I. PURPOSE

To commemorate the American, Kenyan and Tanzanian victims of the bombings of the U.S. Embassies in Nairobi and Dar es Salaam.

II. BACKGROUND

On August 13 you participated in a ceremony at Andrews when the remains of 10 of the 12 American victims of the Embassy bombings returned to the United States. This memorial service will once again honor the 12 slain Americans, as well as the Kenyans and Tanzanians who were killed. (235 Kenyans died, including 33 who worked in our embassy; 10 Tanzanians died, including 5 embassy employees.) Our Ambassador in Kenya and Charge in Dar will be present, as will the Kenyan and Tanzanian Ambassadors to the United States. Foreign Service Nationals from both countries will also be present. The American, Kenyan and Tanzanian flags will be flown. To commemorate the Muslims killed in the bombings, there will also be a reading from the Koran.

**PRESIDENT WILLIAM JEFFERSON CLINTON
REMARKS AT MEMORIAL SERVICE
WASHINGTON, DC
SEPTEMBER 11, 1998**

To the members of the families; friends and colleagues of the deceased; survivors of the attacks in Nairobi and dar-es-Salaam; Ambassador Bushnell, Chargé Lange; representatives of Kenya and Tanzania; Bishop Haines, Dean Baxter, Reverend Jackson; Vice President Gore, Secretary Albright, Secretary Cohen; members of the cabinet, the Congress, the military services, and the diplomatic corps; distinguished guests:

Twelve Americans have perished in the service of their nation, alongside cherished friends from Kenya and Tanzania. Their achievements, their heroism, their sacrifice -- that is why we gather in this sacred and historic place. Their goodness, their warmth, their humanity -- that is why we shed tears of grief.

The two sides of their lives -- who they were in their labors and who they were as husbands and wives, sons and daughters -- came together. For as these twelve Americans showed every day their devotion to family and friends, their work was about bringing better lives to all -- creating opportunity and hope, fighting poverty and disease, bridging divides between peoples and nations, promoting tolerance and peace. They expressed their patriotism and their humanity, as Adlai Stevenson put it, "in the tranquil and steady dedication of a lifetime."

In the book of Isaiah, it is written that the Lord called out, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And Isaiah, the prophet, answered, "Here am I, Lord. Send me." These Americans -- brave, adventurous, generous souls -- answered the call of service, the call to build a better future.

They perished together with proud sons and daughters of Kenya and, in the same tragic moment hundreds of miles away, proud citizens of Tanzania, when terrible explosions shattered the morning calm in two capital cities. Some of these Kenyans and Tanzanians worked alongside Americans at our embassies, making vital contributions to our common efforts. Others were nearby, working hard, providing for their loved ones, as they did each and every day.

All of them -- Americans, Kenyans and Tanzanians -- were taken much too soon. They left behind adoring families, including many young children.

No tribute can rouse us from a long night of mourning. That takes time. But I hope you can find some measure of comfort in this: No one can ever erase the happiness they brought or the difference they made. Your hearts will mend, and their goodness will live inside you to the end of your days.

Last month at Andrews Air Force Base, Hillary and I had the honor of meeting the families of the Americans who lost their lives. They are proud of what their loved ones accomplished,

proud that they pursued noble dreams of a better world. And they are proud of America, of our commitment to help build that world, one of greater democracy, prosperity, and peace.

As we walked out into the hangar that day, we saw a larger family, many standing, pressed together -- colleagues from the State and Defense Departments, the military services, AID, and the CDC. They, too, will miss these brothers and sisters more than words can say. They, too, are proud of these fallen friends and the traditions and accomplishments they shared.

All of us stand together -- with our friends from Kenya and Tanzania and other peace-loving nations -- joined in grief, but also joined in common commitment to carry on.

I pledged that we would find those responsible and bring them to justice, and we have already made much progress. We will not rest until that job is done. We will not rest as long as terrorists plot to take more innocent lives.

Our struggle -- for hope over hatred, for unity over division -- is not over. But we know our cause is just, and we will prevail. We owe no less to those who have given their lives.

In their honor, let us commit to this: to open our hearts with generosity and understanding, to treat others with respect and kindness, to hold fast to our loved ones, and to always, always, work for justice, tolerance and peace.

The second video is a message for Bob Farmer's 60th birthday celebration. You appointed Farmer as U.S. Consul to Bermuda in 1994. In the summer of 1991, he stepped down as Treasurer of the DNC to join the Clinton exploratory committee. He later served as Treasurer for the 1992 Clinton presidential campaign. The Vice President and Mrs. Clinton have also recorded messages. The video will be played at Farmer's birthday party in Bermuda September 18.

The third video is for The History Channel's special program: The Great American History Quiz. You will ask a question about the Statue of Liberty and then provide the response. The one-hour special will air on The History Channel and tapes will be distributed to high schools as a learning tool. Some other participants are: Mike Wallace, Bob Costas, and Mrs. Clinton.

The fourth video is in recognition of retiring Arkansas State Representative John Miller. Representative Miller, now serving his 20th term, ends a career that has spanned more than four decades in state government. The video will be played on September 17 at Lyon College in Batesville.

The fifth video is for the Close Up Foundation's informational video. The video will be used in thousands of high schools across the country for the next three to four years. Others participating in the video include: Senator Abraham, Senator Daschle, Senator Enzi, Senator Levin, Senator Landrieu, Senator Thomas, Congresswoman McKinney, Congressman Adam Smith, Congressman Upton, Brian Lamb of C-SPAN and Charles Overby of the Freedom Forum.

The sixth video is for the White House Fellows Program. The video will be used by members and alumni of the program during their Fall outreach events. The events, held in several cities around the country, explain the fellowship to corporate and civic leaders, association heads, university deans, and ethnic and racial community leaders.

The seventh video is for the Simon Wiesenthal Center's 20th Anniversary Dinner honoring Merv Adelson. Mr. Adelson, who is receiving the Center's Humanitarian Award for his lifelong commitment to human rights and his leadership in the Jewish community, serves on the Time-Warner Board of Directors and the Executive Board of the Center's Board of Trustees. Congressman John Lewis will also be recognized for his work in the Civil Rights Movement. The Center is an international human rights organization that promotes tolerance and combats racism and anti-Semitism around the world. Over 1,200 people will attend the dinner in Los Angeles on Tuesday, September 15 at the Beverly Hilton Hotel.

The eighth video is a message for the National Summit on Africa Regional Conferences. The National Summit on Africa is an NGO that is organizing eight regional meetings on Africa over the next eighteen months, culminating in a national event in Washington at the end of next year. The conferences are opportunities to change Americans' perceptions about Africa by debating key U.S.-Africa issues.

REMARKS AT IRISH-AMERICAN EVENT
THE WHITE HOUSE
SEPTEMBER 11, 1998**

It is a profound honor to receive this award. I am always grateful for any award that recognizes the work of peace, but in this case, the award is special because it honors Paul O'Dwyer, a man who tirelessly devoted his life to human rights and the cause of people – not just Irish people, but all people. Let me accept not only for myself, but on behalf of the many who put in long hours to convert the peace agreement from a miracle delivered on Good Friday to a daily reality, going into effect as we speak.

Last week, during my visit to Northern Ireland and Ireland, I learned a little of the predicament of Ray Lankford, the St. Louis Cardinals centerfielder who often bats behind Mark McGwire. Because that's what it felt like to be introduced after George Mitchell at one event after another. Before I go on, let me say how proud America is of the former majority leader, whose wisdom, determination and infinite patience helped turn the leaders in Northern Ireland from conflict to the beginnings of cooperation.

Eight days ago, I flew from Moscow to Belfast. Even early in the morning, people were out in droves to wave American flags at us as we drove from one spot in Northern Ireland to another. At Stormont and at Waterfront Hall, we saw the crucial players who are already coming together to start a new government. At Armagh, I spoke before tens of thousands of people, young and old – and the dynamic impact of this peace could not have been clearer. That same day, at Omagh, I met with the victims of a brutal attack on the peace. But even the saddest moment of my trip carried a message of affirmation. The victims I met with – from north and south of the border – were united in their resolve that the work of peace continue.

The Good Friday peace agreement and its overwhelming approval by the Irish people, north and south, has brought something precious – the chance to begin anew. After 29 years of the Troubles, the people of Northern Ireland and Ireland are saying “no” to violence and division and “yes” to cooperation and progress. There will always be setbacks. But the few who hate have lost their ability to intimidate the vast majority who hope.

Last week, I could already see the peace taking shape. I addressed the new assembly in Northern Ireland. Day after day, there were important breakthroughs. Gerry Adams unequivocally condemned the Omagh bombing and declared violence “a thing of the past.” He named Martin McGuinness as Sinn Fein's person responsible for decommissioning. First Minister David Trimble showed leadership by announcing he would meet with Gerry Adams. They met this

Monday, and held their first ever bilateral session yesterday. It is breathtaking to consider the distance we have come since Saint Patrick's Day. This peace is going forward. And as it continues, let us remember an old Irish saying ... "a job well-begun is a job half-done."

There are so many reasons to work for this peace, on both sides of the border and both sides of the Atlantic. A peaceful and prosperous Ireland is already well on its way to becoming one of America's best partners in the new century. Nowhere does the new millennium correspond better to a real change in the outlook of a people. New ideas and new approaches have opened up a wide future. Ireland's economy is booming. More and more companies are investing. There are 470 American companies in Ireland and the list is growing fast. Dublin is a major telecommunications center, and a natural gateway for Internet commerce between the U.S. and Europe. There are probably more foreigners living there than at any time since the Vikings pillaged Ireland in the 9th century. I hate to confuse the symbols of two different American sports teams, but I have to agree – the "Celtic Tiger" is roaring.

This prosperity has sent ripples of change around the island. In thousands of ways, Ireland is less insular and more connected with the outside world. Ireland's strong relationship with Great Britain has opened opportunities on both sides of the Irish Sea. Irish-American relations have never been better. At home, many new Irish voices are expressing themselves. The First Lady mentioned the Vital Voices conference – and I heard over and over again from the people of Ireland how much the First Lady had meant to them over the past few years. This peace would never have happened were it not for the women who spoke out against violence and hatred. The example of Mary Robinson and Mary McAleese has galvanized Irish women to enter public life. And the young people of Ireland are committed as never before to building a future – in Ireland.

This is good news for Irish-Americans who love their ancestral home. But Ireland's peace and prosperity benefit all Americans. Because a prosperous, international Ireland will help us in our many efforts to build peace and prosperity in other parts of the world. Irish peacekeepers have been on the job day in and day out since the UN started peacekeeping forty years ago. In that time, 75 Irish soldiers have given their lives. Today, they are stationed around the world, from Africa to the Middle East to Bosnia, where they stand shoulder to shoulder with American troops.

Seeing the people of Ireland brought home to me just how much America has to contribute to our friends around the world. Everywhere we went, announced and unannounced, the Irish people poured out their affection for the United States. I felt proud of all of us – of Senator Mitchell – of the First Lady – of the Congressional delegation who came with me – and of everyone in my administration and Congress who worked to give peace a chance.

But I was especially proud of the Irish-American community. Your commitment to peace is as deep as it is enduring. Each day I was in Ireland and Northern Ireland, I was grateful for your commitment ... the community activists pressing for civil rights and equality ... the business leaders investing in Ireland's future ... the religious leaders urging tolerance and understanding ... the strong voices from the United States insisting that violence is not an acceptable course of action, that building is better than fighting ... the people from all backgrounds who form a living bridge to the island we trace our ancestry to ... the people like Kirk O'Donnell, who passed away

last week, but spent a lifetime advancing the friendship between our nations. All of you kept us focused on the task at hand. Thank you for that commitment.

The Irish built this peace themselves. They voted for it. But as each leader took a risk on this peace, they relied on America's unwavering support. I am honored that we could provide it. This peace has affected people around the world, far from Ireland's shores. It has shown cynics and backsliders that peace is no idle daydream – that hostile parties can honestly address their differences and put aside ancient quarrels for the common good and the good of the future. It has strengthened my hand every time I talk with people in conflict. In the Middle East, in the Balkans, in South Asia ... everywhere that centuries weigh heavily on people ... I can say, "don't tell me it's impossible ... look at Northern Ireland." In every continent, in every country, the peace of 1998 is sending a message of hope, faith and confidence to move beyond the limitations of the past. It is the beginning of a new and better history for Ireland and Northern Ireland.

A hundred years ago, in 1898, William Butler Yeats gave a speech in which he evaluated Ireland's past and predicted a new day was beginning with the new century. He said, "we are building up a nation which shall be moved by noble purposes and to noble ends." It has taken some time to realize that vision. But a hundred years later, his prediction is coming true – and it is poetry for those of us who have waited a long time to see this day. Thank you all for your work toward peace ... for Ireland, and for America.

II. BACKGROUND

Local efforts to prevent substance abuse by young people will be enhanced by the announcement of more than \$8.7 million dollars to programs in 93 communities. This new program was created in the Drug Free Communities Act -- which passed with strong bipartisan support and you signed into law on June 27, 1997 -- and is a joint effort of the Office of National Drug Control Policy and the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention at the Justice Department. The grants you will announce Saturday will fund coalitions made up of young people, parents, media, law enforcement, school officials and religious organizations to target young people's use of illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco.

RADIO ADDRESS ON DRUG GRANTS
September 12, 1998**

The Oval Office

Good morning. It's been an exhausting week in the Capitol, for me certainly, but for many others too. Among other things, I met on Thursday with my entire cabinet. We had a very frank and heartfelt discussion of my personal troubles. I asked them all for their forgiveness and support.

But I also told them that the most important thing they can do, and that I can do, is to continue to stay focused on the important issues that the American people sent us here to deal with, from health care to terrorism. And that is what we're doing. Today I'd like to tell you about the latest steps we're taking to combat an alarming trend: the growing use of drugs among our young people.

The good news is that overall drug use among the general population has dropped by half since 1979. But among America's youth, the problem is getting worse. In fact, half of all high school seniors will have smoked marijuana by the time they graduate, and that's frightening. When we know that drugs lead to crime, failure in school, and the fraying of families and neighborhoods, we know we must do better.

We can reverse this terrible trend if we attack it the way we did the crime problem, by working together. Crime overall has dropped to a 25-year low because whole communities are taking responsibility for their own streets and neighborhoods, and because Washington is giving them the tools they need, such as support for community policing programs. When we assume responsibility for bringing down crime, something remarkable happens: crime goes down. I believe we can have a similar dramatic effect curbing youth drug use.

All of us have a responsibility to send our young people the same simple message: drugs are wrong, drugs are illegal, drugs can kill you. This summer, my administration launched an unprecedented media campaign to ensure that that message comes across when young people watch television, listen to the radio, read the newspaper, or surf the Web. But even today's young people don't learn **everything** from the media. They learn the most from their parents, teachers, preachers, coaches, principals, from the community of adults around them. That's why, with the support of both Democrats and Republicans in Congress, and directed by General Barry McCaffrey we are extending new help to community-based groups all over the country. These groups, some of whose representatives are with me today, are already working to curb youth drug use by reclaiming drug houses, reaching out to at-risk foster kids, and teaching parents to deliver the anti-drug message.

Today, I am delighted to announce the first round of high-impact, low-red-tape grants to 93 communities. Their dollar amounts are not large, but if these grants empower communities to do more of what works to keep young people away from the scourge of drugs, their effect will be incalculable.

Now, we need Congress' support on other serious issues. We must continue economic growth by staying with the economic strategy that has made America the envy of the world. We must maintain our fiscal discipline by setting aside every penny of any budget surplus until we save Social Security. We must strengthen the world economy by paying our dues to the International Monetary Fund. Treasury Secretary Rubin and I will be traveling to New York on Monday, where I will discuss the risks to our prosperity if Congress refuses to act. We must invest in the education of our people with high standards, smaller classes, more teachers, and modernized schools. We must pass a real patients' bill of rights; protect the environment; and protect our democracy by passing bipartisan campaign finance reform.

All of these items are before Congress, **now**. Our nation's leaders have an obligation to act **now**, in the weeks before the November election. There is no excuse for failing to stay focused on the peoples' business.

To Alma, Tracy, Michael, the rest of the Brown family, and all of you who worked with Ron, I am very proud to be here with you today to unveil this portrait.

What Secretary Daley just said is very true -- Ron and I were very close. I can't say I really miss getting whipped by him on the basketball court, but I would gladly take the loss if it meant we could play together just one more time. And every spring, when I see the dogwood we planted in his memory getting ready to bloom, I can't believe another year has passed since Ron Brown left this world behind.

But you and I know that everything he believed in is living on.

Ron believed that there was no distance between people too wide to be bridged, no barrier that couldn't be knocked away, no life that couldn't be lifted up with an equal opportunity to achieve -- and he was right.

He believed that American businesses could help themselves and help our nation while helping to support growth and freedom around the world -- and he was right.

He believed that people divided even by ancient hatreds could put those differences aside for the good of their people -- and he was right. I'll never forget how excited he was the day he left for Bosnia -- he knew that peace and prosperity were possible there, and he wanted to be a part of the process.

The peace process is working in Bosnia -- thanks to strong support from the international community, and the efforts of courageous Bosnians who continue to deepen their democracy, expand their economy, and accept that their differences are less important than their aspirations for a better future.

But the peace Ron Brown and his colleagues gave their lives for in the Balkans is under seige again. Today, we search our hearts for the best way to bring peace to Kosovo, torn apart by the same ethnic conflict that nearly destroyed Bosnia. The United States is determined to protect peace for reasons that Ron understood very well. The world needs a Europe that is stable, democratic, and at peace. If people are killed for their ethnicity in Kosovo, and the bloodshed

and hatred spread, Europe will be none of those things.

We can build peace by diplomacy, but if diplomacy fails, we must strengthen it with force. We must stand up and defend the ideals so many Americans in this century gave their lives for. We must do so today so that others will not have to do so tomorrow, at far greater cost.]

Ron Brown spent his life trying to bring people together and help them make the most of their lives. Later today at the White House we will honor America's finest corporate citizens with the Ron Brown award -- those who do well by doing good, those who are dedicated to carrying on Ron's vision of a world where no one is left behind.

I want to leave you today with something Ron once said. "In the passage of history, a nation is often measured by the limits of its vision ... by its willingness to reach beyond the human constraints of prejudice and of fear." I believe Ron held himself to that same standard. There were no limits to his vision, no constraints on his commitment to bring people together, for the good of our country and the cause of peace.

So let this wonderful portrait remind all who see it that a great man named Ron Brown once passed this way and left this nation a better place. Trail-blazer, bridge-builder, hero ... husband, father, friend -- he is locked in all our hearts, and lives on in our memories, driving us forward to make our own mark on the world.

William Clay; Rep. Harold Ford, Jr.; Rep. Eleanor Holmes-Norton.

Before I begin, I'd like to say some words to the Commerce Department and Census Bureau employees who, a year from now, will have the important task of carrying out our 2000 Census. I am committed to working with you to conduct the fairest, most accurate census possible -- one that truly reflects who we are as a people. That is why I am disturbed that with just one year to go to Census Day -- April 1, 2000 -- Congress is considering legislation that could undermine our ability to conduct an accurate and timely census.

We know that the 1990 Census was, for the very first time, less accurate than the one before. It missed some 8 million people -- the overwhelming majority of whom were children, minorities, city dwellers and rural Americans.

This time, we must make sure that every American counts. For the next census, I am committed to following the recommendation of the National Academy of Sciences to use the latest scientific methods along with the head count. I want to thank the hard-working Census Bureau employees for putting forth a comprehensive plan that ensures the count will be as complete as possible -- with, for the first time-ever, paid radio, television and billboard advertising, special outreach, and unprecedented partnerships with business, community groups, schools, state and local governments.

I want you to know that we are working hard to stop Congress from interfering with the work of these Census bureau professionals. The Supreme Court has spoken and it is time to let the Census Bureau do its work and produce a census that will count everyone. When he took office as Commerce Secretary, Ron Brown said that we must have a 2000 census "that unites us as Americans ... that counts all Americans equally well no matter who they are or where they live." We must work together to make that vision come true.

In a few weeks, the dogwood tree that Hillary and I planted in Ron's memory three springs ago will bloom again. I still miss my friend deeply. As some of you may know, earlier this morning, I attended the unveiling of Ron's portrait at the Department of Commerce. The artist had captured perfectly that familiar gleam in his eyes -- that gleam of supreme confidence and optimism that made Ron Brown a lifeforce in this town -- and one of the most visionary men in America.

Ron Brown brought that very same confidence and optimism to what he made his own and his Department's mission, "to ensure economic opportunity for every American." He believed wholeheartedly in the potential of every single American. And he knew that we could empower all our citizens with the tools to seize the opportunities of our time -- with American business and the Department of Commerce leading the way.

Today's Corporate Leadership Awards are just one important way we are moving forward with Ron's mission. No one was a more forceful advocate for American business than Ron Brown. And no one knew better than Ron that the business of business is -- first and foremost -- to make a profit. That's why, during his too-short tenure in my Cabinet, Ron Brown logged so many miles traveling to Capitol Hill and Wall Street, across the country and around the world, helping all kinds of businesses grow, find new markets and attract new customers. But while Ron understood that business could do good simply by creating jobs and new products, he also believed that business could profit by doing right by their employees and their communities.

The four Ron Brown Award winners we honor today have shown us how what's good for a community and employees can also be good for the bottom line. By presenting them with these awards today, we are challenging all businesses to look to them for inspiration. Look to Anheuser-Busch for proof that recycling, reducing waste and protecting the environment can foster goodwill in a community and attract new customers. Look to BankBoston for proof that millions of dollars can be made in bringing credit, basic banking services and hope to the working poor. Look to Cascades Engineering for proof that productivity goes up when you help workers resolve troubles at home. And look to Seafirst Bank for proof that providing low-income young people with the mentors, the jobs and the scholarships they need to succeed in the future can lift up and strengthen entire communities. These four companies have thrived by helping their communities and their employees thrive. They embody the best of American corporate citizenship.

Today, I challenge more businesses across America to follow their lead. We are living in a time of unprecedented prosperity. The past six years have been very good for American business. We have the longest peacetime economic expansion in history. We have 18 million new jobs -- the overwhelming majority of them created by the private sector. Businesses are posting amazing profits. Anheuser-Busch

A Pledge and a Promise: Reduce, Reuse and Recycle

Since the founding of Anheuser-Busch in 1852, the company has rigorously upheld a tradition of highest quality in its products and services. It applies this quality standard globally to all aspects of its business, including environmental, health and safety issues. Employees in every Anheuser-Busch subsidiary have formed grassroots, cross-functional employee Environmental Quality Teams that address all environmental issues from solid waste to energy and water conservation. Highlights of their recommendations and efforts include waste prevention, encouragement of reuse of natural resources, recycling and composting.

NOTE: As you know, Anheuser Busch had a labor dispute with the Teamsters over their last collective bargaining agreement which resulted in the company's imposition of a new contract without the union's agreement. Unfair labor practices were filed with the National Labor Relations Board and were decided in the company's favor. It is our understanding that the company is working to rebuild its previously cooperative and longstanding relationship with the union. Additionally, it has been brought to our attention by the Glass Bottle Union that the company has decided to purchase 5% of its bottles from a Mexican facility to provide bottles for its West Coast operations. We met at the staff level separately with company and union representatives to attempt to assist them in resolving their differences.

BankBoston

Community Banking Group

BankBoston's Community Banking Group has intensified its connection with the urban low-to-moderate income market and proven that the inner-city market can be served profitably by understanding, meeting, and respecting the needs, cultures, languages, and customs of its diverse populations. It is a comprehensive system based on the employee life cycle.

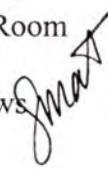

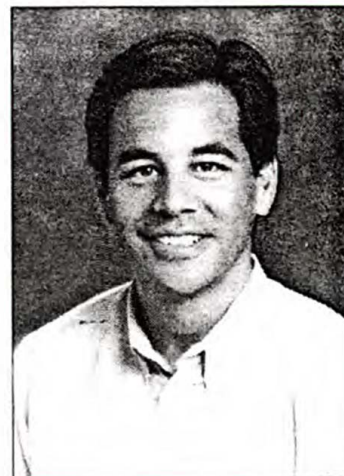
Ken Abdalla is married to Kay Stoneburner and has a child, Cory.

Farai Chideya

Farai Chideya is a 28 year-old journalist and author whose scope goes from television to print, and from African-American issues to punk music. In 1997, Newsweek named her to its "Century club" of 100 people to watch as we approach the year 2000.

Chideya is an ABC News correspondent covering a range of issues from youth to race to politics. She spent the 1996 Presidential election season as a CNN Political Analyst. Named to the (New York) Daily News' "Dream Team" of political reporters, and commentators, she also appeared on other networks including "CBS up to the Minute" and BET's "Town Hall Meeting on the Black Family." In addition, Chideya completed a fellowship at the Freedom Forum Media Studies Center, examining why young Americans are turning out the news.

Chideya's stereotype-shattering 1995 book, *Don't Believe the Hype: Fighting Cultural Misinformation About African-Americans* (Plume Penguin), is now in its eighth printing. Using statistics largely from government sources, she systematically undercuts the argument that African-Americans are at the root of problems like crime,

welfare and drugs. In January 1999, her second book, *The Color of America: Our Multi-Racial Future*, will be published by William Morrow.

Chideya is currently the National Affairs Editor for Vibe magazine, which covers urban issues and culture, and a contributor at TIME. She's the executive editor of her own "Cool Site"—Pop & Politics (<http://www.popandpolitics.com>) -- "the site for insight" on everything from rap music to race to campaign finance.

From 1994-96 she was a writer at MTV News, and from 1990 to 1994 she reported for Newsweek magazine in New York, Chicago and Washington, where her political coverage ranged from labor issues to following the President as pool reporter on Air Force One.

Her freelance journalism ranges from profiling white supremacists for Mademoiselle, to examining child sexual abuse allegations for the Los Angeles Times, to writing on affirmative action for The New York Times. Honors include winning a National Educational Reporting award, a WIN Young Women of Achievement award and a GLAAD Award.

Keith T. Clinkscales

Keith T. Clinkscales, President and CEO of VIBE, has been the guiding force behind the urban music magazine since its inception in September 1993. The magazine, a joint venture between Quincy Jones • David Salzman Entertainment and Time Inc. Ventures, was sold to VIBE Ventures, a partnership led by Jones and Robert L. Miller of Goldrush Media. Clinkscales and John Rollins, VIBE Publisher, round out the ownership group. VIBE is the first magazine of its kind to focus on the many facets of urban music and the multi-culture generation of trendsetters who inspire it.

Clinkscales joined VIBE as Chief Operating Officer, and he was promoted to President and Chief Executive Officer in February 1994. Under his leadership, the magazine has experienced tremendous growth. VIBE's initial circulation base started at 100,000 in 1993, increasing to its present circulation of 600,000. His business acumen has allowed VIBE to grow beyond the magazine into a franchise that includes the recently acquired SPIN magazine and in August of 1998, VIBE will launch BLAZE, the fifth element of hip-hop.

VIBE will produce its fourth industry trade show titled "VIBE Music Seminar" this August. Due to the success of the New York seminar, this year it was expanded to Washington, DC and Atlanta, GA. Its web site, VIBE On-line, is one of the most popular music-oriented sites on the Internet.

Prior to joining VIBE, inspired by what he perceived

as a lack of balanced journalism relating to African-Americans, Clinkscales conceived Urban Profile, a bi-monthly magazine dedicated to the issues affecting young African-Americans and their communities.

For the last three years, Clinkscales has been a guest lecturer at the Stanford Professional Publishing course. Last year, Clinkscales joined the New York University's Center for Publishing faculty to teach Marketing for Publishing, a new Masters degree program. This year he will serve as a guest lecturer for the program.

Clinkscales is a *magna cum laude* graduate of Florida A&M University. He was the first student speaker for the prestigious School of Business and Industry Forum series, and the President of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity. Clinkscales also graduated with an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School. While at Harvard, Keith was selected with several colleagues to represent the Business School at the International Moot Court Entrepreneurial Competition at the University of Texas at Austin.

Clinkscales incorporates into his schedule music and publishing conferences where his keynote speeches address topics that include African-American entrepreneurship and the role of media in contemporary culture. Interested in the future of young people, Clinkscales also enjoys speaking to schools and youth organizations.



Tracey E. Edmonds



Five years ago, when Tracey E. Edmonds established Yab Yum Music, she was often asked in what direction she wanted to take her company. This 31 year old California-born executive had set a clear goal for herself: "I want to create a full service entertainment company with unique artists, producers, writers and executives, a powerful West Coast-based source for great music and great talent."

And indeed, Mrs. Edmonds has done just that. In the few short years she has been in business, this young maverick has utilized her ingenuity, imagination and influence to successfully establish a multi-million dollar entertainment empire. As Founder, President and CEO of parent company Edmonds Entertainment Group, Inc., Tracey oversees the day to day operations of six additional subsidiary companies: Edmonds Entertainment, the film and television production company, Edmonds Management, Yab Yum Music, Yab Yum Records, Edmonds Music and the Tracken Place recording studio, making her one of the most powerful forces in the music and entertainment business.

Tracey's company Edmonds Entertainment, has released two films to date. The first, the award winning "Soul Food," released in association with 20th Century Fox on October 26, 1997, has grossed

approximately \$43 million. In addition, the video sales are in excess of over 2.5 million units, making it one of the most commercially successful African-American movies ever to be released. The film received five 1997 "NAACP Image Awards" and three "Black Oscar" Awards: Tracey Edmonds, Producer; George Tillman, Jr., Writer / Director and Kenneth "Babyface" Edmonds, Soundtrack.

The second film, "Hav Plenty," which she, in partnership with Wanderland Pictures, sold to Miramax Pictures at the Toronto Film Festival was released through e2 filmworks, a newly-established division of Edmonds Entertainment. This romantic comedy, released in June '98, was written and directed by the talented young filmmaker, Christopher Scott Cherot. Produced for an astonishing \$100,000, the film, which has received rave reviews has generated box office receipts now totaling \$2.3 million.

Maria Eitel



Maria S. Eitel is Vice President, Corporate and Social Responsibility at Nike, Inc. In her role, she is responsible for NIKE's labor practices and compliance, environmental issues and community involvement, including P.L.A.Y. (Participate in the Lives of All Youth).

Prior to joining NIKE, she was the European Corporate Affairs Group Manager for Microsoft Corporation. At Microsoft, Maria managed corporate, public and community affairs initiatives for the company's European headquarters in Paris, France, including development and implementation of Microsoft Europe's community affairs programs. Before joining Microsoft in 1995, Eitel was director of public affairs for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting and senior manager for communications and community relations for MCI Communications Corporation.

From 1988 to 1992, she served in the White House as deputy director of media relations and later as Special Assistant to the President for Media Affairs. For five years prior to that, Eitel had a distinguished career in broadcast journalism, serving as a reporter and producer for the United States Information Agency, a producer of a PBS series on foreign affairs and a television reporter and associate producer in Seattle for KCTS-TV and KING-TV.

Born in Everett, WA, Eitel graduated from McGill University in Montreal with a B.A. degree in communications and French, and holds an M.S. degree in foreign service and international developing economies from Georgetown University. She is a member of the board of governors of The American Hospital of Paris.

Brian Fargo

Brian Fargo is founder and CEO of Interplay Entertainment Corp., one of the most influential electronic game software companies in this decade's fastest-growing industry. Born in 1962 in Long Beach, California, Fargo is eleven generations removed from ancestor William George Fargo, of Wells Fargo and American Express fame. Both Fargos are acknowledged for their business acumen and vision; the late Fargo in the area of finance and 35 year-old Brian in the field of interactive entertainment.

Brian's early years were spent in Whittier and Newport Beach where he excelled as a high-school athlete and early computer buff. After graduating from Corona Del Mar High School and studying a year at Orange Coast College, Fargo began to develop entertainment software full-time. By 1983, at the age of 21, he already had two software companies behind him when he founded his third and most successful venture, Interplay Productions. Here, Fargo broke ground by taking a studio approach to product development, bringing together a mix of creative professionals to produce software programs as a cohesive unit. Soon after, Interplay shipped the world's first CD-ROM

entertainment title. In less than a decade, Brian has commandeered the company to become a leading publisher, marketer, distributor and sales organization in the electronic game industry – at home and abroad.

In a whirl of activity beginning in 1994, Fargo expanded his company with the new subsidiary VR Sport and acquired Shiny Entertainment. In turn, he ceded a minority share of Interplay to international entertainment giant Universal Studios. This culminated recently with Fargo and Interplay completing an Initial Public Offering of stock in June of 1998.

Fargo and his team – currently approximately 530 dedicated game developers, enthusiastic marketing gurus and administrative support professionals – will release no less than 30 new titles in 1998, a total of 60 SKUs (includes different platforms for individual titles, multi-title promotions and samplers, and special editions). Interplay also completed a strategic restructuring of its development department in 1997 into five smaller, newly created divisions that will focus on genre-specific games.



Donna A. Frisby

Currently, Ms. Frisby is the Executive Director for Rock the Vote, a non-partisan, non-profit organization dedicated to protecting freedom of speech and educating and motivating young people to participate in the political process. Ms. Frisby joined Rock the Vote in 1995 as development director and quickly led the organization to visible and unprecedented growth. During Ms. Frisby's tenure as development director, Rock the Vote's revenues tripled. During her pivotal first year at Rock the Vote, Ms. Frisby increased the number of minority members on the Board of Directors and established the Hip Hop Coalition for Political Power, a campaign designed specifically to reach African American and Latino youth. The coalition attracted the participation of influential urban artists, from LL Cool J and Chuck D to Methodman, Cypress Hill, and The Alkaholiks, who committed their time and talent to educate disenfranchised youth about the importance of political participation.

Her life of service and activism began at a very young age. By the time Ms. Frisby was 16, she was a founding member of the Youth Council NAACP, serving as its first treasurer and going on to spend two terms as president of the organization before attending college at The University of Virginia. After receiving a B.A. in English Literature, Ms. Frisby returned to the Willingboro foundation that she built, serving five years as advisor of the NAACP Youth Council and on the Executive

Committee of the Willingboro Branch of the NAACP.

In 1989, after teaching in the Philadelphia School District and working with Philadelphia 4-H; Ms. Frisby co-founded Children First, Inc., an advocacy and service organization for adolescents living in underserved neighborhoods throughout Philadelphia, PA. While at Philadelphia 4-H, Ms. Frisby helped to double the number of youth served from 7,000 to 14,000 in the City of Philadelphia. Her work at Children First, 4-H and other non-profit organizations brought Ms. Frisby attention from the local and national media and resulted in her being recognized by Ebony Magazine as "One of Fifty Leaders Under 30" and by The Philadelphia Business Journal as one of "40 Under 40 Business and Professional Leaders".

In 1993, Ms. Frisby was selected as a National Urban Fellow. She took a hiatus from non-profit consulting and Children First, Inc. to attend Baruch College in New York City, where she earned a Master of Public Administration. As part of her fellowship, Ms. Frisby served as a Special Assistant to the Assistant Secretary for Policy Development and Research at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

In 1997, Ms. Frisby received the Spirit of Democracy Award from the National Coalition on Black Voter Participation and The Theresa Hoover Global Citizenship and Community Service Award from the United Methodist Church.





Christy Haubegger

Entrepreneur Christy Haubegger was recently chosen as one of the Top Ten Role Models of 1997 by the Ms. Foundation for Women. She was also chosen as one of the most Inspirational Women of 1996 by NBC Nightly News with Tom Brokaw. She has received numerous accolades and has been profiled in a variety of media outlets including Mediaweek, Glamour, USA Weekend, Working Woman, Texas Monthly, The Los Angeles Times and CNN. Having launched *Latina*, the first bilingual magazine catering exclusively to Hispanic women in the United States, Haubegger is the dynamic personality opening doors for Latinas in the American mainstream media.

As President of Latina Publications, L.L.C., a joint venture between Essence Communications, Inc. and Haubegger's own company, Alegre Enterprises, Haubegger oversees the production of *Latina*, a monthly magazine with a circulation of 175,000 which enjoys the backing and resources of ESSENCE, the leading magazine for American women of color. *Latina* launched in June, 1996.

Haubegger's idea began to germinate long ago when, as a teen growing up in a middle class neighborhood in Houston, she would pick up women's magazines and notice a lack of images or information which related to her experience as a Mexican-American.

Haubegger went on to attend the University of Texas at Austin and Stanford University School of Law. While at Stanford, Haubegger joined the editorial staff of the Stanford Law Review, rising to the position of Senior Editor. Her tenure at the publication provided the technical foundation to complement her passion to someday start a magazine she herself would want to read.

Immediately after receiving her law degree, Haubegger set out to create her dream magazine: a bilingual publication that would serve as a source of information and provide positive images for Latinas like herself, who live between two cultures and two languages. She wrote a comprehensive business plan for *Latina* and, at the age of 26, raised venture capital and began meeting with titans of publishing. After months of knocking on doors, Christy convinced Essence Communications, Inc., publishers of ESSENCE magazine, of the tremendous opportunity in the U.S. Hispanic market. Thus, *Latina* was born.

Christy Haubegger is a Mexican-American native of Houston, Texas. She received a B.A. degree in Philosophy from The University of Texas at Austin and went on to earn her Juris Doctor from Stanford Law School, where she was President of her class. She is single and resides in Manhattan with her dog.

Bill Hoogterp, Jr.

Bill was raised in and near Grand Rapids, Michigan, the son of William and Judith Hoogterp, with an older sister Diane and two younger brothers, Brett and Paul. Bill Sr. and Judy recently retired from Steelcase, the Office Furniture company where he was a forklift driver and she an employee relations specialist. They are enjoying retirement splitting the year between Michigan and Avon Park, Florida where they tear up the golf courses.

Bill has a bachelor of arts with a double major in international relations and French, having attended the University of Notre Dame, Aquinas College and the Alliance Francaise in Paris. After graduation, Bill traveled around the United States in a pick up truck under a grant from the Kellogg Foundation, developing community service programs at hundreds of colleges. Among the programs Bill has started or been involved with are the Hunger Cleanup, Into the Streets,, COOL, (The Campus Outreach Opportunity League), Break Away (which helps college students set up school break service programs) and The National Student Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness. These programs have involved hundreds of thousands of students in service and raised millions of dollars for various charities. Bill has also worked in various direct service settings including a famine refugee camp in the Sudan, an orphanage in Mexico, a farm in Appalachia and a center for street children in Colombia. He is planning a trip for

Curitiba, Brazil in November. He has also been involved in other efforts, most recently with Christine Gilifillan and others on the Presidents' Summit chaired by General Colin Powell. He prefers working behind the scenes and avoids the media.

With others, Bill currently is dedicated to helping turn Newark, NJ from one of the least healthy places to live into one with a high quality of life and studying what it takes to change a city. Towards this goal, he has created initiatives including Summer of Service, Newark Do Something and the Just One Neighborhood Program towards this goal. He was also recently named a Director for the City of Newark, overseeing all Newark's efforts of recreation, cultural affairs, Symphony Hall and neighborhood preservation. St. Francis is one of his role models and he donates all salaries he receives to various charities and works on the weekends for Continental Airlines, as a fork lift and van driver to earn a living and flight privileges for travel.

Jesse L. Jackson, Jr.

Representative Jesse L. Jackson, Jr. began service in the United States House of Representatives on December 12, 1995, when he was sworn in as a member of the 104th Congress, the 91st African American ever elected to Congress.

Representative Jackson currently serves on the House Committee on Banking and Financial Services, on the Subcommittee on Housing and Community Opportunity and the Subcommittee on Domestic and International Monetary Policy. He also serves on the committee on Small Business and is the Ranking Minority Member on the Subcommittee on Regulatory Reform and Paperwork Reduction.

Other leadership appointments include: Co-Chair of the Communications Group for the House Democratic Policy Committee; service on the House Democratic Caucus; service on the Committee on Organization, Study and Review; appointed by the Congressional Black Caucus to chair the Presidential Personnel Task Force; serves on the Steering Committee of the Congressional Progressive Caucus; and is a member of the Congressional Steel Caucus and the Congressional Urban Caucus.

Prior to his congressional service, Representative Jackson served as the National Field Director of the National Rainbow Coalition. In this role, he instituted a

national non-partisan program that successfully registered millions of new voters. He also created a voter education program that educated individuals on the importance of the political process.

Having grown up on the picket lines of the Civil Rights Movement, Representative Jackson spent his twenty-first birthday in a jail cell in Washington, D.C. for taking part in a protest against apartheid at the South African Embassy. He also demonstrated weekly in front of the South African Consulate in Chicago. Representative Jackson's long-time involvement as an anti-apartheid crusader led to him being the only American to share the stage with Mr. Nelson Mandela during his historic speech to the world following a 27-year imprisonment in Cape Town.

In 1987, Representative Jackson graduated magna cum laude from North Carolina A & T State University in Greensboro, North Carolina, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Management. Three years later, he earned a Master of Arts Degree in Theology from the Chicago Theological Seminary, and in 1993, received his Juris Doctorate from the University of Illinois College of Law.

Representative Jackson, who was born March 11, 1965, resides in the Second Congressional District of Illinois with his wife Sandi.

Steve Jurvetson is a Managing Director of Draper Fisher Jurvetson. He served on the Board of Directors of Hotmail from its inception through the acquisition by Microsoft. Previously, Mr. Jurvetson was an R&D Engineer at Hewlett-Packard, where seven of his communications chip designs were fabricated. He has also worked in product marketing at Apple and NeXT Software. As a Consultant with Bain & Company, Mr. Jurvetson

Alan Khazei

Alan Khazei is Co-Founder of City Year, an "action-tank" for national service, developed in the spirit of an "urban Peace corps" that enlists hundreds of young adults from all backgrounds, ages 17-23, for a demanding year of full-time community service and leadership development. Corps members meet critical needs in their communities serving as teachers aides, running after-school programs, teaching violence and AIDS prevention, rehabing public housing units and building parks and playgrounds. From a 50 person pilot program launched in 1988, City Year has grown to 700 corps members serving in seven cities across the U.S.: Boston, MA; Chicago, IL; Columbia, SC; Columbus, OH; Providence, RI; San Antonio, TX; and San Jose, CA.

Since its founding in 1988, City Year has engaged over 2,000 young people in giving a year of service to their communities. Together, City Year corps members have provided over 2 million hours of service. 3,000 visitors from all over the world have come to see City Year first hand and upwards of 250 corporations and foundations, 25,000 individuals and local and federal government have invested a total of \$50 million in City Year. In 1992, the Bush administration named City Year as one of only eight demonstration national service programs in America and in 1993 the Clinton administration used City Year as a model for its AmeriCorps program.

Mr. Khazei is a *magna cum laude* graduate of

Harvard College and *cum laude* graduate of Harvard Law School. During Senator Gary Hart's 1984 Presidential Campaign, he served as a field coordinator on the New Hampshire Campaign. In September of 1991 President Bush appointed and the U.S. Senate confirmed Mr. Khazei to serve on the Board of Directors of the Commission on National and Community Service. He served as Vice-Chair of the commission until January 1993. Mr. Khazei has also served on the Board of Directors of the Massachusetts Youth Service Alliance, Teach for America and Share Our Strength.

In 1994 Time Magazine named Mr. Khazei as one of America's 50 outstanding leaders under 40. He is a recipient of the Reebok Human Rights Award, the Jefferson Award for Public Service, The Caring Institute Award, the Boston Bar Association's Public Service Award, the Boston Jaycees Ten Outstanding Young Leaders Award as well as honorary degrees from Framingham State College and Northeastern University Law School. Mr. Khazei has recently returned from a "year on" traveling around the world through Asia, India, South Africa, The Middle East, Russia and Eastern and Western Europe meeting with "Citizens in Action." He visited innovative projects and programs and learned from and shared strategies for change with students, citizen activists, entrepreneurs, business leaders and government officials.

Wendy Kopp

Upon graduating from Princeton University in 1989, Wendy Kopp founded Teach For America, the national teachers corps of outstanding recent college graduates from all academic majors who commit two years to teach in under-resourced urban and rural public schools. Within eight years, Teach For America has inspired over 25,000 individuals to apply and has trained and placed 5,000 of them to teach in 13 geographic regions from South Central Los Angeles to the Mississippi Delta to the South Bronx.

Wendy was the youngest person and the first woman to receive the Woodrow Wilson Award, the highest honor Princeton University confers on an undergraduate alumnus. In addition, she has received the Jefferson Award for Public Service, Aetna's Voice of Conscience Award, the Citizen

Activist Award from the Gleitsman Foundation, and the Kilby Young Innovator Award. She was also recognized as one of Time Magazine's forty most promising leaders under forty, and as one of Glamour Magazine's Women of the Year in 1990. Wendy has received honorary degrees from Connecticut College and Drew University.

Currently, Wendy serves as the president of Teach For America, which has eighty full-time staff, fourteen offices nationwide, and an annual budget of \$6.5 million. She is also the president of The New Teacher Project and is on the board of The Learning Project.

Wendy received a B.A. degree from Princeton University, where she participated in the undergraduate program of the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs.



Lawrence Lessig

Lawrence Lessig is the Jack N. and Lillian R. Berkman Professor for Entrepreneurial Legal Studies at Harvard Law School. From 1991 to 1997, he was a professor at the University of Chicago Law School. He graduated from Yale Law School in 1989, and then clerked for Judge Richard Posner for the 7th Circuit Court of Appeals, and Justice Antonin Scalia on the Supreme Court.

Lessig teaches and writes in the areas of constitutional law, contracts, comparative constitutional law, and the law of cyberspace. He

is currently working on two books, *Code: Considerations on a Law of Cyberspace* and *The Fidelity in Translation*.

In 1994-1995, Dave co-founded the Knowledge Is Power Program (KIPP) with Mike Feinberg. KIPP has grown from a program serving 45 fifth graders in Houston to two schools which now serve over 500 students in grades 5-8 in the

South Bronx, New York and the Gulfton Community in Houston. Dave Levin currently serves as the School Director of the KIPP Academy Bronx which was named an Annenberg School by the Manhattan Institute's Center for Educational Innovation. In 1995, Dave received the Jefferson Award from the city of Houston for outstanding public service. In 1996, ABC's World News Tonight featured Dave's work on their nightly "Solutions" segment. In 1997 Do Something recognized Dave as a winner in their national BRICK Award given for outstanding community leadership and Good Morning America featured the success of the KIPP Academy. This past spring the KIPP Academy earned the honor of being the highest performing middle school in District 7 in the South Bronx.

Charles Lewis



Charles Lewis, 35, is the Executive Director of ENIC, a publicly traded company on the London Stock Exchange. ENIC divides its business interests between Europe and the United States, focusing on sports and entertainment based enterprises. Lewis recently inked a deal for ENIC, partnering with Time Warner to build, operate and market Warner Brothers entertainment centers worldwide. This is the first joint venture of its kind for the media giant and garnered Lewis a seat on the Time

Warner Board of Directors.

Lewis also recently closed a production deal with Warner Brothers Film Department to produce feature films, working closely with Warner Brothers film chief Terry Semel. Lewis, an avid sports fan and participant, led ENIC in purchasing six of the top European club soccer teams.

Richard Lovett is President of the Los Angeles-based literary and talent agency, Creative Artists Agency (CAA).

Today he works extensively with some of the industry's most talented and successful actors and directors. He has been instrumental in guiding the careers of many younger talents.

For the past five years, he has helped develop curriculum as a mentor at Venice High School in Venice, California, where each semester he teaches a weekly class for 15-35 students. Dr. Frank I. Luntz



Frank Luntz is one of the most honored political and communication professionals in America today. Time Magazine named him one of 50 of America's most promising leaders aged 40 and under, USA Today labeled him one of the nine most influential minds in the GOP, Newsweek called him one of the three primary engineers of the 1994 Republican landslide, The New York Times wrote that his well-chosen words helped turn an election, and he is the hottest pollster in America according to the Boston Globe. Prior to 1994, Frank was named one of the four Top Research Minds by Business Week and was the winner of the coveted Washington Post Crystal Ball Award for being the most accurate pundit.

Frank has been a guest on Meet the Press, Crossfire, This Week with David Brinkley, The McNeil-Lehrer Newshour, The Late Late Show with Tom Snyder, The Today Show, Good Morning America, The Charlie Rose Show, Charles Grodin, Politically Incorrect, The News With Brian Williams, Inside Politics, and has been on Nightline more than any other pollster in the past four years.

Dr. Luntz was the pollster of record for the Contract with America, the national Republican campaign effort widely credited with giving the Republicans a majority in Congress for the first time in 40 years. Overall, he has written and supervised more than 400 surveys for political and corporate clients in ten countries since forming his company in 1992. A dozen

Fortune 500 companies have turned to Dr. Luntz for communication guidance in the past four years.

When he is not consulting, Dr. Luntz can usually be found in front of a classroom. From 1989 until 1996, he was an Adjunct Assistant Professor at the University of Pennsylvania. He has also taught at Harvard and the Graduate School of Political Management at George Washington University.

An accomplished writer, Frank has authored, co-authored or contributed chapters to four texts. His first book, *Candidates, Consultants & Campaigns*, addressed the American electoral process. He is the co-author of *The People's Budget*, a much-touted spending plan that was published in 1995. Frank was also the contributing author to the Annenberg publication *Media Technology and the Vote: A Source Book*, and the Hudson Institute's *The Promise of American Life*. In addition, Frank has authored op-ed pieces for The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times, and The Washington Post.

Frank graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with an honors Bachelor of Arts degree in history and political science, and was named a Thouron Fellow. He received his Doctorate in Politics at the age of 25 from Oxford University, and spoke at the historic Oxford Union Society for 24 straight hours. In the spring of 1993, Frank was named a Fellow at Harvard University's Institute of Politics, the second youngest individual ever to receive this honor.

Sylvia M. Mathews



Sylvia M. Mathews was appointed Assistant to the President and Deputy Chief of Staff to the President in January 1997. She supervises the work of several White House offices, including the National Economic Council, the Domestic Policy Council, Public Liaison, Staff Secretary, Intergovernmental Affairs, Council on Environmental Quality, Press, Cabinet Secretary, and Communications. In addition to overseeing these offices, Ms. Mathews helps review staff recommendations and manages the flow of information from them to the President of the United States. Ms. Mathews has had responsibility for several special projects ranging from Presidential State of the Union Addresses (1997 and 1998) to the President's historic trip to Africa.

Before her appointment as Deputy Chief of Staff, Ms. Mathews served as Chief of Staff to Secretary of the Treasury, Robert E. Rubin, from 1995-1997. In this position, she advised the Secretary on foreign and domestic policy, management and communications issues, and she helped implement the Secretary's priorities throughout the Department. She also shared day to day responsibilities with the Deputy Secretary and served as the Secretary's Liaison to the White House and other government agencies.

Ms. Mathews first joined the Clinton

Administration in December 1992 as the manager of the President-elect's Economic Transition Team. In January 1993, she became Staff Director for the National Economic Council and Special Assistant to Robert E. Rubin, then Assistant to the President for Economic Policy. Her responsibilities included advising Mr. Rubin on economic and long-term planning issues, working closely with senior White House and Administration officials, and overseeing the day-to-day work of the NEC staff.

Before joining the Federal government, Ms. Mathews worked in the private sector for McKinsey and Company, management consulting firm. From November 1990 to July 1992 she was an associate with McKinsey in New York, where she performed analytical research, primarily in the areas of finance and telecommunications.

Ms. Mathews graduated *cum laude* from Harvard University with an A.B. in Government in June 1987. She was a recipient of the Harvard College Agassiz Scholarship and Institute of Balkan Studies Harvard Fellowship, and was a Harvard Club of New York Scholar. As a Rhodes Scholar, she received an honors degree (B.A.) in philosophy, politics, and economics in June 1990 from Oxford University in Oxford, England. Ms. Mathews is from Hinton, West Virginia.

David Milner

David Milner is Founder and President of Funds for the Community's Future. During the summer after his sophomore year of college, David lived and worked in the inner city of Lowell, MA. He was troubled by what he saw in his Lowell neighborhood; people full of great ideas for improving their communities and lives, but without the resources and training to carry the ideas out. He began thinking of a way to address this problem, and, in 1990, entered his strategy in a nationwide contest to design a public service project. With the first prize, \$10,000 in seed money from the Samuel Huntington Fund, David founded Funds for the Community's Future in his parents' basement.

Funds for the Community's Future is located in David's hometown of Washington, DC and currently operates in 17 low-income neighborhoods and 3 public high schools. Through local development projects initiated by neighborhood residents, FCF neighborhoods involve thousands of people in community building projects which both improve the neighborhoods and generate scholarship money for students who might

otherwise never have gone to college.

Funds for the Community's Future is recognized both locally and nationally as a model for community development. The organization was awarded a two-year grant from the Rockefeller Foundation to explore program replication, and was featured in the March, 1994 issue of *The Chronicle of Philanthropy*. In 1992, *Washingtonian* magazine named David a "Washingtonian of the Year," the youngest recipient to receive this honor.

David has given speeches around the country on social entrepreneurialism to groups such as the Center for Entrepreneurial Leadership, Youth Service America, and others. Before FCF, David successfully ran a painting franchise and founded a refrigerator sales company; he also founded a student organization to control increases in college tuition. He is a 1986 graduate of the Sidwell Friends School, and a 1990 graduate of Middlebury College. In 1988, David was one of 80 students nationwide offered a fellowship to attend the University of Chicago Graduate School of Business.



Sean O'Connor



Sean O'Connor, 36, a Commander in the U.S. Navy, is a Surface Warfare Officer currently serving in the Office of Management and Budget as a White House Fellow. A native of Rumson, NJ, he is a 1983 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy.

Commander O'Connor's first tour after graduation was on USS Cushing DD-985 where he served as Electrical Officer and then ASW Officer from June 1984 to December 1986. He then reported as an Engineering Instructor to Surface Warfare Officer School Pacific where he taught the Division Officer course until March 1989. During this tour he earned a master's degree in Business Administration from National University.

Upon completion of Department Head School, Commander O'Connor reported to USS Rodney M. Davis FFG-60 homeported in Yokosuka, Japan as Engineering Officer from November 1989 to July 1991. Commander O'Connor is married to the former Lori Brooke Pritchett of Rancho Cordova, CA. They have two sons, Patrick (3) and Ryan (1).

Kim Polese is Co-founder, President and Chief Executive Officer of Marimba, Inc., a recognized leader in application distribution and management (ADM) solutions. As Marimba's chief executive officer, Ms. Polese is responsible for planning, communicating and managing Marimba's business decisions and policies.

Prior to co-founding Marimba, Ms. Polese spent more than seven years at Sun Microsystems, most recently as the Product Manager for Oak (now known as Java). During her tenure at Sun, she played a pivotal role in conceiving and driving the

Internet strategy for Java. Prior to joining Sun, Ms. Polese worked as an Applications Engineer for Intellicorp, Inc., consulting with engineers in the development of expert system application frameworks.

She holds a B.S. in Biophysics from the University of California, Berkeley and studied Computer Science at the University of Washington, Seattle. Jeffrey Prieto

Jeffrey Prieto is currently a White House Fellow assigned to Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala. He is a former environmental planner for the City of Santa Barbara. While working for the City, he managed Santa Barbara's update of its cultural resources policies. Subsequent to leaving the City to serve as a private environmental planner, the Santa Barbara City Council appointed Prieto to the Santa Barbara Planning Commission.

Prieto's community service has focused on high-risk youth. He was co-organizer of the first End Barrio Warfare conference in the South Coast area. Prieto was a co-founder of the Esperanza

In addition she holds the appointments of Assistant Professor of Medicine at the Harvard Medical School, Assistant Professor of Maternal and Child Health at Harvard School of Public Health and Assistant in Health Policy at the Massachusetts General Hospital. Dr. Reede is a graduate of Brown University and Mount Sinai School of Medicine and completed her pediatric residency at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, Maryland and child psychiatry fellowship at Children's Hospital in Boston. Her administrative background is enhanced by an MPH and an MS in health policy and management from the Harvard School of Public Health, as well as by the completion of fellowships in health services research and academic administration.

Dr. Reede has worked as a pediatrician in community health centers, juvenile prisons, public schools and academic health centers. The impact of Dr. Reede's work and the dedication provided by her and her staff is reflected in numerous programs she has generated to benefit minority students, residents, scientists and physicians. Dr. Reede was instrumental in

developing the Biomedical Science Careers Project Inc., a collaborative not-for-profit organization involving academia, private industry, medical centers, public education, and professional societies. This organization is designed to identify and support minority students, trainees and professionals pursuing biomedical careers. She has developed mentoring programs for minority students, high school through graduate/medical school levels. Dr. Reede has also designed a training program for middle and high school teachers, science curriculum for public schools, implemented research and exchange clerkships programs at the Harvard Medical School, and designed and implemented an innovative fellowship in minority health policy for physicians.

In 1986, she received the Boston's NAACP award for her contributions to the health of the Boston minority community. Dr. Reede was awarded the 1993 Community Service Award from the Epilepsy Association of Massachusetts in recognition for her work on a live satellite five-part series on Neuroscience for high school science teachers in the New England Area. In 1996, she received the American Association of University Administrators Exemplary Models of Administrative Leadership Award.

Michael Sanchez



Michael, 31, is President and co-founder of Do Something. Founded in 1993 during Michael's third year at Columbia Law School, Do Something is a national non-profit organization that inspires, trains, funds, and mobilizes young people to be leaders who measurably strengthen their communities.

Over the last five years, hundreds of thousands of young people in schools, community organizations, and neighborhood groups have actively participated in Do Something's programs. Currently, Do Something is focused on creating a new position in society, the "Community Coach," a trained teacher or community leader, who works to develop young leaders and connect to other local institutions and resources.

Michael also co-founded and served as Chief Executive Officer of the '94 Cup Daily, the nation's only daily newspaper dedicated to the 1994 World Cup Soccer tournament. Featured in the Wall Street Journal and other publications, the profitable '94 Cup Daily had a circulation of 250,000 papers per day during the World Cup and was distributed in five cities across the country.

While in Law School at Columbia, Michael was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar, worked in the foster care system through the Child Advocacy Clinic, led a neighborhood tutoring program, founded the Law School Workshop which prepared aspiring law students for law school, co-founded the Cougar Soccer School, a summer soccer camp for kids, and worked at the law firm of Cravath, Swaine, and Moore where he received an offer of full-time employment.

Following college at the University of Virginia, where Michael was a member of the nationally top-ranked men's soccer team and active in the Big Brother program, Michael went to Bulawayo, Zimbabwe where he was a high school math teacher and a professional soccer player for the Bulawayo Highlanders.

Growing up in New Jersey, Michael was the nation's top-ranked junior chess player. He received extensive media coverage as a chess prodigy and traveled around the world and the nation, conducting dozens of exhibitions and earning a draw with Victor Korchnoi, the third ranked player in the world.

Jeff Schwartz

As a Vice President, Jeff Schwartz represents world-class athletes at International Management Group (IMG), the global leader in sports management and marketing. joined by Tom First, and together they stumbled upon making fruit juice.

Today, Tom Scott is Co-founder and Co-president of Nantucket Nectars. He is an accomplished and sought after speaker. He sits on the board of Shackleton Schools and the Nantucket Film Festival and offers support to countless other charitable organizations. When he can find the time, he still entertains his passion for the theater. Tom Scott resides in Boston with his dog Becky.





Andrew Shue

Actor; Activist; Athlete; Entrepreneur. Since graduating from Dartmouth College in 1989 with a degree in History, Andrew has succeeded in many fields.

For the last six years Andrew has starred on the hit TV show *Melrose Place*, and recently made his feature film debut in Francis Ford Coppola's *The Rainmaker*.

He co-founded Shue Media, Inc. with his brother John, and is currently co-producing an Imax movie about World Cup Soccer.

He was named one of ten outstanding young Americans by the Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1995 and received an honorary doctorate from Drew University also in 1995. Andrew is 31 years old, is married to Jennifer Shue and is the proud father of two boys, Nate and Aidan.

Major John K. Tien

John Tien, 34, is a Major in the US Army and will be a Special Assistant in the Executive Office of The President as a member of the US Trade Representative's office. He recently finished a tour as a political science professor at the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York. Tien is also a term member on the Council of Foreign Relations.

Tien currently conducts research on societal and governmental trends for several US Army agencies. In June, 1997, he served as a military congressional fellow to Congressman Jerry Lewis (R-CA). Over the past two years, he has conducted research on legislative issues for the Department of Defense as a researcher for the Office of the Chief Legislative Liaison.

A combat veteran, Tien was among the first US soldiers to cross the Saudi-Arabia-Iraq border during Operation Desert Storm. As the leader of his battalion's reconnaissance unit, he saw action against two different Iraqi Republican Guard divisions during the ground war. The US Army subsequently awarded him the Bronze Star Medal and awarded his battalion the Valorous Unit citation for his unit's "conspicuous gallantry in actions against the enemy." The Army also awarded him the Southwest Asia Service Medal with three campaign stars for serving in all three major campaigns during Operations Desert Shield and Storm. In 1996, Tien won the top award given to junior officers in the US Army, the

General Douglas MacArthur Leadership Award, which is given to only twelve active-duty officers per year.

Tien has often sought opportunities to work with our nation's youth. In 1994, he tutored and mentored inner-city high school youths in Killeen, Texas. At West Point, he is the co-organizer for the New York Orange County Special Olympics. Both of these projects are part of Tien's attempt to inspire soldiers to go beyond their stated contribution of "warfighter" to contribute in a real and tangible way to the communities in which they live.

In 1987, Tien graduated from West Point with a BS degree in Civil Engineering. As the top-ranked military cadet in his class, Tien also served as the First Captain and Brigade Commander of the 4400-person cadet corps. A first generation Chinese-American, Tien is the only Asian ever to serve as the top cadet at West Point. Afterwards, he attended Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar from California, earning a BA degree in Philosophy, Politics, and Economics. As a part of the top five percent of the officers in his peer group, Tien earned an early promotion to Major.

Although "home" is where the Army sends him, Tien calls Long Beach, California his true hometown. He is married to the former Tracy Franklin, a high school math teacher, and they have two young daughters, Amanda, 6, and Rebecca, 4.

Bill Signing Ceremony for H.R. 540, Nursing Home Resident Protection Amendments

I. PURPOSE

To sign into law H.R. 540, which amends Title XIX of the Social Security Act to prohibit transfers or discharges of residents of nursing facilities as a result of a voluntary withdrawal from participation in the Medicaid Program.

II. BACKGROUND

In April 1998, a nursing home operated by Vencor, Inc. in Tampa, Florida, attempted to evict 52 Medicaid residents ostensibly for the purpose of remodeling the nursing home facility. A judge halted the evictions, and the nursing home allowed the residents to remain. A State agency concluded that the evictions were based solely on the fact that these residents relied on Medicaid to pay their nursing home bills. Since that time, Vencor reversed its actions in Tampa and invited back all the discharged patients. In the Vencor case, Medicaid patients were protected by current law and regulations because the Vencor facility continued to participate in the Medicaid program. However, other facilities that have withdrawn from the Medicaid program are free to evict Medicaid patients.

H.R. 540 affords protection from discharge or transfer based on Medicaid status to residents of nursing homes which decide to withdraw from the Medicaid program. The residents protected include those who are presently receiving Medicaid benefits in nursing homes, as well as those patients who are already residents but not yet dependent on Medicaid.

For those individuals who take up residence in the nursing home after the effective date of the facility's withdrawal from the Medicaid program, H.R. 540 provides that they must be informed orally and in writing that the nursing home may transfer or discharge the resident once the resident is unable to pay the charges of the facility through non-Medicaid sources.

The two individuals whose story inspired this legislation will be present at the event - Mr Nelson Mongiovi and his wife, Geri Mongiovi. Almost eleven months ago, officials at

the above mentioned Tampa nursing home told Nelson Mongiovi that he would have to relocate his 93 year old, Alzheimer's-afflicted mother, Adalaida (who passed away last year), so that the facility could complete "renovations." After learning that the temporary relocation was actually a permanent eviction of all 53 residents whose housing and care were paid for by Medicaid, the Mongiovi's have been outspoken advocates for the need for this legislation.

Rep. Jim Davis (D-FL) and Sen. Bob Graham (D-FL) sponsored H.R. 540 which passed overwhelmingly in the House (398-12) and passed by unanimous consent in the Senate. This signing ceremony has been arranged at their request.
