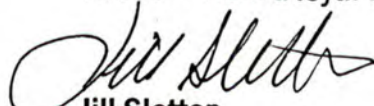

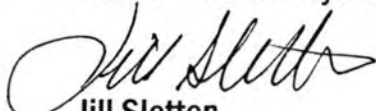
I just wanted you to know that.

Dear Mr. President:

Could I persuade you to do a preface for a stupendous book profiling women lawyers who are heroes – **sheroes** – of our profession? Your mentorship helped many of those profiled achieve star billing.

A lawyer at my firm, Elizabeth Vrato, is the author of this book which contains sparkling interviews with recipients of the American Bar Association's Margaret Brent Women of Achievement Award.

You appointed several of the women interviewed and profiled -- Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Attorney General Janet Reno, and former Deputy Attorney General Jamie Gorelick -- literally changing the landscape for women in careers as part of your legacy. And you influenced many of the others.

Other chapters profile Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, Patricia Schroeder, the highest ranking woman at GM, Elaine Jones of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, the Dean of Boalt Hall-Berkeley Law School, and other women who have pierced the glass ceiling in their fields.

The book – call it a *Profiles in Courage* for women – not only provides mentoring to women embarking upon career paths, but also tells the inspiring stories of the first generation of women who have made it to the top.

Mr. President, you have broken the glass ceiling for many women in the bar, the bench, and in government. Your introduction to this book seems so appropriate. If you would entertain the idea, I'll send a copy of the full manuscript.

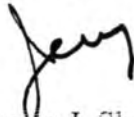

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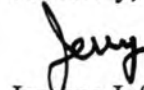

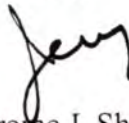

Additionally, Ms. Fay is responsible for the company's minority business development and employee volunteerism programs.

Prior to joining Time Inc. in 1982, Toni held positions as a social worker in the New York City Department of Welfare (South Bronx); Director, PBA Halfway House; Regional Commissioner, Governor's Council on Drug and Alcohol Abuse (Commonwealth of Pennsylvania); Director of Planning and Development, National Council of Negro Women; and Executive Vice President, D. Park Gibson Associates.

How many of us have to drive down streets filled with potholes that should have been fixed months ago? How many of our kids are being educated alongside 130 students in a room built for 100? How many of us live where people of color own none of the businesses in their neighborhood?

How many of us are willing to do something about it? No one can cure all the ills of society, but we can turn our own communities around. We simply have to ask, "What can I do?" and accept the answer. It's this type of initiative that's at the heart of Toni Fay, Vice President of Community Relations for Time Warner Inc.

The move to Time Warner

Toni soared through positions such as Social Worker for the New York City Department of Welfare, Director of Planning and Development for the National Council of Negro Women, and Regional Commissioner for the Governor's Council on Drug and Alcohol Abuse before landing at Time Warner. She recalled, "The only place I had not worked was a corporation. I wrote Time Inc. hoping to test my interviewing skills, not thinking I'd get hired. I made a new résumé and sent it to a post office box. I got called for an interview and

my secretary almost didn't put it through. Four interviews later I was hired. That was 18 years ago. You never know the power of responding to ads."

Time hired Toni as a manager, a position outside recruits did not typically hold. So, said Toni, "I had to prove I could survive and demonstrate I could produce. In two years I was appointed Director, and year later elected to the current position on the board of directors."

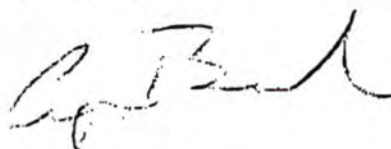
Dear Mr. President,

Glickmans give \$100,000 to WSU

The agriculture secretary and his siblings present the check to establish a new lecture series in memory of their parents.

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman and his siblings, Sharon and Norman, presented Wichita State University with a \$100,000 check Monday morning.

In return, WSU President Donald Beggs gave Dan Glickman a banana cream pie. Glickman accepted it, laughing. After the ceremony, he gingerly placed it back in its box.

"I don't mind," he said. "It was presented to eat, not as a personal attack."

That was different from last month, when Glickman ducked a tofu cream pie that an animal rights activist threw at him during a speech.

The exchange was reminiscent of the humor his parents, Gladys and Milton Glickman, were known for. The couple were prominent philanthropists in the community who died 2 1/2 weeks apart in December after being married for 62 years.

The Glickmans donated the money to establish a new lecture series -- the Glickman Lecture Series on Public Policy -- at WSU, honoring their parents.

About 60 people gathered Monday morning at the Rhatigan Student Center at WSU for the announcement by the Glickmans.

The series will focus on public policy issues, weaving in humor in American public life through speakers.

Dan Glickman also donated papers from his 18-year congressional tenure to WSU's Ablah Library. They will also be available on the Internet.

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The lecture series and the congressional papers will serve as the foundation for the Glickman Institute for Public Policy at WSU. The university has already raised about \$11,000 and plans to hold fund-raisers after Dan Glickman is out of office.

Gladys and Milton Glickman thought education was important, Dan Glickman said. His mother sometimes took classes at the university. "Neither had a college degree, but they felt a strong belief in education," he said.

Milton was a lifelong Wichitan who operated Glickman Inc., a scrap-metal processor in north Wichita, and had gas and oil interests. He also owned and ran the Wichita Aeros, a Triple-A baseball team.

Gladys had lived in Wichita since she was 11. She volunteered with many organizations.

The Arthritis Foundation named them its couple of the year in 1994.

The announcement of the lecture series came the day after family members saw the couple's gravestone unveiled.

"It's been a rough six months," Sharon Glickman said. "So this was a very happy day."

The ceremony was appropriately laced with humor. Speakers made several pie jokes.

The audience laughed when Beggs recalled Gladys Glickman's conversation with President George Bush. When the president said he wanted Dan to convert, meaning from Democrat to Republican, she told Bush, "We like being Jewish."

Norman Glickman described his parents as characters. During his visits here, he stayed at the Hyatt Regency Wichita. Employees would show him free tickets to shows that they had received from the Glickmans. They also had photos that his dad had handed out of his "pride and joy."

But rather than his children or his grandchildren, the picture showed bottles of the laundry detergent Pride and dishwashing soap Joy.

A longtime friend of Gladys and Milton Glickman, Lt. Gov. Gary Sherrer, said he had spoken to his wife about the couple before the ceremony.

"She said, 'You know, every time I think of them, I smile,' " Sherrer said. "What a legacy -- to be thought of with a smile."

What's So Funny? U.S. Agriculture Secretary Glickman and Family to Fund New Institute Emphasizing Humor in Politics

WICHITA, Kan., June 12 (AScribe News) -- The man who has been the target of more tofu pies than any other high-ranking public official is, with his siblings, establishing an institute for public affairs with an emphasis on humor in American political life.

U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman and brother Norman and sister Sharon are creating the Glickman Institute of Public Affairs at Wichita State University in memory of their parents, Gladys and Milton, both of whom died recently.

Dan is a native of Wichita and a former member of Congress representing the area. His parents were well-known and longtime supporters of the university and a variety of other philanthropic and civic causes.

One thing his entire family appreciates, Dan Glickman says, is humor, especially as it appears in politics and public life.

It's a good thing he's got a good sense of humor. In recent years, Glickman has been the target of what was identified as nongenetically modified soybeans, a bucket of a foul substance identified as rotten buffalo entrails, and most recently, a tofu pie.

In honor of their parents, the Glickmans are giving \$100,000 to Wichita State University to endow the Glickman Lecture Series on Public Policy.

In addition, Dan Glickman announced that he would place his papers as agriculture secretary in Wichita State's Ablah Library. Glickman already has contributed his congressional papers to Ablah Library. These papers offer an important resource for scholarly research. His congressional papers are housed in Ablah Library's special collections. A guide to the collection is available through the Web site www.twsu.edu/library/specialcollections/97-5-a.html.

The lecture series and public service papers are the foundation for the planning of The Glickman Institute for Public Policy at Wichita State University. Tentative plans call for The Glickman Institute to perpetuate the memory of Milton and Gladys Glickman, highlight contributions to the Wichita community of the Milton Glickman family, and honor the public service of Wichita native Dan Glickman. The institute intends to give special attention to humor in American public life.

In a prepared statement, Norman, Dan, and Sharon Glickman said, ``Our parents were proud Wichita residents who spent their lives contributing to many different projects and charities. They especially loved Wichita State University and would be proud to know that through their efforts the university can continue to excel in public policy issues, especially those involving humor in American life.''

Functions of The Glickman Institute would include educating and informing WSU students and Wichita area citizens about major public policy issues of the day; creating a forum for public discussion of significant state, national and international issues of the day; and invoking appropriate humor into public discourse.
