July 10 (Reuters) - Israeli Prime Minister Ehud

Barak survived

a no-confidence vote in parliament which would have brought
down

the government on Monday, the eve of a U.S.-sponsored peacemaking

summit with the Palestinians.

The no-confidence motion, brought by the opposition Likud party, had posed the last hurdle before his departure for the crucial peacemaking summit at the Camp David retreat outside Washington. Fifty-four members of parliament supported the motion and 52 opposed with seven abstentions, leaving the opposition short of the 61 votes required in the 120-member chamber to topple the government. The remaining did not attend the vote. The vote embarrassed Barak and left his hold on power far from firm. He lost his parliamentary majority on Sunday when three of his coalition parties quit for fear he will cede too much land to the Palestinians at talks starting on Tuesday. Before the vote, Barak delivered a speech to parliament in which he appealed to Israelis to back his peacemaking drive and said it would bring Israel a safer and more secure future.

TAKING POINTS FOR CONGRESSIONAL CALLS

* President has decided that Israeli-Palestinian peace negotiations
have hit a
dead end; has concluded that there is a real opportunity but that only
chance of
reaching an agreement before situation deteriorates is to bring PM
Barak and
Chairman Arafat together.

* The President will announce later today that he has invited Barak and Arafat to a Summit meeting at Camp David. They have agreed. Will begin on July 11. Their goal will be to try to reach an agreement on all permanent status issues.

* Their senior negotiators will be coming a few days earlier for preparatory discussions under Secretary Albright's supervision.

* The President reached this decision after serious review and close consultation with the two leaders. He decided on this course of action for two principal reasons:

* Without a Summit, there will be no agreement. The negotiators have worked hard and have made progress. But significant gaps remain, and they cannot be resolved at the negotiators' level. They involve complex, sensitive issues for which the leaders direct involvement is required.

* Passage of time does not make it easier. Both leaders already are under intense political pressure from their own sides, and this will only get worse. Also facing deadline they have set for themselves that will create its own dangerous dynamic; September 13th (deadline for reaching final agreement; also could be date for unilateral declaration of Palestinian state which would escalate tensions). It is the shared view of all three leaders that the time to move is now.

* Issues that remain are deep-seated for both sides. No guarantee of success. But no alternative.

* If no Summit, cannot reach agreement, and risk running into potential cycle of unilateral steps that will harm Israelis and Palestinians, could lead to dangerous escalation in region.

* President knows that only Israelis and Palestinians can make the

decisions. We
can help, but we cannot impose solutions and we will not try to.

* Expect, at some point, parties will raise US assistance. As you know we have provided help to support the parties for every prior Arab-Israeli agreement. If a historic agreement is reached now, believe we should be prepared to lend our hand. We will not make any commitment without consulting thoroughly with you.

* Of course, others in the region and in the international community also have responsibility to help. Europeans and Arabs in particular will have to contribute significant amounts, and we will press them.

Draft Departure Statement

In a few moments I will leave for Camp David to join Prime Minister Barak and Chairman Arafat in an effort to reach agreement on the core issues that have divided Israelis and Palestinians for half a century. It is an understatement to say that the task will be difficult. The two leaders face the most profound and wrenching questions, and neither is likely to gain complete satisfaction from the answers at hand. They face the challenge of building a new and different future in a land that perhaps more than any other has been defined by its past -- by its peoples' attachment to their soil, their traditions, their experience of suffering and exile.

Both leaders feel the weight of history; but both, I believe, recognize that the time has come to make history. We have never had an opportunity like this to bring about a just and enduring end to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, which is the key to lasting peace in the Middle East.

While there is no guarantee of success, not to try is to guarantee failure. And while the path ahead is daunting, it is no less steep than the journey already taken. From the first Camp David summit, to Madrid and Oslo, to the first handshake on this lawn between Prime Minister Rabin and Chairman Arafat to the peace between Israel and Jordan and the Wye Accords, the parties have proven that peace is possible when they are determined to make peace.

In the process, they have begun to change their people's lives and raise their people's hopes. They have passed the point of no return. The only way forward now -- is forward.

Both sides must find a way to acknowledge suffering, resolve competing claims, yet give their children the gift of peace. It will take patience. It will take creativity. It will take courage. But Prime Minister Barak and Chairman Arafat have those qualities, or they would not have come this far. And they will have the unstinting and unequivocal support of the United States.

We have worked so long for peace. We have never been closer. I will work as hard as I can over the coming days to see that the promise of this moment is fulfilled.
