ISRAEL: Hamas Chief Yassin Predicts No Accord at Mideast Talks

[FBIS Translated Text] Gaza -- "The summit will not lead to any accord, but it would fail even in the event of an accord, because only our people can liberate Palestine. And, sooner or later, they

will succeed: We will destroy Israel, this is the only solution."

This statement was made by Sheik Ahmed Yassin, the spiritual leader of Hamas, the Palestinian fundamentalist organization responsible for terrorism against the Jewish state. More or less at the same time as the summit was beginning at Camp David, he said his evening prayer to

Allah before the interview in his modest house in Gaza, sitting in the paraplegic's wheelchair to which he has been confined since he was a boy, in between continued fits of coughing which even required the intervention

of a doctor. [Franceschini] Sheik Yassin, what do you expect from the summit

in the United States? [Sheik Yassin] No accord. And if there were an accord, it would definitely be at the expense of the Palestinian people. What negotiations can there be when the stronger side, Israel, wants to dictate its conditions to the weaker side? What is the use of "final" negotiations, when Israel has not even put into effect the commitments it undertook in the past? [Franceschini] Will you back 'Arafat

if he were to come back with an accord? [Sheik Yassin] I will only say

this: 'Arafat must not sign anything which compromises the historic rights of his people, primarily over Jerusalem our capital, and the return of 3 million refugees to Palestine. [Franceschini] What will happen if the summit fails? Will it be the end of negotiations? [Sheik Yassin] Resistance will start. The anger of the Palestinian people will unleash another Intifada, a new kind of Intifada, one that Israel has never seen before. As for negotiations, they had been moribund for some time: This summit is their intensive care ward.

[Franceschini]

What role would Hamas play in a revolt against Israel? [Sheik Yassin]

The role it has always played: leading the resistance against the Jewish

oppressor. Only that this time we hope to have the Palestinian Authority,

and 'Arafat, alongside us too. [Franceschini] Once 'Arafat came to wash

your feet in sign of tribute, then he kept you under house arrest for a long time. How do relations between you stand now? [Sheik Yassin]

As ever. Let us say abnormal. We shall see whether they change for the better after the summit. [Franceschini] How do you view the collapse

of Barak's coalition? [Sheik Yassin] Revealing. It is proof that, despite many words and many promises, the Jews are not ready to make

peace with us. [Franceschini] Barak had warned the Palestinians that

Israel, the Mideast military superpower, cannot be defeated in battle.

What do you think? [Sheik Yassin] I think that he is wrong. If it does not happen today, it will happen tomorrow: The end of Israel is predicted in the Koran, Israel will be defeated and will disappear for ever. [Franceschini] So, Sheik Yassin, will there never be peace in this land? [Sheik Yassin] First they have to give us back the land which they are occupying, and which they drove us out from. Afterward, we will be able to live in peace together: There will be room for Jews too in our state, in Palestine. But the entity called Israel does not exist for me, it is a trick, an injustice, and it has to disappear. This is the solution. The only possible solution. _

^Palestinians say they are ready if unrest flares

GAZA, July 12 (Reuters) - Palestinian President Yasser Arafat's Fatah organisation said on Wednesday it had declared a state of emergency

in Palestinian areas to avoid violence in case the Camp David summit with Israel ends without agreement.

``We have declared a state of general emergency and heightened alert to deal with any emerging situation," said Diab al-Louh, a spokesman

for Fatah, essentially the area's ruling party. ``There is no plan to attack Israel or to harm Israelis, but we are preparing for self-defence."

Arafat and Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak were meeting at the U.S. presidential retreat trying to end 52 years of conflict by reaching agreement on issues such as the status of Jerusalem, borders,

Palestinian refugees and Jewish settlements.

Officials say there could be unrest if the talks fail. Arafat

has warned he will declare a Palestinian state on Sept. 13, the deadline

for a final agreement, if there is no pact.

``We are not seeking a confrontation, God forbid, but if it was imposed on us by the Israeli occupation then we would have no choice," al-Louh said.

Israel seized the West Bank from Jordan and the Gaza Strip from Egypt in the 1967 Middle East war. It has handed over more than

40 percent of the land to Palestinian rule since 1993.

Israel has been reinforcing Jewish settlements in Gaza and the West Bank and providing them with light arms in anticipation of possible clashes if the negotiations fail to yield an accord.

``Does Israel alone have the right to take precautionary arrangements in case of a deterioration in the situation? Should we stay handcuffed if a bad thing happens, or defend ourselves?" al-Louh

asked.

Fatah is the biggest faction in the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO). The Fatah Youth Organisation (Shabiba) said in a statement that it had recently held the first in a series of military courses for 1,000 boys and girls.

Israeli cabinet minister Haim Ramon said that violence was not the way to solve disputes. "I believe it is better to have an end of 90 percent of the conflict and leave only one issue that we will solve, of course, through negotiation and not through a conflict and violence," Ramon said in Jerusalem.

Israel has said it might take unilateral steps of its own if Arafat declared a state -- a statement understood in some quarters as a veiled threat to annex occupied land.

Palestinian cabinet minister Abdel-Aziz Shahin said on Monday that Israel would pay a big price if it attempted to raid areas included in a declaration of independence.

Israel Cancels Sale of Early-Warning Radar System to China ^By

Camp David, Maryland, July 12 (Bloomberg) -- Israel Prime
Minister Ehud Barak has canceled a deal worth \$250 million to sell
the

Phalcon early warning radar system to China, his spokesman Gadi
Baltiansky
said.

"We're not going to continue it at this time," Baltiansky
said. "If the circumstances change, we'd reconsider the situation."
The decision to cancel the sale comes on the second day of
the Middle East talks that U.S. President Bill Clinton is mediating
between Barak and Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat at the Camp
David
presidential retreat.

The U.S. has pressured Israel to cancel the deal, and White
House spokesman Joe Lockhart said in a press briefing yesterday that
the issue is a "concern" to the U.S.

Key House Republicans, including Representative Sonny Callahan,
from Alabama, had threatened to hold up \$250 million of foreign
assistance

to Israel if the sale went through. The U.S. House was scheduled to
vote on the measure today.

The aircraft in question, produced by Israeli Aircraft Industries,
is a Russian Ilyushin-76 transport equipped with a saucer-like radar
pod that will allow China to monitor aircraft and telecommunication
traffic, including Taiwan's air force, more than 200 miles away.

China already has given Israel a \$250 million down payment
for the aircraft. The warplane would have filled a crucial void in the
Chinese military's muscle, which right now lacks an extensive
airborne

command, control and reconnaissance, according to a new Pentagon

report.

^Israeli minister doubts summit deal on Jerusalem

JERUSALEM, July 12 (Reuters) - Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak and Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat are unlikely to resolve a dispute over the status of Jerusalem at their Camp David summit, a senior

Israeli cabinet minister said on Wednesday.

Haim Ramon, minister responsible for Jerusalem issues, said the problem was so complex that the leaders should concentrate on seeking

agreement on other matters and allow themselves at least five years to resolve the dispute over a city holy to three faiths.

Israel says Jerusalem is its indivisible, eternal capital.

Palestinians want the east, which Israel captured from Jordan during a war in 1967, as the capital of a state which they plan to declare this year.

"This is the heart of the heart of the Jewish people,"

Ramon told the Foreign Press Association.

"So far I can't see that we can reach a final agreement,

a comprehensive agreement over the issue of Jerusalem...I believe that

what we have to do is to delay the issue of Jerusalem, to agree to disagree,

and delay it for the next five, six years."

Ramon said he did not know whether Barak shared his view but added: "I believe that if he considers the alternative, he will prefer what I am proposing now. My feeling is that this is the best solution under the present circumstances."

Experts on all sides say Jerusalem is the most difficult issue and the least likely to be solved at the summit with U.S.

President

Bill Clinton which began on Tuesday at the Camp David retreat outside

Washington.

The issue is so difficult that Israeli and Palestinian negotiators left it until last when they launched a peace process in Oslo in 1993. But time is now pressing because the two sides want to reach a final peace treaty by September 13.

DELAYED SOLUTION BETTER THAN SUMMIT'S COLLAPSE

Ramon said that despite the target date, it was better to delay a solution on the holy city than to risk the whole summit failing.

He ruled out giving the Palestinians sovereignty over the eastern part of Jerusalem but suggested an interim solution might be found to allow Palestinian administration of shrines that are holy to Islam.

Israel annexed Arab East Jerusalem in a move not recognised internationally.

Ramon was more optimistic that agreement could be reached on other issues such as refugees, Jewish settlements and territory. He said a deal was possible under which the Palestinians would gain sovereignty of most of the West Bank and some control, but not immediate sovereignty, over parts of the West Bank while ceding

some land containing Jewish settlements to Israel.

Ramon suggested 70 percent of territory covered by the agreement should be in the first category, 20 percent in the second, and 10 percent in the third. There was no indication the Palestinians would accept this.

Barak's room for manoeuvre could be limited by a crisis in which three parties left his coalition on Sunday. He only narrowly survived

a no-confidence vote in parliament on Monday over opponents' fears he

will give away too much at Camp David.

Barak has drawn up five "red lines" which put limits on his ability to compromise and make concessions.

Foreign Minister David Levy, who struck Barak a blow by deciding not to attend the summit, told a news conference that wide gaps remained

between the peace negotiators.

The United Nations Middle East envoy, Terje Roed-Larsen, told reporters it was vital that agreement be reached because a failure could be "an invitation to unrest locally which easily can spread,

producing instability in the region."
