How Can Access to Care for People Living with HIV Be Expanded?

Objective: All Americans with HIV should have access to appropriate care and related services.

Problem: Primary HIV care coverage programs – Medicaid and Medicare (40 – 60% of care) -in most cases require that an HIV+ persons be *already disabled* before accessing programs, while new treatments offer hope of delaying or preventing disability.

Current Resource Commitment: For FY '98, the public sector devoted about \$7 billion to provision of HIV-related primary care and related services, covering everything from prescription drugs and doctors' visits to case management and housing. With early intervention as the recognized standard of care, Medicaid and Medicare less often cover initial care for uninsured HIV+, thus increasing the burden on relatively smaller programs like Ryan White, HOPWA and ADAP, where disability is not a pre-condition to access.

Changed Circumstances: Three factors have refocused attention on the existing HIV care financing and delivery system: (1) new standard of care for HIV treatment; (2) changing demographics of the epidemic; and (3) decline in mortality among people diagnosed with AIDS, with reduced rate of progression to AIDS among HIV+.

New Standard of Care: In 1997, HHS issued new treatment guidelines for HIV including treatment with combination drug therapy prior to development of symptoms and before substantial deterioration of the immune system. Once initiated, such treatments must be sustained for an indefinite period of time to assure best results and avoid development of drug-resistant HIV strains.

Changing Demographics: CDC estimates that 650,000 – 900,000 Americans have HIV infection. 500,000 know their status. 350,000 are in care. Half of all new HIV infections are related to injection-drug use. People with AIDS are increasingly likely to be uninsured, impoverished, abusing substances, female and members of racial or ethnic minorities - populations historically underserved by the healthcare system and which require culturally appropriate and sensitive care.

Declines in Mortality: AIDS-related deaths have declined (44% during first half of '97 compared to '96). AIDS diagnoses are down (12%). ***But the number of people living with HIV is increasing.*** Demands on the healthcare system have changed, from a need for more intense end-stage care, to a need for services associated with a chronic condition. Additional costs of caring for more HIV + with expensive drugs, however, is often offset by dramatically lower costs than for those in the later stages of HIV-disease. Lower inpatient costs more than compensate for increased outpatient costs.

Issue Status: In April, 1997, Vice President Gore asked HCFA to evaluate the possibility of expanding access to Medicaid for poor HIV+ prior to their becoming disabled. HHS has concluded that, on a national basis, expansion would not be budget neutral. However, HCFA/HHS's cost-estimate for annual AIDS-related costs to

Medicaid (\$27,000) is **dramatically** higher than the average cost of care experienced in private HMOs or in the VA (the largest single direct provider of healthcare for HIV+), estimated at \$10,000 - \$12,000 per year.

Between the first quarter of FY '91 and the fourth quarter of FY '97, the percentage of the Medicaid budget spent on HIV drugs increased from 0.57% to 5.25%, an almost **tenfold** increase. Actual HIV drug expenditures grew from under \$20 million in the first quarter of FY '94 to almost \$120 million in the second quarter of FY '97. ***HIV drug costs are the single largest component of HIV treatment and care and that segment is growing rapidly.***

HCFA/HHS has suggested that individual states submit 1115 Medicaid waiver requests proposing expanded HIV+ care and treatment, as an alternative to a national solution. Several states are currently preparing such waiver request proposals. However, any successful attempt to develop a cost-neutral strategy must include a reduction in drug costs. In fact, Massachusetts health officials indicate that an additional discount of approximately 15%, on top of their existing 26% discount, would be necessary to achieve cost neutrality as defined by the parameters set forth by HCFA/HHS.

Unfortunately, no one in the federal government has been willing to even attempt to deal with drug pricing. Also, efforts to convince HCFA/HHS to expand the items considered in determining cost neutrality or to extend the timeframe for achieving such neutrality from 5 to 10 years (both strategies which the states believe would be successful), have met with little support from HCFA/HHS.

Action Items:

- (1) The President should direct the White House Access to Expanded HIV Care and Treatment Task Force (?) to thoroughly review all existing programs related to the provision of care and treatment services for HIV+, with the goal of creating an effective, comprehensive and cost-efficient web of care and services for people with HIV infection.
- (2) The President should direct the Secretary of HHS to do all in her power to encourage and facilitate the efforts of the states to develop creative initiatives to expand access to appropriate care for HIV+, including encouraging and expediting favorable review of state-requested 1115 waiver requests.
- (3) Discussions previously initiated between Vice President Gore and the drug companies must be expanded to specifically include the issue of drug pricing; and also to include the Departments of Justice and State to ensure that anti-trust and international concerns are adequately and appropriately addressed.
- (4) Expanded access to appropriate, early-intervention care and treatment of HIV+ individuals should be included as part of Vice President Gore's "reinventing government" efforts, specifically his "Hassle-free Zone" Initiative.

*World AIDS Day and the release of **Children on the Brink: Strategies to Support a Generation Isolated by HIV/AIDS** Report*

December 1, 1997

Washington, D.C.

I would like to thank Carol Bellamy, Dr. Piot and the others who worked with us to make this event today possible. As some of you know, for four years I have advocated development assistance as an essential element of crisis prevention. This is why I am so deeply troubled by the findings of the report that USAID is releasing today: *Children on the Brink*. It is my belief that the findings in this report must serve as a powerful wake up call alerting us all to a crisis of terrible magnitude.

According to our study -- which looked at 23 countries -- the total number of children who will lose one or both of their parents from all causes in these 23 countries is projected to increase from 34.7 million in 2000 to 41.6 million in 2010.

The human and social costs of these numbers are mind-boggling. In countries across Africa, Asia and Latin America, HIV/AIDS is rapidly reversing years of hard won progress in economic and social development. Life expectancy -- which has been steadily on the rise for the last three decades -- will drop to 40 years or less in nine sub-Saharan countries by the year 2010.

In countries like Botswana, Zambia, and Zimbabwe, which would have had life expectancies of 60-70 years without HIV/AIDS, we will see life expectancies plummet to around 30 years with HIV/AIDS. We live in a world so technologically sophisticated, so closely interconnected, and yet in parts of the world we are seeing life expectancies that will drop to medieval levels.

In all the countries included in this study, AIDS-related mortality will eliminate the gains made in child survival over the past 20 years. In Zambia and Zimbabwe, infant mortality rates will likely nearly double, and child mortality rates will triple.

In many of the sub-Saharan African countries included in this study, the HIV/AIDS epidemic is severe, with the percentage of the population infected with HIV reaching more than 30 percent in some urban areas.

However, the countries that are most seriously affected by HIV/AIDS are in Asia and they are home to over 20 percent of the world's population. By 2020 the largest number of children to lose parents to HIV/AIDS will likely be in South and Southeast Asia. The sheer size of the population at risk for HIV/AIDS in Asia means that the problem of parental deaths there will

eventually eclipse that of sub-Saharan Africa. The number of children likely to lose their parents due to HIV/AIDS will also continue to grow in Latin America and the Caribbean, where the epidemic also started later.

The growing number of children who will lose parents will have a profound impact on these societies. The economies of the developing nations in this study will all struggle to deal with the immense economic dislocation and costs of illness, death and lost opportunity.

With children who have lost parents eventually comprising up to a third of the population under age 15 in some countries, this outgrowth of the HIV/AIDS epidemic will create a lost generation -- a sea of youth who are disadvantaged, vulnerable, undereducated and lacking both hope and opportunity. What we are seeing here are the seeds of crisis. These are the numbers that should make us all take a long hard look at what kind of world we are going to be living in fifteen years down the road.

The creation of such a large and disaffected demographic "youth explosion" could propel some of these societies to significant unrest and destabilization over the long term. The threat to the prospects for economic growth and development in the most seriously affected countries is considerable. New approaches -- including policy innovations for women and children -- must be developed within the next few years to nurture and develop local efforts to assist families and communities affected by the crisis.

But even more important than the numbers contained in this study is the human story they tell.

Children's are left emotionally and physically vulnerable by the illness or death of one or both parents. *In countries with even only moderately severe HIV-infection rates, up to 25 percent of children born to healthy women may have at least one HIV-infected parent by their fifth birthday.*

Subsequently, children who have lost parents are more likely to be removed from school because their households need new sources of income and labor. Children are increasingly forced to assume adult roles in the home and the workplace. Strains on households and families may result in increases in child abuse and neglect. Girls may face pressure to marry at younger ages.

HIV/AIDS also causes the dissolution of families. Children may be fostered or adopted prior to the death of a parent. Orphans are cared for by grandparents, uncles, aunts, or siblings. Female orphans may be preferred for adoption over male orphans because they can provide domestic labor, sexual diversion, and, in many places, a bride price.

In short, forty million children losing one or both of their parents are 40 million children more likely to be forced into child labor; 40 million children who may never have an opportunity to attend school; and 40 million children more at risk of contracting HIV themselves.

It is impossible to overemphasize or exaggerate the scope and complexity of challenges faced by children affected by HIV/AIDS and by the families, communities, and governments responsible for them. The international community -- through a host of concerned partners -- are working to

prevent new HIV infections and deal with the immense problem of children who have lost parents to AIDS.

The first and most important responses to the problems caused by AIDS comes from the affected children, families and communities themselves. Arranging access to credit or ways to generate additional income can help families overcome the economic setback of illness and death. Reducing "property grabbing" by protecting women's and children's property and inheritance rights is vital.

Measures should also be taken to reduce the health risks to children in households affected by HIV/AIDS. These may include developing home-based health services, supporting child nutrition programs, making special efforts to include these children in immunization programs and other health outreach efforts and targeting especially vulnerable children.

Many of the communities hardest hit by HIV/AIDS have fashioned similar responses to HIV/AIDS and the needs of families and children. We need to find new ways to strengthen these community responses.

Developing country government leadership is also needed to encourage all elements of society to collaborate in developing realistic strategies to meet the needs of children and families affected by HIV/AIDS. All parties must work together toward the overarching goal of creating an enabling environment for those affected. Stigma and discrimination impede efforts to prevent the spread of HIV/AIDS and improve care and support of those with HIV/AIDS.

Lastly, we must continue to support AIDS prevention programs. Prevention is a question of awareness, education and resources. Without more effective prevention programs, the international community will never get the upper hand in the battle to protect children and families from the impact of HIV/AIDS.

USAID works with more than 500 private voluntary and nongovernmental organizations in 40 countries to implement HIV prevention programs. The agency has reached more than 15 million people with comprehensive HIV prevention education. Given the threat the epidemic poses to sustainable development, USAID has made reducing transmission of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases one of its strategic objectives. We must all work together to save the next generation of children, there is no other acceptable choice. Thank you.

We can ill afford to stand by and watch our next generation face either the direct or indirect consequences of STDs.

How Can Access to Care for People Living with HIV Be Expanded?

Objective: All Americans with HIV should have access to appropriate care and related services.

Problem: Primary HIV care coverage programs – Medicaid and Medicare (40 – 60% of care) -in most cases require that an HIV+ persons be *already disabled* before accessing programs, while new treatments offer hope of delaying or preventing disability.

Current Resource Commitment: For FY '98, the public sector devoted about \$7 billion to provision of HIV-related primary care and related services, covering everything from prescription drugs and doctors' visits to case management and housing. With early intervention as the recognized standard of care, Medicaid and Medicare less often cover initial care for uninsured HIV+, thus increasing the burden on relatively smaller programs like Ryan White, HOPWA and ADAP, where disability is not a pre-condition to access.

Changed Circumstances: Three factors have refocused attention on the existing HIV care financing and delivery system: (1) new standard of care for HIV treatment; (2) changing demographics of the epidemic; and (3) decline in mortality among people diagnosed with AIDS, with reduced rate of progression to AIDS among HIV+.

New Standard of Care: In 1997, HHS issued new treatment guidelines for HIV including treatment with combination drug therapy prior to development of symptoms and before substantial deterioration of the immune system. Once initiated, such treatments must be sustained for an indefinite period of time to assure best results and avoid development of drug-resistant HIV strains.

Changing Demographics: CDC estimates that 650,000 – 900,000 Americans have HIV infection. 500,000 know their status. 350,000 are in care. Half of all new HIV infections are related to injection-drug use. People with AIDS are increasingly likely to be uninsured, impoverished, abusing substances, female and members of racial or ethnic minorities - populations historically underserved by the healthcare system and which require culturally appropriate and sensitive care.

Declines in Mortality: AIDS-related deaths have declined (44% during first half of '97 compared to '96). AIDS diagnoses are down (12%). ***But the number of people living with HIV is increasing.*** Demands on the healthcare system have changed, from a need for more intense end-stage care, to a need for services associated with a chronic condition. Additional costs of caring for more HIV + with expensive drugs, however, is often offset by dramatically lower costs than for those in the later stages of HIV-disease. Lower inpatient costs more than compensate for increased outpatient costs.

Issue Status: In April, 1997, Vice President Gore asked HCFA to evaluate the possibility of expanding access to Medicaid for poor HIV+ prior to their becoming disabled. HHS has concluded that, on a national basis, expansion would not be budget neutral. However, HCFA/HHS's cost-estimate for annual AIDS-related costs to

Medicaid (\$27,000) is **dramatically** higher than the average cost of care experienced in private HMOs or in the VA (the largest single direct provider of healthcare for HIV+), estimated at \$10,000 - \$12,000 per year.

Between the first quarter of FY '91 and the fourth quarter of FY '97, the percentage of the Medicaid budget spent on HIV drugs increased from 0.57% to 5.25%, an almost **tenfold** increase. Actual HIV drug expenditures grew from under \$20 million in the first quarter of FY '94 to almost \$120 million in the second quarter of FY '97. ***HIV drug costs are the single largest component of HIV treatment and care and that segment is growing rapidly.***

HCFA/HHS has suggested that individual states submit 1115 Medicaid waiver requests proposing expanded HIV+ care and treatment, as an alternative to a national solution. Several states are currently preparing such waiver request proposals. However, any successful attempt to develop a cost-neutral strategy must include a reduction in drug costs. In fact, Massachusetts health officials indicate that an additional discount of approximately 15%, on top of their existing 26% discount, would be necessary to achieve cost neutrality as defined by the parameters set forth by HCFA/HHS.

Unfortunately, no one in the federal government has been willing to even attempt to deal with drug pricing. Also, efforts to convince HCFA/HHS to expand the items considered in determining cost neutrality or to extend the timeframe for achieving such neutrality from 5 to 10 years (both strategies which the states believe would be successful), have met with little support from HCFA/HHS.

Action Items:

- (1) The President should direct the White House Access to Expanded HIV Care and Treatment Task Force (?) to thoroughly review all existing programs related to the provision of care and treatment services for HIV+, with the goal of creating an effective, comprehensive and cost-efficient web of care and services for people with HIV infection.
- (2) The President should direct the Secretary of HHS to do all in her power to encourage and facilitate the efforts of the states to develop creative initiatives to expand access to appropriate care for HIV+, including encouraging and expediting favorable review of state-requested 1115 waiver requests.
- (3) Discussions previously initiated between Vice President Gore and the drug companies must be expanded to specifically include the issue of drug pricing; and also to include the Departments of Justice and State to ensure that anti-trust and international concerns are adequately and appropriately addressed.
- (4) Expanded access to appropriate, early-intervention care and treatment of HIV+ individuals should be included as part of Vice President Gore's "reinventing government" efforts, specifically his "Hassle-free Zone" Initiative.

Half of all new Infections now in 15-24 year olds -

Development gains being wiped out

fewer deaths in North America, Western Europe, but no progress in prevention;

HIV infection rates unchanged for a decade

According to a report issued today by the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) and the World Health Organization (WHO), the AIDS epidemic update - December 1998, during the past year a further 5.8 million people were infected with HIV - approximately 11 men, women and children every minute - and the total number of people living with the virus rose by one-tenth, to 33.4 million worldwide. Half of all new infections are now occurring among young people aged 15 to 24. This year's World AIDS Campaign "Young People: Force for Change" was prompted in part by the epidemic's threat to those under 25 years old, for as HIV rates rise in the general population, new infections are increasingly concentrated in the younger age groups.

The global epicentre of AIDS continues to be sub-Saharan Africa. Since the epidemic began, 34 million Africans have been infected, and almost 12 million of them have already died. In 1998 the region experienced four million new infections and rising AIDS death tolls, seen in an estimated 5,500 funerals per day. In the southernmost countries of the continent, where HIV spread took on epidemic proportions only recently, infection rates continued to rise dramatically during the past year. Four countries now estimate that 20% to 26% of adults are living with HIV, and South Africa alone accounts for one out of every seven new infections on the continent. In contrast, a number of countries in West Africa remain relatively less affected, in part as a result of early and sustained

prevention efforts.

In the regions of North America and Western Europe, the availability of new more potent anti-HIV drug combinations has helped people with HIV live longer, healthier lives. In the United States, for example, the number of people dying from AIDS dropped by two-thirds between 1995 and 1997, when these antiretroviral combinations came into wide use. Alongside this undoubted therapeutic success, there is a disturbing lack of progress in prevention. Every year for the past decade, the numbers of new HIV infections have remained stagnant in North America and Western Europe, with close to 75 000 people acquiring the virus in 1998 alone.

"Two decades into the AIDS epidemic, we know better than ever before about prevention --- how to persuade people to protect themselves, make sure they have the necessary skills and back-up services, and remove social and economic barriers to effective prevention," said Dr Peter Piot, Executive Director of UNAIDS. "Yet almost six million people became infected this year. Every one of these new HIV infections represents a prevention failure -- our collective failure."

In many Asian and Eastern European countries, where the epidemic started later than in other regions, HIV is rapidly gaining new footholds. In India, for example, recent research shows that HIV is now firmly embedded in the general population and is spreading into rural areas that were previously thought to be relatively spared. In the state of Tamil Nadu (population: 25 million), a new survey reveals that almost half a million people are already infected with HIV and that the infection rate is three times higher in villages than in the cities.

In Latin America, while infections are concentrated in men who have sex with men and drug injectors, transmission through sex between men and women is on the rise.

Development gains being wiped out

In the worst-affected countries the AIDS epidemic is now making significant inroads into precious development gains that have been built up over the past decades.

In nine countries where at least 10% of the adult population is HIV-positive, it has been estimated that AIDS will soon be costing an average of 17 years of life expectancy, compared with what these countries could look forward to in the absence of the epidemic. These dismal declines are not only due to adult deaths. Over half a million children -- most of whom acquired the infection before or at birth, or through breastfeeding - died in 1998 alone. By 2005-2010, the infant mortality rate in, for example, Namibia, is expected to reach 72 per 1000 live births as opposed to 45 per 1000 without AIDS.

The onslaught of AIDS is also denting the prospects for economic development in hard-hit countries. In Zimbabwe, some companies have reported that AIDS costs are now absorbing as much as one-fifth of company earnings and, for instance, in Tanzania and Zambia, other firms estimate that AIDS illness and death cost them more than their total profits for the year.

Says David Heymann, Executive Director, Communicable Diseases Cluster, WHO, "AIDS is a deadly serious public health threat. But as the epidemic continues to spin out of control, countries face more than just a health crisis. They face a growing threat to human development and to economic and social stability."

Forces that fuel the epidemic

Some of the reasons behind HIV's spread remain undetermined. It is not

fully understood why, for instance, HIV infection rates take off in some countries while remaining stable in neighbouring countries over many years. What is known is that a number of factors clearly influence the shape and scope of the epidemic in different parts of the world.

Wars and armed conflicts generate fertile conditions for the spread of HIV. The UNAIDS/WHO report notes that in Rwanda, before the political turmoil of the mid-1990s, infection rates were approximately 10% in cities and towns and around 1% in the countryside, where most people lived. Yet by 1997, both urban and rural rates were just over 11%. A revealing fact is that HIV infection rates rose sixfold among the mostly rural people who had fled to refugee camps.

In many places people have no access to voluntary HIV testing and counselling. Yet even when these services are offered, many do not want to know or acknowledge their HIV status because of the blame and shame attached to AIDS. For example, in Cote d'Ivoire, where more than 13 000 pregnant women were offered interventions to increase their chances of having a healthy baby, fewer than half accepted testing and returned for the results.

In Zimbabwe's city of Mutare, surveillance data indicate that close to 40% of pregnant women are HIV-infected and probably 30 000 adults are living with HIV. Yet the sole HIV support group in the city has just 70 members, leaving thousands of others to struggle alone with the implications of their infection, including the dilemma of how to explain the sudden need for condom use with a spouse or other stable partner.

Secrecy can persist even in the face of sickness and death, which in immunodeficient people is often caused by tuberculosis or other common illnesses. In one study of home-based care schemes in southern Africa, fewer than 1 in 10 people who were caring for HIV-infected relatives at home acknowledged that they were suffering from AIDS, and the patients themselves were barely more open.

"One might think that in a country with a quarter or third of the population infected, people would become more open about the epidemic. Experience teaches us that this doesn't happen automatically," said Dr Piot. "The silence needs to be broken, publicly and courageously, by leaders who encourage their people to face the truth about AIDS."

"We sometimes speak of the comforts of home as the 'small blessings'; but, when you look in the eyes of these grateful children and their adoptive families, we remember that there are few greater blessings. I would like to encourage more families to follow the example of those who join us here today --to open their arms, and their hearts, to children who need loving homes."

President Bill Clinton
November 24, 1998

Today, President Clinton and First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will host a ceremony at the White House in honor of National Adoption Month and 24 new adoptive families in the District of Columbia. The President will issue a new directive to the Department of Health and Human Services to expand the use of the Internet as a tool to find homes for children waiting to be adopted from foster care.

USING THE INTERNET TO MEET THE PRESIDENT'S GOALS FOR ADOPTION. In 1996, President Clinton set a goal of doubling, by the year 2002, adoptions and other permanent placements from the public child welfare system. Since then, adoptions have increased; from 1996 to 1997 alone, adoptions increased by over 10 percent, from 28,000 to 31,000. Today, the President is directing the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to develop a plan to expand the use of the Internet to share information about children who are legally free for adoption in order to shorten the time needed to find them adoptive families. HHS estimates that approximately 100,000 children in our nation's foster care system cannot return to their birth families and need families to adopt them. An effective national registry will help to break down geographic barriers to adoption and assist in meeting the President's adoption goal. HHS Secretary Donna Shalala will report to the President within 60 days on a plan to work with the states and other leaders to carry out this effort.

A SOLID RECORD OF ACHIEVEMENT. Today's announcement builds on a deep commitment by the President, the First Lady, and the Administration to facilitate adoptions and improve the child welfare system:

- **Achieving Landmark Legislative Reform.** In 1997, the President signed the Adoption and Safe Families Act, reforming our nation's child welfare system and making it clear that the health and safety of children must be the paramount concern of state child welfare services;
- **Making Adoption Affordable for Families.** In 1996, President Clinton signed into law the Small Business Job Protection Act of 1996, which provides a \$5,000 tax credit to families adopting children, and a \$6,000 tax credit for families adopting children with special needs;
- **Giving States Flexibility and Support.** To test innovative strategies to improve state child welfare systems, the Clinton Administration has granted waivers to 18 states, giving them more flexibility in tailoring services to meet the needs of children and families. In 1993, the Clinton Administration enacted and secured federal funding for the Family Preservation and Support Program to help states, local governments, and service providers develop effective programs to serve children and families at risk and to prevent children from entering foster care in the first place;

- **Breaking Down Racial and Ethnic Barriers to Adoption.** *New inter-ethnic adoption provisions, passed as a part of the Small Business Job Protection Act of 1996, ensure that the adoption process is free from discrimination and delays on the basis of race, culture and ethnicity by strengthening the Multi-Ethnic Placement Act which the President signed in 1994;*
- **Providing Support for Child Protection and Adoption.** *In 1993, President Clinton signed into law the Family and Medical Leave Act, enabling parents to take time off to adopt a child without losing their jobs or health insurance.*

Thanks again for meeting with me on Friday and for agreeing to set up a meeting with HHS on Tuesday, December 8 (from 9AM-Noon) when at least Steve Lew, Ron Rowell and I will all be in Washington DC (for the CDC HIV prevention consultants meeting on Monday, December 7). We also were going to invite John Chin from the Asian and Pacific Islander Coalition on HIV and AIDS in New York and Paul Bouey and Charles Blackwell from NNAAPC (or others that Ron thought appropriate - maybe Curtis Harris from American Indian Community House in New York?) to attend the meeting. We discussed framing the meeting as a small, working meeting with key representatives from the Asian and Pacific Islander and Native American communities with HHS to discuss surveillance and prevention issues for smaller populations like ours with unique needs. You were going to invite folks from CDC DHAP, the NIH and the HHS Executive Staff to discuss how HHS could address these needs and our communities as part of the many HHS initiatives focusing on racial disparities in health status (e.g. President's Race and Health Disparities Initiative, CDC People of Color Initiatives, Healthy People 2010, etc.). We thought that the surveillance and associated research issues were

fundamental to any of these discussions. We also thought that we needed to focus on prevention, especially on the geographic, linguistic, cultural and legal barriers to a clear and coordinated prevention strategy for our communities. We are eager to work with HHS to develop a series of incremental and realistic research and programmatic strategies to address some of these needs.

"Detection of Mycobacterium Tuberculosis in Nasopharyngeal Aspirate Samples in Children (Research Letter)"

Luis Miguel Franchi and others from the Institut de Salud del Nino in Lima, Peru, compared the use of gastric aspiration and nasopharyngeal aspiration in children suspected to be infected with Mycobacterium tuberculosis to obtain bacterial confirmation of infection. Often, children cannot produce an adequate sputum sample for confirmation. The researchers report that the yields of the two procedures were comparable for culture, PCR, and staining. Nasopharyngeal aspiration was found to be adequate for obtaining bronchial secretions in children. In comparison to gastric aspiration, the procedure is fairly non-invasive, can be done at any time during the day, does not require fasting, and is inexpensive. Furthermore, the needed materials are already available in all hospitals in developing countries.

"Peptide Inhibitors of HIV-1 Protease and Viral Infection of Peripheral Blood Lymphocytes Based on HIV-1 Vif"
Proceedings of the National Academy of Science Online (11/10/98)
Vol. 95, No. 23, P. 13865; Potash, Mary Jane; Bentsman, Galina; Muir, Tom; et al.

Researchers from Columbia University and Rockefeller University in New York conducted experiments to determine whether the HIV-1 virion infectivity factor (Vif) could serve as the basis for the design of new protease inhibitors and treatment for HIV-1 infection. The researchers synthesized peptide derivatives from the Vif region. They found that full-length recombinant Vif and a peptide composed of residues 21-65 of Vif inhibited protease activity in the cleavage of virion-like particles composed of HIV-1 Gag precursor polyprotein. In comparison, neither the control peptide nor BSA inhibited protease activity. A smaller region of Vif, residues 41-65, and Vif 21-65 inhibited viral expression during infection of peripheral blood lymphocytes. Upon analysis of Gag cleavage site inhibition, the scientists observed that Vif 21-65 inhibited the cleavage of polyprotein p55 to mature p24. The authors concluded that "Vif-derived peptides inhibit protease during HIV-1 infection and may be useful for the development of new protease inhibitors."

"World AIDS Report Says Epidemic Is Growing"

An annual report released Monday by the Joint United Nations Program on HIV/AIDS indicates that the number of HIV-infected people increased 10 percent last year, with over 33 million people worldwide now carrying the virus. According to the World AIDS Day Report, half of the new infections were in people aged 15 years to 24 years, and there were 11 new infections a minute. Sub-Saharan Africa accounts for two-thirds of the infected population, with about 12 million deaths due to AIDS. In Botswana, Namibia, Swaziland, and Zimbabwe--which have the

highest rates of infection--between 20 percent and 26 percent of people 15- to 49-years-old are infected with HIV. A total of 3 million people in South Africa carry HIV. In the United States, 75,000 people contracted HIV in 1998, approximately the same number of people infected during the prior year. The study also reported that there were 200,000 new HIV infections in Latin America and the Caribbean last year, with another 80,000 reported in Eastern Europe and Central Asia. In response to the increasing number of infections, the International AIDS Vaccine Initiative plans to announce this week \$9 million in funding for research on two prototype vaccines designed to attack the virus in Africa.

"Helping AIDS Patients Have Safer Sex"

Infection with HIV can cause patients to experience sexual dysfunction, with associated depression often limiting a patient's sexual drive. In men, decreased testosterone levels can cause fatigue and an inability to function sexually. Many male patients receive testosterone treatment to alleviate these problems, and the hormone replacement therapy is also being studied in women. Dr. Judith G. Rabkin, of Columbia University's College of Physicians and Surgeons, found that testosterone therapy helped men gain muscle mass, relieved depression, and increased sexual desire; she also found a corresponding increase in the likelihood that a patient with restored sexual function would use condoms. However, many HIV-infected people find it difficult to frankly discuss sex with their partners or to use condoms. A study published earlier this year found that 40 percent of HIV-infected people surveyed did not tell their recent partners of their infection and more than 50 percent did not regularly use condoms. This leaves many physicians in an ethical dilemma regarding treatment for HIV-infected patients. Doctors who suspect a patient of being reckless sexually may withhold medication that boosts sexual functioning until that individual can demonstrate increased responsibility.

"UN Aide Asks Debt Respite to Fight AIDS"

Boston Globe Online (11/24/98) P. A4; Knox, Richard A.

Dr. Peter Piot, director of the Joint United Nations Program on HIV/AIDS, asked international lending organizations on Monday to forgive debts by developing nations heavily affected by HIV if those countries consent to spend the funds on HIV-fighting programs. Piot called for more support from the international community, arguing that "if the Western world doesn't invest today, we'll have to invest far more later in less productive things like food aid." A new report by UNAIDS found that the worldwide HIV infection rate increased by 10 percent last year. A separate report by Piot and Daniel Tarantola, a senior advisor to the director-general of the World Health Organization, indicates that only \$350 million is being spent of AIDS prevention globally. Piot asserts that at least three times this amount is needed to effectively combat the disease. In Africa, many of the hardest hit countries will experience a major

decrease in average lifespan because of HIV, reducing the number of skilled workers and adversely affecting the economy. There are also concerns about intravenous drug use and the spread of HIV, particularly in some eastern European nations.

"Upsurge in Hepatitis C Taxes Medical Facilities"

An increase in the number of people with hepatitis C and the number of people desiring to get tested for the virus that causes the infection has resulted in a strain on public health agencies and private liver specialists in Texas and across the United States. Media exposure and information concerning the virus has dramatically elevated public awareness of the hepatitis C virus (HCV), prompting a wave of people seeking testing and treatment; but some public health agencies do not have the resources or staff to meet this demand. Currently, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention receives \$9.5 million for HCV-related services. However, CDC officials told Congress that in order to implement recommended guidelines, \$48 million is needed. A complete round of tests for the virus can run \$400 to \$500, while therapy with a combination of interferon and ribavirin can cost up to \$10,000 for a single course of treatment.

"Across the USA: Texas"

In an effort to determine the hepatitis C rates in Texas prisons, some 3,000 inmates will be tested for the disease. Officials expect infection rates to be higher in units composed of prisoners with a history of drug use.

"Drugs and Drug Policy: The Case for a Slow Fix"

Issues in Science and Technology (Fall 1998) Vol. 15, No. 1, P. 45; Kleiman, Mark A. R.

Current drug policies are causing more harm than good, partly because of the formidable complexity of the problem authorities are attempting to manage, according to Mark A.R. Kleiman, editor of the "Drug Policy Analysis Bulletin" and a professor at the University of California at Los Angeles. Drugs and drug users cannot be defined by simple categorization. Although the serious policy questions cannot be grouped in the easily understood polarity that fits two-party politics, the drug policy debate continues to be polarized between the advocates of stringent control and those who favor more liberal controls. The result of the two-part debate is that some ideas that do not fit within either extremes are not debated. Perhaps, the only solution to closing the gap is developing another way of viewing drug policy. In the current scenario, policy reflects the stance of the drug warriors and includes stricter controls, increased enforcement, harsher punishments and mass media campaigns to stigmatize the use of illegal drugs. Treatment is secondary. Roughly three-quarters of the overall \$40 billion spent by governments on the anti-drug campaign is used for enforcement. On the other hand, critics of the stringent policies focus on efforts to make drug use less harmful to consumers, such as needle-exchange

programs to cut HIV transmission. Some of the advocates who fall into the "harm reduction" camp believe eliminating penalties for drug use would lower the crime and violence associated with drug use. But these efforts to reduce the harm associated with drug use may in fact encourage more users or the intensity of drug use. The element missing from current drug policies is measuring effectiveness in terms of benefits produced and harm avoided. This third approach to combating the drug problem would apply to alcohol and tobacco, which cause more damage than illegal drugs, and would shift the focus to high-dose users whose dependency leads them to crime.

"Few Fear Large Jump in STD Rates"

Advocate (11/24/98) No. 773, P. 20

While some rates of sexually transmitted diseases among homosexual men and women have risen over 70 percent in recent years, a recent survey of more than 2,300 gay men and lesbians in New York City, Los Angeles, Denver, and San Francisco found that many respondents do not appear to worry about infection. According to the results, 42 percent of lesbians and 24 percent of gay men do not discuss STDs with their doctors. Additionally, only one-third are regularly screened and less than half receive hepatitis vaccinations. The survey, conducted by the National Lesbian and Gay Health Association and the manufacturers of K-Y lubricant, also revealed that about 37 percent of gay men and 14 percent of lesbians reported having had an STD other than HIV.

\$10 million, administered by USAID, will be used to (1) identify and
enhance model programs to support communities in caring for children
and families affected by AIDS, (2) *initiate these model programs*
in areas of most acute need and where they do not

currently exist; and (3) develop an action plan for expanding and sustaining effective community-based programs proportionate to the magnitude of the problem.

An additional \$10 million may be provided by the National Institutes of Health to enhance these activities and document their effectiveness.

In addition, the President will direct Sandra Thurman, Director of the Office of National AIDS Policy, to lead a delegation in January that will report to him on the extent of the problem and provide recommendations for additional action. This delegation will include representatives from Congress, foundations, and the media.

The increasing number of AIDS orphans has reached crisis proportions in many of the world's poorest countries. The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) estimates that there will be 40 million orphans by the year 2010. To date, over 8.2 million children had been orphaned by AIDS; 90% of these children are from sub-saharan Africa.

The President is scheduled to meet with the Advisory Council on HIV/AIDS on December 18th. The Council is going to make a strong request to the President for increased leadership on and funding for the international AIDS epidemic. This initiative provides a timely opportunity to provide such leadership.

World AIDS Day is sponsored by the World Health Organization. The 1998 World AIDS Day theme, "Force for Change: World AIDS Campaign with Young People" challenges governments and non-governmental organizations around the world to children and youth who are most severely impact by this epidemic.

Conference on HIV/AIDS was held. In 1996 the President met with NIH, CDC, and HHS representatives for a scientific research briefing in the Oval Office. In 1997, the President signed the World AIDS Day Proclamation and an Executive Order that urged Federal agencies serving youth to improve access the HIV prevention and care services.

\$10 million, administered by USAID, will be used to (1) identify and
enhance model programs to support communities in caring for children
and families affected by AIDS, (2) *initiate these model programs
in areas of most acute need and where they do not*

currently exist; and (3) develop an action plan for expanding and sustaining effective community-based programs proportionate to the magnitude of the problem.

An additional \$10 million may be provided by the National Institutes of Health to enhance these activities and document their effectiveness.

In addition, the President will direct Sandra Thurman, Director of the Office of National AIDS Policy, to lead a delegation in January that will report to him on the extent of the problem and provide recommendations for additional action. This delegation will include representatives from Congress, foundations, and the media.

The increasing number of AIDS orphans has reached crisis proportions in many of the world's poorest countries. The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) estimates that there will be 40 million orphans by the year 2010. To date, over 8.2 million children had been orphaned by AIDS; 90% of these children are from sub-saharan Africa.

The President is scheduled to meet with the Advisory Council on HIV/AIDS on December 18th. The Council is going to make a strong request to the President for increased leadership on and funding for the international AIDS epidemic. This initiative provides a timely opportunity to provide such leadership.

World AIDS Day is sponsored by the World Health Organization. The 1998 World AIDS Day theme, "Force for Change: World AIDS Campaign with Young People" challenges governments and non-governmental organizations around the world to children and youth who are most severely impact by this epidemic.

In 1997, the President signed the World AIDS Day Proclamation and an Executive Order that urged Federal agencies serving youth to improve access the HIV prevention and care services.

Hi Todd - I looked at the draft proclamation, and I think it should include more on the impact of HIV on youth in the U.S. Here are some possible bullet points:

HIV is having an increasing impact on adolescents and young adults in the United States. Over 26,000 Americans ages 13 to 24 have been diagnosed with AIDS, and thousands more are infected with HIV. It has been estimated that about half of new HIV infections in the U.S. occur in people under age 25, and one quarter occur in people under age 22. It is further estimated that at least one American teenager is infected with HIV every hour of every day.

Compared to adults, young people with AIDS are almost twice as likely to be female and are far more likely to have been infected though heterosexual sex. African Americans and Hispanics are disproportionately represented among all adolescent AIDS cases, accounting for 57% of male cases and 83% of female cases. Gay youth and homeless/runaway youth are also particularly hard hit by HIV.

HIV prevention and care programs have helped to stem the tide of new HIV infections among young people, and to provide care to those who are already infected. However, much more remains to be done to address the HIV epidemic among young people.

them transitional entry back into the community where they live in a
half-way
house for a period of 3-12 months. During this period they are ineligible
for
any Federal subsidies such as Medicaid, Medicare or ADAP because they are
technically still under the auspices of the Federal Correctional System.
Essentially, these individuals are responsible for the entire cost of their
medical treatment and associated pharmaceuticals. Because the waiver they
have signed financially relinquishes the Bureau of Prisons from these
costs (a
waiver which the Bureau of Prisons admits is done as a cost saving
measure),
hundreds , if not thousands of individuals find themselves in these
half-way
houses with no means to adequately cover their health care costs.

This not only raise questions concerning Informed Consent in an era when we
are striving towards a Patients Bill of Rights, but also raise grave
implications for these ex-offenders but for the public-at-large. The
potential for treatment failure with the development of drug-resistant
strains
of HIV are real and pose potentially disastrous consequences to the patient
and to the health of the public which might conceivable be exposed to these
dangerous strains.

We need your help, Mr. President, to resolve the stalemate on this issue;
an
issue which has been discussed among those at ONAP, HHS and the BOP but
which
seems to be stalled. This strikes us as an issue which could be corrected
in a
relatively short period of time.

DAY

WHITE HOUSE EVENT

DECEMBER 1ST, 1998

Thank you, Mr. President.

This is the 11th time we have come together to observe World AIDS

Day. Each ye

ar this day serves as a solemn reminder of the

continued growth of this global

pandemic: 6 million new

infections this year; over 2.5 million dead in 1998 alo

ne from

AIDS, 600,000 infants and children infected. These latest

statistics ar

is so staggering that one can become numb to their significance.

It is a testament to the commitment of the citizens of this country that the United States has led the international response to this global pandemic. Since 1986, the U.S. Government, through USAID, has expended nearly \$1 billion dollars for the prevention and mitigation of this epidemic in the developing world. USAID's HIV/AIDS budget of \$125 million for this year exceeds all other bilateral donors. We also provide 25 percent of annual budget of United Nations Joint Program on HIV/AIDS, UNAIDS.

Yet with more than 16,000 new infections each day, we face an incredible challenge. USAID is working in over 40 of the hardest hit countries in all regions of the world. Nearly 70 percent of our HIV/AIDS program assistance goes to small nongovernmental organizations which have direct connections to the poorest of the poor and those most vulnerable to infection.

In the past 5 years, USAID has provided behavior change services for over 22 million people and has provided training to 180,000 new HIV/AIDS counselors and educators. We have improved the medical treatment of other sexually transmitted diseases, such as syphilis, as a way to decrease the efficiency of the virus transmitted from one person to another. We have provided over one billion condoms and other critical technologies so that people can protect themselves and their partners.

We are just now beginning to see the fruits of these efforts. In Senegal, Philippines and Indonesia, early, comprehensive HIV intervention programs supported by USAID and other donors have helped curtail and prevent major epidemics. Even more dramatic, in another set of countries—Uganda, Dominican Republic, Thailand—intensive HIV/AIDS programs were launched after major epidemics had begun.

The numbers of new infections are now actually coming down in these countries

These are amazing achievements every bit as significant for the world as the breathtaking progress in HIV treatment in the United States.

However, globally, the epidemic continues to rage. The President has talked about a new tragedy within this global scourge, that we are just now beginning to recognize. This is the impact that this virus is having on children. There are two devastating aspects to this, the ever increasing number of HIV infections in infants and the impact on children who lose one or both parents to AIDS.

The Crisis of Children Infected by HIV:
Within the past two years, it is now estimated that over 10% of new HIV infections around the world occur in the under 15 age group, mainly due to infected mothers passing the virus on to their newborn children. This form of transmission is now the second most common way for persons to become infected, second only to sexual transmission. These two causes of infection now far exceed those that are caused by injecting drug use, unsafe blood supplies, etc. Almost all of these infected children will die by their fifth birthday. The HIV/AIDS pandemic in subSaharan Africa is presently more significant, in terms of impact on child survival and maternal mortality, than all other emergencies combined.

Children Affected and Orphaned by HIV:
Last year, USAID released a report, *Children on the Brink*, which described the looming crisis of AIDS orphans. In 1990, less than 20% of orphans in Africa were due to AIDS deaths. By the year 2010, 70% of orphans will be due to AIDS. In 9 subSaharan countries, (Zambia, Malawi, Rwanda, Zimbabwe, Uganda, Botswana, Tanzania, Burkina Faso, CAR) one-fifth to one-third of all children under the

age of 15 will be orphaned by the year 2000. Losing one or both parents to the lingering deterioration of AIDS exerts a horrible price on these children. Their nutrition suffers and this eventually leads to serious stunting of growth. Orphans school attendance seriously declines. In the final days of their parents lives, these children become the care givers. These orphaned children could come to represent a lost generation, extremely vulnerable to the crises that surround them. USAID's primary mission is to protect men and women from becoming infected by HIV in the first place, so they will not pass it on to their newborns and, as parents, will be able to care for their children. This critical mission must continue.

However, the sheer number of infants becoming infected and the number of deaths of parents leaving orphans behind, call for an unprecedented, urgent response.

USAID has already started two programs to address the needs of orphans in Malawi and Zambia. Although, the scale of these programs is limited. We also wish to commend and thank Congressman Callahan and Congresswoman Pelosi for identifying an additional \$10 million to help address this escalating tragedy. This funding will be used in three areas of urgent need: supporting community based efforts for orphans, reducing mother to infant transmission of HIV, and improving the medical care of children who are already infected with HIV. Clearly, \$10 million is not enough to manage the massive scale of this tragedy....but it is a start.

In closing We live in an increasingly integrated world, as has recently been shown by the world economic crisis. For America to prosper we need new markets and stable democracies, both of which could be threatened by an unbridled HIV pandemic.

America is a caring nation, as shown by the outpouring of concern

and tangible
help to victims of Hurricane Mitch. However, there
is a grave danger that Americans will not recognize the enormity
of the worldwide suffering, or fully understand the terrible
social and economic impact, which the AIDS pandemic will have on
the developing world.

It is vital that everyone realize that for most people in poor
countries, almost all that has changed with regard to HIV is the
speed and extent of the disease's spread and the extent of its
devastation.

It is therefore imperative that we constantly remind ourselves
that if we fail to solve the problem of HIV/AIDS around the
world, we will ultimately fail to solve the problem here at home.

Scope and Impact

**** The sheer number of people affected by the epidemic is overwhelming. Since the start of the epidemic, an estimated 34 million people living in sub-Saharan Africa have been infected with HIV. Some 11.5 million of those people have already died, a quarter of them children. In the course of 1998, AIDS will have been responsible for an estimated two million funerals in Africa (UNAIDS)

**** It is important to translate into human terms what such numbers mean. AIDS is devastating families. It kills breadwinners in their most productive years. Children lose their parents during the years that they need them most.

**** The problems start long before a parent dies. The limited resources families have are used for medical expenses. Sick parents can no longer work. Children drop out of school. Families can't buy or produce enough food, houses fall into disrepair. Children become the care providers for sick parents and younger siblings.

**** While Africa has borne the brunt of the impacts of HIV/AIDS, this is not an African problem. The number of orphans is growing in Latin America and the Caribbean, where the pandemic started later. The sheer size of the population at risk for HIV/AIDS in Asia means that the problem of orphans in that region are expected eventually to eclipse those of Sub-Saharan Africa.

"According to UNAIDS and WHO estimates, 7 out of 10 people newly infected with HIV in 1998 live in sub-saharan Africa; among children under 15, the proportion is 9 out of 10. At least 95% of all children orphaned by AIDS have been African, yet only one-tenth of the world's population lives in Africa south of the Sahara"

In Botswana, Namibia, Swaziland and Zimbabwe, current estimates show that over one person in five between the ages of 15 and 49 is living with HIV or AIDS (UNAIDS)

In Zimbabwe, a fifth of the nation's population live on commercial farms. Many are migrants and the majority no longer have regular contact with their extended families back home. This leaves children with no one to take them in if their parents should die - an increasingly frequent occurrence. Whereas in 1996 there were an estimated 2.1 orphans per farm. We now see around 10 orphans per farm. the average age of these children is 10. On the upside, many farm owners are supporting initiatives to care for these orphans on their farms. Most of these initiatives center on finding families to foster abandoned children and orphans. In two years' time, because of AIDS the country will be burying some 350

people a day, and by the year 2005 the government estimates there will be over 900,000 children under 15 struggling to survive without a mother. (UNAIDS)

The impacts of HIV/AIDS on children are both large scale and long term. The number of orphans in the countries already most affected by AIDS are not expected to peak until after the year 2030.

The scale of the social and economic impacts of the HIV/AIDS pandemic are large and getting larger. Problems will grow and be with us for a long time.

The impact of AIDS has not just increased the numbers of orphans, but it includes the social, economic, demographic, and other impacts on children, families, and communities. Ignoring these issues could undermine the effectiveness of development activities throughout much of sub-Saharan Africa.

As things stand, in the countries most affected by HIV/AIDS by the year 2010 the mortality rate for children under five years of age are projected to double or triple and the proportion of orphans will increase by three or four times.

Orphaned children often have to take on adult responsibilities. In most cases they are cared for by relatives, but the growing number of orphans is stretching the coping capacities of these families. Some are neglected or abused. Some orphans are entirely on their own struggling to survive in rural areas or on city streets.

There are profound, wide-reaching effects that are gradually taking place at the family and community levels. In the countries most affected by the pandemic, there are concerns that as such problems accumulate at family and community levels we may see increasing social disruption as the numbers of children and young people face increasing loss and deprivation.

Much of the burden of coping with the effects of AIDS is borne by women. Mothers not only care for children and do household and agricultural work, they have to find ways to generate income to cover families' most basic expenses.

AIDS will affect not only the economies of the developing nations. There is already an impact on affected national economies, with far reaching concern/ramifications for the global economy.

Current/past activities

In 1991, in response to an urgent request from the First Lady of Uganda, the U.S. government sent a team of experts to assess the orphan situation in Uganda, and to recommend an appropriate course of action to help the children.

The team submitted a report which ultimately served as the basis of the Uganda National AIDS Orphans Strategy

Based upon American principles of self-reliance and community volunteerism, this strategy recommended a series of interventions to strengthen the capacity of families and communities to care for their most vulnerable children, and especially their orphans.

Within this plan, local as well as international funding was provided for a wide variety of small and larger scale programs to address two key strategic objectives:

One - to keep children in school; and

Two- to improve economic conditions of the communities which were most severely impacted by the AIDS epidemic.

In addition to Uganda, USAID supports two major AIDS orphans programs in heavily affected countries in Africa.

One of these programs, being implemented in Malawi, by Save the Children/U.S. serves as a model for programs that stimulate community concern and protection of orphans.

Recognizing that families and communities are the front line of response, this program has mobilized people and villages and assists them to organize and work together to protect the most vulnerable children. The village committees have raised money to assist orphans and other vulnerable community members, helped orphans to return to school, started gardens to provide them food, organized structured activities to help isolated orphans reconnect with their communities, organized youth anti-clubs, and trained are providers in home-based care for people living with AIDS.

This program is continually expanding with more than 100 village committees established.

The Malawi program, as well as the other programs in Uganda and in Zambia, recognize that the first line of defense for these children lies within a family-like structure and their communities. It is the role of donors and international organizations to strengthen these capacities. In this context, USAID is exploring the potential benefits that microenterprise activities can offer in severely affected communities.

Principles of Action

**** Promote increased understanding and commitment to meet the needs of vulnerable children. Activities should be directed to all children in need, reducing the potential for stigma and discrimination resulting from efforts that focus only on children whose parents died of AIDS or are living with HIV/AIDS.

**** Support policy interventions that address the rights of women and children, ensure their access to education and the ability to support themselves, and protect their earnings and investments through equitable property ownership and inheritance laws.

**** Most of these children are not outwardly "sick". Therefore, we tend to overlook them, and the impact on these children is underestimated. However the trauma experienced by these children is enormous. Many are living with these problems for as long as they can remember. Many are caring for their ill parents. Many are caring for their siblings. Though the impact may not be apparent now, in the years to come, the impact will be felt both at the individual and the societal level as they become adults. The environment in which they are growing will affect their ability to function in relationships, within their families and in the community in which they live.

**** Because of pervasive stigma and discrimination, it is often difficult to identify the children most in need - to reach them with the counseling and support that can help. Often the parents do not feel they can or should share the information about their serostatus to their children. It often becomes an undisclosed family secret. In either case, whether the parents choose to talk about the disease with their children or whether they choose to "protect" their children from the stigma and knowledge of having parents who have HIV/AIDS, the children experience the stress and anxiety that pervades the family. The children live in an environment affected by the disease, whether because they know their parent have HIV/AIDS or because they experience a family life affected by chronic illness. We need to find a way to decrease the stigma and increase acceptance and understanding. And we need to find ways of reaching the children who are not now being reached.

In all of these activities, foster an environment of respect and understanding for people infected and affected by the disease, while incorporating efforts to prevent continued transmission for the protection of those who are not yet infected and for the children of tomorrow.

The families and communities most seriously affected by HIV/AIDS are the front line of response to the impacts of the pandemic. Action by governments, service providers, and others who respond to the impacts of HIV/AIDS will be effective to the extent that they strengthen the capacities of people on the front line to

cope.

The enormity of the problem and the scarcity of resources make it imperative to identify effective models of intervention by thorough evaluations and to disseminate the results so that those activities which are most effective can be reproduced in other areas.

To date, projects responding to the needs of orphans and other children made vulnerable by HIV/AIDS have been very limited. Cost-effective, sustainable interventions must be scaled up to match the scale of the impacts that are occurring.

Given the magnitude of the problems created by HIV/AIDS, even relatively low-cost interventions will require significant resources to be implemented at scale. It is essential to increase collaboration among governments, donors, business, non-governmental and community organizations to address the enormous need.

Childhood malnutrition is potentially one of the most severe and lasting consequences of an adult death in the household. Seeking to mitigate the impact of the AIDS epidemic on childhood nutrition is an important aspect which must be addressed.

When we consider that families are not only struggling to provide enough nourishment to their family members that are affected by this disease but must also struggle with feeding the children that are left behind-- we must ask--- how are they doing it and how can we better help. Certainly, there is much we can do to alleviate the effects of an adult death on a child's malnutrition. Communities all over the world are coming together to support creative solutions to this problem.

Future activities

**** Identify and support the innovative and effective community-based approaches already implemented by families and communities affected by HIV/AIDS. Solutions have been developed, but these need to be strengthened and expanded to more adequately address the current and future needs of children, their families, and their communities.

**** In areas where activities have not yet been developed, foster the initiation of community-based approaches to identify and care for its most vulnerable members, including children affected by HIV/AIDS and their families. Encourage the development of the capacity of communities to sustain these efforts as the impact of AIDS continues to take its toll.

Some regions of the world are just beginning to experience the impact of a growing HIV/AIDS prevalence. In those areas, initiate community-based systems that will begin to recognize and address the growing needs of children and others as the impact of the disease increases.

Build upon the capacity of children to support themselves. Enable children to stay in school and to learn vocational skills, improving their ability to provide for their own needs - now and in the future.

Ensure the protection of the most vulnerable children who are neither cared for by family nor community. Essential services include those that include adoption and foster care mechanisms, protection of abused or neglected children, and address the needs of street children and other abandoned children.

This is a human rights issue. It is important that we act responsibly and that we act NOW..
