Biography of

Congressman NICK J. RAHALL, II (W.Va – 3rd)

Democrat of Beckley, West Virginia: first elected to the United States House of Representatives on November 2, 1976. At age 27, Congressman Rahall was the youngest member of the 95th Congress. Now in his 12th term, Rahall is the 33rd most senior Member of the House of Representatives and is the dean of the West Virginia Delegation to the House.

Born in Beckley on May 20, 1949, Rahall graduated from the Woodrow Wilson High School and received his B.A. degree from Duke University. He attended graduate school at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

Congressman Rahall serves as the Ranking Democrat on the Subcommittee on Ground Transportation, of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure. Rahall also serves on the Committee's Subcommittee on Aviation. During the 103rd Congress (1993-94) Rahall served as the chairman of the Subcommittee of Surface Transportation. Between 1985 and January 1993, Rahall served as the Chairman of the Subcommittee on Mining and Natural Resources of what was then called the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, now the Resources Committee. Rahall continues to serve on the Resources and its Subcommittee on Energy and Mineral Resources and Subcommittee on National Parks and Public Lands.

Rahall is a member of the Congressional Steel Caucus, the Congressional Rural Health Care Coalition, the Congressional Travel and Tourism Caucus, Congressional Arts Caucus and the Congressional Black Caucus.

Rahall has gained the enactment into law of numerous legislative initiatives, among them:

- The Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century in 1998 that provides \$1.77 billion in federal highway funding for West Virginia, including \$163.89 million in earmarked funds for specific projects in the Third Congressional District * \$118.5 million federal funding for the Route 52 replacement between Huntington and Bluefield (I-73/74 – Shawnee Parkway) and authorization for the Coalfields Expressway in the 1991 federal highway bill * federal funding for the proposed New River Parkway * the Southern West Virginia Water Supply and Wastewater Treatment Demonstration Project in the 1992 Water Resources Development Act * the reauthorization of the Abandoned Mine Reclamation Program through the year 2004 * the establishment of the New River Gorge National River in 1978 * the "West Virginia National Interest River Conservation Act of 1988" establishing the Gauley River National Recreation Area and Bluestone National Scenic River * the Rahall Coal Remining Amendment to the Clean Water Act * The Coalbed Methane Development Program, coal remining, and Surface Mining Act amendments in the 1992 National Energy Bill * the Mining and Mineral Resources Research Institute program reauthorization * the Southern West Virginia Coal Heritage Initiative * authorizations and funding for various U.S. Army Corps of Engineers flood control and navigational projects in West Virginia * recreational authorizations for several southern West Virginia Corps' projects. * the Rahall/Byrd

Amendment to the Export-Import Bank and Reauthorization prohibiting the financing of foreign mining ventures * legislation establishing "Drug Free School Zones" * Rahall is also responsible for reforming the federal onshore oil and gas leasing system. In addition, he is a tireless fighter for the Appalachian Regional Commission, black lung benefits, veterans benefits, and mine health and safety issues.

In 1996, Rahall became a member of the Professional Advisory Board of ALSAC - St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. Congressman Rahall, a 33rd degree Mason, is life member of the following organizations: National Rifle Association, Elks, NAACP, and Moose. Rahall is also a past Commander of the Congressional Squadron of the U.S. Air Force Civil Air Patrol.

State and national organizations have recognized Congressman Rahall for his work, including: the "Claude Pepper Award" presented by the National Association of Home Care in 1998, the State Legislator of the Year Award in 1998 by the West Virginia Home Health Council, the West Virginia Credit Union's "Consumer Choice" Award in 1998, the Citizen's Coal Council award for protecting the rights of coalfield citizens in 1997, the 1997 ARTBA Public Service Award, the "West Virginia Son of the Year" in 1996 presented by the West Virginia Society of Washington, D.C., the "Keeper of the Flame" Award presented in 1996 by Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt for Rahall's work on behalf of coalfield citizens, the 1996 Highway Safety Leader Award, the 1994 West Virginia Rivers Coalition award for conserving and restoring the State's exceptional rivers and streams, the 1990 "Friend of the Earth Award" for protecting coalfield citizens, the 1988 "Seneca Award" for Outstanding Environmental Stewardship from the West Virginia Chapter of the Sierra Club, American River's 1988 "River Conservation Award," Eastern Professional Outfitter's 1987 "Outfitter of the Year Award," 1980 "Young Democrat of the Year" from the Democratic National Committee, the American Federation of Government Employees of West Virginia's 1980 "Distinguished Service Award," named 1979 "Coal Man of the Year" by Coal Industry News, and served as the 1979 West Virginia State Chairman of the March of Dimes. In 1984 Rahall received the West Virginia American Legion's "Distinguished Service Award."

Before his election to the Congress, Rahall served as a staff assistant (1971-74) to U.S. Senator Robert C. Byrd (D-W.Va), Board of Directors of Rahall Communications Corp., president of Mountaineer Tour and Travel Agency and is currently the president of West Virginia Broadcasting Corp. Congressman Rahall has three children: Rebecca, Nick Joe, III and Suzanne Nicole. Rahall is a member of the Beckley Presbyterian Church. Congressman Rahall's office address is: 2307 Rayburn House Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20515. Rahall also maintains five offices in his Congressional District at Huntington, Beckley, Bluefield, Logan, and Lewisburg.

I. PURPOSE

You are scheduled to meet with Rev. Leon Sullivan. He has come to brief you on the results of the African-African American Summit held in Accra, Ghana from May 17-21, 1999.

II. BACKGROUND

The African-African American Summit was attended by almost 5,000 people from the U.S. and across Africa including twenty African Heads of State. Your 33 member Presidential Mission was headed by Sec. Alexis Herman and Rev. Jesse Jackson, and was joined by a variety of Administration officials, 22 U.S. mayors (led by Mayors Archer and Webb), and a long list of prominent African American leaders (Kweisi Mfume, Dorothy Height, Andrew Young, Coretta Scott King, Hugh Price, and others). Rev. Sullivan may raise with you his perception that the U.S. government did not provide him with the type of support and visibility he expected during the Summit. In fact, the U.S. government has long supported his biennial Summit not only through logistic, planning and expertise resources at our embassies, but by sending Presidential Missions to the past three Summits.

As you know, in 1984, Rev. Sullivan created the International Foundation for Education and Self-Help (IFESH) to call attention to the many challenges facing Africa. Rev. Sullivan has used the African-African American Summit as an opportunity to call for leadership on three levels -- from government, from business, and from the community. This is Rev. Sullivan's fifth Summit, all five of which have focused on African development, especially economic development. This year's Summit made the battle against AIDS a principle issue, recognizing that AIDS is not only ravaging families and communities throughout Africa, but is wiping out hard-earned development gains, and threatening both economic growth and political stability.

As part of the Summit, Rev. Sullivan convened a group of 22 AIDS experts (including several Americans) charged with developing priorities for helping to turn the tide on AIDS in Africa. Rev. Sullivan now plans to incorporate this action agenda into his only IFESH work and to push for implementation of these ideas through meetings with you, The World Bank President James

Wolfensohn, UN Secretary General Kofi Annan, and other high level leaders. These AIDS principles include:

Government Leadership. African governments should put AIDS at the top of the agenda; deal with AIDS not just as a health issue but an issue involving all sectors; and declare AIDS a state of emergency in order to marshal resources. The U.S. and other donors should increase funding for the fight against AIDS in Africa, and explore innovative ideas such as debt relief for AIDS.

Business Leadership. CEOs and labor should work to protect employee's rights, provide HIV education, and guarantee care for employees with AIDS. Governments should develop tax incentives to reward corporate responsibility. International businesses should offer preferential investments to African countries that have implemented sound AIDS policies.

Community Leadership. AIDS efforts should be community-based with local buy-in. Religious leaders, regardless of denomination, should work to mobilize their communities in an environment of compassion not stigma.

In addition to these AIDS initiatives, Rev. Sullivan also launched several other initiatives that focus on strengthening U.S.-Africa ties in the next millennium:

People's Investment Fund for Africa. Summiteers were asked to invest \$500-\$2000 to support micro-enterprise and small-scale development projects. Investors will receive 6% interest and contributions will be matched dollar-for-dollar by OPIC. Approximately \$150,000 was pledged prior to the Summit's closing.

Sullivan Principles for Corporate Responsibility. Companies sponsoring Summit events and operating in Africa were asked to underscore their commitment by instituting socially responsible policies. These principles call for companies to: respect human rights, child labor laws, and freedom of association; encourage diversity and equal opportunity among various ethnic groups; and train and advance disadvantaged workers in technical and managerial skills. This idea is a follow-on to the "Sullivan Principles" for corporate responsibility during apartheid in South Africa.

I. PURPOSE

To bring together a broad coalition of consumers, providers, advocacy groups, business leaders, state, local, and national elected officials, and leaders in the mental health research and pharmacology, service delivery and insurance coverage – as well as communities across the country through over 1,000 satellite sites – to increase awareness on issues surrounding mental illness and its impact on people of all ages.

II. BACKGROUND

Today, at the first-ever White House Conference on Mental Health, chaired by your Mental Health Advisor Tipper Gore, the Clinton/Gore Administration will unveil unprecedented measures to improve mental health. “We are taking new steps to breakdown the myths and misperceptions of mental illness and to encourage and enable Americans to get the care they need,” said Tipper Gore. The Administration’s proposals provide parity, improve treatment, bolster research, and expand community responses to help those with mental illnesses. Highlights of these initiatives include:

- **Ensuring that the Federal Employees Health Benefits Plan (FEHBP) -- the nation’s largest private insurer - implements full mental health and substance abuse parity.** Today, the Office of Personnel Management is sending a letter to the 285 participating health plans informing them that starting next year they will have to offer full mental health and substance abuse parity to participate in the program. This step will provide full parity for nine million beneficiaries by next year and ensure that the Federal government leads the way to providing parity. The Department of Labor is also launching a new

outreach campaign to inform Americans about their rights under the Mental Health Parity Act of 1996.

- **Launching national school safety training program for teachers and education personnel.** You will announce a major nationwide public/private partnership between the National Education Association (NEA), EchoStar, and other partners to improve school safety. The partnership, which includes the Departments of Education, Justice, and Health and Human Services, will create and run a comprehensive program that will be available at the beginning of the new school year with the goal of reaching every school across the country and providing training to teachers, school personnel, and community members on how to improve school safety.
- **Accelerating progress in research.** In July, National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) will launch a \$7.3 million landmark study to determine the nature of mental illness and treatment nationwide and to help guide strategies and policy for the next century. This new study will collect information on mental illness, including the prevalence and duration of mental illness as well as the types of treatment that are most commonly used. NIMH also will announce the launch of two new clinical trials, investing a total of \$61 million, to build on effective treatments for those affected by mental illness.
- **Encouraging states to offer more coordinated Medicaid services for people with mental illness.** Millions of Americans with severe mental illness rely on Medicaid to pay for their health care. To encourage states to make the most effective services available, the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) will advise all state Medicaid directors that: (1) Medicaid will reimburse for services provided in Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) programs targeting people with the most severe and persistent mental illness; (2) Medicaid recipients all have access to medications approved by FDA for the treatment of serious mental illnesses; and (3) states should educate Medicaid providers and beneficiaries about their ability to enter into "advance planning directives" that set out treatment guideline for people who became severely incapacitated in the future.
- **Launching a pilot program to help people with mental illness get the quality treatment they need to return to work.** Of the 4.7 million Americans that receive Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI), the Social Security Administration (SSA) estimates that approximately one in nine (about 500,000) has an affective disorder (such as depression or a bipolar disorder). Research suggests that many of the people suffering with these disorders could get effective treatment and perhaps return to work. The Administration will launch a new five-year, \$10 million demonstration to provide treatment for SSDI beneficiaries with affective disorders. This complements the Jeffords-Kennedy-Roth-Moynihan legislation, which allows people to buy into the Medicaid or Medicare program when they return to work.

- **Educating older Americans and their health professionals about the risks of depression.** Five million Americans over the age of 65 suffer from some form of depression, but many do not recognize their symptoms as depression and do not receive the treatment they need. NIMH and the Administration on Aging (AoA) will launch an outreach initiative to educate the elderly and their healthcare professionals about mental illness. The Department of Veteran Affairs will also launch six new study sites to test two modes of primary care for older Americans with mental health and/or substance abuse disorders.
- **Reaching out to vulnerable homeless Americans with mental illnesses.** The Department of Housing and Urban Development is launching a new initiative to encourage communities to create safe havens where homeless mentally ill Americans can get treatment and care. HHS will also launch a two-year, \$4.8 million grant program to study the treatment, housing, education, training, and support services needed by homeless women and their children given to as many as 2,000 homeless mothers and their 4,000 children, many of whom suffer from mental illnesses. The Department of Veteran Affairs will double the number of “stand down” events to reach out to homeless Americans with mental illness to help them get the treatment and services they need.
- **Implementing new strategies to meet the mental health needs of crime victims.** To ensure that the federal response to community crises, like acts of terrorism or mass violence, includes a strong mental health component, the Administration is announcing a new interagency partnership between the Department of Justice’s Office for Victims of Crime and the Center for Mental Health Services within the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMSHA). This partnership also will ensure that strategies are in place to address the mental health needs of victims of violent crime.
- **Developing and implementing new strategies to address mental illness in the criminal justice system.** SAMHSA and DOJ are hosting a conference later this summer to focus on how the criminal justice system can prevent crime by mentally ill people and can address the needs of offenders with mental illness. Following this conference, DOJ will launch an outreach effort to educate the criminal justice community on how to better serve people with mental health needs. This initiative will include a new partnership with the National GAINS center so that communities interested in pursuing these approaches can get technical assistance and ideas about how to implement successful strategies.
- **Implementing a new comprehensive approach to address combat stress in the military.** At least 30 percent of those who have spent time in war zones experience combat stress reaction. Today you will direct the Department of Defense to report back within 180 days on an implementation plan for a comprehensive combat stress program throughout the military. DOD will also hold a conference this fall to develop strategies and educate military leaders and medical personnel about the need to enhance current prevention strategies.

- **Launching the expansion of the “Caring For Every Child” mental health campaign.** At least one in ten American children and adolescents may have behavioral, or mental health problems. The Administration will launch a five-year \$5 million dollar campaign in targeted communities to highlight the special mental health needs of children.
- **Improving the mental health of Native American youth.** The suicide rate for Native Americans between the ages of five and 24 years old is three times higher than the rest of the U.S. population in this age group. This initiative allocates at least \$5 million for a collaboration between the Departments of Interior, Justice, Education, and HHS, to go to ten Native American communities to develop effective strategies to address mental health needs of youth in settings such as the home, school, treatment centers, and the juvenile justice system.
- **The Administration Also Challenged Congress to Pass Legislation to Improve Care and Services for People with Mental Illness.** The Administration urged Congress to:
 - Pass the Jeffords-Kennedy-Roth-Moynihan-Lazio-Waxman-Bliley-Dingell legislation, which would enable people with disabilities to return to work by accessing affordable health insurance.
 - Hold hearings on the mental health parity law to review its strengths and weaknesses.
 - Fund the historic \$70 million increase in the mental health grant.
 - Pass a strong enforceable patients’ bill of rights which ensures that people with mental health needs obtain critical protections such as access to specialists and the continuity of care protections.
 - Pass strong comprehensive privacy and legislation to eliminate genetic discrimination.

Panelist Biographies

Mike Wallace,

Co-Editor, CBS' *60 Minutes*

Mike Wallace has become an American icon as co-editor of CBS's *60 Minutes* and an award-winning journalist, whose career spans nearly 60 years. His incisive interviewing techniques and expansive knowledge of current affairs has enabled him to produce an impressive series of interviews with American and international leaders, including every President from John F. Kennedy through George Bush. More recently, Mr. Wallace has openly discussed his experience with depression with the same candor that he has demanded of his interviewees. His hour-long HBO documentary, "Dead Blue: Surviving Depression," has helped draw attention to the pervasiveness of depression and the ability to recover from it. He is a testament to the contributions that people living with mental illness can and do make in our society.

John Wong, Rosemead, CA

John Wong immigrated to the United States with his parents and two stepbrothers from Hong Kong in 1973 when he was seven years old. He first experienced symptoms of schizophrenia when he was 16 years old and had the first of his four psychiatric hospitalizations when he was about 18 years old. John's symptoms have been reduced gradually through medication and psychosocial rehabilitation treatment in the past 17 years. In fact, John is president of the Consumer Planning Council of Pacific Clinics Asian Pacific Family Center (APFC) where he is also a part-time employee. As part of his work duties, he teaches an "English as a Second Language" class to other Asian immigrant consumers. He also participates in home visits and outreach activities in collaboration with other agency staff. Jon's father, Mr. Hoi Wong, gave up his restaurant business in 1980 in order to take care of his two children- John with mental illness and another son with a heart disease.

Jennifer Gates, Scotch Plains, NJ

Jennifer Gates is a nineteen-year-old from Scotch Plains, NJ. She is a sophomore at the College of William and Mary in Virginia, hoping to double major in English and psychology. She has been recovering from an eating disorder for the past three years, and has always felt strongly about dispelling the misconceptions the public has about eating disorders. She hopes that by speaking about her struggle today she will be able to give a personal perspective and to increase understanding of this very debilitating disease.

Robin Kitchell, Franklin, TN

Robin is a parent and professional who has worked with children and families for ten years. She is married and is the parent of a thirteen-year-old son with bipolar disorder, ADD, and learning disabilities. She has been a passionate advocate for children and families with special needs. She believes that one of the challenges for parents of a child with mental illness is to navigate through the education and mental health system, and thinks it is critical for parents, teachers, and school district officials to work as a team. Mrs. Kitchell is also an advocate with Tennessee Voices for Children, and recently participated in a forum with Mrs. Gore at Vanderbilt University.

**Wayne Burton, M.D., First Vice President /Corporate Medical Director
Bank One Corporation, Chicago, IL**

Bank One is the 5th largest U.S. bank holding company with over 90,000 employees worldwide. The Medical and Benefits Units of Bank One have worked together since 1982 to strategically design health and wellness benefits programs and cost management strategies. To address the impact of depression on employees and Bank One, Dr. Burton with his colleague Dr. Conti, spearheaded a comprehensive effort to improve the company's ability to identify and get appropriate treatment for employees with depression in a timely manner. In addition to his duties at Bank One, Dr. Burton is an Associate Professor of Clinical Medicine and Psychiatry at Northwestern University Medical School.

David Satcher, M.D., Ph.D.

**Assistant Secretary for Health and U.S. Surgeon General
Department of Health and Human Services**

Dr. Satcher is the 16th Surgeon General of the United States, and only the second person to simultaneously hold the position of Assistant Secretary for Health and Surgeon General. Prior to this appointment, Dr. Satcher served four years as the Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Administrator for the Toxic Substances and Disease Registry from 1993 to 1997. Dr. Satcher will be joining the conference plenary session via satellite from the Carter Center in Atlanta, GA. He will be there with a number of community mental health leaders, and will be focusing on the ways communities can respond to crises or traumas.

Congresswoman Lynn Rivers (D-MI)

Congresswoman Lynn Rivers was born in Au Gres, Michigan, the daughter of a mailman and a homemaker. She is married with three children. While raising her children, working, and going to college at the University of Michigan, she became politically active. Representative Rivers ran for a seat on the school board in 1984 and won, serving for eight years. In 1992, she graduated from Wayne University Law School. In 1994, Representative Rivers ran for the United States Congress and won, becoming one of only 13 freshman Democrats to gain a seat that year, and she now serves on the Science Committee and the House Budget Committee. Though she was diagnosed with manic depression in her twenties, Representative Rivers accomplished a great deal because of her effective treatment.

Harold S. Koplewicz, M.D, New York, NY

Dr. Harold S. Koplewicz, founder and director of the New York University Child Study Center, is a nationally renowned child and adolescent psychiatrist. He is the Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Child and Adolescent Psychopharmacology. He has written many scientific articles on the diagnosis and treatments of children and adolescents with behavioral disorders, anxiety disorders, and mood disorders. He is also the author of It's Nobody's Fault: New Hope and Help for Difficult Children And Their Parents. Dr. Koplewicz seeks to change the way we treat and deal with child mental illness so that no parent or child is ashamed to seek the help they need.

Steven E. Hyman, MD

Dr. Hyman is the Director of the National Institute of Mental Health, the component of the National Institute of Health charged with generating the information needed to understand, treat, and prevent mental illness. He was Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and Director of Psychiatry Research at Massachusetts General Hospital. He was also the first faculty Director of Harvard University's Interfaculty Initiative on Mind, Brain, and Behavior. In addition to his many scientific writings, he has authored and edited several widely used clinical texts. He also serves on several review and advisory boards including the Riken Brain and Sciences Institute in Japan, the Max Planck Institute in Germany, and the Howard Hughes Medical Institute in the United States.

- Q: **Mike Wallace:** And now, I want to introduce a man who also struggled with mental illness – and whose decision to come forward with his experience has inspired many Americans to do the same. Mike we have a broad audience here today, with varying levels of understanding about mental disorders. Will you tell us about your experience with depression?

Background: Recently, Mr. Wallace has openly discussed his experience with depression. His hour-long HBO documentary, "Dead Blue: Surviving Depression," has helped draw attention to the pervasiveness of depression and the ability to recover from it. He is a testament to the contributions that people living with mental illness can and do make in our society.

Possible follow-up: Tell us about the stigma associated with depression for men?

Possible follow-up: What do Americans need to know about depression?

- Q: **John Wong** who came here today from California has been living with schizophrenia for over 13 years. John, when did you first realize you were experiencing a mental illness?

Background: Mr. Wong's illness started in adolescence. (*In men we know that schizophrenia usually appears in the late teens or early twenties.*) Initially John was very resistant to treatment, but for the past nine years he has managed his illness. He now does outreach with others to help them get the treatment and support they need when coping with a mental disorder.

POTUS POSSIBLE FOLLOW-UP: Was there a particular event or symptom that made you realize that you needed mental health treatment and how did you get help?

Possible follow-up: Can you tell us about your recovery and how you have reached out to help others?

Possible follow-up: I know your father is in the audience, and has been very supportive and helpful in your recovery. Tell us how he helped.

- Q: **Jennifer Gates** is here to talk about her experience. Jennifer, you had a very serious experience with anorexia. Tell us when your illness started.

Background: Jennifer, who is now 19-years-old, was 15-years-old when her eating disorder began. She controlled her food intake as a way to lose weight and look "good" for the summer. After a few months the disease took control of her. She can speak to her obsessive thoughts of perfection in all aspects of her life (i.e., grades, weight), and how treatment, 3 years later, remains an important part of her recovery.

Possible Follow-up: With depression we talk about how we can't expect someone to pull themselves up by their bootstraps. I know you have mentioned the stigma you experienced when you were ill, how often family and friends didn't understand why you wouldn't just eat. As best as you can, will you tell us what you were experiencing at that time and the role treatment and support played in your recovery?

Possible Follow-up: What do you see in your future?

Vice President's Panel

Q: **Robin Kitchell**, from Nashville Tennessee, has a son who suffers from bi-polar disorder. She recently met Tipper at an event like this one in Tennessee. Robin, tell us about some of the challenges and rewards of caring for a child with a mental illness?

Background: Mrs. Kitchell struggled with schools to assure her son received the support he needed to succeed. Robin is also an activist with Tennessee Voices for Children and fights to make sure that schools and other aspects of the community work effectively to help children with mental illness.

Possible follow-up: How can we help communities and schools do a better job of reaching and supporting kids with mental illness?

Q: **Dr. Wayne Burton** is the Corporate Medical Director of Bank One Corporation. Dr. Burton, tell us how the comprehensive mental health services Bank One offers has helped your business?

Background: In 1983, Bank One began to implement comprehensive mental health services for its employees including: (1) training managers to reduce stigma; (2) increasing employee awareness of services; and (3) enhancing covered mental health benefits. As a result, the costs of mental health have gone from 15 percent of health care costs in 1982 to 6 percent in 1996.

Possible follow-up: What are some of the things your program does to raise awareness among your employees?

Possible follow-up: Do your employees worry about discussing these issues in the workplace because of confidentiality? How do you all address this issue?

Q: I'd like to call on **Dr. David Satcher**, who is joining us from the Carter Center in Atlanta where he is leading a discussion on how communities can better respond to the short-term and long-term impact of crises, such as school violence or floods. Dr. Satcher, tell us about some of what you all are focusing on today?

Background: Dr. Satcher is with leaders who address mental health needs in their communities, including a woman from Oklahoma who helped set up comprehensive mental health services following the bombings.

POTUS POSSIBLE FOLLOW-UP: What are the long-term mental health effects of these types of crises?

VP possible follow-up: What can communities do to assure they can respond in times of crisis and address every day mental health needs?

Mrs. Clinton's Panel

Q: **Dr. Steven Hyman:** I'd like to talk with this distinguished group of panelists about the science of mental health and illness. We're happy to have Dr. Steven Hyman with us today, a distinguished scientist who directs the National Institute of Mental Health. NIMH is part of the National Institutes of Health.

Dr. Hyman, you are dealing with some very difficult diseases that affect millions of people. Over the last few years, what progress are we making and what have we really learned about these diseases?

Possible Follow-up: How have these scientific discoveries changed the way we as a society deal with mental illness?

Q: **Dr. Koplewicz** is an expert on mental health issues, particularly in children. What steps can we take as a nation to demystify mental illness?

Background: Dr. Koplewicz, founder and director of the New York University Child Study Center, is a nationally renowned child and adolescent psychiatrist. He has written many scientific articles on the diagnosis and treatments of children and adolescents with behavioral disorders, anxiety disorders, and mood disorders. He is also the author of It's Nobody's Fault: New Hope and Help for Difficult Children And Their Parents. Dr. Koplewicz seeks to change the way we treat and deal with child mental illness so that no parent or child is ashamed to seek the help they need.

Possible Follow-up: What are the particular issues associated with children with mental illness?

POTUS POSSIBLE FOLLOW-UP: What can we do to intervene early, before the mental illness causes a child to become violent to themselves or others?

Q: Representative Lynn Rivers: So all this offers us new hope about treatment of mental health, but also the importance of early diagnosis. Congresswoman Rivers, would you share with us your experience?

Background: Representative Rivers has been outspoken about her history of mental illness. Though she was diagnosed with manic depression in her early twenties, she has accomplished a great deal due to her effective treatment.

Possible follow-up: How did you decide to come forward?

The Numbers Count

Mental Illness in America

According to a recent study by the World Health Organization, the World Bank, and Harvard University, mental disorders account for 4 of the 10 leading causes of disability in established market economies worldwide. These disorders are: major depression, manic-depressive illness, schizophrenia, and obsessive-compulsive disorder. Other research has estimated that the cost of mental illnesses in the United States, including indirect costs such as days lost from work, was \$148 billion in 1990, the last time the total bill was measured.

Depression

- More than 19 million adult Americans age 18 and over will suffer from a depressive illness—major depression, bipolar disorder, or dysthymia—each year. Many of them will be unnecessarily incapacitated for weeks or months because their illness is untreated.
- The onset of depression may be occurring earlier in life in people born in recent decades compared to the past.
- Nearly twice as many women (12 percent) as men (7 percent) are affected by a depressive illness each year.
- Depression is a frequent and serious complication of heart attack, stroke, diabetes, and cancer, but is very treatable.
- Depression increases the risk of having a heart attack. According to one recent study that covered a 13-year period, individuals with a history of major

depression were four times as likely to suffer a heart attack compared to people without such a history.

- Depression costs the nation more than \$30 billion per year in direct and indirect costs, according to the most recent data available.
- Major depression is the leading cause of disability in the United States and worldwide, according to a recent study by the World Health Organization, the World Bank, and Harvard University.

Manic-Depressive Illness

- More than 2.3 million Americans ages 18 and over – about 1 percent of the population – suffer from manic-depressive illness.
- As many as 20 percent of people with manic-depressive illness die by suicide.
- Men and women are equally likely to develop manic-depressive illness.

Suicide

- In 1996, approximately 31,000 people died from suicide in the United States.
- Almost all people who kill themselves have a diagnosable mental disorder, most commonly depression or a substance abuse disorder.
- The highest suicide rates in the United States are found in white men over age 85.
- The suicide rate in young people has increased dramatically in recent years. In

1996, the most recent year for which statistics are available, suicide was the 3rd leading cause of death among 15 to 24 year olds.

- Men are more than four times as likely as women to commit suicide.

Schizophrenia

- More than 2 million adult Americans are affected by schizophrenia.
- In men, schizophrenia usually appears in the late teens or early twenties. The disorder usually shows up when women are in their twenties to early thirties.
- Schizophrenia affects men and women with equal frequency.
- Most people with schizophrenia suffer chronically throughout their lives.
- One of every 10 people with schizophrenia eventually commits suicide.
- Schizophrenia costs the nation \$32.5 billion annually according to the most recently available data.

Anxiety Disorders

- More than 16 million adults ages 18 to 54 in the United States suffer from anxiety disorders, which include panic disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, social phobia, and generalized anxiety disorder.
- Anxiety disorders cost \$46.6 billion in 1990.
- Anxiety disorders are frequently complicated by depression, eating

disorders, or substance abuse. Many people have more than one anxiety disorder.

Panic Disorder

- Panic disorder affects about 1.7 percent of the U.S. adult population ages 18 to 54, or 2.4 million people, in a given year.
- Panic disorder typically strikes in young adulthood. Roughly half of all people who have panic disorder develop the condition before age 24.
- Women are twice as likely as men to develop panic disorder.
- People with panic disorder may also suffer from depression and substance abuse. About 30 percent of people with panic disorder abuse alcohol and 17 percent abuse drugs such as cocaine and marijuana.
- About one-third of all people with panic disorder develop agoraphobia, an illness in which they become afraid of being in any place or situation where escape might be difficult or help unavailable in the event of a panic attack.

Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder (OCD)

- About 2.3 percent of the U.S. adult population ages 18 to 54, approximately 3.3 million Americans, has OCD in a given year.
- OCD affects men and women with equal frequency.
- The nation's social and economic losses due to OCD totaled \$8.4 billion in 1990.

Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)

- In the United States, about 3.6 percent of adults ages 18 to 54, or 5.2

million people, have PTSD during the course of a given year.

- PTSD can develop at any age, including childhood.
- PTSD is more likely to occur in women than in men.
- About 30 percent of men and women who have spent time in war zones experience PTSD. The disorder also frequently occurs after violent personal assaults, such as rape or mugging or domestic violence; terrorism; natural or human-caused disasters; and accidents.
- Depression, alcohol or other substance abuse, or another anxiety disorder often accompany PTSD.

Social Phobia

- About 3.7 percent of American adults ages 18 to 54, or 5.3 million people, have social phobia in a given year.
- Social phobia occurs in women twice as often as men, although a higher proportion of men seek help for this disorder.
- The disorder typically begins in childhood or early adolescence and rarely develops after age 25.
- Social phobia is often accompanied by depression and may lead to alcohol or other drug abuse.

Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)

- ADHD is one of the most common mental disorders in children, affecting 3 to 5 percent of school-age children.
- Two to three times more boys than girls are affected.
- ADHD has long-term adverse effects on success at school, work, and in social relationships.
- National public school expenditures on behalf of students with ADHD exceeded \$3 billion in 1995.
- As they grow older, children with untreated ADHD who have a coexisting

conduct disorder often experience drug abuse, antisocial behavior, teenage pregnancy, and injuries of all sorts.

Autism

- Autism and related disorders (also called autism spectrum disorders or pervasive developmental disorders) represent chronic and severely disabling developmental disorders. There is no known cure.
- There are 1 to 2 cases of autism per 1,000 people.
- These disorders develop in childhood and are generally apparent by age three.
- Autism is three to four times more common in boys than girls. Girls with the disorder, however, tend to have more severe symptoms and lower intelligence.
- These disorders present families with financially and emotionally costly challenges over the lifespan of their affected children. About 60 percent of adults with autism will require continued care throughout their lives.
- The cost of health and educational services to those affected by autism exceeds \$3 billion each year.

I. PURPOSE

To learn more about important issues in the Asian Pacific American communities and to highlight your agenda.

II. BACKGROUND

Asian Pacific American (APA) communities are very diverse ethnically and socio-economically. Nonetheless, many Asian Pacific Americans agree that immigration, small business development, civil rights, health and education are particularly important issues for their communities. However, the primary issue that binds all Asian Pacific Americans together is negative stereotyping, an issue that has been particularly painful for many APAs. You discussed this issue in light of campaign finance at the last outreach meeting in December 1997. And, most recently, John Podesta addressed this issue in light of Chinese espionage allegations.

The participants and the communities they represent are very pleased that you want to reach out to them, and they will thank you for your distinguished efforts on their behalf. In addition, meeting participants are likely to address the following issues: negative stereotyping of APAs, Bill Lann Lee and other political appointments, health disparities, Filipino veterans, felony deportation and immigration backlog, and hate crimes.

Meeting participants are likely to suggest the following:

- Public statements from you denouncing negative stereotyping of APAs in the media and recognizing the positive contributions of Asian Pacific Americans to this country, particularly in the science and high-tech fields.
- More APA nominations
Talking Point:
My administration has appointed more Asian Pacific Americans (over 200) to senior-level positions than any other administration. I am committed to continuing such

appointments and have just hired Laura Efurd as Deputy Director of Public Liaison for APA outreach.

- Continued attention to the health disparities between Asian American and Pacific Islander groups and white Americans.

Talking Point:

I am signing an Executive Order today, which will ensure that the specific healthcare and data collection needs of APA groups are addressed.

- Better benefits for Filipino veterans

Talking Point:

We acknowledge the heroism of the Filipino Veterans. In October of 1996 I signed a proclamation honoring the Filipino Veterans of WWII. In our budget for the last two years, I have requested funds to provide 100% health services to those Filipino Veterans who are currently eligible for services and receiving only 50% of what other veterans receive. I also support a provision in the Foster Care Bill now going through the House Ways and Means Committee that will expand SSI benefits to allow Filipino veterans to receive SSI benefits even if they return to the Philippines.

- Immigration

Talking Points:

Felony Deportation -- I understand that South East Asian American communities are being hard hit by a retroactive law requiring the deportation of legal immigrants who are felons because many of their adults have been deported for felonies committed as youthful gang members. My Domestic Policy Council is reviewing the issue with community input and considering ways to address this issue.

Immigration Backlog -- INS has been making steady progress in increasing the number of applications completed. The agency completed 461,543 naturalization applications during October 1 -- March 31 of FY 1999 -- a 91% increase over the same period last year (241,766 completed).

Administration Achievement -- We have published a regulation on public charge so that immigrants can apply for services without fear of deportation.

Thank them for their efforts on the following:

- Their education campaign about the census undercount.
- Their efforts to win back immigration provisions of the welfare law and restore food stamp benefits to legal immigrants.

**PRESIDENT WILLIAM JEFFERSON CLINTON
REMARKS AT ARRIVAL CEREMONY FOR PRESIDENT GONCZ
WASHINGTON, D.C
JUNE 8, 1999**

In the early 1850's, the great Hungarian patriot Lajos Kossuth [LOI-ush ko-SHOOT] came to this country and to this house to seek support for restoring freedom to his nation. He moved many Americans with his impassioned commitment to democracy. He said, "To find the sunlight of freedom, we must come to America." Kossuth would be proud today to find his statement no longer holds. For now, the sunlight of freedom shines across the world.

In the past year, I've had the privilege to welcome to the White House some extraordinary heroes: leaders who had risked their lives in the struggle for liberty, were imprisoned for their beliefs and activism, and now have emerged, in freedom's light, as presidents of their nations. Kim Dae Jung of South Korea. Vaclav Havel of the Czech Republic. Nelson Mandela of South Africa. Today, with freedom at last shining brightly in Kossuth's own nation, I have the great honor and pleasure to welcome President Arpad Goncz [AR-pad GOONTZ] of Hungary.

E.L. Doctorow has said, "The devastating history of 20th Century Europe, which you and I might study in a book or look at as tourists, is housed in the being of Arpad Goncz." In World War II, he fought in the resistance and was wounded by Nazi fire. In 1956, he rose with fellow citizens against Stalinist oppression, and, after Soviet tanks crushed the uprising, was sentenced to life in prison. Released after six years, he became a translator, bringing Western ideas to Hungary, and through his own plays and stories challenged Hungarians to think about the nature of tyranny and the meaning of freedom. After NATO's resolve and the courage of Central Europeans helped bring down the Iron Curtain, the Hungarian people chose Arpad Goncz to lead them.

With Prime Minister Orban, President Goncz has been working to strengthen democracy and build prosperity. America is Hungary's single largest foreign investor, and we are making a very good investment, for Hungary is one of the fastest-growing economies in Europe. With President Goncz's leadership, Hungary has acted to protect the rights of its own minority groups, while working in support of the principle that ethnic Hungarians can live with their rights secure as citizens of other nations.

Our nations have stood shoulder-to-shoulder, now as NATO allies, against ethnic cleansing in Kosovo. NATO remains united and determined to give the Kosovars the chance to return home and live in peace. Together in partnership, we will continue our work to deepen freedom, promote tolerance and integration, and broaden opportunity all across Southeast Europe. And we would welcome a democratic Serbia that respects the rights of all its people as part of this effort.

We have learned, as President Roosevelt said near the end of his life, that America "cannot live alone at peace," that to protect the security of our own people, we must join with others in the cause of common humanity. Together, we are doing just that in Kosovo. Much hard work remains, there and across the region. Today's visit to America by the President of Hungary is another step on this journey, a journey toward lasting peace, prosperity, and democracy. I am

very proud of the alliance between our countries, and the friendship between our peoples.
President Goncz, welcome back to America and to the White House.

**PRESIDENT WILLIAM JEFFERSON CLINTON
REMARKS AT DINNER FOR PRESIDENT GONCZ
WASHINGTON, D.C
JUNE 8, 1999**

President and Mrs. Goncz, members of the Hungarian delegation, distinguished guests:

150 years ago -- September 12, 1849 -- a congressman from Illinois offered a resolution in our House of Representatives supporting the Hungarian people's struggle for independence and democracy. The leader of the Hungarian freedom movement was, of course, Lajos Kossuth [LOI-ush ko-SHOOT]. The congressman was Abraham Lincoln.

Today at last America and Hungary are partners for democracy and allies for a just peace in Kosovo and a peaceful future across Europe. But bonds between our citizens, based on mutual aspirations for a better world, have deep roots.

This morning I talked a little about Kossuth. Through the efforts of Tom and Annette Lantos and others, a bust of Kossuth now stands in the Rotunda of our Capitol. But most Americans today probably don't know much about him. They should. He was not only a tremendous force in Hungary and Europe, but for a time he captured America's imagination. Ralph Waldo Emerson called him "the angel of freedom." The abolitionist Charles Sumner said Kossuth received from Americans "an ovation which only two men had ever received -- Washington and Lafayette." He was only the second non-American -- Lafayette being the first -- to address both houses of Congress. Crowds greeted him wherever he went. Books were written about him, and streets, counties -- and children -- across America were named for him. One history even reports, "Kossuth hats became the rage and Kossuth beards a fad." Today we would call it ko-SHOOT-mania.

I know, Mr. President, that, like Kossuth, you taught yourself English while in prison -- at a time when you had just escaped a death sentence and faced a life term. Later, you translated the works of many great writers: Edith Wharton, Thomas Wolfe, William Faulkner, Ernest Hemingway, Arthur Miller, James Baldwin, William Styron, John Updike, Alice Walker and others. These translations offered Hungarians a window on the West and earned you many admirers at home. This work is just one part -- but a vital part -- of your contribution to ending the division of Europe.

You even translated into Hungarian President Bush's 1988 campaign biography, "Looking Forward." Of course, by the time [Al Gore and] I published our book, "Putting People First," in 1992, you were President of Hungary and thus too busy to translate this great work of our time. Or at least I choose to believe that is the reason.

At last in this decade your own works have been translated and published in English, and your plays performed in the United States. They are brave explorations of political conflict and war, freedom and betrayal, and of the struggle for daily survival and dignity in the face of adversity.

We have absorbed these works as we have watched you lead your nation, deepening freedom there, while promoting human rights and ethnic tolerance around the world. The only Hungarian

head of state to make an official visit to Romania in this century, you told a joint session of Parliament there that ethnic minorities enrich their nations and "form a valuable connective link in strengthening relations" *between* nations. Your vision -- of peoples living together and nations living together, resolving differences peacefully and drawing strength from diversity -- will form the basis of a better future for Europe and the world.

Now, Mr. President, our State Department has advised in a memo that the Hungarian word for "cheers" is, and I quote, "practically impossible to pronounce correctly." I will accept their considered judgment. Let me, instead, salute you with the words that greeted Kossuth on streamers across New York City on the day he arrived in America: Isten Hozta [ISH-ten HOZE-ta] [*literally, "God brought you here," can also be translated as "hearty welcome"; a warm traditional Hungarian greeting*]. I ask all of you to join me in a toast to President Goncz, Mrs. Goncz, and the people of Hungary.

Welcome to the White House.
- I must admit, I've been watching baseball for a long time, and I can't remember a season filled with so much excitement, energy – and so many firsts. A season where baseball once again proved itself America's greatest pastime.
- It was the year of the great homerun race between Mark McGwire and Sammy Sosa. And, of course, the season where the New York Yankees showed the world why they are appropriately called the Bronx Bombers.
- Former Yankee great Yogi Berra once said, "you give 100 percent in the first half of the game, and if that isn't enough in the second half you give what's left." There's no better way to describe last year's Yankees. From the first pitch of the season to the final out of the World Series, you played as a team, putting your heart into each and every game. I. PURPOSE

To meet with the 1998 World Series Champions: The New York Yankees.

II. BACKGROUND

The New York Yankees, beginning their 1998 season at 0 and 3, ended with one of the most successful baseball seasons in history as they defeated the San Diego Padres in four games to win their 24th World Series title, their 2nd in the last three years.

Igniting their drive to win was the departure of Darryl Strawberry as he sought treatment for colon cancer, the reunion of Orlando "El Duque" Hernandez with his family whom he had not seen since his defection from Cuba on a raft 10 months earlier, and a skeptical media and fan base. Despite all of these challenges, the Yankees became the winningest Major League team of all time, finishing with 125 wins and 50 losses.

Accompanying the team will be Manager Joe Torre, who on November 12, 1998, was named the American League Manager of the Year. Mr. Torre has recently battled prostate cancer and on March 18, 1999 underwent successful surgery to remove a cancerous prostate gland. Mr. Torre has fully recovered, and returned as manager of the Yankees on May 18, 1999 in a game against the Boston Red Sox.

Leading the 1998 New York Yankees was 3rd baseman Scott Brosius, a first time All-Star and World Series MVP. Also of note was pitcher David Cone who finished fourth in the Cy Young Award voting, and led the American League in wins with a record of 20 wins and 7 losses (his 20 win season broke the Major League record for the longest stretch between 20 win seasons - 11 years). Centerfielder Bernie Williams made Major League Baseball history by winning the Gold Glove award, the batting title, and the World Series all in the same year.

1998 New York Yankee Season Highlights:

- The New York Yankees began the season 0 and 3 for the first time in 14 years. However, this 0 and 3 start began one of the greatest major league baseball seasons ever. They finished the season at 125 wins and 50 losses.
- New York Yankees defeated the San Diego Padres in four games to win their 24th World Series Championship and their 2nd in the last three years.
- The 1998 New York Yankees are the winningest American League team of all time.
- Records set by the 1998 New York Yankees:
 1. Yankees were the first team in playoff history to clinch a playoff birth in the month of August (Aug. 29).
 2. On September 4th, the Yankees won their 100th game- the earliest date ever.
 3. They later broke the American League record for wins set by the Cleveland Indians in 1954.
 4. In the first four months of the season their winning percentage was over .700.
 5. They went 61 and 20 in the first half of the season, the best major league record since the league changed the to a 162 game schedule.
 6. They matched a team record by finishing the season 66 games over .500, the most by any team since the 1954 Cleveland Indians.
- Personal Accomplishments of Yankee Player:
 1. **Tino Martinez** (123) and **Paul O ' Neil** (116) were the only players to drive in 100 runs.
 2. **Bernie Williams** won the American League batting title.
 3. **David Cone** pitched for 20 wins.
 4. **David Wells** pitched a record of 18 and 4 including a perfect game on May 17th.
 5. **Mariono Rivera** had 36 saves in the season.
- Perhaps one of the most moving events in the Yankees remarkable season was when the Yankees ace pitcher, Orlando "El Duque" Hernandez was reunited with his family (Oct. 23, 1998) whom he had not seen since defecting from Cuba on a raft 10 months earlier.
- Another moving event was when star outfielder Darryl Strawberry was forced to leave the team because of colon cancer surgery. Throughout the series, every member of the team had Strawberry's number #39 embroidered on their caps in recognition of the team's love and devotion for their teammate.
- Scott Brosius was named the World Series Most Valuable Player (MVP) as he went 8-17 with six runs batted in (RBI's).

- On November 12 Joe Torre, the New York Yankees manager was named the American League manager of the year. This awarded is voted on by the Baseball writer's Association of America. Torre received 128 votes (23 – 1st, 4 – 2nd, 1 – 3rd) more than double the amount of the runner up (Jimmy Williams - 59).

Players

Clay Bellinger:

A minor league standout with Toledo that has joined the team on a semi-permanent basis. Bellinger is a flexible player that has played all nine positions in minor league play. Graduated from Rollins College in 1990

Scott Brosius:

The 1998 World Series Most Valuable Player was acquired in trade with Oakland in 1997. In 1998 he hit .300 with 19 HR in 152 games. Brosius's career-high 98 RBI all came from the 7th, 8th and 9th spots in the order (most in the majors from these positions) and in 1998 he played in his first All-Star Game. Never saw a Major League game until his first day at Spring Training.

David Cone:

Among the American League leaders in wins (tied-1st), winning percentage (tied-4th), strikeouts (5th) and ERA (8th) in 1998 Cone finished 20-7 with a 3.55 ERA in 207.2. Established the David Cone Charitable Gift Fund in 1996 to benefit worthwhile charities and non-profit organizations nationwide. Was honored by the Baseball Assistance Team (BAT) with the Bart Giamatti Caring" Award, presented annually to an active player for his "caring feeling for the community." In November, received the Marty Lyons Foundation's 1st annual "Children's Award" for his off-the-field accomplishments which have touched the lives of children. In May, he was honored with the Mickey Mantle Foundation's 1st annual "Team Valor Award" presented to sports heroes who best exemplify Mickey's spirit and courage.

Chad Curtis:

Curtis hit .243 with 10 HR and 56 RBI in 456 at-bats and made 121 starts. He spent most of 1998 replacing injured teammates and is known as a utility player. Did not appear in 1998 World Series, although he had his most productive season ever. In high school was voted All State Honors in both football and baseball for three years.

Chili Davis:

Signed as free agent by Yankees, Dec. 10, 1997 missed 118 games at beginning of season after surgery to right ankle returned to finish at .291 with 3 HR and 9 RBI in 103 at-bats. From Kingston, Jamaica and has over 2000 hits and several World Series appearances with other teams.

Todd Erdos:

An up and coming pitcher with the Yankees made only two appearances with the team last year, but this season he should see more starts. In high school was the Scholar-Athlete Award winner as a senior and was named the Outstanding Player of the Year in Pennsylvania.

Joe Girardi:

The primary catcher of the Yankees, he hit .276 with 3 HR and 31 RBI in 254 at-bats. The pitching squad posted a remarkable 3.80 ERA in games he caught. In the past he has lead the league in fielding percentage. Graduated from Northwestern University with a degree in industrial engineering, twice awarded all-academic team honors.

Jason Grimsley:

Jason Grimsley joins the Yankees from a successful minor league career. Despite not being able to pitch due to arm and shoulder injuries in his last two years of high school, he was still able to gain notice in high school as an outstanding short stop. This year he has worked his way up to being a major league pitcher and brings a new strong arm to the Yankees pitching staff. His hobbies include golfing, fishing and hunting.

Orlando Hernandez:

After escaping from Cuba on a raft in December, 1997, Orlando "El Duque" Hernandez jumped into the Yankees starting rotation, going 12-4 with a 3.13 ERA in 21 starts. He became the first rookie righthander to win at least 12 games for the Yankees since Ron Davis went 14-2 as a reliever in 1979. He broke the Yankee record for most strikeouts by a rookie when he struck out a career-high 13 batters in a 2-0 win on 8/13 vs. Texas. "El Duque" played a key role in ensuring the Yankees a World Series championship. He went 2-0 with a 0.64 ERA in two post-season starts, including a key win that brought the Yankees back into the ALCS. The Yankees trailing two games to one in the ALCS, when he tossed seven shutout innings for a 4-0 victory on 10/10 at Cleveland, tying the series.

Hideki Irabu:

Hideki Irabu brought his Japanese pitch velocity record of 95 mph to the 1998 Yankees. He helped jumpstart the Yankees record breaking season by starting off at season 9-3 with a 2.86 ERA in 17 starts. He was named American League's Pitcher of the Month for May (4-1, 1.44 in six starts). Irabu became the first Yankee pitcher since 1972 to record a hit in a regular-season game.

Derek Jeter:

Derek Jeter set career highs for home runs (19), RBI (84), hits (203), triples (eight), stolen bases (30) and batting average (.324). He was among the American-League leaders in batting average (5th), runs (1st), hits (3rd), triples (14th), multi-hit games (T2nd) and at-bats (6th). He broke the season home-run record for Yankee shortstops and was named to the first All-Star Team. Jeter was named American League Player of the Month for August. He finished third in the American-League MVP voting and hit .353 (6-for-17) vs. San Diego in the World Series. Since his rookie of the year season in 1996, Jeter has been a leader both on and off the field. In 1997 he received the Joan Payson Award for community service, presented by New York Chapter of BBWAA, for his work in preventing and treating teenage substance abuse.

Chuck Knoblauch:

Chuck Knoblauch was another Yankee to bring out his best in the 1998 World Championship Season by setting a career high, hitting 17 home runs and hitting five lead-off homeruns. He batted .375 with 1 HR and 3 RBI in the World Series vs. San Diego, starting all four games at second base. Knoblauch personified true Yankee grit by keeping his cool despite being hit by a pitch an American League-high 18 times.

Tino Martinez:

Hit .281 with 28 HR and 123 RBI in 531 at-bats had fourth straight season with 20+ HR and 100+ RBI in 1998. Only fourth player in team history to drive in 120+ runs for two consecutive

seasons and hit his sixth career grand slam, April 17 at Detroit. Martinez hit a dramatic, two-out grand slam off Mark Langston to cap a seven-run seventh inning in the Yankees' 9-6 victory in Game 1 of the World Series. It was only the 17th grand slam in World Series history, the eighth by a Yankee.

Greg McCarthy:

A recently acquired left-handed pitcher, Greg McCarthy has yet to see much time on the mound. But as injuries begin to take their effect on the team that should change this season.

Ramiro Mendoza:

Appeared in 41 games: 14 as a starter, 27 as a reliever was 6-1 with a 3.87 ERA in 88.1 IP as a starter for the 1998 Yankees. Also in 1998 tossed first career complete game and shutout in a 5-hit performance at Minnesota, May 10. From Los Santos Panama.

Dan Naulty:

Spent last season with Minnesota and traded last fall to the Yankees. Primarily a relief pitcher, Naulty has struggled with injuries since arriving in New York. Pitched in College World Series and was all-conference and Most Valuable Player on college club.

Jeff Nelson:

A relief pitcher, he had 45 appearances, went 5-3 with a 2.79 ERA recorded 35 strikeouts in 40.1 innings pitched in 1998. Currently on the disabled list with inflamed elbow. Received the 1992 "Star of the Future" award from the Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association at their annual "Tops in Sports" banquet.

Paul O'Neill:

O'Neill has continued to be a consistent force in the Yankees' lineup, batting .317 with 24 HR and 116 RBI in 152 games. He ranks third in the American League with a .317. O'Neill and co-player Bernie Williams (.339) are the first pair of Yankee outfielders since Babe Ruth and Earle Combs (1927-33) to bat .300 or better in four consecutive seasons.

Andy Petite:

Petite has established himself as one of the premier lefthanders in baseball, going 16-11 with a 4.24 ERA in 33 games (32 starts). His .657 career winning percentage is the second highest of all active pitchers in the Majors.

Jorge De Posada Jr.:

In 1998 Posada saw increased playing time in and established himself as the Yankees primary catcher by year's end. He batted .268 with 17 HR and 63 RBI in 111 games.

Mariono Rivera:

Rivera is the anchor of the Yankee bullpen, as he posted another impressive season in his second year as closer for the Yankees. He was 3-0 with a 1.91 ERA and 36 saves in 54 relief appearances. With a 0.51 ERA in his post-season career (35.0 IP, 2 ER), Rivera holds the major-league record for the lowest career ERA in post-season play (minimum 30.0 IP)

Luis Sojo:

After missing the entire first month of the season due to injury, the versatile Sojo returned to the Yankees and started at four different positions in '98 (14 at SS, 12 at 1B, 5 at 3B and 3 at 2B). He batted .231 with 0 HR and 14 RBI in 54 games.

Shane Spencer:

After nine years in the minors, Spencer burst onto the scene to play a key role in the Yankees' historic season. In four stints with the Yankees, he batted .373 with 10 HR and 27 RBI in 27 games.

Mike Stanton:

Stanton was 4-1 with a 5.47 ERA and had six saves in a team-leading 67 relief appearances. When Mariano Rivera was placed on the disabled list, Stanton elevated his play to another level and converted all four save opportunities in Rivera's absence.

Tony Tarasco:

Tony Tarasco began the year at Triple-A Rochester, but quickly found himself back with the big club after Jerome Walton went on the disabled list. He added a fresh lift to the Yankees roster.

Bernie Williams:

In 1998 Williams enjoyed one of his finest seasons in the Majors, becoming the first player ever to win a batting title, Gold Glove Award and World Series Championship in the same season. He batted .339 with 26 HR and 97 RBI in 128. In 1997, Bernie took over for Don Mattingly as Yankee representative for the Children's Health Fund, donating and raising money for each home run he hits. The fund, originally established by singer Paul Simon, provides health care for underprivileged and homeless children nation wide.

Ownership

George Steinbrenner III:

Success in both the world of business and sports is nothing-new Steinbrenner, Principal owner of the New York Yankees. The 1998 Yankees captured the fourth World Championship of his tenure(also 1977, '78 & '96) and second in the past three seasons. A recipient of four honorary doctorate degrees, Mr. Steinbrenner is involved heavily in various civic and community causes. He is the founder of the Silver Shield Foundation in New York City, which provides college education's for children of policemen, housing and transit police, fire-fighters and state troopers who gave their lives in the line of duty. In February 1997, he was honored as the New York Society of Association Executives' 1997 "Outstanding New Yorker." Mr. Steinbrenner has also served as Chairman of the Olympic Overview Commission, which was created to evaluate the structure and efforts of the United States Olympic program. In February 1989 he was elected to the position of Vice President, U.S. Olympic Committee, a position he still holds. He probably devotes as much time and effort to the U.S. Olympic Committee as he does to his many other sporting endeavors. As a representative of the U.S. Olympic Committee, he accompanied the U.S. Olympic team to Albertville, France in 1992 Lillehammer, Norway in

Coaching Staff

Joe Torre:

Torre enters his fourth season as manager of the Yankees and enjoyed his finest season as a major-league Manager in 1998. Joe has guided the Yankees to their second World Series Championship in three years while establishing an American-League record with 114 regular-season victories including the postseason, the Yankees won a total of 125 games, breaking the major-league record of 118 by the 1906 Chicago Cubs. The record-breaking season earned him his second BBWAA American-League Manager of the Year Award, his second Associated Press Manager of the Year Award, and his first Sporting News American-League Manager of the Year Award.

Jose Cardenal:

Cardenal is presently in his fourth season as the Yankees' first-base coach. He was named to the position on 11/16/95.

Chris Chambliss:

Chambliss is in his fourth straight season as the Yankees' batting coach, a position he also held here in '88. He began his coaching career in 1988 as the Yankees' batting coach.

Tony Clonginger:

Clonginger returned to the Yankees in 1998 as bullpen coach, a position he has held for the past five years as well as in 1992. He is presently in his 11th consecutive season in the Yankee system.

Willie Randolph:

Randolph is in his fifth straight season as third-base coach of the Yankees. He was named to the Yankees' coaching staff in October 1993. He Played 18 years in the Major Leagues, including 13 seasons with the Yankees.

Mel Stottlemeyer:

Stottlemeyer is in his fourth season as the Yankees pitching coach. As a player Mel ranks among Yankee all-time leaders in games (10th), innings (3rd), wins (6th), strikeouts (5th), shutouts (T2nd), complete games (8th) and ERA (8th).

Don Zimmer:

Zimmer is celebrating his 50th anniversary in professional baseball. He returns for his fourth consecutive season as the Yankees' bench coach although he also coached here in 1983 and 1986. In 1989 was Zimmer was named National League Manager of the Year after leading the Cubs to the NL East title with a 93-69 record.

Gary Tuck:

Tuck is presently serving his fourth consecutive year with the Yankee organization, as he acts as the team's batting-practice instructor.
