Dear Colleague:

The International Center for Research on Women (ICRW), in collaboration with researchers from India, is pleased to present the first in a three-part series on domestic violence in India.

The first report: "Domestic Violence in India: A Summary Report of Three Studies" includes an examination of governmental and non-governmental responses to domestic violence in the states of Karnataka, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, and Maharashtra. The report also includes the results of a household survey in rural Gujarat.

The three projects and the researchers are:

- *Violence Against Women in India: Evidence from Rural Gujarat* by Leela Visaria of the Gujarat Institute of Development Studies;
- *Best Practices Among Responses to Domestic Violence in Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh* by Nishi Mitra of the Women's Studies Unit from Tata Institute of Social Sciences in Mumbai; and
- *Responses to Domestic Violence in Karnataka and Gujarat* by Veena Poonacha and Divya Pandey of the Research Centre for Women's Studies, from the SNDT Women's University in Mumbai.

These projects are the first three in a three-year research program which began in 1997 on domestic violence in India. The India program, funded by USAID/India, is part of a larger global grants program being implemented by the International Center for Research on Women.

The second report will include the summaries of four studies analyzing institutional records on domestic violence: court, police, NGO, and hospital records. The third report will summarize the findings of an extensive, multi-site household study of domestic violence carried out by the International Clinical Epidemiologists Network (INCLEN). These remaining two parts of the series will be available next year.

We hope that these reports will contribute to understandings of the nature of domestic violence in India as well as policies and programs designed to address violence. In particular, we hope that this research will highlight the urgency in building a consensus to work against domestic violence in a unified manner and to bring about change through prevention.

Crimes in Delhi on the rise: Advani too record increase

Delhi was being reviewed by the central government from time to time. Advani said number of reported cases of crime against women like rape, kidnapping and abduction and dowry deaths in Delhi were more than the number of reported cases of similar crimes in all the three metropolitan cities put together.

In 1998 (January-June) fell to 194 compared to 262 in the same period last year, number of kidnapping and abduction cases decreased to 484 from 519 and dowry deaths to 55 from 70 in the first six months of 1997.

Crimes against Rajasthan women on the rise: Report

The Government has issued a report on the rise in crimes against women in Rajasthan. The report says that the number of crimes against women in Rajasthan has increased by 10 per cent in the last year. Child gets justice for dead mother

A 10-year-old boy has been awarded compensation for the death of his mother. The boy's mother was killed by her husband. The court has ordered the husband to pay compensation to the boy.

Are special women's cells felt

The need for intervention, by police mediation, by trained social workers to provide effective help, by counselling, was felt. The objective in setting up the Cell, was to study the types of complaints that were registered with the Cell, to provide counselling and to create awareness about the humiliations and atrocities suffered by women.

Home is no haven for women

Even "home" is not a safe haven for women in India's crime-ridden cities. Capital, as domestic violence tops the list of crimes. According to the figures available with the Delhi Commission for Women, most of the 1,800 cases registered against women in the capital in 1997, 85 per cent were related to domestic violence.

Engineers, doctors rank high on cruelty-to-wives list: Biswas

Among professionals, engineers and doctors were found to be the most common culprits in cases of domestic violence. The report also says that the number of cases of domestic violence has increased in the last year.

Violence against women still pervasive

Violence against women is still pervasive in India. The report says that the number of cases of violence against women has increased in the last year. The report also says that the number of cases of violence against women has increased in the last year.

Majority of women face some form of marital violence, abuse

A study conducted in a rural district of Gujarat, two-thirds (66 per cent) of the interviewees said they had faced some form of psychological, physical or sexual abuse.

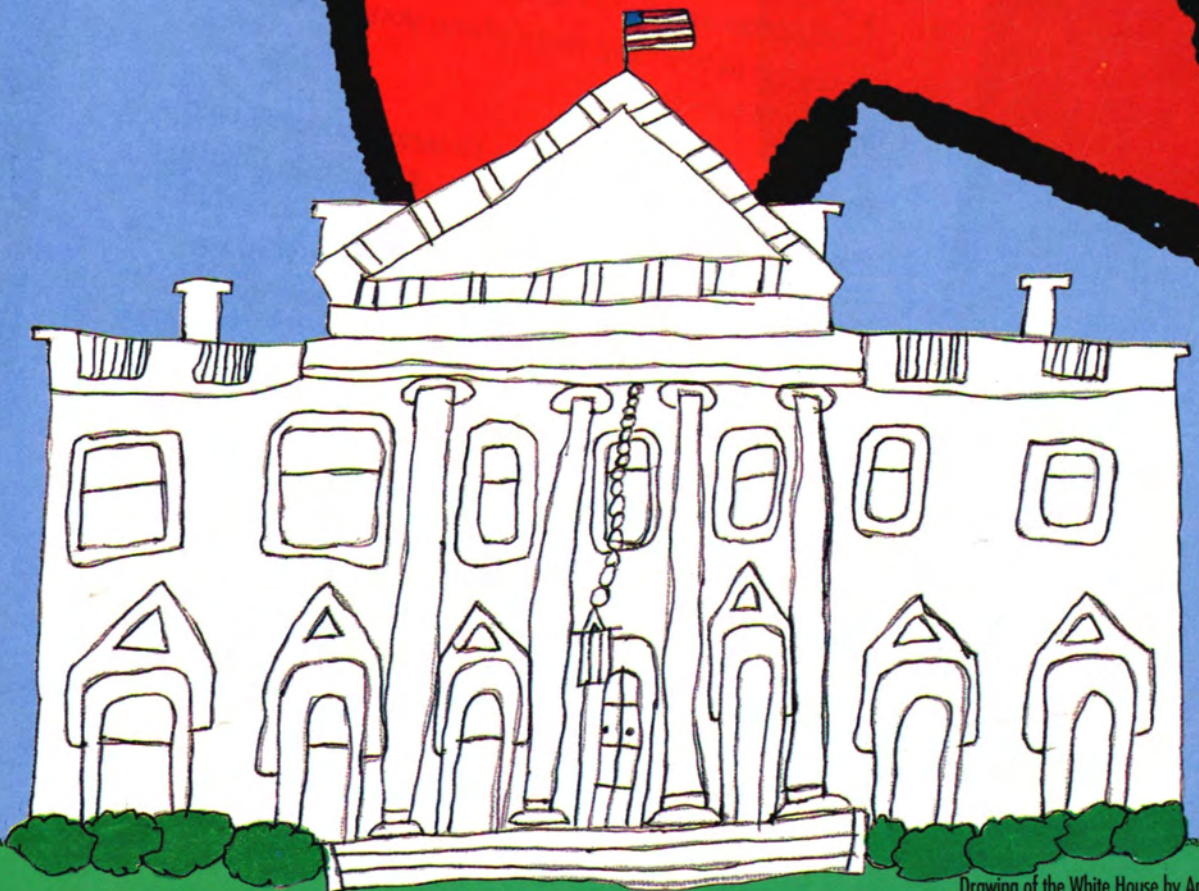
