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FOREWORD

The Division of Community Services is pleased to present this report on children placed into out-of-home care in our state. As the reader will note, there was a rapid growth in out-of-home care, particularly foster care, over the period covered in the report. It is our hope that the efforts of this Division and Department, County Departments of Social and Human Services, and private child placing agencies will result in reductions in such placements in the future.

The fact of the matter is, however, that the lives of these children are too important to not take our responsibility seriously or to do what is in our power to secure for them a safe and stable future.

We also appreciate their willingness to listen to and implement the input of staff of the Department.

It is our hope and intent to update the data in this report on a regular basis so that we can all monitor our progress in achieving our mutual goal.

Introduction

This is the first comprehensive report during the 1990s on out-of-home care of children in Wisconsin. The report is based on data from the "Substitute Care Module" of the Human Services Reporting System (HSRS). HSRS data are generated by county and state employees in the course of monitoring the care of children under their supervision, and data are used to meet a variety of state and federal reporting requirements regarding out-of-home care of minors.

Children are placed in out-of-home care in Wisconsin for a number of reasons. Most are placed as Children in Need of Protection or Services (CHIPS), primarily as a result of abuse or neglect by their caregivers. Some are placed due to delinquent behavior or status offenses and a few youth enter out-of-home care settings after a stay in a juvenile correctional facility. Finally, some children enter care under voluntary and time-limited placement arrangements between their caregivers and a social services agency.

HSRS data track the course of all of these children and youth as they move through the out-of-home care system in Wisconsin. Out-of-home care settings include licensed kinship foster homes, foster family homes, treatment foster homes, group homes, and child caring institutions (CCIs). Court-ordered out-of-home placements of children with a non-legally responsible relative who is not a licensed foster parent are not monitored via the HSRS. Furthermore, incarceration in a juvenile correctional facility is not treated as an out-of-home placement within the HSRS.

This report is based on the best information available about children

in out-of-home care in Wisconsin; nevertheless, the data have significant limitations that should be acknowledged. Most importantly, the HSRS provides no information about the role of kin in the provision of out-of-home care. Currently, placement information in the HSRS does not distinguish between placement with licensed relatives and placement with unrelated foster parents; both of these kinds of placements are treated as foster home placements. But kinship care appears to be a major placement resource in Wisconsin. For example, Milwaukee County's own data indicate that over 40% of children in licensed out-of-home care in Milwaukee are living with relatives. There are no data on the extent of licensed kinship care outside Milwaukee County, although it is nearly certain that other counties make far less use of these placements than Milwaukee. Throughout this report reference is made to the difficulty in interpreting various findings because of the uncertain role of licensed kinship care.

The lack of clarity within the HSRS about which foster home placements are with kin and which are not is compounded by the exclusion from the HSRS of unlicensed kinship care. As of 1993, Milwaukee County had approximately 1,400 children placed under court order with non-legally responsible relatives in unlicensed homes. Whereas anecdotal evidence suggests that unlicensed kinship care is not used very extensively outside of Milwaukee County, there are no data available to provide an accurate estimate. At any rate, court-ordered placement of children in the unlicensed homes of relatives constitutes at least 15% of all out-of-home care in Wisconsin. These placements are

excluded from the analyses presented in this report and this should be kept in mind when interpreting the report's findings.

Another problem with HSRS data is the apparent lack of consistency in reporting by the counties. The most problematic aspect of this inconsistency is late reporting of HSRS data. Some counties report HSRS data to the state up to several months after events (e.g., entry to out-of-home care or changes in placement) have taken place in the lives of children in care. This limits the timeliness trend data from the HSRS. For example, one must wait at least six to nine months after the fact to obtain a reasonably accurate picture of how many children were in out-of-home care on a particular day. Although nearly all of the analyses conducted for this report rely on data about events that have taken place long enough in the past to be immune to the problems of late reporting, point-in-time estimates for July 1, 1994, may slightly underestimate the out-of-home care census on that date.

An obvious limitation of the HSRS is the narrow range of information it provides about children in out-of-home care and their families. HSRS includes basic demographic information about children and even more limited information about their parents. In addition, social workers are allowed to record up to three "characteristics" of children and/or their families. Unfortunately, for a number of reasons, workers do not regularly enter this information, rendering it of very limited utility. HSRS data also present little in the way of information about the services children receive while they are in out-of-home care. In terms of services, the HSRS is best used to monitor transitions of children in and

out of care and between placements while in care. Many questions that come to mind about the way in which child, family, and service characteristics contribute to the outcomes of out-of-home care cannot be answered using HSRS data.

Lastly, when reading this report it is important to keep in mind that the creation of HSRS out-of-home care data is just one part of the considerable reporting effort—paperwork—undertaken by child welfare personnel. County-level monitoring activities and data editing procedures at the state level attempt to minimize errors in entry of HSRS data; nevertheless, an unknown number of entry errors are made. Thus, some degree of caution is in order when interpreting the numbers provided in this report.

In spite of the considerable limitations of existing statewide data, this report provides the first broad look at the functioning of the out-of-home care system in Wisconsin. The

report describes trends in the out-of-home care caseload and presents descriptive information about the children who have experienced out-of-home care in Wisconsin since 1988. It also presents data on some significant measures of the functioning of the child welfare system, including the length of time children spend in out-of-home care, placement stability, how children exit care, and the likelihood that they will reenter care at a later date. Differences between out-of-home care in Milwaukee County, and the rest of the state, are highlighted throughout the report. A separate appendix to this report provides selected data on out-of-home care for each county in Wisconsin. It is hoped that the information provided in this report will contribute to a constructive dialogue about the future of services to families and children in Wisconsin, and serve as an illustration of the potential use of administrative data in informing policy and program development.

CHAPTER 1:

Out-of-home care caseload dynamics in Wisconsin

Discussion of out-of-home care caseloads usually starts and ends at the question of size: How many children are in out-of-home care? This information is useful but obscures important aspects of change in the caseload over time. Is the number of children going up over time, or is it going down? How many children are entering care each year and is that number changing? A similar question can be raised about exits from care. In fact, growth or decline in caseload size is due to an interaction of changes in entries and exits over time. For example, entries to care can rise rapidly but this will only affect the overall size of the caseload if exits do not keep pace. An understanding of the dynamics of these changes can be useful to policymakers and program administrators; interventions intended to decrease the number of entries to out-of-home care (e.g., family preservation programs) are quite often different from the interventions aimed at increasing exits (e.g., family reunification or adoption programs). The following tables and figures illustrate aspects of change in the out-of-home care caseload in Wisconsin since the end of 1987.

Since the end of 1987, the out-of-home care caseload in Wisconsin has grown at rate far outstripping the growth in the child population (see Figure 1a). The caseload grew by 57 percent over this period from 4,891 on December 31, 1988 to 7,662 on December 31, 1993. The most rapid period of growth took place between the end of 1988 and the beginning of 1991; the rate of growth was about 10 percent per year during this period. Since 1991 the caseload has grown at about 4 percent per year.

Since 1987, the out-of-home care caseload in Milwaukee County has grown from 35 percent of the overall state caseload to over half of the overall caseload (see Figure 1a). In fact, caseload growth in Milwaukee County accounted for 80 percent of statewide caseload growth since

1987. It is also likely that the inclusion of unlicensed kinship foster in these numbers would increase Milwaukee County's contribution to caseload growth. However, Figures 1c through 1f show that caseload activity (i.e., entries and exits) has actually been much lower in Milwaukee County over this period than in the balance of the state.

Both entries and exits to out-of-home care have been considerably lower and have grown at a lower rate in Milwaukee County than in the rest of the state (Figures 1b and 1c). The annual number of entries to out-of-home care in the balance of the state have ranged from about four to nearly five times as many as in Milwaukee County. In 1993, Milwaukee County accounted for over half of the out-of-home care caseload but only 20 percent of all entries. A similar disparity exists for exits from out-of-home care; between 1988 and 1993, from five to nearly seven times as many children exited care in the balance of the state as in Milwaukee County. Milwaukee County accounted for only 17 percent of all exits from out-of-home care in 1993.

If caseload activity in Milwaukee County is so much lower than in the rest of the state, then why has Milwaukee County accounted for most of the growth in out-of-home care? Figures 1d through 1f provide an answer. Figure 1d illustrates the components of caseload growth in the State of Wisconsin over the five-year period. Of particular interest is the graph line showing the difference between entries and exits in a given year. This line represents the increase or decrease in the statewide caseload from the end of one year to the end of the next. The numbers in the table are all positive, reflecting the fact that entries exceeded exits in every year resulting in net caseload growth.

Figure 1e shows the relatively low level of caseload activity in Milwaukee County along with the rapid

increase in the total out-of-home care caseload. The reason for rapid caseload growth is that the number of entries to care was larger than the number of exits in every year, in spite of the fact that entries actually declined from 1989 to 1992. Figure 1f shows a much different picture; in the balance of the state, high caseload activity was coupled with a relatively modest difference between entries and exits and a correspondingly small increase in caseload size.

Of interest to child welfare program administrators and practitioners alike is monthly or seasonal variation in caseload activity. There has long

been anecdotal information suggesting that holidays and school calendars affect transitions in and out of out-of-home care. Figure 1g shows the average number of entries and exits to out-of-home care by month in the State of Wisconsin between 1988 and 1993. There is much more variability in exits over the course of a year than in entries. In particular, there are spurts of exits in June and August corresponding to the beginning and end of Summer. Entries to out-of-home care, although relatively stable compared to exits, do have a low point at the end of the year followed by a high point in January.

There is significant regional variation in monthly caseload activity. Figures 1h and 1i show average monthly caseload in Milwaukee County and the balance of the state respectively. Entries in both areas exhibit a low point at the end of the year followed by a rebound to a relatively high point in January. In contrast, the seasonal increases in exits that are observed at a statewide level are almost entirely a function of caseload activity outside of Milwaukee County.

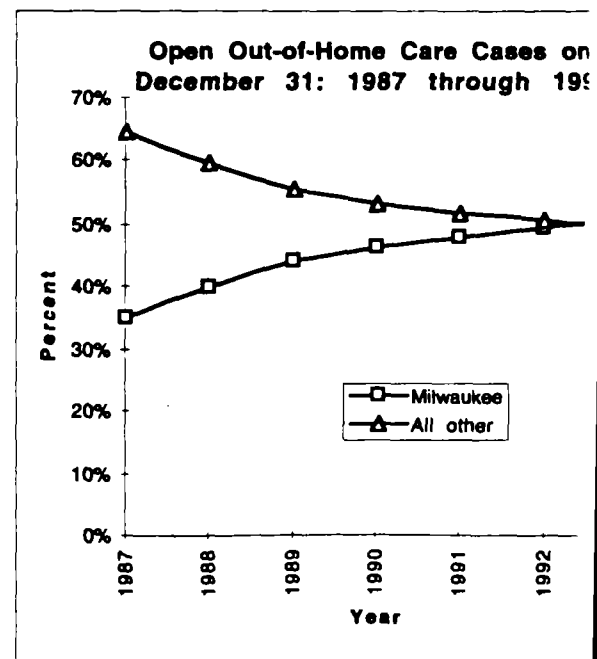
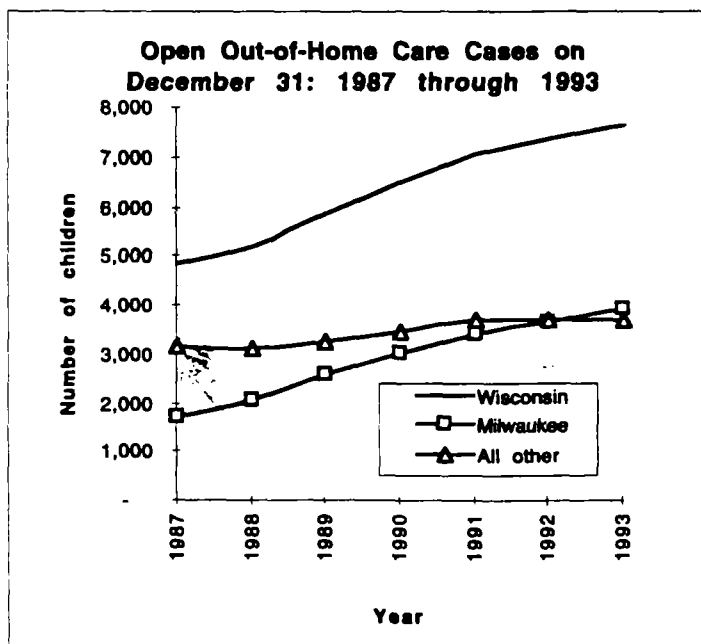

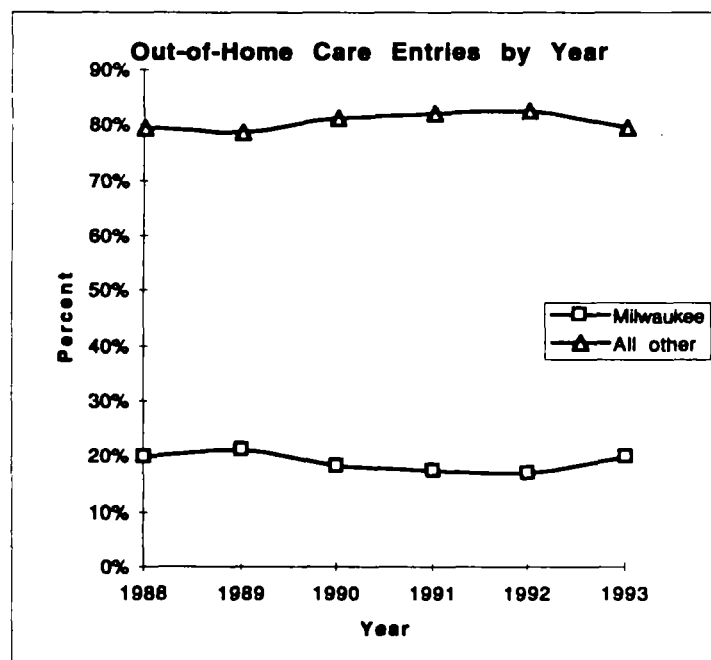
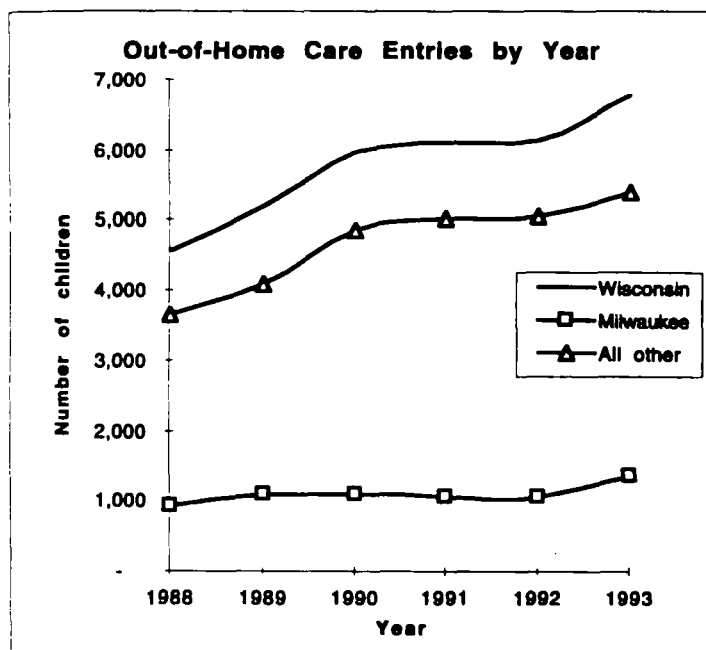

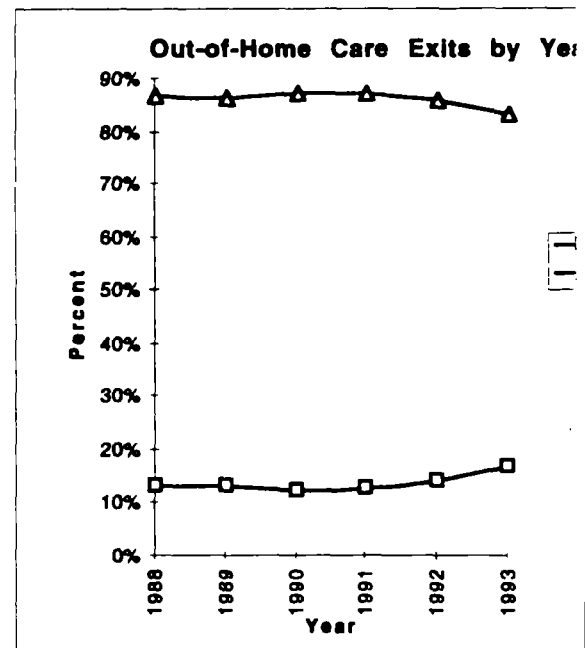
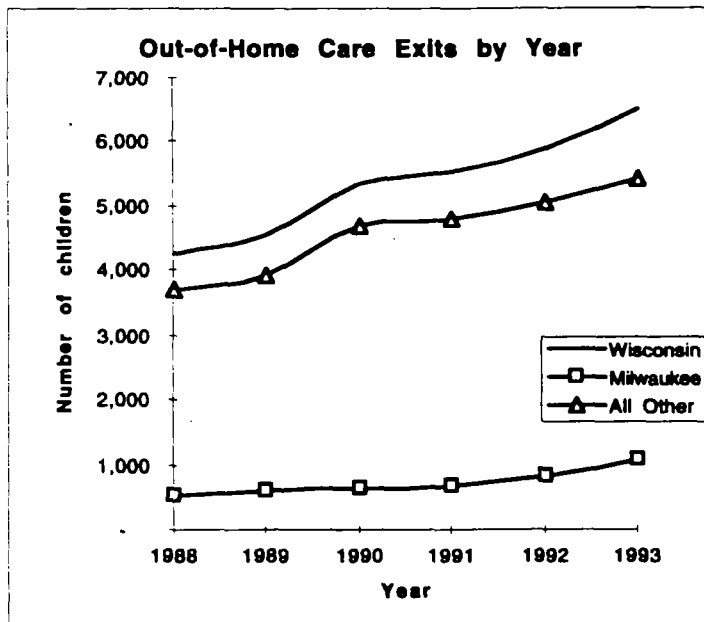

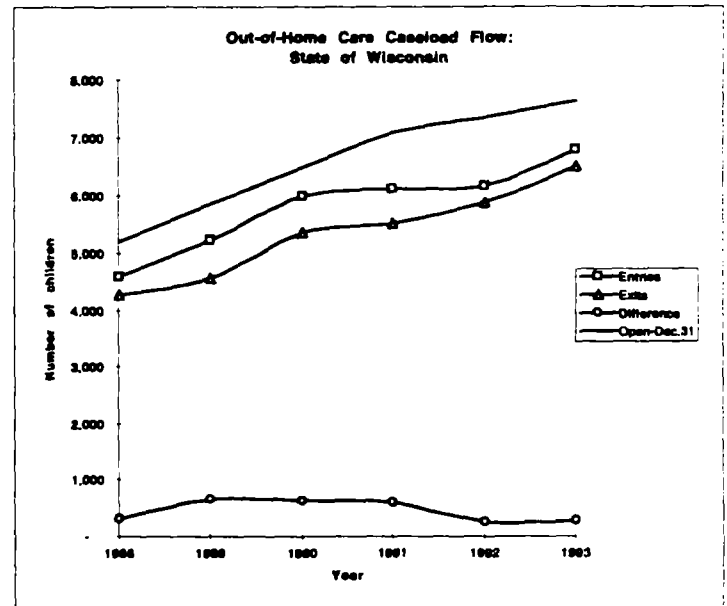

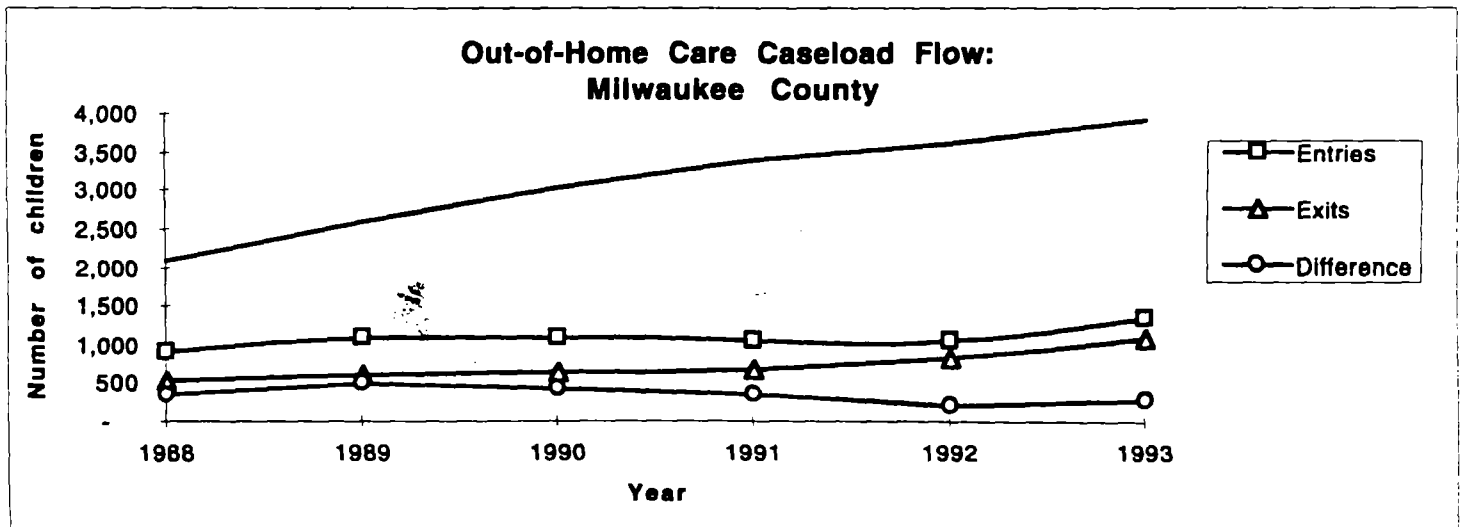

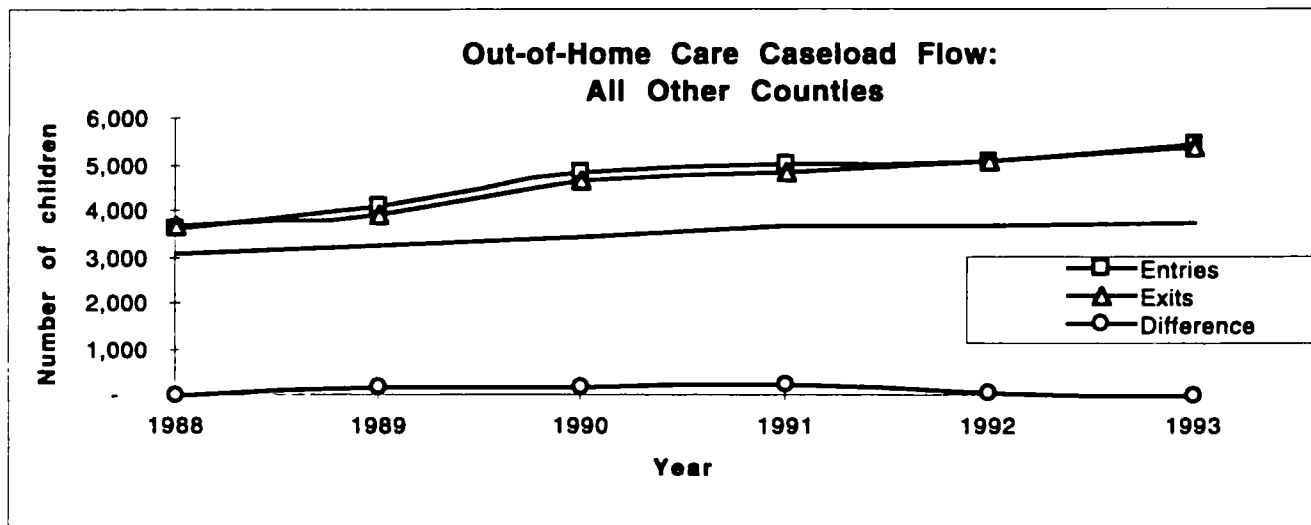

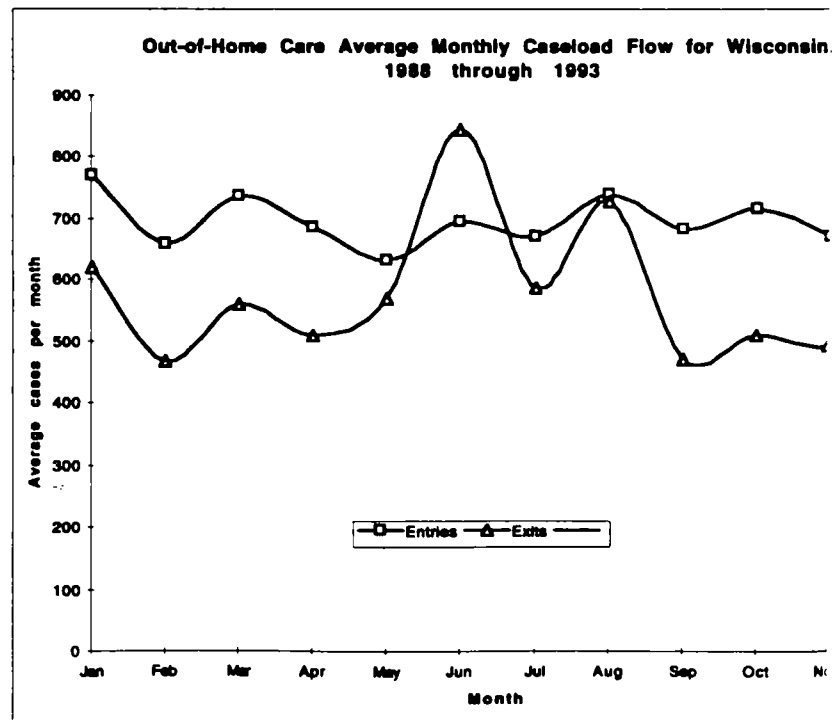

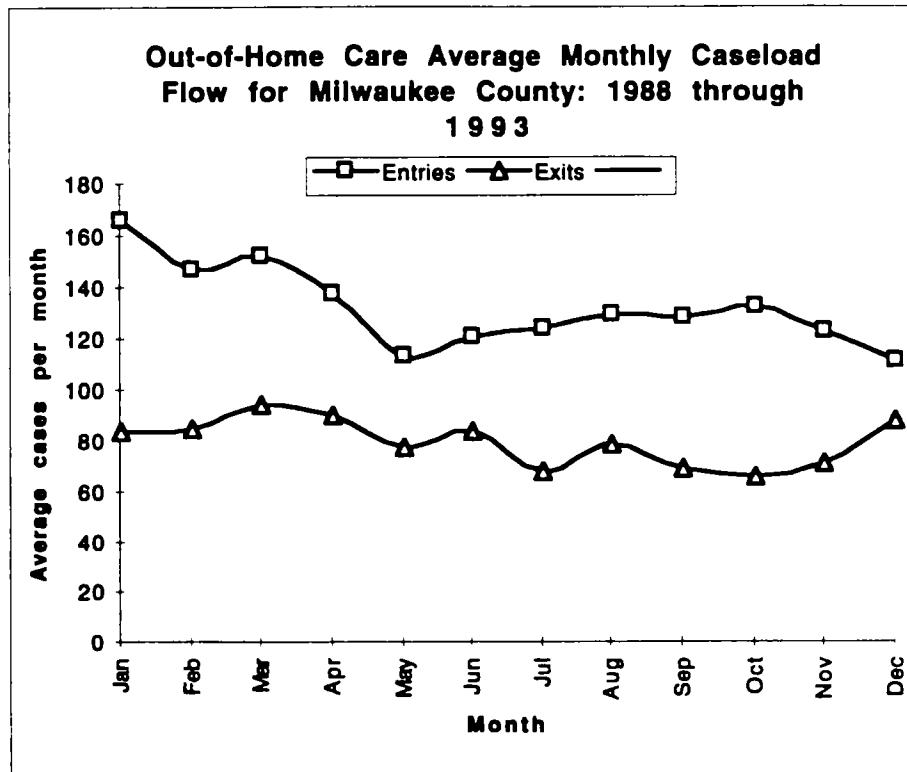

CHAPTER 2:

Characteristics of the out-of-home care population in Wisconsin

What are the characteristics of children in out-of-home care in Wisconsin? Have there been changes over time in the attributes of children entering care? This chapter uses HSRS data on the gender, race/ethnicity, age and placement type of children who have been in out-of-home care in Wisconsin in order to help answer the questions raised above.¹

Out-of-Home Care Prevalence

A comparison of 1990 United States Census data with out-of-home care caseload data from December 31, 1990 provides a measure of out-of-home care prevalence in Wisconsin. Figures 2a and 2b show foster care prevalence rates for Wisconsin by race/ethnicity and age group. Overall, 6.27 children per 1,000 in Wisconsin lived in out-of-home care at the end of 1990. Variation by race is large. Out-of-home care prevalence for African Americans is over five times that of Whites and the rate for Native Americans is over three times that of Whites. Variation by age group in out-of-home care prevalence is not nearly as great as that associated with race/ethnicity. Older teens have the highest level of out-of-home care placement at 8.28 per thousand children. In contrast, 4.98 children per thousand between 12 and 14 years old lived in out-of-home care at the end of 1990. This group had the lowest out-of-home care prevalence.

Children in Out-of-Home Care on July 1, 1994

Figures 2c through 2m provide recent point-in-time estimates of the characteristics of children living in Wisconsin. Figure 2c indicates that 7,873 children were living in out-of-home care in Wisconsin on July 1, 1994. About 53 percent of these children were placed by the Milwaukee County Department of Social Services with the remainder being placed by other jurisdictions.

Table 2c describes the characteristics of children who entered care

during 1994 as recorded by caseworkers.² The most common child characteristic reported by Milwaukee County workers was neglect whereas delinquency and those held in need of protection or services appeared to be the most common entrants to out-of-home care in the remainder of the state.

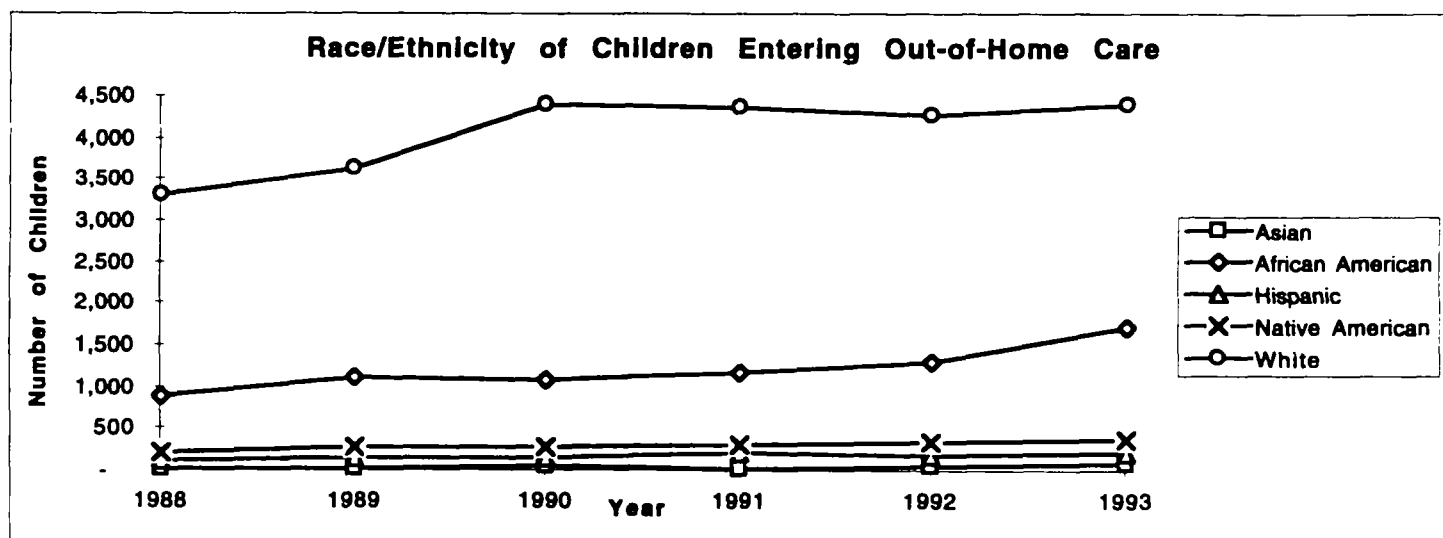


FIGURE 2U(2).

The age distribution of children in out-of-home care varies considerably by region as illustrated in Figure 2d. Nearly two-thirds of children in out-of-home care in Wisconsin are twelve years old. However, children dominate the out-of-home care population much more in Milwaukee than in the rest of the state. Seventy percent of children in out-of-home care in Milwaukee County in July 1994 were 12 years old in contrast to 40 percent of children elsewhere. Younger children 15 years old are the largest group of children in out-of-home care outside of Milwaukee County, accounting for 37 percent of the overall population in care.

Males account for 54 percent of all children in out-of-home care in Wisconsin (Figure 2e). However, the difference is largely a result of a much larger number of males than females in out-of-home care in Milwaukee County. Males and females each account for about half of the out-of-home care population in Milwaukee.

Figure 2f shows the distribution of children in out-of-home care by race/ethnicity in the State of Wisconsin, Milwaukee County and the balance of the state. The overwhelming majority of children in out-of-home care in Milwaukee County are African American whereas Whites dominate the caseload in the balance of the state. Hispanics and Asians make up relatively small percentages in all regions. Native Americans account for six percent of the caseload in Milwaukee County but only one percent inside the county.

¹ Analyses presented in this section of the report were conducted at various points in time over several months. Therefore, as a consequence of late reporting of HSRS data by some counties, the total number of children in care reported in some figures is slightly lower than in others.

² Workers are allowed to list up to three characteristics for each child in care in the HSRS, but in practice few list more than one, particularly in Milwaukee County. Table 2c shows that social workers listed a total of 9,085 characteristics for the 7,412 children who entered out-of-home care in Wisconsin in 1994. As a result, percentage totals for columns in Table 2c exceed 100 percent.

Over four-fifths of the children in out-of-home care in Wisconsin live in foster family care while smaller numbers live in group homes or child caring institutions (CCIs). Figure 2g shows the placement distribution for children in out-of-home care in Wisconsin. Congregate care settings, particularly group homes, are less common placements for children from Milwaukee County than for children from the remainder of the state; 26 percent of children in out-of-home care outside of Milwaukee County are in group homes or CCIs whereas only eight percent of such children in Milwaukee County are in congregate care.

Figures 2h through 2k show placement arrangements by age group for children who were in out-of-home care in Wisconsin on July 1, 1994. Two patterns emerge in these figures. First, older children are more likely to reside in congregate care settings (i.e., group homes and CCIs) than young children. Whereas only a handful of children in out-of-home care under 5 years old live in congregate care settings, over 40 percent of those over 15 do so. Second, Milwaukee County makes much less use of congregate care than do other jurisdictions. Much of the relatively high level of usage of congregate care outside of Milwaukee is no doubt a reflection of the predominance of older children and youth on the caseloads of these counties; nevertheless, for each age group of children in out-of-home care, a smaller proportion in Milwaukee County live in congregate care than the proportion living in these settings in the rest of the state.

Figures 2l and 2m show placement arrangements by race/ethnicity for children who were in out-of-home care in Wisconsin on July 1, 1994. In Milwaukee County, White children are much more likely than African Americans, Hispanics or Native Americans to be placed in a CCI, and more likely than Native Americans or African Americans to be placed in a group home. Al-

though Asians appear to be the most likely group to be placed in congregate care in Milwaukee, their numbers in care are too small to draw any firm conclusions.

The relationship between race/ethnicity and placement type outside of Milwaukee County is much more complex. All groups are placed in congregate care in relatively high numbers, from a low of about 18 percent of all placements for African Americans and Hispanics, to a high of about 40 percent of placements for Asians. The ratio of group home placement to CCI placement varies considerably, however, from one group to the next. Asians and Hispanics are somewhat more likely to be placed in group homes than in CCIs whereas the opposite is true for African Americans. Native Americans and Whites are about as likely to be placed in group homes as in CCIs.

Trends in the Characteristics of Children Entering Out-of-Home Care

Knowledge of trends in the characteristics of children entering out-of-home care is useful in gauging emerging service needs. Figures 2n through 2y illustrate trends in the age, gender, race/ethnicity and placement type of children entering care over a six-year period.

Overall, the proportion of children entering care since 1988 who were under five years old when they entered care has been relatively constant at slightly under one-fourth of entrants (Figure 2n). In contrast, children between the ages of five and 15 have made up a growing proportion of entrants to out-of-home care, now accounting for 45 percent of entrants. The proportion of children entering out-of-home care who are over 15 has declined since 1988. The most notable difference in the age distribution of entry cohorts between Milwaukee County and the rest of the state (Figures 2o and 2p) concerns the age group

representing the largest proportion of entrants; in Milwaukee, young children (under five years old) make up the largest group of entrants, whereas youth over the age of 15 are the largest group of new entrants in the rest of the state.

Between 1988 and 1993, there was a slight increase in the proportion of entrants to out-of-home care who were male (Figure 2q). This reflects a growing difference in the proportions of males and females entering care outside of Milwaukee County (Figures 2r and 2s). In Milwaukee County the proportion of females entering care actually exceeded that of males in 1993.

Since 1988, African Americans have made up an increasing proportion of children entering out-of-home care in Wisconsin while Whites have made up a decreasing proportion of entrants (Figure 2t). These trends are consistent across regions of the state (Figures 2u and 2v). Other racial and ethnic groups have contributed small and fairly stable proportions of children entering care.

Since 1988 Wisconsin has seen a small gradual increase in the proportion of first placements in out-of-home care accounted for by foster homes, and a corresponding decrease in the proportion of first placements accounted for by CCIs (Figure 2w). Although foster homes have not grown rapidly as a proportion of all first placements, the absolute number of first placements per year in foster homes grew by nearly 1,800 between 1988 and 1993. Virtually all of the shift from congregate care to foster care has taken place in Milwaukee County (Figure 2x); in the remainder of the state placement patterns have remained largely stable for the past six years, though absolute numbers of placements have increased (Figure 2y). It may be the case that much of the growth in foster care in Milwaukee County in recent years reflects growth in kinship care.

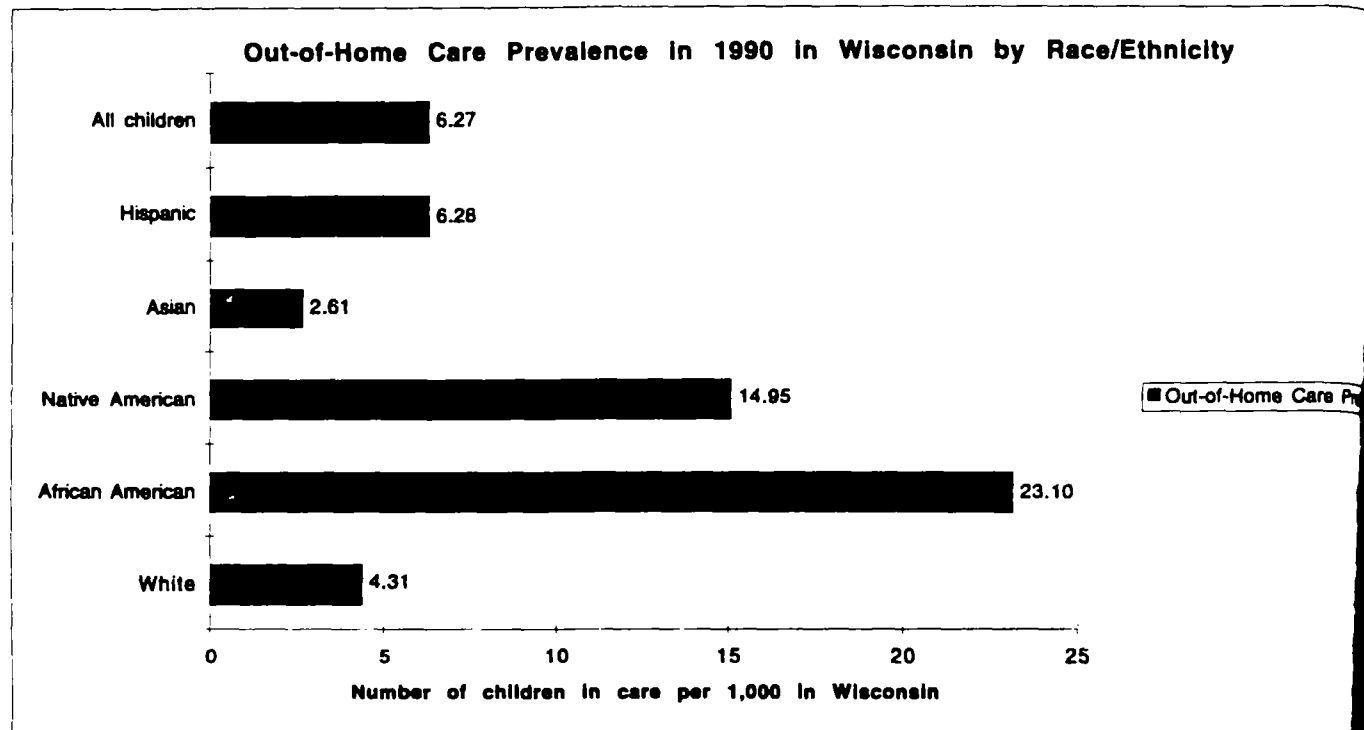
Out-of-Home Care Prevalence in 1990 in Wisconsin by Race/Ethnicity

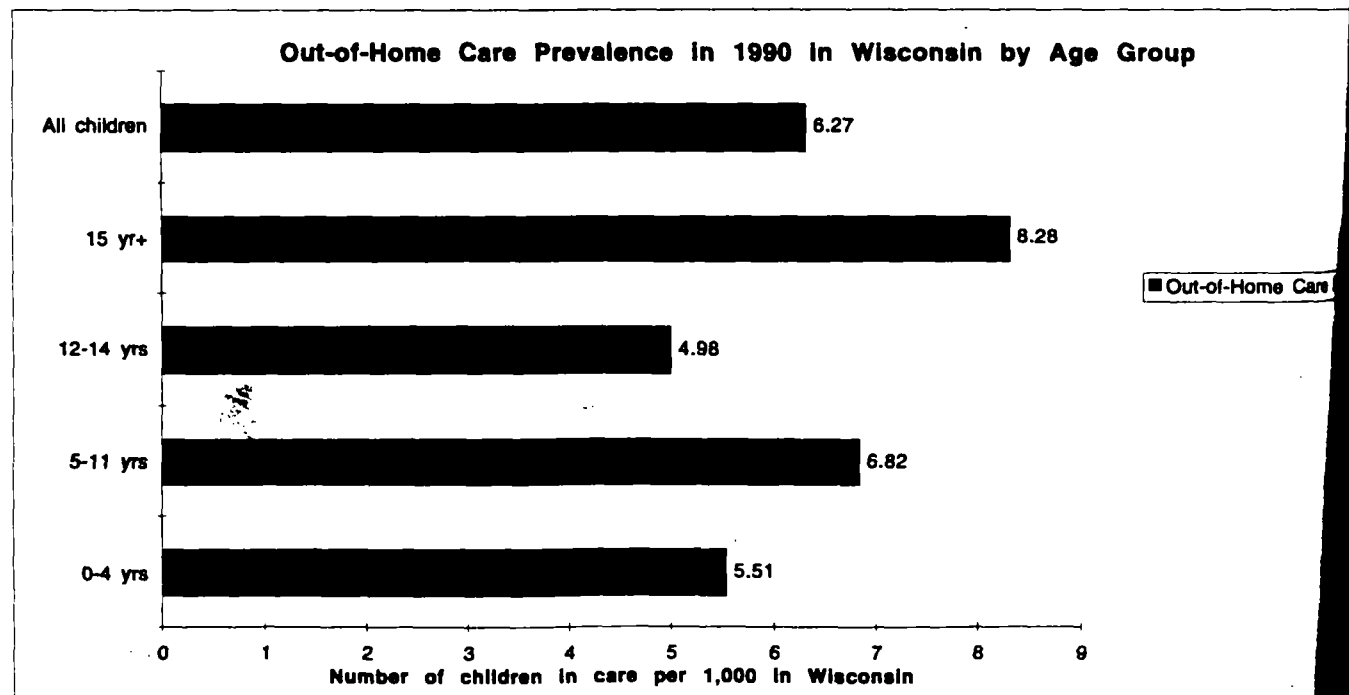
Out-of-Home Care Prevalence in 1990 in Wisconsin by Age Group

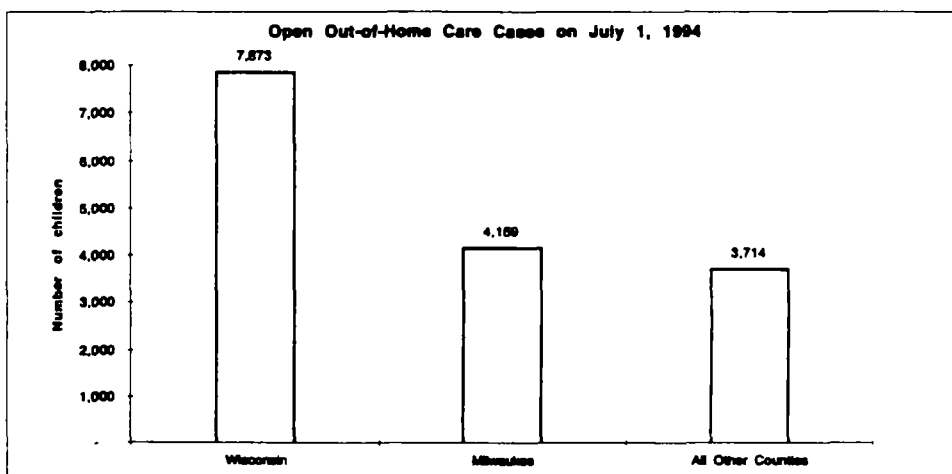

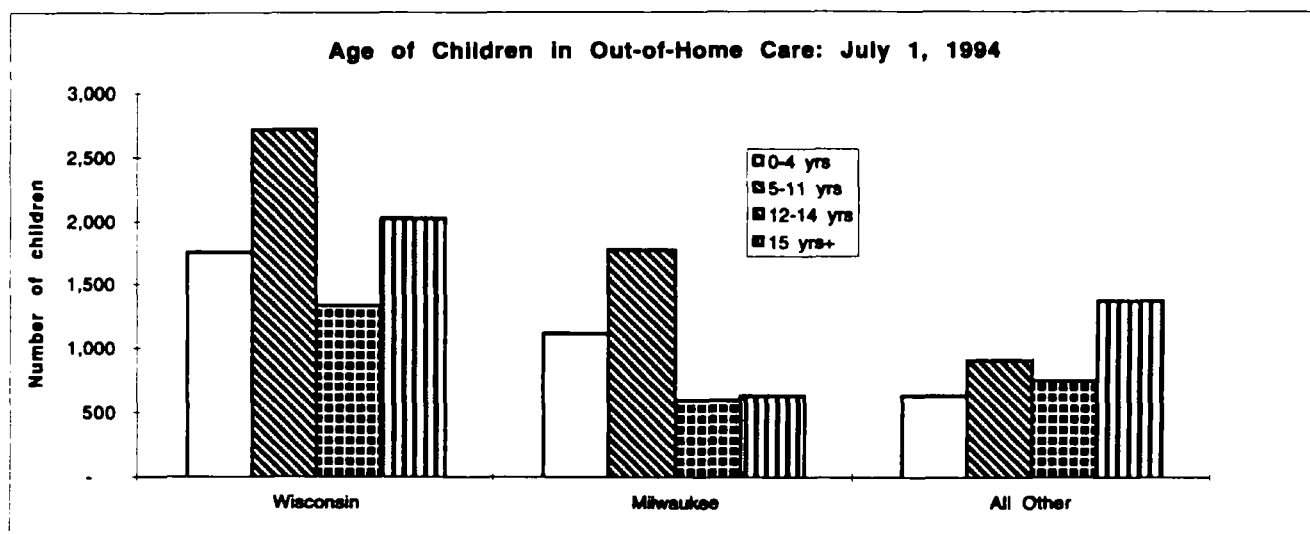

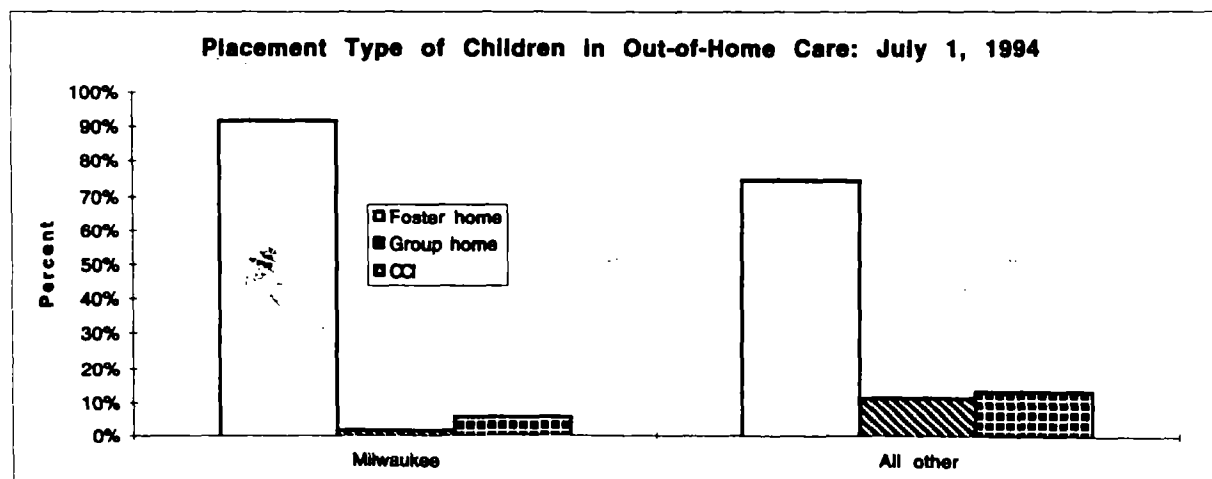

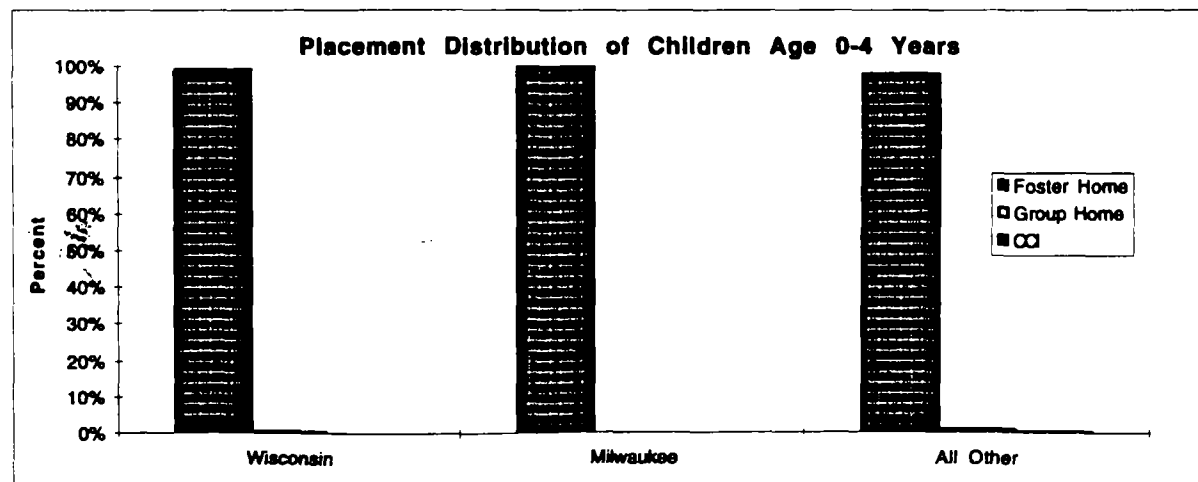

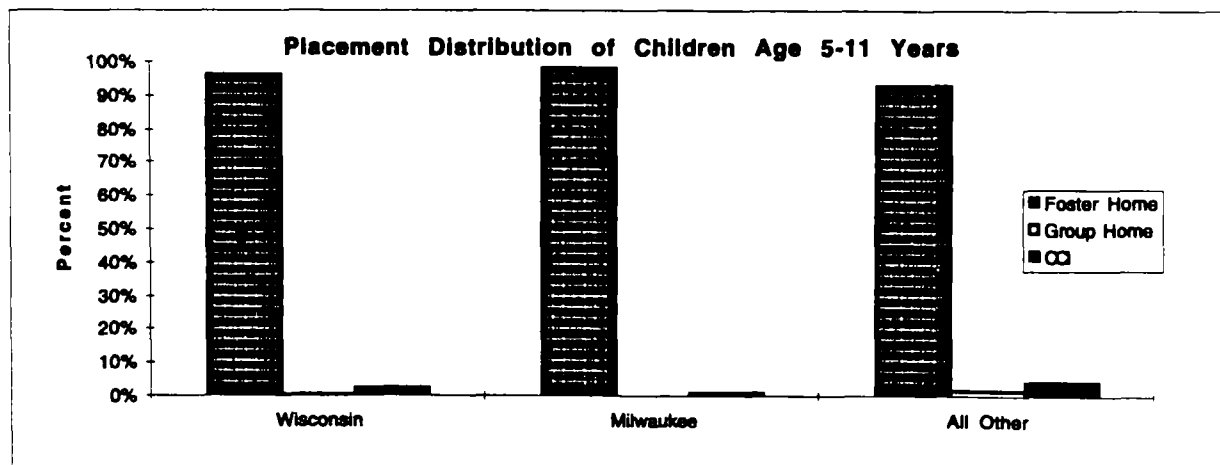

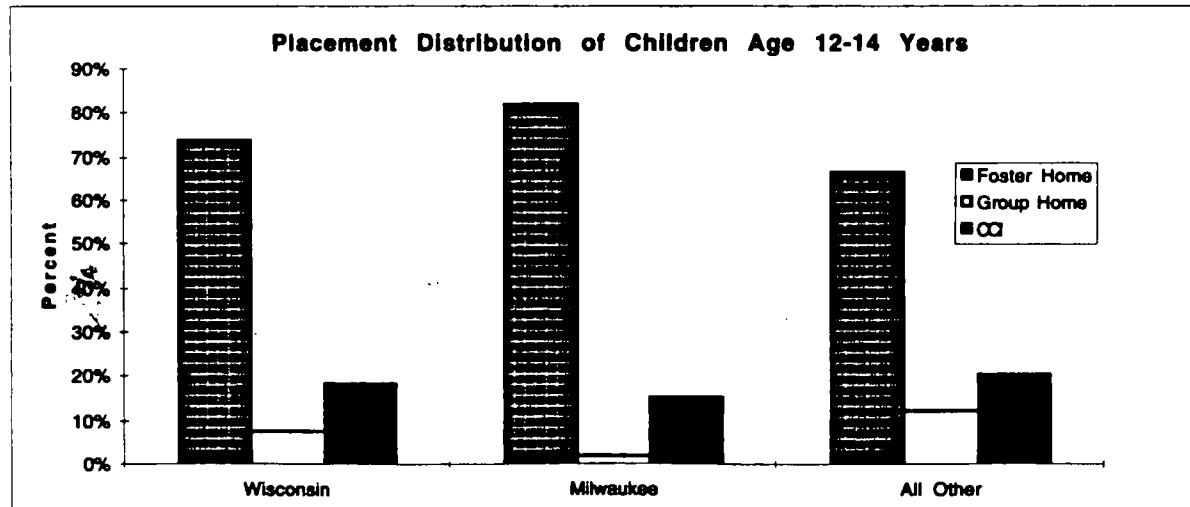

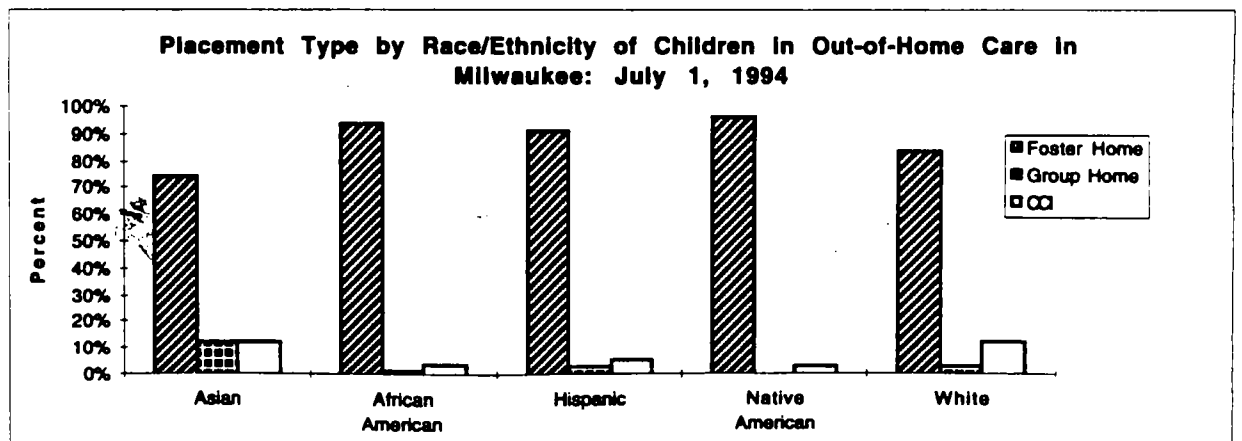

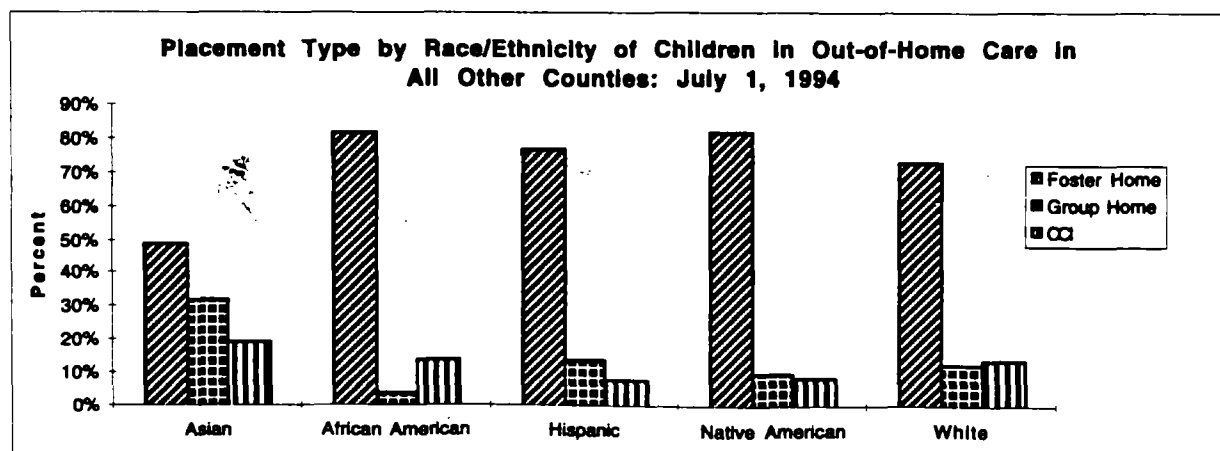

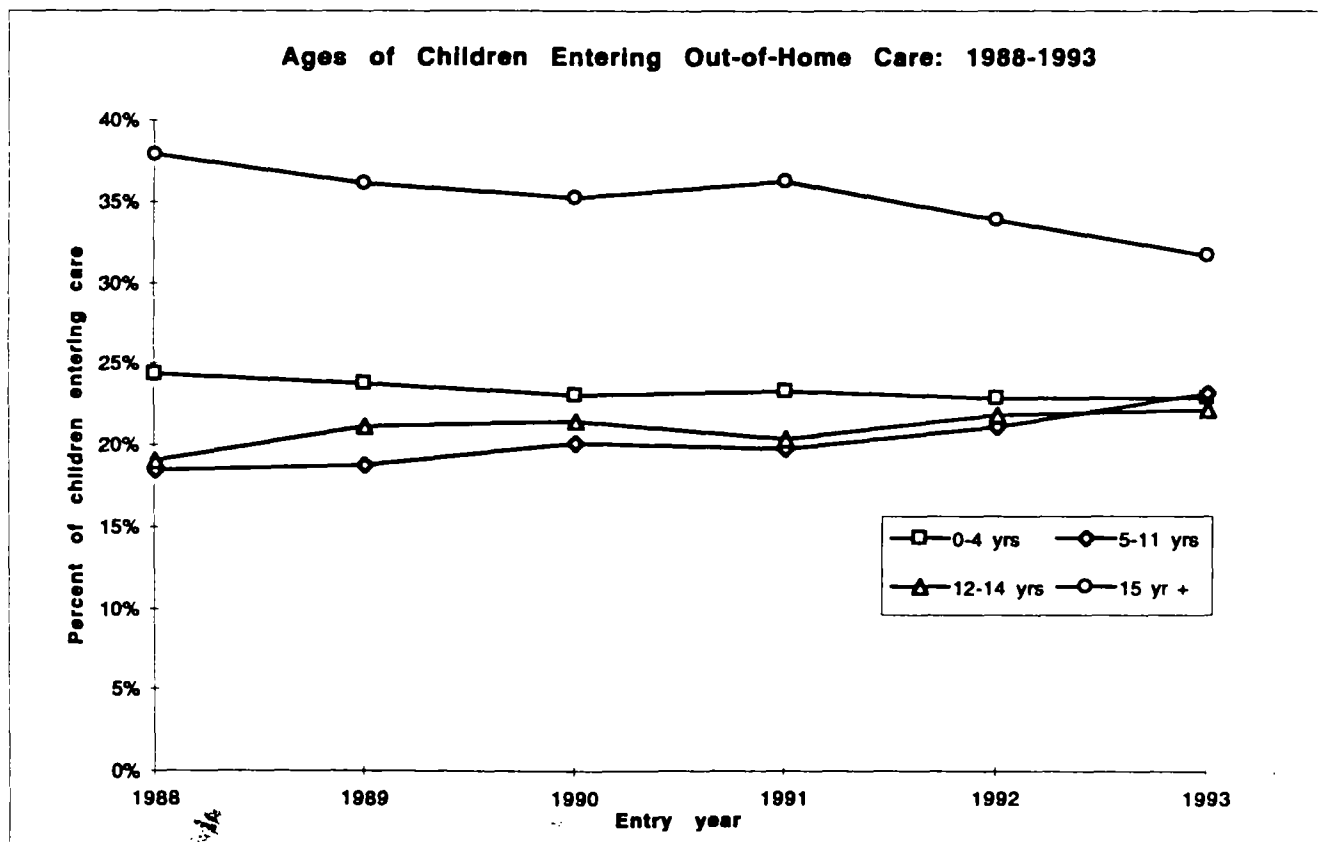

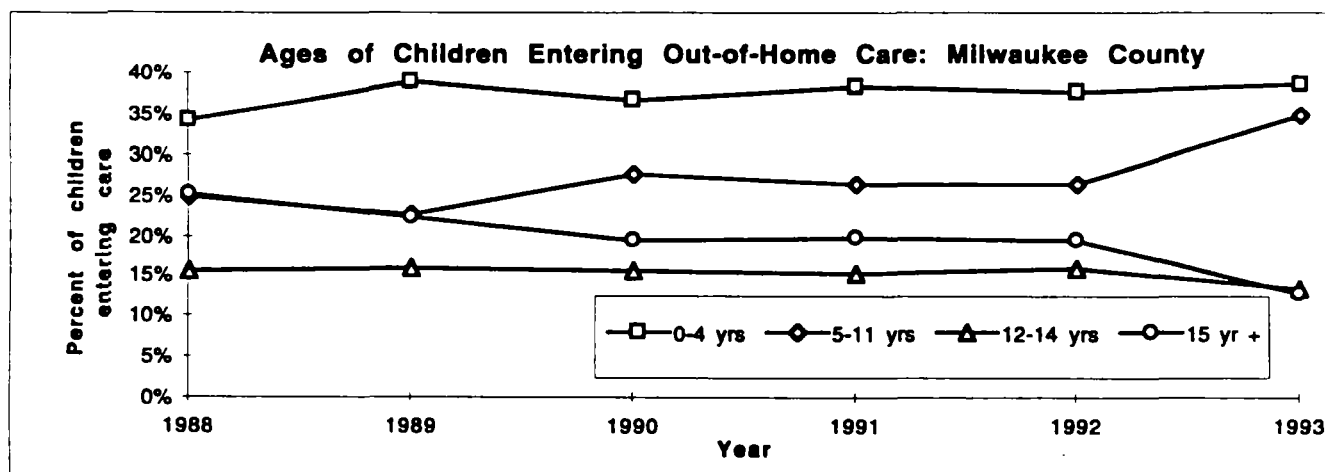

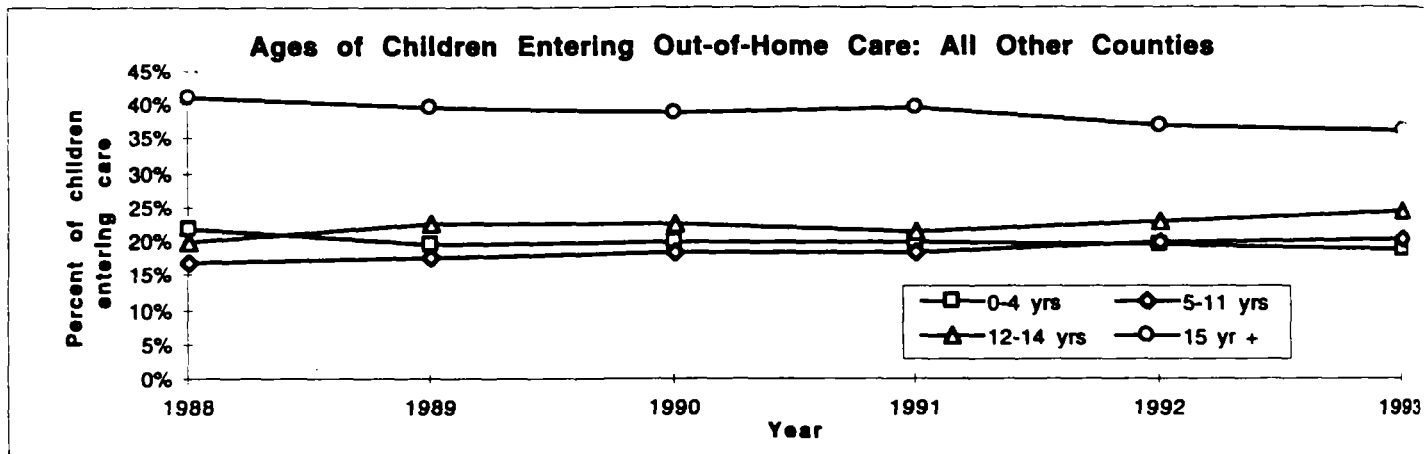

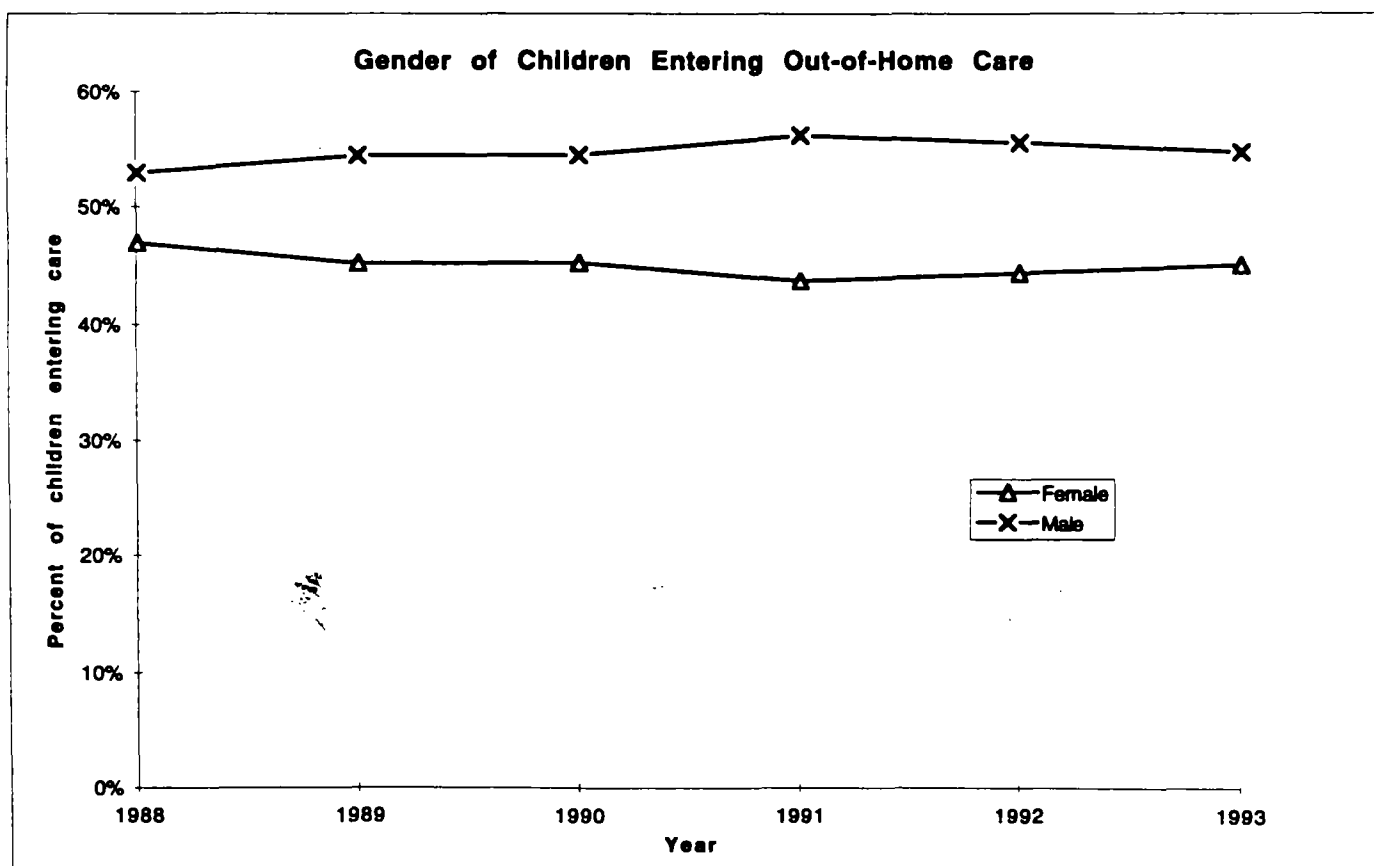

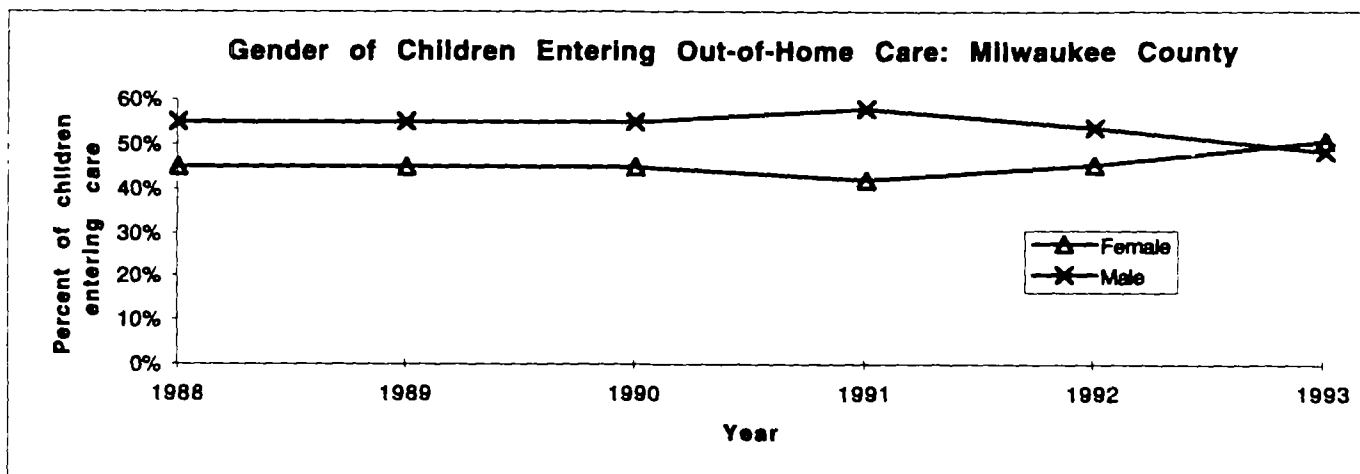

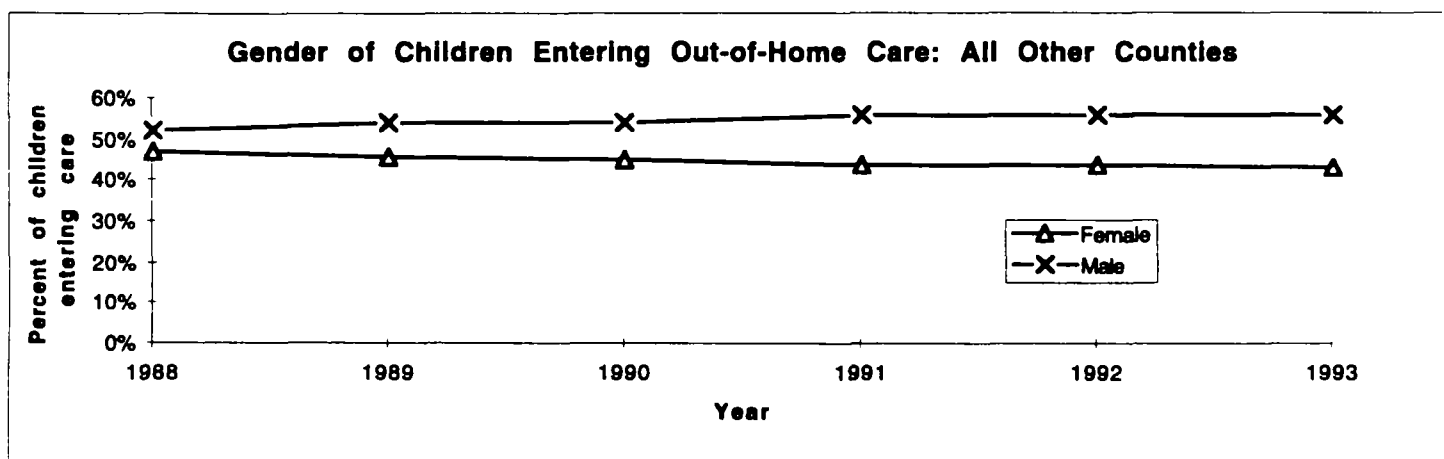

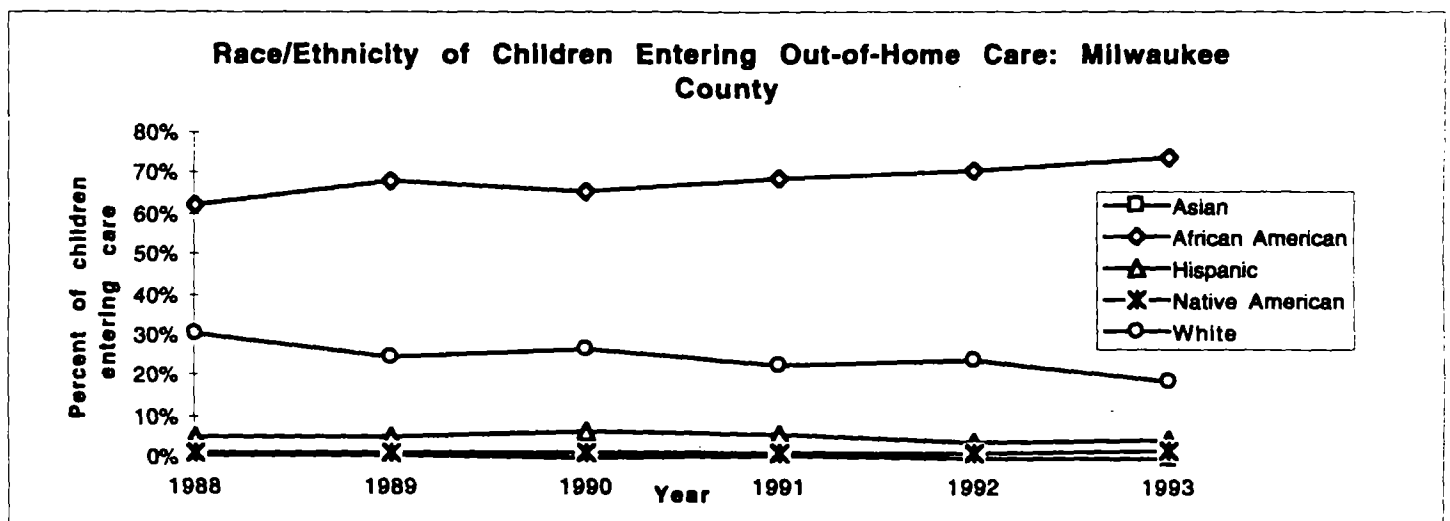


FIGURE 2V(1).

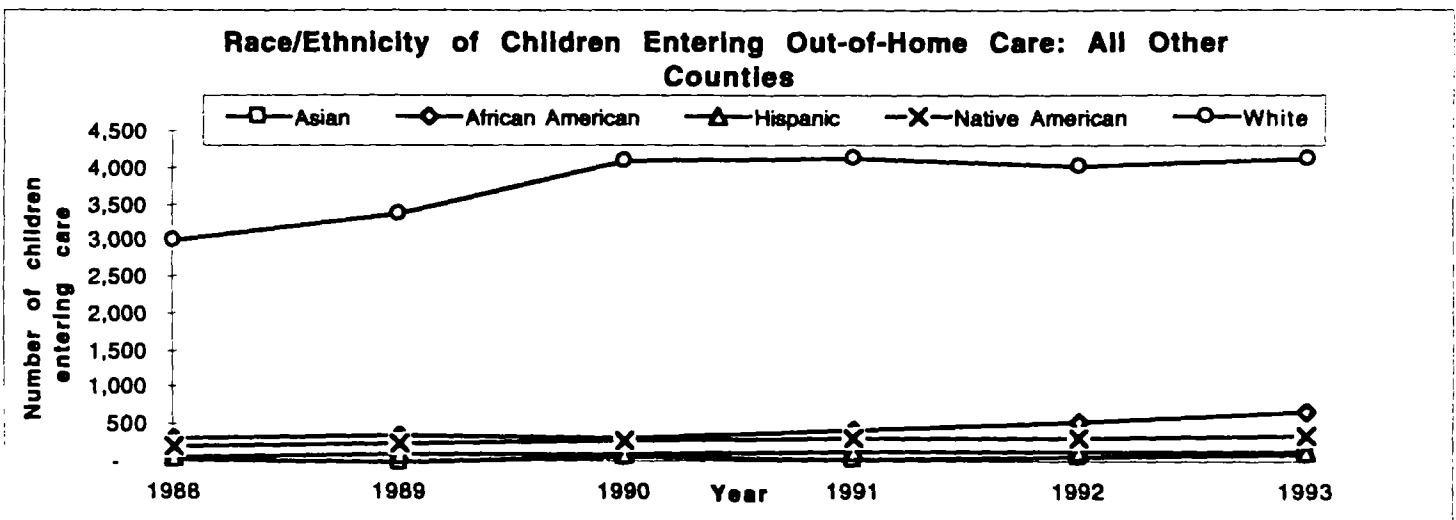

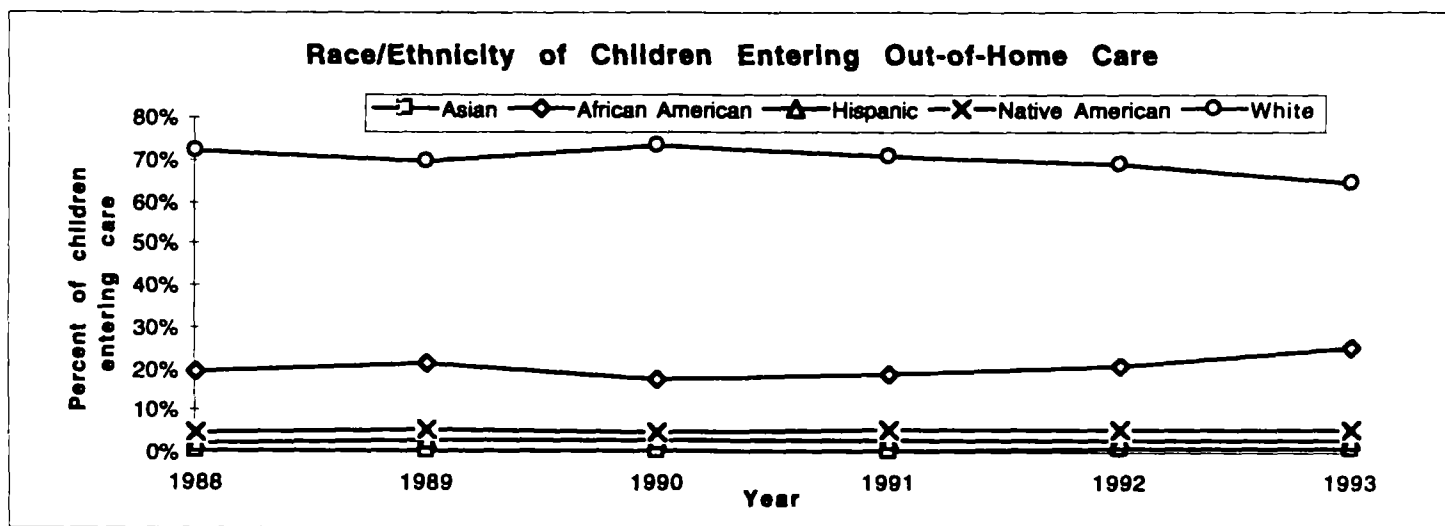


FIGURE 2U(1).

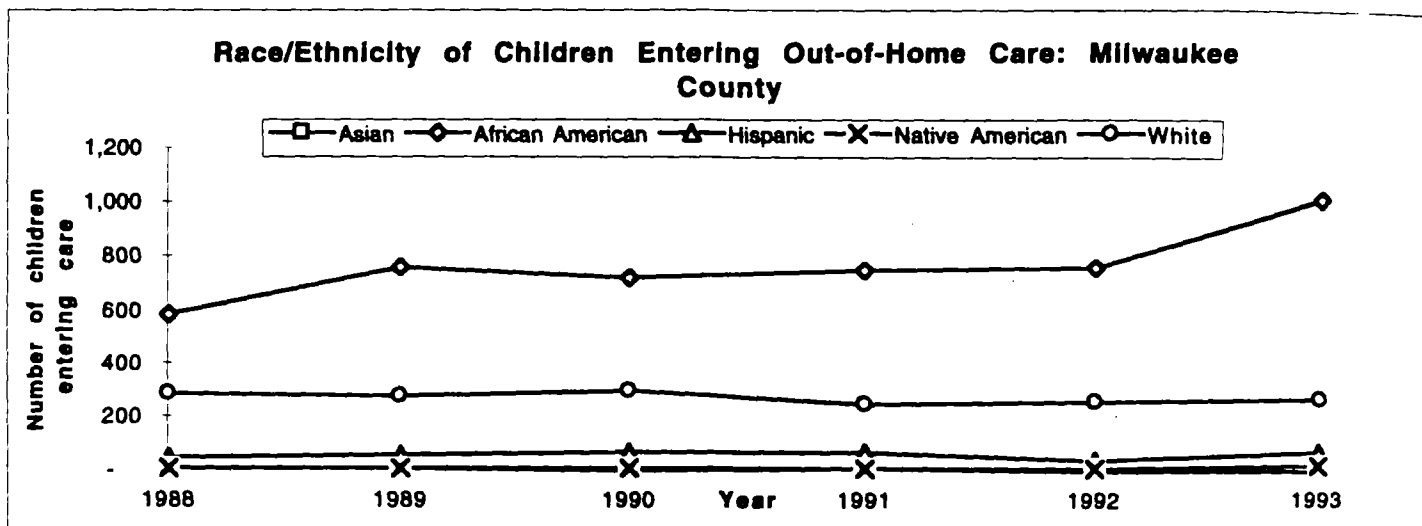


FIGURE 2V(2).

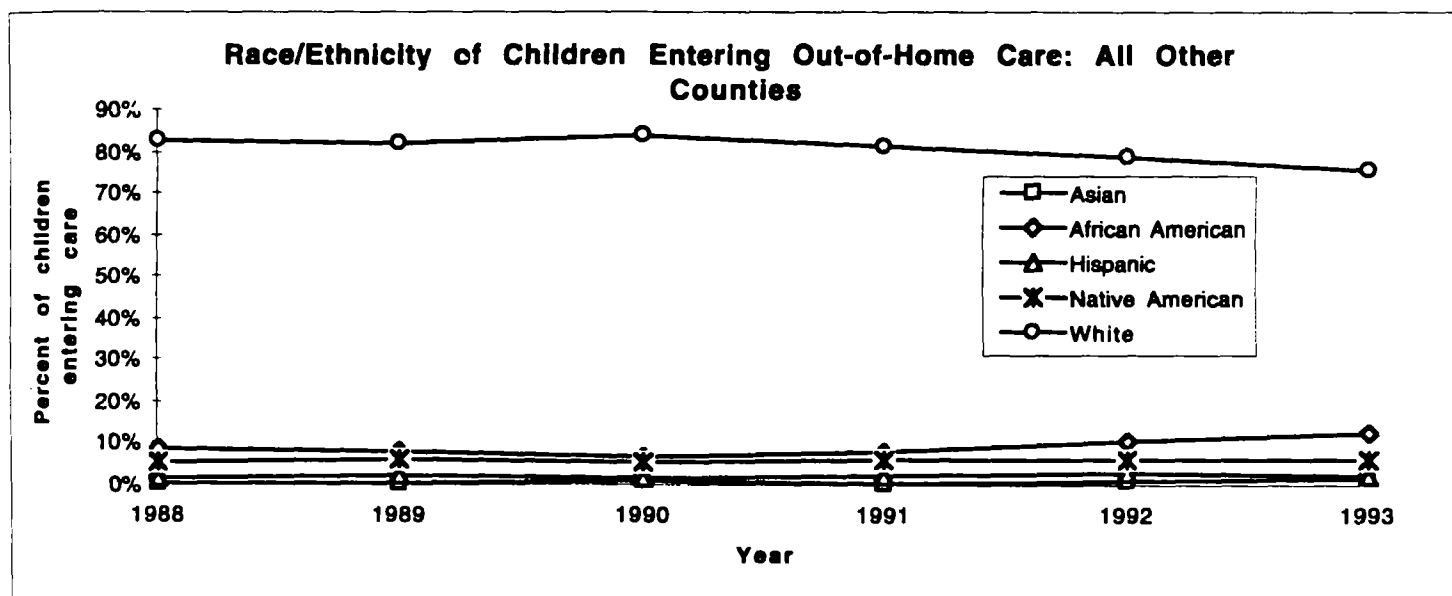

CHAPTER 3:

Length of stay of children in out-of-home care in Wisconsin

One of the most common measures of the functioning of the out-of-home care system is the length of time children spend in care before exiting. Although long-term foster care placement is an acceptable permanency plan for many children, particularly older youth preparing for interdependent living, the assumption is that most children entering out-of-home care should be reunified with their families or adopted in a timely manner. This common wisdom should be regarded with caution, however, in that children entering out-of-home care are not a homogeneous group; differences in length of stay are often a reflection of the variability in circumstances facing families, children, and child welfare agencies.

Although a point-in-time measure of "average length of stay" in days or months is often used to describe the process of exit from out-of-home care, this measure can be very misleading. For a number of reasons it tends to result in a biased overestimate of placement duration. Because of this, in examining length of stay this report relies on estimates of the proportion of children who have left out-of-home care at specific points in time after having entered care. This method allows for graphic representation of the exit process in out-of-home care and for comparison of the exit rate for various sub-populations. Figures 3a through 3f plot the proportion of children remaining in a first episode in out-of-home care at various points in time after initial placement. The figures also show the percent of children remaining in care at 3, 6, 12, 18 and 36 months respectively.

Figure 3a illustrates the overall exit process in out-of-home care in Wisconsin. Most stays are of short duration; 35 percent of children leave care within 3 months and nearly half within six-months. However, the rate of exit slows down rapidly after about six months. More children exit care in the first 3 months than do so in the following year.

Figure 3b shows that the rate of exit in Milwaukee County is much slower than in the rest of the state. In fact, the exit rate in Milwaukee County is never very high and decreases over time; over the past six years 38 percent of children entering out-of-home care in Milwaukee County have remained in care at least 18 months and nearly half for three years or longer. In contrast, over half of all children entering out-of-home care in the remainder of the state leave care within six months, and about 83 percent are home within 18 months. Data on foster care length of stay from other states show that children placed in kinship foster homes stay in care longer than children placed in traditional foster family homes. Therefore, it is likely that at least some of the difference in observed length of stay between Milwaukee and the rest of the state is due to Milwaukee's heavier reliance on kinship care.

Length of stay in out-of-home care varies significantly by race, but this is largely a function of the difference in exit rates between Milwaukee County and the balance of Wisconsin. Figure 3c illustrates differences in the proportion of various race/ethnic groups remaining in care at selected points in time after entering care. African Americans have much longer stays in care on average than any other group. Hispanics stay somewhat longer than Asians, Native Americans and Whites, but much shorter than African Americans.

These estimates of length of stay are deceptive, however, because they do not account for the vast regional variation in the racial and ethnic makeup of Wisconsin's population. Figures 3d and 3e illustrate the confounding relationship of race and region using the difference in exit rates between African Americans and Whites as an example. Although differences in out-of-home care duration between these groups are still apparent in both Milwaukee and the rest of the

state, the differences are much smaller than those observed at the statewide level. This is because most of the observed difference in length of stay between African Americans and Whites, and to a similar extent Hispanics and Whites, results from the fact that most African Americans and Hispanics in out-of-home care live in Milwaukee County while most Whites live outside of Milwaukee.

Younger children entering out-of-home care in Wisconsin are staying in care longer in all regions of the state (Figure 3f). About a third of children in all age groups exit care within three months, but the younger children who remain in care after that point are much less likely to exit care than their relatively older counterparts. This is a particularly troubling trend for very young children since they are in a position

to spend most or all of their childhood in out-of-home care if another permanent home cannot be found. Over one fourth of children who enter out-of-home care in Wisconsin when they are under the age of five will remain in care for at least three years.

Gender does not appear to be significantly related to length of stay in out-of-home care in Wisconsin.

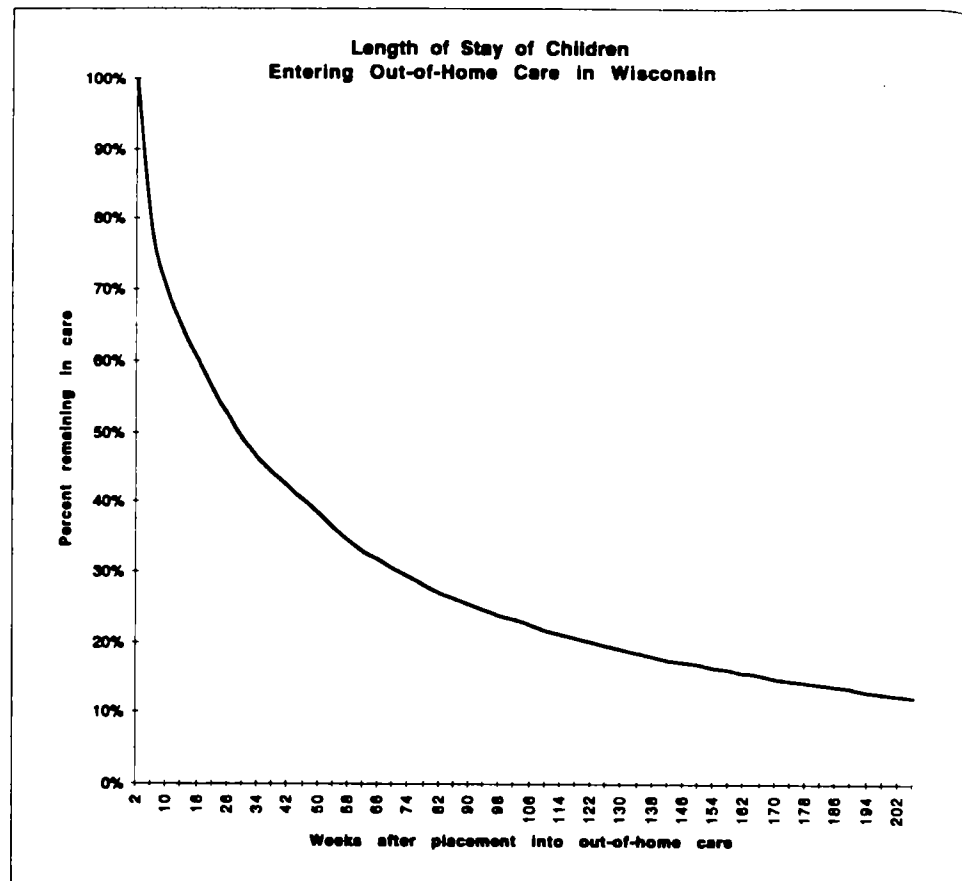

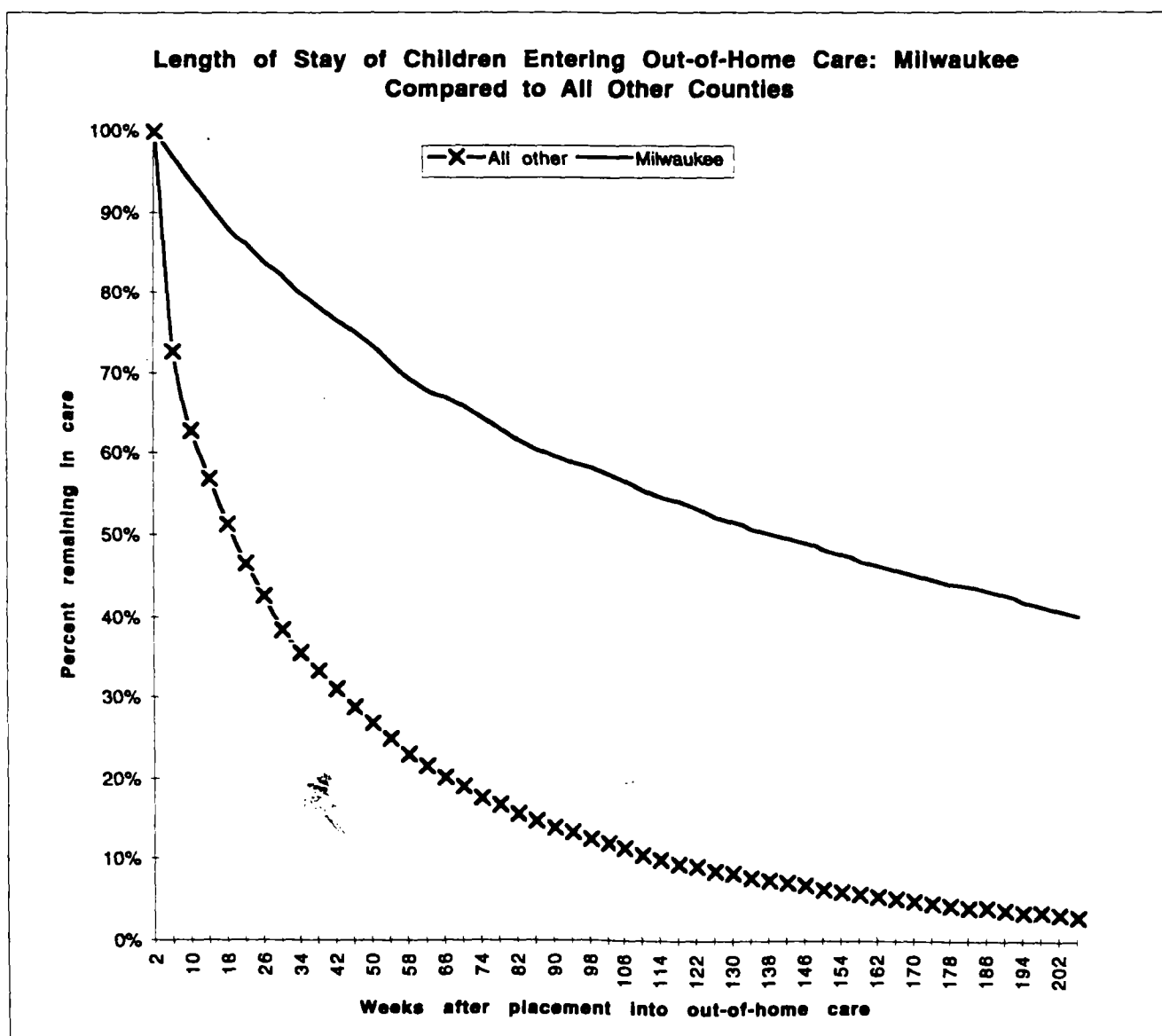

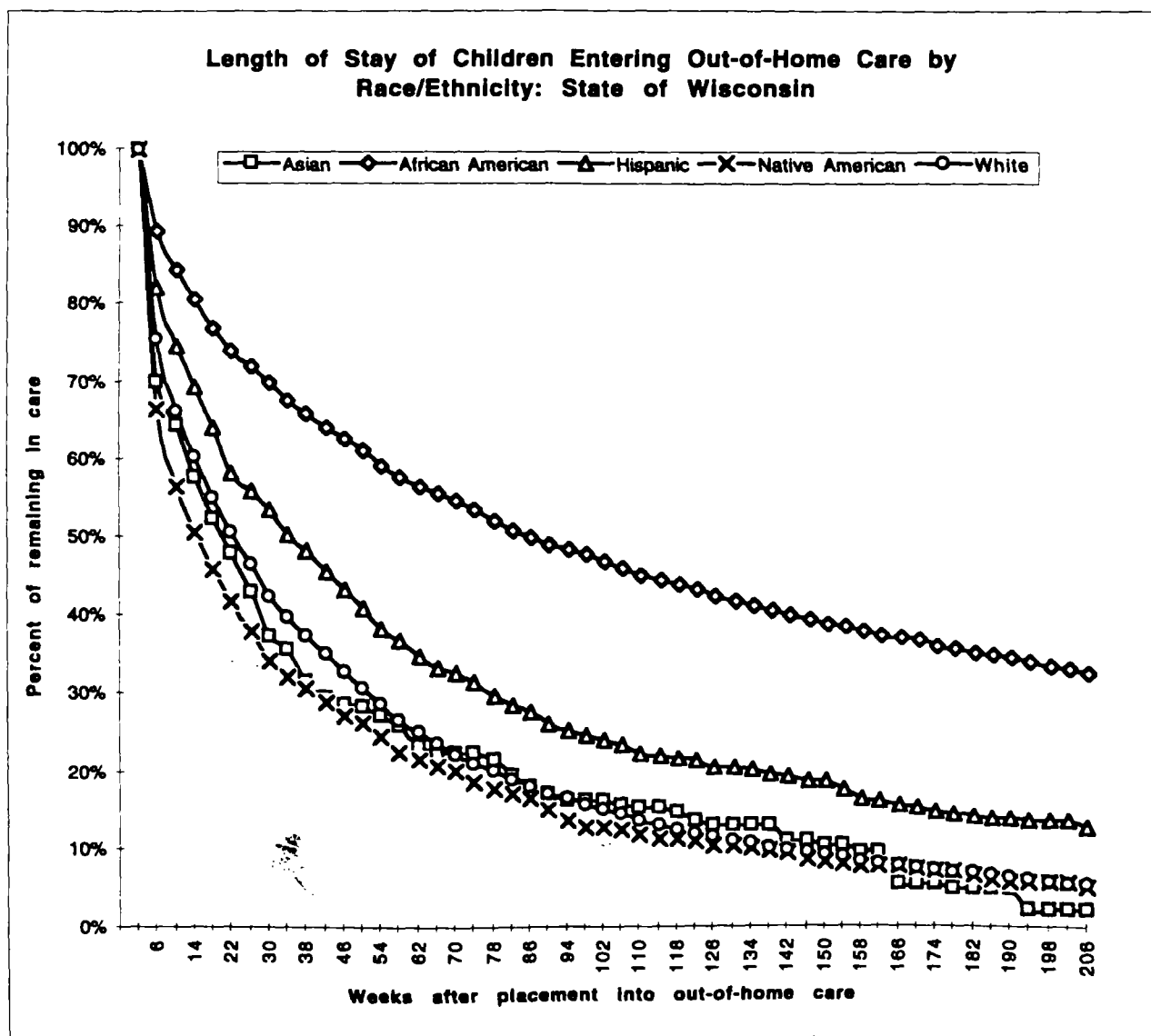

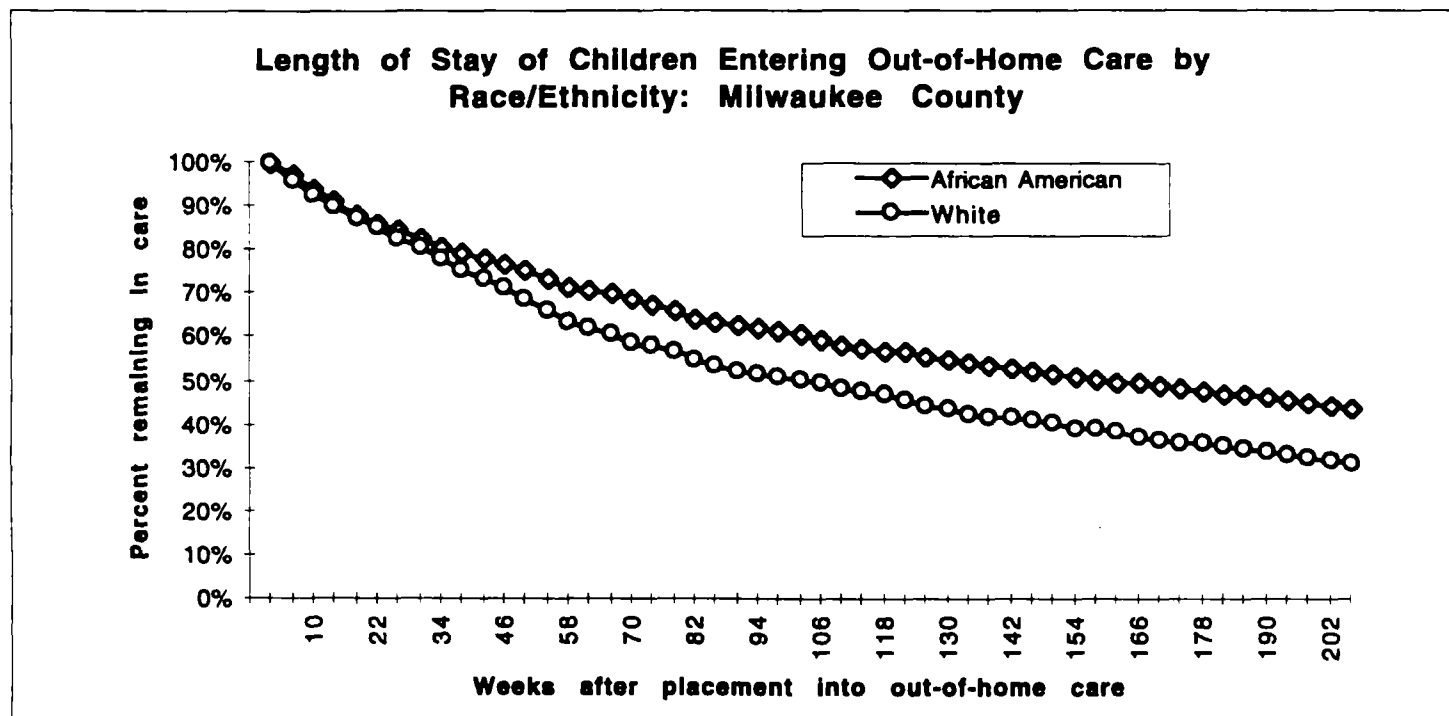

CHAPTER 4:

Modes of exit for children in out-of-home care in Wisconsin

What are the outcomes of placement for children who have entered out-of-home care in Wisconsin since relatively reliable data began to be collected? An important outcome is the way in which a child leaves the out-of-home care system. Of course, some children do not leave for a long period of time, and whether it is planned or not the outcome for them is long-term out-of-home care placement.

Figure 4a shows outcomes for all children who entered a first episode in out-of-home care between 1988 and 1993. Since many of these children entered care relatively recently, these numbers tend to underestimate the proportion of children who will exit via adoption or independent living—transitions out of care that tend to take relatively long to occur.

The most striking difference between regions is in the proportion of children remaining in care; 45 percent of children placed by Milwaukee County over this period remained in care at the end of 1994 in comparison to nine percent in the rest of the state. Children in Milwaukee County experienced a lower rate of exit to all forms of permanent placement (i.e., return home, adoption, and placement with a relative) than children in the remainder of the state. Although a higher proportion of youth exited to independent living in Milwaukee than in the rest of the state, this is likely a function of the high proportion of children who remain indefinitely in out-of-home care in Milwaukee; at some point they will either run away, become institutionalized in some way, or exit to independent living.

A note of caution is in order regarding discharge statistics from Milwaukee County. Since it appears that Milwaukee County makes much greater use of kinship care than other Wisconsin counties, many children in long-term foster care in Milwaukee are actually living with extended family. Children in licensed place-

ments with relatives show up as open out-of-home care cases in the HSRS data, but their placements are not strictly comparable in terms of "permanency" to those of children living with unrelated foster parents. Unfortunately, HSRS data cannot be used to reliably distinguish licensed kinship care from traditional foster family care.

Figure 4b shows outcomes six to seven years later for children who entered a first episode in out-of-home care in 1988; a subset of the children whose outcomes are described in Table 4a. This view of placement outcomes provides for a better analysis of the long-term permanency status of children placed in out-of-home care in Wisconsin. The overall pattern of exits is similar to that depicted in Table 4a, except that a higher proportion of children are shown to have been adopted or discharged to independent living. Even after a minimum of six years, however, over one-quarter of children who entered out-of-home care in Milwaukee County remained in care.

Figure 4c shows the relationship between a child's age at the time of entry to out-of-home care and the outcome six to seven years later of the child's first episode in out-of-home care. Not surprisingly, young children were much more likely to be adopted than older children, while older children were more likely to run away from care. More troubling is the finding that a significant proportion of younger children are likely to remain in out-of-home care indefinitely. The relationship between age at entry to care and placement outcome is fairly consistent across regions of the state, even after taking into account the slower rate of exit in Milwaukee County.

³ The sample used to construct Table 4d is not large enough to make meaningful comparisons between racial and ethnic groups for some of the outcomes listed; many of the observed differences are fairly likely to have resulted from chance alone. Readers are urged to use caution in making inferences from the data beyond those stated in this report.

Race and ethnicity are also related to permanency outcomes in Wisconsin, although these findings should be tempered by the significant regional differences in the racial/ethnic composition of the out-of-home care population in Wisconsin.³

Figure 4d shows that African Americans, and to a somewhat lesser extent Hispanics, are more likely than Whites to remain in care indefinitely. This result is in keeping with the fact that African American

children are least likely to be adopted.

There appears to be no significant relationship between gender and placement outcomes.

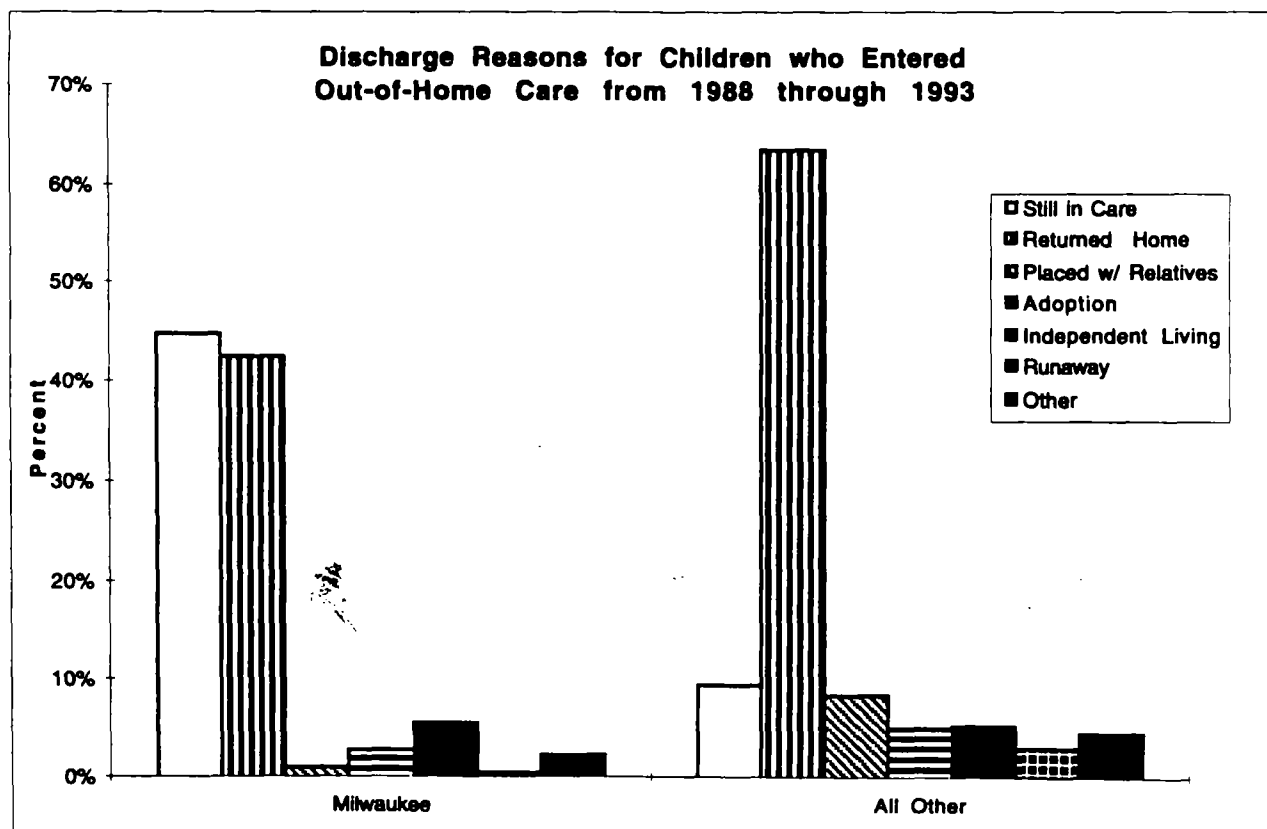

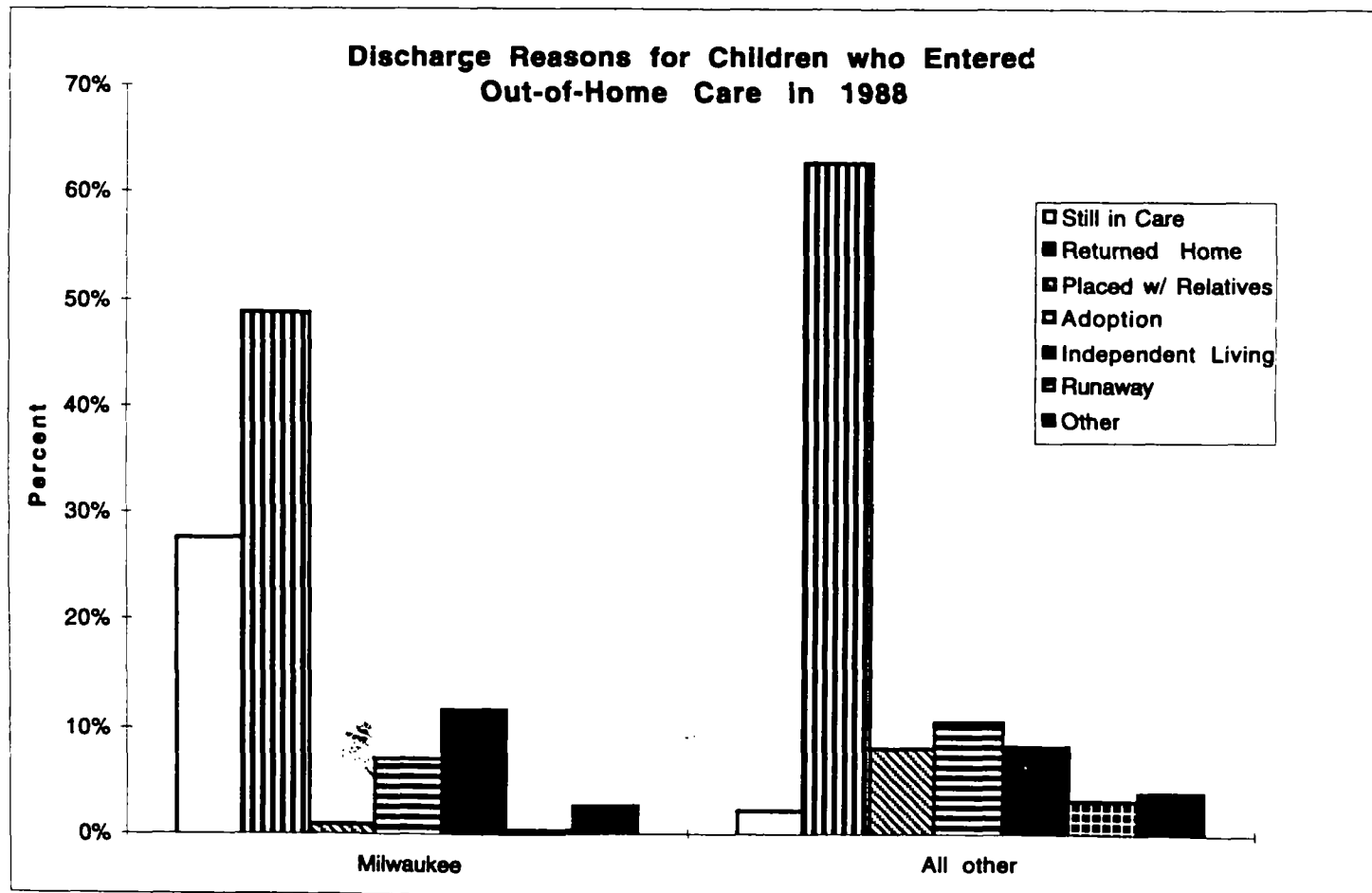

CHAPTER 5:

Placement stability of children in out-of-home care in Wisconsin

One of the common criticisms of the out-of-home care system is that children are often "bounced around" from one foster home or congregate care setting to another. Although moving a child from one placement to another is often unavoidable for a number of reasons, longitudinal research on children in out-of-home care suggests that children often suffer in a number of ways when they are subjected to multiple placement moves. Thus, in general, placement stability is considered a goal of permanency planning for children in out-of-home care.

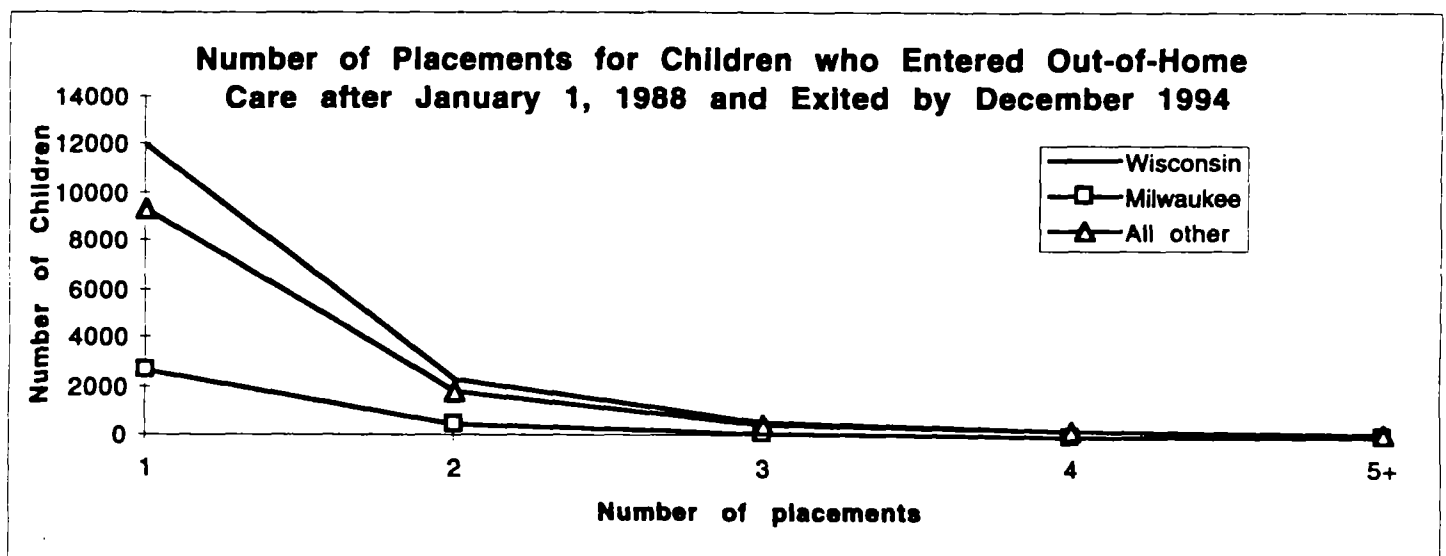


FIGURE 5A(2).

One way to look at placement stability is to consider the number of placements children have before they exit out-of-home care. Figure 5a shows the distribution of the number of placements experienced by over 15,000 children who entered out-of-home care in Wisconsin for the first time after January 1, 1988 and exited before the end of 1994. Since most children exit care in Wisconsin within a relatively short period of time, the numbers presented in Figure 5a represent the experience of the vast majority of children who have been placed in out-of-home care in the past seven years. The overwhelming majority of children who enter out-of-home care in Wisconsin experience only one placement. In fact, of the children who entered care since 1988 and who have since exited care, only six percent had more than two placements. As Figure 5a demonstrates, this is a pattern that is consistent across regions of the state.

The picture looks somewhat different, however, for those children who end up spending a relatively long period of time in out-of-home care. Figure 5b shows the number of placements experienced by 487 children who entered a first episode in care in Wisconsin in 1990 and remained in care through the end of 1994. The distribution of placements for Milwaukee County looks similar to that in Figure 5a; over 90

percent of children in out-of-home care in Milwaukee County experience fewer than three placements, even those who experience indefinite stays. In contrast, over half of the children outside of Milwaukee with indefinite stays had three or more placements, and nearly one-fifth had five or more.

Figures 5c through 5e show that the large difference between Milwaukee County and the balance of the state in placement stability for children in long-term out-of-home care is not restricted to a particular age group. Children in Milwaukee experience very few placements regardless of age. However, long-term out-of-home care residents in the remainder of the state, even very young children, are very likely to experience more than one placement.

Figure 5f shows another result of the regional variation in placement stability in Wisconsin. African American children experiencing long stays in out-of-home care have much more stable placement histories than White children.⁴ Almost all of this difference is due to regional variation, although even within Milwaukee County African American children experience slightly fewer placement transitions than White children.

It is worth noting that much of the regional and racial variation in placement stability described here may be a result of the high proportion of children in Milwaukee County who are living in foster care placements with kin. Evidence from other states indicates that these placements tend to be very stable over time.

There was no significant relationship between child gender and placement stability.

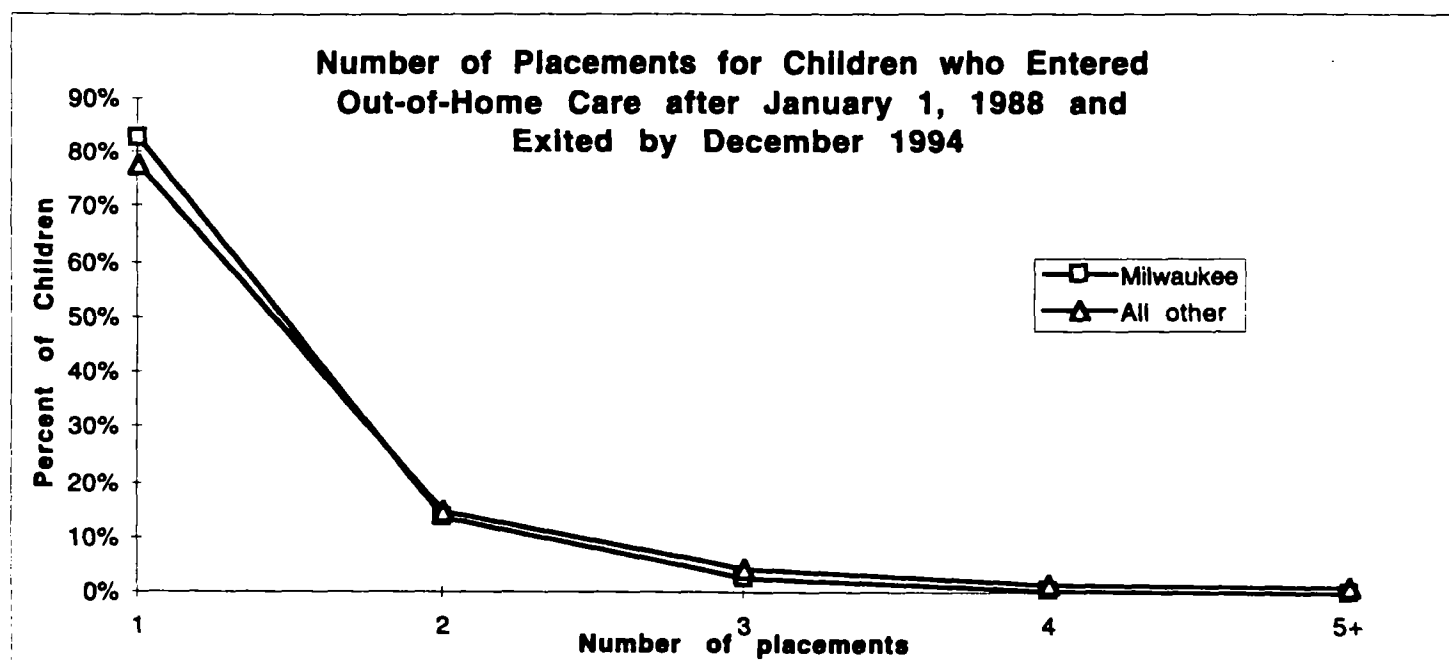

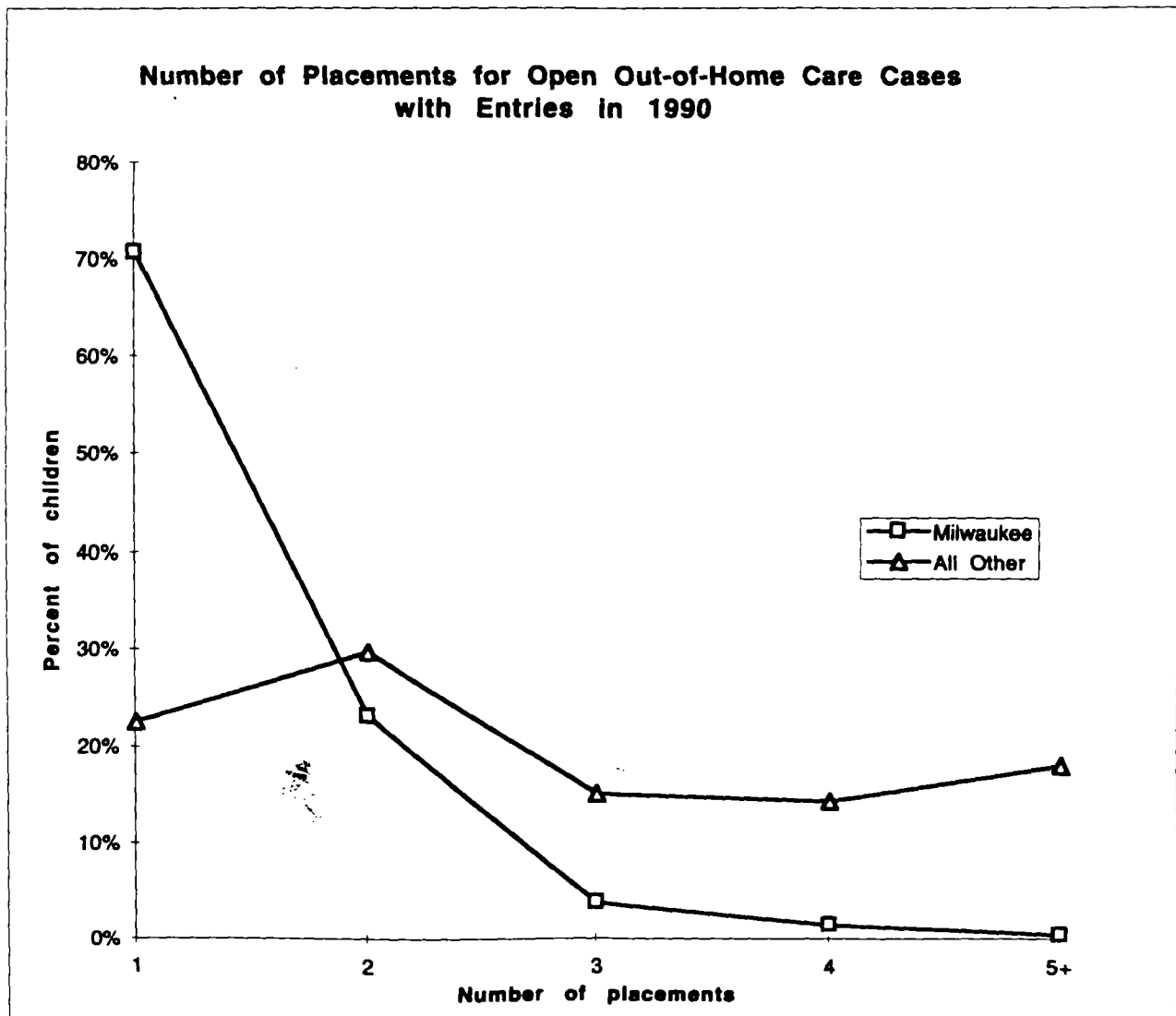

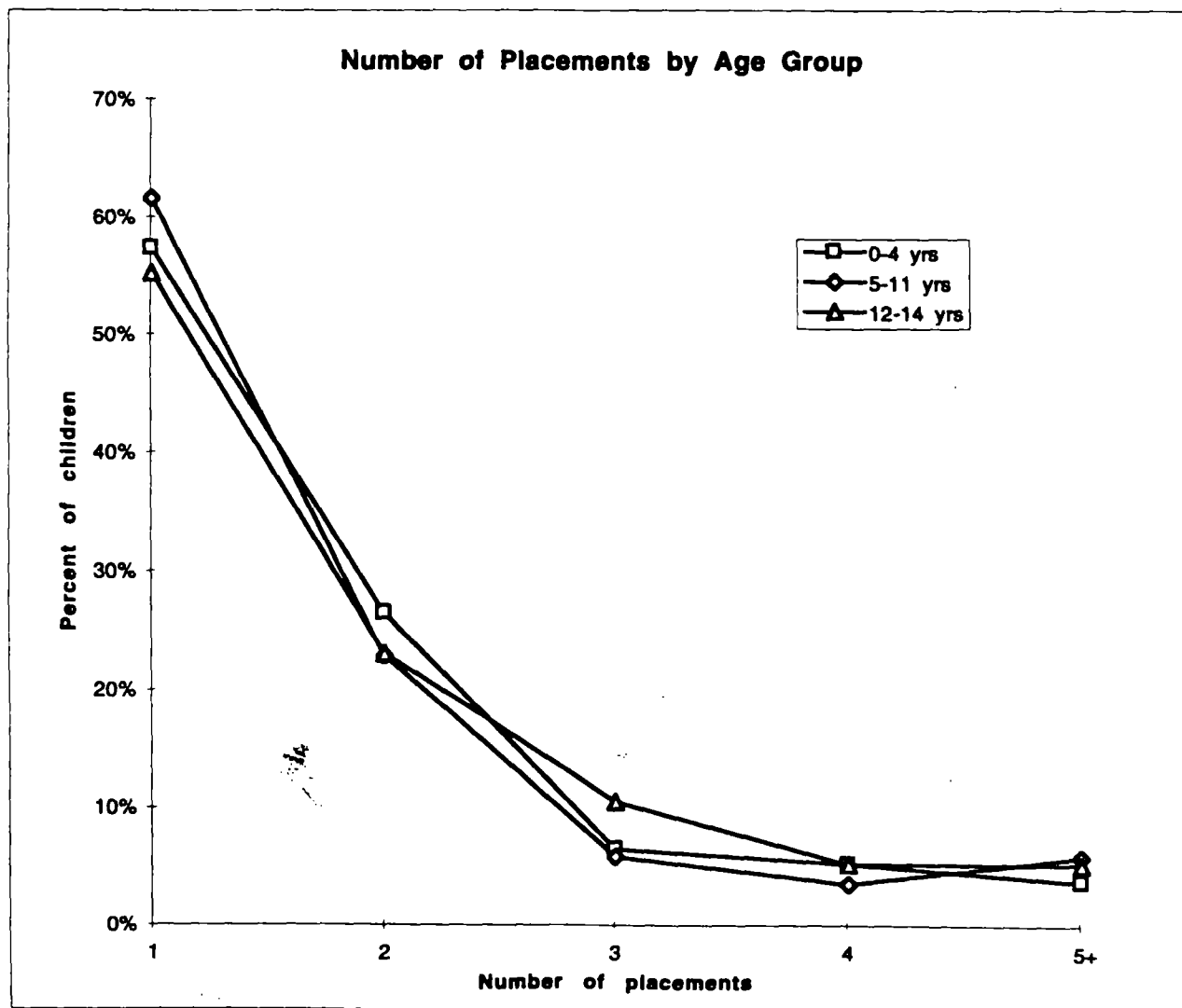

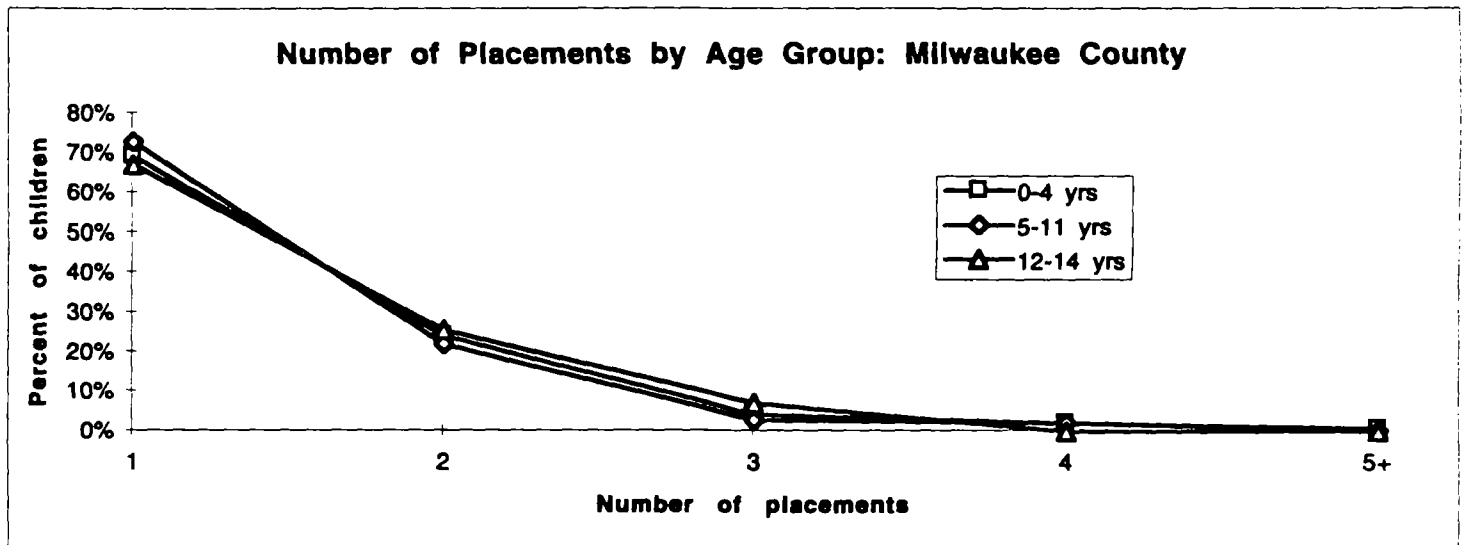

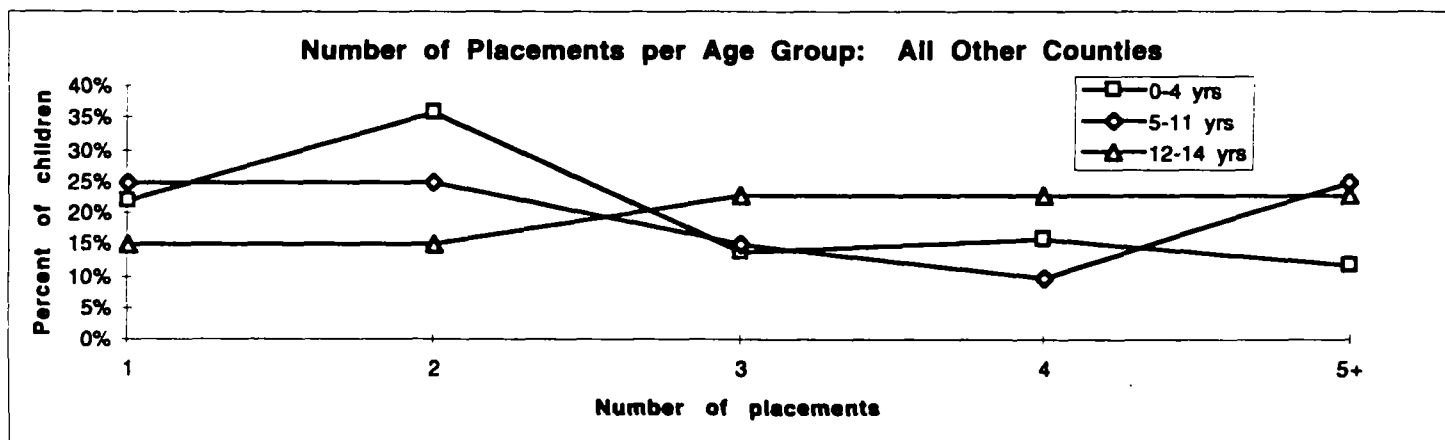

CHAPTER 6:

Reentry of children into out-of-home care in Wisconsin

Another important measure of the functioning of the out-of-home care system is the rate at which children who are returned to their families reenter care at a later date. Ideally, all children returned home would stay there safely never to reenter care. Of course, reality does not reflect this ideal and some proportion of children returned to their families end up reentering out-of-home care. This report examines reentry to out-of-home care following return to family because reentry following other kinds of exits (e.g., runaway) is often a qualitatively different phenomenon. Furthermore, since the vast majority of children entering out-of-home care return home, the persistence of family reunification is an important issue for policy makers and program administrators.

Figure 6a shows the proportion of children remaining out of care at various points after discharge for Wisconsin as a whole, Milwaukee County, and the balance of the state. The graphs show that 32 percent of children returned to their families will reenter care within three years, but that the reentry rate is much lower in Milwaukee County than in the rest of the state. Over one-third of children leaving out-of-home care outside of Milwaukee County will return to care while less than one-fifth of children in Milwaukee will do so. About one out of six children going home from out-of-home care outside of Milwaukee County will return to care within six months.

Figure 6b illustrates the relationship between race/ethnicity and reentry to out-of-home care. Overall, African Americans and Hispanics return to care at a lower rate than Whites and Native Americans. However, this is largely a reflection of the fact that African American and Hispanic children in out-of-home care are predominantly located in Milwaukee—a region with a relatively low reentry rate—whereas Whites and Native Americans are

more likely to live outside of Milwaukee. In Milwaukee County, African Americans do have a slightly lower reentry rate than Whites, but race and ethnicity have no significant relationship to reentry rates outside of Milwaukee County.

Older children and youth experience a higher rate of reentry to out-of-home care than their younger counterparts (see Figure 6c). Surprisingly, nearly a fifth of those from twelve to 15 years old when they exited out-of-home care reentered care within six months, and 45 percent did so within three years. This relationship is largely consistent across regions of the state.

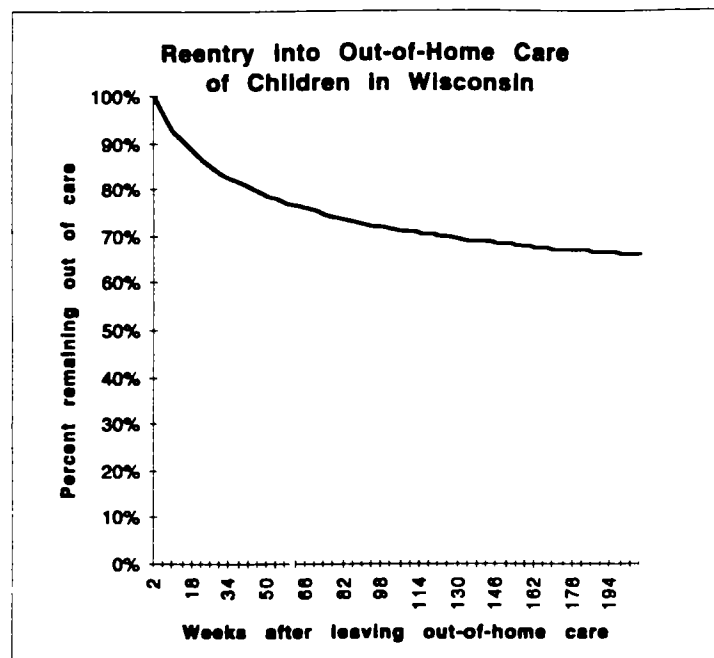
Statewide, children experiencing short stays in out-of-home care reenter care at a somewhat higher rate than those who experience relatively longer stays (see Figure 6d). The difference in reentry rates is particularly noticeable over the first year after discharge from care. However, this relationship is largely a function of a strong association, outside of Milwaukee County, between length of stay in out-of-home care and reentry to care. In fact, those with very short stays in Milwaukee County (i.e., those who spent less than three months in out-of-home care) actually had a slightly lower reentry rate than those who stayed longer in care in Milwaukee County.

There was no significant relationship between child gender and reentry into out-of-home care in Wisconsin.

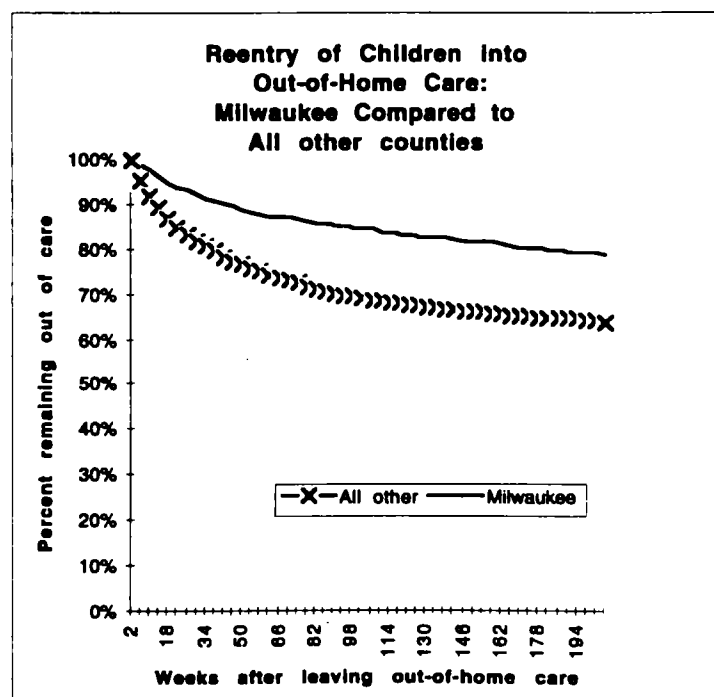

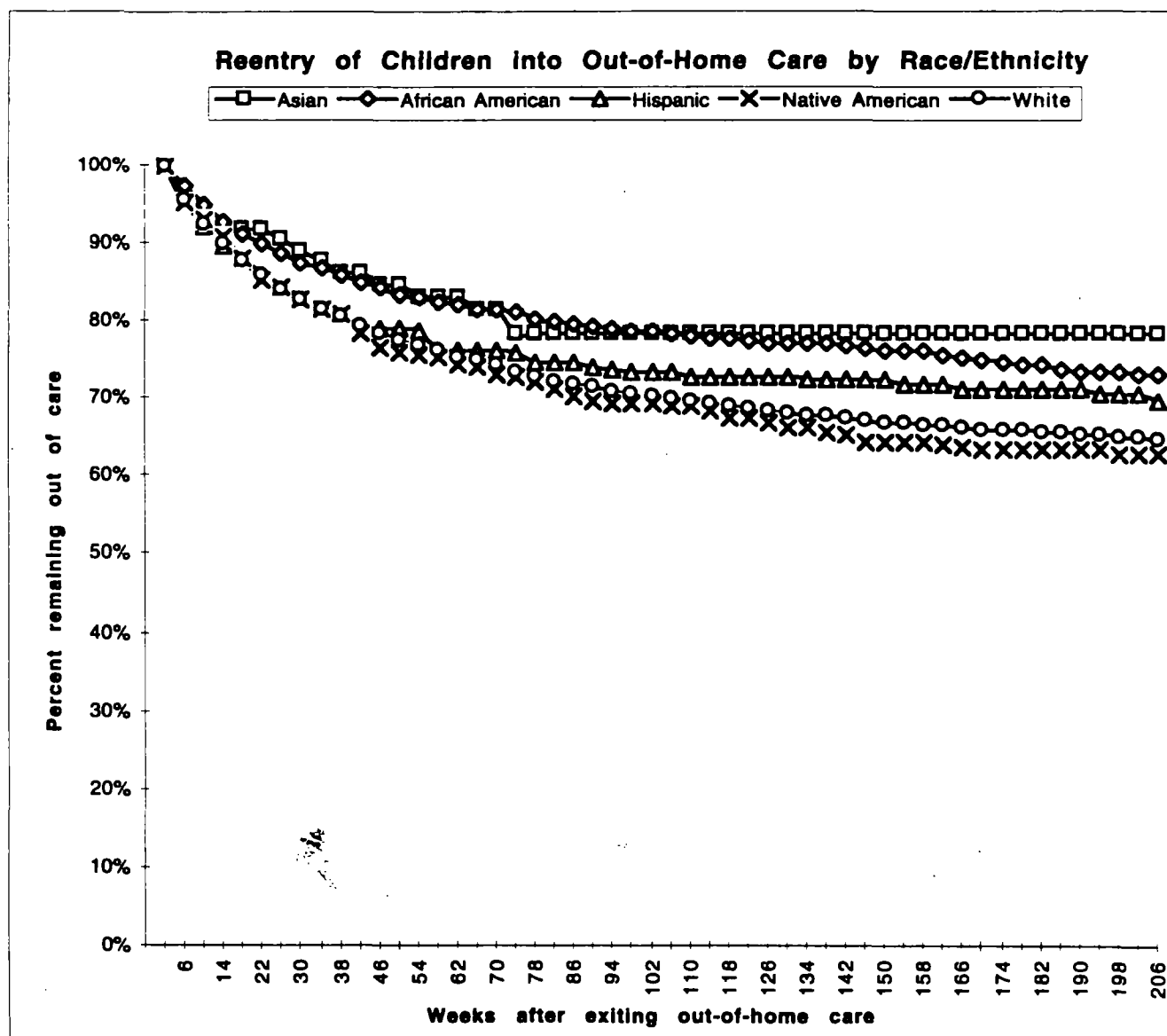

Appendix

This appendix to "Out-of-Home Care in Wisconsin: 1988 to 1994" contains selected information on out-of-home care for each county social services or human services department in the state. Identical information is available for each county, allowing for intercounty comparison. Intercounty comparison is also facilitated by pages 1 through 3 which provide data for the entire state of Wisconsin, Milwaukee County, and for all other counties combined.

Each page presents trend data on the out-of-home care population including entries and exits to care by year, the difference between annual entries and exits, open cases at the end of each year, and the percentage change in the out-of-home care population since 12/31/1987. The age, race/ethnic, gender, and place-

ment type distributions of children in out-of-home care on July 1, 1994 are also provided. A measure of length of stay in out-of-home care is provided in the form of a table indicating the number of weeks it takes for selected percentages of children to exit care. Lastly, a table indicates what percentage of children returned to their families from out-of-home care reenter care within 3 months, 6 months, one year and two years. The tables for length of stay are based on out-of-home care entries and exits since 1988, whereas the tables for reentry are based on out-of-home care exits and reentries since 1988.
