FROM: SAMUEL BERGER *in Kennel*I. PURPOSE

To meet with the families of those Americans killed in the bombing of our Embassy in Nairobi, Kenya.

II. BACKGROUND

You will participate in a private meeting with the immediate family members of eleven of the twelve Americans killed in the bomb blast at our embassy in Kenya. Following that meeting you will participate in a public ceremony marking the return of their remains.

You will have approximately five minutes to talk privately with the family of each victim. There will be only ten groups, as Sgt. Olds' family will not be present, and two of the victims, Julian and Jay Bartley, were father and son. The family of Senior Master Sergeant Sherry Olds has requested that her body be flown directly to them after an autopsy is performed. It is arriving in the United States separately. Some members of Jean Dalizu's family will participate in the ceremony, but she is being buried in Kenya at the family's request. Her husband is a Kenyan citizen.

Attached at Tab A are brief descriptions of each victim and an outline of any issues the family may have. Throughout this time you will be accompanied by Acting Secretary of State Tom Pickering, who will arrive to talk with the families about 30 minutes before you. Appropriate clergy support will also be available.

The State Department has made great efforts to ensure that the families are well taken care of. It is paying for all

transportation costs for the victims' remains and for the immediate family (parents, spouse and children). Most of the families will stay in the same area hotel the evening before and will return there for a State Department sponsored luncheon after the ceremony. They may, therefore, have built up some group camaraderie.

You should be aware that a number of the families have been frustrated by the autopsy process and, while appreciative of the need to gather any evidence, would like the remains back as quickly as possible. Some families are concerned that planned weekend funerals may be disrupted. The Bartley and Kavalier families have also requested permission for burial in Arlington cemetery for their three victims. This has not yet been resolved.

**PRESIDENT WILLIAM JEFFERSON CLINTON
REMARKS ON RETURN OF NAIROBI EMBASSY BOMBING VICTIMS
ANDREWS AIR FORCE BASE
AUGUST 13, 1998**

Secretary Albright, Secretary Cohen and other members of the cabinet, [Speaker Gingrich, Senator Lott, Senator Daschle, Representative Gephardt] and other Members of Congress, leaders of our Armed Forces, members of the diplomatic corps, honored guests, family members:

Today, we honor twelve proud sons and daughters of our nation. Though they perished half a world away, they never left America behind. They carried with them the love of their families, the respect of their countrymen, and above all, the ideals for which America stands. They died in the highest of callings: giving their energies, their commitment, their courage in the service of our country.

Family and friends of those we bring home today, Americans have learned a little bit about your loved ones this week. But they will never know them as you did, or remember them as you will - as a brand new baby, a proud school graduate, a beaming bride or groom, a reassuring voice on the phone from across the ocean, a tired but happy traveler at the airport, bags stuffed with gifts ... and arms outstretched.

Nothing we say can answer the terrible question, "Why?" Words cannot make sense of the senseless or bring your loved ones back. But nothing can erase the lives they led or the difference they made ... the joy they brought to their families ... their strength and their decency. On behalf of all Americans, let me say, we are profoundly grateful for their lives of service.

The men and women who serve in our embassies around the world do the hard work -- not always fully appreciated -- of protecting America's interests, promoting our values abroad. When I travel overseas, I make it a point to meet with them. They are diplomats and doctors and drivers, bookkeepers and technicians and military guards. They are far from home; they endure hardships; they risk their lives. And sometimes they *give* their lives.

These twelve Americans came from diverse backgrounds. But each of them had an adventurous spirit ... and a generous soul. They relished the chance to see the world. And they were committed to making the world better.

They were a senior diplomat and his son who proudly worked alongside him this summer. A budget officer who had just spent her vacation caring for her aging parents. A State Department worker who looked forward to being back home with a new grandson. A Foreign Service officer, born in India, who became an American citizen and traveled the world -- with her family -- for our country.

A Marine sergeant, the son of proud parents. An Air Force sergeant who followed in her father's footsteps. An epidemiologist who loved her children and worked to protect African children from malaria. An embassy administrator who married a Kenyan and stayed in close touch with their children in America. A Foreign Service officer whose three children included a baby girl.

Another Foreign Service member who was an accomplished jazz musician and devoted husband. An Army Sergeant, a veteran of the Gulf War, who told his father that if anything ever happened to him, he wanted his ashes scattered in the Pacific off Big Sur, because that was where he had met his beloved wife.

To the Kenyans and Tanzanians, who have suffered such unspeakable loss, this is our shared tragedy. On behalf of all Americans, I offer our deepest condolences. We are proud of the strong bonds between our nations and that many of your loved ones worked alongside ours in our embassies. We are grateful for your extraordinary efforts in the wake of this tragedy. We pray for the speedy recovery of the injured, Africans and Americans.

To all those here today, I say: No matter what it takes or where it takes us, we will find those responsible for these evil acts. And we will see that justice is done.

There may be more hard road ahead. Make no mistake: Terrorists target America because we act for peace and democracy. They target America because the spirit of America is the very spirit of freedom. But we cannot, we must not, we will not allow murderers to deter us. We, the living, must honor the memory of those who have given their lives by upholding the ideals for which they lived.

America will continue to stand strong for freedom on every continent. America will continue the fight against terror and to protect our citizens at home and abroad. America will not retreat from the world and all its promise.

We must never forget what America means to all who yearn for freedom -- a beacon of hope in an often stormy world. We must never forget -- as these heroic American never forgot.

Let us praise and always remember them. As it is written: "Their righteous deeds have not been forgotten ... Their glory will not be blotted out ... Their bodies were buried in peace... But their names shall live forever." [*Sirach 44:10, from the Apocrypha*]

Information on Victims and Their Families

Sergeant Jesse Aliganga (21)

[Pronounced: JE-ssee Ah-lee-GONG-ah]

Home State: Tallahassee, Florida

A Marine security guard at the embassy. According to unsubstantiated (and disputed) press reports, he died at his post, and may have helped ensure that the vehicle with the bomb did not gain access to the embassy's underground garage. He is survived by his parents (who are estranged) and a sister.

Julian Bartley (55) and Jay Bartley (20)

[Pronounced as it sounds]

Home State: Tennessee

Julian was a successful career diplomat serving in Nairobi as the Consul General. He had previously served in the Dominican Republic, Colombia, Spain, Israel, and Korea during his 24 years in the foreign service. His son, who was attending the International University in Nairobi, was working as a summer intern at the embassy. They are survived by Susan Bartley (wife of Julian and mother of Jay), who has flown from Nairobi, and Edith Bartley (25) a law student here in Washington. The Bartley family has requested burial for both Julian and Jay in Arlington National Cemetery. The request is pending.

Jean Dalizu (61)

[Pronounced: De-LEE-zoo]

Home State: Washington, D.C.

Jean had lived in Kenya for 26 years, after meeting and marrying a Kenyan political science professor. Jean worked in our U.S.-Kenya liaison office. Her remains will be buried in Kenya and are not being returned with the others at the request of her family. Most of her family members will, however, be present. Lori Dalizu, one of Jean's four children, lives in Southeast Washington, DC.

Molly Huckaby Hardy (51)

[Pronounced as it sounds]

Home State: Georgia

Hardy of Valdosta, Georgia, was a 26-year veteran of the State Department. She was known as the "fun" mom when she raised her only daughter alone. She served two tours in Brazil, one in Africa, and several in Washington. She had been scheduled to return to the United States in June, but was forced to remain in Kenya because the State Department had not found a replacement. It was most likely her last month abroad, since she was planning to retire in four years. We hope you were able to speak with her mother, Mrs. Huckaby, on Wednesday evening, who will be unable to attend the ceremony at Andrews Air Force Base, but other family members will attend.

Sergeant Kenneth Hobson (27)

[Pronounced as it sounds]

Home State: Lamar, Missouri

Army Sgt. Hobson of Nevada, Missouri, was assigned to the U.S. Army Defense Attache, Kenya, as an administrative assistant. Hobson, 27, is survived by his wife Deborah, one daughter (2 years old), and his parents, Kenneth R. and Bonnie Sue of Lamar, Missouri. Hobson escaped unscathed during his service in the Persian Gulf War, only to die in peacetime in Nairobi.

Prabhi Guptara Kavalier (45)

[Pronounced: PRAH-bee Goop-TAH-rah KA-va-ler]

Home State: McLean, Virginia

Born in India, Kavalier became a U.S. citizen and then career foreign service officer after marrying her husband, Howard Kavalier, a career foreign service officer and State Department lawyer. She had served with her husband at U.S. embassies in the Philippines, Pakistan, Israel, and France, after meeting him in her native New Delhi, India in 1980. Kavalier had arrived at her new embassy job only days before and hadn't even unpacked. She and her husband had previously served in Kenya and wanted their two daughters, Tara and Maya, to get a taste of Africa's teeming wildlife. Prabhi's husband has requested that she be buried in Arlington National Cemetery. The request is pending.

Arlene Kirk (50)

[Pronounced: Ar-LEEN KIRK]

Home State: South Bend, Indiana

Employee of USAID and married to another career USAID employee, Bob Kirk of South Bend, Indiana. They recently lost their five year old daughter to cancer and he is badly shaken by Arlene's death. She had returned to the embassy, after home leave following their daughters' death, only two hours before the bomb exploded. The Kirks have reluctantly agreed to the autopsy though they are concerned it may delay the funeral service they had hoped to hold on Saturday.

Dr. Mary Louise Martin (known as Louise) (45)

[Pronounced as it sounds]

Home State: Atlanta, Georgia

Dr. Martin was a veterinarian, geneticist, and epidemiologist with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Task Force for Child Survival and Development. She had been in Africa for three years testing new anti-malarial drugs. Martin was the mother of three children, ages 10, 11, and 14. Her husband, Dr. Douglas Klaucke, was also employed by the CDC and stationed in Kenya. She would have been 46 on August 11.

Michelle O'Connor (37)

[Pronounced as it sounds]

Home State: Baton Rouge, Louisiana

Full name: Ann Michelle O'Connor. She was the second ranking budget and fiscal officer at the U.S. Embassy since 1996. O'Connor, from Baton Rouge, Louisiana, was a career member of the Foreign Service for the past 11 years. She is survived by her husband, James, her mother (who lived with her in Kenya) and three daughters. She had served tours in Barbados, Ecuador, and Uruguay. Her family has reluctantly agreed to have the autopsy performed.

Senior Master Sergeant Sherry Olds (40)

Home State: Panama City, Florida

Olds, of Panama City, Florida, was assigned to the Air Force Security Element, U.S. Central Command, Nairobi. Olds, 40, is

survived by her parents Delbert and Mary Olds, also of Panama City. Her remains were sent directly to her family at their request. She had just extended her two-year term in Nairobi for another year.

Uttamlal T. "Tom" Shah (37)

[Pronounced: OO-tahm-lahl T. Shaw]

Home State: Bremen, Indiana

Shah joined the Foreign Service in 1987, and served in Cairo, Damascus and Washington. He was posted to Washington, D.C. and was on consultations at the embassy at the time of the explosion. He is survived by his wife of 15 years, Linda Marie Grise Shah, of Vienna, Virginia, and his parents. Shah had a Doctorate of Arts in music history and enjoyed directing the jazz ensemble when he was a student at Ball State University.

Let me express America's profound gratitude for your extraordinary efforts -- with Americans and others -- to respond to this shared tragedy: pulling people from the wreckage, aiding the wounded, searching for evidence as to who committed these terrible acts.

Violent extremists try to use bullets and bombs to derail our united efforts to bring peace to every part of this earth. We grieve together, but I am proud that our nations have also renewed our commitment to *stand* together -- to bring the offenders swiftly to justice, combat terrorism in all its forms, and create a more tolerant and more peaceful world for all our children.

IN KENYA AND TANZANIA
August 15, 1998

Two days ago, at Andrews Air Force Base, we welcomed them home: America's brave sons and daughters, carried under stars and stripes, flanked by the silent sentries of the honor guard. They had perished in Nairobi, cruelly and without warning, in an act of terror at the American Embassy. It was not the sort of homecoming any of us would have wished. But it was a tribute that befit their service to our nation.

Hillary and I had the honor to meet with their families on the morning of the ceremony. They shared stories with us, stories and memories, showed us photographs. Their shoulders were heavy with sadness, their voices sometimes shook, but anyone could tell that their hearts were full of pride -- pride in the brave service of their loved ones, pride in the nation they so ably and faithfully represented overseas. Collectively, over the course of their careers, these 12 men and women represented the United States in more than 20 countries across the globe, from Brazil to Botswana, from France to the Philippines, from South Korea to their final post: Kenya.

They represented America not simply by their deeds but by their character: by the quiet labors of a medical doctor; by the careful diplomacy of a foreign service officer; by the iron discipline of men and women in uniform. Their dedication to our country was matched by their dedication to their families. In all these ways, they represented the essence of America. They showed the world our very best face and shared with its peoples our most cherished values.

America has lost much. Twelve families have lost even more. Words cannot describe, and tributes cannot begin to fill, the cruel vacancy left by evil acts of terror. But in the example of the proud, grieving families I met on Thursday, we find an embodiment of American resolve. Do not, these families urged me, do not let our nation give in to terror. Do not turn inward, or retreat from the world and all its promise. Instead: stand strong, as ever, for freedom and democracy in all countries, for all people.

America must -- and will -- continue to stand strong against terror and for freedom. The spirit of these twelve patriots is the spirit of America: a nation strong and free, peaceful and proud, and a powerful beacon of hope around the world.

Talking Points

Acknowledgments: Romer; Grossman; Len Barrack; John Sweeney; Gerry McEntee (Chair of the AFL-CIO Political Committee); Congratulations to Morty Bahr for quickly settling the CWA/Bell Atlantic strike.

Five and a half years ago, we came to office carried by people who believed our country could do better if we not only had new leadership, but new ideas for the 21st Century. We took a new message to the American people -- based on opportunity, responsibility, and community. We abandoned the false debate between those who said government could solve all our problems and those who said government was the cause. Instead, we said that government could focus on empowering all our people with the tools to overcome their own challenges and make the most of their own lives.

Here are the results: Crime is at 25-year low; unemployment lowest in 28 years; Welfare lowest in 29; the first balanced budget in 29 years; inflation lowest in 32 years; highest homeownership in history. We have smallest government since Kennedy. We've expanded college opportunity, with new Hope Scholarships; expanded Pell Grants and work-study. We've strengthened child health -- providing insurance for up to 5 million children, achieving the highest childhood immunization rate ever. We've protected our environment, with cleaner air, cleaner water, safer food, fewer toxic waste dumps. We've strengthened our communities with citizen service: 100,000 Americans have joined Americorps; 1,000 college students have volunteered in America Reads. We've helped more Americans meet their responsibilities at work and at home: The Family and Medical Leave Act has helped millions over the past 5 years.

I have said many times that the choice before the American people today is between progress and partisanship. Time and again, we have seen what good things we can achieve for America's working families when we put progress before partisanship, people before politics. Here's just one example: 17 years ago, Democrats and Republicans worked together to pass the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program -- LIHEAP -- so that our neediest Americans could protect their families in times of weather distress. Ever since, LIHEAP has helped hard-working Americans pay for air conditioners, fans, electric bills during summer heat waves; for heating and insulation in times of extreme cold.

As you know, we are experiencing the hottest summer on record. In parts of the South and West, 100+ degree days have become the norm. Earlier this week, the Vice President announced that last month was the planet's hottest ever, beating out July 1997 by half a degree. July was the seventh month in a row to be hotter than the previous year.

This scorching heat wave has destroyed crops, caused widespread power outages, and worst of all, led to the deaths of more than 100 Americans. The heat poses the greatest threat to our most vulnerable citizens -- children, the disabled, and the elderly. And for all those who cannot afford air-conditioning, the high temperatures will continue to be life-threatening.

But because of LIHEAP, we have been able to make this dangerous heat wave safer for thousands of American families. Last month, I directed the Department of Health and Human Services to release \$100 million in emergency funds for the 11 hottest southern and western states. Today, as the record heat wave continues, and hard-working families continue to struggle to meet the challenge of keeping cool and paying cooling costs, I have ordered the release of another \$50 million to these states. This aid will also help those of you who work in these industries get this vital help to those who need it.

This emergency relief was paid for in last year's bipartisan balanced budget agreement. And thanks to our bipartisan commitment, thousands of Americans will be better able to protect their children and families this summer.

We must continue to put progress before partnership. We are living in a golden moment of prosperity. Now we must take advantage of these good times to meet America's toughest challenges as we approach the 21st Century.

1. Keep economy growing/fiscal discipline.
2. Save surplus for Social Security.
3. Health: Patients' bill of rights. (AFL-CIO has media/grassroots campaign in support of the bill.)
4. Education: High standards, teachers, Internet, class size (AFT, NEA helping us w/ Sept. 8 modernization day.)
5. Environment: No riders that cripple wildlife protection and put roads through wildernesses, clean water.

I am committed to working with the labor community this year and in the years to come. Together, we've raised the minimum wage, defeated attempts to weaken workplace health and safety laws, and helped Americans meet their obligations at work and at home. I've vetoed every single piece of anti-labor legislation that has crossed my desk.

Now you must continue to make the voices of working families heard in Washington and all across America. The defeat of Calif. prop. 226 showed us what Labor can do to get working families to the polls. We must do it again in November. (VP, HRC and Mrs. Gore are working hard for Unity '98)

I. PURPOSE

To release new data on record school enrollment, and call attention to the need for school modernization: construction and renovation, smaller classes with well-qualified teachers, and education technology. Other events for "National School Modernization Day" have been organized in more than 80 sites across the country, and many of them will be downlinking the satellite transmission of your remarks at the school between 2:15 and 2:45 pm. VPOTUS, FLOTUS, several cabinet members, and roughly 50 Members of Congress are participating in the events nationally.

II. BACKGROUND

Since July, virtually every part of the White House has been working with the Education Department, education groups, and the Democratic leadership to organize back-to-school "modernization" events on September 8. More than 100 were being organized, and we have been able to confirm at least 80 events that will occur (see the attached map).

We have defined school modernization broadly to include (1) school construction and renovation, (2) smaller class sizes with well-qualified teachers, and (3) education technology. Each event determines its own participants, focus and activities. While they were provided with information about the Administration initiatives, the events were not organized for the purpose of lobbying Congress. However, you can exhort them to do so.

Pine Crest Elementary School is six years old and serves upwards of 400 students. It is very diverse, and nearly half are on free or reduced-price lunch. There are five portable buildings. Gov. Glendening's office is concerned that we not create the impression that he is failing to meet the need of the State's schools, and your remarks have been written with that concern in mind.

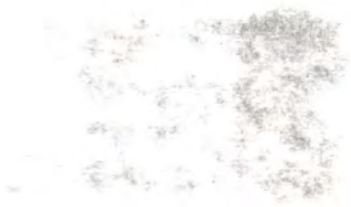

**PRESIDENT WILLIAM J. CLINTON
REMARKS ON NATIONAL SCHOOL MODERNIZATION DAY
SILVER SPRING, MARYLAND
SEPTEMBER 8, 1998**

I'm proud to stand with Secretary Riley, Rep. Wynn, Lt. Governor Kennedy-Townsend and Americans in 37 states and 84 cities -- many of whom are joining us by satellite -- on National School Modernization Day. I am pleased that the First Lady, the Vice-President, state governors, members of Congress and the Cabinet, are leading these gatherings all across the country. In every one of these communities, we are united in saying that all children deserve schools that are as modern as the world they will enter in the 21st Century.

We are living in a time of great change and transition -- all around the world. I have just come from visiting two places that are struggling to make the tough decisions, to take the strong actions they need to strengthen their people for the future. In Russia, I met people who are working to lift their country out of economic crisis even as they stay on the road to democracy and free markets. And in Northern Ireland, I visited families determined to abandon the deadly hatred of the past and build a peaceful, more hopeful future.

We in America are blessed. Our nation has the resources and the confidence to navigate this time of great change. We have the strongest economy in a generation and a new balanced budget. Crime rates have dropped for five years in a row and continue to fall. Welfare, unemployment and inflation are the lowest in some 30 years. We have the highest homeownership in history.

America is on the right track. But we must keep on the right track, moving toward an even brighter future for our children. That is why I am determined to work with Congress and the American people to make sure America does not go backward. We must stay on the path of fiscal discipline. We must set aside the surplus until we've saved Social Security first. We must protect our environment, give our people the health care protections they deserve, strengthen our democracy with campaign finance reform.

But nothing we do today will have a greater effect on America's future, nothing will do more to expand our economy, strengthen our social fabric, promote our ideals and values, than a committed effort to providing every single child a world-class education. This month, a record 52.7 million children will be enrolling in our public schools. That's half-a-million more children than last year; more than at the height of the Baby Boom, more than at any other time in the history of America. And in a new study to be released today, Secretary Riley reports this growth will continue -- this "Baby Boom Echo" will reverberate for years to come. Today, we have a tremendous responsibility -- and a tremendous opportunity -- to ensure that the largest generation in American history will have the best education in American history.

That is why I renew my call to make our public schools the best in the world -- with a

revolution of high standards, high expectations and accountability. We must expand charter schools; end social promotion; reward our most committed teachers, recruit more of our best and brightest to build careers in the classroom. We must make sure our children master the basics with voluntary national standards in fourth grade reading and eighth grade math.

But even as we bring high standards to our classrooms, we must make sure that our school buildings themselves meet high standards. Our children must have safe, modern schools they can look forward to going to every day. But as many of you know firsthand, this is not the case. Too many schools are overcrowded. Classes are held in hallways, gymnasiums, and portables on campuses all across America -- even here at Pinecrest. At the same time, one-third of all schools need major repairs. More than half have major building problems.

This is unacceptable. We cannot build our children up in buildings that are literally falling down. We cannot allow our children to be crowded out of the education they deserve. That's why I am proposing a first-ever national initiative to help communities build and modernize more than 5,000 schools and meet the challenge of welcoming America's largest-ever generation of students. My school construction tax cut is paid for in my balanced budget, line by line, dime by dime. We will not touch a penny of the surplus. This is the right way to cut taxes - - respecting fiscal discipline, targeting investments that will build our nation's future. I call on everyone here and across America to tell Congress that if they fail to act on this issue, they are saying that crowded and crumbling classrooms are good enough for our children. We must say that America can and must do better.

There is more Congress and America can do. More students means we need more teachers. I call on Congress to pass my plan to hire 100,000 new teachers so we can reduce class size to an average of 18 students in the early grades. Research tells us that well-trained teachers leading smaller classes is the best way to ensure students get the personal attention they need to master the basics. And I call on Congress to provide scholarships to 35,000 teachers who will teach in our neediest rural and urban communities.

Finally, our schools must be equipped to teach our children to thrive in the Information Age. I know that Pinecrest is a leader when it comes to technology education. In fact, I'd heard of this school even before I came here. Last spring, the First Lady and I visited a school in Uganda that will soon be linked to Pinecrest by Internet. I want every school and every child to have resources like yours. But unfortunately, nearly half our schools do not have the wiring to support basic computer systems. I call on Congress to reconsider its refusal to provide enough funds to support my initiatives to train teachers in computers and expand student access to the Internet. We all know that technology will only play a greater role in our lives. Those children who have computer skills will succeed; those who do not, will not. It's that simple. We must give all children these basic tools to make the most of their own lives in the 21st Century.

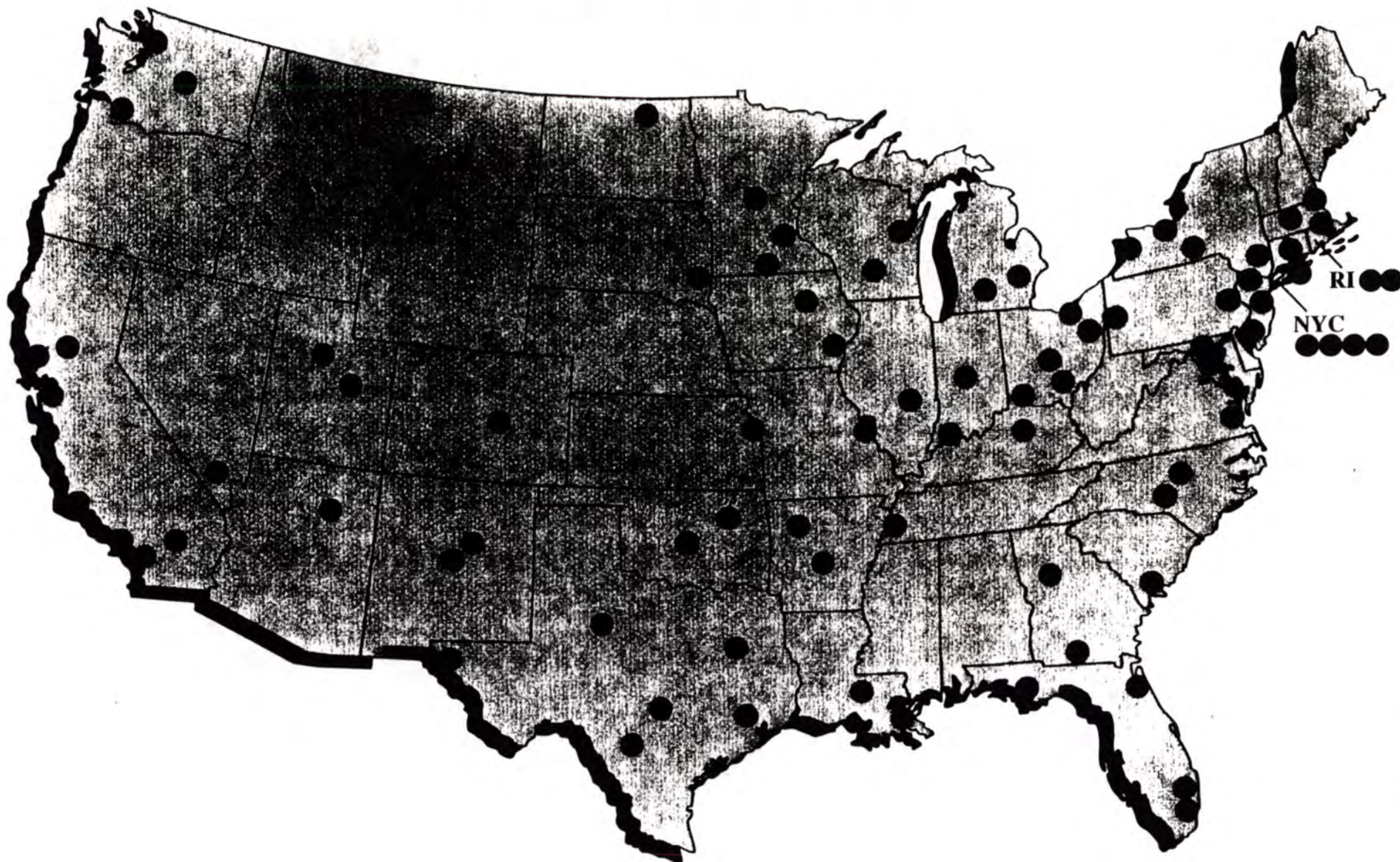

We're proud of our gleaming skyscrapers and modern office parks -- they tell us our economy is strong and growing. But what do crowded and crumbling schools say about our commitment to education?

Let us make every school across America a shining, modern temple of learning -- a place where a computer is as common in the classroom as a chalkboard, where classes are small enough for teachers to teach and children to learn, where students are inspired to look to the future with hope and confidence. Our children deserve nothing less.

PRESIDENT CLINTON ANNOUNCES NEW RECORD SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AND CALLS ON CONGRESS TO HELP IMPROVE, MODERNIZE SCHOOLS

"The ultimate national security of any country rests in the strength of its own citizens. And for us, that means we have got to prove that no matter how diverse we are, we can still offer a world-class education to every single American child." -President Clinton, August 31, 1998

"Baby Boom Echo" Yields 52.7 Million Schoolchildren this Fall. Joined by roughly 50 Members of Congress, and education, community and business leaders in more than 80 cities across the United States, President Clinton on Tuesday, September 8, will release a new Department of Education report -- the third annual Report on the Baby Boom Echo. The findings include:

- 52.7 million children attend public and private elementary and secondary schools in America today -- the highest school enrollment ever.
- 2.2 million teachers will need to be hired over the next ten years.
- A record 14.6 million students will attend college this year.

The report includes current and projected data on specific states, as well as data on recent growth in selected suburban communities across the country.

Communities Cite Needs, Successes on National School Modernization Day. According to a recent GAO Report, about 14 million students attend schools that need extensive repair or replacement of one or more buildings. Almost 60 percent of America's schools reported at least one major building feature in disrepair. In communities across the country, elected officials, parents, business leaders and others will gather to hear the President's remarks, and discuss their own communities' strategies for school construction and renovation, achieving smaller class sizes with well-qualified teachers, and taking advantage of new technologies. These local forums are part of National School Modernization Day on September 8.

President Clinton Calls for Immediate Action by Congress. The President will urge Congress to help America address these pressing needs by enacting -- in the next month before leaving Washington -- the education agenda that he first proposed in the State of the Union address, including:

- **BUILDING AND RENOVATING OVER 5,000 SCHOOLS.** The President has proposed School Modernization Tax Credits to help provide all students with safe, state-of-the-art school buildings. The proposal would use Federal tax credits to pay interest on nearly \$22 billion in bonds.
- **HIRING 100,000 TEACHERS TO REDUCE CLASS SIZE.** President Clinton is committed to helping local schools provide smaller classes with well-prepared teachers in the early grades. The initiative would provide \$12.4 billion over seven years to reduce class size in grades 1-3 to a nationwide average of 18 and help make sure that every child receives individual attention, gets a solid foundation for further learning, and learns to read independently and well by the end of third grade.
- **HARNESSING TECHNOLOGY FOR EDUCATION.** The Clinton Administration has made an unprecedented commitment to bring technology into the classroom and ensure that all children are technologically literate by the dawn of the 21st century. However, the House appropriations bill cuts the President's request for educational technology by \$180 million, while the Senate cuts it by \$98 million. They eliminate \$75 million for technology teacher training, which would help new teachers learn to use technology effectively to strengthen instruction and enhance student learning, and they also cut \$50 million from the President's request for the Technology Literacy Challenge Fund, which would deny funding to 400 school districts to provide students and teachers with access to classroom computers, training and the latest educational software and telecommunications technology. The President will also continue to strongly oppose any effort by the Congress to repeal or delay the e-rate -- an expansion of universal service to provide discounted Internet access and telecommunications services to schools and libraries.

Clinton/Gore '96 did especially well in the City of Baltimore as well as Baltimore, Prince George's, Dorchester, Howard, Kent, Montgomery, and Sommerset counties. 1998 GOVERNOR'S RACE

Despite his incumbent status, Maryland Governor Parris Glendening (D) is seen by many as vulnerable in his '98 reelection bid. After his narrow 6,000 vote victory in 1994, Glendening has been plagued by problems--including an investigation into the election itself--which dropped his approval rating below 30% in the summer of 1996. Glendening fundraising operation has already netted \$2.1 million. While Glendening has improved his public standing by fighting a heated battle against the gambling interests, pushing for an income tax cut, and working to improve education, voters take issue with him over the funding of two stadiums, the way education issues are being spent, and ethical issues. This dissatisfaction made a primary challenge inevitable.

Early in July, former Redskin Ray Schoenke took himself out of the primary race when it became clear that he was not gaining any ground on Glendening. Although he endorsed the Governor, his departure had little effect on the race. Glendening's campaign took a political hit when two leading African American Democrats - Baltimore Mayor Kurt Schmoke (D) and Prince George's County Executive Wayne Curry (D) - gave their endorsement to Harford County Executive Eileen Rehrmann (D). This, however, was a terrible political miscalculation on their part, because Eileen Rehrmann last month had to shut down all campaign operations due to lack of funds. This leaves Glendening with virtually no primary challenger except from little known physician Terry McGuire (D).

Kurt Schmoke and Wayne Curry now find themselves in political hot water. Schmoke has signaled his willingness to make amends with Glendening. Secretary Cuomo last week helped facilitate this by working out an agreement that Schmoke and Glendening would meet this week. Wayne Curry, on the other hand, is much more independent and has used some of his campaign war chest to air radio advertisements in the Washington DC media market attacking Glendening on education. These advertisements have been effective in lowering Glendening's numbers in Prince George's County and Montgomery County.

1994 Republican gubernatorial nominee Ellen Sauerbrey (R) formally announced her candidacy

at an April 30th fundraiser attended by Steve Forbes. She will face a primary challenge from Howard County Executive Chuck Ecker (R) and could be haunted in the election by the outrageous cries of fraud she made following the 1994 election. Her spiteful, bordering on obsessive, attacks against Glendening after the race dropped her approval ratings in 1996. On June 16, she announced that former U.S. attorney Richard Bennett (R) will be the running mate for her ticket. Sauerbrey's selection of Bennett is very popular with GOP moderates around the state.

Sauerbrey has met with African American business leaders in Columbia, Maryland as a part of her effort to turn what has been a disastrous electoral liability for Republicans into an asset. It is still unlikely that there will be a significant African American vote for her. African Americans - almost one-quarter of the electorate in Maryland -- are the Democrats' most reliable supporters. Polls suggest that they voted nearly 9-to-1 for Glendening in 1994.

Because the closed Republican primary is dominated by the party's far right, the conservative Sauerbrey will likely defeat the moderate Ecker, despite her damaged reputation. At the first GOP debate, on May 20, Sauerbrey and Ecker focused on Glendening's ethics in government and faulting Democrats for public policy failure. The two offered almost no criticism of each other but instead issued harsh words towards Governor Glendening. The Democratic nominee would most likely be a slight favorite against Sauerbrey because of her very conservative views and marred image. However, if Ecker is able to emerge victorious from the GOP primary, he will present a formidable challenge to the Democrats.

A July 16-18, Mason Dixon showed Sauerbrey leading Ecker by 57 points in a primary matchup.

The above poll also found in a general election matchup, Governor Parris Glendening leading Ellen Sauerbrey by 7 points.

The general consensus is that Glendening has turned the corner. Some believe it started last summer with his handling of the pfiesteria outbreak in the rivers feeding the Chesapeake Bay, while other say his work on education and other environmental issues such as reducing run-off into waterways, and his opposition to gambling are the markers of his recovery. Although polling confirms his improved position, he is by no means out of the woods, but rather that he has been upgraded from critical to serious condition. This race is leaning Democratic.

1998 SENATE RACE

Senator Barbara Mikulski (D) is seeking reelection to a third term in 1998. She won election to a second term in 1992 with 71% of the vote and should easily win reelection in 1998. Her approval rating has been consistently in the mid 60's during the last three years and she has \$1,671,549 cash on hand. There are no shortages of Republicans lining up to challenge Mikulski, but none of them are likely to pose any serious threat to her. There are 8 Republicans who have filed for the September 15th primary: investment consultant John Stafford, physician Michael Gloth, attorney George Liebmann, computer software executive Kenneth Wayman, contractor Thomas Scott, 1988 house candidate Bradlyn McClanahan, Barry Steve Asbury, and John Taylor. For 1998, Republicans have wisely chosen to focus their attention on unseating Governor Parris Glendening (D) rather than wasting their efforts against Mikulski, who would help in turning out Democrats.

It is evident from the polls that none of the Republican candidates have any degree of name recognition. According to a April 2-5 *Mason-Dixon* poll, the undecideds led the field with a whopping 68 percent, followed by McClanahan with 15 percent, Liebmann with 8 percent, Scott with 6 percent, Gloth with 2 percent and Wayman with 1 percent. Mikulski had a favorable rating of 64 percent and had approximately 60 point lead over all her Republican challengers.

Republicans may have a crowded primary, but the value of the nomination is considered nothing. Mikulski will easily win reelection.

1998 CONGRESSIONAL RACE

Eighth Congressional District

Civil Rights activist Ralph Neas (D) announced in November his bid to unseat Rep. Connie Morella (R-08). This is the only Congressional race being watched in Maryland.

Morella has established a unique hold on this Democratic-leaning district with her moderate to liberal stands on social issues and her attentiveness to issues that affect the thousands of federal employees living in the district. She has won each of her re-election contests with at least 63 percent of the vote. As of the end of June 1998, Morella has \$539,983 cash on hand.

Neas, the former executive director of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, will be Morella's toughest opponent. His 15 years with the LCCR not only gained him a great deal of notoriety, but also provided him with tremendous contacts and relationships that have come in handy as he has begun his campaign. As of the end of June, Neas has \$208,311 cash on hand, more than any of Morella's previous opponents have had combined since 1988.

While Morella has racked up impressive winning percentages for the past 10 years, she is in for her stiffest campaign since her first election. Neas is a tireless candidate and fundraiser who will continue to run an aggressive campaign, but Morella has a strong grip on this district and will be difficult to demonize. This race will be competitive, but assuming that there will be no strong undertow for Republicans in November, this is leaning toward Morella.

MARYLAND HOT ISSUES:

Louis Goldstein

On July 3, state comptroller Louis Goldstein (D) passed away after 60 years of public service. Goldstein served in the state legislature for 20 years before becoming state comptroller for the past 40 years. The following Monday, July 6, Governor Glendening named his campaign chair and former Rep. Michael D. Barnes to fill the vacated position. Barnes, a liberal Democrat from Montgomery County, has been out of office since losing the 1986 primary for the U.S. Senate to Barbara Mikulski. Glendening's decision came despite the fact that former Governor William Schaefer and more than a dozen other candidates had filed to run for the office this fall. Schaefer and Barnes stood out among a small army of candidates, including former Baltimore City Council President Mary Pat Clarke, Baltimore Comptroller Joan M. Pratt and former Maryland Senator Julian L. Lapides. Among those staying out of the crowded field was Eileen Rehrmann, who resisted prodding from other Democrats that she should abandon her race against Glendening and run instead for comptroller.

At a July 9 press conference, just three days after accepting the appointment, Barnes withdrew from the position and the race to permanently fill the position. Barnes' actions came after a surge of political support mounted for the surprise candidacy of Schaefer. During the press conference Glendening announced that Schaefer would now run as part of his team working for reelection this fall and that he asked longtime Goldstein assistant, Robert Swann, to serve until a permanent replacement is selected in November. The announcement marked a quick effort by Glendening and his allies to make the best of what was rapidly turning into a potentially embarrassing free for all that could threaten Democratic unity for the fall elections. This latest development will strengthen Glendening's candidacy by adding the popular former governor to his ticket.

A July 16-18, Mason-Dixon/PMR poll, found Schaefer leading both primary opponent Joan Pratt (D) and potential general election opponents Michael Steele (R) and Tim Mayberry (R).

Ethics

On March 6, Governor Glendening ordered that all state agencies that have contracts with elected officials to submit them for review and make them available for public inspection. In a response to a legislative recommendation, Glendening (D) also created a commission to review state health care contracts, which were at the center of a recent Senate ethics scandal. The panel will have the authority to send questionable contracts to the Maryland attorney general for investigation. Glendening's actions came as ethics controversies dominated Legislature in

Annapolis. The scandals have set the stage for an election-year battle over the integrity of public officials, with Glendening himself a potential target for Republicans.

For the third time in 1998 the possibility of ethics violations were investigated in the Maryland state legislature. Allegations circulated that state House Speaker Casper R. Taylor Jr. (D), intervened with state officials to help a close friend win a unique state coal mining lease. Taylor met with top state officials in 1994 to promote a deal that gave James J. J. Oberhaus a lease to mine state-owned coal in Western Maryland. In promoting the arrangement, Taylor personally called the appraiser twice to stress his interest in the deal. The calls came after the appraiser concluded that the transaction was bad for the state. However, two Republican elected officials, Delegate George C. Edwards and Senator John J. Hafer were also mentioned as being involved with the coal mining lease. The Maryland General Assembly ethics committee voted unanimously on March 11 to clear Taylor of any ethical violations for his dealing with the mining deal. The Joint Committee on Legislative Ethics came to the conclusion that no ethic violations were committed after reviewing news accounts of the transaction and a letter from Taylor defending himself.

Delegate Gerald J. Curran (D), a Northeast Baltimore Democrat and member of one of Maryland's most prominent political families, submitted his resignation from the Maryland House of Delegates on February 26. Curran, 58, a Townson-based insurance broker, was due to appear on March 2, before the General Assembly's Joint Committee on Legislative Ethics to defend some of the insurance arrangements he has entered into in recent years. After receiving Curran's resignation letter, the ethics committee voted on February 26 to end its investigation. Curran's resignation ends a 32 year legislative career under an ethics probe into his business dealings with the University of Maryland System. He pushed for seven years to establish an insurance program for the University of Maryland's 30,000 employees. He sought help from his contacts in state government, including former Governor William Schaefer (D) and Comptroller Louis Goldstein (D). Curran's decision saves the House from having to consider disciplining the longtime legislator, as the Senate did in January with Senator Larry Young (D).

On January 16, African American West Baltimore state Senator Larry Young was the first Maryland lawmaker in two centuries to be expelled by his colleagues. An investigation found Young was guilty of using his elected office for personal gain. On February 10, a five-member Democratic Central Committee in Young's district unanimously agreed that he should return to his seat. Attorney General Joseph Curran Jr. (D) issued a formal opinion on February 10 saying that under the Maryland Constitution, each House shall judge the qualifications and elections of its members and that Young has already been deemed unqualified to hold his seat by his colleagues. Acting upon the advice of Attorney General Curran, Governor Parris Glendening (D) refused to reappoint Young to his Senate seat. Under the urging of Glendening the Democratic Central Committee nominated a new candidate to fill the vacated seat. On February 16 the committee nominated John Jeffries to fill the post. Jeffries, 69, is a former two term member of the Maryland House of Delegates and currently serves as assistant secretary in the state's Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation. The 44th District committee selected Jeffries to fill the west Baltimore Senate seat until the term expires in January 1999. This will be the second time that Jeffries has filled a seat left vacant by Young. In 1988, Jeffries succeeded him

in the House of Delegates when Young moved over to take an open Senate seat. Jeffries says that he will finish the term out but will not seek election to a full four year term this fall-- leaving Young the opportunity to make another bid to reclaim the seat.

- Small Community College Funding, an initiative that will make tuition affordable, improve administrative efficiency, and expand programs in information technology at the state's small community colleges.
- Public school construction funding, a total of \$222 million in Fiscal Year 1999 to build new schools where necessary, as well as to modernize and renovate existing schools in established communities-the highest amount in 25 years.

Nominee: Herbert B. Silber

Organization: San Jose State University

Proposal # HRD-9814702

Summary: Dr. Silber has a distinguished 25-year record of seeking-out and mentoring minority and disadvantaged students at the high school, undergraduate and graduate levels. The focal point of Dr. Silber's mentoring activity is the laboratory. As evidenced by 90 publications co-authored by students, Dr. Silber involves his students in significant research and supports their efforts. At the national level, Dr. Silber has had a 20-year involvement with the American Chemical Society's SEED program (Summer Educational Experiences for the Disadvantaged), including a very successful three-year appointment as chair of the National SEED Committee.

Nominee: Billy Joe Evans

Organization: University of Michigan

Proposal # HRD-9814705

Summary: In over 25 years at the University of Michigan, Dr. Evans has secured significant support for undergraduate and graduate programs to enhance minority participation in science. At the precollege level, Dr. Evans has placed more than 200 inner-city minority high school students in authentic research settings. Approximately 50 of these students are still enrolled in undergraduate programs and at least a dozen have earned Ph.D. or M.D. degrees from several of the nation's leading universities.

Nominee: Sheila E. Browne

Organization: Mount Holyoke College

Proposal # HRD-9814714

Summary: As one of two women and the only Native American in her Ph.D. class of 140 at the University of California, Berkeley, Dr. Browne knows first-hand the need for, and importance of mentoring. Through her efforts with the New England Board of Education, Dr. Browne has provided opportunities for hundreds of high school, community college, and undergraduate students in science. Dr. Browne is currently faculty mentor for the fifty members of the student organization, Sisters in Science. Her performance encouraging women, particularly women of color, from the precollege to the doctoral level, to prepare and succeed in science is exceptional.

Nominee: Su-Seng Pang

Organization: Louisiana State University (LSU)/Southern University (SU)

Proposal # HRD-9814716

Summary: In addition to his research and teaching responsibilities as a Professor at LSU and as an adjunct Professor at SU, Dr. Pang advises and supports at least 30 minority undergraduate engineering/science students per year. He is also a leader in the State of Louisiana in supervising engineering/science minority Ph.D. students. Current mentees include three African American doctoral students. Former mentees include four doctoral degree recipients, one of whom recently joined the SU faculty. Dr. Pang is one of the State leaders among university faculty members promoting mathematics and science for middle and high school students.

Nominee: Jesse M. Nicholson

Organization: Howard University

Proposal # HRD-9814718

Summary: During his 32-year tenure at Howard University, Dr. Nicholson has served as advisor to 14 doctoral students, 9 master's degree students and countless undergraduates. Under Dr. Nicholson's stewardship there has been a 100% increase in total enrollment in Howard's chemistry program and in the number of students pursuing doctoral degrees in chemistry. The program annually produces 20-25% of the nation's African American Ph.Ds. in chemistry. Dr. Nicholson also collaborates in a precollege program that allows high school students to experience hands-on scientific research at Howard.

Nominee: Nina M. Roscher

Organization: American University

Proposal # HRD-9814720

Summary: Dr. Roscher has a thirty-year history of mentoring outstanding women and minority scientists at the baccalaureate, master's and doctoral levels. Dr. Roscher has provided sustained academic support to her students, encouraging 25 students to complete master's degrees and 9 students to obtain the Ph.D. As a student, Dr. Roscher developed several peer-mentoring strategies. Dr. Roscher has also been highly successful securing funds and fellowships for her graduate students.

Nominee: Armando A. Rodriguez

Organization: Arizona State University (ASU)

Proposal # HRD-9814738

Summary: Soon after his arrival six years ago at ASU, Dr. Rodriguez developed a mentoring program entitled MoSART (*Modeling, Simulation, Animation, and Real-Time Control*) that cuts across the entire spectrum of undergraduate education reaching into the job market and graduate school. Through the program, Dr. Rodriguez has influenced more than 80 students to complete their degrees in a timely manner and to take advantage of opportunities such as internships, publications and conference activities. Dr. Rodriguez has also directed 10 master's and 2 Ph.D. recipients and is currently supervising 10 additional graduate students. Dr. Rodriguez has put forth an excellent example of an innovative approach to mentoring that can be replicated elsewhere.

Nominee: Winsor E. Alexander

Organization: North Carolina State University (NCSU)

Proposal # HRD-9816097

Summary: Over the past 20 years, Dr. Winsor Alexander has successfully promoted the advancement of African American students, by providing sound advice and mentoring at the graduate and precollege levels. Dr. Alexander has successfully recruited African American students into graduate engineering resulting in enrollments of approximately 10 Ph.D. students each year from underrepresented groups over the last several years. The Department of Electrical Engineering at NCSU has had eight African American Ph.D. graduates over the last 10 years; Dr. Alexander has mentored all of them. Dr. Alexander is also involved in tutoring and mentoring African American high school students on a weekly basis.

Nominee: Aubrey Gorbman

Summary: Dr. Gorbman truly pioneered the concept of "science mentoring of women" by effectively advising a significant number of Ph.D. female students and postdoctoral associates at a time of significant underrepresentation. Dr. Gorbman has been retired for 12 years, and yet continues to keep as active as that experienced mentor that young researchers are happy to find. Over a span of 25 years, he advised 50 postdoctoral associates (13 of them women) and 16 Ph.D.s (9 women). Most of these women have made significant contributions to the field of research and are considered to be role models. Dr. Gorbman founded and

meticulously edited the *Journal of Comparative Endocrinology* for 32 years. He included in the editorial board both women and minorities.

He has managed to continue supporting students at all levels over the years and helped 20 students from Appalachia to pursue successful graduate work. Through his research projects, Dr. Butterfield affords many underrepresented undergraduates and graduate students the opportunity to experience groundbreaking laboratory research. Of Dr. Butterfield's many students, five females earned doctorates and eight earned master's. Four females are currently pursuing doctoral degrees and one is pursuing a master's degree.

Summary: Between 1990 and the present, 13 doctoral degrees and 49 master's degrees in mathematics or mathematics-related fields have been awarded by UNL to women, compared to no doctoral degrees awarded during the entire decade of the 1980s. These increases in the number of mathematics or mathematics-related degrees earned by women attest to a climate highly supportive of women and to the effectiveness of the UNL approach. Women graduate students in the UNL Department of Mathematics and Statistics are encouraged to mentor high school students, meet regularly with role models, engage in research, attend professional meetings, and acquire teaching experience. For the past six years, 45% of the graduate student body of the UNL Department of Mathematics and Statistics has consisted of women.

SUBJECT: Achieving Greater Diversity Throughout the U.S. Scientific
and Technical Workforce

The American higher education system is justifiably envied for its excellence in advanced training in science and engineering. Maintaining leadership across the frontiers of science and producing the finest scientists and engineers for the twenty-first century are principal goals of this Administration's science and technology policies.

As we work to develop the finest scientists and engineers for the twenty-first century, our human resources policy must move beyond simply the supply and demand of personnel and address the composition of our science and engineering workforce. Achieving diversity throughout the ranks of the scientific and technical workforce presents a formidable challenge. The number of women, minorities, and persons with disabilities in science and engineering, relative even to professions such as medicine and law, remains low. We need to draw upon the full talent pool. We cannot afford to overlook anyone.

Participation of women, ethnic minorities, and persons with disabilities in scientific and technical fields leaves much room for improvement and continued policy considerations. At all degree levels in U.S. science and engineering, African-Americans, Hispanics, and Native Americans remain under-represented. In every year of this decade, there have been far too few minorities awarded degrees in a science or engineering field. The trend in minority admissions and degree awards is not encouraging.

Today, the science and engineering workforce hardly reflects the face of America. By 2010, about half of America's school-age population will be from minority groups, emphasizing the importance to the nation of broader participation in science and engineering careers. Expanding such participation will require drawing on and developing talent at all stages of educational preparation leading to advanced study. For example, only a small fraction, perhaps one-eighth, of all high school graduates have the mathematics and science preparation that would permit advanced study in a technical field; for under represented minorities, the fraction is only half as much.

The work of individuals and organizations to inspire and mentor young people, and offer role models is crucial. To recognize this, the annual Presidential Awards in Science, Mathematics, and Engineering Mentoring were established in 1996. Individuals and

organizations are honored for their outstanding mentoring efforts that have encouraged significant numbers of minorities, women, and disabled persons to succeed in these fields.

The Federal government, working in partnership with the private sector and state governments, can be an effective agent of change; we can promote fuller participation of women, minorities, and people with disabilities in scientific and technical careers. With your help, my Administration has promoted quality education in the crucial early years (K-12) by improving the quality of our schools and teachers, expanding access to the Internet and other technology-based learning tools, and basing all our efforts on rigorous standards through Goals 2000. We have expanded access to higher education by making it more affordable.

Existing Federal programs provide the means to achieve, but what are also needed in many cases are the mentors or role models that can help point the way to success. My High Hopes initiative will provide mentoring for middle and high school students to encourage larger numbers of low-income young people to enroll in colleges and universities. However, we must continue to assist under-represented minorities as they make their way through the myriad options available to them once they enter into our nation's system of higher education. This is especially true for important technical career paths where minorities traditionally are under-represented.

Therefore, I direct the National Science and Technology Council (NSTC) to develop recommendations in 180 days on how to achieve greater diversity throughout our scientific and technical workforce. The NSTC will provide a road map to bolster mentoring in science and technology fields by recommending linkages and improvements to existing Federal programs that expand access; and to work with the private sector and academia to strengthen mentoring in higher education to ensure educational and career success.

BIOGRAPHICAL DATA ON
AMBASSADORS PRESENTING CREDENTIALS
September 10, 1998

Ambassador Bolger (New Zealand), a prominent figure in New Zealand, served as his country's Prime Minister from 1990-1997 and as a Member of Parliament for 26 years. He has also served as Minister of Maori Affairs, Fisheries, Labor, and Immigration and as President of the International Labor Organization. An experienced dairy, sheep, and beef farmer, he and his wife have nine children. He has an abiding interest in American History, particularly the Civil War.

Ambassador Philon (Greece), a career diplomat, has held numerous interesting assignments, his first posting as third secretary at the Greek Mission to the UN. From 1984-1989 he served as Deputy Chief of Mission here in Washington; from 1989-1993 he served as his country's Ambassador to India, Sri Lanka, Burma, and Nepal (residing in New Delhi); and from 1993-1995 he served as Ambassador to Turkey. Prior to arriving in Washington he was Secretary-General of the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs, its most senior career position.

Ambassador Shoval (Israel), earned his bachelors degree at the University of California. From 1970-1981 and again from 1988-1990 he was a member of the Israeli Knesset. This is his second posting as Ambassador to the U.S., having first served from 1990-1993. Ambassador Shoval is a member of the Likud Party's Central Bodies and President of World Likud. Previously he served as Director of Likud's Foreign Relations Bureau. He has also been active in banking, investing and business.

Ambassador Vang (Laos), another career diplomat, has spent the bulk of his 21 year career in Vientiane, most recently serving as Director-General of the Asia Pacific and Africa Department at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He has had postings abroad in Beijing (1979-1980) and Bangkok (1987-1990). From 1990-1994 he served as his country's Ambassador to Australia.

Ambassador Conzemius (Luxembourg), also a career diplomat, has had several postings abroad, including five years in Brussels at the European Communities, and as the Deputy Chief of Mission at the Luxembourg Embassy here in Washington (1989-1993). Just prior to this ambassadorial appointment Ambassador Conzemius served two years as her country's Permanent Representative to the Council of Europe in Strasbourg. During Luxembourg's EU Presidency and troika periods (1997-1998), she was her government's point person on human rights.

Ambassador da Rosa (Guinea-Bissau), entered the foreign service in 1977. He has had postings in Algeria and Belgium as well as his country's Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Bissau. Since 1989, Ambassador da Rosa has served in New York as his country's Deputy Permanent Representative to the UN.

Ambassador Johnny (Saint Lucia), holds degrees from the University of the West Indies, Johns Hopkins, and a J.D. from Georgetown. From 1979-1989 she served her country's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and at the St. Kitts Embassy here in Washington. She was in the corporation counsel's office of the D.C. Government from 1993-1997 and with private law firms also here in Washington from 1989-1997.

Ambassador Dimitrov (Bulgaria), a 1977 graduate of the University of Sofia, spent the next 12 years practicing civil law. Never a Communist Party member, he co-founded the Green Party (a former Union of Democratic Forces (UDF) component) in 1989. He served as Prime Minister from November 1991 to December 1992. After the collapse of his government, Ambassador Dimitrov remained UDF chairman until 1994. He has been a member of Parliament since 1992. Before coming to Washington, he served as his country's Permanent Representative at the UN.

Ambassador Marcoullis (Cyprus), a career diplomat, received both a bachelor's degree in law and a second degree in public law and political science at the University of Athens as well as a doctorate in social sciences from the University of Helsinki. Some of her postings abroad have included serving in New York twice at her country's Mission to the UN (1980-1981; 1983-1988) and also at the Cyprus Consulate (1982-1983). Most recently she served as the Cypriot Ambassador to Sweden.

Ambassador Stixrud (Guatemala), a civil engineer who has spent many years designing and constructing housing, has also owned and managed his family's farm, Candelaria. He has held many positions with agricultural organizations and has also been active in governmental and nongovernmental organizations involved with rural development, legal assistance for farmers, and resolution of land conflicts.

Ambassador Gautam (Nepal), studied business administration at Syracuse University after attaining a Masters of Arts and Bachelor of Law degrees in Nepal. In 1992 he retired as Nepal's highest career civil servant, serving as Chief Secretary under Prime Minister Koirala. Since then Ambassador Gautam has served on various public corporate boards and as an advisor to international organizations operating in Nepal.

Ambassador Reyn (Belgium), a 30 year career diplomat, holds a doctorate in law from the State University of Ghent. Over the years he has held numerous positions at the Belgian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Abroad postings have included serving in Kinshasa and Geneva. Ambassador Reyn has also held two positions at the UN in New York, first as political Minister-Counselor (1984-1987), and more recently as the Permanent Representative of Belgium (1993-1998).

SUBJECT: Summary of 1998 Cabinet Accomplishments and Goals

DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Headwaters: DOI achieved two key milestones in its on-going effort to acquire and set aside old growth redwood stands in northern CA ("Headwaters Forest"): 1) the negotiation of a draft Habitat Conservation Plan that will protect 200,000 acres of forest land, in addition to the 7,500 acres of old growth redwoods that are being purchased; and 2) approval of state funds from the State of California to complete the purchase of the Headwaters Forest.

National Petroleum Reserve-AK: DOI issued a final Integrated Activity Plan/Environmental Impact Statement for the northeast corner of the National Petroleum Reserve-AK. The preferred alternative would make 87 percent of the area available for oil and gas leasing while protecting subsistence use areas and important habitats.

Grand Staircase-Escalante Monument: DOI reached an agreement with the State of UT on the largest state-federal land swap of this century, fulfilling your promise that the school children of UT would not suffer financial loss from the creation of the Grand Staircase-Escalante Monument.

New World Mine: DOI completed the purchase of the New World Mine in MT to protect the watersheds in the northern portion of Yellowstone National Park.

Everglades: DOI completed the draft of the Multi-Species Recovery Plan for threatened and endangered species in the region; developed a State, Federal, and tribal consensus on the Corps of Engineers' initial draft plan for restudy of the water management system for South FL, and completed a purchase agreement with the St. Joe Company and The Nature Conservancy to acquire the Talisman property--a major land acquisition in support of the restoration effort.

GOALS

Headwaters: DOI expects to complete all requirements associated with the purchase of the Headwaters Forest and the protection of the surrounding 200,000 acres of timber. The transaction must be completed by March 1, or Congressional funding for the purchase will not be available.

Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument: DOI will release a draft plan and environmental impact statement for the new Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument and conduct public meetings on the draft plan.

Everglades: DOI will complete work on the restudy of the water management system for the region and complete the final public review and approval of the Multi-Species Recovery Plan. Finalize acquisition of the Talisman property.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Farm Safety Net: USDA provided \$412 million in 8,652 direct loans, and \$691 million in 4,970 guaranteed loans to family farmers in rural America to date in FY98. In addition, USDA provided direct and guaranteed loans to 1,550 minority and women farmers so far in FY98. In FY97, USDA provided direct loans totaling \$80.5 million to 2,111 USDA farmers, exceeding the Congress's targeted allocation by 176 percent. USDA initiated new foreclosure and lending policies in an effort to ensure that no one will lose their farm because of discrimination.

Tobacco: USDA worked closely with DPC to ensure that tobacco farmers were protected in comprehensive tobacco legislation under consideration in Congress as a result of the historic Tobacco Settlement Agreement between State Attorneys General and Tobacco Companies.

International Markets: USDA continued implementation of two major new trade agreements--the Uruguay Round Agreement on Agriculture and the North American Free Trade Agreement--as well as countless bilateral agreements to open markets for U.S. agricultural products. As a result of these and other efforts, U.S. agricultural exports have risen from \$40 billion at the beginning of this decade to an estimated \$55 billion this year.

Rural Revitalization and Job Creation: Some 2.5 million people have benefited from improved drinking water quality or been provided with a public water supply for the first time since Water 2000 was launched in August 1994. To date, USDA has invested nearly \$1.7 billion in more than 1,300 rural communities.

Conservation: USDA made the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) more environmentally sensitive and sound; enrolled nearly 23 million acres of America's most environmentally sensitive lands for protection in the CRP, freeing up millions of acres of cropland to be put back into production; and started the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program, using state and federal resources to help solve environmental problems.

Food Security: USDA overhauled the national school lunch and breakfast programs for the first time in 50 years to improve the popularity and nutritiousness of school meals. New dietary guidelines will upgrade the nutritional quality of meals served.

Food Safety: USDA put in place a farm-to-table food safety initiative, integrating efforts within USDA for surveillance and inspection, research, risk assessment and education for producers, processors, retailers and consumers.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Aggressive Export Promotion: DOC conducted a Secretarial Trade Mission to Northern Ireland/Irish Republic; participated in Presidential trips to Africa, Latin America, China, Russia, Northern Ireland (e.g., China Summit initiatives on housing, aviation, insurance) and in Latin American Telecommunications Summit; Under Secretary for Trade mission to Asia; and held nationwide outreach seminars to help U.S. companies to 1) respond to impacts of the Asian financial crisis and 2) maximize opportunities from European monetary union.

Expanding Opportunity: DOC expanded access of minority-owned businesses to E-Commerce/Internet, including Phoenix/Opportunity Database (market leads and bid-matching), outreach and training materials, and "One-Stop Centers" in two key growth sectors.

Census: DOC completed major operational phases for Census 2000 "dress rehearsal" on time and within budget; delivered specific questions proposed for Census 2000 to Congress by April 1 deadline.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Workforce Investment Act: DOL secured passage of major employment and training reform legislation that incorporated the principles of your *GI Bill for America's Workers*.

Youth Opportunities: Authorized as part of the Workforce Investment Act, this program was part of your four-year, \$1 billion commitment to provide grants to expand job opportunities for at-risk youth in high poverty areas.

Welfare-to-Work: DOL implemented the Welfare-to-Work program, including formula grants to 42 states totaling \$815 million and 51 competitive grants totaling \$198 million.

Technology: DOL instituted high-tech employment and training strategies, including the expansion of America's Job Bank to target high-tech employers and the Y2K problem.

Social Security: DOL held a National Summit on Retirement Savings and delivered the National Saver Summit Report to Congress.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Child Health Insurance Program (CHIP) Approvals: As of September 1998, 35 of the 53 CHIP proposals have been approved. It is projected that over the next six months, 50 of the 53 plans will be approved. According to a recent report by The Commonwealth Fund, more than 9 million of the 11.3 million children under age 19 who do not have health insurance would be eligible for coverage under either CHIP or Medicaid if states were to enroll all those who are eligible. This would reduce the number of uninsured children by 80 percent. HHS is coordinating the Administration outreach initiative and is working with the responsible agencies to marshal all resources to identify these children and get them enrolled.

Food Safety: HHS will play an active role in the National Food Safety Initiative. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), with the Vice President, launched a national computer network of public health laboratories called PulseNet that will help rapidly identify and stop episodes of foodborne illness. CDC is providing these public health laboratories with state-of-the-art technology that performs DNA "fingerprinting" on foodborne bacteria. CDC, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), and USDA have increased the number of surveillance sites across the country in the FoodNet network and coordination of these efforts is working well. FoodNet tracks foodborne diseases outbreaks to help public health officials better understand the foodborne diseases. In addition, HHS will play a prominent role on the President's Council on Food Safety and will participate in developing a comprehensive strategic plan for federal food safety activities.

Welfare Reform: As of June, welfare caseloads had declined to approximately 8.4 million recipients and slightly over 3 million families. There are 5.7 million fewer recipients on the welfare rolls since you took office, and 3.8 million fewer welfare recipients since the passage of the 1996 law. The rate of decline for 1998 remains strong with nearly 2 percent reductions each month, almost double the rate for the same period in 1997. HHS has designed a national welfare reform evaluation strategy that invests resources to build knowledge on the results of welfare reform implementation, to study the critical importance of supports like child care and child support that improve the transition from welfare to work, and to promote successful strategies on how best to help families on welfare keep and advance in jobs. In addition, HHS continues to focus on implementing the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) regulation.

GOALS

Consumer Bill of Rights: HHS will continue to work on implementing your directive on the Consumer Bill of Rights. As a lead member on the "Quality Interagency Coordination" (QuIC) task force, HHS is taking an active role government-wide in this effort. After two meetings of the QuIC, five initiatives have emerged in the areas of Patient and Consumer Information, Key

Opportunities for Improving Clinical Quality, Improving Quality Measurement, Developing the Workforce and Improving Information Systems. HHS will also work with Congress to ensure passage of the Patient Bill of Rights.

Medicare+Choice: Starting in January 1999, in addition to original fee-for-service Medicare and health maintenance organizations, a broader array of health plans will be able to join Medicare, including preferred provider organizations (PPOs), provider sponsored organizations (PSOs), private fee-for-service plans (PFFS), and a Medical Savings Account (MSA) demonstration project. To assist Medicare beneficiaries in making decisions about their care, HCFA is planning a comprehensive national information campaign designed to provide consumers with information about available plans, answers to frequently asked questions, and additional information resources. The campaign will include a national Internet site with comparative information on available plans. HCFA will also begin piloting in five states a toll-free hotline service to assist beneficiaries and continue focus-group testing a comprehensive Medicare handbook, "Medicare and You." Beneficiaries will receive information this Fall regarding the new Medicare Medical Savings Account demonstration project and other Medicare health plan options.

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Increasing Affordable Housing: The nation's homeownership rate during the second quarter of this year rose to 66 percent, tying the all-time record rate set in the 3rd quarter of 1997. The number of families owning their own homes rose to 68.3 million, the highest number in American history. The second quarter rate was up slightly from the first quarter rate, which was 65.9 percent. These record-setting rates are the result of a strong economy created by the Administration's policies and HUD's homeownership initiatives.

Fighting for Fair Housing: HUD is committed to cracking down on all forms of housing discrimination. Since January, HUD has either sought or obtained relief in 590 cases of housing discrimination. Additionally, in April of this year, HUD announced two landmark actions. HUD, for the first time, required a builder to make modifications to completed housing units so they are accessible to people with disabilities. HUD also announced the highest settlement of mortgage lending discrimination allegations in U.S. history. A conciliation agreement was signed by the AccuBanc Mortgage Corporation targeting \$2.1 billion in mortgages to minorities and low- and moderate-income families in the next three years to enable them to become homeowners. AccuBanc also agreed to spend \$24 million over the next three years in mortgage closing cost assistance to targeted families. Fair housing agencies expect over 15,700 families will receive mortgages because of this agreement.

Community Builders: One of the pivotal moments in HUD's history will occur in September when the first round of external *Community Builders* joins the Department. This group of 230 high caliber professionals will join the internal Community Builders in becoming the new face of

HUD in the hundreds of communities HUD serves. The Community Builders, who will be knowledgeable about the wide range of HUD programs will focus exclusively on helping HUD's existing and potential clients navigate the wealth of opportunities offered by the Department. In partnership with Harvard University, which will provide training to the Community Builders, these individuals will resemble an "urban Peace Corps." Community Builders will be based out of HUD's 81 field offices and will travel into nearby cities and towns to serve as the agency's first point of contact. This infusion of new talent and skills will strengthen HUD's partnership with localities across the country. The Community Builders program is a major element of HUD's management reform plan, which calls for a new focus on community outreach and direct customer service for the public.

Empowering People and Communities: Last year HUD started the Officer Next Door program with the double duty of expanding homeownership and creating safer communities. Under this initiative, police officers purchase HUD homes at a discounted price in the communities they serve. During the past several months, HUD has accepted 1,484 contracts and sold 1,336 homes under this program.

Bad Landlords: HUD's crackdown on bad landlords is one of the most dramatic enforcement measures now underway. HUD, in partnership with DOJ, is cracking down on landlords who are abusing federal housing programs for self-enrichment. During the past six months, HUD has continued its efforts to severely sanction these individuals and organizations.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

TEA-21: DOT's greatest legislative accomplishment during the past six months was the passage of the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (TEA-21). This six-year reauthorization guarantees a record \$198 billion investment, within the limits of the balanced budget agreement, to maintain and improve America's surface transportation systems. It also, in your words, expands opportunity for every American. It is DOT's intention to administer these funds in a way that fulfills this Administration's objectives.

Safety: DOT's highest priority continues to be promoting public safety and health by eliminating transportation-related death, injury, and property damage.

Rail Safety: From January to May 1998, there was a 16 percent reduction in rail collisions, a seven percent reduction in rail-related fatalities, and a 27 percent reduction in rail-related injuries. In July, DOT signed an MOU initiating a four-year effort with the rail industry to develop Positive Train Control technology to support safe high-speed passenger operations and to improve freight railroad capacity utilization. DOT has also used its regulatory authority to include safety as a factor in approval of rail mergers.

Safer Skies Agenda: On April 14, the Vice President announced the FAA Safer Skies agenda, a partnership to reduce fatal air transportation industry accidents by 80 percent over the next decade by focusing resources on the most prevalent causes of aircraft accidents and using special teams of technical experts to recommend safety advances.

Record Level Safety Performance: On August 24, DOT announced that newly analyzed data from the Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS) shows that as of 1997, the proportion of fatalities that are alcohol-related had dropped below 40 percent for the first time since 1975.

Drug Interdiction: On August 18, the USCG, working jointly with U.S. Customs, seized 5,149 pounds of cocaine -- 23 million doses -- from a Panamanian registered freighter.

DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Energy Strategy: DOE developed a *Comprehensive National Energy Strategy* to address the nation's growing dependence on imported oil, while producing a cleaner environment. This document addresses new technologies like fuel cells that will make our nation more energy efficient.

Electricity Restructuring Legislation: DOE announced the Administration's strategy to bring competition to the electric utility industry, a proposal that will result in \$20 billion in annual savings to the American people. The legislation to make this proposal a reality was finalized and submitted to Congress in June.

Climate Change: DOE is the lead domestic agency on climate change and has carried out a large number of activities in support of this initiative. DOE is making key investments in energy efficiency, renewable energy, improving efficiency in power generation, and carbon sequestration in order to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in a cost-effective manner.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Student Loan Interest Rates: DOEd made college more affordable by winning passage of new low interest rates that will save about \$700 for the typical college student with loans.

Workforce Bill: The new Adult Education and Family Literacy Act consolidated categorical programs into a single, flexible State grant with performance measures to ensure accountability.

Higher Education Tax Credits: The HOPE Scholarship took effect January 1, and the Lifetime Learning Tax Credit took effect July 1.

America Reads Challenge: Over 1,000 colleges and universities signed on to the America Reads Federal Work-Study program to send their work-study students into schools and communities to tutor children in reading.

New Publications: DOEd issued *Early Warning, Timely Response: A Guide to Safe Schools*, which tells what to look for and what to do to prevent violence in schools and when to intervene and get help for troubled children.

GOALS

School Modernization Tax Credits: DOEd will work to ensure that any tax legislation includes our proposal to pay the interest on bonds for building, rebuilding, modernizing over 5,000 public schools.

Class Size Reduction: DOEd will work to pass legislation to help local school districts to hire additional teachers and reduce class sizes nationally in grades 1-3 to an average of 18 students.

Education Technology: DOEd will work to secure full funding for your education technology initiatives, block further attempts to repeal or delay the E-Rate, and make first E-Rate awards.

VETERANS AFFAIRS

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Quality of Care: Customer service standards have been implemented, customer satisfaction surveys are routinely performed, and management is being held accountable for improving service satisfaction. In FY97, 65 percent of all inpatients reported the quality of VA care as very good or excellent. VA is working on outcome measurements for health care that are the best in the business.

Staff Reduction: Between December 1994 and March 1998, VA staffing has decreased by over 23,000 while the number of patients treated per year has increased by more than 10 percent. Annual VA inpatient admissions have decreased by 24 percent while ambulatory care visits increased by 30 percent. VA has consolidated 48 facilities into 23 integrated systems.

GOALS

Improving Benefits Delivery: VA plans to implement an initiative with DoD in which veterans can file for benefits even before leaving the service. VA have developed a partnership with DOL and state agencies to conduct six joint training seminars for disabled veterans.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY

Clean Air: EPA is moving ahead to implement the updated air quality standards for ozone (smog) and particulate matter (soot). For example, working with auto manufacturers and states, EPA adopted a voluntary nationwide program for new cars and light trucks that will be 70

percent cleaner. Consumers will be able to purchase cleaner vehicles in the Northeast beginning later this year, and these vehicles will be available nationally by late 2000. The emissions benefits associated with the program are the equivalent of taking 10.5 million new cars off the road.

Safe Drinking Water: Administrator Browner signed a final rule requiring water systems to provide annual Consumer Customer Reports to their customers. These reports will provide important information about drinking water, including the source, the presence of contaminants, potential health effects, and the treatment process used.

Climate Change: EPA has built 6,000 partnerships with small and large businesses, state and local governments, schools and universities, hospitals, and other organizations in order to reduce energy bills and prevent pollution.

UNITED STATES TRADE REPRESENTATIVE

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

FTAA: Negotiations match all U.S. objectives including a comprehensive negotiating schedule, launching negotiations in Miami this year, and concluding with the U.S. co-chairing the close of negotiations with Brazil.

Global Electronic Commerce: USTR negotiated an agreement in the WTO to maintain duty free electronic commerce and secured important bilateral agreements with Japan and the EU on this front.

Transatlantic Economic Partnership: In May, you and Prime Minister Blair announced that the U.S. and the EU would proceed with a broad new trade initiative, the Transatlantic Economic Partnership, to bring down trade barriers across goods, services, and agricultural trade.

Free Trade Zone: Together with Israeli Trade Minister, Natan Sharansky, and a Jordanian official, Ambassador Barshefsky announced the conclusion of an Israeli-Jordanian-U.S. free trade zone which we will seek to expand in the months ahead.

GOALS

Trade Initiatives: To a great extent U.S. public, congressional, and international perceptions of on-going trade initiatives are substantially influenced by the on-going economic uncertainty in Asia, Latin America, and Russia. Ambassador Barshefsky will focus on the importance of market-opening initiatives in these areas of the world in the months ahead and will invest substantial efforts in maintaining support for the expansion of trade relationships both among domestic publics and trading partners. With regard to congressional activities, the efforts of Ambassador Barshefsky and USTR will be focused on achieving attainable trade objectives (securing USTR's appropriations request, Africa trade legislation, renewal of GSP, passage of CBI, Trade Adjustment Assistance, MFN for Mongolia, and ratification of the Global

Shipbuilding Agreement). The Ambassador is investing substantial attention toward key trade initiatives which have involved you, particularly the Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA), the new U.S.-EU Trans-Atlantic Economic Partnership, and the APEC sectoral initiative. In the FTAA, USTR will begin negotiations across nine areas this Fall in Miami, FL and launch the work of the Civil Society working group to address environment and labor concerns. Within APEC, USTR is focused on securing the \$1.5 trillion sectoral trade package at the November APEC meeting in Malaysia. USTR also plans to launch talks in the new U.S.-EU trade relationship in the coming months (December). To enhance the U.S. position, Ambassador Barshevsky will conduct meetings in Brussels (EU), and Bonn, Germany in October.

Trade Enforcement: USTR will continue to engage in an aggressive enforcement effort including renewal of "Super 301" and "Title VII" foreign procurement surveillance to be announced by Ambassador Barshevsky in September. USTR intends to use this announcement to announce a new series of cases which to bring to the WTO on behalf of U.S. industry. Over the next few months, the EU must announce its compliance strategy in the bananas distribution case, and Canada must formally present its plan to open its market further to U.S. magazines. USTR is awaiting the WTO Appellate Body decision (deadline October 17) with concern in terms of how environmental constituencies interpret WTO actions related to the environment. While not technically in the enforcement category, as part of the Administration's efforts to encourage macroeconomic reforms in Asia and build support for IMF funding and other initiatives, USTR will monitor actions in Korea (e.g., autos), Indonesia, and Malaysia toward the objectives of greater market transparency, reduction of trade barriers, and generating more open competition.

OFFICE OF NATIONAL DRUG CONTROL POLICY

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Release of the *National Drug Control Strategy*: The five-year goal is to reduce drug consumption and availability by 25 percent by 2002 and by 50 percent by 2007. This will bring national drug-use rates to the lowest level in the past 30 years.

Five-Year Drug-Control Budgets: ONDCP transmitted to Congress, along with the FY99 budget, preliminary estimates of drug-control resources required in out years to attain the goals and objectives of your *Strategy*.

National Youth Anti-Drug Media Campaign: You and Speaker Gingrich provided great visibility to this important prevention initiative. Anti-drug messages are now reaching all of America's teens on average four times a week.

Athletic Initiative against Drugs: The NHL, 18 Major League Baseball teams, Major League Soccer, and the NCAA have teamed up with ONDCP. ONDCP is now working with the NFL, USOC, and others. On October 23, ONDCP will hold the first-ever *National "Coachathon" Against Drugs*.

GOALS

Southwest Border Coordination: ONDCP will submit a detailed proposal to address coordination problems among the 23 federal agencies involved in drug-control operations along the U.S.-Mexico border.

FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

Project Impact: FEMA initiated the pilot phase of Project Impact in seven communities, with the goal of establishing Disaster Resistant Communities nationally in 50 states.

Disaster Loans: FEMA partnered with Fannie Mae to implement a nation-wide program of low interest loans for homeowners wishing to retrofit their homes against disasters. Similar local loan partnerships have been developed with banks in Seattle, WA, Pascagoula, MS, and Oakland, CA.

Disaster Prevention: FEMA developed a training program on disaster prevention for economic development officials in partnership with DOC's Economic Development Administration.

UNITED STATES INFORMATION AGENCY

Embassy Bombings: USIA broadcast and internet media provided immediate news and information on official U.S. reaction in several African and international languages. Following the U.S. response in Sudan and Afghanistan, USIA disseminated timely information on U.S. actions, purposes, and goals, including live broadcast of your statements, in Arabic and Farsi and on the USIA website. The USIA research office is tracking foreign attitudes and reactions through international opinion polling and media reaction reports from key capitals. Over the next several months, broadcast media will focus on global anti-terrorism efforts. USIA will poll in Jordan, Lebanon, Saudi Arabia, and the U.A.E. on reactions to terrorism, U.S. actions, and related issues. Another poll in six Moslem countries and focus groups in three countries will uncover attitudes about religious and nationalist views about the U.S. and the role of Islam in society.

Asian Financial Crisis: Since July 1997, USIA has promoted U.S. policies calling for political and economic reforms as key to renewed growth, including greater transparency in financial institutions and the need for a new international financial architecture. Some highlights of this strategy are: support for visits by senior U.S. officials; increased financial reporting by VOA; and a comprehensive website on the crisis. Using new technologies, USIA initiated a bi-monthly e-mail/internet outreach to several hundred economic opinions makers in the region, providing direct, up-to-the-minute reporting on U.S. global economic policies. USIA released a summary report detailing Asian publics' views on the crisis, on U.S. and IMF intervention, and options for recovery. USIA granted funds for Asian foreign students whose studies in the U.S. were threatened by financial reversals caused by the crisis, and established a clearinghouse for additional grants.

APEC Summit: For the APEC summit, USIA will poll in Japan, Korea, China, Thailand, Indonesia on economic, political, bilateral, and U.S. image issues. USIA will also produce two internet electronic journals to highlight and reinforce the call for fundamental economic reform.

Balkans-Kosovo: In the run-up to September elections, USIA is helping to organize televised debates and establish objective standards for political coverage. Civic education programs there continue their focus on teacher training in education for democracy, with strong support from the Bosnian Ministry of Education. USIA has used pre-election polling on Bosnia to track public opinion on ethnic tensions and the peace accords, helping policy makers plan their strategy. In Serbia, extensive polling is yielding insights on how Serbian citizens view the crisis in Kosovo and their government's actions. VOA and Worldnet are combining coverage of September elections, with follow-up interviews, news reports, and analysis in Bosnian language versions.

GENERAL SERVICES ADMINISTRATION

Building Programs: GSA's successes include the Public Buildings Service (PBS) which is in the midst of the largest courthouse construction program since the New Deal. The Design Excellence program is promoting a rebirth in federal architecture. The new Construction Excellence program is building on that success. PBS has implemented measurement discipline and business practices to enhanced the productivity of our real estate portfolio and which will yield benefits in safety, efficiency and comfort for the federal worker.

Minority- and Women-Owned Business: GSA is working to increase its commitment to minority- and women-owned business. GSA has increased its procurement dollars with women entrepreneurs from \$97 million in 1992 to \$286 million today, and has increased contracts to minority-owned businesses from \$289 million to \$684 million in the same time period.

SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION

Disability Redesign: In 1994, SSA announced a plan to improve service delivery for those who file disability claims redesigning the disability process. The goal of redesign is to provide more timely and accurate decisions for those who apply for benefits. SSA is continuing with testing of a number of pilots designed to provide data around various proposed changes to the disability process that are being examined. SSA has been meeting with unions representing federal and state employees, national associations, and management representatives over the last couple of months to listen to their concerns and suggestions and hopes to be making decisions about implementing process changes by the end of 1998. This effort is critical to SSA's being able to provide improved service to the millions of people who apply for disability benefits each year.

800 Number: This is the 10th anniversary of SSA's national 800 number service. In October, SSA will announce a pilot to develop a new service that would allow SSA customers for the first time, to file applications for retirement or survivor's benefits via its 800 number. SSA will implement pilots in three of its 800 number teleservice centers (Birmingham, Chicago, and

Albuquerque). The new service is designed to eliminate the wait for callers who want to file immediately for benefits. The pilot testing of 800 number claims filing is one important way SSA is responding to the public's desire to be able to complete more of their business at the first point of contact. The goal of being able to take a claim over the telephone by the year 2000 is part of the Vice President's NPR goals for High Impact Agencies.

Plain Language: An internal steering group has been established to implement the Plain Language in Government writing directive for all notices, pamphlets and other agency publications in response to your recent directive to all Agencies. SSA produces millions of notices and publications for the general public, and views this as a critically important customer service initiative.
