A BRIEF HISTORY OF KOREAN ACTIONS

(Abstracted from USS Juneau History by Larry W. Jewell)

- I. May 1950, USS JUNEAU Proceeds to WestPac.
- II. 25 June 1950 North Korea invades South Korea.
- III. Vice Admiral C. Turner Joy Commander, Far East Naval Forces Deploys USS Juneau to patrol the 38th parallel to prevent enemy landings.
- IV. 29 June 1950 USS Juneau conducts first shore bombardments at Bobkuko, KO destroying enemy shore installations.
- V. July 1950 Established the Formosa Straits Patrol.
- VI. 2 July 1950 engaged in the first naval action sinking 3 enemy torpedo boats near Chumonchin Chan and supported raiding parties along the coast.
- VII. 18 July 1950 together with British units laid down a deadly barrage on enemy troop concentrations near Yongdok slowing the N. Korean advances southward.
- VIII. 1 November 1951 to 25 February 1952, USS Juneau 20 mm & 40 mm armament was replaced with (14) twin gun mounts of 3".50 rapid fire anti-aircraft guns.
- IX. 19 April 1952 she relieved U.S.S. IOWA BB-61 on the bomblines, providing support for the Republic of Korea Corps, as a unit of TASK FORCE 77.
- X. 22 April 1952 she became the Flagship for Rear Admiral J. M. Higgins, Commander CruDiv 5.
- XI. 1 June 1952 she began surveillance patrols in the Tsushima Straits.
- XII. For the remainder of her deployment she had various strikes on various N. Korea & Chinese units, firing on bunkers, supply areas, roads, railroads, mortar positions as well as providing anti-aircraft defense, plane guard and air control duties for Task Force 77.

Dear President Clinton:

On June 21, 2000 you will be receiving a small number of elderly World War II veterans at the White House, to honor them with the Congressional Medal of Honor. A very good friend of ours, **Mr. Rudolph Davila** will be one of the men being so honored.

Please be advised that Mr. Davila does not have the use of his right hand or arm. (He sustained a battlefield injury during the war...two years after the action for which he is receiving the Medal of Honor, which left him without the use of his right arm.) Therefore, when he is presented to you, and it is time for the two of you to shake hands, Mr. Davila will proudly present his left hand for you to shake.

I am writing to you to let you know how extremely pleased Mr. Davila would be if you were prepared to extend **your left hand** to vigorously shake his hand, instead of there being a brief, potentially awkward, moment should you first extend your right hand.

I know that this may sound like a very small point. But, I can assure you Mr. President, that it would mean a great deal to Mr. Davila, and I suspect the kind gesture on your part would not be overlooked by the news media present.

My family and I have had the distinct privilege of knowing Mr. Davila and his wife Harriet (recently deceased) since 1950, when Mrs. Davila first went to work as a nurse in my father's medical office in Los Angeles. I know of no finer Americans. They represent the epitome of the spirit and courage of Americans so beautifully portrayed by Tom Brokaw in his best-selling book *The Greatest Generation*.

Dear Attorney General Reno:

We write to urgently request that the Department of Justice immediately file an amicus curiae brief in support of the original writ of habeas corpus filed by Texas death row inmate Gary Graham. While legal papers will be filed in the United States Supreme Court seeking a stay of execution and other relief, Mr. Graham is still scheduled to be executed tomorrow in Texas.

As you well know, Mr. Graham has been on death row for 19 years, convicted on the testimony of a single eyewitness with a poor view of the crime. The witness, however, is directly contradicted by additional eyewitnesses who have never been heard in court. Moreover, the police department's own ballistics tests determined that Graham's gun, which allegedly linked him to the crime, was not used in the murder. In fact, not a single shred of physical evidence has linked Mr. Graham to the crime. Nonetheless, on May 1, 2000, the Supreme Court refused to grant Mr. Graham's petition for a writ of certiorari to challenge the arbitrary application of the AntiTerrorism and Effective Death Penalty Act of 1996, which procedurally bars his federal habeas corpus petition.

Mr. Graham's case underscores the inaccuracies of the capital punishment as implemented in Texas. Therefore, we also request that the Justice Department immediately commence an investigation of state practices in Texas. In 1993, the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, on behalf of Gary Graham, filed a civil rights complaint with the Department of Justice that claimed:

- * The state of Texas lacks an adequate legal representation system for persons charged with capital crimes. The state does not have a public defender system and instead utilizes a court-appointed attorney system that has been called into question because of cronyism and the paltry allocation of financial resources.

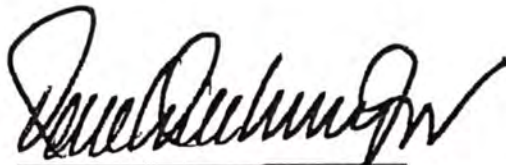

* The Texas Board of Pardons and Parole lacks constitutional safeguards. In fact, former members of the Board have acknowledged that innocent people may have been executed because of the Board's failure to properly consider clemency petitions.

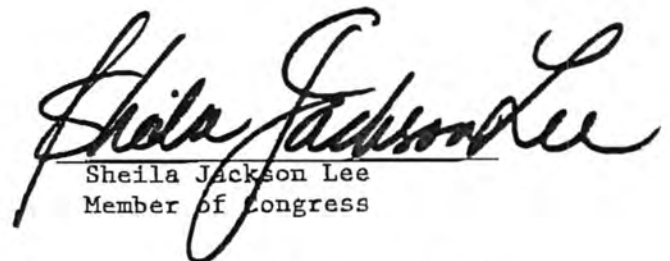
* Blatant racial disparities exist in the administration of the death penalty in Texas. The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that the state of Texas illegally offered testimony alleging that race could predict the future dangerousness.

The Department of Justice has never responded to this complaint. We strongly believe that this matter demands your immediate attention and trust that you will give this request your most careful consideration.

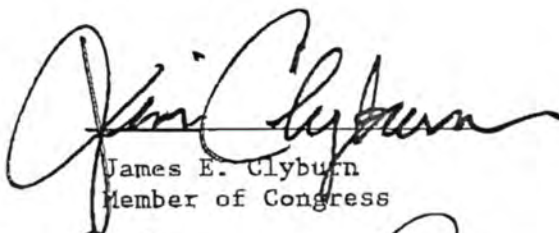

It's been called a declaration of war.

who experienced it firsthand: musicians, artists, journalists, intellectuals, students, budding activists, even the waitresses and bartenders who worked the clubs.

In the more than sixty years since its 1939 debut at Café Society, the legendary Greenwich Village nightclub, "Strange Fruit" has been performed by everyone from Nina Simone and Cassandra Wilson to Tori Amos, Sting, and UB40. Jazz lovers, American history buffs, fans of Billie Holiday, and anyone who cares about racial justice will enjoy *Strange Fruit*—the story of a song that foretold a movement, and the lady who dared to sing it.

David Margolick is a contributing editor for *Vanity Fair*. Prior to that, he was the National Legal Affairs Editor for the *New York Times*, where he wrote "At the Bar," a popular weekly legal column, and was nominated four times for the Pulitzer Prize.

He has written two prior books: *Undue Influence: The Epic Battle for the Johnson & Johnson Fortune* and *At The Bar: The Passions and Peccadillos of American Lawyers*.

Hilton Als is a staff writer for *The New Yorker*. His first book, *The Women*, is out in paperback from Noonday Press.

Memorandum to the President

Re: Reflections on the Monument Strategy

Since you asked me in a letter on November 10, 1998, to consider places in the west that would be appropriate for national monument designation, I have recommended and you have created eight national monuments. Along with the Forest Service monument at Sequoia and today's designation of Abraham Lincoln's summer retreat, you have set aside more than 3 1/2 million acres of land for future generations. With only six months remaining, we are at an important juncture in this strategy.

The environmental groups and others will argue that after the election you will have a free hand to designate countless new national monuments. I want to caution you about that approach. Over the past year, we have been able to make these designations work and stick because of the advance public support we have cultivated. The danger after the election lies in a public perception that the designations that have not been discussed publicly are arbitrary and without public support. Ultimately, such action could collapse the whole strategy and set Congress up to bring down everything we have accomplished in preserving these important landscapes. I believe the opportunities after the election will be few and should be centered around completing work that has already begun.

Rather than rely on an end-game strategy, I hope we will continue to engage in the local processes and designate fitting landscapes under the Antiquities Act over the next few months as the opportunities arise.

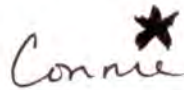

When I learned I was to be promoted, I told a colleague of mine in the Medical Unit that I was speechless and didn't know what to say. My astute colleague quickly reminded me, "well, that won't last very long."

I believe ceremonies such as these should recognize and honor the many people who made the promotion possible. Many of you are responsible for this special day. I would like to acknowledge those people who have played a special role in my life.

First of all: my family. Thank you to my husband, Richard Stevens, for your love, patience, and understanding. Not only are you my valued domestic advisor and mentor, but you continue to be my best friend for the past 28 years.

Thank you to our sons, Andrew and Jason Stevens. Thank you for your support, encouragement, and love. You, more than anyone, know how to keep me humble. You will forever be my greatest achievement in life.

Retired Navy Captain Stephen Duich - my first commanding officer over 17 years ago on the USS Prairie. Thank you for teaching me many lessons about leadership.

Captain John Mitas - as the chief of medicine at the Naval Hospital in San Diego - you were my finest boss. Thank you for nominating me to become a White House Physician. I wouldn't be here if it hadn't been for your trust and confidence in me.

Captain Al Roberts - Thank you for leaving the White House! If you hadn't vacated the Navy Physician billet, I wouldn't be here today. Thank you for selecting me. Thank you for your guidance and wisdom throughout the years.

Retired RADM and now President of Marian College, Dick Ridenour Thank you for your mentorship and friendship.

Retired Navy Commander Bill McGee who is now Director of Operations at Marian College - Thank you for being my right hand and right brain at the White House. You will forever be a true friend.

I would also like to acknowledge my medical school - the Uniformed Services University School of Medicine - America's military medical school. I am honored that the President of USU, President James Zimble, a former Surgeon General of the Navy, is here today. President Zimble, please convey my gratitude to the outstanding professors and staff at USU. In the span of only ten years, the White House Medical Unit has selected eight graduates of USU who have served as White House Physicians - more than any other medical school in America.

My promotion today has special meaning for my family. I came from a Navy family where my father, uncles, cousins, and great uncles have dedicated over 100 years of accumulated service to the Navy.

My father served six admirals during his career. I grew up in a home where the name "admeeral" took on god-like qualities. Occasionally, I would accompany my father on a weekend to his work place - which was the

admiral's quarters or home. We never went through the front door. We always entered through the back door, through the kitchen.

Actually, as I look back I realize this was excellent preparation for my life at the White House where we usually enter buildings through the garage, loading dock or kitchen.

Whenever I would visit my father in the admiral's house, we would stay only in the kitchen. At that time, we believed it was our place. At that time, my father not only accepted this but he was grateful for the opportunity to serve as a steward. It was his honor to serve in this way.

And this is why we are here today. In this beautiful room. The President and Mrs. Clinton have graciously offered to hold the ceremony here - in the State Dining Room - with President Lincoln looking on. For it was in the dining room and adjoining kitchen where my father and many stewards before him served America.

I believe this promotion honors not just me and my family. I believe this promotion honors the thousands of Filipino American servicemen who have come before me - who have paved the way. For many of them, the only way they could serve America was as stewards in the kitchens, dining rooms, and in the homes of senior officers.

I am blessed to stand before you today as proof that Filipino Americans no longer have to go through the kitchen door to succeed in the United States Navy.

Therefore, it is only fitting that the daughter of a Filipino Navy steward receive this honor in the State Dining Room. If today you hear the sound of glass breaking, it's not kitchen glassware being broken. It's the ceiling being shattered.

Throughout my eight years at the White House, I have worked side by side with Filipino mess specialists who take care of the President. The Master Chiefs who serve as the President's personal valets have been a daily reminder to me of where I came from and why I am here - and that is, to serve. I thank all of the members of the Mess, and especially, the Master Chiefs, for their constant example of service and humility.

Finally, I thank President and Mrs. Clinton for making this all possible. Your administration has done more to recognize and honor Asian Pacific Americans than any other administration in history. We thank you for that.

Thank you, Mr. President, for your trust, your kindness, your unending support, and your wonderful sense of humor. It is an honor to be your physician. I guess you can say, today, we've had a role reversal. Today, the patient has taken care of the doctor.

Mrs. Clinton: thank you for your graciousness and kindness to me and the Medical Unit. I will always cherish the privilege of having served as your family physician.

Let me conclude by thanking all of you once again. You have all played a special role in my life and I am grateful to you. Thank you.

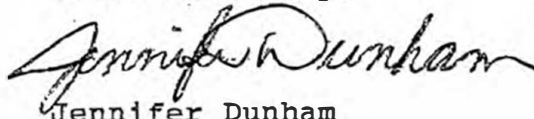
Mr. Leopoulos thought you might be able to help me in obtaining employment within the government in the Washington area. I would appreciate any assistance you could give me.
