Dear Mr. President:

I recently spoke with Chris Dodd and Ari Swiller and they mentioned how much you enjoyed the reception you received at the UJA Young Leadership Washington 10 Conference. As a follow up to my last letter dated 21 March 1996, I would like to give you some statistics on the participants at the conference and the objectives of the UJA Young Leadership Cabinet.

There were 3,000 attendees from 40 states, District of Columbia and Puerto Rico between the ages of 25 and 45 with the median age being 35. (I have attached the number of participants from each state.) The National Young Leadership Cabinet is made up of approximately 500 men and women (between the ages of 35 - 45) from across the country who are committed to and involved in the operations of various institutions within their local Jewish community. Most of the Cabinet members are successful within their profession and are the next generation of leaders for the Jewish community in America. The National Cabinet holds a retreat each year for its members (usually in the summer) to discuss issues affecting the country and their local communities. This allows us to coordinate our efforts when needed. The Washington Conference is held every two years and as you have seen, attracts a large participation from the younger generation of the Jewish community.

Again, I would like to thank you for your participation and your continued support of Israel.

Gore: Republicans picking on Hillary

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"And the Republican candidates should tell them that, too."

GOP presidential candidates have been in Iowa almost daily since last month, campaigning in the hopes of doing well in the Iowa caucuses Feb. 12. Gore's appearance in Sioux City marked his second visit to the state this month as the Clinton-Gore team attempts to balance out the Republican attacks.

During his speech Friday morning to Democratic activists at the Sioux City Convention Center, Gore singled out two Republican candidates — frontrunner Bob Dole and Texas Sen. Phil Gramm — and U.S. House Speaker Newt Gingrich.

The three were full of criticism after Congress passed Clinton's budget and deficit-reduction plan in 1993, Gore said. Dole described Clinton's plans as "job killing," Gingrich said they'd "force a recession," and Gramm said that overall, "American people will be worse off," Gore said.

He said they were so far off "if they were working for the Weather Channel, they would have been fired right away."

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Vice president in Bluffs today

Vice President Al Gore will make a campaign appearance on behalf of President Bill Clinton in Council Bluffs this afternoon.

Gore will rally Democratic caucus-goers at the Best Western Crossroads motel at 12:30 p.m.

Camille Johnston, a spokeswoman for the Re-elect Clinton-Gore Campaign in Des Moines, said the purpose of Gore's visit was to remind voters that Democrats would also hold party caucuses on Feb. 12.

"The caucuses are about party-building and activating Democrats," she said. "The general election is going to be a battle, and this sets us up well for the election."

Clinton is currently the only candidate running for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Clinton said he did the right thing and made our country proud by putting the United States of America in a position to keep the peace that he engineered and negotiated in Bosnia," Gore said.

Gore said the Republicans are trying to gain ground against Clinton by creating "an extremist agenda" to cut Medicare and balance the budget. That is what has led to the government shutdowns, he said.

"They said to America and to our president, 'If you don't swallow this extremist agenda, we will shut down our government. And we don't care about the consequences,'" he said. "They were so devoted to this extremist ideology that they were willing to do harm to the American people in an effort to get their way."

Gore said that's not the way to lead a country.

"Solving problems is what it's all about. And again, Bill Clinton is taking our country in the right direction and making progress," he said.

Gore arrives in F.D. today

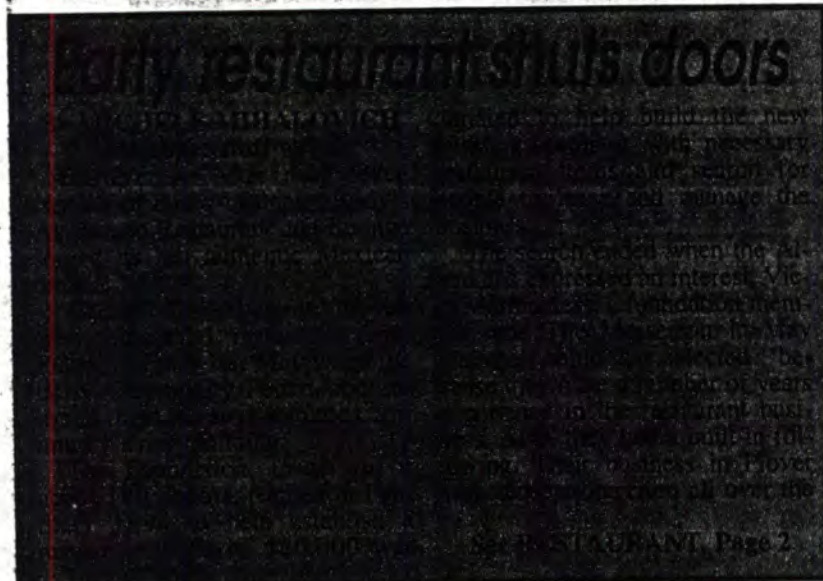
For Sondra Price, being named the Iowa School Nurse of the Year was an award for school nurses areawide.

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'Taunting Robbers suspects behind ba

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Two men were behind bars Friday on suspicion of being the bandits who have held up 18 ern banks over the past couple years while taunting the FBI: couldn't catch them.

At a news conference here, the FBI showed off bombs, masks of President Clinton and Richard Nixon they said were the pair. The items were seized in a raid Thursday night in Kansas City.

Peter Langan, 37, was arrested Thursday on a federal fugiti after a shootout with authorities in Columbus, Ohio. Richard L. Jr., 37, was captured on Monday in Cincinnati.

Authorities believe the two have hit at least 18 Midwes since January 1994, stealing more than \$250,000 and writin newspapers making fun of the bureau.

Guthrie and Langan are believed to have "extremist phil and have expressed hatred for blacks, Jews, the FBI and the ernment, said David Tubbs, special agent in charge of the FB Kansas City. There was no indication of any link with the City bombing, he said.

The material seized outside Kansas City included a semiau fle and pistol, a booby-trapped wooden crate, a military gas m: ta Claus suit, a copy of Adolf Hitler's "Mein Kampf," two ja "FBI" lettered on the back and literature from the Aryan Nat supremacist group.

FBI officials had previously speculated that the bandits, FBI logos while holding up banks and used agents' names wh getaway cars, had a grudge against the government.

Various charges have been filed against them in several jur including bank robbery, assault on federal officers and we: bomb-making charges, Tubbs said.

O'Donovan Criticized For Ties With Clinton

The Georgetown Ignatian Society has called for University President Leo J. O'Donovan, SJ, to resign should he fail to denounce President Bill Clinton's (SFS '68) recent veto of a bill that would have banned partial birth abortions.

Ann Sheridan, president of The Georgetown Ignatian Society, said her organization asked University President Leo J. O'Donovan, SJ, to write a letter to the editor in the April 16 issue of THE HOYA repudiating Clinton's veto of the bill. Partial birth abortion is a rare procedure used to end late-stage pregnancies.

The bill, vetoed on April 10, would

William Peter Blatty (CAS '50), author of 'The Exorcist' and member of the Georgetown Ignatian Society, said in a press release he is concerned that O'Donovan is compromising the university's Catholic identity.

"It is dumbfounding that a Georgetown Jesuit could publicly berate John Thompson for wanting to own a few slot machines, and then keep silent on the horrors of the late-term partial birth abortion," according to the press release.

According to Sheridan, Clinton is taking advantage of O'Donovan. "I don't think [O'Donovan is] bright enough to know it," Sheridan said.

According to Roger Williams, associ-

or communications, university relations, is committed to the anti-abortion stance.

(SFS '50), an attorney in the district and Ignatian Society, said the priest rested in hearing from an abortion viewpoint. "Big federal grants, big federal grants, he federal government there's a relationship between O'Donovan's fawning government grants

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"But I speak my heart nonetheless, trusting, hoping, that this foolishly impractical gesture may somehow move this good and decent man, Fr. Leo O'Donovan, to an act of courage I am convinced is more than easily within his reach," Blatty said. "Nobody hates you, Leo; but couldn't we render just a little bit more to God and quite a bit less to Bill?"

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"The issue is that Clinton is out to get the pro-abortion vote and O'Donovan is supporting him. He doesn't have the luxury as a priest to be as free [as a layperson]," Sheridan said.

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The bill, vetoed on April 10, would have only allowed partial birth abortions in order to save a woman's life. Clinton would not support the ban because it did not permit exceptions in cases that could seriously hurt a woman's health.

The HOYA did not receive a letter from O'Donovan for the April 16 edition.

The society, which is committed to the ideals of the Catholic Church, consists of 20 members locally and has a mailing list of approximately 1,200 members, according to Sheridan.

Sheridan said she is concerned that O'Donovan has a personal relationship with Clinton and consequently will not criticize his veto of the bill.

In a prepared statement, O'Donovan responded to the charges yesterday.

"As a Catholic Jesuit university, Georgetown remains faithful to the Catholic Church's position concerning the sanctity of human life. I am certain that President Clinton knows that I remain unalterably opposed to abortion. I have made my views known on this subject previously and I will continue to do so in the future."

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According to Roger Williams, associate vice president for communications, alumni and university relations, O'Donovan remains committed to the Roman Catholic anti-abortion stance.

Charles Molineaux (SFS '50), an attorney at Wickwire-Gavin in the district and a member of The Ignatian Society, said the society is not interested in hearing O'Donovan's anti-abortion viewpoint.

"Georgetown gets big federal grants and contracts from the federal government. You have to assume there's a relationship between O'Donovan's fawning over Clinton and these government grants and contracts."

Blatty agreed that O'Donovan has done little to publicize the Catholic Church's outrage with Clinton.
