Dear Mrs. Clinton,

Being quite overwhelmed by the whole experience -- a formal visit on May 1 at the White House, at your invitation, -- all that I managed to say to you was, that I was honored to be present.

Actually, I also wanted very much to express my profound gratitude to you and to the Clinton Administration for being so concerned and supportive in the daunting task of combating the serious illnesses, that have stricken thousands of children in Ukraine. The statistical data on the victims and the late-developing effects and diseases, is not only diminishing but is growing, ten years following the Chornobyl catastrophe.

As the Vice President has rightfully stated, much of this grievous situation resulted from the unconscionable and monstrous behaviour of the Soviet regime -- perhaps not surprisingly so, given the history of genocide, ethnocide and linguicide in all the East European countries, which the Russian Bolshevik regime had occupied and ruled.

Speaking with Volodymyr Malofienko at the reception, I told him, how wonderful it was to meet a child who has suffered a cancer brought on by the Chornobyl radiation but, due to the excellent medical care in the United States, he is completely cured. The memories haunting me, are those of the gravely ill children, whom I saw and met at one specialized children's hospital, in the city of Lviv, in 1994. My husband and I taught voluntarily two semesters at Kyiv higher institutions; after visiting this hospital, we initiated a fund collection, through the Children of Chornobyl Foundation, for a life saving blood-cell separator, so desperately needed by that hospital. My concerted work yielded results, and the collected \$38,800 will purchase this apparatus, to save lives of 85% of leukemia patients, at that facility.

I cite this simply to point out, that every aid effort, in which Ukrainian-Americans have been engaged, is significant, albeit in a small degree. Your continued interest and support will mean so much to all of us, and will provide concrete aid to Ukraine's youngest Chornobyl victims.

This auspicious occasion has been historic not only for the invited individuals personally, but for our country of origin, so destroyed and disfigured by the Soviet regime. Presently, only 20% of the children in the whole Ukraine are born healthy.

May I express my deepest gratitude to you and to the Vice President on behalf of all the children, who shall be the recipients of your help. It was truly an honor and a pleasure to meet you.

Dear Melanne:

I was so pleased to see you - and hear you! - at the Ukrainian Independence Day Celebration. And it was good of you to remember that we shared a luncheon table at the State Department during those days when I was President of the Eurasia Foundation.

I do take a good deal of pride in the fact that Eurasia opened the first NIS field office in Kiev in those early, early days when there were those in the State Department who objected to such recognition of Ukraine. How times have changed!

Melanne, we spoke at the Congressional reception about the First Lady's trip to Ukraine. I said that I have spent a great deal of time and energy over the last three years trying to understand and then improve the health care situation in Ukraine. ~~As I have had too little success thus far - and since the Ukrainian government seems unable to arrest the deterioration of the health care system, I can only report that Ukraine is in the midst of a major crisis as the result of the lack of pharmaceuticals, diagnostic equipment, and even "off the shelf" items for hospital emergency rooms.~~

When I began in 1993 to agitate for action I drew a bleak picture of the situation from a 1993 report by the World Bank:

"Ministry officials report that in 1991, the equivalent of US \$800 million [worth] of drugs and raw materials were imported to Ukraine principally from Soviet republics. In 1992, the value of imports dropped to zero...

The pharmaceutical and medical products industry is near collapse for lack of inputs. Barter among health care facilities was being used to obtain required drugs. Extensive substitution was common, often for drugs not considered an optimal choice for treatment.

Ukraine needs technical assistance to help identify its areas of comparative advantage in pharmaceutical and medical equipment production. Donors could help finance imports of essential drugs and supplies for pharmaceutical production and technical assistance for short-term planning for procurement and distribution."

My most recent trip in June to Ukraine where I attended the Western NIS Enterprise Fund Board Meeting confirmed once more that the situation continues to deteriorate and there has been little to no progress since 1993. My visit to two emergency medical centers was chillingly depressing - Ukrainians must bring their own medicines and drugs to the hospital! Imagine!

I cannot think of a more generous and sensitive activity for the First Lady in Ukraine than to visit a hospital perhaps in the company of Dr. Andriy Serduik, Minister of Health of Ukraine and I know that Madame Kuchma is in the forefront of those in Ukraine who are trying to deal with the crisis. I believe she

may have her own foundation dedicated to these issues. So, perhaps, she might join the First Lady - or at least have the subject on their agenda.

I should also tell you that Minister Serdiuk, and the President of the National Committee on the Prevention of Drug Abuse and AIDS, Dr. Valery Ivasiuk, have approached the U.S. Government for an emergency shipment of pharmaceuticals (including a powerful cry for medicines for treatment of HIV-infected and AIDS patients) and long-term assistance in rebuilding the failed pharmaceutical industry in Ukraine. Thus far they have gotten painfully little attention. For the First Lady to highlight this crisis through visits to a hospital or two, discussions (and perhaps a hospital visit) with Mrs. Kushma and Minister Serdiuk would be doing a good, humanitarian service; a service that with Mrs. Clinton's encouragement and publicity can do important things for all the people of Ukraine.

If this idea is attractive to you I would be glad to help provide information, documentation and further suggestions.

I don't recall from our conversation when the First Lady's party goes to Ukraine. So if you need anything at any time please let me help. I can't think of a more worthy endeavor for Mrs. Clinton in Ukraine.

Let me know if such an idea finds its way on the First Lady's schedule and I will do everything possible to facilitate that part of the program that deals with health issues - particularly, in my mind, the escalating incidents of AIDS.

Again my thanks for your courtesy and interest at the Ukrainian reception. As a person who has given much time and sympathetic attention to Ukraine for a very long time, I am delighted and relieved to know that you are there for the people of Ukraine.

Dear Don:

It was good to see you at the meeting with Melanne Verveer. I've been down a lot of trails in my forty years in Washington but I have rarely been at a meeting that was as crisp and well-directed as that one. Melanne has a real talent in the way she moves to calling for "solutions".

Before moving to a few of the ideas expressed at the meeting permit me to send along to you two of the letters I sent to Melanne over the last few months. Have a look at them as background to my rendition of "assignments".

- ▶ I'm going to do "God's Work" (Melanne's phrase) and try to bring Zbig Brzezinski into this operation. This will include pushing CSIS to host and/or sponsor Serdiuk while he is here.
- ▶ I have a good relationship with George Soros and his troops. Again I will try to move George "back" to Ukraine at least in the health care area. (By the way, I hear President Kuchma may be visiting with Soros soon. Is this the case? If so we should try to get the social sector questions brought up).

One last point - for now - on an observation you made at the meeting. That was on the difficulty - if not impossibility - of getting "non-American" drugs/pharmaceuticals into the process.

In my letter to Melanne I mention the Bulgarian operation where Soros, the Albert Schweitzer Foundation, and an American wholesaler using all sources (mainly European drugs) was able to do far better than the AID shipment in terms of quantity and cost.

The reason one says quickly that it was a better deal was that the funds were all "non-American".

But if one looks at AID's own regulations (Section 310, Source, Origin, and Nationality) one sees that if "the delivered price from the United States would be at least 50 percent more than from another source" a waiver of U.S. source policy "will be considered".

Don, I worked on the basic legislation years ago (Fulbright, Church committees) and I'm sure that Congress would be as open to such waivers particularly if it were in the area of essential pharmaceuticals.

Just a thought - and just to say I've seen a number of cases where the 50% was there - and the AID contractor didn't even consider the option.

We can talk about that last point sometime in the future if you wish. For now, just know that I am very much engaged in the health care issues in your area. And want to help in any way I can.

I gather you are bringing the troops together in Kiev (Kate Schecter leaves for Ukraine on the 26th). I've communicated to a number of folk around the Minister that he must "have an agenda" for his American trip - not just a tin cup!

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS PROJECT

The U.S.-Ukraine Foundation (USUF) announces the launch of its new project, *U.S.-Ukraine Community Partnerships for Local Government Training and Education* (CPP).

Over the next three years, CPP will establish 18 partnerships between U.S. and Ukrainian cities to deliver cost-effective training programs and thereby improve public administration in Ukrainian local governments. The goal is to enable Ukrainian local governments to become more constructive players in a democratic society.

The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) is funding this three-year \$6.9 million project. The project will contribute to USAID/Kyiv's Strategic Objective of "More efficient, responsive and accountable local government in Ukraine."

Strategic Partnerships

U.S. President Clinton and Ukrainian President Kuchma have declared a strategic partnership between the two countries "based on shared ideals, mutual respect, and a commitment to work...towards the resolution of issues." The Gore-Kuchma Commission was created to further this strategic partnership. CPP extends this partnership to the local level. Community partnerships will harness the wealth of local government expertise in the U.S. and engage it promoting effective and responsive local government in Ukraine. U.S. public officials will work with their Ukrainian counterparts to solve concrete problems in budgeting, housing and communal services,

transportation, economic development, or citizen participation.

Why Community Partnerships?

Community partnerships will be long-term relationships designed to achieve real results. Partnerships are an effective model for delivering targeted technical assistance because they:

- ◆ invest all parties in the project objectives because decisions are made bilaterally. Participants become "stakeholders" rather than just aid recipients.
- ◆ engage committed practitioners with real-life experience in a wide variety of fields;
- ◆ involve Ukrainian participants at every step of the decision-making process, giving them a practical understanding of how local government operates in a democracy; and
- ◆ access other sectors of the community in the project, leading to possible business and other alliances.

CPP will establish 18 U.S.-

Ukraine community partnerships to improve local governance in Ukraine.

Why 18 Partnerships?

A key to sustainable reform in Ukraine is developing a "critical mass" of progressive communities. Those implementing reform must feel that they are part of a larger effort.

With this in mind, CPP has been designed to include as many communities as possible. In addition to the 18 partnerships, non-partner cities will be invited to participate through a network of regional training centers. CPP aims to create a coalition of like-minded U.S. and Ukrainian communities working together to promote reforms in Ukraine.

Ms. Verveer and I both endorse the goals of this project, knowing that training in market economics is key to Ukraine's economic and democratic development.

This is also an area of interest to the Kiev Mission of the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), which is currently conceptualizing a program for business management training in Ukraine. Given that a number of organizations have expressed interest in working in this area, USAID will shortly issue a Request for Applications (RFA), describing the proposed program and the criteria for competitive selection of one or more organizations to implement it. Once it is issued, the RFA will be posted on USAID's internet web site (www.info.usaid.gov) and USAID will notify all organizations that have expressed prior interest.

I appreciate your commitment to this important component of Ukraine's transition to a market-oriented economy and your interest in working with USAID to provide these services to the Ukrainian people. I hope that you and your partners will submit a proposal under this arrangement.

Dear Melanne:

Just a short note to follow my letter of February 19th.

Yes, Serdiuk is coming. The window of dates I have been given runs from 29 March to 9 April. I have suggested two, possibly three, business days in Washington.

So, could you lend a hand in organizing something for him? As you know from my last note Zbig Brzezinski has invited the Minister to come to the United States (I attach that letter again to remind) and this was the handle in dealing with Serdiuk's own system.

Specifically, it would be extremely important in my view if you might host a meeting in the White House to kick off Serdiuk's Washington rounds (or, indeed, it could be the end of the trip where he could report on results - your call, of course).

Could you give me a day and time sometime within his "window" here? Given that the 9th of April is Holy Thursday (my Catholic background speaking) I suspect earlier is better particularly because I want to take him to the Hill.

Nevertheless, my major objective at the moment is to get you and Zbig in the same three day period!

I'll call your office on Wednesday to try to start the process.

I'm most excited about the timing of all this - AID's announcement that it has "found" some \$40 million for infectious diseases and the good feelings here for Ukraine as a result of MA's trip there and the decision on Iran, etc. I also believe I have convinced Serdiuk to come up with a plan - not merely a tin cup.

Welcome!...to the fifth edition of the NIS-US Women's Consortium newsletter. This publication is distributed regularly and is also available in Russian and Ukrainian.

2ND INTERNATIONAL CONSORTIUM MEMBERSHIP MEETING HELD IN KYIV

The growing sophistication of women's NGOs was evident when the *NIS-US Women's Consortium* held its Second International Membership Meeting, "Preparing for the 21st Century." The meeting was hosted by the West NIS Consortium office in Kyiv, Ukraine from January 23-26, 1998. Consortium member representatives from over 120 women's NGOs in Armenia, Belarus, Moldova, Russia, Ukraine, and the US were in attendance, as well as observers from women's organizations in Central Asia, the Caucasus and Central Europe.

Participants developed an Action Plan for 2000 and Beyond outlining strategies and directions for the Consortium. The current focus on leadership training was reaffirmed and a strong interest in women's entrepreneurship was expressed by the non-profit leaders. Participants also had the opportunity to increase their skills and knowledge through training sessions and roundtable discussions; to network and share information with counterparts throughout the NIS and the US; and to identify fundraising opportunities and acquaint regional donors with women's NGOs and their importance in developing civil society in the NIS. A conference report will be available soon.

"TRAFFICKING OF NIS WOMEN ABROAD" INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE, MOSCOW

In November 1997, Russian Coordinator Elena Ershova and West NIS Coordinator Cara Galbraith attended the "Trafficking of NIS Women Abroad" International Conference in Moscow, Russia. The conference was co-sponsored by US Consortium member the *International League for Human Rights*, the Global Survival Network, Russian Consortium member the *Syostri Center* in Moscow, and the Andrei Sakharov Foundation. Over 100 people attended the conference, including representatives from the United Nations, the European Commission, the US Department of State and the Russian Government.

The conference highlighted the fact that trafficking is a violation of women's human rights and forced slavery, rather than a prostitution issue. Statistics show NIS women are among the most trafficked women in the world.

Conference participants recommended that receiving countries re-evaluate their immigration laws, enforce legal protection and provide sanctuary for women victims of trafficking. Visa extensions should be made to allow women to reside in the "host" country or an intermediary country until such time as court proceedings are held. It was reported that the Dutch Government has created a policy to grant temporary residence permits for victims of trafficking, demonstrating the feasibility of this recommendation.

Since the conference, the West NIS Consortium office in Kyiv has become an implementing partner of the US Department of State-funded Information Campaign on Prevention of Trafficking of Ukrainian Women through a sub-contract with the International Organization for Migration. During the month of June, Consortium trainers will provide a series of 16 interactive discussions throughout Ukraine for women's NGOs, youth organizations, government officials, schools and the mass media. Also, the Kyiv office is a distribution center for educational materials such as the report Crime and Servitude: An Exposé of the Traffic in Women for Prostitution from the Newly Independent States by the Global Survival

Program Summary:

USAID has funded Project Harmony to conduct a training program to combat trafficking of women from Ukraine. This a twelve-day comprehensive program (July 18- August 1) designed to provide participants with exposure to new approaches and techniques in anti-trafficking work. The program will facilitate a transfer of practical skills through interactive, hands-on training and small group activities. Additionally, it will provide a number of networking opportunities for participants to connect with specialists, officials and organizations involved in anti-trafficking work in the US. Participants will engage in strategic action planning throughout the program in order to focus their experiences toward practical application at home. By the conclusion of the program, each participant will have designed a detailed action plan for implementation upon return home and will have acquired the skills, resources and professional support necessary to implement significant change within their organization and community in Ukraine.

Each program day consists of a balance between lecture presentations, focused discussions and interactive training techniques, as well as site visits and meetings with key organizations, agencies and officials. Participants will also be provided with a number of networking opportunities with specialists and trainers, as well as the larger Ukrainian-American Community in the New York-New Jersey metropolitan area.

Project Harmony is a not-for-profit educational and professional exchange organization founded on the belief that active citizenship and community involvement strengthen the international community. It has over thirteen years of experience in developing and facilitating educational and professional exchanges between the US and countries of the former Soviet Union. Project Harmony maintains three offices in Ukraine in Lviv, Odessa and Kiev.

Purpose of Meeting:

To provide the Ukrainians with an opportunity to express in their own words their view of this phenonema in their country and potential solutions, with a particular focus on prevention and economic alternatives.

Lawyer, Consultant to the NIS-US Women's Consortium in the areas of legal assistance and the development of small business programs for women, including professional development and training. She will be outlining the legal basis for implementing a microcredit program throughout the Consortium starting in August 1998. She is specifically responsible for defining the legal basis and regulations for implementing the microcredit program. She also provides consultation and assistance to women in workers' rights and employment regulations.

Mrs. Iryna Turlo

Chief Officer/ Training Specialist at the Department of Humanitarian Education and Development under the Ministry of Education. She directs the Ministry's efforts to introduce preventative anti-trafficking measures at the secondary level, primarily through educational information dissemination. She directs the creation and publication of educational materials, in particular on the problem trafficking, youth employment and parenting issues. She is particularly interested in developing job training and skills development programs for women prior to their completion of secondary school. She looks to the Consortium and other NGOs for assistance in planning an information campaign to implement throughout schools in Ukraine.

FY-98 FREEDOM Support Act Funding to Combat
Trafficking in Women in Ukraine

- USAID will invest \$3 million in FY-98 funds in Ukraine to address trafficking. The \$3 million breaks out as follows:
 - \$1.1 million has been awarded to Winrock International to the NIS-US Women's Consortium for a three-pronged effort: 1) job skills training for potential victims to provide economic alternatives; 2) a violence prevention program; 3) a seed grants competition for NGO's. These programs will be launched shortly in Kiev and 3 other high-risk cities. \$1.5 million will support USAID's Community Health Partnerships. These funds will support programs that provide services and counseling for women victims of domestic violence and trafficking. The final \$400,000 has not been programmed, but USAID is considering funding a television docudrama on trafficking.
 - USAID is also working on a Request for Applications for a Women's Economic Empowerment Program, which would be funded at \$2 million over 3 years. The program would focus on business training for women and developing women's business associations. The program would not be focused on potential victims of trafficking but would certainly reach out to some members of this population.
- INL has funded a brochure, "Be Smart, Be Safe" for potential and actual victims of trafficking with FSA funds. The brochure was translated into Russian and Ukrainian by USIS.
- USIS has provided Democracy Commission grants to Ukrainian NGO's seeking to provide professional and psychological assistance to women without work and returned victims of trafficking. They will continue to reach out to these groups.
- USIS is working with the Ministry of Education and their partners in the civic education project to include a segment on the dangers of trafficking in the secondary school curricula.

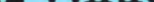
