U.S. NGOs To ATTEND FIRST LADIES' CONFERENCE

USAID recommends that the First Lady consider the following NGOs to attend the parallel event at the First Ladies' Conference. Canada has requested the names of the NGOs by August 12, 1999.

Each country has been requested by the Canadians to bring two NGOs, one specializing in the well-being of the child 0 - 6 and the other with expertise in women's health. These NGOs would attend the NGO forum and could or could not be part of the official delegation - another decision for the First Lady to make.

For the child 0 - 6, we propose one of the following NGOs: Save the Children, CARE, or World Vision. All three organizations are members of the network (named CORE) of 35 U.S.-based Child Survival NGOs. Another option would be to select the Secretariat for CORE, which could represent the entire network. CORE's functions are to coordinate policy issues, provide technical capacity building and work with U.S. and international donors. USAID funds the Secretariat.

Our recommendations for the NGOs in the women's health area are as follows. CARE is probably the best agency for direct service delivery in the reproductive health area. For more women's advocacy NGOs who also are involved in health issues, consideration should be given to the International Center for Research on Women (ICRW) and the Center for Development and Population Activities (CEDPA). ICRW has in the past (not now) been involved in women's health and nutrition projects in Latin America and the Caribbean. In addition, they and the Inter-American Dialogue serve as the secretariat for the Women's Leadership Conference of the Americas (WLCA), a network of over 100 women leaders in the Americas. One of the priority issues of WLCA is domestic violence. CEDPA works towards gender equality, reproductive and human rights and women's empowerment globally. It is well known for its skills in leadership training for women generally as well as being active in the area of women's reproductive health.

FRIENDS OF ART AND PRESERVATION IN EMBASSIES DONATES JOEL SHAPIRO SCULPTURE TO U.S. DEPARTMENT OF STATE FOR OUTDOOR GARDEN AT NEW U.S. CHANCELLERY IN OTTAWA, ONTARIO, CANADA

On Thursday, September 30, First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will officially dedicate the Joel Shapiro sculpture at a ribbon cutting ceremony. The sculpture was commissioned by the Friends of Art and Preservation in Embassies (FAPE) as part of its millennium project, GIFT TO THE NATION. Following the dedication, the National Gallery of Art in Ottawa is opening an exhibition of work by Joel Shapiro.

For the first time in forty years the U.S. government is constructing a completely new building to serve as its embassy in a country which has very strong historic ties to the United States. Situated in the heart of the city, it is a pivotal urban site along Ottawa's Confederation Boulevard Ceremonial Parade Route, bounded by the Canadian capital's Federal District or "Gown" and the active restaurant, shopping and market area known as Byward Market or the "Town."

The 40-foot bronze sculpture by internationally recognized American artist, Joel Shapiro, will be located on the southern lawn of the embassy compound between the new building and the new York Steps. The sculpture will be visible from the Steps, York Street and Major's Hill Park and will be seen as a dramatic statement as one walks from the Byward Market to historic Parliament Hill.

FAPE is a non-profit, tax-exempt foundation established in 1988 to augment the representation of American culture in U.S. embassies overseas. Working closely with the Department of State, FAPE contributes numerous works of American art to embassies, and provides funds for restoration projects at some of our country's more historic properties. Jo Carole Lauder serves as FAPE's Chairman and Ann L. Gund is FAPE's President.

GIFT TO THE NATION is a commitment by FAPE to acquire through purchase or donation as many as 200 major works of American art for embassies around the world by the end of the year 2000. This lasting legacy will include American paintings, sculpture, works on paper, photography, decorative objects, crafts, tribal art, and folk art. Among the lead gifts are:

- "Untitled #4" by Agnes Martin donated by the American Art Foundation.
- Three plant drawings by Filaworth Kelly donated by the artist.
- Dog Tags by Robert Rauschenberg donated by Jo Carole and Ronald S. Lauder.
- Twelve photographs by André Kertész donated by Harlette and Noel Levine.

Joel Shapiro

Joel Shapiro's sculptures have been extensively exhibited throughout the United States and Europe. For over a quarter of a century he has created works that define him as one of the finest sculptors of his generation.

Joel Shapiro grew up in New York and graduated from New York University in 1964. He joined the Peace Corps and served for two years in India.

His one-person exhibitions have been organized by the Whitechapel Art Gallery, London, in 1980; and by the Louisiana Museum of Modern Art in Denmark, in 1980, which traveled to IVAM Centre Julio González, Valencia, Spain; Kunsthalle, Zurich, and Musée des Beaux-Arts, Calais, France.

The Whitney Museum of American Art organized a major retrospective in 1982, which traveled to the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts, the Art Gallery of Ontario, and the La Jolla Museum of Contemporary Art. In 1985 he was the subject of a travelling exhibition organized by the Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam.

The first major exhibition of Joel Shapiro's outdoor works opened at the Walker Art Center/Minneapolis Sculpture Garden in 1986 and traveled to the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art/Kansas City Sculpture Park in 1996.

Among Joel Shapiro's commissions and publicly sited sculptures are those located in major cities in the United States, Japan, and Europe, including a large outdoor sculpture for the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, Washington, DC (1993); a bronze sculpture for Sony Plaza in New York City (1995); and a piece for the Friedrichstadt Passage, Berlin (1996). Most recently, he installed a large three-part sculpture at the Kansas City International Airport and a sculpture in front of the municipal building in the Canton of Aarau, Switzerland.

In 1975, Joel Shapiro received a National Endowment for the Arts award for sculpture. He also received the Brandeis University Creative Arts Award in 1984, the Skowhegan Medal for Sculpture in 1986, and an Award of Merit Medal for Sculpture, American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters, New York, in 1990. Joel Shapiro was elected to the Swedish Royal Academy of Art in 1994. In 1998, the American Academy of Arts and Letters, New York, elected him a member.

American embassies and Ambassadors' residences are important symbols of our country in other lands; these official buildings represent the best of the United States to foreign visitors. The need to reflect the quality of our country's culture in the public rooms of these buildings led, in 1986, to the establishment of the Friends of Art and Preservation in Embassies (FAPE), a non-profit, tax-exempt foundation. Working closely with the Department of State, FAPE supports the exhibition and preservation of fine and decorative art in many of the 171 embassy residences.

As we prepare to enter the third millennium, FAPE is establishing a unique gift to the nation. This lasting legacy will consist of donations and purchases of as many as 200 American paintings, sculpture, works on paper, photography, decorative objects, crafts, tribal art and folk art, to be placed in permanent locations in United States embassies and Ambassadors' residences around the world. The selection of these works will be made with the advice of a committee of prominent professionals from American museums.

Before these works are distributed to our embassies, a selection of FAPE's GIFT TO THE NATION will be exhibited in Washington, DC. The collection will be published in a catalogue.

In order to celebrate our cultural as well as our diplomatic achievements, the objective of FAPE's GIFT TO THE NATION is the contribution of the finest of American arts. Because we are a global community with vital interests abroad, and because art is an invaluable means of representing us as a nation, FAPE is dedicated to creating this gift of American art.

FAPE also will undertake one major preservation project, the restoration of Hôtel Talleyrand, an historic building in the heart of Paris which is used for U.S. Consular Affairs, offices of the United States Information Agency, the Marshall Center for cultural events, conferences and other activities.

Gift of the Friends of Art and Preservation in Embassies in honor of FAPE millennium
GIFT TO THE NATION

I wanted to create a sculpture that would be sympathetic to the architecture and the site. I wanted the sculpture to be large but not overwhelming, enduring but not leaden, open and expansive but not monumental, complicated but easy to read. You can see the sculpture as a joining of individual parts into a coherent and unexpected whole. I wanted it to be animate and human - about growth and conjunction. I wanted the work to use common language that all could understand. I wanted it to be accessible and moving: about the future, understood from common pasts. I wanted to make a sculpture that would represent the close historical ties and relationship between our two nations.

I know that these thoughts can be given form. The sculpture's organization is spontaneous - about the present, but its components are familiar; the ground we walk on, the building wall, our own articulation as we proceed through the world.

I am looking for the unexpected. I want the sculpture to take off, to soar, to be expansive, to be a symbol of optimism and possibility.

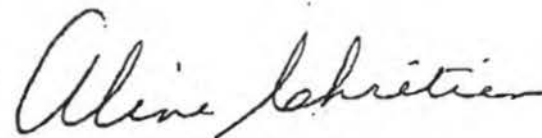

PARALLEL NGO EVENTS FOR FIRST SPOUSES' CONFERENCE

Canada is proposing a significant innovation to the existing First Spouses' Conference format: a parallel civil society or non-governmental organizations (NGO) fair. This innovation arises from the commitment at the Santiago Summit of the Americas to engage civil society more actively in the efforts of governments to achieve hemispheric social and economic sustainable development. The First Spouses are equally committed to this goal.

The parallel NGO fair would bring together leading NGOs from across the Americas in the two theme areas of the conference: A Healthy Start: Investing in Children 0 - 6 and Women's Health. One day will be devoted to each theme. First Spouses are invited to select two NGOs from their country, one active in early child development (health and education) and the other in women's health, to participate in this event. Canada would invite an equal number of Canadian NGOS active in the same fields.

Each morning NGOs will exhibit information and materials on their programs and exchange information and ideas with each other, the international agencies, and interested technical advisors. First Spouses would tour the exhibits themselves for one hour before lunch as part of their agenda. This would enable them to collect information on programs of interest to them and to speak to NGO representatives directly about these programs. In the afternoon, Canada would facilitate discussions between groups of NGOs, international agencies, and Canadian Government Departments with similar interests. It is planned that after the conference a website will be established to continue this dialogue.

Canada has agreed to offer assistance with NGO travel and accommodation costs for countries requesting it - for one representative per NGO.
