenage pregnancy, poor poverty housing poor medical care and no jobs. These individuals are left at home with parents to support them in the background. With the parents having a lower education/or no educational background portrayed by negative thinking without positive thinking for low-income families. These same families in the medical arena, do not have health insurance for a longer life-span thereby becoming another statistic.

Forty-Percent of the children in the Clinton City School system receive free or reduced lunch for the low-income family.

We need more social services, team work, rehabilitation team, U.S. unemployment team work, foundation/other charitable funds, team work through small and corporate business and more workshops that will help fight the poverty level for our communities.

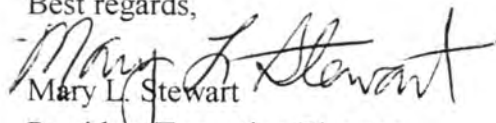

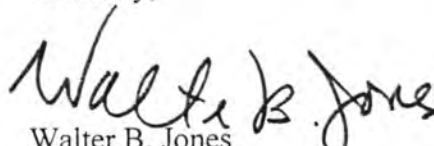

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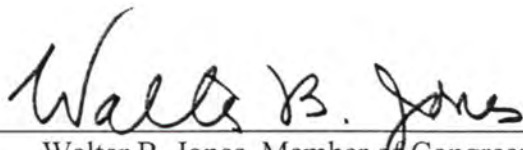

Poverty level concerns local school officials

With the approach of the first day of school, concerns of the 'vicious' cycle of poverty and its affects on the youth of today have school officials and other county administrators attempting to concentrate on further education for students to break the cycle.

City Schools Superintendent Dr. Charles Gainey said poverty is a situation that is self-encompassing, spinning its victims further into the circle of failure because of the inability to obtain positive solutions to problems beyond their control.

"It's going to be very difficult to make dramatic changes in the educational levels of these children until society is more able to deal with the issues of poverty," he said.

For some, coming to school is a different world. Children living in homes where things like books and electronic devices such as computers may be a rarity are often amazed and overwhelmed by the learning process.

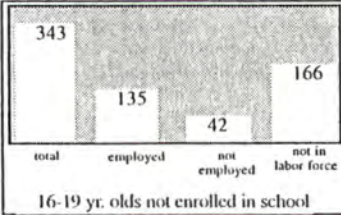
"When they are placed in an environment that places significant emphasis on reading and electronic forms of transferring information such as computers, it is extremely difficult to handle for the student," Gainey said.

And according to statistics from Census figures and Health Department numbers, the problem may not be getting any better.

Even with increased efforts within schools to educate teens on the repercussions of sexual activity and available measures of birth control, numbers for teen mothers continue

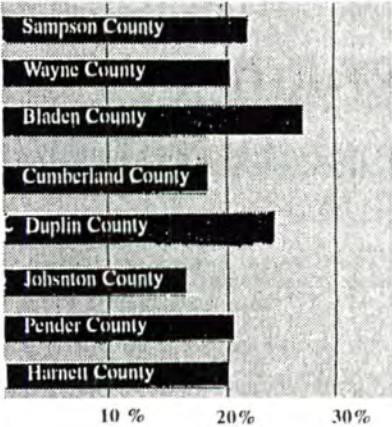

to climb as do the birth of children out of wedlock. According to Health Director Curtis Holloman, numbers that span the last five years indicate that teen moms and single mothers have increased more than 7 points, putting the new child at risk of being

caught up within the poverty cycle. Children of teen mothers are often low in birth weight and other common characteristics that sometimes lead to costly medical expenses. The burden of a 'baby giving birth to a baby' usually falls back on the fam-

ily, if the support system is there. If not, the teen moms are forced to go out on their own, find a job and support the family, often leaving school behind. The reality of not finishing school no longer is said to just effect

the drop out, but their children to come.

On a good note, numbers in infant mortality rates are dropping, falling off three points from 12.9 to 9.3, indicating a positive trend in the county, according to Health Department Director Curtis Holloman.

Another big indicator, according to Gainey, in a student's academic achievement is their race. Racial distribution in the classroom is often a good indicator as to the overall number of students affected by poverty, he said.

"This is not because they may be black or Hispanic, it is simply because of the cluster effect," he said. "Larger numbers of families under the poverty level, lower education levels, and single family parenting all tend to occur more frequently in the those communities."

In fact, actual population numbers within the black community and figures compiled in 1992 that indicate numbers of families needing assistance are almost exact. Gainey estimated that approximately 40 percent of the children within the Clinton school system were receiving, or were eligible to receive, free or reduced cost lunches because of

their family income. According to population figures produced by the Census Department in a 1992 survey, 41 percent of the population of Sampson County schools are student between 5-17 that are black.

"Children need a stimulus rich environment to grow and develop, something a lot of these children can't find at home," Gainey said.

And as expected, Gainey said families with lower educational backgrounds tend to have a highly positive correlation with lower family incomes.

"Without a proper education, it is harder to get better jobs," he said.

Also come problems with lack of insurance, fewer benefits at work, working longer hours to support a family and the loss of social placement.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE
PIERRE EXCEPTIONAL SCHOOL, INC.

ARTICLE I
Name

The name of this organization shall be Pierre Exceptional School, Inc.

ARTICLE II
Objectives

The objectives of the corporation shall be to coordinate, support, promote, and encourage the programs and activities identifying and serving the health, educational and material needs of persons who are physically, mentally, or financially unable to provide for such needs for themselves.

ARTICLE III
Membership

The corporation shall have no members.

ARTICLE IV
Election of Officers

The officers of the corporation shall be: _____.

All officers shall be elected annually. Officers shall be elected on the 3rd day of 1997 of each year and installed in the month of January of each year. Should one be unable to complete a term of office, a replacement shall be appointed by the Advisory Board. The advisory board shall consist of the Board of Directors/ President and this board shall transact the business of the corporation unless directed otherwise.

ARTICLE V
Meetings

The general meeting of the corporation shall be held on the 4th day of each month. The Advisory Board will meet on the 25th day of each month. Special meetings may be called in accordance with Article IV of the By-Laws when deemed appropriate.

ARTICLE VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. President. It shall be the duty of the president to preside at all meetings of the corporation and of the advisory board. The president shall convene the general and special meetings appoint all committees and chair-persons, appoint persons to fill vacancies and be an ex-officio member of all committees.

Section 2. Vice-President. It shall be the duty of the vice-president to preside in the absence or disability of the president. In case of resignation or death of the president, the functions of this office shall be exercised by the vice-president until the end of the elected term.

Section 3. Secretary-Treasurer. The secretary-treasurer shall keep records of all meetings of the corporation and shall conduct all correspondence and shall have charge of all funds of the corporation and shall deposit to the credit of the corporation in such banking institution as the corporation shall direct. All monies shall be drawn by check of the secretary-treasurer, and co-signed by the president for the purposes of the corporation. The secretary-treasurer shall make itemized monthly reports and end of the year statement which would include the results of an authorized audit.

ARTICLE VII MEMBERSHIP

There shall be no members of the corporation.

ARTICLE VIII DISSOLUTION

In the event of dissolution, the residual assets of the organization will be turned over to one or more organizations which themselves are exempt as organizations described in sections 501(c)(3) and 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 or corresponding sections of any prior or future Internal Revenue Code, or to the Federal, state, or Local government for exclusive public purposes.

Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, this corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by (a) a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law or (b) a corporation contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 or any other corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law.

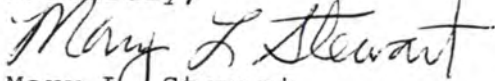
Dear Ms. Robinson,

Enclosed is the information that was sent to the Washington, D.C. office on Friday, August 1, 1997. I apologize that this information arrived after your departure.

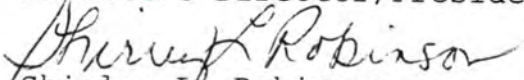
Also enclosed is additional information regarding Pierre Exceptional School, Inc. Feel Free to call me at (910) 590-3316.

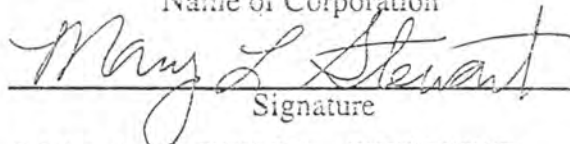
