Additional Federal Funds	Section 2121 Provides additional \$3.5 B total over 5 years, 100% Federal funds <u>outside block grant</u>, divided among 15 States with largest number of undocumented immigrants. States selected based on INS 10/92 population estimates (FY 1996) and updated estimates (FY 1997-2000) which could change the States covered. [States for FY 1996: CA, NY, TX, FL, IL, NJ, AZ, MA, VA, WA, GA, MD, CO, OR, and PA.] [Because additional 100% Federal funding operates <u>outside the block grant amount</u>, these States would have a <u>positive incentive</u> to provide these services, up to the limit of the additional Federal funds.] Yearly total amounts are based on increases in the National Medicaid Growth Percentages. Funds allocated based on proportion of undocumented immigrants in each eligible State compared to total in all eligible States.	Section 11302 Provides additional \$3.5 B total over 5 years, 100% Federal funds <u>outside cap</u>, divided among 15 States with largest number of undocumented immigrants. States selected based on INS 10/92 population estimates, <u>no updating</u> in future years. [States: CA, NY, TX, FL, IL, NJ, AZ, MA, VA, WA, GA, MD, CO, OR, and NM.] [Because additional 100% Federal funding operates <u>outside the per capita cap</u>, these States would have a <u>positive incentive</u> to provide these services, up to the limit of the additional Federal funds.] Yearly totals based on increases in nominal GDP. (<u>Higher</u> FY 1996, 1999, 2000; <u>lower</u> for FY 1997, 1998, vs. Conf.) Funds allocated base on proportion of undoc. immigrants in each eligible State compared to total in all eligible States. [President's FY 1996 budget and 1995 immigration bill provided additional \$150 M per year for 5 years (total \$750 M), divided among 7 States that received more than 1% of total SLIAG funds (FY 1988-94). States: CA, TX, NY, IL, FL, AZ, and WA.]
