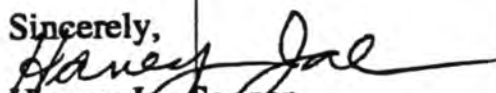

RE: A Check of White House Correspondence

A private organization, **World Press Freedom Committee**, has requested the Department of State to approve in principle a "Charter For a Free Press" which they are advancing. Ultimately, they want President Clinton to endorse the charter in writing before he leaves office.

We are reviewing the efficacy of the charter here at State. Meanwhile, the question has arisen whether the **World Press Freedom Committee** had previously made any *direct approaches* to the White House seeking President Clinton's endorsement. Obviously, we want to extend a consistent, unified response to the Committee, rather than have the left hand not know what the right hand had previously done.

It would reassure us here at State if White House logs could be checked for incoming correspondence, faxes, e-mails, etc., from either the **World Press Freedom Committee**, or from two individuals who play prominent roles for the Committee: Leonard Marks and Richard M. Schmidt, Jr.

History Museum Gets \$80 Million

Gift Largest Ever To Smithsonian

Kenneth E. Behring, one of the country's wealthiest entrepreneurs, will give the Smithsonian Institution \$80 million to refurbish the National Museum of American History.

The gift, to be announced today, is the largest single individual gift the Smithsonian has ever received. Behring's new gift, when added to the \$20 million the West Coast developer gave the Smithsonian three years ago, represents one of the biggest donations a single person has ever given any American museum.

A college dropout who left the University of Wisconsin to sell used cars, Behring will see his name added to both main entrances to the museum, which will bear plaques saying "Behring Center."

The gift does not come with directions on how it is to be used, but Behring says he hopes the money will help the Smithsonian tell the story of the pursuit of the American dream.

"The museum should talk about who we are. Sometimes it is easy to forget how we started, who made the country," Behring said. "I hope we can put something here to inspire people to chase the American dream."

Behring started working in a Wisconsin cheese factory at 14. Today, at 72, after a career in which he made enough to buy and sell an NFL franchise as well as an entire Florida town, he is working on giving a chunk of his fortune away.

Behring said yesterday that he has been selling some of his businesses to fund his philanthropy. "I want to accomplish what I can when

I am still here," he said. "Investments for the last several years have been good. I have enough for my family and my children."

Lawrence M. Small, the secretary of the Smithsonian since January, has shown a knack for snagging big donations, but Behring's sets a new standard.

"I couldn't be happier," Small said. "This is a shining example for others to do the same, and to beat it."

One of Small's crusades has been to draw attention to the Smithsonian's outdated exhibitions and decaying structures, and then raise funds for the projects. Small said this year has been a banner one for large gifts. The Smithsonian has brought in a record-breaking \$200 million since last October. Almost all the Smithsonian museums have benefited from direct bequests: \$60 million to the National Air and Space Museum, \$10 million for the National Postal Museum, and \$12 million to the Archives of American Art, a division of the Smithsonian's Museum of American Art.

The Mall's sprawling American History building, which will benefit from Behring's latest gift, was opened in 1964 as a catalogue of American inventions and technology. Its artifacts include the original Star-Spangled Banner, Edison's light bulb, Ford's Model T, George Washington's uniform, and Judy Garland's "ruby slippers" from "The Wizard of Oz." But visitors as well as scholars have complained over the years that the museum's curators try to do too many things and ultimately fail to provide a coherent chronicle of American history.

Behring was born in Illinois and grew up in Monroe, Wis. His entrepreneurial career began with a used car dealership in Wisconsin. He then ventured into real estate development. In the early 1970s he bought land near Fort Lauderdale and built the retirement community of Tamarac. (He reversed the name of his car wash chain, Car-a-Mat.) The Florida land deal made him a multimillionaire, and he went on to develop an exclusive community in the San Francisco Bay area. After that he spent a rough 10 years as the owner of the Seattle Seahawks football team, which he sold in 1997. Fans, he said later, always viewed him as an outsider, a "Californian developer." In the last few years he has toyed with several major real estate ventures. His fortune was estimated at \$495 million by Forbes magazine in 1998.

His wealth has brought him the luxury of indulging in high-ticket

hobbies, including big-game hunting. And that pastime has brought him a number of hunting awards, as well as criticism from environmentalists. When he gave \$20 million to the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History in 1997, for renovation of the landmark Rotunda and overhauling the Hall of Mammals, animal rights and environmental activists criticized the agreement and later raised questions about Behring's plan to give the museum the remains of four rare Asian wild sheep that he had shot. Behring said he had the proper permits to hunt the sheep in Kazakhstan in 1997. In addition, Behring's participation in an 1998 elephant expedition in Mozambique drew criticism from environmentalists.

Small said the museum had reviewed all the issues surrounding Behring's hunting and donations. "We found no legal or regulatory problems," he said. But after a long wait, the Smithsonian withdrew its application to bring the animals into the country.

This year Behring began selling off an estimated \$2 million worth of guns and sporting art.

Behring has also built the Blackhawk Museum near his home in Northern California. His own collection of classic automobiles is at its core. Though the automobile is certainly a pivotal part of the 20th-century American story, Small said there was no discussion about using some of those artifacts in Washington. "That has nothing to do with the gift," he said.

In this phase of his life Behring is shoring up his status as a philanthropist in a number of areas. He has pledged \$15 million to start Wheelchairs for the World Foundation, a charity that distributes chairs to the disabled and poor in 58 countries. He said yesterday that his travels, especially those as a hunter, have opened doors to the leaders of countries where wheelchairs are in critically short supply.

In July he gave \$7.5 million to the University of California at Berkeley to train teachers to become principals in low-performing schools.

In the case of the Natural History donation, the Rotunda and adjacent hall were renamed for the Behring family. Small said the new American History Museum gift would be boldly acknowledged through the addition of the words "Behring Center" to the name of the museum on the front of the building. Behring called the gesture an honor but said what was most important was what people experienced inside the halls.

Dear Mr. President:

I hope that you are well. I am looking forward very much to seeing you later this month, when you will meet with Prime Minister Wim Kok at the White House. Thank you very much for extending this invitation, which means a great deal to one of our staunchest allies.

I am writing to make a request regarding one of the many areas in which you have advanced the U.S. position in the world, biotechnology. (And you thought only Tom perused you on this subject!) Last January, the U.S. Embassy in the Hague organized and hosted an international conference, "*Biotechnology: the Science and the Impact*", which brought together pre-eminent scientists, advocates for the developing world, policy makers from the U.S., EU, and Dutch government, and NGOs (for example, Greenpeace), and consumer advocates for an exchange of views on biotechnology. The conference itself and the subsequent media attention demonstrated that informed debate can help overcome opposition to biotechnology. Members of the Dutch government have told me that the conference (at which three Dutch Ministers spoke) played a pivotal role in shaping the fundamentally positive attitude towards biotechnology of the Dutch government and public.

My request to you is that you write a brief (2 to 3 pages) forward to be included in the publication of the proceedings of the conference in a special edition of The Journal of Biolaw and Business. I am all too aware that time is running short, but I hope, nonetheless, that you will make time to take your rightful place in a publication that testifies both to the extraordinary scientific advances made during your tenure, and to the pro-active position of the U.S. government, both at home and abroad, in gaining acceptance for the safe application of this promising new technology.

Having just received full funding from the State Department, we are moving ahead to publish this autumn. While I realize that the approval process can be time consuming, I hope that, if you consent, you will submit the Forward to the editor of BioLaw, Robin J. Blatt, within a month, by October 10th. To save time, I would suggest that you send it to her directly at the following address:

For your information, I enclose the following to facilitate decision-making about, and execution of this request: suggested talking points for your forward; proposed Table of Contents for the special supplement of The Journal of Biolaw and Business; a copy of the proceedings of "Biotechnology: the Science and the Impact"; an example of The Journal of Biolaw and Business, and information about the Journal.

I hope very much that you will agree to lend your views on biotechnology, and the prestige that accompanies them, to this publication. This special edition of the Journal of Biolaw and Business is intended as an "ambassador for biotechnology", of sorts. The exchange of views between supporters and opponents contained within it will demonstrate that the United States supports free and open debate on biotechnology, supported by facts. Equally importantly, it will provide a reference for members of the USG at home and abroad of the full range of accomplishments and potential of biotechnology in agriculture, medicine, genomics, sustainability, and aid to the developing world. In addition, the information contained within the proceedings offers an informed guide to thorny questions about risk/benefit analysis by clarifying what is and is not known about potential future risks both from biotechnology, and from alternative methods. Since the speakers included the leaders in their fields, the publication will remain a standard for a long time to come.

In short, I believe that this publication will be a source both of value and pride to the full range of U.S. government entities involved with biotechnology. As the leader of both the campaign to earn acceptance for this technology, and, through your announcement with Tony Blair of the genome sequencing, of US/EU cooperation on this subject, your name rightfully belongs in the front pages. I hope you will consent to putting it there.

Please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions. Thank you very much for your consideration of this request. I look forward to hearing from you, and to seeing you on September 28th.

Please give my best to Hillary and Chelsea. Both of them look more beautiful every day in the press photos. Chelsea looked great at the UN summit; Hillary looks as if she is thriving.

Suggested Talking Points for the Foreword by President Clinton

- ◆ We stand on the threshold of rapid scientific advances that will change our lives and those of our children and grandchildren in ways we can only begin to imagine.
- ◆ With the joint announcement of the mapping of the human genome Prime Minister Blair and I were proud to host, science has assumed center stage in world affairs.
- ◆ Thanks to the discoveries of biotechnology, both health care and agriculture as we know them will be transformed over the next century.
- ◆ Knowledge reaped from the mapping of the human genome will contribute to a gradual shift from diagnostic to prognostic medicine.
- ◆ Greater understanding of the genetic and environmental influences on health and disease will make it possible to know to which conditions we may be predisposed.
- ◆ The next step will be the ability to detect and cure today's diseases, including cancer, cystic fibrosis, hemophilia, and Alzheimer's.
- ◆ Developments in agricultural biotechnology offer the promise of more efficient and more environmentally sound food production.

- ◆ Biotechnology uses modern scientific techniques, including genetic engineering, to improve or modify plants, animals and microorganisms. Biotechnology in agriculture is not new, except in the degree of accuracy that genetic transfer through DNA offers in comparison with traditional plant breeding methods.
- ◆ Agricultural biotechnology holds the promise of food security for the developing world. Not only that, but with new developments that significantly improve nutritional content, such as vitamin “A” enforced rice, biotechnology offers hope to millions who suffer from hunger and disease.
- ◆ Crops can be genetically modified to flourish alongside “weeds,” eliminating the need for herbicides, thus protecting plant, insect, and bird bio-diversity.
- ◆ We in America are committed to ensuring the safety of this technology and its products through a sound system of science-based testing and regulation.
- ◆ Rarely has there been a comparable opportunity to influence and shape the destiny of science -- and the future -- as there is now. At this historical juncture, the public, professionals, and regulatory officials face the challenges of: (1) reaping the benefits of the new knowledge and technology; (2) extending those benefits globally; and (3) ensuring and protecting the safety of the consumer and the environment as the innovations of the new sciences are introduced.
- ◆ We realize that the understanding and acceptance of biotechnology varies across the world.
- ◆ Key to creating a safe and open climate for the introduction of scientific innovations is: (1) increasing understanding of the science itself; and (2) creating a sound science-based regulatory framework.

- ◆ Open dialogues between different shareholders in the life sciences -- scientists, consumers, consumer advocates, policy makers and NGOS -- are needed to broaden understanding of the issues and of our mutual stakes in them.
- ◆ The conference *Biotechnology: the Science and the Impact*, organized by the U.S. embassy in The Hague under the leadership of Ambassador Cynthia P. Schneider, fostered just such an open dialogue by bringing together diverse groups of experts to examine cutting-edge issues related to biotechnology and the life sciences. The conference assembled leading international figures in biotechnological research to de-mystify biotechnology and to discuss its potential advantages and disadvantages for both the developed and developing worlds.
- ◆ With publications such as this one, and with the continuing dialogues among scientists, policy makers, and citizens all over the world, we will work together to make the most of this new technology for the benefit of all mankind.

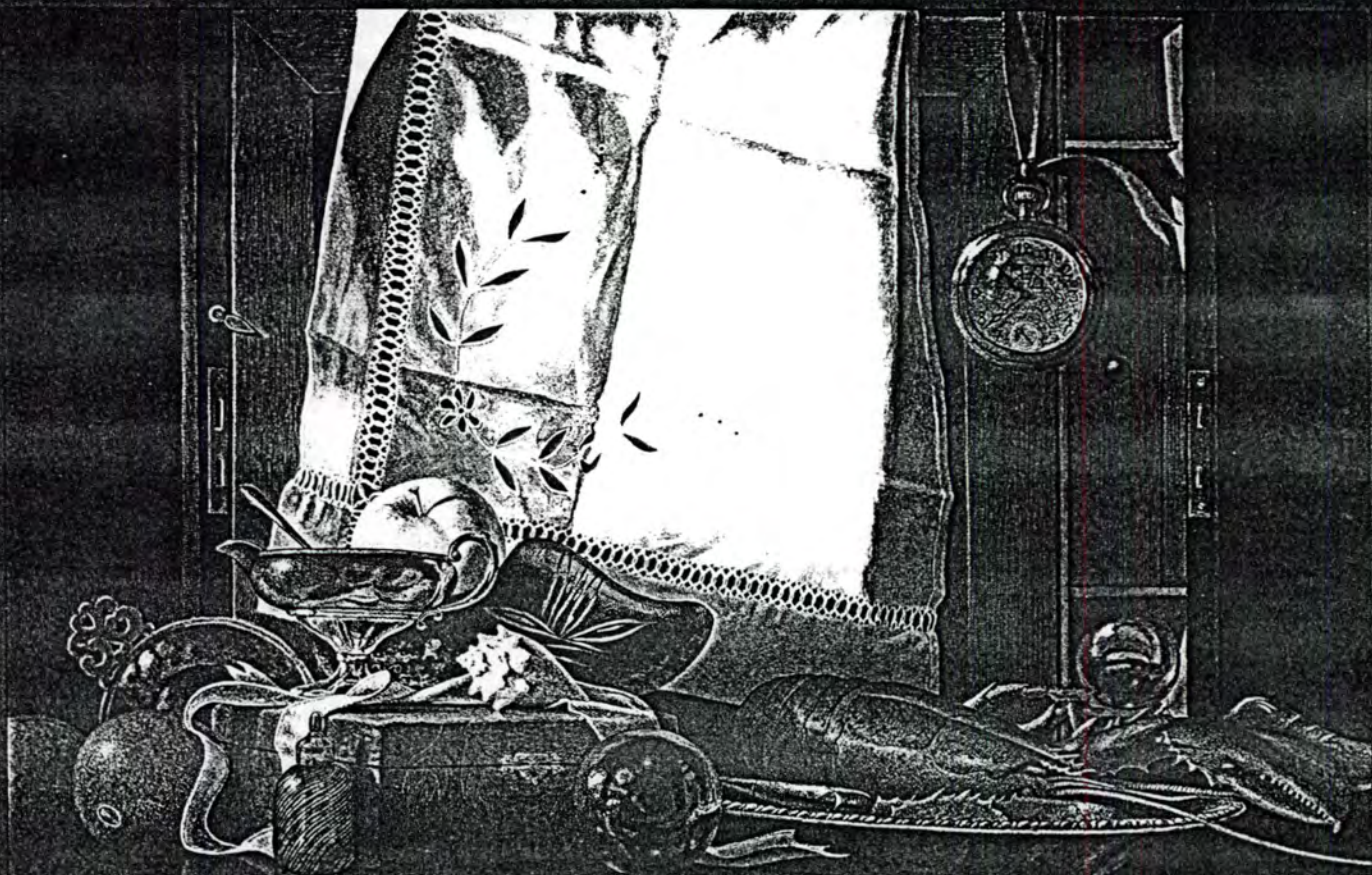

- ❖ The chance to make real business deals with a pre-screened list of interested contacts in each business sector

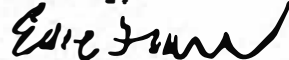

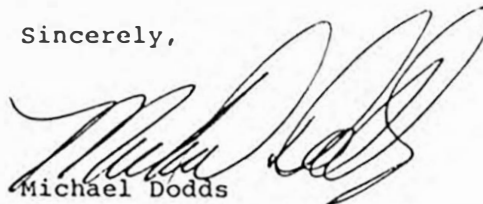

Memorial Day Memories

Kern Valley couple found romance amid World War

Fred Dodds explains, with a twinkle in his eyes, that he really only joined the armed forces as a young man for the \$21 a month he received.

"I think the first time we talked I was walking across the street and he was on patrol," Ruby said. She had heard about Dodds from her girlfriends. "He was one of their favorites," she said.

The two knew each other about nine months before they were married, but Ruby did not think her

Dodds spent a little over a year fighting with ground troops, and he and Ruby communicated only by letters.

"Love," Dodds said about what he wrote in the letters. "Couldn't write anything else, they were all censored."

So Ruby had to wait until WWII was over to hear about Dodds' experiences in combat.

"Once in April before VE day I was standing guard at about 10 p.m. someone tapped me on the shoulder and handed me a pistol, which was held facing him (the soldier) and said 'Comrade.' It was a German soldier surrendering to me, as he was tired of fighting and wanted to surrender," Dodds said.

Ruby said she had been so busy during the war working on the air base that she has hardly had time to miss Dodds. She might have been more anxious had she known everything he was going through.

"In the Priest area of Germany, I was knocked out for two days from a concussion from direct artillery from a tank. My two buddies on either side of me were killed. I could not speak for two days," Dodds relayed. "After that the Germans retreated."

He once walked for 30 days with his company without taking a bath or re-supplying. He earned a Bronze Star for bravery for taking a German machine gun nest.

All this while Ruby joined the nationwide wide effort to help the troops. It was nothing like you have ever seen, the couple ex-

plained. Everybody went out for the war effort.

Dodds said he believes WWII was a necessary war and is proud of his p.38 (a nine mm handgun) which he took from the dead body of a German soldier.

"He didn't need it anymore, he was dead," Dodds said.

From her vantage point in the states, Ruby felt the impact of the fighting.

"Hitler would have taken over," she said. "They fought in Europe to keep it (the war) away from our shores."

It was not an easy transition for Dodds to come back from fighting combat to civilian life. Originally from South Dakota, he and his wife moved to the Kern Valley in 1946 because her mother worked for Camp Owen. He returned not only to a strange community and a wife he had not seen in more than a year, but a radically different lifestyle as well.

"You are around thousands of people everyday in combat, and then all at once you are alone," Dodds said.

Once in the Kern Valley the couple began working at the Miracle Hot Springs Resort, once located where Hobo campground is today, and eventually bought it.

Dodds and his wife have not slowed their busy pace. At 74 and 70 they remain active in Veteran's activities and service organizations. He has served two years as District Commander of the Disabled American Veterans, and one term as District Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Next year, Dodds will have spent 30 years on the Kern Valley Hospital Board — the Skilled Nursing Center is dedicated to

him. He was named Man of the Year last year by the Lake Isabella Chamber of Commerce.

Service to veterans will always be important to the Dodds.

"We're just loyal to the veterans," Dodds said. "We'll always be loyal to them."

The Dodds have three children, four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. They said they felt

it was important to educate the younger generation about V because it was "the last war won." And today's skirmishes police actions don't compare said.

"I tried not to worry, be worrying gets you in trouble. I was always afraid, not going to deny that they afraid," Dodds said.

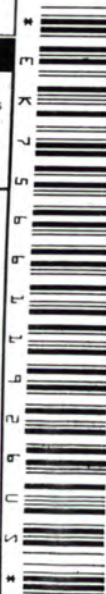
