I. PURPOSE

In your State of the Union speech this year, you called on leaders across the nation to wage a "National Campaign Against Teen Pregnancy." Earlier this year, you approved the recommendation of Bill Galston and others that such a Campaign be formed not as a governmental entity (e.g., a Presidential Commission), but as an independent, non-partisan organization which could have a more lasting and meaningful impact on this complex problem. The model often referred to is the Partnership for a Drug Free America.

This meeting provides you the opportunity to make a personal appeal to more than twenty leaders of the business, media, foundation, and religious communities to create such a National Campaign. The individuals in the room have all expressed concern about teen pregnancy; many are actively engaged in prevention initiatives. Also represented today are experts and community practitioners in the field.

However, you should be aware that there is no shared understanding on the part of the participants that they have been invited for anything more than a discussion of whether and how a national effort could be organized. Our goal today is to motivate those in attendance to work together to launch this campaign. We hope that you will challenge participants to identify what they can do to motivate others in their fields to work on this issue and to make specific commitments for action. David Hamburg of the Carnegie Corporation is prepared to offer to host a follow-up meeting, and others in the group have indicated willingness to contribute to the organization of a national effort.

II. BACKGROUND

Since February, people inside the White House and out (Jody Greenstone, Belle Sawhill, Sarah Brown, to name a few) have been working to develop this initiative. They have conducted outreach to determine what is happening in the field and how a new national effort could be most helpful. Their work also led to the identification of the people invited to this meeting who might form the nucleus of such an effort.

Purposes of a National Campaign We have identified several useful roles for a potential national campaign:

- * *Supporting Community Efforts* -- A national campaign could celebrate, encourage, and assist efforts at the local level. It could help build networks among communities to share ideas and help get the private sector more involved at the community level.
- * *Research and Evaluation* -- There is a lot of good activity taking place in communities around the country, but evaluation has been fragmented. There is a role to be played by a national organization to conduct objective, respected evaluation and to disseminate information on best practices.
- * *Media* -- There is no national effort at present to develop and implement communications strategies to influence attitudes and behavior on teen pregnancy. There have been media campaigns on teen pregnancy which have had inconclusive results. Future media efforts should be integrated into a sustained, national strategy.

Background on Teen Pregnancy A fact sheet containing key statistics on teen pregnancy is provided as Attachment I. One important note: in recent data, the rapid growth of teen pregnancy rates has begun to level off. While encouraging, the numbers are still very high, and the U.S. still has the highest teen pregnancy rate among developed nations.

Administration Activity on Teen Pregnancy The effort to create this new entity is only part of the administration's work on teen pregnancy. Other components include:

- * *Welfare reform legislation* - The administration's proposals and those included in the Senate bill just passed take a comprehensive approach to teenage pregnancy prevention. Our bill included demonstrations to address teen pregnancy in a comprehensive way. The Senate bill includes the strong teen parent provisions the Administration has called for from the start including: your proposal to require custodial parents to live at home with an adult family member to qualify for assistance; grants to establish 'Second Chance' or adult-supervised group homes as alternative living situations; and requirements that teen parents remain in school and work or train for work after graduating from high school.
- * *New Initiatives* The administration is developing a new strategy for approaching the problem of teen pregnancy. This strategy is built on two main principles: catalyzing communities to build partnerships that bring all sectors of society together and investing in research and evaluation to find out what strategies work.

To that end, HHS is supporting new demonstration programs and expanding existing programs. Last week, 15 grants totalling \$4.2 million were awarded under the Adolescent Family Life Program (started under a previous administration) to support programs that encourage abstinence. Some of the ideas to be tested include: focusing on improving communication with parents and other adults about life decisions and sexual values, having older teens serve as mentors and role models, teaching assertiveness, and developing a series of age-appropriate abstinence messages.

Also, CDC has launched a \$6.5 million, two-year demonstration called the Community Coalition Partnership which has awarded thirteen grants to support community wide coalitions mobilizing and organizing their resources in support of teen pregnancy prevention programs. Activities under these grants include intensive school health education programs, community service, job skills development, and other opportunities for youth to build self-esteem.

- * *Ongoing Funding* - Federal funding through Title X Family Planning, Medicaid, and a range of other programs provided the primary support for community based efforts to address teen pregnancy - funding hotlines, clinics, adolescent pregnancy prevention programs - and research and evaluation efforts to determine what is effective.

A more complete description of HHS's accomplishments in this area can be found in Attachment II.

III. PARTICIPANTS

IV. PRESS PLAN

The meeting is closed to the press. This decision was made for several reasons:

- * The effort is supposed to be bipartisan and serious. To open up this initial discussion to media coverage would have made it more of a political showpiece - and it would have been difficult to attract the caliber of people from across the political spectrum who are attending today.
- * This is just an initial discussion. We hope that within a few months, something concrete will form from these efforts which at that time can be announced and given more publicity.

V. SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

Pre-program The meeting will have begun at 10:00 prior to your arrival. Carol Rasco and Secretary Shalala will have been leading a discussion with three objectives:

- * Providing an overview of the facts relating to teen pregnancy
- * Giving a sense of the national, state and local response to the problem
- * Outlining the need for and possible objectives of a new national effort in the private sector.

Arrival
(11:15) Carol Rasco and Secretary Shalala will summarize the discussion to that point and may ask one or more of the participants to reiterate points made in your absence.

Remarks
(11:20) You will give brief remarks (Attachment IV).

Discussion
(11:30) You will lead a discussion of "how a national initiative led by members of the private sector can complement government efforts at teenage pregnancy prevention." The goal of this discussion is to establish a consensus among as many of the participants as possible that there is a need for such an effort - and that in this room sit the people with the interest and the resources to launch such an effort.

Challenge
(12:00) After a half-hour of more open discussion, we hope you will challenge the group to give a concrete sense of what they will do from here. We have included notes on several key participants on whom you may wish to focus during the meeting and who may be in a position to commit to further concrete activity in support of this effort. I am even more impressed that your presence means that you have an interest not only in the problem of teen pregnancy – but in working to find a solution.

Teen pregnancy is one of our nation's most difficult social problems. You know the scope of the problem, so I won't waste time repeating the grim statistics. And you also know this is not a problem that lends itself to an easy solution – particularly not one determined by the government here in Washington.

But it's not a problem we can run from either. The challenge should encourage us to redouble our efforts to address it.

The epidemic of teen pregnancy is, I believe, one of the most serious threats to our children today. For the teens who have children too young, the impact is so enormous on their life chances. You all know the consequences: education cut short, job opportunities lost, a dramatically high likelihood of ending up on welfare. And you know the consequences for the children of these young parents: low levels of pre- and post-natal health care, less chance of starting school on the right foot, child poverty and all its consequences.

Of course, early child-bearing is only one aspect of a larger set of social and economic problems facing our teenagers today. And we need to look at solutions in the broadest possible ways: providing opportunity and hope for our young people – through jobs and education. Not to mention providing productive outlets for their energy and creativity – by keeping schools open into the evening and through active community based programs.

But there's a lot to be gained through a simple and focussed message as well: Telling our youth not to have children until they are older, graduate school, marry, and can support themselves and their children through work.

Last January, I called for a national campaign against teen pregnancy. I believe the only way we can tackle a problem like teen pregnancy is by coming together as a nation. Private sector in partnership with public sector. Leaders in entertainment, media, education, religion, medicine, foundations working together.

That's why I have asked all of you here today.

I wanted to talk with you seriously in a meaningful, non-partisan way about what we can do to address this difficult problem. That's why I have done everything I could to keep this a low-key off-the-record meeting. I want to have a real discussion with you – I didn't want a showcase meeting for the media.

So let's get to it. I'd like to hear your ideas and most important – and I'll be frank about my real purpose – I'd like to challenge you each as national leaders to talk a bit about what you think you individually or collectively can do to help us as a nation address this difficult problem.

THE FACTS ABOUT TEENAGE PREGNANCY

A National Epidemic

- Every year, about 1 million American teenagers become pregnant -- that's about 11% of women ages 15-19. Recent news has been somewhat positive: From 1991 to 1992, the majority of states saw a decline in teen pregnancy rates for 15-19 year-olds.
- From the 1950s through the early 1980s, the rate of births to teens decreased steadily. However, in 1986, that trend reversed, and over the period 1986-91, the rate grew by 24%. From 1991 to 1993, the rate declined by 4%.
- As the teenage population grows, teen births are expected to increase. Even if the teen birth rate remains constant, the number of births is expected to jump 30% by the year 2010.

Trend towards out-of-wedlock childbearing

- In 1960, only 15% of teenage mothers were unmarried. Today, 72% are unmarried.

International Comparisons

- The U.S. rate of births to teens is now twice as high as in the United Kingdom and six times as high as in France, Italy, and Denmark.

Role of Adult Males

- A recent survey indicates that at least half the babies born to teenage women ages 15-17 are fathered by adult men ages 20 or older.

Costs to the Children

- Children born to teens are more likely to die in their first year of life, to have lower cognitive achievement, to repeat a grade in school, to be victims of abuse and neglect, and to become teen parents themselves.
- 80% of children born to unwed teenage mothers who have not completed high school live in poverty. In contrast, of those children born to 20 year-old married parents who are high school graduates, only 8% live in poverty.

Costs to Society

- More than three-fourths of all unmarried teen mothers will be on welfare (Aid to Families and Dependent Children) at some point during the 5 years following the birth of their child.

PREVENTING TEENAGE PREGNANCY

Overview: Each year, approximately one million pregnancies occur among American teenagers. As President Clinton said in his State of the Union address, "We've got to ask our community leaders and all kinds of organizations to help us stop our most serious social problem: the epidemic of teen pregnancies and births where there is no marriage."

The Administration's strategy to prevent teen pregnancy combines opportunity and responsibility. It starts with a strong message from the top. It mobilizes communities and works in partnership with young people, parents, schools, civic leaders, businesses, nonprofit organizations, and state and local governments. It encourages abstinence and personal responsibility by young people. It provides access to health and family planning services. And it invests in research and evaluation to determine what approaches work.

The Administration's strategy is reflected in all of HHS' activities. This month, for example, HHS has:

- Awarded 15 grants totalling \$4.2 million dollars to comprehensive demonstration programs aimed at preventing early teen sexual activity and reducing teen pregnancies. These programs feature innovative ways to emphasize and encourage abstinence.
- Launched the Community Coalition Partnership Program for the Prevention of Teen Pregnancy by awarding 13 grants totalling \$6.5 million over two years. The grants will help support community-wide coalitions in their efforts to reduce teen pregnancy.
- Completed a comprehensive and exhaustive review of the most recent literature on adolescent sexual behavior, pregnancy, and parenthood and on the effectiveness of teen pregnancy prevention programs.

HHS PROGRAMS:

- The Adolescent Family Life Program awarded \$4.2 million for 15 demonstration and research projects that encourage abstinence as the best way to prevent adolescent pregnancy and encourage the involvement of parents in discussions with their children of issues about human sexuality. The program also supports research on the causes and consequences of adolescent sexual behavior, pregnancy and childbearing.
- Community Coalition Partnership Programs for the Prevention of Teen Pregnancy is a new demonstration program that will provide \$6.5 million over two years to enable 13 communities to develop plans for implementing and evaluating community-wide interventions that are innovative, comprehensive, and sustainable.
- Health education in schools supports the efforts of every state and territorial education agency to implement school health programs to help prevent the spread of HIV and sexually transmitted diseases (STDs). Assistance is also given to 13 states to build an infrastructure for school health programs to help prevent unhealthy risk behaviors. Efforts are targeted at preventing early sexual activity, STDs, HIV, drug and alcohol abuse, tobacco use, and injuries, and emphasis is placed on the importance of healthy diets and adequate physical activity.
- Healthy Schools, Healthy Communities established 27 new school-based health centers in 20 states and the District of Columbia to serve the health and education needs of children and youth at high risk for poor health, teenage pregnancy, and other problems.
- Title X of the Public Health Service Act provides reproductive health and family planning services to more than 4 million persons each year. Nearly one-third of Title X clients are adolescents. Improving outreach and services to adolescents is a priority of the program.
- Health Care and Promotion under Medicaid provides Medicaid-eligible adolescents under age 21 with access to a comprehensive range of preventive, primary, and specialty services within its Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT) program. In conjunction with the Maternal and Child Health Bureau, new guidelines from the Bright Futures project, which stress the importance of family and community support for positive health and social behaviors, including adolescent pregnancy prevention, are being disseminated to state Medicaid and Maternal and Child Health programs.

- **Federal/State Partnerships**, including the *Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant* and the *Social Services Block Grant* (authorized by Titles V and XX of the Social Security Act, respectively), include support for adolescent pregnancy prevention programs, state adolescent health coordinators, state prenatal care hotlines, family planning, school health, and other prevention services. The *Community Services Block Grant* enables local community agencies to provide low-income populations, including youth at risk, with job counseling, summer youth employment, GED instruction, crisis hotlines, information and referral to health care, and other services. The *Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant* (under Title XIX of the Public Health Service Act) provides resources to 49 States for services to the general population, including health education, risk reduction and public health nursing.
- **Youth programs** including Runaway and Homeless Youth Programs, the High Risk Youth Program, Community Schools, the Youth Gang and Drug Prevention Program, National Youth Sports, and Youth Violence Prevention Programs, address a wide range of risk factors related to teenage pregnancy.
- **Healthy Start** has demonstration projects in 22 communities nationwide to reduce infant mortality in the highest-risk areas and to improve the health and well-being of women, infants, and their families. Among a broad array of services provided, thousands of teenagers participate in prevention programs exclusively designed for adolescents that encourage healthy lifestyles, youth empowerment, sexual responsibility, conflict resolution, goal setting, and the enhancement of self-esteem.
- **Empowerment Zones and Enterprise Communities** in 105 rural and urban areas across the country have been awarded grants to stimulate economic and human development and to coordinate and expand support services. As they implement their strategic plans, some sites are including a focus on teenage pregnancy prevention and youth development.
- **Community and migrant health centers**, including family and neighborhood health centers, operate in 1600 sites and provide primary and specialized health and related services to medically underserved adolescents. Some centers include special hours or clinics for adolescent patients.

- Indian Health Service provides a full range of medical services for American Indians and Alaska Natives. IHS has a special emphasis on youth substance abuse, child abuse and women's health care, and provides services directed at prevention of teenage pregnancy.
- Drug treatment and prevention programs include services to prevent first-time and repeat births among teenagers. Sixty-five residential substance abuse treatment programs for pregnant and postpartum women, as well as women with dependent children, receive support to provide family planning, education, and counseling services. In addition, 13 grant demonstration projects offer interventions and outreach to female adolescents ages 12-20 who are at risk for alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use; physical and sexual abuse; and pregnancy. Additional grants will be awarded in September, 1995. Finally, a two-year public information campaign will reach out to adolescent girls ages 9-14, and to their families and social networks, to educate them about the risks and consequences of drug, alcohol, and tobacco use.
- Resources centers and clearinghouses at both the state and national level provide information and technical assistance to state and community-based health, social service, and youth-serving agencies. Toll-free hotlines also provide guidance on family and youth services, STDs, AIDS, and other issues.
- Research, surveillance, demonstrations, and evaluations are conducted on an ongoing basis to gather and provide information and technical assistance on the magnitude, causes, and prevention of teenage pregnancy and on programs and approaches that work.

WELFARE REFORM: REACHING THE NEXT GENERATION

Because estimates indicate that over half the mothers who receive Aid to Families with Dependent Children were teenagers when they had their first child, preventing teenage pregnancy is a critical part of the Clinton Administration's approach to welfare reform. To prevent welfare dependency, teenagers must get the message that staying in school, postponing sexual activity, and preparing to work are the right things to do. As President Clinton has said, "Nobody should get pregnant or father a child who isn't prepared to raise the child, love the child, and take responsibility for the child's future."

In his welfare reform legislation introduced last year, President Clinton presented a comprehensive approach to teenage pregnancy prevention. The welfare reform bill passed by the Senate in September 1995 includes the strong teen parent and child support enforcement provisions the Administration has called for from the start:

- * **Making Teen Parents Responsible.** Under the President's approach, the message to teen parents is clear: stay at home and remain in school. The Senate has adopted the President's proposal requiring custodial parents to live at home with an adult family member in order to qualify for assistance. States would also receive grants to establish "Second Chance" homes, or adult-supervised group homes, as alternative living situations to help teen parents break the cycle of welfare dependency. In addition, teenage parents would be required to remain in school and work or train for work after graduating from high school.
- * **Strengthening Child Support Enforcement.** Both houses of Congress have adopted President Clinton's comprehensive child support enforcement plan in their welfare reform legislation. This plan includes: streamlined efforts to name the father in every case; employer reporting in new hires to catch deadbeats who move from job to job; uniform interstate child support laws; computerized state-wide collections to speed up payments; and tough new penalties, like drivers' license revocation, for parents who fail to pay. These five measures would increase child support collections, move thousands of families off the welfare rolls, and send the strongest possible message to young men and women that they should not have children until they are prepared to care for them.

- Her client relationships, with many of the nation's leading consumer products companies, could be an invaluable resource for the national initiative.

Ms. Jane Fonda, Trustee and Vice President, Turner Foundation

- Ms. Fonda is dedicating significant time and resources to addressing teen pregnancy.
- She has launched a state-wide initiative called the Georgia Campaign for Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention (G-CAPP).

Ms. Whoopi Goldberg, actress

- Ms. Goldberg was a teen mother, and her daughter is a teen mother, as well.

Ms. Ann Moore, President, *People Magazine*

- Ms. Moore is highly motivated. Last year, at Moore's suggestion, *People* ran a cover story on the lives of teen mothers. That issue was the second most popular of the year, and a follow-up story is in the works.
- She is presently working with Oprah Winfrey to identify issues they might address together. Teen pregnancy could become the focus of a series of articles and t.v. programs they produce. (Oprah regrets not being able to attend the meeting today.)

Dr. David Hamburg, President, Carnegie Corporation of New York

Mrs. William Bennett (Elayne), President, Best Friends Foundation

- Mrs. Bennett directs a program in Washington, D.C., which encourages adolescent girls (grades 5-9) to postpone sexual activity and reject drug use.
- She believes strongly that teen pregnancy must be given national-level focus

Role of the Media: "The media has a significant role to play as we think about establishing a national initiative. I certainly understand that we cannot fix this problem by putting a few PSAs on the air. The answer is much more complicated than that. The media effort must be long-term, and it has to be tied into a comprehensive strategy. How do you think we can enlist the help of the media in addressing this problem over the long-term?"

You did so much to bring the Games to America, and you're doing so much now to make sure we'll have a terrific celebration. How can we build on the spirit of the Olympic Games, the stories of young men and women excelling in their sports through great discipline and personal drive, to give our kids hope, to let them know there are options out there for them?"

Supporting Local Initiatives: "I know there are many important efforts being made at the state and local level across the country, and that the solution to this sensitive issue must be worked out within our families and communities. I'm interested in knowing how a national initiative could support what is already happening in our schools, in our health departments, in our community centers and churches. Also, how might a national effort stimulate communities to take action if they aren't already doing so?"

- Pose the question: "Where do we go from here?"

- Possible conclusion: "Thank you all for your time and commitment. It is my earnest hope that you will work together to build an initiative that is comprehensive and long-term and that recognizes the diversity of opinions on this critical issue across our nation."

Note: A number of individuals in the room may raise reservations about the idea of a launching a national campaign (e.g. Andrew Young, Irving Harris, Marian Wright Edelman, and Doug Besharov). Some are weary after many years of effort with often disappointing results. Some believe strongly that we cannot address teen pregnancy without declaring war on the root causes of the problem: poverty and bleak life options for young people.

Possible response: "This is an extremely difficult issue, and many hardworking people have tried for years to develop solutions. And oftentimes the news has not been positive. But we have to keep trying. We've never had a broadly based, nationally focused initiative on this issue. I believe that leaders from all sectors of our society can join together and bring new resources and approaches to this problem. We can make a significant difference, and it is our responsibility to keep working."

Elayne Bennett is the founder of the Best Friends Program, a program for adolescent girls, grades 5 through 9, which fosters self-respect and promotes responsible behavior. Best Friends grew out of observations by Mrs. Bennett that little was being done in the area of adolescent development, especially for pre-teen and teenage girls. As a teacher who had studied child development and who had supervised and trained teachers, Mrs. Bennett thought that girls could benefit from the experience and guidance of older responsible women.

Since 1987, Best Friends has proven successful in helping hundreds of girls to postpone sexual activity and reject drug use. First introduced into District of Columbia schools, the program is currently in schools in Newark (NJ), Seattle (WA), Milwaukee (WI), Petersburg (VA) and Silver Spring (MD). The Best Friends curriculum is taught in District of Columbia and Maryland schools by Mrs. Bennett.

Elayne Bennett received her B.A. and M.Ed. in Special Education from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. As a doctoral student there, she concentrated on resources and program development for special needs students and their families. Since 1988, she has been a faculty member of the Georgetown University Child Development Center. In 1993, she founded the Best Friends Foundation, a 501(c)(3) organization located in Washington, D.C. to support the program locally and nationally. Mrs. Bennett serves as the Foundation's President and executive director.

Since founding Best Friends, Mrs. Bennett has become a public spokeswoman on issues of adolescent behavior and teenage pregnancy. She has appeared on a number of national television shows, including ABC's "Nightline," and CNN's "Both Sides with Jesse Jackson."

Mrs. Bennett is involved in a number of volunteer activities. Since 1986, she has served as a Co-Chair of the Executive Committee of the annual CARE International celebration. She is on the National Advisory Board of the March of Dimes and the Honorary Chairman of the annual benefit for Sports Against Drugs International. Mrs. Bennett serves on the executive committee of Project HOPE. Her most important activities, however, are her two children, John, 11, and Joseph, 6.

A native of Charlotte, North Carolina, Mrs. Bennett resides in Chevy Chase, Maryland with her husband, William J. Bennett, and their sons.

DOUGLAS J. BESHAROV

Douglas J. Besharov is a lawyer and a resident scholar at the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Besharov is currently a visiting professor at the University of Maryland School of Public Affairs, where he teaches courses on family policy, welfare reform, and the implementation of social policy.

Mr. Besharov was the first Director of the U.S. National Center on Child Abuse and Neglect, from 1975 to 1979. The National Center, which had a \$19 million annual appropriation and a professional staff of thirty, with a representative in each of the ten Federal Regions, supported over 250 research, demonstration, training, technical assistance, and on-going service projects in all parts of the country.

Mr. Besharov began his career as an Assistant Corporation Counsel of the City of New York, where he supervised a staff of 37 lawyers assigned to juvenile delinquency, ungovernability, child protective, non-support, and spouse abuse cases in the New York Family Court. Based on that experience, he was invited by the Speaker of the New York State Assembly to be the Executive Director of the Assembly's Select Committee on Child Abuse.

From 1991 to 1992, he served as the administrator of the AEI/White House Working Seminar on Integrated Services for Children and Families, a project designed to improve the delivery of services to disadvantaged children and their families.

Mr. Besharov has also taught family law, torts, criminal law and public policy at Georgetown University Law Center, New York University, the University of Maryland Law School, the College of William and Mary, American University, and Osgoode Hall Law School in Toronto, Canada.

Mr. Besharov's most recent book is Recognizing Child Abuse: A Guide for the Concerned, a book designed to help professionals and laypersons identify and report suspected child abuse. He has written or edited thirteen other books, including: Legal Services for the Poor: Time for Reform, The Vulnerable Social Worker: Liability for Serving Children and Families, and Juvenile Justice Advocacy. He has written over 130 articles, and contributes to the Washington Post, the Wall Street Journal and American Enterprise Magazine.

In the area of social welfare policy, his current research interests include the relationship between family breakdown and family poverty, child care and Head Start, child support enforcement, child abuse and neglect, and welfare reform generally. In the area of legal policy, his interests include legal services to the poor, professional and products liability, tort reform, and the legal implications of rationing access to advanced medical techniques.

Mr. Besharov lives in suburban Maryland with his wife and two children, where he serves as an elected member of the Somerset Town Council.

Sarah Brown is currently a senior study director at the Institute of Medicine, which is a component of the National Academy of Sciences, in Washington, D.C. She holds undergraduate and graduate degrees from Stanford University and the University of North Carolina, and was recently elected to Delta Omega, the public health honorary society. In 1993, she was awarded the John McQueen award for excellence in maternal and child health, sponsored by the Association of Maternal and Child Health Programs, and in 1995 received the Harriet Hylton Barr Distinguished Service Award, offered by the School of Public Health Alumni Association, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

She is married to attorney Winthrop Brown and lives in Washington, D.C. along with their three daughters, ages 9, 13 and 16.

Dr. Michael A. Carrera is Thomas Hunter Professor Emeritus of Health Sciences at Hunter College of the City University of New York. He began his teaching career in 1959 at a Junior High School in the Bronx. Since 1970 Dr. Carrera has been Director of Adolescent Sexuality and Pregnancy Prevention Programs for The Children's Aid Society in New York.

Dr. Carrera's first book, Sex, The Facts, The Acts and Your Feelings, has been translated into 17 languages. His two books Sexual Health for Men: Your A to Z Guide, and Sexual Health For Women: Your A to Z Guide are widely used by health services and child care agencies. Dr. Carrera's latest book, The Language of Sex, is a High School and College resource book.

In 1984, Dr. Carrera received the American Association of Sex Educators, Counselors and Therapists National Award for Distinguished Service in Sexuality Education. In 1987, he received the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, Rutgers University, Award for Outstanding Contribution to Sexuality Education. In 1990 Dr. Carrera received an award from The Center For Population Options (CPO) in recognition of his achievements in enhancing the health and well being of adolescents during 1980's. 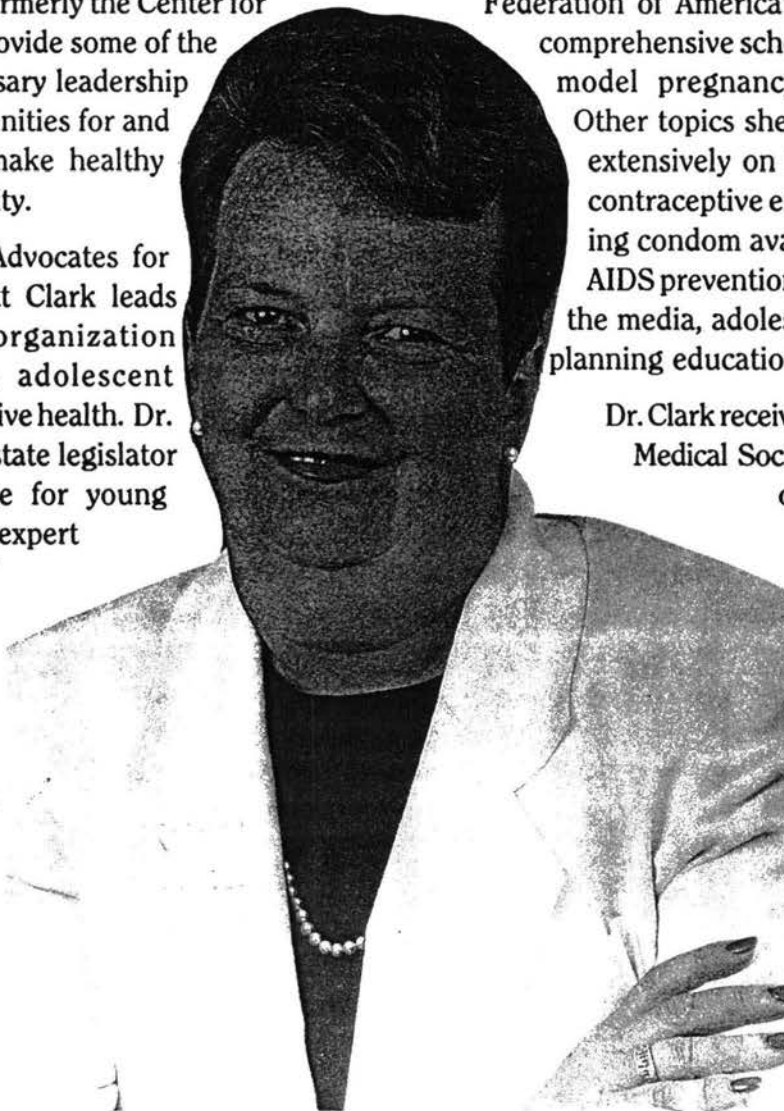

Dr. Clark has been invited to speak before the National Institutes of Health regarding teen parenting, the Conference of Mayors on adolescent HIV infection, the National Conference of State Legislators on reproductive rights and how they fit into national health care reform and Planned Parenthood Federation of America's annual conference on comprehensive school-based health care as a model pregnancy prevention program. Other topics she has written and spoken extensively on include: peer education, contraceptive efficacy and access, including condom availability programs, HIV/AIDS prevention education, sexuality and the media, adolescent risk taking and life planning education.

Dr. Clark received her Ph.D. in Family and Medical Sociology from the University of Texas at Austin, her M.A. in Sociology from the University of Illinois, and her B.A. in Sociology from Beloit College in Wisconsin.

A Brief Biography of Marian Wright Edelman



Children's Defense Fund

Marian Wright Edelman, founder and president of the Children's Defense Fund (CDF), has been an advocate for disadvantaged Americans for her entire professional career. Under her leadership, the Washington-based CDF has become a strong national voice for children and families. CDF's mission is to educate the nation about the needs of children and encourage preventive investment in children before they get sick, drop out of school, suffer too-early pregnancy or family breakdown, or get into trouble. On the eve of a new century and millennium, CDF seeks to ensure that no child is left behind and that every child has a Healthy Start, a Head Start, a Fair Start, and a Safe Start in life with the support of caring parents and communities.

Mrs. Edelman, a graduate of Spelman College and Yale Law School, began her career in the mid-60s when, as the first black woman admitted to the Mississippi Bar, she directed the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund office in Jackson, Mississippi. In 1968, she moved to Washington, D.C., as counsel for the Poor People's March that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., began organizing before his death. She founded the Washington Research Project, a public interest law firm and the parent body of the Children's Defense Fund. For two years she served as the Director of the Center for Law and Education at Harvard University, and in 1973 began CDF.

Mrs. Edelman has received many honorary degrees and awards including the Albert Schweitzer Humanitarian Prize and was a MacArthur Foundation Prize Fellow. She served on the Board of Trustees of Spelman College which she chaired from 1976 to 1987. She is the author of several books, including Families in Peril: An Agenda for Social Change, The Measure of Our Success: A Letter to My Children and Yours, and a new 1995 book, Guide My Feet: Meditations and Prayers on Loving and Working for Children.

Marian Wright Edelman is married to Peter Edelman, who serves as counselor to the Secretary of Health and Human Services. They have three sons: Joshua, Jonah, and Ezra.

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JANE FONDA

Jane Fonda was born in New York City on December 21, 1937, daughter of Henry Fonda and Frances Seymour Fonda. She attended the Emma Willard School in Troy, New York and Vassar College in Poughkeepsie, New York. In her late teens Fonda studied acting with the renown Lee Strasberg and became a member of the Actors Studio in New York.

Fonda's career as a professional stage and screen actress has garnered numerous awards, including two Academy Awards, (Best Actress in 1971 for *Klute* and in 1978 for *Coming Home*) five additional nominations and an Emmy Award for her performance in *The Dollmaker*. In addition to her acting career, she has produced numerous films and television productions including *Coming Home*, *The China Syndrome*, *Nine to Five*, *Rollover*, *On Golden Pond*, *The Morning After*, *The Dollmaker* and *Broken Trust*.

Since the release of the first *Jane Fonda's Workout* video in 1982, Fonda has revolutionized the fitness industry with the production of 23 home exercise videos, 3 audio recordings and 5 books which together have sold more than 13 million copies. Her original *Jane Fonda's Workout* video was at the top of the charts for nearly four years and is the top grossing home video of all time.

Fonda is a long-time community activist and advocate for the environment, human rights and the empowerment of women worldwide. She has helped spearhead a number of community projects over the years. One example is Laurel Springs Children's Camp, a summer program which she ran for fifteen years at her ranch in Santa Barbara, California. The camp used performing arts to build self-esteem and cooperation among children of all races and socio economic backgrounds. In 1992, together with Kenny Leon of Atlanta's Alliance Theatre, The Atlanta Project and Atlanta City Schools, she helped create The Douglass High School Fine and Performing Arts Talent Center.

Jane Fonda is a trustee and Vice President of the Turner Foundation, the private grant-making organization founded by her husband R.E. Turner, Board Chairman and President of Turner Broadcasting System, Inc. (TBS). The Foundation was formed in 1990 to provide grants for projects dealing with water and toxics, climate, habitat, energy and population.

Along with Turner's five children, who also serve as Foundation trustees, Fonda volunteers with many projects funded by the Foundation. Two such projects are the Georgia Campaign for Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention (G-CAPP) and the Georgia Women's Economic Development Corporation (WEDCO).

Fonda serves as a trustee of the Carter Center, and, in 1994, Fonda was named Goodwill Ambassador for the United Nations Population Fund and is on the board of the Montana Nature Conservancy.

Fonda is the mother of Vanessa Vadim, a social advocacy film maker, and Troy Garity, an actor. Fonda married Turner in December 1991. Her interests include horseback riding, hiking and yoga. Fonda and Turner divide their time between their homes in Georgia, Florida, Montana and New Mexico. On their western ranches they raise more than 7,000 bison, a herd that is considered to be the largest in the world.

Henry W. Foster, Jr., M.D.

Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology Meharry Medical College

Career Background

Dr. Henry W. Foster, Jr., is Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Meharry Medical College and Consultant to the Department of Health and Human Services. On February 2, 1995, President Bill Clinton nominated him to become the next U.S. Surgeon General. This process was, however, blocked when his favorable recommendation from the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee was not allowed an up-or-down vote by the full Senate. At the time of his Surgeon General nomination, Dr. Foster was conducting a one-year sabbatical leave as AHC Scholar-in-Residence at the Association of Academic Health Centers in Washington, D.C. Prior to this he served as acting president of Meharry Medical College from October 1993 to July 1994. He chaired Meharry's department of obstetrics and gynecology from 1973-1990, when he assumed the position of dean of the school of medicine and vice president for health services.

Dr. Foster received his undergraduate education at Morehouse College and his Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of Arkansas in 1958. He conducted an internship at Detroit Receiving Hospital, 1958-59, spent two years as a medical officer in the U.S. Air Force and upon discharge conducted residency training in General Surgery in Malden, MA, 1961-62, and completed his residency in OB/GYN at Meharry from 1962-65.

Upon finishing of his residency, Dr. Foster assumed the position of Chief of OB/GYN at the John A. Andrew Memorial Hospital of Tuskegee University (formerly Tuskegee Institute). While at Tuskegee, he pioneered what has become a national model for regionalized perinatal health care systems throughout the country. It was primarily this activity that led to his induction into the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences in 1972. While serving as professor and chairman of Meharry's Department of OB/GYN, Dr. Foster spent five years as senior program consultant for the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and directed its Program to Consolidate Health Services for High Risk Young People, 1981-86. From this program, he conceptualized and developed the "I Have A Future" program to reduce teen pregnancy which was recognized by President George Bush in 1991 as one of this Nation's "Thousand Points of Light."

Professional, Business and Civic Activities

During his career, Dr. Foster has continued to find time to write more than 100 publications and abstracts as well as contribute chapters to text books and develop audio/visual educational materials. He has conducted more than 25 formal university lectureships and his professional expertise has been sought across the globe. He has participated in conferences, seminars and hearings in Spain, Mexico, the African continent, the Mediterranean area, Mainland China, Canada, Southeast Asia, the United Kingdom, and Australia.

Dr. Foster has served on numerous boards, committees and councils, all of which work to improve perinatal outcome. Such examples are: the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation; American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and in 1984 he was elected president of the Nashville Davidson County Obstetrical and Gynecological Society becoming the first African American to serve in that capacity. He has also served as an examiner for the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology and has been a member of the editorial board of *Academia* (formerly the *Journal of Medical Education*), of the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC). Dr. Foster is immediate past president of the Association of Professors of Gynecology and Obstetrics (APGO) that addresses undergraduate educational issues for OB/GYN in all 125 American and 16 Canadian medical schools.

Honors and Awards

Dr. Foster was elected to Alpha Omega Alpha National Scholastic Honor Society while a student at the University of Arkansas School of Medicine. During the 1980s, he received the Appreciation Award for Research and Teaching in Sickle Cell Anemia, Tuskegee Institute; First White House Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and Universities Faculty Award for Excellence in Science and Technology. In May 1993, the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences, conferred upon him the Honorary degree, Doctor of Science.

Dr. Foster is married to the former St. Clair Anderson. They are the parents of a daughter and son.

WHOOPI GOLDBERG

(Biography)

Whoopi Goldberg began performing at age eight in New York with the Children's Program at the Hudson Guild and the Helena Rubinstein Children's Theatre. In 1975, she moved to San Diego, where she appeared in the San Diego Repertory Theatre's productions of Bertold Brecht's "Mother Courage" and Marsha Norman's "Getting Out," and honed her comedic skills as part of an improvisational group called Spontaneous Combustion.

Later, she moved to the Bay Area and joined the Blake Street Hawkeyes Theatre in Berkeley, partnered with David Schein. Moving shortly into solo performances, Goldberg created "The Spook Show," which first played San Francisco and then toured the United States and Europe.

It was at a 1983 performance of that show, performed at the Dance Theatre Workshop in New York, that Whoopi caught the rapt attention of Mike Nichols, who offered to present her in a new Broadway show. An evening of original material, written and created by Whoopi, the show opened at the Lyceum Theatre to critical acclaim. She later taped the show as an HBO special, "Whoopi Goldberg: Direct From Broadway." The record album of her Broadway show won a Grammy Award as Best Comedy Recording of the Year in 1985.

Her Broadway show also turned out to be an audition for Steven Spielberg, who was casting his film version of Alice Walker's "The Color Purple." Before making her auspicious motion picture debut in "The Color Purple," Whoopi briefly returned to San Francisco to star as the legendary Moms Mabley in "Moms," a one-person show which she also co-wrote, based on the late comedienne's original material.

"The Color Purple" launched Whoopi Goldberg's film career and, in addition to an Oscar nomination, earned her the 1985 Golden Globe Award for Best Performance by an Actress in a Dramatic Motion Picture, as well as the NAACP's Image Award for Best Actress in a Motion Picture.

Since "The Color Purple," Whoopi has starred in such motion pictures as "Jumpin' Jack Flash," "Burglar," "Fatal Beauty" (for which she won a second Image Award), "Clara's Heart," "Ghost," "The Long Walk Home" (earning her a third Image Award), "Soapdish" and Robert Altman's "The Player."

Whoopi's performance as Oda Mae Brown in "Ghost" -- the highest-grossing movie of 1990 -- earned her the Academy Award for Best Supporting Actress, the Golden Globe Award, the NAACP Image Award, the British Academy (BAFTA) Award, the Movie Award, an American Comedy Award and the Saturn Award (presented by The Academy of Science Fiction, Fantasy & Horror Films).

Whoopi starred in the 1992 box-office hit "Sister Act," which to date has grossed over \$300 million worldwide and garnered her yet another Golden Globe Award nomination and the NAACP Image Award for Best Actress in a Motion Picture, in addition to winning the Image Award for Motion Picture of the Year. Her film credits also include her Image Award-nominated performance in "Sarafinal," "Made in America," "Sister Act 2: Back in the Habit," a cameo in "Naked in New York" and "Corrina, Corrina." During the summer of 1994, Whoopi appeared in a cameo role in "The Little Rascals" and her voice was featured in the animated "The Lion King." She was also heard in the live action/animated feature "The Pagemaster" and appeared in Paramount's feature film, "Star Trek: Generations." She starred most recently in Warner Bros.' "Boys on the Side," directed by Herbert Ross and co-starring Mary Louise Parker and Drew Barrymore. She'll be seen next in "Moonlight and Valentino," with Kathleen Turner, Elizabeth Perkins and Gwyneth Paltrow. She has also completed shooting another feature film, "Bogus," for Warner Bros. opposite Gerard Depardieu and directed by Norman Jewison and is currently shooting the comedy, "Eddie."

On television, her appearance on an episode of "Moonlighting" in 1986 earned her an Emmy Award nomination as Best Guest Performer in a Dramatic Series. Whoopi starred with Jean Stapleton in CBS' "Bagdad Cafe," and she appeared for five seasons as Guinan on the hit syndicated series, "Star Trek: The Next Generation," for which she was been nominated for an NAACP Image Award. Whoopi also appeared in the CBS Schoolbreak Special, "My Past Is My Own," for which she was nominated for a Daytime Emmy Award, and she starred in the CBS telefilm, "Kiss Shot." In 1991, Whoopi guest-starred on the NBC series, "A Different World," which resulted in another nomination for a Prime-Time Emmy Award, this time as Best Guest Actress on a Comedy Series. She also starred in "Dead Wait," an episode of HBO's horror anthology series, "Tales from the Crypt." Last year, Whoopi made her debut as a talk show host with "The Whoopi Goldberg Show," her own syndicated half-hour late-night talk show.

Whoopi has appeared on a variety of TV specials, including "Carol, Carl, Whoopi and Robin" (Burnett, Reiner, Goldberg and Williams, respectively); Marlo Thomas' "Free To Be...A Family;" "FreedomFest: Nelson Mandela's 70th Birthday Special" (co-host) and "The Truth About Teachers," which she hosted as part of a four-part series of specials entitled "Raising Good Kids in Bad Times." She co-produced the syndicated special, "A Laugh, A Tear" and appeared in and co-produced "Hot Rod Brown," a "Tales from the Whoop" special for Nickelodeon, for which she was nominated for a Daytime Emmy Award. In 1992, Whoopi hosted the "34th Annual Grammy Awards" and she hosted ABC's "A Gala For the President at Ford's Theatre" in 1993. On March 21, 1994, Whoopi hosted "The 66th Annual Academy Awards" -- the highest rated special of the 1993-94 television season -- for which she was nominated for an Emmy Award. Whoopi returned to Washington in Fall, 1994, to once again host ABC's "A Gala For the President at Ford's Theatre."

In 1987, Whoopi, Billy Crystal and Robin Williams co-hosted HBO's now-historic "Comic Relief" benefit for the nation's homeless. Following the equally successful "Comic Relief II," the three have hosted "Comic Relief III, IV, V, VI" and the upcoming "Comic Relief VII." Cumulatively, the "Comic Relief" benefits have raised more than \$25 million. Additionally, Whoopi participated in the televised "Hurricane Relief" benefit to aid victims of Hurricane Andrew.

Whoopi toured her one-woman show, "Living on the Edge of Chaos," throughout the U.S., Canada and Australia and, in August, 1988, she performed a television special for HBO Comedy Hour, titled "Whoopi Goldberg's Fontaine...Why Am I Straight?" Her second comedy album, "Fontaine...Why Am I Straight?," was nominated for a Grammy Award. In 1990, prior to embarking on her SRO six-week tour of Australia and New Zealand, Whoopi hosted yet another special for HBO Comedy Hour, "Whoopi Goldberg and Billy Connolly in Performance." Her most recent special for HBO, "Whoopi Goldberg: Chez Whoopi," debuted in August, 1991.

In addition to her comedy albums, her recordings include "Koi and the Kola Nuts," an African folktale narrated by Whoopi with a score by Herbie Hancock for Rabbit Ears' international collection for children, "We All Have Tales," and she narrates the audio recording of the best-selling autobiography "Having Our Say: The Delany Sisters' First 100 Years."

She was the voice of Gaia, the spirit of Earth, on "Captain Planet and the Planeteers," an animated environmental action-adventure series and another performance that garnered her a Daytime Emmy Award nomination. She also lent her vocal talents to the Fox TV 1993 holiday special, "Cool Like That."

In the summer of 1991, Whoopi returned to the legitimate stage to co-star with Timothy Dalton in A.R. Gurney's two-person play, "Love Letters." Whoopi made her literary debut with "Alice," a children's book published by Bantam Books in September, 1992. "Alice" is written by Whoopi Goldberg, with illustrations by John Rocco.

Whoopi is well known for her tireless humanitarian efforts on behalf of children, the homeless, human rights, substance abuse and the battle against AIDS, as well as many other worthwhile causes and charities.

Among her many awards and honors, Whoopi was named the NAACP's 1991 Entertainer of the Year, and she has received the Hollywood Women's Press Club's Golden Apple for Female Star of the Year; UCLA's Jack Benny Award; a Women in Film Tribute; Women in Film's Norma Zarky Humanitarian Award, an honor she shared with her "Comic Relief" co-hosts Billy Crystal and Robin Williams, and The Thelians named Whoopi "Ms. Wonderful" for her charitable contributions. Yet another highlight of 1991 was the christening of Royal Caribbean Cruise Line's Viking Serenade, a luxury cruise ship of which Whoopi has been named Godmother.

In January, 1992, Nor'East Miniature Roses, Inc. presented "Whoopi," a miniature rose named for her. Whoopi was also honored alongside Frank Sinatra for "Distinguished Achievement in Film" at "The 9th Annual American Cinema Awards," a 300-star salute to benefit the Motion Picture and Television Country House and Hospital and she was honored with Shirley MacLaine at L.I.F.E. (Love Is Feeding Everyone)'s "Hunger Hero Awards." Additionally, she was chosen as one of Glamour Magazine's "1992 Women of the Year" for her professional and charitable accomplishments.

Whoopi has been honored by Harvard University's Hasty Pudding Theatricals as their 1993 Woman of the Year and by NATO/ShowWest as 1993 Female Star of the Year. In 1993, she won an American Comedy Award for her performance in "Sister Act," as well as three People's Choice Awards (for Favorite Motion Picture Actress, Favorite Actress in a Comedy Motion Picture and Favorite Comedy Motion Picture for "Sister Act"). She was the American public's top vote-getter again in 1994 and 1995 for the People's Choice Award for Favorite Actress in a Comedy Motion Picture. Whoopi has been honored five times with Nickelodeon's Kid's Choice Award for Favorite Movie Actress, more than any other individual in Kid's Choice history. Whoopi became part of Hollywood history in February, 1995, when prints of her hands, feet and braids were placed in cement in the forecourt of Mann's Chinese Theatre.

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DAVID A. HAMBURG, M.D.

David Hamburg has been President of Carnegie Corporation of New York since 1983. He received his A.B. (1944) and his M.D. (1947) degrees from Indiana University. He was Professor and Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Stanford University from 1961-72 and Reed-Hodgson Professor of Human Biology from 1972-76; President of the Institute of Medicine, National Academy of Sciences, 1975-80; Director of the Division of Health Policy Research, and Education and John D. MacArthur Professor of Health Policy at Harvard University, 1980-82. He served as President, then Chairman of the Board of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (1984-86).

Dr. Hamburg is a trustee and vice chairman of the board of Stanford University. He also serves on the boards of: The Rockefeller University; The Mount Sinai Medical Center, New York; The American Museum of Natural History; The Johann Jacobs Foundation, Zurich; and The Federal Reserve Bank of New York, where he is also the Deputy Chairman. He is a member of the American Philosophical Society and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Dr. Hamburg received the American Psychiatric Association's Distinguished Service Award in 1991. He was awarded an Honorary Degree from Duke University in 1993.

He has served on many policy advisory boards. In the international security field, he has served on the Chief of Naval Operations Executive Panel; the Secretary of Energy Advisory Board; the National Academy of Sciences Committee on International Security and Arms Control; the Center for Naval Analysis; and the United States-Soviet Joint Study Group on Crisis Prevention. He currently serves on the Defense Policy Board, United States Department of Defense.

In science policy, he has served as Chairman of several national groups including the Science Policy Committee of the Institute of Medicine and both the intra-mural and extra-mural Scientific Advisory Boards of the National Institute of Mental Health as well as the Science Education Advisory Committee of the National Science Foundation. For a decade, he served on the Advisory Committee on Medical Research of the World Health Organization. In September, 1994 Dr. Hamburg was chosen to serve on the President's Committee of Advisors on Science and Technology.

His research contributions have dealt with biological responses and adaptive behavior in stressful circumstances; and with several aspects of human aggression and conflict resolution. He has been concerned with the conjunction of biomedical and behavioral sciences--first in the context of building an interdisciplinary scientific approach to psychiatric problems, then in research on the links of behavior and health as a major component in the contemporary burden of illness. In recent years, he has concentrated on child and adolescent development.

Dr. Hamburg is the author of Today's Children: Creating a Future for a Generation in Crisis, (1992). He is chairman of the Carnegie Council on Adolescent Development and founder of the Carnegie Commission on Science, Technology and Government.

MARION HOWARD PH.D.

Biographical Sketch

Dr. Marion Howard is currently a Professor in the Department of Gynecology and Obstetrics of the School of Medicine at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. She also is Director of the Center for Adolescent Reproductive Health. She is Clinical Director of the Emory University/Grady Hospital Teen Services Program, a family planning program for young teenagers at Grady Memorial Hospital. The Teen Services Program clinically serves close to 1,500 patients each year in after-school hospital-based clinics. The educational program offered by the Teen Services Program in the public schools reaches 5,000 students each year.

Prior to her appointment at Emory University, Dr. Howard was Director of the Consortium on Early Childbearing and Childrearing in Washington, D.C. She has also held appointments in the Department of Epidemiology and Public Health at Yale University and the Departments of Sociology and Health Care Administration at George Washington University.

Dr. Howard is a frequent guest lecturer and keynote speaker. She is the author of numerous articles and publications. Dr. Howard has written several books aimed at teenagers and the professionals who serve them:

Only Human: Teenage Pregnancy and Parenthood
(Seabury Press 1978)

Did I Have a Good Time? Teenage Drinking
(Continuum Publishing Company 1981)

Sometimes I Wonder About Me: Teen Mental Health
(Continuum Publishing Company 1983)

How to Help Your Teenager Postpone Sexual Involvement
(Continuum Publishing Company 1988)

The focus of Dr. Howard's work has been on the development, evaluation, and dissemination of innovative interventions and service delivery models with respect to negative adolescent health behaviors. Particular attention has been paid to adolescent reproductive health.

Recently, Dr. Howard has developed and produced a number of educational programs for youth designed to help young people postpone sexual involvement: *Postponing Sexual Involvement for Young Teens*--aimed at 13-15 year-olds and *Postponing Sexual Involvement for PreTeens*--aimed at 10-12 year-olds. These programs are being adopted by schools and youth agencies throughout the United States.

Currently, Dr. Howard's work is centered on developing programs and materials aimed at helping youth understand the interrelationship of substance use and reproductive health. Another effort just underway is on applying the social influence model to helping young people use contraceptives more consistently.

Executive Vice President of Corporate Affairs

Sheila Johnson, BET's executive vice president of corporate affairs, is primarily responsible for investigating various community and philanthropic activities the network may wish to pursue. She is also the chairperson of the Educational Advisory Board of *YSB (Young Sisters & Brothers)* Magazine and president of the Geron P. Johnson Foundation. She has served in her current capacity since August 1992.

Johnson joined BET in 1988 as vice president, corporate affairs after spending 19 years in education as a music instructor in private schools throughout Washington, D.C.

Johnson's educational credits include the formation of Young Strings In Action, an ensemble for students between the ages of 3-18, in 1975. The 140-member group was noted for a diverse musical repertoire featuring classical, jazz, country, and Broadway music which attracted the attention local organizations and foreign government officials.

In 1984, Queen Noor of Jordan invited the *Young Strings* to perform during the country's Jerash Festival of Art and Culture. The orchestra's performance was so well received that the Queen took steps toward establishing a similar ensemble in Jordan and would later appoint Johnson the United States Information Agency's (U.S.I.A.) cultural liaison to the Middle East. While serving in that capacity, she was instrumental in establishing Jordan's National Music Conservatory, the country's first.

Between 1984 and 1988, Johnson travelled to Jordan every 12 weeks to conduct training classes for Jordanian music students and instructors. Johnson and the Royal Board of the National Music Conservatory also held numerous fundraisers activities in order to generate interest in the Conservatory. Today, the institution currently boasts more than 280 students.

In recognition of her work and various contributions, Jordan's King Hussein presented Johnson with the Al Nada medal, the country's most prestigious educational honor.

Johnson has written a book detailing her methods of teaching young music students entitled *Young Strings In Action* published by Boosey and Hawkes. The textbook is currently being used in many schools systems around the United States.

In addition to her professional accomplishments, Johnson is actively involved with many community-oriented groups and organizations. She is the co-chairperson for Carnegie Hall's Educational Advisory Council and serves as a board member for

the National Child Research Center and the United Negro College Fund.

A graduate of the University of Illinois School of Music, Johnson now makes her home in the greater Washington, D.C. area with her husband Robert and their two children.

After graduating from the University of Virginia in 1976, Mr. Jones established a career as a commodities broker in New York, concentrating on the cotton futures market. He developed a significant base of customers from 1976 to 1982 and also traded actively for his own account in various commodity futures markets.

Mr. Jones was instrumental in the creation of FINEX, the financial futures division of the New York Cotton Exchange (NYCE), and in the development of the U.S. Dollar Index futures contract which trades there. He presently serves on the board of Directors of the NYCE.

Mr. Jones regularly commits his personal time and energy to charitable, philanthropic, and natural resource conservation efforts. He presently serves on the Board of Directors of the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

Former New Jersey Governor Tom Kean is President of Drew University.

Rated among America's five most effective governors by Newsweek, Kean was noted for tax cuts that spurred 750,000 new jobs, a federally replicated welfare reform program, landmark environmental policies, and over 30 education reforms. She has been with Child Trends, Inc. since 1982, studying trends in child and family well-being, the effects of family structure and social change on children, the determinants of early sexual activity and parenthood, and the consequences of adolescent parenthood. With Dr. Martha Zaslow and the Manpower Development Research Corporation, she is conducting an evaluation of the impact of the Federal JOBS program on young children whose mothers receive AFDC. This study includes a longitudinal survey study and an observational sub-study of mother-child interactions. Also, four years after Baseline, school-records data and teacher questionnaire data will be collected with funding from the Department of Education.

Dr. Moore is a member of the Family and Child Well-being Research Network established by the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development to examine over a five-year period the factors that enhance the development and well-being of children. As a Network member, Dr. Moore is working on several projects to enhance child indicators data and to develop new analytic data resources to inform both scientific research and policy making.

Dr. Moore has testified on numerous occasions for members of the U.S. Congress and the Administration, most recently at briefings for the United States Senate Committee on Finance pertaining to prevention of teen pregnancy. She has also testified for the Sunbelt Caucus, the staff of the Ways and Means Committee, and before the House Subcommittee on Census and Population on "Our Nation's Children: Trends." She has presented at several briefings, including those for the Assistant Secretary of Planning and Evaluation and the Administration for Children and Families at the Department of Health and Human Services, the Working Group for Welfare Reform, Family Support and Independence, the Casey Journalism Center at the University of Maryland and the NICHD Council. She recently wrote the executive summary for a major report completed by the Department of Health and Human Services on the topic of nonmarital childbearing.

During 1990-1991, Dr. Moore assisted the National Commission on Children to design, implement and analyze two national surveys -- one among the general public and one among a sample of parents and children with over-samples of African-American and Hispanic families. She served on the National Academy of Sciences panel on Work, Family and Community between 1980 and 1982, and on the panel on Adolescent Pregnancy and Childbearing between 1984 and 1986. Dr. Moore also directed, with Dr. James Peterson, the third wave of the National Survey of Children. Dr. Moore has served as an advisor on teenage pregnancy and family issues regarding the National Survey of Family Growth, the National Survey of Families and Households, and the National Longitudinal Survey of Youth; and the Data Archive on Adolescent Pregnancy and Pregnancy Prevention. She also serves on the Science Advisory Panel of the Alan Guttmacher Institute. In 1991, Dr. Moore was selected to receive the Presidential Award from the National Organization on Adolescent Pregnancy and Parenting.

Doug Nelson is Executive Director of The Annie E. Casey Foundation. Prior to joining the Foundation, he was Deputy Director of the Center for the Study of Social Policy, a Washington, D.C.-based non-profit organization specializing in policy research and analysis across a range of domestic issues including health care, aging, long-term care, welfare, mental health and social services to children and families. He came to that position from 8 years with the Wisconsin government, first as the State Aging Director and later as Assistant Secretary of the umbrella Department of Health and Social

Services. He is nationally known for his leadership and advocacy on behalf of family-centered, community-based responses to the needs of at-risk children, elderly persons and adults with disabilities.

Nelson was appointed by President Carter as an advisor to the 1981 White House Conference on Aging. He has also served as a member of the American Bar Association's Commission on the Legal Problems of the Elderly; as a trustee of the Wisconsin Child Abuse and Neglect Trust Fund; as advisor to the National Governors' Association project on Long-Term Care; along with service on numerous other boards and commissions.

In addition to frequent lectures and addresses, Nelson has written widely on a range of social policy issues. His social history of the World War II relocation of Japanese Americans, entitled Heart Mountain, earned him a Pulitzer Prize nomination in 1976. His other published works include studies and essays on aging, long-term care, housing, and more recently, children and youth.

Mr. Nelson is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Illinois. He has a Masters Degree in history from the University of Wyoming and he studied American History at the University of Wisconsin.

Biographical Information

Dr. Helen Rodriguez-Trias grew up in Puerto Rico and New York City where she attended public schools through High School. After marriage and the births of three children, she continued higher studies at the University of Puerto Rico and its Medical School, graduating with the highest honors in 1960. Following attainment of the MD and the birth of a fourth child, she went on to Internship and Pediatric Residency.

Dr. Rodriguez-Trias remained on the Medical School faculty in Puerto Rico and at the University Hospital, developing the first center for care of newborn babies on the island. Under her leadership, and with the collaboration of the Maternal Infant Care Regional Program staff, the Hospital's rate for deaths of newborn babies decreased by half within three years.

A growing interest in the social and economic circumstances affecting children's health led her away from sophisticated neonatal clinical research to ambulatory care and advocacy for women's and children's rights. Soon after her arrival in New York City in 1970, she joined a large group of advocates for women's reproductive rights and became a founding member of the Committee to End Sterilization Abuse. The demonstration of the need for appropriate informed consent led the New York City Health and Hospitals Corporation to enact guidelines on sterilization procedures and the New York City Council to pass a law to protect against abuses. She remains a firm advocate for women's rights to choices.

Dr. Rodriguez-Trias has directed Pediatric programs: Lincoln Hospital in the Bronx (Director of the Department of Pediatrics); St.-Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital Center in Manhattan (Director, Division of Primary Care) and at the Newark Beth Israel Medical Center in New Jersey (Director of Pediatric Primary Care Program). It was in Newark in 1985, that the discovery of children with AIDS in the walk-in and primary care clinics convinced her that the prevention and management of HIV infection must be on every health care person's agenda.

During her tenure as Medical Director at the AIDS Institute in New York State in 1988 and 1989, Dr. Rodriguez-Trias participated in developing programs and policies directed at serving the needs of families affected by HIV, particularly those comprised of women and their children. Dr. Rodriguez-Trias incorporates the principles of professional activism into the curriculum for students and

residents, teaching on subjects ranging from child abuse to AIDS. She stresses the need to learn cross cultural skills and to respect and celebrate diversity.

Dr. Rodriguez-Trias was an Assistant Professor in Pediatrics at the University of Puerto Rico School of Medicine, and has held the rank of Associate Professor of Pediatrics at: the Albert Einstein College of Medicine; the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia University and at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey.

Over the past twenty years she has served as consultant to numerous foundations and government agencies. She publishes and lectures extensively on women's and children's health and health care issues. Dr. Rodriguez-Trias relocated to California in 1989 from where she consults on health programming specially in primary care and on services to prevent and treat HIV infection in women and children.

Among the national organizations on whose Boards she currently sits are the National Women's Health Network, the Reproductive Health Technology Project and the National Center for Children in Poverty.

In 1991, she was honored by the American Public Health Association whose Governing Council elected her President Elect. On November, 1992 she became President of APHA for the one year term that ended on October 28, 1993, and, remained on the Executive Committee and Executive Board as Immediate Past President for an additional year. In 1994 she was named Chair of the American Public Health Association's Standing Committee on Women's Rights.

Dr. Rodriguez-Trias lives with her husband, Edward Gonzalez, Jr., a career consultant and adult educator, in Brookdale, a village near Santa Cruz, California. She has two daughters who live in San Francisco, one son in Puerto Rico and another in Los Angeles. Seven grandchildren bring her great joy, as they do to their parents and to her husband.

SENATOR WARREN B. RUDMAN

Warren B. Rudman became a partner in the international law firm, Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton and Garrison after serving two distinguished terms as a U.S. Senator from New Hampshire. The Senator maintains offices with the law firm in both Washington and New York and on his own in New Hampshire. He was first elected to the Senate in 1980 and overwhelmingly re-elected in 1986.

Born on May 18, 1930, Senator Rudman is a lifelong resident of New Hampshire. He received a B.S. from Syracuse University in 1952 and served in the U.S. Army as a combat platoon leader and company commander during the Korean War. He entered the Army as a second lieutenant and was discharged with the rank of captain. In 1960, he received his LL.B. from Boston College Law School.

Senator Rudman began his career practicing law in his hometown of Nashua. In 1970, he was appointed Attorney General of New Hampshire and in 1975 he was elected president of the National Association of Attorneys General. After completing his term as Attorney General, Senator Rudman joined the Manchester, NH based law firm, Sheehan, Phinney, Bass and Green where he currently maintains an office part-time.

During his twelve accomplished years in the Senate, Senator Rudman established a record of independence by refusing to accept out-of-state political action committee (PAC) donations. A survey by the National Journal based upon interviews with Senate observers named Rudman as one of the body's "Best Legislators" and early in his career one of the Senate's "Rising Stars."

Perhaps his best known accomplishment came in 1985 when he co-authored the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings deficit reduction law. This historic legislation, an innovative mechanism unprecedented in its scope and effectiveness, inserted discipline and accountability on the chaotic federal budget process in order to reduce the federal deficit. It was described by one Washington writer as "the most significant piece of legislation of the 1980's."

In December, 1986, Rudman was appointed to serve as Vice-Chairman of the Senate Select Committee investigating arms transfers to Iran. In his position as Vice-Chairman he was instrumental in organizing and directing the investigation of the Iran-Contra affair earning bipartisan recognition for his aggressive, thorough and objective pursuit of the facts. During the public Iran-Contra hearings, he captured the nation's interest when he cross-examined Oliver North and concluded by saying, "The American people have the Constitutional right to be wrong."

While in the Senate, Rudman served on the Ethics Committee from 1985 until he left the Senate. As its Chairman and Vice Chairman, he presided over numerous investigations and hearings including the Keating Five and was active in fashioning ethics legislation. In addition, he served on the Senate Impeachment Panel for Judge Claiborne and Judge Alycee Hastings.

Senator Rudman served on the Senate Appropriations Committee, the Intelligence Committee, the Governmental Affairs Committee and the well-known Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations. As a member of the Appropriations Committee, he was active on the Subcommittees on Defense and Commerce, Justice, State and the Judiciary, where he served as the Ranking Republican. While supporting a strong military, he actively opposed expensive weapons systems that were not cost effective.

Due to his extraordinary concern with the inability of policymakers to resolve the country's fiscal crisis, Rudman joined with former Senator Paul Tsongas and former Commerce Secretary Pete Peterson to form the Concord Coalition. The Concord Coalition is a non-profit organization set up as a grass-roots movement to awaken the American people to the gravity of our nation's fiscal crisis. Senator Rudman is very active in this organization which was started in September of 1992.

In addition to the Concord Coalition, the Senator is a member of the Board of Directors of the Chubb Corporation, Collins & Aikman and the Raytheon Company, and a Trustee of several funds of the Dreyfus Corporation. President Clinton appointed Senator Rudman as a member of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board in the fall of 1993 where he now serves as Vice Chairman. He also serves on the Board of Trustees of Boston College, Valley Forge Military Academy and the Aspen Institute as well as being a member of the Senior Advisory Committee of the Institute of Politics of the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard.

ISABEL V. SAWHILL

Isabel Sawhill is currently a Senior Fellow occupying the Arjay Miller chair in public policy at the Urban Institute, a nonprofit research organization in Washington, D.C.

Before returning to the Urban Institute in February 1995, Ms. Sawhill was an Associate Director at the Office of Management and Budget where she served for two years. Her responsibilities included all of the human resource programs of the Federal government including education, training, welfare, and Social Security, accounting for one third of the Federal budget.

Before joining the Clinton Administration, Ms. Sawhill directed several large research projects at the Urban Institute. She is the author or editor of numerous books and articles including Welfare Reform: An Analysis of the Issues (Urban Institute, 1995), Challenge to Leadership: Economic and Social Issues for the Next Decade (Urban Institute, 1988) and "The Economist vs. Madmen in Authority," (Journal of Economic Perspectives, 1995, forthcoming). Her interests have spanned a wide array of economic and social issues including fiscal policy, economic growth, poverty and inequality, the well-being of children, and changes in the family.

Ms. Sawhill has been Director of the Children's Roundtable (a Carnegie Corporation project designed to educate members of Congress on children's issues), a Visiting Professor at Georgetown Law School, Director of the National Commission for Employment Policy, and President of the Association for Public Policy Analysis and Management. She has served on a number of nonprofit boards, including the German Marshall Fund, Resources for the Future, the American Assembly, the Manpower Research Demonstration Corporation, and the Population Reference Bureau. She was elected a member of the Executive Committee of the American Economic Association and has served on the editorial boards of two leading journals in economics. She currently chairs the Research Advisory Board of the Committee for Economic Development. She has been an adviser to Stanford University's Center for Economic Policy Research, the Public Interest, the National Academy of Sciences, and numerous other organizations. She has testified frequently before Congress, and her contributions to the press have been published in the Washington Post, the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal, and other newspapers.

Born in Washington, D.C. in 1937, Ms. Sawhill attended Wellesley College and received her Ph.D. from New York University's Graduate School of Business Administration in 1968. She now lives in Washington, D.C. with her husband, John C. Sawhill. She is an avid skier and hiker as well as a proud grandmother who always puts extra chocolate chips in the cookies.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF LOUIS W. SULLIVAN, M.D.

Dr. Sullivan returned to the Morehouse School of Medicine (MSM) on January 21, 1993, after serving as Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in the Bush Administration, the longest tenure (47 months) of any HHS Secretary in U.S. History. As Head of HHS, Dr. Sullivan oversaw the Federal agency responsible for the major health, welfare, food and drug safety, medical research and income security programs service of the American people.

Dr. Sullivan became the founding Dean and Director of the Medical Education Program at Morehouse College in 1975, the first minority medical school founded in the United States in this century. In 1978, MSM began operation as a two year program in the basic medical sciences, admitting its first class of 24 students. On July 1, 1981, the Morehouse School of Medicine became independent from Morehouse College with Dr. Sullivan as its Dean and first President, and on July 1, 1983, MSM became a member of the Atlanta University Center.

Graduating Magna Cum Laude from Morehouse College in 1954, Dr. Sullivan earned his medical degree, Cum Laude, from Boston University School of Medicine in 1958. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Alpha Phi Alpha Honor Societies, and the recipient of 41 honorary degrees. He is on the Boards of Boy Scouts of America, Little League, United Way of America, The Ethics Resource Center, The Ida Cason Callaway Foundation, the American Cancer Society, the Woodruff Arts Center, Africare, CARE, the Southern Center for International Studies, and the Association for Academic Health Centers.



KATHLEEN SYLVESTER

Kathleen Sylvester is vice president for domestic policy of the Progressive Policy Institute. She directs the Institute's work in a variety of domestic policy areas, with particular emphasis on family policy, education and reinventing government.

She is the author of *Preventable Calamity: Rolling Back Teen Pregnancy* (1994), and *Second-Chance Homes; Breaking the Cycle of Teen Pregnancy* (1995). She has served as an advisor on teen pregnancy to federal and state officials.

Ms. Sylvester served as a consultant to Vice President Gore's National Performance Review, and is an associate of the Alliance for Redesigning Government. She also serves on the advisory board of the Georgetown University Family Policy Seminars. She is a founder, past president and a director of Jobs for Homeless People of Washington, D.C.

Before joining PPI, Ms. Sylvester was a senior writer at *Governing*, the leading national magazine of state and local public policy, which she helped found in 1987. She reported for NBC News, National Public Radio and The Washington Star and had contributed to a variety of publications including The Washington Post and Newsday.

She has an undergraduate degree from the Georgetown University School of Foreign Service and a master's degree from Wesleyan University. She also studied at Yale Law School and was a Knight Fellow at Stanford University.

Jay A. Winsten received his Ph.D. in molecular biology from The Johns Hopkins University. Concurrent with post-doctoral cancer research at Harvard Medical School, he devoted considerable time to freelance writing for the lay press; his articles on health policy and scientific research were carried by *The Wall Street Journal*, *The New York Times* syndicate, *The Christian Science Monitor* and the Associated Press. He left the research laboratory to pursue his longstanding interest in journalism and public health, and accepted a position at the Harvard School of Public Health. He directed the School's Office of Health Policy Information, a resource center for policy makers and journalists; conducted research examining quality assurance programs in medical care; assessed legislative proposals for medical cost containment; served as co-editor, along with Nobel laureate James Watson and Howard Hiatt, of a three-volume *Origins of Human Cancer*; and conducted a three-year study examining how news coverage of science and health is shaped by economic, organizational, and professional incentives in journalism.

Dr. Winsten currently is associate dean and director of the Center for Health Communication at the Harvard School of Public Health. The Center's mission is to mobilize the immense power of mass communication to motivate positive behavior change and

contribute to informed public policy. The Center has forged a unique set of partnerships with the U.S. broadcast, advertising, news and entertainment industries. Its best known initiative is the Harvard Alcohol Project. Conducted in collaboration with all major Hollywood studios and the leading television networks, the Project successfully demonstrated how a new social concept -- the "designated driver" -- could be rapidly introduced and widely disseminated through mass communication. Launched in 1988, the Harvard Alcohol Project marked the first time that a health institution and the Hollywood community undertook a joint campaign on such a scale; it paved the way for subsequent Hollywood campaigns on the environment and other issues. The Center recently launched "Squash It!", a national media campaign to reduce youth violence that has won the personal support of President Clinton and wide participation from the entertainment industry.

ANDREW YOUNG

Andrew Young has spent more than 35 years in public service. Following his graduation from Howard University and Hartford Theological Seminary, Young pastored small Congregational churches in Marion, Alabama, and in Thomasville and Beachton, Georgia. Later Young moved to New York City to become Associate Director of the Department of Youth Work for the National Council of Churches. In 1961, Young returned to Atlanta to work as a top aide to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. during the civil rights movement. He served as Executive Vice President of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

Young was elected to three terms in the United States Congress where he represented the Fifth Congressional District of Georgia. In 1977, Young resigned his seat in the House of Representatives to become United States Ambassador to the United Nations under President Jimmy Carter.

First elected Mayor of Atlanta in 1981, Young was re-elected for a second term in 1985. During his administration, over half a million jobs were created, and the metropolitan region attracted more than \$70 billion dollars in private investment and construction.

Following his terms as mayor, Young joined Law Companies Group, Inc., one of the most respected engineering and environmental consulting companies in the world. Young served as Chairman of its subsidiary, Law International, Inc. until February 1993 when he was appointed Vice Chairman of Law Companies Group.

As a result of Young's visibility in both the national and international arenas, he played an instrumental role in bringing the 1996 Summer Olympic Games to Atlanta. Currently, he serves as Co-Chairman of the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games (ACOG).

Recently, President Clinton appointed Young Chairman of the new Southern Africa Enterprise Development Fund (SAEDF). This \$100 million fund will help establish small and medium size businesses throughout Southern Africa.

Young is a member of numerous boards, including: Delta Airlines, Thomas Nelson Publishing Company, Host Marriott Corporation, the Howard University Board of Trustees, the Georgia Tech Advisory Board, the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center Board of Directors, the Global Infrastructure Fund, and the Center for Global Partnership.

Young has received many awards during his career: the Presidential Medal of Freedom, America's highest civilian award; the Legion d'Honneur (France); and more than 35 honorary degrees from Universities such as Notre Dame, Yale, Morehouse and Emory.
