I am also completing an internship in SBCC's mental health services program where I provide crisis intervention and referral to community mental health support.

I am the product of an educational system that has provided support through offices of Services for Students with Disabilities and referrals for services through agencies such as the Department of Rehabilitation.

- As we head into the 21st century, community colleges such as Santa Barbara will become even more crucial to our society, our economy, and the lives of millions of American students and workers.
- Judging from the kinds of programs that are flourishing here: Nursing, Marine Diving, Culinary, Early Childhood Education, Telecommunications, Television and movie production, SBCC is truly responding to the needs of the modern workplace.
