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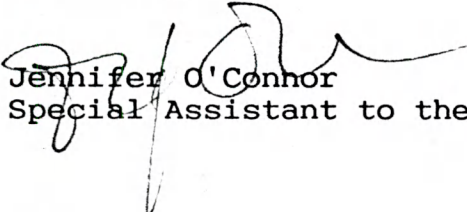

WHO WOULD GET THE GOP TAX CUT? Tax Benefit Issue Could Decide Budget Debates

Democrats have made a charge that could echo for the rest of the year: Republicans want to cut needed programs to pay for tax cuts for the rich.

Unless the GOP refutes this "reverse Robin Hood" depiction, Democrats may derail Republican efforts to steer a balanced budget through Congress.

Luckily for the GOP, some evidence shows that the tax-cut package passed by the U.S. House not only refrains from tilting toward the wealthy, but actually favors the middle class, in whose name Democrats have attacked.

But these figures are subject to debate.

The Clinton administration has reviewed the House's tax cuts, concluding that those at the upper end of the income scale would gain the most.

In general, this disagreement owes to different ways of looking at tax cuts and defining income.

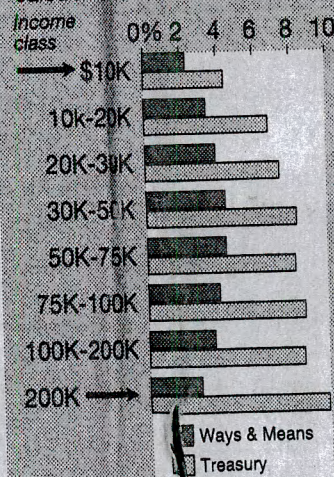
In April, the House passed a bill that would cut taxes in a variety of ways.

For families, it would give a \$500 tax credit per child to households earning up to \$200,000, ease the marriage penalty and repeal tax hikes on social security.

For economic growth, it would cut

taxes on capital gains from 28% to 19.8%, let firms fully write off the costs of plant and equipment, and repeal the minimum tax on corporations.

GOP congressional analysis of the tax cuts focuses on two angles — the shares of all federal taxes paid by people from different income groups and the actual amounts of taxes paid by people from these groups.

In the year 2000, the top 1% of taxpayers would pay 18.2% of all federal taxes under the GOP bill, compared to 18% without the tax cuts, according to the House Ways and Means Committee.

Similarly, the share of federal taxes paid by the top 5% of taxpayers would hit 34.3%, rather than 34.1%, says Ways and Means, which relied for its data on Congress' Joint Committee on Taxation.

Measuring the tax cut in terms of the percentage drop in taxes for various income groups also tends to refute Democratic criticism.

People making between \$40,000 and \$75,000 would see their tax bills dive by 4.4%, more than people in any other income group, says Ways and Means.

By contrast, taxpayers earning between \$75,000 and \$100,000 would have tax bills 4% lower. People making between \$100,000 and \$200,000 would have bills 3.7% lower.

At the top of the income scale, people earning more than \$200,000 a year would find their tax bills 2.9% smaller. Only people earning less than \$10,000 would get less of a percentage drop in their taxes.

But the Treasury Department disputes these numbers.

While the analysis of Ways and Means only accounts for tax cuts for individuals, Treasury allocates cuts in

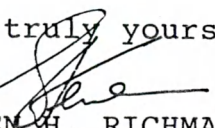
