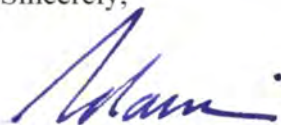

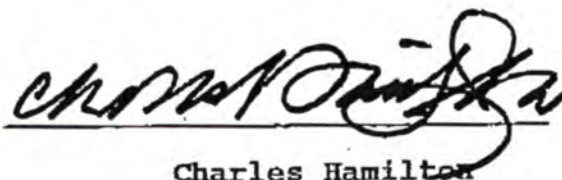

Mary,

You are SO SO wonderful. As you expected, I did talk to the President yesterday at the LZ in Connecticut and also a few times in New York as I was the event chair for "The Iceman Cometh." I have found through years of mistakes that it is usually far better to work things at the staff level and not circumvent the system. While I may get what I want sooner going directly to the President, staff often becomes resentful. (I am certainly not inferring in the least that you or Nancy fall into this category. I also endeavor to operate at Bear Stearns in the same manner.)

Therefore, in direct answer to your question, although I certainly feel close enough to the President to ask him directly about both Douglas Campbell's request but also about my interest in being invited to watching a game or movie with him, I did not do either.

As it turns out, the President commented to me how very appreciative he was that I undertook the Majority 2000 event and how much that he enjoyed it. In retrospect perhaps, I should have at the least mentioned either of these topics to him.

Alas, however, I did not and must once again ask your assistance to follow through. If either prove difficult, I am sure there will be other opportunities when I will have the opportunity to ask him directly.

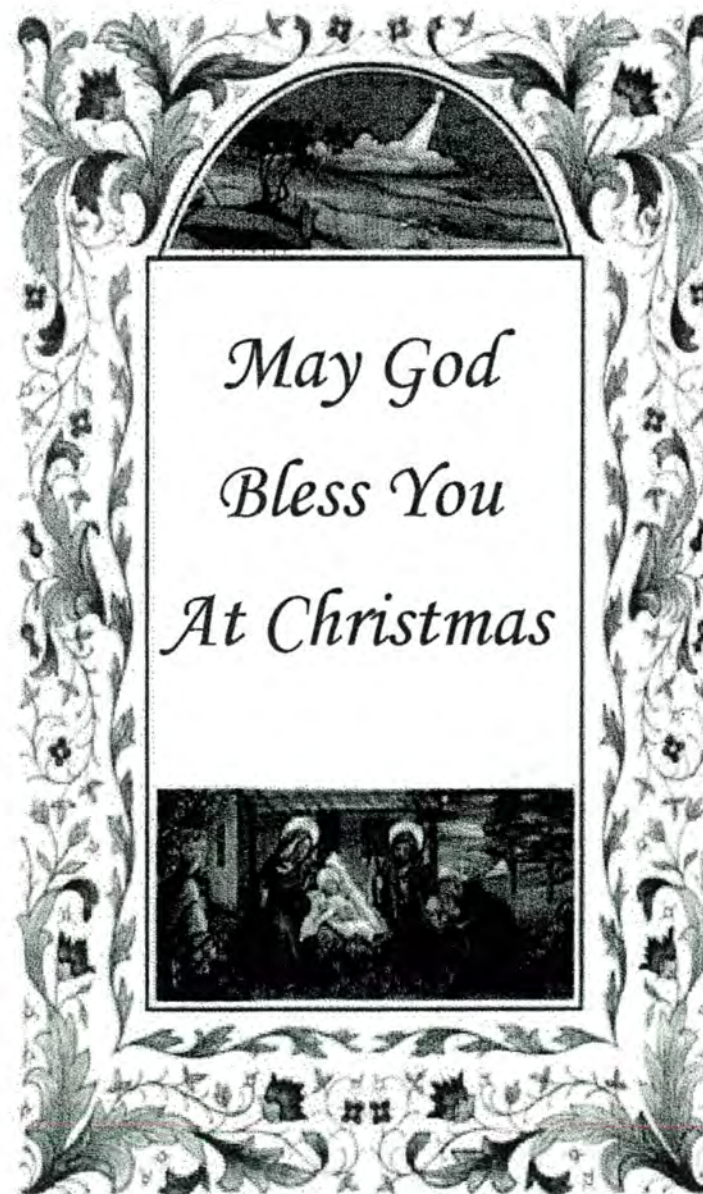

Like It Was Yesterday

By Bill Clinton

A few months before the end of his presidency, President Clinton met with the editor in the Oval Office to talk about games and other childhood memories. This piece is drawn from that interview.

Growing up in the South was hot so we were outside all the time. You could be outside 12 months a year; it was sometimes 70 degrees on Christmas Day. There was the sense that we just lived outside. And if we were outside, we would make up a game....

From age 8 until I was 14, I was playing games constantly. All the obvious ones: touch football, softball, and hide and seek. Hide and seek was fun because we lived in a great place with a lot of bizarre nooks and crannies.

When we didn't have enough people to put together a game of football or softball, we would just make up a game. We used to play one particular game over and over again. All it required was a ball and a bat and at least two players. You could either pitch to the batter or the batter could just throw the ball up and hit it. The fielder, of course, would try to catch it. If he could catch it in the air, then he got to bat. But, if he

didn't catch it in the air – which was most of the time because we would try to hit it on the ground – then he had to field the ball and stop right where it was fielded. The batter would then put his bat on the ground and the fielder would roll the ball at the bat. If he hit the bat, then he became the batter. But if the ball bounced up and the batter was able to catch it, he got to keep batting.

The key was to field the ball quickly -- the quicker you could get to the ground ball, the shorter the distance you would have to roll the ball. But you also had to learn how to roll the ball essentially *on* the ground; you didn't want it to bounce very much because otherwise it could bounce over the bat. It actually had to hit the bat. It was very good training for fielding and for directional control – rolling the ball made it almost like a bowling game.

I used to play a lot with my friend David Leopoulos who lived only about two blocks from me in Hot Springs. Sometimes we would play with another friend of ours who lived a few more blocks away. And once in a great while we'd have as many as four. But usually it was two or three. My brother, Roger, was 10 years younger than me, so he wasn't old enough to play with us.

We normally played in the back of my house. There was a drive up a hill, and then it was gravel, and then I had a little grass yard to the right as you faced the house. So you might catch the ball on the grass, you might catch the ball on the gravel, but either way, part of the rolling of the ball had to take place over the gravel.

I should confess -- David ^{and} I used to play one not so nice game. We had two huge oak trees in my front yard one of which had a lot of hedges around it -- it was perfect for hiding. David and I would gather acorns and hide behind the trees. Right in front of my house was a thoroughfare, Park Avenue. We would wait for the cars to go by and try and hit the hubcaps with our acorns. We never tried to hit the cars -- anybody could hit a car going by. The idea was to hit the hubcap, because it made the loudest, most delicious sound. Although sometimes if a pickup went by, we'd try to land the acorn in the back of the pickup. But we never wanted to hit a windshield or do any damage.

But one time we hit a guy's hubcap and it sounded like the world was coming to an end -- BONG! The guy put on his brakes, stopped the car, and pulled over. He

came racing up in our yard and we ran and ran. Thank goodness nobody was home to beef to.

Both my folks worked. My mother usually got home by the middle of the afternoon, because she started at 7:00 a.m. in the morning. Very often she was there when I got home from school or shortly thereafter. But the neighborhood was like one big family. Right across the street in the back of my house there was a family that I was very close to. They had three children and they're all still friends of mine to this day. I spent tons of time in their house.

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To me, childhood was about friends and discovery. When I think back on it, I think about how wonderful it was to be outside, even if I was getting stung by a bumble bee or dodging a rattlesnake, or handling tarantulas or centipedes or scorpions – and we had lots of them. Sometimes we'd even cut up the centipedes and watch the sections crawl on each other -- our own little laboratory experiment. Everything we did became a game. That's the way it ought to be.

Bill Clinton was the forty-second president of the United States.
