I. PURPOSE

Every Memorial Day, we gather in Arlington to honor our war dead and to remember the extraordinary sacrifice by which this nation secured its freedom. Today marks the final Memorial Day of the century. It was a century that saw too many white stones added to these gentle hills. But it was also a century that saw Americans triumph on one field of endeavor after another. A hundred years ago, the United States was strong, but untested. Today, the entire world knows what we can do. Our military is the finest in the world. Our people have never been more prosperous.

But we have never been defined merely by what we possess. More important by far is what we believe and what we are prepared to do to defend those beliefs. Americans are a realistic people – but at the heart of our achievement is a confidence rooted in optimism and a faith in our common humanity. We believe that people are worthy of the astonishing abilities God has given to us. We believe that people owe each other a decent respect for the opinions that guide them and the rights that protect them. We believe that much is expected from those to whom much has been given. That faith precedes our strength – it is the source of our strength.

If the 20th century saw too much violence, it also saw progress in the war against war. Thanks to our brave men and women in uniform, our nation has never been more secure. The Cold War is now another chapter in our history books. The world powers that fought this century's world wars are cooperating as never before. As those wars recede from our living memory, they seem closer to our earlier past, and to a yearning for freedom that traces all the way back to the Revolution that gave birth to a new nation, based on the radical premise that people could and should govern themselves.

History beckons us on Memorial Day. Nowhere is our past more palpable and present than here at Arlington. On this day, in this place, previous battles become as vivid as the white rows set in this green landscape. From Concord to Corregidor, from Korea to Khe Sanh, from Kuwait to Kosovo, our entire history is written in this ground. Only eleven days ago, a young man from Ohio, Chief Warrant Officer David Gibbs, was laid to rest here after his helicopter crashed in a training exercise in Albania. We pay tribute to a brave American who gave his life in service to his nation's highest ideals.

Many of the most famous American names are engraved on the stones that line these hills. John Pershing, George Marshall and Omar Bradley are here. Another veteran of the second world war, John F. Kennedy, lies not far from us. And countless veterans of other struggles: great explorers [Robert Peary]; four brave astronauts who gave their lives to increase our knowledge of the heavens [Gus Grissom, Roger Chaffee, Dick Scobee, Michael Smith]; Medgar Evers, who

landed at Normandy on D-Day and then fought for civil rights at home. Familiar names like Joe Louis, Earl Warren, Abner Doubleday and Audie Murphy. All different – all American.

We are the oldest constitutional democracy in the world. But we must never lose sight of how quickly we have come to be where we are. One of the great Americans buried here is the Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, Jr. He served until the administration of Franklin D. Roosevelt, and his opinions still affect us every day. But as a boy, he shook hands with a veteran of the American Revolution. As a young man, he fought in the front lines of the Civil War, where he was visited by President Lincoln, not far from here. The President, wearing his stovepipe hat, began to attract Confederate fire until Holmes shouted these immortal words: “Get down, you fool!” Lincoln replied, “I’m glad you know how to talk to a civilian.”

Justice Holmes also saw World War and Depression. He watched the United States assume the mantle of world leadership. And he never forgot that this responsibility began with the humble soldiers and sailors and airmen who have always stepped forward for our democracy. As he said on Memorial Day in 1895, war reminds us that “our comfortable routine is no eternal necessity of things.” That not a single freedom we enjoy would be safe without men and women ready, at great cost and peril, to protect it. That not one of our “birthrights” would be available at birth if it were not for the courageous generations before our time who defined these rights and defended them against all adversaries.

We did not become a great nation just because this land was generous to the people who settled it – though it was. We did not become a great nation just because the people who fled here were resourceful – though they were. We became a great nation because every time our beliefs and ideals have been threatened, Americans have stepped forward to defend them. From our biggest cities to our smallest towns, patriotic citizens have done what had to be done to advance a dream that began on the fourth of July in 1776.

If today is a day for history, it is also a day to look into the future. Today, there is a new challenge before us in Kosovo. It is a small province in a small country. But it is a big test of what we believe in. Our belief in human dignity. Our desire to bequeath to our children a world where young people do not brutalize other young people because of their heritage and faith. Our interest in building a lasting peace in an undivided free Europe.

It would be easy to look the other way, to pretend we do not see the hundreds of thousands of innocent men and women and children driven from their homes, and the thousands singled out for death along the way. We could simply accept what the Serbian leaders tell us – that these people do not exist, that they are figments of our imagination. But looking the other way is not the American way. We did not arrive at this summit of influence by sitting on our hands when our allies needed us, and when our values and interests were at stake.

Europe has seen great progress in the last ten years. More people than ever before live in freedom, united by a commitment to law, and shared beliefs about how governments should treat their citizens. Those beliefs were articulated in our nation’s founding documents. They were embraced fifty years ago, by nearly all nations, in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. And for fifty years, they have been defended by NATO.

But these beliefs are still taking root in the Balkans, and Europe's progress is imperiled by a regime that threatens human dignity and contradicts the new Europe struggling to emerge. Ten years ago, the Berlin wall fell, ending a cruel and arbitrary division between people. That same year, Slobodan Milosevic created new divisions by stripping away the rights of Kosovars. That is why the nations of the world condemn Mr. Milosevic and his war crimes. Not only are 19 NATO allies standing strong. But from every continent, help is pouring forth. Arabs and Israelis are sending assistance. Protestants and Catholics from Northern Ireland. Greeks and Turks. Africans – Asians – Latin Americans – even those whose lives have been battered by hurricanes and other disasters.

Of course, it will take time to realize our aims. Today of all days, we remember that no great evil was ever turned back without sacrifice and cost. But Americans back up their beliefs. And though we always strive to solve problems peacefully, when we fight, we fight to prevail. We will not rest until we have secured our aims. The Kosovars will go home. The Serbian forces will withdraw. An international force will deploy to protect all the people of Kosovo. And afterwards, we will build democracy and prosperity in Southeastern Europe, so that our vision of a united, peaceful Europe is at last complete.

In the days and nights ahead, I ask all Americans to remember our brave pilots and crews flying over Serbia. To keep their families in our thoughts. And to do all we can to relieve the dire suffering of the Kosovo people. Even those who escaped will be struggling with what happened to them for a long time. This afternoon, I ask all Americans to reflect on these thoughts in a moment of remembrance at 3 o'clock, Eastern Daylight Time.

In this amphitheater, it is hard not to be moved by the still-unfolding story of America. Not only because of the white rows that surround us – but because of all of you, the living symbols of American valor – members of the armed forces, veterans of every war fought this century, the families who gave you the strength to fight, and the children who will take our nation to new heights in the new century. If you want to know why this is a great country, all you have to do is look around you. It is fitting that we are standing up to ethnic cleansing with a multi-ethnic military that embodies the strength of diversity. You inspire the world with your respect for each other. You pass every test with the same flying colors – red, white and blue.

As we leave this cemetery today, and prepare to leave this century, let us honor the simple purpose of Memorial Day, and of the white stones that serve as memorials every day. For all our achievement, we did not get where we are without an effort and a price. As we race toward a future that invites and implores us, we must never become too busy to remember those who gave their lives to give us everything. Americans will do great things in this century, and go to extraordinary places. Let us never forget to remember where we have been, and who helped us get there.

I. PURPOSE

To announce that the Federal Trade Commission and the Department of Justice will conduct a joint study of the marketing practices of entertainment industries to determine whether these industries are marketing to children violent and other material that is rated for adults.

II. BACKGROUND

As part of your continuing efforts to reduce youth violence, you will announce today that the Federal Trade Commission and the Department of Justice will conduct a joint study of the marketing practices of entertainment industries to determine whether these industries are marketing to children violent and other material that is rated for adults. You will also challenge retailers to enforce age restrictions on adult-oriented media, so that inappropriate material is kept out of the hands of children.

Helping Parents to Make the Right Choices for Their Children. Numerous studies have shown that violent programming increases children's aggression toward others and desensitizes them to violence. If and to the extent that the video game, movie, and recording industries market to children violent and other materials that are rated for adults, they undermine current content-based ratings systems, make it harder for parents to control the movies, music and games their children see, and increase the likelihood of children being exposed to inappropriate materials. Therefore, you will announce today that the Federal Trade Commission and Department of Justice will conduct a study to determine whether and how the video game, motion picture, and recording industries market to children violent and other material rated for adults. The study will examine, among other matters, whether sectors of these industries advertise violent material rated for adults in media outlets in which children comprise a substantial percentage of the

audience or whether they otherwise use marketing practices designed to attract children to violent material. The study also will examine whether these industries have adopted procedures restricting the sale of products rated for adults to children and the extent to which these procedures are effective in ensuring that children do not have access to adult-oriented material.

Challenging Entertainment Industry Distributors to Enforce Ratings. A key to shielding children from exposure to excessively violent media is to halt their access to these products at the point of sale. Too many children can purchase or rent violent video games and films intended for adults from retailers who do not check identifications. In fact, according to a study conducted last year, only nine percent of retail stores that rent video games refused to rent to minors games that are rated as suitable only for adults. As part of an effort to address this issue, the Washington State Retail Association and the Interactive Digital Software Association are working together to create a point-of-sale system that will notify and remind clerks to ask for identification from buyers. Because you have argued that it is wrong to sell or rent the most violent video games and movies to children without their parents' approval, you will challenge the nation's retailers today to follow the lead of those in Washington State and enforce the ratings systems when they sell or rent any adult-rated material to children.

REMARKS ON CHILDREN, VIOLENCE AND MARKETING
THE ROSE GARDEN
June 1, 1999

In recent weeks, and in the wake of tragedy, we have witnessed something truly remarkable: Americans from all regions and all walks of life coming together to prevent youth violence. As you may recall, the First Lady and I traveled to Colorado recently and spoke with the students of Columbine High School. In one sudden moment, just six weeks ago, they lost much of the innocence of youth; but I am pleased to say that they have lost little of its idealism. They have held fast to their faith in a better future – a future where hatred no longer hardens the heart; a future where values, and not violence, make up our common culture.

The national grassroots campaign Hillary described is rooted firmly in that faith. We know we can prevent youth violence if we work together, across all the lines that may divide us; and assume responsibility rather than assign blame. That responsibility, of course, begins at home. Parents must guide children as they grow, and stay involved even as children become more independent. That responsibility must be reinforced at school; in houses of worship; and in the community as a whole. The more invested we are in the lives of our children, the less isolated they can become.

Those of us in public service must also do our part, and fulfill our responsibility to keep guns out of the hands of criminals and children. To that end, there is a broad and growing national consensus that says we must do more. I am grateful that a number of gun manufacturers came here to the White House last month and voiced their support for our common-sense approach. And I am encouraged that the Senate agreed to close the deadly gun-show loophole; require that safety locks be sold with every handgun; ban the importation of large-capacity ammunition clips; and ban violent juveniles from owning guns as adults. To the House of Representatives I say: Pass these common-sense measures into law, and do so swiftly when you return from recess. Don't put our children's safety on hold – put it at the top of your agenda.

Members of the entertainment industry must also do their part. They – and the rest of us – must not kid ourselves: our children are being fed a dependable, daily dose of violence. Studies show that the typical 18-year-old has seen 200,000 dramatized acts of violence and 40,000 dramatized murders. Kids become numb to it. They have to. And as their exposure to violence grows, so does, in some deeply troubling cases, their taste for it. We should not be surprised that half the video games the typical seventh-grader plays are violent ones.

Anyone who doubts the impact of this cultural assault can look at hundreds of studies, three decades' worth, showing the direct link between violent entertainment and violent behavior. What these studies tell us is that for adults, the boundary between fantasy and reality is a bright line; but for vulnerable children, it can be blurred. Kids who are steeped in the culture of violence can become desensitized to it and more capable of committing it themselves.

That is why I have strongly urged people in the industry to consider the consequences of what they create. One can value our First Amendment right to free expression and, at the same time, act with restraint. Our administration has worked to give parents the tools to protect their kids – and block violent programming from entering their living rooms. We have worked with the industry to develop a voluntary rating system for television, and a V-Chip that enables parents to enforce it. We've also made progress on parental screening for the Internet and ratings for Internet game sites.

Still, when violent entertainment made for adults is marketed to children, it undermines the rating systems designed to protect them. Advertisements have the power to egg children on and lure them in. Every parent knows what response a commercial for sugar cereal – or the latest “Star Wars” toy – will get from their kids. They want that product and, one way or another, they're determined to get it. So we should think twice about the impact of ads for so-called “first-person shooter” video games – like the recent ad for a game that invites players to “get in touch with your gun-toting. . . cold-blooded murdering side.” Now, Arthur obviously has the inner strength and the upbringing to reject that kind of violent appeal. But not every child will.

Today, I am asking the Department of Justice and the Federal Trade Commission to study the extent to which the video game, music and movie industries market violence to children – and whether those industries are abiding by their own voluntary systems of regulation. To any company that sells violent products, I say this: Children are more than consumers. They are our future, and our most precious resource. They should not be targets in the marketing of violence. Don't make young people want what your own rating systems say they shouldn't have.

I also issue this challenge to the owners of movie theaters and video stores, to distributors, and to anyone at the point of sale: enforce the ratings systems on the products you sell. Check IDs. Draw the line. If underage kids are buying violent video games or getting into R-rated movies, then ratings systems should be strictly enforced to put a stop to it. And if gratuitous violence is getting into PG-13-rated movies, then ratings systems should be reevaluated.

I want to thank Senators Brownback, Lieberman, Hatch, and Kohl for the work they've done on this issue. And I want to commend Washington State Representative Mary Lou Dickerson, who is here with us today. Inspired by an article she read about young Arthur, Rep. Dickerson helped create a task force on video game violence. And, thanks to her work with Mothers Against Violence in America and the Washington Retailers Association, both of which are represented here today, video game retailers in Washington State will now voluntarily sign a

pledge to parents, committing themselves to check IDs and block sales of violent games to minors.

I urge others to follow their lead. For this, in the end, is the way we will make progress: by constant and coordinated effort – as individuals and industries, as communities and as a nation. Youth violence is a problem we face together – and it is a problem America can solve together. By joining hands in this effort we can truly build a safer future for all our children in the 21st Century. Thank you.

I. PURPOSE

This interview will give you a chance to promote the National Campaign to Prevent Youth Violence and next week's White House Conference on Mental Health. The program will also provide you a forum to encourage the House to pass the gun control amendments included in the Senate's juvenile justice bill when they return to Washington D.C. next week.

Charles Gibson will be conducting the first interview with you in the Cabinet Room. At 7:30 you will join Mrs. Clinton and Diane Sawyer in the Roosevelt Room for an interactive "town hall" style conversation with approximately 40 middle and high school students. This audience will include about ten special teenagers from across the country whose lives have been directly impacted by youth violence. The rest of the audience will be made up of teenagers from high schools around the Washington D.C. area. The town hall participants will "look like America," representing a cross section of age, gender, ethnic, and geographic backgrounds. Diane Sawyer and Charles Gibson will continue their conversation with the audience after you and the First Lady finish your segment at 8:00 a.m.

There will be a half-hour briefing in the Map Room with the First Lady starting at 6:30 p.m. today. There will also be a short briefing in the Oval Office on Friday morning.

II. BACKGROUND

Good Morning America is the second highest rated morning news program, with an average audience of approximately four million viewers. Sixty five percent of the program's audience is female. Earlier this year Charles Gibson and Diane Sawyer replaced hosts Lisa McCree and Kevin Newman. Since the change, ratings for the program have increased by twenty percent.

Gibson had co-hosted the show for eleven years before leaving the program last spring. He last interviewed you at the Volunteer Summit in 1997. Diane Sawyer last interviewed you and Mrs. Clinton around the time of the 1993 inauguration.

Charles Gibson took a few days off from the program earlier this week after undergoing an angioplasty last weekend. His daughter Jessica recently left her post as Larry Stein's assistant at the White House Legislative Affairs Office.

III. QUESTIONS

Gibson and Sawyer will open the program from the Rose Garden. Charles will then proceed to sit down with you in the Cabinet Room, while Diane goes to the Roosevelt Room to meet Mrs. Clinton and the 40 teenagers. Gibson's 17-minute interview with you will be mostly on the issue of youth violence. He might ask you a question or two about Kosovo or any other late breaking news story.

Topics to be discussed include:

- Access to guns.
- Will legislation make a difference?
- Parental responsibility.
- School security.
- Local solutions.

After your interview with Charles you will both proceed to the Roosevelt Room for the town hall portion of the program. Both you and Charles will be wearing wireless microphones. You will be seated with Mrs. Clinton at the front of the room. Gibson and Sawyer will be in the audience with the students. The discussion will feature three primary issue areas and a wrap-up "solutions" component.

These issue areas include:

- Gun Access: Gun accessibility and access ramifications.
- Cultural Influences and Glamorization: The impact of violent video games, music lyrics, movies and television; as well as the cultural issues of self-esteem, peer pressure and peer rejection, and youth responsibility/accountability.
- Parental Communication/Accountability: Issues of quality time, areas of communication, and ultimate behavioral responsibility.
- Solutions: A wrap-up discussion of what the teenagers think the President, their schools, and their peers could and should be doing.

Diane Sawyer and Charles Gibson will facilitate the discussion between you, the First Lady, and the youth participants. The forum will feature a select number of youth "testimonials" and tape set up segments to provoke discussion. There will be a video monitor at the side of the room so you can see these taped segments. The participants will be encouraged to direct their remarks to you, Mrs. Clinton, and to each other. Please see the attachments for a description of the specially selected teenagers and the makeup of the rest of the audience.

There will be no commercial breaks during this town hall segment.

School Safety/Youth Violence

Q: In the wake of the school shootings, like those in Jonesboro, and Littleton, what can really be done to make our schools and communities safer for our children?

A: All of us must work together and accept responsibility for the safety of our children -- in our schools and our communities. And that means there is more for each of us to do at home and at school, in Hollywood and in the heartland and here in Washington.

First and most fundamentally, we must do more to help parents fulfill their most important responsibilities -- those to their children. Challenging parents to turn off the television or use the V-Chip to block inappropriate programming; to use the new tools to keep an eye on the computer screen; to refuse to buy products that glorify violence.

I have called on the media and entertainment industries for their participation as well. We cannot pretend that there is no adverse impact on our culture and our children if there is too much violence coming out of what they see and experience. So we have to ask people who produce things to consider the consequences of them -- whether it's a violent movie, a CD, a video game. If they are made, they at least they should not be marketed to children and I have called on the FTC and the Justice Department to immediately commence a study into this issue.

And finally, the Congress must join in our national effort by quickly passing legislation necessary to keep guns out of the hands of children and criminals. I've proposed comprehensive legislation on this front, and worked with gun manufacturers and sportsmen to garner their support for my common sense measures that will help save lives.

Q: Are America's schools unsafe?

A: America's schools are quite safe. While we need to work to make them safer, we know that for the most part our schools are safer than the communities in which they are located. Data from the Annual Report on School Safety indicates that 43 percent of schools reported NO incidents of crime, and 90 percent of schools reported NO incidents of serious violent crime.

But even though schools are generally safe, no school or community is immune from senseless violence, as recent school tragedies remind us. And although students are safer sitting in a classroom than walking down the street, serious crime problems persist, gang

presence in schools doubled between 1989 and 1995, thousands of kids bring guns to school, and discipline remains the #1 problem in the classroom. My revamped Safe and Drug-Free Schools program will put a new emphasis on school discipline, in addition to combating crime and drugs in schools.

Q: How many students are expelled for bringing guns to school? Is this number increasing?

A: As part of our national policy for gun-free schools, in the 1996-97 school year, over 6,000 students were expelled for bringing a gun to school. We have some indications that these numbers are decreasing and fewer students are bringing guns to school. Moreover, serious violent crime committed against students at school -- which is lower than crime committed against students while they are away from school -- has also been on the decline.

Q: What specific school safety initiatives have you recently proposed?

A: My revamped Safe and Drug-Free Schools proposal contains a number of new initiatives to help keep our schools safer, more disciplined, and drug-free. My safe schools proposal will require counseling for students who bring guns and bombs to school, promote programs that educate students on the risks associated with firearms, provide more school counselors to help deal with troubled youth, and inform parents when guns are brought to school. My proposal also promotes more orderly and disciplined classrooms by allowing more education funds to be spent on alternative schools for disruptive youth, and character education to help instill common sense values in our young people.

My proposal also provides more effective prevention programs for the reduction of drugs and violence in schools, more accountability for results, and better targeting to those schools that need the most assistance. Under the revamped program, school districts will be expected to develop comprehensive plans that: require schools to adopt comprehensive school safety plans, use proven anti-drug and violence prevention programs, establish security procedures for schools, and give parents an annual school report of incidents of drug use and violence. In addition, my safe schools initiative would create Project SERV - the School Emergency Response to Violence -- to dispatch a coordinated FEMA-like response if a school tragedy should occur.

But whole communities need to get involved with keeping our schools safe. That is why we created a new \$380 million program, the Safe Schools-Healthy Students initiative, to establish community-wide responses to school safety. Our initiative will give communities funds to provide comprehensive services for our young people, such as mental health services, school resource officers, mentoring, and after school programs.

Q: What are some examples of local solutions that have been successful in

combating youth violence?

A: Communities across the country have been successful in devising solutions to their local youth violence problems. Some particularly noteworthy communities include:

- **Boston, MA:** Boston brought together a broad coalition of Federal, state, and local government agencies, non-profits, businesses, religious leaders, and residents to devise a comprehensive strategy to address the escalating number of youth homicides. Some of the innovative programs they developed include Operation Ceasefire and the Boston Gun Project which helped them to identify gang-involved youth, send clear messages about the city's zero tolerance policies, and trace crime guns to disrupt illegal gun markets. Boston also created Operation Night Light to strengthen supervision of youth probationers, and expanded their intervention and prevention programs for at-risk youth. As a result, Boston's youth homicide rate dropped dramatically, and experienced a remarkable two year period where no juvenile was killed with a gun.
- **Minnesota, MN:** Minnesota created a unique public-private partnership ("Minnesota HEALS") to develop their violence reduction strategy. The initiative includes numerous corporate commitments and public agency collaborations to reduce violent crime. The city created a Law Enforcement Task Force to help identify the gang problem responsible for much of their violent crime, a rapid response team to crack down on gang shootings and retaliations, and saturation patrols to patrol crime and gun "hot spots." In addition, Honeywell, General Mills, and other private companies partner with existing community organizations to provide financial resources and expertise for revitalization programs, as well as school partnerships, and to employment training. As a result of Minnesota HEALS, homicides are down by 30 percent, and gang-related homicides have been cut in half.
- **San Diego, CA:** In San Diego, the school district responded to the county's increase in juvenile violence and crime with a comprehensive approach to reduce youth violence and increase students' educational success. The district provides a race/human relations team to proactively deal with discrimination and gang issues, a Life Skills Program to prevent substance abuse and teen pregnancy, counselors and nurses in every elementary schools, and zero tolerance policies for guns and drugs in schools. The district also maintains close ties to police officers, juvenile judges and probation officers, and employs a number of security measures as well such as school police, a crisis team, and undercover police to detect drug use. As a result, the district has less crime and

truancy during the school day, significant declines of 50 to 75 percent in drug, alcohol and tobacco use by students and a decrease in drop out rates.

Guns

Q: The gun lobby has successfully beaten back efforts to pass new gun laws in recent years. Do you believe that the Congress will actually pass gun control legislation this year?

A: I believe the Congress will -- indeed, it must-- pass common sense gun legislation this summer. Although violent and gun-related crime have fallen dramatically over the last 7 years, these tragic school shootings remind us that we must do even more to reduce youth violence and keep guns out of the hands of children. An estimated 13 young people die everyday in America from a gun shot wound. This is unacceptable. While the Senate should be commended for moving quickly to pass reasonable gun legislation, the House leadership must recognize that there is a growing national consensus that government should do more to keep guns out of the hands of criminals and children, and that it should put the will of the American people over the clout of the gun lobby.

Q: Are you satisfied with the Senate-passed gun legislation?

A: I am pleased that the Senate bill contained many of the provisions that I recently proposed as part of my Youth Gun Crime Enforcement Act -- the most comprehensive gun legislation put forward in 30 years. Some of my proposals included in the Senate bill would: (1) close the gun show loophole to require Brady background checks at gun shows; (2) ban the juvenile possession of semi-automatic assault rifles; (3) halt the importation of large capacity ammunition magazines; (4) bar violent juveniles from owning guns as adults; (5) require child safety locks with guns; and (6) help law enforcement trace more crime guns to their source.

However, as the House of Representatives prepares to take up gun legislation in the coming weeks, they should view the Senate's gun provisions as a floor -- not a ceiling. The House bill should also raise the age of handgun possession from 18 to 21, extend the Brady Law to purchases of explosives. I believe that these additional measures would go a long way toward helping to save lives, and the House should act on them promptly.

Q: The NRA and certain Republicans charge that under the your Administration, federal gun prosecutions are significantly down, and almost no cases have been brought against students for bringing a gun to school. They believe that more enforcement of existing laws is needed instead of new gun control laws. What is

your response?

A: Although Republicans and the NRA like to say that so-called "Triggerlock" prosecutions are down, and my administration has failed to prosecute kids for bringing guns to school, that's simply not the real story on federal firearms prosecutions. The truth is that:

(1) The laws have succeeded in deterring gun crime. The federal laws cited by the NRA have relatively small penalties and were enacted primarily for their deterrent effect on crime and weapons-carrying by criminals and young people. Put simply, they are intended to stop guns from getting into the hands of criminals and juveniles, and the evidence shows they are doing so. Crime rates are down nationwide, and gun-related crime -- particularly by youth -- is down dramatically: homicides, robberies, and aggravated assaults committed with gun are down by an average of 27 percent. This is in part because these laws have stopped over a quarter million felons, fugitives, and prohibited users from buying guns in the first place.

(2) Federal prosecutions of serious gun crimes have gone up. At the federal level, we have focused on the most serious gun crimes, and prosecution of these crimes is up during this Administration. Prosecutions of gun criminals serving sentences of five years or more have increased by fully 30 percent.

(3) Overall firearms prosecutions of serious gun criminals are up. Combined state and federal prosecution of gun offenses is up during this Administration, in large part because of improved coordination and sensible allocation of resources. About 25 percent more criminals currently are sent to prison for state and federal weapons offenses than in 1992. In many cases, state prosecutions make more sense because criminals may be subject to longer sentences in the state court system.

(4) Tough talk is cheap. Despite its rhetoric, time and again, the gun lobby has opposed efforts to provide real money to state, local, and federal law enforcement agencies to investigate, arrest, and prosecute gun criminals and illegal gun traffickers. Over the past two years, we have called for more resources to enforce our gun laws on every front -- requesting tens of millions of dollars to hire over 280 new ATF agents and over 40 new federal prosecutors, as well as more than a billion dollars to hire more local police and prosecutors.

(5) Enforcement alone is not enough. While we support increased resources for federal enforcement and prosecutions, enforcement alone is simply not enough. It is essential to prevent criminals and kids from getting guns in the first place. The Brady Law has stopped over a quarter of a million felons, fugitives, and stalkers from getting handguns, preventing countless crimes. That is why I am urging the Congress to enact my proposals to prevent guns from falling into the hands of

children and felons.

Q: It has been widely reported that there is a growing divide between the gun industry and the NRA. Are you encouraging this divide? And how does this affect gun legislation in Congress?

A: I have called on all sectors of society to come together and do what they can to prevent and combat youth violence. I am pleased that key members of the gun industry are stepping up to the plate and have signaled their support for reasonable, common sense measures to help reduce gun violence.

The American Shooting Sports Council, which represents over 300 gun manufacturers and dealers, specifically endorsed five of my proposals: (1) requiring background checks at gun shows; (2) raising the age of handgun possession from 18 to 21; (3) expanding our crime gun tracing initiative; (4) establishing liability for adults who allow children access to guns; and (5) permanently banning violent juveniles from owning guns.

We believe that the industry's endorsement of our proposals to keep guns out of the hands of kids and criminals exemplifies the kind of broad support we have for our common sense proposals -- and gives Congress yet another reason to enact these initiatives immediately.

Media Violence

Q: Earlier this week, you announced a joint FTC and Justice Department study on marketing violence to youth. What will this study specifically look into?

A: Studies show that violent programming increases children's aggression toward others and desensitizes them to violence. If and to the extent that the video game, movie, and recording industries market to children violent and other materials that are rated for adults, they undermine current content-based ratings systems, make it harder for parents to control the movies, music and games their children see, and increase the likelihood of children being exposed to inappropriate materials.

That is why I asked the Federal Trade Commission and Department of Justice to conduct a study to determine whether and how the video game, motion picture, and recording industries market to children violent and other material rated for adults. The study will examine whether sectors of these industries advertise violent material rated for adults in media outlets in which children comprise a substantial percentage of the audience or whether they otherwise use marketing practices designed to attract children to violent material. The study also will examine whether these industries have adopted procedures restricting the sale of products rated for adults to children and the extent to which these procedures are effective in ensuring that children do not have access to adult-oriented

material.

Q: What do you plan to do if this study concludes that media industries do market violent materials rated for adults to children?

A: First, the study can help the industries themselves to enforce their self-regulatory systems by providing them with information about various kinds of marketing practices. If the report concludes that some members of these industries are pushing adult-rated material on children, the industries as a whole may want to adopt stronger protections against these marketing practices. Second, this information will serve as a useful tool for parents by helping them better understand, and thereby better monitor, whether and how the media target violent material to children. Third, government officials can review the finding of the study to determine whether any action is appropriate, consistent with the First Amendment.

Q: Why doesn't your study look into whether the gun industry targets children?

A: The study focuses on the entertainment industries for the simple reason that these industries do massive amounts of marketing; indeed, images of guns and other weapons reach far more people through entertainment advertising than through advertising for those products. If those conducting the study, however, believe that they can uncover important information by looking further into the gun industry's marketing practices, then they have the authority and resources to do so.

Q: There has been a lot of talk about the V-Chip, and its ability to help parents screen out programming that they don't want their children to see. When will it be ready?

A: With the Vice President Gore helping to lead the fight, we passed legislation that requires that the V-Chip be installed in all new television sets sold beginning January 1, 2000. And last month, we took two more steps to make sure the V-Chip becomes a useful tool for parents. First, the FCC will establish a V-Chip Task Force to ensure that V-Chip requirement is enforced promptly and comprehensively and promote parental awareness. And second, we are working with the Kaiser foundation and the Center for Media Education in their national effort to educate parents about the V-Chip TV ratings system -- with free booklets for parents on how the V-chip TV ratings system works that will be available through a toll-free telephone number.

National Campaign to Prevent Youth Violence

Q: You've previously announced that you were planning to launch a national campaign to prevent youth violence. Why a national campaign? Can it really do anything?

A: Youth violence is a problem that government cannot solve alone. That is why we called for the creation of a national campaign to reduce youth violence. This campaign will work at the grass-roots level with all sectors of our society – the media, education groups, parents, religious leaders, and young people – to focus on this problem, find what is working, and spread it to new communities.

We wanted to model the new campaign after two extremely successful efforts that we previously launched: the national campaign to reduce teen pregnancy, and the Welfare to Work Partnership. These campaigns have played important roles in helping to reduce the teen pregnancy rates, and moving over 40,000 people from the welfare rolls to the job rolls.

PROFILES OF SELECT YOUTH ATTENDING WHITE HOUSE/GOOD MORNING AMERICA TOWN HALL

Jen Bidula, Bethel Park, PA: Jen enjoys guns as a sport and hobby she shares with her family. Her Bethel Park High School had a high profile pepper spray violent incident that sent 40 kids to area hospitals. The incident occurred the day before the Columbine High School shooting

Trey Carver, Conyers, Georgia: Trey is a junior at Heritage High School, site of last month's school shooting. He reported that his friend, T.J. Solomon, brought a gun to school two weeks before he shot and wounded six students.

Scott Carver, Baltimore, Maryland: Teenager who has his own web site dedicated to the video game "Doom". Scott is completely immersed in the video culture.

Leanne Dews, Pearl, Mississippi: Sister of Pearl school shooting victim who now advocates for better accountability and parental responsibility. Her family is suing the family of the boy responsible for the school shooting at her high school.

Missy Jenkins, West Paducah, Kentucky: Paralyzed in Heath High School by the shooter, Michael Carnal. Supports more gun control, parental responsibility and school control.

Marc Kramer and Mike Robbins, Chicago, Illinois: Marc accidentally shot his best friend Mike at his father's home with his father's gun. Mike recovered.

Albert Smith, Evanston Illinois: Albert's sister was shot in a random shooting outside his home. Albert has organized an annual anti-violence march and supports more gun control and parental intervention.

Brandy Varner, Jonesboro, Arkansas: Sister of Britney Varner who was killed in Jonesboro at Westside Middle School. Her mother, Suzanne Wilson, has become active in getting parental responsibility legislation introduced. Brandy thinks there is too much violence in movies and on television. She also thinks the media does a bad job of depicting the shattered lives left from the incidents of teen violence.

Betina Lyn, Springfield Oregon: Betina was shot by Kip Kinkel at Thurston High School. She has become a strong advocate for tough gun legislation.

Hope Allison Williams, Washington D.C. Is a peer mentor at Woodrow Wilson High School. Feels it is important to talk to kids to understand their anger, frustration etc. A student from her school recently committed suicide. The student had complained that she had no one to talk with about her problems.

I. PURPOSE

To convene the members of your Cabinet to issue an new Executive Order on energy efficiency in federal buildings; discuss the Fiscal Year 2000 Budget and the situation in Kosovo. Following the meeting, you will make a statement highlighting the previous discussion.

II. BACKGROUND

The last time you convened your Cabinet was on January 13, 1999 to prepare for your State of the Union Address. John Podesta assembled the entire Cabinet for briefings in February and April, 1999. He has also met with members of your Cabinet both individually and in small informal groups throughout the year.

Federal Energy Executive Order

The Executive Order you will issue helps meet the challenge of global warming by dramatically improving energy efficiency in Federal buildings. Meeting the Order's energy efficiency goals will result in over \$750 million in annual savings by 2010 and reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 2.4 million metric tons – the equivalent of taking 1.7 million cars off the road. As a prime example of the savings that can be achieved, you will also announce a major contract to retrofit over 800 buildings at five military installations in the Washington, D.C. area. This contract will result in savings of over \$219 million, making it Energy Saving Performance Contract ever.

Fiscal Year 2000

In the past two weeks both the House and Senate have finished the process of allocating the federal budget to different subcommittees. Through this process, the Republicans have presented a budget that is unrealistic, reckless and dangerous because it would create devastating cuts in a vast array of programs that Americans rightfully count on from their government. These include cuts in basic programs such as education and job training, Head Start, FBI agents, Border Patrol guards, and toxic waste clean up.

We have been pushing hard in the press on the Hill to underscore that your budget presents an alternative to these draconian cuts. Your budget invests in Social Security, Medicare, and other important priorities while also offsetting the funding so as to ensure a balanced budget that keeps our fiscal house in order. We have also emphasized that if the Republicans reject your plan, then it is their responsibility to present a realistic and responsible plan. We have been working with members of your Cabinet to underscore these points.

PRESIDENTIAL TALKING POINTS

CABINET MEETING

JUNE 3, 1999

- Thank you for being here. There are a few important topics that I want to discuss with you.

FEDERAL ENERGY EXECUTIVE ORDER

- Today I am issuing a new Executive Order to substantially improve energy efficiency in our federal buildings in order both to help meet the challenge of global climate change and to save taxpayers money at the same time.
- I am convinced that this issue of climate change is going to be one of the critical issues of the next century and I am committed to seeing the federal government stand as a leader in taking effective steps to save energy and save money.
- After all, we are the nation's largest energy consumer with an annual bill of over \$8 billion – more than \$4 billion just to heat, cool, and power its 500,000 buildings.
- We have already made a lot of progress in reducing energy under previous Executive Orders, but there is a lot more we can do. The Order I am issuing today (1) sets new goals for energy efficiency and reducing greenhouse gases; (2) directs you all to use a number of specific tools and strategies at your disposal to reduce energy in a cost-effective manner; and (3) sets forth a number of measures to increase accountability in reaching the Order's goals.
- **I want to ask each of you to make this whole matter of energy efficiency a priority. We cannot look to businesses and consumers to take the kind of smart steps that are available to them – and that could go a long way toward dealing with our global warming problem – unless we are prepared to lead the way. So please make sure senior people in your agencies are charged with carrying out the provisions of the Order.**
- One of the most interesting tools for reducing energy are Energy Saving Performance Contracts under which private contractors can overhaul your buildings at no cost to you because they get paid out of the energy savings they generate. In fact, you can save large amounts of money while cutting your greenhouse gas emissions.

DOD has a wonderful new ESPC that we're unveiling today and that I'd like to ask Bill (Cohen) about – it's going to cover over 800 buildings and save over \$200 million during the 18-year life of the contract while cutting energy use by some 25%. It's a great deal and we need to do more of that.

- Before turning to Bill, though, I'd like to ask Bill Richardson – whose agency *does* have energy efficiency at the core of its mission – for some comments on the new Order and how DOE can help agencies comply with it.
- [After Richardson finishes:] Bill [Cohen]: could you tell us bit more about this new Energy Savings Performance Contract that DOD is entering into?

FISCAL YEAR 2000

- In my Fiscal Year 2000 budget, I put forward a plan to meet the needs of the nation's future and to honor fiscal discipline. This has brought us historic economic prosperity, and budget surpluses "as far as the eye can see."
- My plan reserves 62% of the surplus for the next 15 years to extend the life of the Social Security Trust Fund, puts another 15% into the Medicare, another 12% for a tax cut in the form of Universal Savings Accounts, and leaves the remainder to provide for the other needs of our future, including defense spending and funds for education.
- In the past two weeks both the House and Senate have finished the process of allocating the federal budget to different subcommittees.
- We now face critical choices that will affect the nation's economy and our prosperity through the 21st century.
- **Through this process, the Republicans have presented a budget that is unrealistic, reckless and dangerous because it would create devastating cuts in a vast array of programs that Americans rightfully count on from their government.**
 - These include cuts in basic programs such as education and job training, Headstart, FBI agents, Border Patrol guards, and toxic waste clean up.
- The Republicans have created categories of "winners" and "losers." More than half the funding bills fall into the category of "losers," facing cuts in the range of nearly ten to twenty percent. We've been down this road before and we know what it leads to.
- There is another choice. My budget invests in Social Security and Medicare while funding important priorities in all areas of government that will prepare Americans for the 21st Century. At the same time, all of the funding that I am requesting for Fiscal Year 2000 for important National priorities is offset, ensuring a balanced budget that keeps our fiscal house in order.
- And if the Republicans reject my plan, then it is their responsibility to the American people to make their own choices for a realistic and responsible plan, instead of the reckless and

dangerous budget they have presented.

SUBJECT: Federal Energy Executive Order

Tomorrow, you are scheduled to sign a new Executive Order on energy efficiency in federal buildings. Meeting the Order's energy efficiency goals will result in over \$750 million in annual savings by 2010 and reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 2.4 million metric tons – the equivalent of taking 1.7 million cars off the road. You will also announce -- as a prime example of the savings that can be achieved -- a major DOD Energy Savings Performance Contract to retrofit over 800 buildings at five military installations in the Washington, D.C. area. The savings over the 18-year life of the contract are estimated to be some \$219 million, making it the largest ESPC ever.

The Executive Order itself has three main components: it establishes new efficiency goals for agencies in terms of both energy efficiency and greenhouse gas reductions; directs agencies to maximize their use of specific energy-saving tools and strategies, such as ESPCs; and it strengthens agency accountability for smart-energy use.

New Goals. The Order requires Federal agencies to achieve by 2010:

- 35% greater energy efficiency in buildings relative to 1985 levels; and,
- 30% cut in greenhouse gas emissions from building-related energy use relative to 1990.

The Order also directs agencies to expand their use of renewable energy technologies and electricity from non-hydro renewable energy sources (solar, wind, geothermal, and biomass), although it does not lay down specific numeric goals.

Tools and Strategies. Agencies are directed to maximize their use of:

- Energy Saving Performance Contracts, like the DOD contract where private contractors make energy-saving improvements and receive a portion of the resulting savings;
- Life-cycle cost analysis, so agencies consider the real, long term cost of energy investments;
- ENERGY STAR & other energy efficient products, everything from light bulbs to boilers;

- Highly Efficient Energy Systems, like combined heat and power which makes use of “waste” heat from industrial processes.
- Off-Grid Electricity Generation, which can avoid costly new transmission lines, especially to remote locations;
- Sustainable Building Design.

Strengthening Accountability. The Order requires a number of steps to enhance agency accountability in meeting the goals of the Order. For example, annual scorecards evaluating agency progress will be submitted to the President; OMB’s Deputy Director of Management, in consultation with DOE, will be responsible for evaluating each agency’s progress in improving energy management; the President’s Management Council (consisting of agency Deputy Secretaries) is to monitor progress and provide a forum to discuss ways to accelerate improvements; agencies are directed to establish energy management teams to facilitate use of tools such as ESPCs; and The Secretary of Energy will appoint an advisory committee of public and private sector representatives to provide ongoing input on best ways to save federal energy.

I. PURPOSE

To present the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities (PCEPD) President's Award; to call on Congress to pass the Jeffords-Kennedy legislation by the July anniversary of the American with Disabilities Act; and to announce an executive order to ensure that the same federal hiring standards apply to people with psychiatric disabilities as to people with other disabilities.

II. BACKGROUND

Established in 1947 by President Harry Truman, the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities is a small federal agency that reports to the President on progress and problems related to disability employment issues. Under the leadership of Chairman Tony Coelho, some 300 members promote public and private efforts to enhance the employment of individuals with disabilities. The Committee provides information, training, and technical assistance to America's business leaders, organized labor, rehabilitation and service providers, advocacy organizations, families, and individuals with disabilities. Among the Committee's services are the Job Accommodation Network, the Business Leadership Network, High School/High Tech, Project EMPLOY and the Workforce Recruitment Program for College Students with Disabilities, which during the past year placed 300 people with disabilities in private and public sector jobs.

The President's Award is America's highest honor for achievement in furthering the employment and empowerment of people with disabilities. An annual recipient is selected from a national slate of nominees. Honorees have demonstrated outstanding achievements in the world of work and made significant contributions to increase public awareness about Americans with disabilities in the workforce. Since 1947, the award has been presented only six times at the White House, three of those times by you.

Today you will present awards to the following honorees:

Joyce Bender is the president of Bender Consulting Services (BCS), which actively recruits and hires people with disabilities who have expertise in information technologies. BCS contracts these employees as consultants to client companies throughout the Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Wilmington, Delaware areas. In 1985, Ms. Bender sustained a life-threatening epileptic attack that caused an intracranial hemorrhage requiring brain surgery. She returned to work with a seizure disorder, a 40 percent hearing loss in one ear and a renewed respect for the attitudinal obstacles faced by individuals with disabilities. Employment of people with disabilities has become her life's work.

James H. Click, Jr. founded the non-profit LINKAGES program in Tucson, Arizona, as a one-stop shop for employers who want to hire people with disabilities. A LINKAGES liaison works with local rehabilitation agencies to identify qualified candidates for every position. Since 1998, some 80 employers have hired more than 170 people with disabilities through the program. As president of the Jim Click Automotive Team, Mr. Click is also a LINKAGES employer. Approximately 35 individuals with disabilities are working in his car dealership franchises throughout Arizona and California. His dream is to take LINKAGES throughout the country.

Laura Hershey is a grass roots leader who has tirelessly advocated for reform in the Social Security system, housing, transportation and other areas affecting the livelihood of Americans with disabilities. She is best known for mobilizing the PASS Participants Rights Campaign to fight for the rights of adults with severe disabilities to pursue employment and maintain their eligibility for Medicaid coverage. Ms. Hershey has served as interim executive director of the Denver Disability Center for Independent Living and is a former director of the Denver Commission for People with Disabilities. She consults and writes frequently on disability issues.

Today you will also:

Announce the Signing of an Executive Order Expanding Hiring Opportunities for People with Psychiatric Disabilities. In January, Tipper Gore announced that the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) would explore measures to eliminate the stricter standards that are currently applied for people with psychiatric disabilities. Today, you will sign an executive order that:

- Ensures that individuals with psychiatric disabilities are given the same hiring opportunities as persons with severe physical disabilities or mental retardation. The civil service rules will be changed to ensure that people with psychiatric disabilities are covered by the same hiring rules and authority used for individuals with other disabilities.

- Permits people with psychiatric disabilities the same opportunity to acquire competitive civil service status after two years of successful service. This authority will allow adults with psychiatric disabilities the same opportunity for conversion into the competitive civil service as employees with other disabilities.

Challenged Congress to Pass the Historic, Bipartisan Work Incentives Improvement Act. This historic new legislation, which has received overwhelming bipartisan support in both the House and the Senate under the leadership of Senators Jeffords, Kennedy, Roth, and Moynihan and Representatives Lazio, Waxman, Bliley, and Dingell removes significant barriers to work for people with disabilities by improving access to health care through Medicaid; extending Medicare coverage for people with disabilities who return to work; and creating a new Medicaid buy-in demonstration to help people with a specific physical or mental impairment that is expected to lead to a severe disability without medical assistance. One of the biggest barriers to entering the workplace for individuals with disabilities is that, under current law, people with disabilities often become ineligible for Medicaid or Medicare if they work, forcing them to choose between health care coverage and employment. Today, you will urge Congress to pass this important and long overdue legislation by July 26, the ninth anniversary of the ADA.

Fifty years ago, President Harry Truman, the very first President to present these awards, set a goal for our nation: To give every American with a disability the chance – and I quote -- “to play their full part in strengthening our nation ... [and] share in the greatest satisfaction of American life – to be independent and self-supporting.”

Today, we gather to honor three Americans whose efforts to bring more and more people with disabilities into the world of work have moved America ever closer to that great --and just -- goal.

Since the founding of our nation, work has been at the heart of the American Dream. Because millions of Americans have had the opportunity to work and build better lives for themselves and their families, our nation is strong and prosperous. Through work, we reinforce the values that hold our society together – the values of responsibility, perseverance, striving for the future. And in so many ways, we Americans define ourselves, not only by our families and hometowns, but by our work. Often, the first question we ask each other is not “Who are your parents?” or “Where do you live?” but “What do you do?”

Today, there are still too many Americans with disabilities who have never been allowed to answer that question, who have never had the chance to participate in that essential element of the American Dream. Even as we celebrate more than 18 million new jobs and a nationwide unemployment rate of 4.3 percent -- the lowest unemployment in a generation -- 75 percent of Americans with disabilities remain unemployed. And of those unemployed, 72 percent say they want to go to work.

This is not just a missed opportunity for Americans with disabilities. It is a missed opportunity for America. In an era of labor shortages, when companies go begging to fill positions they need to stay competitive in our global economy, we cannot afford to ignore millions of potential workers simply because they have a disability. Think of the loss to American industry, the economy, and even our Treasury. Tony Coehlo often likes to say that he represents the only group in America that actually wants to pay more taxes. If we are to sustain and build our prosperity, if we are to uphold our highest ideal of opportunity for all, then we as a nation must work harder to give all Americans the chance to experience the pride of going to work and earning a paycheck.

Today, one of the biggest obstacles to employment for Americans with disabilities is the fear that they will lose their federal health insurance once they take a job. As many of you know, under current law, people with disabilities cannot work and keep Medicaid or Medicare coverage at the same time. For many Americans with disabilities, medical bills cost thousands of dollars beyond what is typically covered by an employer's private insurance. They have no choice but to stay out of the workforce, dependent on federal assistance.

This is not what America is about. This system denies opportunity to millions who are willing to take the responsibility to work and become full-fledged members of our American community. It is time to change.

Last summer, I called on Congress to free our fellow Americans from this unfair choice between going to work and keeping health insurance. Today, Congress is considering landmark bipartisan legislation to do just that. The Work Incentives Improvement Act, sponsored by Senators Jeffords, Kennedy, Roth and Moynihan; and Reps. Lazio, Waxman, Bliley and Dingell has awaited passage for months. With more than 75 Senate co-sponsors from both parties, there is no good reason why it should take this long to pass. I have proposed funds in my balanced budget to support this legislation. So I challenge Congress to pass the Jeffords-Kennedy bill right away. Next month, we will mark the ninth anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act. The best way we can celebrate the landmark legislation that literally widened the doors of opportunity for millions is to open those doors even wider -- so that more Americans with disabilities can join the proud ranks of working citizens.

There is more we can do. In my balanced budget, I am also proposing a \$1,000 tax credit to help people with disabilities afford the specialized transportation, technology, or personal assistance they need to make a successful transition to work. And we must double our efforts to make "assistive technologies" such as voice recognition software, mobile telephones, Braille translators, more widely available. I challenge Congress to move forward with these proposals.

And today, I am taking immediate action to give more Americans with disabilities the opportunity to become a part of the largest workforce in America. As some of you may know, on Monday, the First Lady, the Vice President and Mrs. Gore and I will be hosting a White House Conference on Mental Health. One of our goals is to help more Americans understand that mental illness is not a character flaw, but a disability. That is why today, I am using my executive authority as President to strip away the outdated barriers that keep people with psychiatric disabilities from serving America in the federal government. I am directing all federal agencies to provide applicants with mental illnesses the same opportunities as other applicants with disabilities.

Government must do its part to widen the circle of opportunity to even more Americans with disabilities. But Americans as individuals can also take action. The three citizens we honor today are proof of the difference one person can make. I am proud to present these awards to each of them.

First, to Joyce Bender. Fifteen years ago, as Joyce Bender lay in a hospital trauma unit, recovering from a near-fatal cerebral hemorrhage, she made a vow to give something back to the patients who were not so lucky. Through Bender Consulting Services, she has used her own expertise as a professional head-hunter to place people with disabilities in high-wage, high-tech jobs. Joyce knows that the demand for high-skilled workers will only continue to grow – and she is determined to make sure more people with disabilities will be ready to meet it. She has founded a new program to train even more disabled people in high-tech skills that are the ticket to the world of work. It is an honor to present this award to Joyce Bender.

Next, to James H. Click, Jr. As the head of nine car dealerships in California and Arizona, Jim Click is an undisputed leader in his field. But he is also unrivaled in his commitment to hiring and extending opportunity to people with disabilities – as we heard from Jill's testimonial. A few years ago, Jim discovered that he could encourage more businesses to follow his lead by making it easier for them to find workers with the right skills. He founded LINKAGES, an organization that brings Tucson businesses and rehabilitation programs together to match qualified people with disabilities to appropriate jobs in the private sector. In a little over a year, more than 170 people have found work through LINKAGES. It is an honor to present this award to Jim Click.

Finally, to Laura Hershey. Laura once said that “disability is not a tragedy... It is powerful.” By speaking her mind, and using her gifts as a writer to point out the shortcomings and possibilities of our society, Laura has found the power to make the world a better place for people with disabilities. As the head of a variety of disability organizations and as a private citizen, she has fought to reform our Social Security, housing, transportation systems to better serve Americans living with disabilities. Economic freedom and self-sufficiency for Americans with disabilities is her goal. I am confident she will not rest until she achieves it. I am proud to present this final award to Laura Hershey.

A high-tech head hunter from Pittsburgh, a car dealer from Tucson, a writer and activist from Denver – our awardees seem to have little in common. But they are bound by their remarkable passion for empowering the disabled. Most of all, each one of them is a true patriot.

Harry Truman once said that “we love our country ... because it offers us the chance to lead useful lives and to do what we can for those around us.” I thank each of you for working to give our fellow Americans with disabilities the chance to lead useful lives, and in so doing, strengthening the ties that bind us all together in love and loyalty to our country.

THE WHITE HOUSE
June 5, 1999**

THE PRESIDENT: Good morning. I am here today with Tipper Gore, my advisor for mental health policy. On Monday, together with Vice President Gore and the First Lady, we will convene the first White House Conference on Mental Health. Today, Tipper and I want to talk about what we must do as a nation to fight the stigma that prevents so many Americans with mental illness from making the most of their lives.

For more than six years, our administration has worked hard to widen the circle of opportunity for every American – and that means making sure that people living with mental illness have the same chance to live up to their potential as all Americans. But the hard truth is, in too many of our communities -- and in too many of our hearts -- mental illness is misunderstood and feared. Too many people with mental illness are treated as less than fully human – and denied the opportunity to fully participate in American life.

Bias against people with mental illness is not unique to our time or our nation -- but as a nation founded on the ideal of equality, we must use our time to change it. Tipper Gore is leading our efforts, and I'd like to ask her to say a few words. [*Mrs. Gore speaks.*]

MRS. GORE: Thank you, Mr. President. Every day, in every community in America, millions of Americans and their families face the problem of mental illness. In fact, more than one in five Americans experiences mental illness every year – from depression to schizophrenia. One in four Americans has a family member with mental illness. And virtually every American has a friend, a neighbor, or a colleague with mental illness. It is a problem that touches us all.

Why, then, is mental illness met with so much misunderstanding and fear? We have come so far in the diagnosis and treatment of mental illness – but our attitudes have lagged far behind. I have talked to many people about the impact these outdated attitudes have on their lives. Some tell me that the shame and stigma they experience are harder to bear than the illness itself. Many live in fear that they will lose their jobs, their homes, or their health benefits if their condition becomes known. And so, too many people with mental illness don't seek treatment that can change their lives – and the vicious cycle of silence, ignorance, and stigma continues.

If we are ever going to put an end to this vicious cycle, we have to take responsibility and dispel the myths about mental illness once and for all. One of the most widely believed – and most damaging – myths is that mental illness is a personal failure, not a physical disease. A recent study shows that the majority of Americans don't believe that mental illness can be accurately diagnosed or treated. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Increasingly, we are

learning that many mental disorders are neurological in nature and can be medically treated -- in some cases, more effectively than illnesses like heart disease. New drugs and better community health services are making it possible for even those with the most severe disorders to live healthier, more productive lives.

A closely related and equally troubling myth is that young people don't suffer from "real" depression, they're just naturally moody. Again, this is simply untrue. We recently learned that even very young children experience serious clinical depression -- and it should be taken seriously. Consider this: the majority of children who commit suicide are profoundly depressed -- but the majority of parents whose children took their own lives say they didn't recognize that depression until it was too late. And senior citizens, too, often accept the notion that depression is a natural part of aging -- and don't reach out for help.

These myths give rise to other misperceptions that influence our lives and our public policy. Chief among them is the belief that we cannot afford to treat mental illness -- but I believe we can't afford not to. Studies show that extending equal health care coverage for mental and physical illness would increase families' insurance premiums by less than one percent -- and would save billions of dollars lost every year to decreased productivity in the workplace.

These myths don't only harm people with mental disorders, they diminish us all. That is why we must break the silence about mental illness -- and as the President will tell us, government can lead the way. [*The President speaks.*]

THE PRESIDENT: We must begin by fighting the stigma associated with mental illness -- and that means talking about it. Tipper's decision to reveal her own struggle with depression is a testament to her personal courage and commitment to solve this problem. Today, I am pleased to announce that later year, together with the Surgeon General, Tipper will unveil a campaign to continue our progress -- by fighting stigma wherever we find it -- from the workplace to the classroom, in every community. Together, we will replace stigma with acceptance, ignorance with understanding, and fear with new hope for the future. Together, we will build a stronger nation for the 21st Century, leaving no one behind.
