Dear Mr. President,

Our night at the White House was unforgettable and we can't thank you enough for making it possible. Ann McCoy couldn't have been more welcoming or helpful. When Diane read the fireplace plaque which says that Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation in the room in which she and I were to sleep she burst into tears. I misted up myself when I entered the Yellow Room and thought of the quiet evenings an exhausted FDR had spent there during the war years with his adoring cousin, Daisy Suckley. It's one thing to have written about the White House, something else entirely to live in it -- even for only a few hours. And I couldn't help noticing that among the CDs behind your desk in the Treaty Room was the Dexter Gordon boxed set. As Wynton Marsalis wistfully said to me not long ago: When will we ever again have a President who not only knows who Dexter Gordon was but actually likes to hear him play!

But above all, we'll treasure the early morning hours we spent with you in the solarium, listening to you talk a little about your plans for the future. I was especially interested to hear you speak so frankly of your ambivalence about writing a book too soon. For my sins, I once had to read through all the presidential memoirs in order. As you said, most of them aren't worth much. The first may also be the most unreadable -- Mr. Buchanan's Administration on the Eve of the Rebellion (1866) in which, in order not to seem immodest, James Buchanan refers to himself only in the third person -- sometimes as "the late president." But something of that same strained detachment makes the books written by most of his successors almost as tedious. All presidential parents seem to have been saintly. Ambition never has anything to do with how a president reaches the White House. Politics is what his opponents indulge in. And the challenges presidents face are usually fitted into tidy, compartmentalized chapters -- "The Economy," "Foreign Policy," "Peace-Making" -- of the kind that make historians and political scientists feel comfortable but convey almost nothing of how things must actually look from behind the president's desk.

Some years ago, Dick Reeves wrote a book called President Kennedy: Profile of Power. It's not a great book by any means, but I was impressed by how vividly it conveyed Kennedy's ongoing battle simply to stay ahead of the conflicting demands and disconnected events that seemed to press in on him all at once. (The men who met with him at the White House to discuss the pros and cons of encouraging the overthrow of the Diem regime on August 28, 1963, I remember reading, had to talk louder than usual to be heard over the loudspeakers on the mall where 200,000 people had gathered for the March on Washington.) If your book set out to convey something of the simultaneity of presidential challenges - political, personal, economic, international, and all the rest - coming at you in every season and at all hours of the day and night I think it would both grip the general reader as other presidential memoirs have not and make a major contribution to the public's understanding of the presidency, as well.

In any case, we will always be grateful to you for inviting us to the White House. Diane and I hope that when you and the Senator move to New York we'll be able to return your kindness in some small measure here on West End Avenue. I can vouch for the Indian food.

The internet is seeing a rapid growth within our country. We now have about 3.5 million Indians having access to the Net.

I am sure that with increasing connectivity more and more Indians will begin to have access to the enormous reservoir of knowledge and information over the Internet.

We are in the process of using satellite communications for providing information access to the villages.

We hope to use the existing Ku band facilities on INSAT 3B and on MEASAT 1 and 2 satellites for providing services like distance learning, telemedicine, e-government and ecommerce to citizens of the state.

The internet as it exists today is largely oriented towards the English language and western culture. There is every need therefore to ensure that different cultures and different languages also find a place over the Internet.

I am sure that the efforts of Greenstar in trying to capture India's art and culture, music, legends, literature and history will help a better understanding and appreciation of India's rich past.

The infrastructure that will be set up by Greenstar will also help in villagers participating in the new economy. I am convinced that network connectivity can add substantially to incomes of farmers and artisans residing in the villages.

I am happy that Greenstar is focusing on clean energy. There is every need to exploit solar power for meeting the energy needs in our country. Too much dependence on thermal power is not only expensive but is also a threat to the environment.

I believe that the future will see more and more decentralised and local power generation.

I am therefore keen to see that the efforts of Greenstar succeed. Greenstar is one of the few companies focused primarily on bringing the benefits of information technology to rural areas.

I take this opportunity to convey my best wishes for the success of the endeavours of Greenstar in connecting villages using innovative solutions.

I would particularly like to compliment Dr. Charles F. Gay for his commitment to the

cause of making technology available for the development of rural communities. As a former Director of the Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory he brings rich experience to the field.

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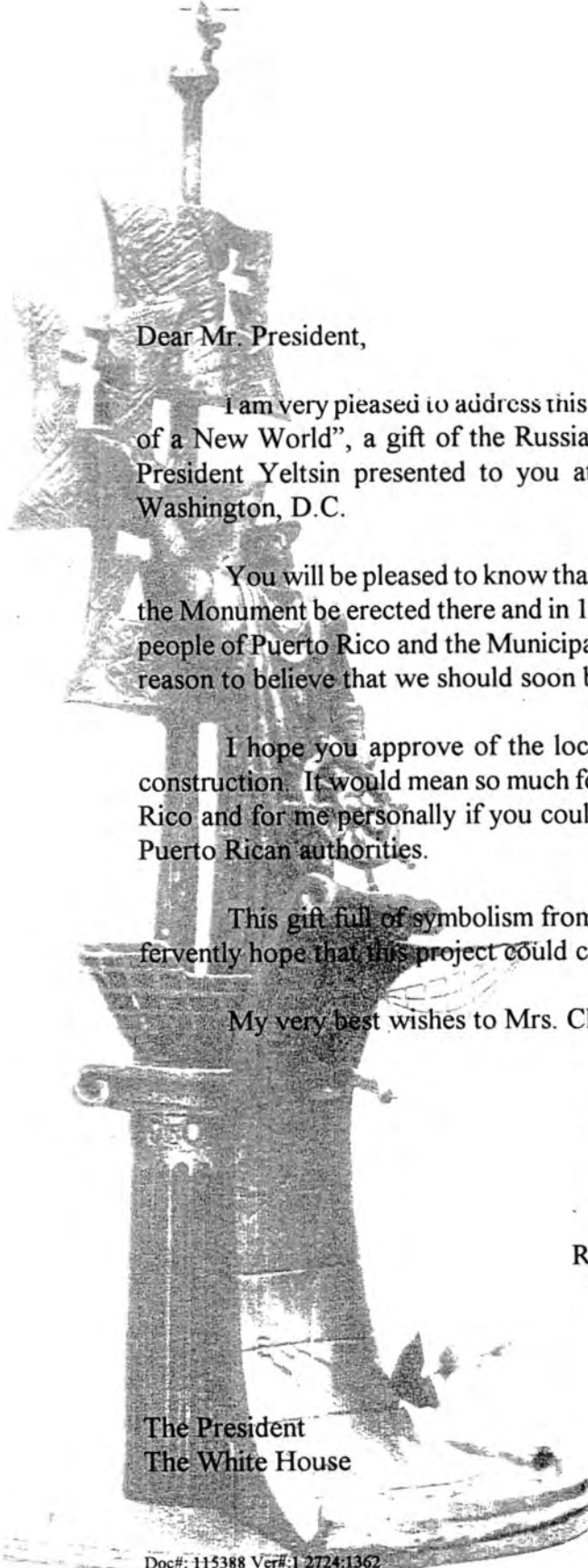

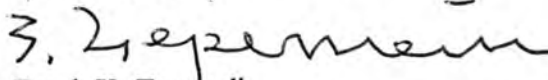

Dear Mr. President:

Congratulations on Hillary's powerful 12 point victory in New York. A great lesson for us all.

I send you a few amateur musing on today's political environment.

We are watching the wind down of the last election of the 20th Century! I find it very useful to examine the ongoing election from the perspective of some consumer research which we at Greenstar are using as we develop our marketing model. Paul H. Ray of the San Francisco consumer research firm American Lives has written that all of the USA is divided into three parts -- to paraphrase Julius Caesar.

Traditionalism / Heartlanders: 29% Core Bush Vote

[Just look at the states Bush won in the middle, but not the key coasts! The Heartlanders are also probably the most virulent 'Clinton haters'.]

Modernism: 47% heavily contested.

[Bush does better appealing to males with a college degree or some college - his edge?]

Cultural Creatives: 24% Core Gore & HRC votes. Nader's only voters.

[HRC's 12% margin is key - she finds a way to hold the Cultural Creatives, twice as many women as men, while presenting a very appealing position to the Moderns! Gore, on the other hand is significantly less successful in appealing to the Moderns, especially the key sector of men without advanced academic degrees.

I observe that the HRC strategy with its 12% margin made the Nader factor irrelevant. However, Gore lost 100,000 of his core Cultural Creative votes in Florida alone to Nader. Gore's challenge, in hind sight, was to do so well with the Moderns that defections to Nader were reduced to a noise factor.

Note that the Cultural Creatives are two full stages beyond the comfort zone of the Heartlanders. My guess is that their sense of isolation and of being a declining minority makes them, at best, deeply suspicious of a group two steps removed from their comfort zone. No wonder they find Cultural Creatives, such as the Clintons and the Gores, very hard to like. They must perceive them as clear and present dangers.]

What are the implications for the future of the Democratic party? The HRC model looks to me to be on the critical path to the Democratic coalition for the 21st century. Can the party as a whole adopt and improve on this strategy? Lastly, when will we have the first election which truly captures the spirit of the 21st century, rather than looking back on the 20th?

"The first world view is **Traditionalism**. It is the belief system for about 29 percent of Americans (56 million adults) who might also be called Heartlanders. In America, traditionalism often takes the form of country folks rebelling against big-city slickers. Heartlanders believe in a nostalgic image of small towns and strong churches that defines the Good Old American Ways. That image may owe as much to John Wayne and Jimmy Stewart movies as to any historical reality, but for them it is a powerful reminder of how things ought to be.

The second world view is **Modernism**. It holds sway over about 47 percent of Americans, or 88 million adults. Modernism emerged 450 years ago as the governing world view of the urban merchant classes and other creators of the modern economy. It defines modern politicians, military leaders, scientists, and intellectuals. Modernists place high value on personal success, consumerism, materialism, and technological rationality. It's not too far off to say that Moderns see the world through the same filters as Time magazine.

The third and newest world view goes beyond Modernism. Its current adherents are the **Cultural Creatives**, who claim 24 percent of U.S. adults (44 million). Trans-Modernism began with esoteric spiritual movements such as 19th-century American Transcendentalism. It gained strength as Western intellectuals discovered the diversity and coherence of other religions and philosophies. It caught fire in the 1960s, as millions of young people joined "movements" for human potential, civil rights, peace, jobs, social justice, ecology, and equal rights for women."

"Cultural Creatives" offer Ideas and Hope

You are not alone!

That's the good news from a 1995 survey on American values: A whole new population that is more idealistic and globally oriented has emerged in the U.S. in the last decade.

Paul H. Ray of the San Francisco consumer research firm American Lives, which conducted the survey, calls this new population the "Cultural Creatives," because "they are the ones who are coming up with most new ideas in American culture, operating on the leading edge of cultural change." Ten years ago, Ray notes, there were so few people in this subculture that no one bothered to measure them. Today, his research indicates, there are some 44 million Cultural Creatives in the U.S., an astonishing growth.

Who are they? The survey shows that Cultural Creatives are fairly well distributed over the whole country, of median income and of median age, and have higher than average education (30 percent are college graduates). About half are focused primarily on the environment; Ray calls these the "Greens." The other half, whom Ray calls "Core Cultural Creatives," share a strong interest in

environmental sustainability, but are also seriously concerned with spirituality, psychology, and person-centered values. In the Greens, there are slightly more women than men; in the Core group, women outnumber men two to one.

But Cultural Creatives face a dilemma, Ray says: They don't know there are so many others out there who think as they do, and there is no central clearing house where they can encounter each other. Ray hopes that members of this new subculture will form themselves into a cultural revitalization movement, something he believes modern society needs in order to survive. "It would be

similar," he explains, "to a values-based social movement in its appeal to deeply held values, but it differs strongly in that it seeks to move off into the new, rather than to return to an idealized past, or to restore old ethnic or religious 'purities.'"

In defining the beliefs and attitudes of Core Cultural Creatives, Ray includes the following which are held by at least 60 percent of the group (in descending order of importance):

LOVE OF THE FOREIGN - travel to other countries, different cultures, the exotic

FEARS/CONCERNS about violence and abuse of women and children

NEIGHBORHOOD AND COMMUNITY - affirmation of the need for society to rebuild neighborhoods and communities

SENSE OF NATURE AS SACRED - redwood groves, planetary stewardship, etc.

ECOLOGICAL SUSTAINABILITY - concern for the global environment, for extinction of species, for overpopulation, and a willingness to pay for remedies

FAMILY ORIENTATION - family should come first in peoples' concerns

FEMINISM - equal pay for women, women as managers/leaders, not confined to traditional roles

VOLUNTARY SIMPLICITY - live simpler lifestyles, with fewer possessions

RELIGIOUS MYSTERIES- interest in the paranormal, reincarnation, afterlife, meditation

DISTRUST OF BIG BUSINESS - too much power/wealth, too profit-oriented

CONCERN FOR RELATIONSHIPS - creating/maintaining them in all situations

SELF ACTUALIZATION - self-discovery, creativity, psychological growth, personal uniqueness

ALTRUISM - helping others, volunteering, wanting to create a better society

ALTERNATIVE HEALTH CARE

DESIRE FOR TRADITIONAL VALUES

These are shared values, Ray emphasizes, believing that studying peoples' values is a much better way of predicting their behavior (lifestyles, purchasing habits, social concerns, spirituality), than analyzing demographics (age, education, income, racial background, etc.). Also, Ray points out that the other two major subcultures in American society - which he defines as "Traditional" and "Modern" - share some of the values that rank highest with Cultural Creatives.

But he makes it clear that this new group is moving a step beyond values the other two subcultures hold that have ceased to be useful in today's world and, in fact, now cause serious societal problems. As examples, Ray lists materialism (greed, doing it for the money, wanting to own more property), financial problems (spending beyond one's needs and means), and cynicism (anti-idealism, political alienation, refusal to believe in caring) as the three top characteristics of those in the Modern subculture.

While Ray believes Cultural Creatives hold the values society needs in the coming years, he is not sure they will prevail: "In the next two decades, our world will either be dramatically better or dramatically worse. The one thing that cannot happen is just 'more of the same.' Most trends of the past are simply not sustainable. The era of the obvious steps to progress is gone, and we face the Great Divide. It really could go either way: Our future is not foreordained.

"We are at a tipping point in civilization. This means we have to be ready to choose a good path. The quality of our 'image of the future,' and the quality of our creative efforts based on it, will determine which way our future develops over the next generation or two. All that is certain is that the stakes have been raised."

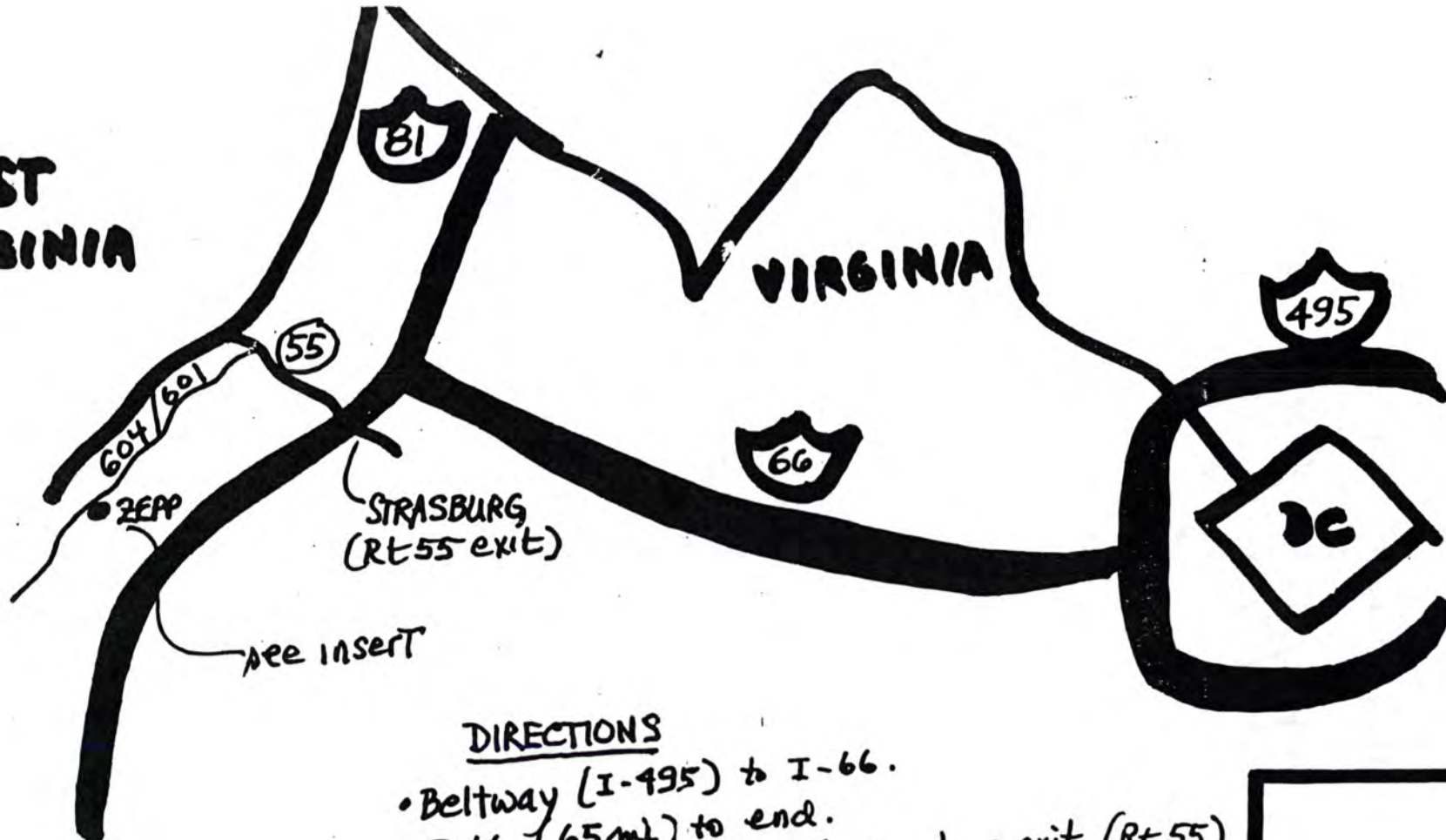

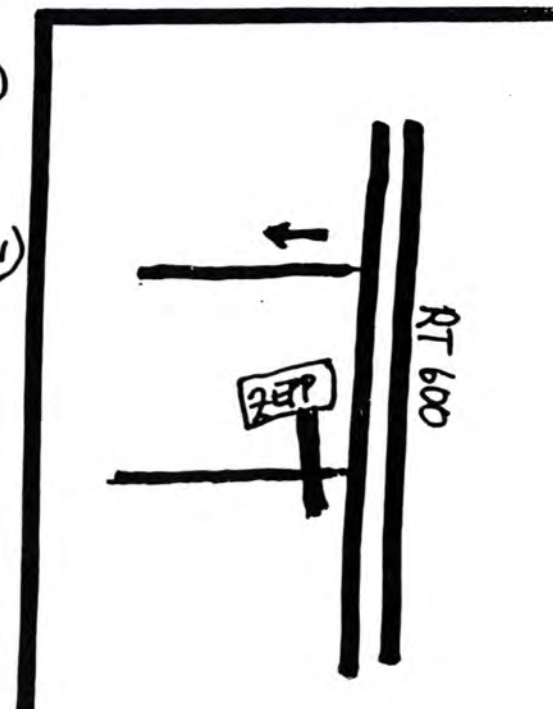

While our ability to influence a congressional earmark at this time is limited, there are existing programs that could be tapped to provide assistance for the construction of the proposed Marian Wright Edelman Library and for future purchases of information technology. OMB staff identified the following Federal programs that could be used to provide funding for the library in Bennettsville, South Carolina. Sylvia plans to call Ersine Bowles to relay this information to him.

- The Department of Education does not have construction funds for libraries, and would be unenthusiastic about an earmark.
- Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding could be used if the library will benefit the whole community and it meets low-income criteria (at least 51 percent low or moderate-income residents). Bennettsville receives a direct allocation of CDBG funding, so additional State or Federal involvement would not be necessary.
- There is the possibility for a small HUD Economic Development Initiative grant (the average size of an EDI grant is \$500,000).
- The Department of Commerce has programs to help with information technology purchases once the library is built. The library could apply through the e-rate program for discounts on telecommunications and Internet technologies. Also, there is a Technology Opportunities Program, which provides competitively-awarded matching grants to libraries for projects demonstrating innovative uses of information technology.
- Finally, the Department of Agriculture may be able to provide a grant and/or low-interest loan to help with construction through the Community Facility program. Bennettsville is small enough and meets the income criteria, so it is eligible. The only issue is whether it would be able to repay the loan (community facility assistance is usually provided as a loan/grant package.) USDA could also help with the purchase of information technology through its

Distance Learning and Telecommunications program. USDA is going to reach out to the community.

Dear Mr. President:

I would like your help in honoring our mutual friend, Marian Wright Edelman. I don't have to tell you about Marian and her work for children, since you are very familiar with it. What I would like to do is tell you a little bit about Marian as a child and what we plan to do to honor her and why.

Marian was born in Bennettsville, South Carolina, where her father was a minister. Her father's church and the manse where they lived are about 100 yards from what I can only call the McColl compound. This included the original home of my great grandfather, D. D. McColl, and the homes of his daughter and three sons. While only 100 yards separated us, we were light-years apart. The street between our homes was the demarcation line above which blacks were not allowed to go after 7:00 p.m. on Saturday night. As a child, Marian could not go in the public library, as access was denied to people of color. While I am more than ten years older than she, I knew her father and remember her as a child. My father liked Reverend Wright, and we occasionally stopped and spoke. Both Marian and I have restored our family homes, which are still 100 yards apart.

My goal, and that of other people in Bennettsville, is to build a new community library at a site located between the two homes on the site of the demarcation line that belonged to the African-Americans. We want it to be a library for all the people. We want to name it after Marian Wright Edelman, and we plan to put "Open to Everyone" or "Everyone is Welcome" across the door. We are raising money from the private sector, from our state, from our county and from our community. We could use some federal help. The project will cost about \$5,000,000. We want it to be a state-of-the-art library, including computer labs and Internet connections. As an aside, Marlboro County, of which Bennettsville is the

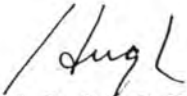

county seat, is approximately 55% African-American. It is a poor community now. When cotton was king, it was a very wealthy town; however, the African-Americans never participated in that wealth. The white leadership today is working hard to bring jobs to the community and to help lift the people. The new library would go a long way to help with that goal. Can you help us make this happen? Thank you for reading this letter.

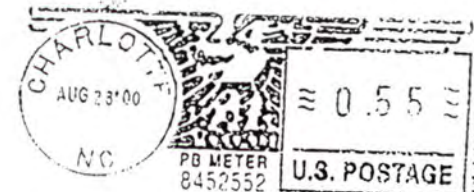

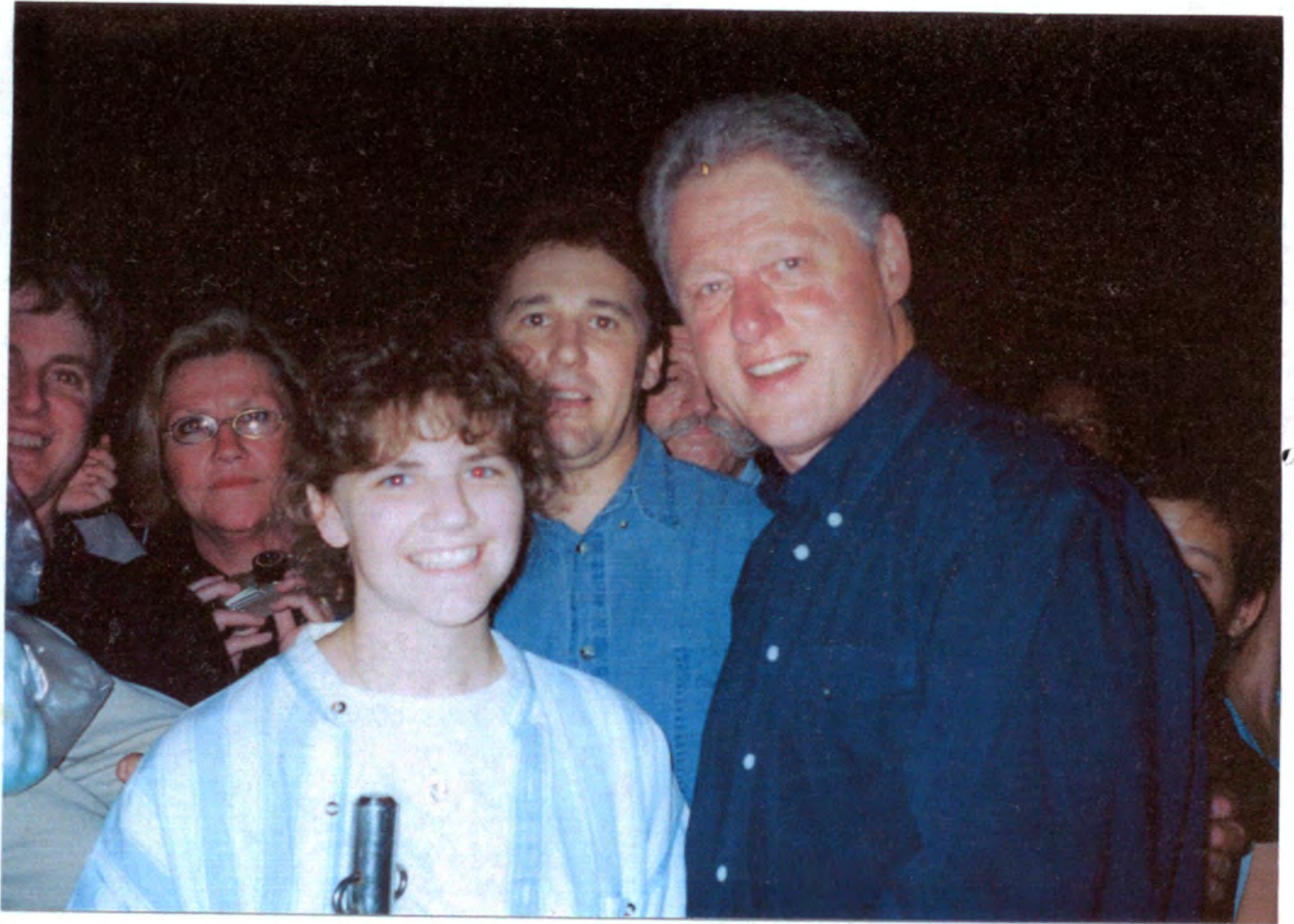
