1,300 GROUPS SIGN OPEN LETTER TO CONGRESS URGING EMPLOYER-BASED HEALTH FINANCING

WASHINGTON — The Health Care Reform Project today released a letter signed by more than 1,300 organizations representing nearly 100 million Americans who want Congress to pass a health care reform bill that includes "shared responsibility" between employers and employees as the basis of financing universal coverage.

The groups signing the letter, which is being delivered today to every Member of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives, include businesses, labor unions, health care providers, educators, seniors organizations and childrens' advocates (see attached list). Their combined membership of nearly 100 million Americans is 150 times larger than the total membership of the National Federation of Independent Business, a vocal opponent of health reform that represents a minority of small businesses.

"An employer mandate builds on our current employer-based insurance system and would be the least disruptive way to achieve universal coverage," the letter says. "It would be fair in that all employers and employees would be responsible for contributing towards coverage. It would level the playing field among different employers, most of whom provide such coverage today. And it would eliminate large, unpredictable and inequitable cost shifts that employers bear today for the uninsured workers of other employers."

The letter also urges Congress to include small business discounts or subsidies in order to help small employers meet their obligations.

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STATEMENT OF SENATE MAJORITY LEADER GEORGE J. MITCHELL

From the National Farmers Union to the Air Line Pilots; from Albany Bowling Supplies to NYNEX; from the AARP to Happy Joe's Senior Volunteers; from Archer Daniels Midland Corporation to the White Dog Cafe these groups and businesses span the width and breadth of the American populace.

They support building on today's system of shared responsibility between and employer and employee because it makes sense. More than eighty-five percent of uninsured Americans are in working families. Eight out of ten privately insured Americans get their health care coverage where they work. A majority of businesses already offer health care coverage to their workers. Clearly, an employer-based system is the basis upon which we must build.

Passing comprehensive reform legislation that guarantees every American health care coverage that can never be taken away is a difficult task. But the millions of Americans represented in this letter are counting on the Congress to act this year. We will.

**STATEMENT OF SENATOR THOMAS A. DASCHLE
CO-CHAIRMAN, SENATE DEMOCRATIC POLICY COMMITTEE**

Mr. President, I am pleased to announce that today the Health Care Reform Project released a letter, signed by over 1,300 groups and organizations from states throughout the country, urging Congress to support employer-based health care reform. These groups represent combined memberships of over 93 million people -- 155 times the membership of the National Federation of Business (NFIB). They want comprehensive health care reform and believe that guaranteeing coverage through the workplace makes the most sense.

Too often, we hear only from the opponents of reform. We hear of their political strength, their mass organization, and their membership numbers. Their rallying cry is that an employer mandate is politically unfeasible. This letter shows that they are dead wrong.

These groups and businesses have stepped to the plate. They are letting their political strength, their voices and their votes be heard. Their message is clear. They want health care for every American and they are willing to make the important choices needed to get there.

Building on the system of shared responsibility between employer and employee is an organized and sensible way to provide coverage to uninsured Americans. More than eighty-five percent of uninsured Americans are in working families. Eight out of ten privately insured Americans get their health care coverage where they work. A majority of businesses already offer health care coverage to their workers and will save under reform. And, a vast majority of Americans support guaranteeing health coverage through the workplace.

The fact is there are only a few ways to accomplish the goal of guaranteeing every American health insurance. Our basic choices are a government-run system financed by a broad-based tax; a "family" or "individual" mandate where each family is legally and financially liable for the entire cost of their insurance; or a system rooted in today's where employer and employee share responsibility for the cost of coverage.

Some people say that there is another choice. They say that the system isn't broken so we needn't fix it. But for most Americans, the status quo is the worst mandate we could possibly impose. Under the status quo mandate, businesses who provide coverage for their employees would continue to be required to pay the freight for those who don't. Businesses and workers who pay for health care coverage would continue to absorb billions of dollars in uncompensated care. And people who get up and go to work each day would continue to fear losing their health care coverage.

The groups signing this letter and the millions of Americans they represent are telling us that the status quo is unacceptable.

From the National Farmers Union to the National Council of Senior Citizens; from the Children's Defense Fund to the St. James Youth Center in Louisiana; from Albany Bowling Supplies in Georgia to the Southern California Edison Company, these groups represent a broad spectrum of Americans.

These are real people and real businesses and they have important stories.

Kurt Thompson, a constituent of mine from Britton, South Dakota and a member of the South Dakota Farmers Union, is a family farmer, raising wheat, corn, soy beans, hogs and cows. He pays \$300 a month for only catastrophic coverage. His deductible is \$2,500 a year and he has asked his insurance company to cut his benefits to reduce his costs. As a self-employed farmer, he is only eligible to deduct 25% of his health care costs unlike most businesses who are allowed 100%. Mr. Thompson estimates that he has to sell at least three hogs a month just to pay his insurance premium. He desperately wants health care reform to help him afford health care for his family and thinks building on today's employer-based system makes the most sense.

Albany Bowling Supplies is a small family business in Georgia which employs nine people. The owner Bud Simpson has provided all of his workers with health care coverage for years. For all these years, he has had to pay the costs for his competitors who don't provide. Albany Bowling Supplies believes that asking all businesses to contribute to their workers health care coverage, is the most fair way to get to universal coverage.

Jerry Wilse, President of the Greater Arizona United Auto Workers Retiree Council as well as the Arizona State Council of Senior Citizens, told me that until we have comprehensive reform none of his members can feel secure. He believes that an employer-based system is the most sensible way to get there.

Mr. President these groups and businesses are diverse and have a wide range of interests. Yet they have come together to support a sensible approach to health care reform. They want action from Congress and they have made their choice known. We should listen.

Open Letter to Congress

Supporting Employer Responsibility for Employees' Health Care

Dear Member/Senator:

Health security for all Americans, that guarantees that no one lacks or loses high-quality health care coverage, is an essential element of health care reform. We believe that this objective should be achieved for working families by requiring all employers to provide and help subsidize health care coverage for their employees. We recognize that some employers (and employees) will need financial help to meet their obligations. We, of course, support providing necessary subsidies.

We believe that an employer mandate is a fair, effective and practical means for achieving universal coverage. We, therefore, urge its adoption.

Dear Senator Mitchell:

The undersigned urge you to include in any health care reform legislation which the Committee on Finance passes a provision which assures health care coverage for all Americans.

We believe that universal coverage is critical to the efficient and optimal performance of the health care system and the broader economy.

We also believe that among the methods of achieving universal coverage, an employment-based system, in which there is both employer and employee financial participation, offers the most practical and realistic approach. An employment-based system is preferred by most Americans and advances a public-private approach to the human and economic needs for universal health care coverage.

Universal coverage is critical to successful health care reform:

- As a matter of equity, humanity and economy, every American should be covered for appropriate health care. The costs in terms of lost productivity and wasted human resources are untenable.
- The current problems in our health delivery and financing systems cannot be effectively remedied when one in six Americans lack health care coverage at any one time.
- There can be no effective means to control the growth of health care costs - either through market or regulatory mechanisms -- when significant portions of the population remain outside the health care system. Needed insurance reforms will work only when everyone has health care coverage.

A prudently designed employment based system offers the most effective means of achieving universal health care coverage by:

- addressing an important element of the current cost shifting crisis in which the costs of caring for the uninsured are borne by the insured;

- extending coverage to the majority of the uninsured -- 84 percent of the 39 million uninsured live in families headed by workers;
- providing the simplicity of using the current mechanism by which Americans receive coverage -- a mechanism preferred by most Americans.

We believe that an employment based system of universal coverage, with employer and employee financial participation, is an essential component of health care reform. We urge you to support inclusion of such a provision in health care reform legislation.

Tough Times Over Tactics On Health Bill

Backers of Insurance Dissect Mitchell Plan

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 — For groups that have led the push for national health insurance, the current Senate debate on the issue raises exquisitely difficult questions of political tactics.

The biggest question is whether to lobby energetically for a bill they view as severely flawed, but which may also represent the only vehicle for achieving their goals.

Liberal lobbyists now find themselves in the awkward position of defending a bill they dislike against amendments they dislike even more.

Labor unions, consumer groups and advocates for the elderly had always seen the Senate Democratic leader, George J. Mitchell, as an ally in their campaign for universal health insurance. Since he first entered the Senate in 1980, Mr. Mitchell has shown a keen interest in health care issues.

But in the bill he laid before the Senate on Tuesday, Mr. Mitchell made so many concessions to conservative Democrats and moderate Republicans that he undercut his base, confusing and dividing his old allies. On Friday, Mr. Mitchell said he was open to even more negotiation, and it appeared that some of his liberal allies, like Senator Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts, would go along.

Long-Term Care Cited

Stephen R. McConnell, a senior vice president of the Alzheimer's Association, said he supported the Mitchell bill because it would create a new program of long-term care. But he added: "If the bill is not all you would like, it's hard to go to your constituents and say, 'Rev up the engines.' It takes more explanation to mobilize your members."

The ambivalence and divisions among liberal groups and labor unions contrast with the unity of purpose among business organizations. Big and small businesses have coalesced in opposition to the Mitchell bill, for many of the same reasons they opposed President Clinton's plan. They fear it will vastly expand the powers of the Federal Government and rob them of the discretion they now have to design and manage their own health plans.

Robert A. Chlopak, coordinator of the Health Care Reform Project, a broad coalition of groups supporting national health insurance, said that one-third of its members supported the Mitchell bill, one-third opposed it and the remainder had not taken a firm position.

William H. Bywater, president of the International Union of Electronic Workers, scorned the Mitchell bill, saying it "seeks mild reforms in the vain hope they will lead to universal coverage." The AFL-CIO said, "The Mitchell bill has no effective cost controls."

U.M.W. Sees Dangers

Leaders of the United Automobile Workers say that passage of Mr. Mitchell's bill would aggravate tensions between employers and employees in their industry.

The Big Three auto makers now pay the full cost of health insurance premiums for union workers. Mr. Mitchell's bill would give the Government's blessing to a much smaller employer contribution, requiring companies to pay at least 50 percent of health insurance premiums, but only in states where more than 5 percent of the people were uninsured in the year 2000.

Alan V. Reuther, legislative director of the auto workers union, said: "The 50-50 standard would create tremendous pressures at the bargaining table. Employers could argue, 'The Government has endorsed that standard, so let's cut back coverage.' The Mitchell bill would lead many employers to drop or reduce coverage. We don't agree with the notion that you pass a bad bill just for the sake of passing something."

Louise Novotny, a health policy analyst at the Communications Workers of America, said: "We have been pushing for broad national reforms with global goals like universal coverage. But the Mitchell bill could backfire on our members, who have coverage now and are battling in every set of labor negotiations to hold on to it. We spent several decades getting to the point that telephone companies now pay 100 percent of the health insurance premiums for our members. The Mitchell bill would undermine the progress we've made."

On the other hand, some of the early advocates for health care legislation, like the American Association of Retired Persons, Families USA and the Catholic Health Association, do support the Mitchell bill as a way to keep the legislative process alive.

"We support the Mitchell bill as the best political vehicle for moving the process forward, with the hope and expectation that the bill will be improved in conference," said Ronald F. Pollack, executive director of Families USA, the advocacy group that organized cross-country bus caravans in support of health care legislation.

William J. Cox, vice president of the Catholic Health Association, which represents 600 Roman Catholic hospitals and 300 nursing homes supports the Mitchell bill for similar reasons.

G.O.P. Split Offers Hope To Democrats On Health Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 — "The only option for us is to kill the President's bill," said Daniel R. Coats of Indiana.

"I hope there will be a cease-fire, a white flag raised and no more ad hominem attacks," said William S. Cohen of Maine.

These are the two voices of Senate Republicans in the health care debate. These Republicans have a lot in common: a general belief that the legislation proposed by Senator George J. Mitchell, the majority leader, and backed by President Clinton, has too big a role for government, and a fear that Democrats are trying to rush them and make them look bad.

But there is a fundamental difference. Mr. Cohen and a significant minority of his party hope they can work out something by amending the Mitchell bill, while Mr. Coats and a majority of Republicans have no interest in that approach and are committed to delaying actions as they echo and re-echo their denunciations.

The larger group says it needs time to explain the evils of the Mitchell bill, and its members become furious when Democrats like Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts or Christopher J. Dodd of Connecticut use the word filibuster in describing the Republicans' debating posture.

Listen to Senator Bob Packwood of Oregon, the Republican floor leader on the health care debate: "I ask you, if we cannot go home and talk to our constituents, and if the only way we have to get the point across that we feel so strongly about on this bill is to talk on the floor of the Senate, is that some kind of an immoral, unethical process? Is that a filibuster?"

No Brawl Developing

But the floor debate has not turned into a brawl largely because the Democrats are counting on the faction Mr. Cohen belongs to, the bipartisan mainstream coalition, to propose amendments to the Mitchell bill that they can accept.

That is, most Democrats hope they can find those amendments acceptable. One of their most liberal members, Senator Paul Wellstone of Min-

Going Over Details

But this morning when Mr. Cohen finished, the Democrats just argued with him about the details of various bills. For example, Mr. Cohen said Senator Bob Dole's proposed bill would protect consumers with pre-existing medical conditions from being denied insurance. Senator Kennedy read from the bill, and argued that it would enable insurers to keep on denying coverage for pre-existing conditions, in contrast to the Mitchell bill.

But the tone was civil. After all, Mr. Cohen was on the way to another mainstream group meeting. Today's session was devoted to trying to find a formula on abortion that neither anti-abortion groups nor abortion-rights groups would count as a significant victory or defeat, some compromise that would come close to preserve the status quo. Participants reported that they had not succeeded in finding that elusive formula.

There is plainly tension between the Republican factions. Members of the mainstream contingent speak caustically of the Dole bill, though insisting on anonymity. And it is clear that Mr. Dole and his even more

conservative allies look at the mainstream group's idea of collaborating with Mr. Mitchell as highly offensive.

Blunt Messages

The battle of messages is fairly blunt. Republicans, in speeches that average close to an hour, say the bill is bureaucratic and the Democrats are rushing. Democrats, in speeches of about 15 to 20 minutes, say the issues have been studied and studied and the public wants action.

Mr. Dodd complained today to reporters that he could not get Mr. Dole to agree on a vote on a minor amendment of his, one that would require insurance companies to cover prenatal and infant care for people who have coverage, starting July 1, 1995. Despite the euphemisms about detailed explanations, or new versions of the bill that Republicans used, he said, "This is what you call a good old-fashioned filibuster."

On May 11, 1864, the Civil War general wrote, "I propose to fight it out on this line, if it takes all summer."

Senator Packwood said, "I think we are prepared to equal General Grant."

In fact, the siege at Spotsylvania Court House was bloody. Confederate casualties are uncertain, and perhaps lower, but union forces suffered 4,100 dead and wounded on May 10, and on May 12, there were 6,820 casualties. Frontal assault on Confederate trenches failed. It was very costly and relatively indecisive victory, if it was a victory at all. And the siege lasted just 14 days, not all summer.

So, the Democratic response is calibrated according to whether a given Republican critic is regarded as a potential ally or an implacable enemy.

Last night, for example, Senator Trent Lott, Republican of Mississippi, attacked the Mitchell bill at length and called it "health scare legislation." Later, Mr. Mitchell returned to the floor and said, "Our colleagues are obviously engaged in a tactic of 'if you repeat something often enough, people will come to accept it, even if it is not correct.'" Mr. Mitchell did not use a term like the "Big Lie," but everyone knew that was what he meant. Then, he scoffed at the technique Republicans have developed for holding up different updates of his bill: "It gets you on TV."
