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INTERGENERATIONAL SHARED SITE PROJECT

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Responding to a need identified by national organizations, government entities, and practitioners in the field, AARP has undertaken to raise awareness about, and provide resources for programs that has been termed “**Intergenerational Shared Site (IGSS) programs**” in this study. IGSS programs are those in which multiple generations receive ongoing services and/or programming at the same site, and generally interact through planned and/or informal intergenerational activities. There are numerous IGSS combinations of older adult programs with child/youth programs, with creative new programs being initiated throughout the nation. The purpose of this study was to increase the body of technical and programmatic knowledge about these innovative IG approaches in order to benefit participants of all ages, and thereby to provide effective solutions to address community needs.

In the fall of 1995, AARP formed an advisory committee for the proposed study of the IGSS project. Through a multiple questionnaire process, nearly 2,600 responses were received, including:

- 1855 organizations asking for more information about IGSS programs
- 314 organizations that have intergenerational programming at sites that are not shared
- 141 organizations planning to open an IGSS program
- 281 active, ongoing IG shared site programs.

The study collected descriptive data about these IGSS programs, including: where the programs are located; the type of organizations involved; program operation information; client population; funding; location; and licensing information. Information was also collected about critical issues facing these programs, both in terms of successes and benefits, and challenges. The analysis was a descriptive summary of program attributes using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS).

Major Findings

- ⇒ The most successful and beneficial aspects of IGSS programs are the positive benefits to the participants and increases in the frequency of positive, informal IG interactions at the site.
- ⇒ The most significant challenge the programs face is funding.
- ⇒ The most common IGSS programs are nursing homes co-located with child care centers, and adult day services centers co-located with child care centers.
- ⇒ IGSS programs are quite evenly distributed among urban, suburban, and rural locations.
- ⇒ The most common IGSS programs are affiliated with public, non-profit corporations.
- ⇒ IGSS programs are most often community-based or long-term care-based.
- ⇒ On an average day, a total of 16,950 older adults and 18,557 children and youth are being served at the 281 sites.
- ⇒ Over half of the older adults in most programs have some cognitive impairment, such as developmental disability or dementia, and at least 25 percent are medically fragile.
- ⇒ Staff training for IG programming has an important impact on the IGSS program, regardless of program type.
- ⇒ The most common type of IG interaction is “planned, ongoing activities.”
- ⇒ The differences in the type of IG interactions fell along the lines of the activity and impairment levels of the older adult populations Senior centers and recreation programs have the highest percentages of occasional, planned IG activities and the programs with higher care levels for older adults have the highest percentages of planned, ongoing IG programs.

Discussion of Results

Program Models

Of the 281 IGSS programs identified in this study, there were 72 possible program models (combinations of older adult and children/youth services), of which 15 models are the most prevalent. Of those 15 most prevalent IGSS program models, this study

identified the nursing home/child care center model as the most common, with 42 sites identified. The second most common was the adult day services center/child care center model with 34 sites identified.

Young Children

It is important to note that both of the two most common IGSS program models include child care centers, and all of the top five models involve some type of care for young children. The IGSS approach to child care can provide an innovative and beneficial program for young children. As our nation realizes an escalating need for child care, as a result of welfare reform and work initiatives, IGSS programs should be encouraged as an effective option for providing service.

Older Adults

As baby boomers age, the need for various levels of older adult services will increase dramatically. The convergence of long-term care needs and the needs for services for young children may result in generational conflict. This could be addressed with intergenerational approaches that include IGSS programs. The findings of satisfaction of older participants with the IGSS program indicates the positive influence age-integration can have for these participants.

Schools

Although IGSS programs that are school-based were less common among survey respondents, this is a potential area for huge growth in the future. As schools are looking for ways to increase community involvement (one of the top benefits of IGSS programs), as well as to gain financial support from the older taxpayers in their communities, they can increasingly look to IGSS approaches. Communities where older adults feel the school is their school will be more apt to have the support of the older adults. In addition, the presence of on-site services can provide practical work opportunities for high school students. It is important for success, however, that the programs be highly integrated.

Funding

The reality of diminishing public funds in communities across the nation is stark for all social service and educational programs. Communities are less and less willing or able to focus service dollars on one age group. Politicians and the media are wont to pit the young and old against each other in an either/or scenario. IGSS programs offer one means to address these problems. While a vast majority of the programs cited funding as their top challenge, over 50 percent also indicated that their ability to attract funding was increased by the IGSS aspect of the program.

Locale

IGSS programs are well distributed among rural, suburban, and urban areas. While programs located in rural and urban or suburban areas may have different challenges, the finding that these programs are well distributed across these areas is important and

indicates that IGSS approaches to service provision are a viable solution for programs regardless of area.

Continuum of Integration

The IGSS programs that responded to our survey are generally high on the “Continuum of Integration” with regard to program characteristics (staffing, IG activities, and building sharing).

IG Activities

The 15 most common IGSS program models most frequently provide some type of planned IG activities, either ongoing or occasional. This may be an indicator of the importance of planned activities to the success of an IGSS program. The more active the older adults, the higher the likelihood of occasional, planned activities. The programs that provide a higher level of care for older adults also have the highest incidence of ongoing, planned activities. The importance of ongoing, planned IG activities in IGSS programs has been established in this study; therefore, the implication is that staff of all sites should consider developing ongoing activities if they are not already doing so. It is important for program planners and practitioners to keep in mind the importance of providing experiences with older adults for children of various functioning levels.

Staffing

With regard to staffing, the sites overall have a blend of IG staff training and shared staff opportunities, with about half including a staff person designated as IG coordinator or specialist. The designation of a staff person who has the responsibility of ensuring that IG interactions and activities, staff training, and communication take place is extremely important to the success of an IGSS program. The presence of cross-training for staff is also highly important, regardless of the IGSS program model. IGSS programs that shared staff between the individual program types were the most likely to provide all three types of IG activities and share sections of the building. Cross-trained staff, shared staff, and the presence of an IG coordinator can help ease such difficulties and ensure staff and participant satisfaction.

Building Use

Most of the programs share the same building, as well as other sections of the facility. Those that do share the building clearly have increased opportunity for the occasional, informal interactions among the generations that seem to influence the overall atmosphere of the program. Anecdotal reports indicated that it is important for the individual older adult and child/youth program components to also have space of their own in the building that is designated only for their use.

Critical Issues

Barriers

Respondents to the Critical Issues questionnaire indicated a high need for opportunities to network with other IGSS programs to share information, ideas, resource materials, and successful strategies. In addition, the sites indicated a very strong need for information about IG activities that are appropriate for all levels of functioning.

Benefits and Successes

The results indicate that the largest benefits of IGSS programs are for the participants. Most respondents indicated that participants of all ages are very happy with the IGSS programs. They report benefits from positive interactions with people of other generations, positive feelings about the program, improved attitudes toward other age groups, and overall seem to be accepting and happy being part of an IGSS program. This could indicate that age-segregation is not the natural state for humans at any age, and age-integration has many benefits.

Conclusions and Implications

Major Conclusions:

The results indicated that the higher the IGSS program on the continuum (the more integrated the populations, the better IG trained the staff, and the more shared the space), the more successes and benefits were reported, as well as the fewer challenges.

The results strongly support that IGSS approaches can provide viable and beneficial options for corporations, long-term care facilities, schools, child care providers and other community based organizations.

Implications for the Future

The fact that, to date, close to 2000 organizations and individuals have requested information upon the completion of this study indicates the strong interest in the IGSS approach across the nation. IGSS programs are an exciting option in providing services to people of all ages, in particular, older adults and young children/youth. The results of this study establish a baseline for the growth of this particular IG approach. This study has increased the information available and will raise awareness of the benefits of an intergenerational shared site program approach, and we believe even the less common program models will increase in the future.

INTERGENERATIONAL SHARED SITE PROGRAMS

What are Intergenerational Shared Site (IGSS) Programs?

IGSS programs are those in which multiple generations receive ongoing services and/or programming at the same site, and may interact through planned and/or informal intergenerational (IG) activities.

What are the Most Common IGSS Programs?

IGSS programs are usually combinations of one or more older adult programs, and one or more child/youth programs:

Older Adult Programs

- Adult Day Services Center
- Assisted Living/Residential Care
- Continuing Care Retirement Community
- Nursing Home
- Senior Center
- Senior Housing Facility
- Community Recreation Program
- Senior Nutrition Site
- Geriatric Care Unit

Child/Youth Programs

- Child Care Center
- Before/After School Program
- Head Start Program
- Early Childhood Program
- Elementary, Middle/Junior High, High School, College/University
- Pediatric Care Unit

The following combinations are listed with the most common first:

1. Nursing Home with Childcare Center
2. Adult Day Services with Childcare Center
3. Adult Day Services Center with Multilevel Childcare (Childcare Center *and* Before/After School Care)
4. Adult Day Services Center with Early Childhood
5. Nursing Home with Multilevel Childcare
6. Senior Center with Before/After School
7. Senior Center with Early Childhood Program



Who Participates?

- People of all ages. Primarily, children under the age of 12 and adults over the age of 48.
- More than 17,000 older adults and 19,000 children/youth participate on an average day.

Where are the Programs Found?

- Programs are found in almost every state, and are evenly distributed among urban, suburban, and rural areas.
- Typically, they are found in public, nonprofit organizations, such as community-based or long-term care-based facilities.

What are the Programs' Characteristics?

Program characteristics (IG activities, staffing, and building use), and the extent to which they are integrated, vary along a continuum of integration. Each site is unique. As they become more integrated, IGSS programs tend to experience more overall benefits.

- At one end of the continuum are co-located programs serving different generations. Participants and staff do not interact and no parts of the building are shared.
- At the other end, are co-located programs with planned, ongoing IG activities, informal IG interaction, an IG coordinator, shared and/or cross-trained staff, and shared building and/or parts of the building.

What are the Programs' Benefits?

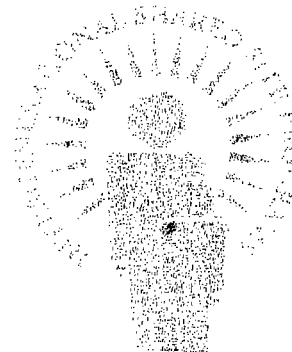
- Enhanced *quality of life* for participants of all ages
- *Positive IG interactions* and improved attitudes about different age groups
- Positive *staff attitudes*
- Positive *public relations/marketing*
- Increased *community involvement*, especially for school-based programs
- Cost savings
- Increased ability to attract *funding*
- Provision of needed *services* for the greater *community*
- Enhanced *employee benefits* package for programs with on-site childcare

Why are Communities Looking for Intergenerational Solutions?

- Communities are less and less willing or able to focus service dollars on one age group; they want solutions that serve the entire community effectively.
- IG approaches can prevent generational conflict caused by the convergence of increased needs for childcare and youth services, and aging services as baby boomers age.
- As schools work to increase community involvement and financial support from older taxpayers, IGSS programs are built-in ways to involve older adults in the schools.
- Politicians and media pit the young and old against each other in an either/or scenario. IG approaches provide opportunities to work together rather than against each other.
- While education and social service programs face dwindling and potentially flat public funding, IGSS programs can increase their ability to attract funding.
