DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION SPEECH OUTLINE
LOS ANGELES, CA
August 14, 2000**

- I. Introduction: Connects California, Hillary, and the VP**
- II. Rare Moment of Opportunity**
 - A. Longest economic expansion in history, 22 million new jobs, etc.
 - B. Best is yet to come. Chance of a lifetime to build the future of our dreams.
- III. The Question is: Will we Seize this Moment to Continue our Progress?**
 - A. How a nation responds to good fortune is as stern a test of its character and judgement as how it deals with adversity.
 - B. Tonight I want to talk to you about the pivotal moment that is before us: How we got here and choice the American voters must make. Big election. Big differences. Our party is the only one that wants you to know what those differences are.
- IV. Eight Years Ago America Faced Adversity**
 - A. High unemployment, soaring deficits – all social indicator going in the wrong direction.
- V. Al Gore and I Vowed to Bring Change to our Party and Country**
 - A. We were tired of the politics of irresponsibility and division. The way Republican Presidents: quadrupled the debt in 12 years and claimed it wasn't their fault. Talked about family values but did nothing for real families. Used issues like crime and welfare as wedges to divide Americans for political advantage rather than to bring us all together around real solutions.
- V. We Said it was Time to Put People First, With New Ideas Based on Old Values: Opportunity, Responsibility, Community**
 - A. New Approach to Governing: neither the main solution nor the main problem. Create the condition and provide the tools for people to solve their own problems.
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 - C. We put forth a *new plan to fight crime*: more police, fewer guns. Republicans fought us, but our plan worked. Crime at 30 year low.
 - D. After 12 years of trickle-down economics, when the rich got richer, the poor got poorer, and the middle class worked harder just to stay in place, *we invested in our people and made work pay*.
 - 1. Education, EITC, minimum wage.
 - 2. Now, wages rising in all income categories and poverty at historic low.
 - E. After 12 years of Republicans deriding big government, but making it even bigger, we made *government smaller and better*, thanks to VP Gore's reinventing government.

- F. After Republican Presidents vetoed *Family Leave*, I signed it. Helped 20 million working parents succeed at home and at work.

VI. This is Progress Worth Continuing. But it didn't happen by accident. And it will not continue by fate. It all depends upon the choices Americans make this fall – between different candidates, different parties, and between two very different sets of ideas.

VIII. Honest Differences between the Parties – Putting People First or Putting the Powerful First.

- A. Fiscal Responsibility
 - 1. We believe in maintaining fiscal responsibility: Medicare off budget (VP's suggestion); pay down debt by 2012; keep interest rates low & prosperity going.
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- A. He is by far the most influential and active Vice President in history.
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One idea: When I was a young man, growing up in the segregated South, Al Gore's father, Senator Al Gore, was a hero to me – someone who fought for the common man, took courageous stands on issues like civil rights. So when Al Gore Jr. joined the ticket in 1992, I felt like I gained not just a running mate, but a brother. We share the same vision for America's future, and the same ideas about how to achieve it. And on every major decision, his advice has been the right advice. Need great example, or some compelling personal anecdote about him, his judgement, his values etc.
