TALKING POINTS

- Thank you, Suzi. I am delighted to have the opportunity to speak with you today. In your letter inviting me to come visit, you wrote that you believe many girls today do not have strong women role models. That is why I was pleased to learn that all of you have been working on leadership skills this past fall [still working on them?]
- Your projects, such as xxx and xxx, provide a great opportunity to develop many of the skills that can help you become anything you choose to be -- whether it is a businesswoman, doctor, construction worker, wife or mother -- or some combination of all those things. You are getting valuable training that will enable you to be anything you choose to be when you grow up.
- I myself was a Girl Scout (more years ago than I care to count), and remember well the fun I had with my troop -- field trips and sleepovers [anecdote here?] --, and also many of the lessons I learned -- lessons of cooperation and teamwork, of leadership and community service. *— Chelsea/G.S. anecdote?*
- The founder of Girl Scouts, Juliett Low, said way back in xxx, “We mustn’t lose sight of the girls. The girls must always come first.” And I believe, now more than ever, that this is true.

First Lady to visit Lebanon tomorrow

Speaks to Girl Scouts

First lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will visit Lebanon tomorrow to speak to a group of local Girl Scouts, Clinton/Gore campaign officials announced yesterday.

Clinton may also meet with local supporters of her husband's re-election campaign but will not appear before the general public in Lebanon, according to Jake Siewert, New Hampshire press secretary for the Clinton campaign. The first lady will make a public speech earlier the same day in Keene, however. Clinton is scheduled to meet with members of Girl Scout Troop 659 and Troop 465 at 3:30 p.m. at Lebanon Junior High School on Bank Street.

The visit grows out of an invitation quietly extended almost a year ago by one of Troop 659's co-leaders, Suzi Madison of Lebanon. At the time, the first lady's staff wrote back to say that Clinton couldn't fit a visit into her schedule, Madison said yesterday. The Lebanon Police Department was alerted last Friday that Clinton might be coming. Madison herself had no inkling that anything was afoot until Monday afternoon, when she received a call from Clinton's staff.

As of yesterday afternoon, when the Clinton campaign announced the visit publicly, Madison still hadn't sprung the big surprise on her Girl Scouts. She hadn't ever told them about the invitation because she didn't want them to be disappointed, and she planned to meet with the girls last night to inform them, she said. "This letter had not really crossed my mind in several months," Madison said, expressing amazement at this week's developments. "I don't know how these things work. I'm not connected. I'm Joe Middle-Class," she said.

Mary Ames is the other co-leader of Troop 659, a Junior Girl Scout troop for girls ages 9-11. Brenda Ellis and Louann Russ are the co-leaders of Troop 465, a Cadette troop for ages 12-14. A total of 18 girls are in the two troops.

"I think she's a good role model," Jessi Madison, a member of her mother's troop and a fifth-grade student at the Hanover Street School, said of Clinton. "She's a very nice person. I'd really like to meet her." "I think it's great," said Maghan Ellis, 12, a Troop 659 member who learned of the impending visit last night.

In the letter she faxed to the White House last year, Madison asked Clinton to speak to the girls about leadership roles for women. She said she got the idea when she came across a quiz in some Girl Scout materials on leadership skills. The question that caught her attention: Name five people you consider to be leaders. Madison tried the quiz with her husband, David, who offered an all-male list. When Suzi Madison pointed out that there were no women on it, her daughter, Jessi, made up a list that included Hillary Clinton.

When the idea occurred to her to write to Clinton, she scribbled a letter in pencil but then put it aside, Madison said. Friends encouraged her to send it, however, and she ended up faxing it to the White House in the hope it would start a better chance of getting to the first lady than a mailed letter. The incident of the quiz made her think "that maybe we do not have enough strong women role models for our daughters to look up to," Madison wrote to Clinton. "Whenever I need a guest speaker to speak to my troop, I always search out a woman first. I would like to invite you to speak to my troop and others in the area about leadership roles for women in the future. I think they would be inspired by such a positive female role model."

Madison said she had recently wondered whether the approaching New Hampshire presidential primary might bring the first lady to the state. "And, bingo!" she said. "They called."

Clinton will also give a speech at noon tomorrow in the Mabel Brown Room of the Student Union at Keene State College. Tickets will be required for admission, and are being distributed through the college, Siewert said.

The Lebanon visit will be a campaign event rather than a White House one. Campaign advance people arrived in Lebanon on Sunday and looked over the junior high school yesterday. Advance people also met yesterday at the Claremont Police Department with police representatives to coordinate arrangements for the visit. Claremont was chosen as the meeting site because it lies halfway between Lebanon and Keene, according to Claremont Police Captain William Wilmot. No appearance is planned for Clinton in Claremont.

Clinton last visited New Hampshire on Dec. 9, when she filed her husband's candidacy papers and made appearances in Manchester, Portsmouth and Durham. She visited Woodstock in June 1993 for a conference of the Democratic Governors' Association.

Madison said she will tell her Girl Scouts that the first lady's visit shows they can accomplish anything if they try hard enough. "Some of them need to know that nothing is out of their reach," she said.

Madison's daughter is looking for a slightly more immediate benefit from the visit, however. It seems her teacher once told the class something to the effect that anyone who got their picture on the front page of the Valley News could be excused from that day's homework. There are three members of her Girl Scout troop in the class, Jessi Madison and they're all hoping for enough exposure to hold their teacher to her word

Speaks to Girl Scouts

First lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will visit Lebanon tomorrow to speak to a group of local Girl Scouts, Clinton/Gore campaign officials announced yesterday.

Clinton may also meet with local supporters of her husband's re-election campaign but will not appear before the general public in Lebanon, according to Jake Siewert, New Hampshire press secretary for the Clinton campaign. The first lady will make a public speech earlier the same day in Keene, however. Clinton is scheduled to meet with members of Girl Scout Troop 659 and Troop 465 at 3:30 p.m. at Lebanon Junior High School on Bank Street.

The visit grows out of an invitation quietly extended almost a year ago by one of Troop 659's co-leaders, Suzi Madison of Lebanon. At the time, the first lady's staff wrote back to say that Clinton couldn't fit a visit into her schedule, Madison said yesterday. The Lebanon Police Department was alerted last Friday that Clinton might be coming. Madison herself had no inkling that anything was afoot until Monday afternoon, when she received a call from Clinton's staff.

As of yesterday afternoon, when the Clinton campaign announced the visit publicly, Madison still hadn't sprung the big surprise on her Girl Scouts. She hadn't ever told them about the invitation because she didn't want them to be disappointed, and she planned to meet with the girls last night to inform them, she said. "This letter had not really crossed my mind in several months," Madison said, expressing amazement at this week's developments. "I don't know how these things work. I'm not connected. I'm Joe Middle-Class," she said.

Mary Ames is the other co-leader of Troop 659, a Junior Girl Scout troop for girls ages 9-11. Brenda Ellis and Louann Russ are the co-leaders of Troop 465, a Cadette troop for ages 12-14. A total of 18 girls are in the two troops.

"I think she's a good role model," Jessi Madison, a member of her mother's troop and a fifth-grade student at the Hanover Street School, said of Clinton. "She's a very nice person. I'd really like to meet her." "I think it's great," said Maghan Ellis, 12, a Troop 465 member who learned of the impending visit last night.

In the letter she faxed to the White House last year, Madison asked Clinton to speak to the girls about leadership roles for women. She said she got the idea when she came across a quiz in some Girl Scout materials on leadership skills. The question that caught her attention: Name five people you consider to be leaders. Madison tried the quiz on her husband, David, who offered an all-male list. When Suzi Madison pointed out that there were no women on it, her daughter, Jessi, made up a list that included Hillary Clinton.

When the idea occurred to her to write to Clinton, she scribbled a letter in pencil but then put it aside, Madison said. Friends encouraged her to send it, however, and she ended up faxing it to the White House in the hope it would stand a better chance of getting to the first lady than a mailed letter. The incident of the quiz made her think "that maybe we do not have enough strong women role models for our daughters to look up to," Madison wrote to Clinton. "Whenever I need a guest speaker to speak to my troop, I always search out a woman first. I would like to invite you to speak to my troop and others in the area about leadership roles for women in the future. I think they would be inspired by such a positive female role model."

Madison said she had recently wondered whether the approaching New Hampshire presidential primary might bring the first lady to the state. "And, bingo!" she said. "They called."

Clinton will also give a speech at noon tomorrow in the Mabel Brown Room of the Student Union at Keene State College. Tickets will be required for admission, and are being distributed through the college, Siewert said.

The Lebanon visit will be a campaign event rather than a White House one. Campaign advance people arrived in Lebanon on Sunday and looked over the junior high school yesterday. Advance people also met yesterday at the Claremont Police Department with police representatives to coordinate arrangements for the visit. Claremont was chosen as the meeting site because it lies halfway between Lebanon and Keene, according to Claremont Police Capt. William Wilmot. No appearance is planned for Clinton in Claremont.

Clinton lasted visited New Hampshire on Dec. 9, when she filed her husband's candidacy papers and made appearances in Manchester, Portsmouth and Durham. She visited Woodstock in June 1993 for a conference of the Democratic Governors' Association.

Madison said she will tell her Girl Scouts that the first lady's visit shows they can accomplish anything if they try hard enough. "Some of them need to know that nothing is out of their reach," she said.

Madison's daughter is looking for a slightly more immediate benefit from the visit, however. It seems her teacher once told the class something to the effect that anyone who got their picture on the front page of the Valley News could be excused from that day's homework. There are three members of her Girl Scout troop in the class, Jessi Madison and they're all hoping for enough exposure to hold their teacher to her word
