Dear President Clinton:

I am writing to express support for Ukraine's interest in representation as an observer at the forthcoming G-7 summit in Halifax. As a Ukrainian-American, I believe it is important that the United States and the other G-7 nations demonstrate continuing support for Ukraine's independence and its development of democratic institutions and a free-market economy. Since issues of specific significance to Ukraine are on the agenda, I believe it would be fair and reasonable to allow for such representation.

During your recent summit meeting in Kyiv, you paid tribute to Ukraine's accession to the NPT, protection of the rights of minorities, fostering democratic institutions and building bridges to other democracies. Most importantly, you praised President Kuchma's courageous economic reform program and reassured the Ukrainian people that "as you build your future, the United States will stand with you." On his part, President Kuchma reaffirmed his determination to stay on course in implementing tough economic reforms and expressed his desire to attend the upcoming G-7 Summit.

President Kuchma has demonstrated the courage and leadership to go forward with economic reforms as recommended by the IMF. Regrettably, the hardship and sacrifices which have ensued are being used by the opponents of democratic and economic reforms to undermine President Kuchma's programs and policies. It is, therefore, important for the Ukrainian people to know that the industrialized democracies stand with their president during this period of economic difficulties.

Moreover, the Halifax summit agenda will include Ukraine's recent decision to go forward with closing the Chornobyl nuclear power plant. It is recognized by the G-7 that both, the closure of Chornobyl and Ukraine's accelerated economic reform program, will require a major commitment from the industrialized democracies. Clearly, Ukraine's presence at the summit would be timely and mutually beneficial.

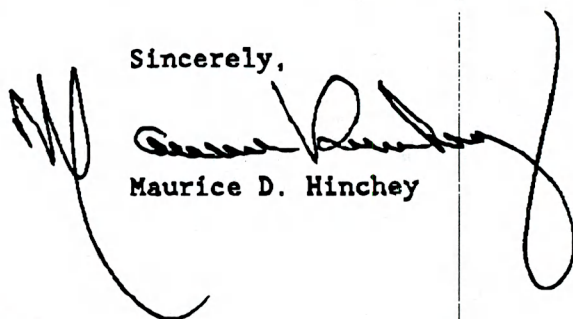

Dear Mr. President:

The Ukrainian American community is most appreciative of your decision to visit Ukraine next month in connection with the commemoration of the historic Allied victory over Nazism. Ukraine's losses in WWII are estimated at 5.3 million. It is entirely fitting that you, as leader of the Free World, should visit a nation which gave so much to the victory over fascism.

Ukraine has an additional distinction, shared with few other nations which suffered the horrors of occupation during World War II: The Ukrainian Insurgent Army, an organized military force of perhaps 100,000 combatants, simultaneously waged war against both the Nazis and Soviets, thereby attaining a level of heroism not achieved even by the Western Allies. The participation of Ukraine's men and women in the struggle of UPA will always stand as an inspiring example of human courage.

In light of your Administration's deepening commitment to a strategic partnership with Ukraine, I am writing to suggest several ways in which your visit to Ukraine could be made more meaningful.

(1) The presidential party should include representatives of the nation's 1.5 million Americans of Ukrainian descent. Appropriate representatives would be Mr. Julian E. Kulas, Chairperson of Ukrainians for Clinton, Mrs. Ulana Diachuk, President of the Ukrainian National Association, our community's largest and oldest fraternal association, and myself as President of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America, the national community organization of Ukrainian Americans.

(2) In light of President Boris Yeltsin's statements about Crimea on April 15, which represent an unprecedented attack upon the principle of territorial integrity, we urge your Administration to require the Russian president to moderate his present stance as a condition of Russia's receiving further assistance from the U.S..

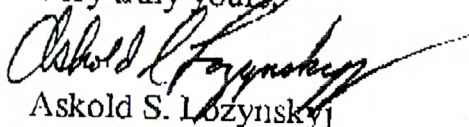
(3) It would greatly assist Ukraine's courageous economic reform program if, during your visit to Kyiv, you would address the Ukrainian people from the symbolic backdrop of the Shevchenko Monument at Kyiv University, thereby placing the

prestige of your office squarely behind the Ukrainian people as they make the difficult transition to a decentralized market economy. We also suggest that you visit the memorial at Babyn Yar, where hundreds of thousands of Jews, Ukrainians, and victims of other nationalities were massacred by the Nazis.

(4) You would also show your support for President Kuchma and his economic reform program if your schedule would allow for an overnight stay in Ukraine. Otherwise, your visit to Kyiv might appear to be a mere stop-over on your return from Moscow, diminishing the importance of your visit.

I hope the above thoughts will prove helpful in the planning of your visit to Ukraine and Russia. For further information, do not hesitate to contact me or this organization's Washington, D.C.
