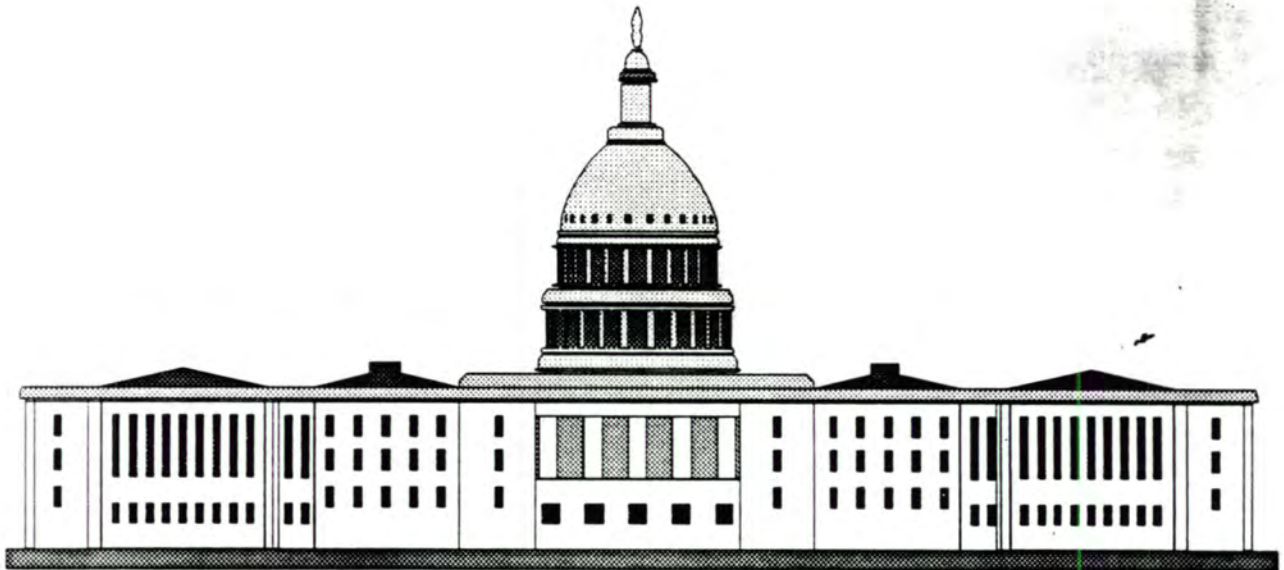


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Taxpayers Facing Higher Rates Compared to Families and Childless Workers Receiving the EITC

Estimation Procedures

Estimated Distribution Across Congressional Districts of Taxpayers Facing Higher Rates and Earned Income Tax Credit Recipients

The district-by-district analysis provides an approximate estimate of how many taxpayers will face higher tax rates under the Conference Committee's proposed budget, and how many families with children will receive the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) once the proposal is fully phased-in. The estimates do not include the seven million American workers without dependent children who would be eligible under the budget plan.

The distribution across Congressional districts of the taxpayers facing higher rates was derived as follows:

1. The Office of Tax Analysis, Department of the Treasury, has estimated that, for the nation as a whole, 1.4 million taxpayers will face higher rates under the proposal.
2. This total was distributed across states according to the proportion of the nation's taxpayers with Adjusted Gross Incomes over \$200 thousand living in each state in tax year 1991 (from the *SOI Bulletin*, Spring 1993).
3. The state totals were distributed across Congressional districts according to the proportion of the state's households with incomes over \$150 thousand residing in each district (as reported in the 1990 Census).

The distribution across Congressional districts of Earned Income Tax Credit recipients was derived as follows:

1. The Office of Tax Analysis, Department of the Treasury, has estimated that 15 million families and 7 million childless workers would receive the EITC under the President's proposal (fully phased in 1994 levels); we assume these national totals also hold for the Conference Committee proposal.
2. This total was allocated across states according to the distribution of EITC recipients across states in tax year 1991 (from the *SOI Bulletin*, Spring 1993).
3. The state totals were distributed across Congressional districts according to the proportion of the state's nonelderly (householder under 65) households with incomes under \$25 thousand residing in each district (as reported in the 1990 Census).

Caveats: The estimates do not include the number of low-income workers without children that would receive the EITC. Since the proposed credit for childless workers is new, there are no historical EITC data on which to base state-by-state estimates for these workers.

All state totals are assumed to grow at the same rate as the national total between 1991 and 1994. Consequently, variations across states are rooted in the 1991 distribution.

The estimates of EITC families by Congressional district somewhat overstate the number of recipients in metropolitan districts and understate the number in rural districts. This is because the proportion of poor households with earnings is higher than average in rural areas and somewhat lower than average in cities.

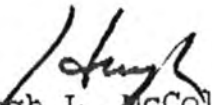

4. The Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, which currently employs some 6,000 federal workers, is scheduled to close in September 1996. Some 30,000 workers in the private sector depend on the yard for their present jobs.

Effective September 1994, two months before your election the only work still at the yard will be the overhaul of the U.S.S. Kennedy, an aircraft carrier. At minimum, the Kennedy must come to the yard on schedule, and there must be no reduction in force between now and your election.

Fletcher Shares Presidential Insights

William Fletcher, Professor of Law at Boalt Hall, spoke to the membership of the Club at the monthly meeting on July 14. He was Co-director of the Northern California Clinton Campaign last year and has been a friend of the President's since the late 1960's. Before addressing his main topic of "Clinton's First Supreme Court Nomination," he offered some observations on the first six months of the Administration.

The Clintons' decision to appoint old friends, he thinks, rather than experienced Washington hands, to important positions on the White House staff has probably been one reason for the recent stumbles. The President has moved to correct this with the addition of David Gergen as counselor. While "it hurts to think that someone from the Reagan White House should have to show us how to run things," it

is important to maintain perspective on Gergen's actual identity as a political independent. So far, his presence seems to have resulted in smoother press relations.

One pitfall Mr. Fletcher is hoping the administration can avoid is criticism over the handling of flood relief in the coming months. FEMA's performance in past disasters has led to much complaint and similar problems in the present could damage the administration's credibility.

Regarding the main topic of the night, Mr. Fletcher stated that he is pleased with the nomination of Judge Ruth Ginsberg to the Court. The rather circuitous route by which the President settled on his choice can be understood by examining his criteria. Mr. Fletcher explained that the President was interested in appointing a Justice who had political as well as judicial experience. Though recent appointees have

Health Care Reform Forum

On June 9, the Club listened to a discussion of health care reform by a panel of speakers including Joyce Lashof, Ph.D. and Dean Emerita of the School of Public Health at UC Berkeley; Stephen Schear, an attorney who has been active in promoting a Canadian-style, single payer system; David Kears, Director of Alameda County Health Care Services; Steven Shaw, an insurance underwriter; and Donna Guenther, M.D. a physician with Kaiser-Permanente. The discussion was moderated by Jeff Steele.

The discussion was lively to say the least. It opened with questions about problems with the current health care system. Dr. Guenther pointed out that even as the cost of health care has soared to 13% of the GNP, access has been decreasing - 40-50 million people are presently uninsured, 40% of which, surprisingly, are employed. Doctors, too, are unhappy with the current system since they dislike being micromanaged by the insurance companies. (An interesting point since many people assume that physicians oppose reform out of a desire to protect their incomes.)

The soaring cost and uneven distribution of medical technology was cited as a contributing factor. Dr. Lashof pointed out that the free market has no mechanism for allocating technology where it is needed. Mammography, for example, is an unevenly distributed technology that is unavailable to many women who need it. Mr. Schear took this a step further, arguing that mammograms are more readily available in Canada because there are fewer machines to perform the job.

With that, Mr. Schear launched into a passionate defense of a single payer plan. Armed with a wealth of statistics and charts,

JOHANNESBURG (UPI) _ A white U.S. graduate student was stabbed to death Wednesday by angry youths in a black township near the coastal city of Cape Town, a killing an African National Congress official called a racist attack.

Amy Biehl, 26, of Newport Beach, California, died in the overcrowded township of Guguletu, 900 miles (1,450 km) southwest of Johannesburg, after a gang of youths forced her from her automobile, beat her to the ground and stabbed her several times in the head.

ANC Regional Chairman Allan Boesak said the mob chanted anti-white slogans favored by anti-apartheid activists before Biehl's killing, which he termed "clearly a racist attack."

But police said there was still no official motive for the slaying of Biehl, who was scheduled to fly home to the United States later this week. No arrests have been made.

"The motive is unknown, although robbery is not suspected," police spokesman Capt. Wicus Holtzhausen said in a telephone interview.

Biehl, a student of woman's rights at the predominately black University of the Western Cape, was driving three friends to their home in the township when the youths attacked her car.

A piece of brick hit Biehl in the face forcing her to stop the car, Holtzhausen said. He said it appeared that Biehl tried to flee before she was beaten to the ground.

Her friends escaped.

Biehl, who arrived in South Africa a year ago, was reported to be involved in educating blacks about the principles of democracy in preparation for South Africa's first non-racial general election next April.

SITUATION ROOM COMMENT: Embassy Pretoria has telephoned the department to confirm the death of Ms. Biehl. According to the department, Ms. Biehl was traveling in a van with at least three black university students. The van was stopped by a black youth mob, which apparently mistook her for a white African. The embassy in Pretoria reports that there is a standing order to American Citizens against traveling to the townships.

According to the department, Ambassador Lyman has notified Amy Biehl's mother in California; her father is traveling in Europe and will be notified by her mother. The department is preparing a letter of condolence from the Secretary.

In the wake of the final decision on base closures, the San Francisco Bay Area as a whole has begun the process of marshalling the resources we need for the process of conversion and economic recovery. While the impact of the closures is magnified by the more general recession, we are confident of the economic potential of this region. Working with a grant secured through the efforts of the congressional delegation, the East Bay Conversion and Reinvestment Commission is up and running, serving as a clearinghouse for a substantial number of projects.

The Bay Area's historic role as a center of international maritime commerce is our number one asset. Maintenance and enhancement of that role is an absolute precondition for recovery and conversion. Maritime activity generates \$5.4 billion worth of economic activity every year and 100,000 jobs. It has a powerful multiplier effect as well in surrounding communities. The GM-Toyota plant in Fremont--our region's largest single industrial employer--would not have located in this area in the absence of deep-water access.

Maintenance of deep-water access requires the improvement of the Bay's navigational channels--specifically, the dredging of the Port of Oakland's channels from the current level of 38' to 42'. While this project is well underway, there are some key problems which, with all respect, we feel require

and justify the intervention of your office and of the Clinton Administration as a whole.

You are aware, I'm sure, that modernization of the Port's deepwater channels has been delayed for years by environmental problems and a certain degree of bureaucratic turf war. The challenge has been to locate and bring on line a range of disposal sites sufficient to handle millions of cubic yards of dredged material--some of which is unsuitable for unconfined aquatic disposal.

Over the last two years, a coalition of Bay Area business, labor and community groups, working closely with the environmental organizations, the Corps of Engineers, and the congressional delegation, has come 90 yards down the field. We need your help to cover the last ten yards.

There are two specific issues:

1) We need to bring on line an "upland" disposal site--known as Sonoma Baylands--located at the north end of the Bay. The House of Representatives has authorized funds for its construction, as well for preliminary engineering for a facility on adjacent property which would be used as a processing station for material not suitable for aquatic disposal.

When completed, the development of Sonoma Baylands will be a model of good economics and sound environmental policy. It will allow continued dredging. Dredged material will be used to re-create historic wetlands, providing habitat for at least two endangered species. And we will have created an important alternative to exclusive dependence on ocean disposal.

The only missing piece now is the funds necessary for the acquisition of property to replace the open space used for the processing facility. We understand that Rep. Dellums is working with you and your staff to secure these funds. We very much appreciate your continued support in this area.

2) We need to end delays in the Port of Oakland project which, irrespective of the availability of disposal sites, have slowed dredging and created considerable uncertainty in the shipping community. We need to find a way to cut through EPA and Corps procedures which, despite considerable and frequently repeated testing of sediment contamination, have already slowed the Oakland project by nearly a year and threaten further delays. We are eager to

discuss with Administration staff actions we believe can be taken to cut through these delays.

We welcomed your statement during your April 26 visit to the Port that your office would do everything possible to assist the Bay Area maritime industry. We have similarly welcomed President Clinton's statement last week that he considers response to the military base closures a key administration priority. We respectfully suggest that a strong signal from the Administration of its support for modernization of the Bay Area's maritime infrastructure, and that it sees such modernization as a necessary part of the conversion process, is an absolutely necessary first step in this direction.

I have attached a copy of Beyond Mudlock, the latest report of the Bay Area Dredging Coalition, an organization composed of labor, business and community organizations in support of the program we have outlined here.

I write once again on the subject of the tragic situation in Bosnia - Herzegovina which has reached a critical point. Decisive action should be taken now to prevent and check the deteriorating situation, in particular the strangulation of Sarajevo. You, Mr President, are better informed about the urgency of the matter and the need for such action.

I share your view that the future of Bosnia - Herzegovina will need to be resolved through negotiations, particularly among parties directly involved in the conflict in a fair and just manner. However, it is clear that the Serbs are using their military superiority on the ground to force that Bosnian Government to make untenable concessions. The world cannot allow the Bosnian Serbs and their Serbian allies to be so rewarded for their aggression. We must prevent the destruction of the human values and principles which we all espouse.

I highly appreciate your efforts to mount air strikes on Serbian positions, in consultation with your NATO allies. The situation on the



ground is deteriorating by the hour and I urge you to order the first air strike on targets which your planners consider most appropriate. I am certain such an action would have a sobering effect on those who have flouted the international call for decency and respect for human lives. Your action, Mr President, will have the support of many other world leaders as well as their peoples.

The decision to end the Bosnian tragedy, Mr Presiden, is in your hands. I urge you to take it.

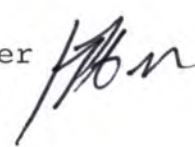

I WRITE ONCE AGAIN ON THE SUBJECT OF THE TRAGIC SITUATION
IN BOSNIA-HERZEGOVINA WHICH HAS REACHED A CRITICAL POINT.
DECISIVE ACTION SHOULD BE TAKEN NOW TO PREVENT AND CHECK
THE DETERIORATING SITUATION, IN PARTICULAR THE
STRANGULATION OF SARAJEVO. YOU, MR. PRESIDENT, ARE BETTER

INFORMED ABOUT THE URGENCY OF THE MATTER AND THE NEED FOR
SUCH ACTION.

I SHARE YOUR VIEW THAT THE FUTURE OF BOSNIA-HERZEGOVINA
WILL NEED TO BE RESOLVED THROUGH NEGOTIATIONS,

PARTICULARLY AMONG PARTIES DIRECTLY INVOLVED IN THE
CONFLICT IN A FAIR AND JUST MANNER. HOWEVER, IT IS CLEAR

At your request, I called Mayor Riley this morning, who had nothing but effusive praise for our efforts to date. He said, "Both Andre and David Lane have been terrific. He said they would be calling with more requests, but the "upbeat" attitude from federal government officials has been very encouraging to date. "Community spirit is a necessary precondition to recovery. The President, the Chief of Staff, and the whole White House operation has helped foster that spirit in our community."

He concluded by noting that "even though I am a diehard Democrat, I am so very proud of the President's economic package, his crime bill and ban on assault weapon imports he announced yesterday. Tell him to 'keep going for it.' I firmly believe that he is on the right side of history, and that the people will understand that eventually."

Dear Mr. President:

On June 26, 1995, world attention will be focused on San Francisco as we commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Signing of the United Nations Charter. Your participation would add considerably to the stature of this celebration and we would be honored to have you join us to commemorate this seminal event.

The Commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Signing of the United Nations Charter offers an opportunity for a forward-looking dialogue about the United Nations and its changing role in the world. The appropriate place for such a discussion is San Francisco, where 50 nations gathered almost 50 years ago with a vision for a new world order.

Two Presidents of the United States have visited San Francisco in relation to the United Nations. The first was Harry Truman who addressed the 50 nations that signed the Charter on June 26, 1945; the second was Lyndon Johnson who participated in the 20th Anniversary Commemorative in 1965. Given the leadership that your administration has already shown regarding U. N. reform, your participation in this event would be an important statement to the world community.

The Herbst Theater (site of the 1945 Charter Signing) and the Opera House have been reserved for a Commemorative Ceremony on Monday, June 26 from 10 a.m. to Noon. Following that event, we plan to hold a luncheon honoring U. N. Secretary General Boutros Boutros-Ghali. We are currently looking at sites for a major public event at which you could address a large international assembly. In addition, we would be honored to have you preside over a gala dinner that evening at the Moscone Convention Center Ballroom.

* We encourage you to consider San Francisco as a site for a Security Council Summit. To date, only one such gathering of Heads of State has been held. An expanded Security Council could meet in San Francisco with an appropriate signing ceremony taking place at Herbst Theater, forging a new era in global politics.

1995 is also the 25th Anniversary of Earth Day and as such will be a milestone for environmental organizations worldwide. San Francisco offers a unique site for an international environmental gathering, one that examines progress made in reaching the goals set out in Agenda 21 at the 1992 Earth Summit in Brazil. As you noted in your letter to Senator Barbara Boxer, the Presidio both geographically and symbolically is an appropriate site for a United Nations Conference.

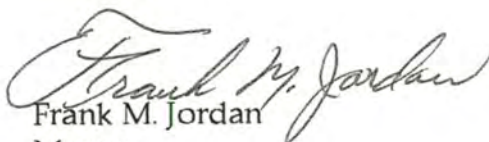
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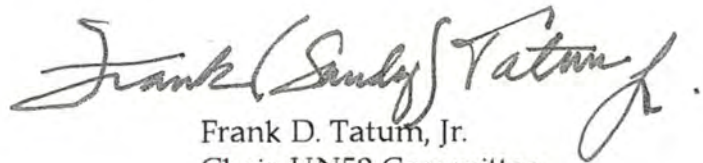
Although we understand that the Commission on Sustainable Development cannot be permanently located in the Presidio, it can be invited by the U. S. to hold its 1995 session in this park, perhaps culminating in the signing of an Earth Charter at the Herbst Theater. The Commission on Sustainable Development is already scheduled to meet for three weeks in June of 1995; the schedule for that meeting would not need to change, only the location. The San Francisco-based UN50 Committee would work with the U.N. and your administration to raise the additional funds required for a venue change.

The U. N. is looking to San Francisco for its leadership. In his letter accepting our invitation to serve as Honorary Chair, Secretary General Boutros-Ghali noted, "It is altogether appropriate that the June celebration in San Francisco should be a highlight of the Jubilee Year and it will indeed be the initial focus for the series of events which we hope will take place."

Thank you for considering this invitation. We would be delighted to work with your administration to determine the most effective way to proceed in our planning.
