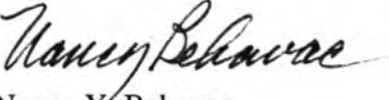

'60s vision earns cellular pioneer national award

When Joel S. Engel began working on cellular telephone technology in the 1960s, most Americans knew of portable phones only by watching the television comedy "Get Smart."

Today more than 20 million Americans have cellular phones, and it is an \$8 billion business.

For his pioneering work nearly 30 years ago, Engel is about to receive one of the nation's most prestigious technology awards.

Engel, vice president of technology at Ameritech Corp., will travel to Washington, D.C., next month to receive the 1994 National Medal of Technology from President Clinton. Fewer than 100 Americans have received the award since it was introduced by the U.S. Depart-

ment of Commerce 10 years ago.

"I'm excited and delighted," Engel, 58, a resident of Highland Park, said Wednesday. "But I have to tell you I almost feel a little guilty accepting it because working (on cellular technology) was so rewarding in itself."

In the late 1960s, Engel led a small group of AT&T/Bell Laboratories engineers in creating the basic architecture for cellular phone systems. Mobile radio phones existed at the time, but they were limited by poor voice quality and the small number of radio channels available for them.

Engel and his colleagues came up with the theory and design that made it possible to create the cellular system used all over the world. The system consists of antennas serving small geographic areas called cells.

Calls are relayed to computers in a switching station, sent to a local phone company office and patched into ordinary phone lines.

Engel's team submitted its findings to the Federal Communications Commission in the early 1970s, setting the stage for the introduction of commercial cellular service in 1984.

"The greatest reward an engineer can have is seeing his stuff be used," said Engel, an avid cellular user.

Although he's less than 10 years away from retirement, Engel still is working on the cutting edge of telecommunications. These days he splits his time between Ameritech's headquarters in Chicago and its office complex in Hoffman Estates. He's developing the interactive video services Ameritech plans to offer customers over their phone lines in the future.

Guests arrive and are admitted at 12:30pm. They are given timed receiving line cards and escorted to the State Floor. Arkansas volunteers are positioned to welcome and guide guests along the way as well as in the different rooms of the State Floor to act as hosts and hostesses.

The Marine combo will be set up in Foyer.

Desserts and drinks will be set up in the East Room so the guests can mingle and enjoy. They will be able to visit the rooms of the State Floor, then at their appointed time, they will go back downstairs to the receiving line which will be set up like the Christmas receiving line in the Diplomatic Receiving Room. Family photos will be taken with the President and First Lady. (Approximately 200 family groups will be here.)

As guests exit the receiving line, they will be directed to the South Lawn where they can take photos of their families with the White House as a backdrop then they will be guided to the Oval Office where they will get a peek inside before going back to the State Floor for more of the reception.

The design of this event was created jointly with the Reunion Committee to achieve the following things:

A traditional engraved Presidential invitation.

A traditional White House reception, with military music, flowers and good things to eat.

An opportunity to see the White House and the Oval Office.

An opportunity to see the President and First Lady and have a photo taken with them.

With the number of guests, the receiving line will have to proceed at a rate of about 2 groups per minute. The Reunion Committee knows the President's time will be spent in the receiving line, but the main objective of most people is to have a photo with the President.

We have also worked with the house staff to keep costs at a minimum since the classmates have to pay for the event. We have projected costs of under \$10,000 and should be fine. I am working with Phil Jamieson on this.

Everyone is very excited about coming...the hardest part will be for the President to keep the receiving line moving. Perhaps it will help the President to know that many people will have to leave to catch planes, so time is important to them as well.

Dear Ralph:

Thanks for your letter regarding the Uruguay Round of GATT.
I appreciate knowing your concerns.

As you know, the Uruguay Round agreement eliminates barriers to U.S. goods and services around the world and will add as much as \$100 billion to \$200 billion per year to our economy when fully implemented. It will provide unprecedented opportunities for American workers and businesses, create hundreds of thousands of well-paying American jobs, and cement our position of leadership in the global economy. As the largest tax cut in history, the Uruguay Round is also important for consumers.

Only the U.S. Congress has the authority to change U.S. law, and we will continue to be able to use U.S. trade laws to enforce our rights. Delay would cost U.S. workers and firms billions of dollars in benefits and lost opportunities. Delay would also send a negative signal to our trading partners, which would undermine the momentum for opening markets to American goods and services. Finally, and most importantly, as the other economies of the world recover, we must do all that we can to help American exporters take advantage of the resulting growth by lowering foreign tariffs.

I think you know that I am committed to seeking bipartisan support for the passage of the agreement this year. I regret your opposition to this agreement, which I believe to be in the best interests of American consumers. In any event, I look forward to working with you in the future on issues that concern our nation.

Dear President Clinton:

The undersigned represent groups and individuals who have disagreed with each other on many substantive issues, including the substance of the proposed trade agreement (GATT) that is the occasion for this letter. Many of us have never appeared on any letter together before. However, we are united in strongly requesting that you not send to Congress this year, under fast-track voting procedures that prohibit amendments and limit debate, the Uruguay Round of GATT, which would establish the World Trade Organization in Geneva, Switzerland.

There are simply too many issues, ambiguities and unanswered questions and consequences embodied in this vast trade agreement and its complex implementing legislation to permit, in any way, a rush to judgment in the waning days of an extraordinarily congested Congress.

A reasonable interval of time is necessary for the American people and their elected representatives to learn about the new GATT and the World Trade Organization, discuss and consider their substance and then communicate their judgments. Your deferring the submission of this agreement to the Congress until next year will provide several months of public reflection and reaction, as befits a deliberate democracy considering a major and long-lasting international obligation.

As President of the United States, you have great authority over the pace and quality of public debate and the people's right to know. It is both a moral authority and logistical authority. We trust you will exercise both in ways that display a sensitive concern for the processes of reasoned and thoughtful public deliberation.

Since potential member nations are not required by the agreement's terms to register their approval or disapproval until July 1995, there is ample time next year for Congress to consider the trade pact and render its decision.

We trust that you will consider the seriousness of this petition and respond affirmatively to our recommendation.

Current tax revenues are fully utilized to provide the residents of the City of Newburgh with adequate police and fire protection.

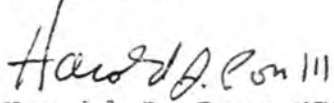

DR. SCHULLER INTRODUCES LOUIE BELLSON

We have so many friends and in the 25 years of our television ministry some of them have moved on to heaven. One of our friends was Pearl Bailey. She wanted to be a guest here and it never worked out in her calendar and ours. And now we have as our special performer, her husband, who loved her and was a faithful and beautiful husband until she died just a few years ago. And let me tell you about him. Many of you know the name, Louis Bellson, one of jazz history's more phenomenal drummers. At the age of 15 he was dissatisfied with his drums and he began to sketch a drawing for a new drum. It took him 7 years before a drum company would implement his drawings. Now, today, 75 percent of all drummers use the Bellson originated two bass drum set up. At age 17 he emerged as first class winner in a drum contest with 40,000 contestants. He became Benny Goodman's drummer when ballroom crowds had reached 9,000 a night. Served as musical director for his late wife, Pearl Bailey. Played with Doc Severson, in Johnny Carson's band and in January 1994, he received the most prestigious American Jazz Master's award. He has composed a number and he's arranged it with Johnnie Carl and you are about to hear music such as has never been heard in a Cathedral and it brought the earlier service to their feet. Get set. It's fantastic!

INTERVIEW - ANDREW YOUNG

My guest this morning is a man that I would call my spiritual brother. Here's a man, Andrew Young, who is a Christian person in tremendous service to God and you know, of course, that he was with Martin Luther King when that 39 year old man was shot and killed. You know that he became a congressman. Then President Jimmy Carter had made him Ambassador to the United Nations. He came back to become the Mayor of Atlanta and following Maynard Jackson, what he did in Atlanta, is fantastic. He made it a great enough city so that he believed it could host the Olympics. And I walked with him for about a mile, side by side, in Seoul, Korea some years ago. He and I went there for the Olympics. And he said, "Bob we're going to get the Olympics in 1996 in Atlanta." He is a positive dreamer and his dreams come from God, flows through that mind, gives him the motivation and courage to be what he is. And you know last night I talked to J.B. Fuqua, one of our dearest friends and friends of this ministry. He's been here often. And he said, "Let me tell you." J.B. lives in Atlanta, Georgia. J.B. said, "Let me tell you. Andrew Young is a good man." "Oh" he said, "let me put it this way. He is a fantastic gentleman." "Oh" he said, "and let me tell you something else. Maybe next to Bob Schuller, he's the second greatest preacher in the world today." So Andy Young, tell us what God is laying on your heart!

AY: Thank you. Thank you.

RS: A Way Out of No Way -- The Spiritual Memoirs of Andrew Young. But I have to ask you: Why so spiritual?

AY: Well, because that's really what life is all about. And I think I discovered that on the way home from college, after kind of muddling through and not knowing what life was all about

from my university training. On a mountain top, I suddenly got a glimpse of everything in the world making sense but me. And I decided and became aware that maybe everything understood that it was God's creation and I had not yet understood that I was a child of God.

When I began to understand that and began to ask not what I want to do with my life and not what my parents want, but what is it that God put me on this earth for, it lead me on an incredible journey that even my mother, who loved me and who believed I was, you know, the sun would rise and set on me, but she would never have imagined, well she didn't imagine that I'd be a preacher, for one thing. And, then that a preacher in Georgia could begin working with Martin Luther King, and Martin Luther King the 3rd is with us this morning...

RHS: Oh, we want to...

AY: ...and I wanted him to be here, too.

RHS: Stand up. I met him before. Hi!

RHS: Give my love to your mother, Corretta, who has been up here and preached for us, too, in this place. Carry on.

AY: But, you know, he was a young man who somehow God took hold of, and at a time when this nation could have been divided black against white, he said, "No, we are all children of God and we have got to learn to live together as brothers or we will perish together as fools." And I think that's what I have tried to do. I've tried to break down dividing walls that separate men and women, rich and poor, black and white, young and old, and that's what the Olympics is trying to do in Atlanta now. But that's what we were trying to do in the Civil Rights movement. We were trying to help people to realize that God is no respecter of persons. That we are all children of the same Father.

RHS: I must say instead of asking him questions and answers, I want him to share where he is within his walk with God. He came here, even though only a few days ago he buried his beloved wife of over 40 years, yet he still wanted to come. Share with us your walk with God as it comes out of your heart Andrew.

MESSAGE - "A WAY OUT OF NO WAY" BY ANDREW YOUNG

Thank you very much. First I want to say that Bob Schuller is a man of the spirit and he is trusting in the spirit this morning. We have heard God praised with high sounding cymbals and we have participated in the vivacious rhythm of a Louis Bellson. And he's asked me to give witness, testimony to who I am and how I got to be. But he, maybe also by the providence of God, gave me a text that I was not particularly familiar with in the first service, but as I read that text I think it is a text for all of us in this time. It's the 58th chapter of the prophet Isaiah. "Then you shall call and the Lord will answer. You shall cry and He will say, 'here I am.' If you take away from the midst of you the yolk, the pointing of the finger and speaking wickedness, if you pour yourself out for the hungry and satisfy the desire of the afflicted, then shall your light rise in darkness and your gloom be as noonday and the Lord will continually guide you and satisfy your desire with good things. And you shall be like a watered garden. Like a spring of water, whose waters fail not and your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt. And you shall raise up the foundations of many generations and you shall be called the repairer of the breach. The restorer of streets to dwell in."

Isaiah was talking of Los Angeles. He was talking of

Atlanta. He was talking of people like you and me. But he was talking in a time in which the cities were far more desolate than ours. He was talking in a time when Jerusalem had been invaded. When people had been taken in exile. When virtually all of the people to whom he spoke were living in situations of great degradation and depravity. They were in the kind of misery and suffering that you and I have never known. And yet, in the midst of that Isaiah says, "If you can stop pointing your finger, and if you can stop speaking wickedness, and if you can care for the hungry and if you can concern yourself with the afflicted, then everything is going to be alright and you will be the repairer of the breach and the restorer of the streets to dwell in." Isn't that what we need? Isn't that what we want?

Now let me just say a little bit about how we might get there. There's a hymn that I keep humming in my heart that all of you know. But the second or third verse says, "It's not with swords loud clashing, nor roll of stirring drum, but it's through deeds of love and mercy that the heavenly kingdom comes."

Now let me skip again, because it was only Monday that I buried my wife of 40 years. After a struggle of three and a half years with liver cancer and after almost six weeks of lying in wait for death, and something happened to my daughters. My engineer daughter, who though she's faithful tends to be very logical and scientific and mathematic about everything she does. And maybe because of her engineering training in electrical engineering, it was very, very difficult for her to deal with the question of her mother's death. But something happened to remind her and to remind us of what life's all about.

Jean who was almost comatose, sat up in the bed and said to Lisa, "Lisa I'm going to die." And Lisa fell apart. But she

noticed that Jean was still talking. And she didn't understand what she was saying and she wasn't talking to her. And she said it was as though she was talking to someone else in the room. And she didn't understand what she was saying, but she was pleased because her mother was not afraid. Whomever it was to whom she was speaking, was someone that she felt very comfortable and loving towards. And after a moment of quiet she turned back to Lisa and she said, "But it's going to be alright and it's going to take a little time."

Lisa is convinced that the angels of mercy or the angels of death, had come to get her mother. But her mother was so concerned about her mother of 91 years old, who incidentally just got off the city council in Marion, Alabama last year, and who still drives a car and still worries about everything going on in the town in which she was a teacher for almost 60 years. But it was very hard for a 91 year old mother to deal with the death of her baby daughter. It was also hard for our three daughters and her youngest son. And so it was as though she negotiated a little more time to prepare us for her transition to a life beyond.

We came to view death, not as something to be feared. Not as something to shun, but something to embrace, even as we embraced our children going off to college. We knew it was going to be a sad time and we cried every time each one of them left. But we knew we had to help them go on, because going on to the next stage of their development was our responsibility as parents. We came to understand that our responsibility as husband, as mother, and as children of Jean Childs Young, was to help her move on to the next stage of her life.

And during the period of her suffering we came more and more

to realize that life is not flesh and blood. Life is not the material things that we give so much of our time and energy to accumulate. Life is really spirit. And the power and the message that she shared in her dying, was essentially the message that we must all learn for life.

I had heard it first from Martin Luther King. And Martin had been stabbed when he was 29 signing copies of a book in Harlem. And as he lay in the hospital, in a coma, he says it was as though he was in the upper corners of the room, looking down upon his body and the ministers who were gathered around him praying. And you don't think of Martin Luther King having a sense of humor, but he made a big joke of it. Because you see he was a 29 year old who had been thrust into the middle of the Montgomery Improvement Association and leading a bus boycott and here were all of the venerable black leaders of the church in New York, gathered around his bedside.

And at that time, most of them really didn't appreciate what he was trying to do. They were moving in one direction and here he was talking about non-violence and here he was getting large numbers of people to follow him and so even though they were praying for him to live, he felt like many of them wished he would go on and get out of the way. But he said he wished that he could tell them, "Don't worry fellows, I ain't gone yet. God is not through with me yet and I'll be around for awhile." And he joked about this moment of coming very close to death.

And he would turn to us and say, "You don't know what life is all about, because you have never faced death." He said, "I've been there." And when they removed the knife from his chest in order to get it out, they had to carve, literally, a cross in his chest, and so he said, "Every morning when I wash my

face and brush my teeth, I'm reminded that this day might be my last. And I'm reminded that the purpose of life is not just what is going on here, but I am reminded that this is my Father's world.

And so the intensity with which he lived. The dedication with which he pursued the purposes of God. The willingness that he had to go against the crowd and to be different than anybody else at that time, essentially came out, not only of his wanting to be successful in terms of the times of this life. In fact, it was not about success at all. It was essentially the message of the cross which is not success, but service.

And so, Martin Luther King, Jr.'s life, motivated in many respects in large measure by this cross in the midst of his chest, led him to follow God in a kind of total, holy obedience that changed the world in which we live.

Remember, this was a time after the second World War. It was a time of great violence and tension. A time when everybody had guns, for we brought our guns back from the Second World War. And we were in the midst of Korea and it was a time when every response, to difference, was met with violence.

And yet, when Martin's home was bombed and Marty's big sister almost killed as she lay in the in the bed near the front of the house, when men brought their guns to his home and said "We've got to put an end to this. We're not going to tolerate this any more." Martin, as a 26 year old, said, "Wait a minute, we've got to find a more excellent way. An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth, will leave us with a nation that's blind and toothless. We could destroy the cities. We could destroy our nation, but we would end up with nothing. What we want to do is redeem the soul of America. And to redeem the soul of America

you can't follow the paths of violence. You must somehow find God's holy path."

My father put it to me differently. He said "Don't get mad, get smart. Use your mind. Use your heart to think through difficulties and obstacles. If you get emotional and angry in a fight, no matter how right your cause, you're almost sure to lose."

And so, the philosophy of non-violence, the willingness to look your enemy in the eye and say, "Yes, you think you're an enemy of mine. You think you're different from me. But I see in you not those things which divide us, I see in you the very image of God. That same image which I have seen and understand in myself. The Gospel starts with "I Am." I am a child of God. And in spite of all of those trappings that go with it in terms of hair and clothes and house and education and race and creed, and rich or poor, none of that is significant. Ultimately, our purpose in life is to prepare for a new life beyond.

Jean helped us to see that. Martin reminded us in his life and even in his death that there is something far more powerful and important than the things of the flesh and the materials which dominate our lives and our energy. We wondered how we would change the world without his body being present. We weren't doing that well with him. And now a bullet strikes him down and we have to face the world without a Martin Luther King. There was nobody that could get the attention of the black community. Still nobody that could speak and everyone listen. And we wondered, what would we do? And yet Martin's spirit prevailed. We have seen the spirit of Martin Luther King break down dividing walls all over America.

What happened in South Africa with Nelson Mandella and de

Klerk. One black and one white. One a prisoner, one a powerful president persecuting the people. And yet they have become brothers in a government of national unity and reconciliation. And now they are united to try to unite people who are rich with people who are impoverished. And the make of one healthy nation all of the peoples that are citizens of Southern Africa.

We saw that happen when the wall came down in East Berlin. It was no accident that they were singing "We Shall Overcome." It was also no accident that the Polish ship yard workers sang "We Shall Overcome" and moved out when the Russian tanks came. There was a direct emulation of the non-violent movement of the south by the freedom fighters in Poland and East Germany and even in the Soviet Union.

The human rights movement in the Soviet Union came directly from the spirit of Martin Luther King, as our movement had come directly from the spirit of Mahatma Gandhi and as Gandhi's movement had come directly from the spirit of Jesus Christ.

Gandhi's favorite hymn was "Lead Kindly Light" and the verse I like in that is "lead kindly light amid the encircling gloom, lead thou me on. The path is dark and I am far from home. Lead thou me on. I do not ask to see the distant scene. One step enough for me." And we have seen somehow the spirit of God moving all over this land. From Montgomery, Alabama to Birmingham to Selma to the Soviet Union, to Eastern Europe, to a young man standing in front of a tank on CNN in Beijing, China.

I've started trying to deal with our problems. And right now, unfortunately, many of us are afraid of many of our own children. We're afraid of youth who dress funny. Wear their hair terribly, it seems, and do everything they can to annoy us and be different. And we forget when we were in that stage. And

somehow rather than loving them, we shy away from them. And some of the things that are being perpetrated on our society now in the name of the repression of youth really are going to be very counter productive and we've got to find some way. You know, I say, if we could love the hell out of the Ku Klux Klan, can't we love our own children? Now it's sometimes a little harder.

It was a lot easier for me, frankly, to be non-violent with the Klan and with people that I started out with no emotional attachment to. I confess my sin that I lose my temper very seldom, but it's only been with my mother, my wife, my younger brother and my son. The people who were closest to us, we find it hardest to love, because we want them to be just like us. And we want them to agree with us and we want to help to lead their lives.

My daddy wanted me to be a dentist. And when I was sworn in as Ambassador to the United Nations by Thurgood Marshall, my daddy said to Jimmy Carter and Thurgood Marshall, at least they said to my father, "You must be very proud of this boy." And my daddy said, even then, "If he'd have been an dentist he'd of been somebody." But God didn't want me to be a dentist. God had other plans for me. And God has plans for you and for your children and even for our most obnoxious and hostile teenagers.

That somehow, in order to shake things up and make all things new, we've got to put aside our views on the materials, the physical concept of success, the things of this world and we've got to take seriously, in our lives, the things of the spirit. And then we can become the repairers of the breach and the builders, the restorers of a peaceful city for our children.

It seems like an impossible dream, but I left Howard University in 1951, driving back from Washington, D.C., to New

Orleans, Louisiana, my home and when I got to the Georgia/South Carolina line it said "Welcome to Georgia." I knew that didn't mean me. I turned around and went back into Anderson, South Carolina to buy gasoline. Because Georgia in the 50's was the worst place on the face of the earth for a black man to be driving alone at night. I did not even want to stop in Georgia for gas. I got gas in Anderson, South Carolina and went all the way to Tuskegee, Alabama before I stopped again.

I was coming down Ponce de Leon, which is the way you got through Atlanta before the express ways, and a rat crossed the road. And do you know, I slowed down for the rat. Because I felt that rats had more rights than black folks in Georgia. And if I'd gone home and told my mother, "Mother, I'm going back to Georgia and I'm going to be a preacher and a Congressman and an Ambassador to the United Nations and I'm going to end up as Mayor of Atlanta and we're gonna bring the Olympic Games to Atlanta." My mother would have begun to look for a psychiatrist. For even my mother could not conceive of the kind of success that we have achieved, not by trying to be successful, but simply by trying to ask what is it that God wants me to do with my life and where is the power of God and the spirit of God leading us in our daily lives?

The spirit is moving all over this land. This is the time for a spiritual presence in the midst of our work place. In the midst of our politics, in the midst of our business. In the midst of our geo-political catastrophes looming. In the midst of all of the stress and the strain on this fragile human and natural environment. God has so ordered this planet. And there's enough here for all of us.

The hungry can be fed. The naked can be clothed. The lion

and the lamb can lie down together and black and white and rich and poor can live and work together. But it depends on our deeds of love and mercy by which the heavenly kingdom comes. It depends on our not pointing our fingers and speaking wickedness. It depends on our pouring out ourselves for the hungry and attempting to satisfy the desires of the afflicted and then your gloom will be as noonday. And then show your light rise in darkness and you shall rebuild your cities and you shall raise up the foundations for many generations. And you shall be called the repairer of the breach and the restorer of the streets to dwell in. May God empower us, that we might see day by day, the evidence and presence and power of His kingdom in our midst. Amen.

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Saddam Won't Just Fight The Same War Over Again

President Clinton has responded with splendid resolve to Iraq's military thrusts toward Kuwait. But Clinton and his generals should not simply prepare to refight the last war. Saddam Hussein won't.

Saddam is not likely to wage the war he has in mind for Clinton only in the deserts of the Iraqi-Kuwaiti frontier. The Iraqi dictator has openly warned this president to yield to his demands or face terror attacks on the United States and its allies.

It is not true that Saddam is completely irrational or unpredictable, as many in the West assume. He manipulates the politics of brute force better than most leaders. And as he did in the spring and summer of 1990, before he invaded Kuwait, Saddam is again broadcasting the steps he intends to take if his threats go unheeded.

On Sept. 27, Saddam promised in a speech to his followers that he would not stand by and allow Iraq, "to die of hunger" because of U.N. sanctions. The speech was immediately analyzed by Baghdad newspapers under his direct control. They asked if the United States really failed to understand "the meaning of every Iraqi becoming a missile that can cross to countries and cities?" Saddam's scribes went on to warn the world community in these terms in the following days:

"When peoples reach the verge of collective death they will be able to spread death to all." And: "The patience of the Arabs and Muslims is about to reach its end and people have now started to prepare for hot confrontations in more than one country and continent."

Empty Iraqi rhetoric intended to influence the U.N. debate on lifting sanctions? Or real threats that Saddam will try to execute? America's only answer can be to hope for the former and prepare for the latter—especially as sketchy evidence suggests that the Iraqis may have already put in motion terrorist networks in America.

But that evidence and the threats coming out of Baghdad had not engaged the Clinton administration, preoccupied at home, in Haiti and elsewhere, before last weekend. My guess is that Saddam has moved his Republican Guard units through the desert to focus Clinton's attention on the dangers Iraq still poses and on the deal that would avoid them.

Do not be surprised, or deceived, if Saddam now indicates that he will lower the tensions he has created and recognize Kuwait's frontier, the major remaining hurdle he has to clear to get sanctions lifted.

In Saddam's mind recognizing Kuwait would be a meaningless commitment that he could reverse when the circumstances change. He has over the years signed and torn up treaties fixing Iraq's border with Iran in the Shaat al Arab estuary as his needs dictate. For Saddam, Iraq's frontiers are etched in blood shed in battle, not in ink scrawled on treaties.

That is why he will be a threat to his neighbors as long as he and his Ba'ath party survive in power. Bush and his generals, Colin Powell and Norman Schwarzkopf, continued to underestimate Saddam when they made the political decision to let him recover key Republican Guard divisions from the Kuwait theater and stay in power at the end of Operation Desert Storm.

The Clinton administration was also taking for granted Saddam's greatly weakened state until this new wake-up call. At the Justice Department there has been no aggressive pursuit of the many loose ends created by Iraqi penetration and manipulation of U.S. banks in the Bush years. More surprisingly,

Rahman Yassin, an American citizen of Iraqi origin who fled to Baghdad after being questioned about his role in the bombing of New York's World Trade Center 19 months ago.

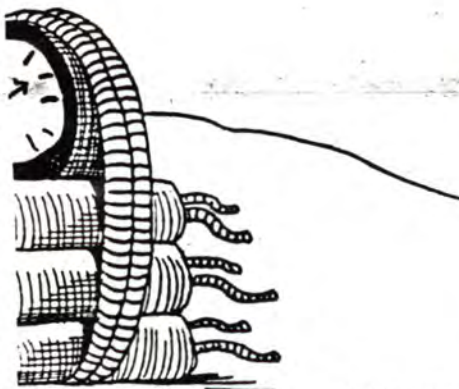

The U.S. Military Can't Create a New Iraq

It is axiomatic that any Iraqi invasion of Kuwait will be met with military force. And there is also a strong argument that military force should be used if Saddam parks his forces by Kuwait's border or withdraws only to return them in the future. In these latter two cases, preemptive attacks by the United States and its coalition partners could be justified as anticipatory self-defense, warranted by Iraq's past behavior, its refusal to recognize Kuwait, and the inherent threat posed by the massing of military forces along a contested border.

But what isn't clear is what the nature of any U.S. or coalition military response should be. What

would the war aims be? What targets? When should we be prepared to accept a cease-fire?

The last time such questions were raised was 3½ years ago. Then, with Kuwait liberated and much of Iraq's conventional and unconventional military capabilities thought to be destroyed, the Bush administration called Operation Desert Storm to a halt after six weeks of air attacks and only 100 hours of land battle.

As it turns out, estimates made in the fog of war about how much Iraqi armament had been destroyed were somewhat high. Nevertheless, another day or even several days more of fighting would only have destroyed several hundred more Iraqi weapons—still leaving Saddam with enough force to put down the Shia and Kurdish rebellions in the spring of 1991 or threaten Kuwait today. Moreover, a continuation of the fighting could well have alienated much of the Arab and Muslim worlds, until then supportive or at least accepting of U.S. policy against Iraq's destruction.

A related question was why the Bush administration agreed to a cease-fire with Saddam Hussein and his regime still in place. In part this

by Saddam that included the plot to assassinate President Bush in Kuwait in April 1993.

That is why Mylroie picked up on the recent rush of threatening statements in the Baghdad media much more than did government counterterrorist agencies, which have not assigned a high priority to countering Saddam's operatives here. The Iraqis were unable to mount terror operations during Desert Storm, the government agencies recall. Why would they try now?

There can be no excuse of misreading Saddam again. The counterterrorist agencies need to make Iraq their top urgent priority. Iraq's coercive diplomacy cannot be rewarded with a deal on sanctions. Clinton, who ordered a one-shot retaliatory raid on Baghdad for the Bush plot, needs to emphasize consistently to all government departments, not just the Pentagon, that Saddam's survival is a continuing threat to American interests at home and abroad.

But the decision to avoid using military force to achieve political change was based even more on an assessment of its proper use. Short of occupation, the military is simply too blunt to achieve precise political outcomes. There was no guarantee that continuing military operations or even entering downtown Baghdad could oust Saddam and put someone better in his place. More likely was that the United States would get bogged down in the quicksand of Iraq's domestic politics, lose more lives than it had in the war up to that point, and forfeit the support of the coalition, Congress and the American people.

The result was that the Bush administration chose not to take sides in a civil war, and ruled out a policy of nation-building. Both promised to be too costly to implement and too uncertain in outcome. The goal was to avoid the mistake of Korea, where 40 years before, the Truman administration crossed the 38th parallel, and in so doing crossed from liberation to roll-back, turning a remarkable success into a tragic standoff.

What are the consequences of this history for the present? If we use force against Iraq, the temptation will arise to make the removal of Saddam Hussein a specific objective. Like most temptations, it should be resisted. The problem is not one of desirability but feasibility. Again, it is not possible to design a military operation at an affordable cost that would achieve this goal. We cannot sustain—politically, economically or militarily—an operation in Iraq that sets as its goal a change of regimes—not any more today than 3½ years ago.

If Iraq invades Kuwait, a more appropriate and achievable objective would be the destruction of much of what remains of Iraq's military capability—its aircraft, tanks, artillery and command and control—and not just those forces near Kuwait. This could be carried out using aircraft and cruise missiles. The result would be an Iraq led by Saddam unable to threaten its neighbors—and possibly a Saddam too weak to hold on to power.

The question of war aims becomes even more complicated in preemptive-strike scenarios. Here, it will be difficult enough to gain coalition support for acting without expanding the war aims to the destruction of all of Iraq's military or the promotion of a change in regime. Any attack would have to confine itself to the Iraqi forces near Kuwait unless Saddam did something more, such as firing Scud missiles or launching a terrorist attack, to expand the confrontation and justify a wider and partially reactive military undertaking by the coalition.

Using military force for limited purposes will no doubt prove frustrating or even defeatist to some, but it should not. Any military intervention must not only be worth going out to do—and with a ratio of costs to benefits that makes sense and looks better than alternative policies. Such an intervention is possible to design for Iraq, but

President Clinton today announces \$200 million in grants to help more than 300 police departments hire beat-patrol police officers. The grants are the first phase in \$8.8 billion authorized by the recently enacted crime bill, which will ultimately add police officers in 15,000 localities.

This list shows each locality, its federal grant, and the expected number of additional police officers. Cities must chip in 25% of the funds in the first year, and more as the plan progresses.

These communities were chosen from 2,450 that had applied for, but failed to receive, shares of \$150 million in grants last year. About 250 departments received grants last year.

\$200 M in grants

For towns, 'all the difference in the world'

For many of the nation's police, often swamped by crime and short on personnel, federal funds for community policing are warmly welcomed.

"Wonderful," Mineral County, Mont., Sheriff Mickey O'Brien says of the grant adding two cops to the six-officer force.

Interstate 90, which runs through the rural county, brings in murder, rapes and armed robberies, he says. "Two more people make all the difference in the world."

Under the recently passed crime bill, 460 cities with more than 150,000 population and about 14,500 smaller communities will receive additional police over the next six years. After training, cops from the first phase should hit the streets around January.

"Really what it's about is to get the public and police to work in concert on crime control," says Hubert Williams, head of the Police Foundation, a research organization.

But some observers say the program offers false hope since it fails to address social causes of crime.

"A police officer can't put a family back together, provide employment, deal with a serious drug or alcohol problem," says Sam Walker, criminal justice professor at the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Other critics say the grants are a poor deal because localities must chip in 25% of the funds at first and progressively more in coming years. As a result, many cash-strapped cities may not apply, they say.

"Bait and switch — they're promising a lot but delivering very little," says Andi Dillin, press secretary for Rep. Bill McCollum, R-Fla.

Sacramento police spokesman Michael Heenan sees it differently. "This is going to give us a chance to implement ... community policing in neighborhoods that never would have received it."

Scheming and cynical, Republicans in Congress reach a new political low

As the 103rd Congress slunk toward adjournment late last week, the Capitol Hill press corps just might have put its finger on the reason our vaunted democratic system of government is not working at all well these days.

Consider the lead on an analysis filed last week by David Hess, a staffer in the Washington bureau of the Knight-Ridder newspaper chain: "Betting that voters are so fed up with Congress that they don't care what it does, Republicans are mounting a fierce campaign to block any bill that might reflect credit on Democrats and Bill Clinton."

You read that right. Any bill that might have made the president of the United States or his party look good — never mind whether it might also have been beneficial to the country — was being opposed by a political party that clearly had settled on flat-out obstructionism as the cornerstone of its election-year strategy.

In short, Clinton was hardly being paranoid when he called a news conference last Friday to cry "foul." Indeed, the word might be used both as a noun and an adjective in describing the Republican approach to the legislative process in recent months.

The GOP scheme actually was even more cynical than an effort merely to keep Clinton and the Democrats from looking good to voters. As Star Tribune Washington correspondents Sharon Schmickle and Tom Hamburger pointed out last week, the Republican objective apparently was to create so much gridlock and make Congress look so bad that voters would reject all incumbents — the majority of whom are Democrats.

You don't have to take our word for it. Minnesota's outgoing Republican senator, the ethically challenged Dave Durenberger, said precisely that in an earlier interview with Hess. The GOP view, he said, is that "any adverse reflection on Congress [resulting from the gridlock] hurts the Democrats worse than Republicans. There are more of them than us" up for reelection.

Now, that's what I'd call a barren, downright irresponsible political position.

Besides, it all seems so unnecessary. Given Clinton's bumbling track record on everything from Cabinet appointments to intervention in Bosnia-Herzegovina to policy on Haitian refugees, I figure he would have found a way to make himself and the rest of the Democrats look bad without any help from the political party that gave us Watergate and IranGate.

Nevertheless, there the Republicans were last week, filibustering vociferously on five — count 'em, five — different Democratic proposals, including:

- A bill to limit the size of the trough provided by lobbyists to congressional porkers in the form of free meals, travel and gifts. The so-called lobbying reform bill died when Democrats failed to muster enough votes to end the filibuster. (To be fair, there were more than a few sighs of relief heard from the Democratic side of the pig pen when the reform effort failed.)

- A bill to add 6.4 million acres of California desert to the rolls of federally protected lands. It seems the Republicans didn't want the bill's chief author, Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., to win a legislative coup when she's in such a tight race for her seat with Rep. Michael Huffington, a Republican. The filibuster was overcome, and the bill was ap-

proved just before adjournment.

- The important Elementary and Secondary Education Act, which was held up by a filibuster led by Republican Sen. Jesse Helms, the North Carolina troglodyte, who wanted stronger language requiring prayer in public schools. The filibuster finally was silenced and the bill passed.

- Nominations to a seat on the Third Circuit Court of Appeals and to the post of chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. The filibusters were broken last week, and both nominees were confirmed.

How bad has it gotten? Lordy. How? Republicans last week even backed away from the GATT treaty — which most of them regard as a plus for the U.S. balance of trade — lest it reflect favorably on the Democrats. And Republican delaying tactics kept Congress from voting on an important plan to improve the cleanup of toxic waste sites.

Selfish political partisanship and gridlock are nothing new, of course, nor is the malady confined to the Republicans — although the GOP seems to be carrying it to particularly inspired lengths of late.

For example, the midnight basketball program originally included in the Democrat-sponsored crime bill was condemned by Republicans as liberal pork. Naturally, none of them mentioned that President George Bush had originally lauded the concept as one of his "Thousand Points of Light" back in 1988 — when the Democrats hammered the notion as nonsensical rhetoric.

Even worse, we've had to listen to GOP partisans try to minimize, and even castigate, Clinton's efforts to neutralize Haiti's military junta. You might recall that the Republicans were not similarly disaffected when President Ronald Reagan flexed his muscles over tiny Grenada in 1983 — or when President Bush invaded Panama in 1989 and kidnapped that sovereign nation's chief of state.

Meanwhile, what are the Republican stalwarts offering to the voters this fall besides congressional gridlock?

Well, they've come up with something dubbed the "Contract With America," under which they pledge to cut taxes, including the capital gains tax, while strengthening the national defense.

In short, the GOP offers little more than warmed-over Reaganomics, the failed economic pipe dream that combined massive tax cuts and steeply higher defense spending to produce towering budget deficits that quadrupled the size of the national debt during the 12 years of Reagan and Bush.

That huge debt, in turn, will mean that our children and grandchildren will enjoy a significantly lower standard of living than they could have — or should have — without the burden bequeathed them by the Reagan and Bush administrations.

Some legacy. Some "contract."

reign of military-installed de facto President Emile Jonassaint, a former Supreme Court judge and a devotee of voodoo, the local religion that combines aspects of Catholicism and African polytheism. There had been a string of other de facto presidents and prime ministers before Jonassaint.

Over the past several months, Jonassaint had publicly called upon the voodoo gods to ward off the arrival of U.S. troops and the return of Aristide. The troops came here as a kind of peacekeeping force, the day after a Sept. 18 accord signed by Jonassaint and former U.S. President Carter.

Monday, Army chief Lt. Gen. Raoul Cedras announced he was giving up power and leaving the country soon. Cedras' departure was the major hurdle in the road to the restoration of democracy.

At the Ministry of Public Health Tuesday, crowds became upset when they saw that a de facto ministry official was planning to leave in a late model red Jeep Cherokee with state license plates.

A U.S. Army sergeant then demanded the keys from the official, Dr. Georges Dubuche, medical director of the state General Hospital.

U.S. Army officers clearly were intent on keeping peace with the pro-Aristide crowds, who have been treating the American troops like liberating heroes wherever they walk or drive around the country.

"Did you calm the crowd down after you showed them the keys?" asked 2nd Lt. Dane Acord.

"Yes, I did," replied Staff Sgt. Timothy Clapper with a nervous smile.

"Sgt. Clapper, you have your hands full today," the lieutenant said approvingly.

Clapper later tried to arrange an escort to get Dubuche safely past the crowds and to his personal vehicle parked some distance away.

Haitian soldiers stationed on the fenced-in grounds of the stately white Presidential Palace were calm and cooperative, as the U.S. troops in full battle gear entered the offices there.

U.S. Army Capt. Steven Stacey said his troops were looking for "booby traps," in addition to clearing out the offices of de facto employees. Stacey said the troops would be carrying out their operation through Tuesday and possibly into Wednesday.

One Haitian soldier, Cpl. Avril Camille, said he realized his army was powerless against the U.S. forces. He said, moreover, that he believed Aristide was the duly elected president of the country and belonged at the Presidential Palace.

He said there were other soldiers who felt the way he did, but up to now they had been afraid of expressing their pro-Aristide sentiments.

"It is difficult when you are a small minority against a majority," he said. "I was concerned I would be sanctioned in some way, imprisoned or sent to a miserable outpost like Mole Saint Nicholas," he said, referring to the town in the barren and extremely poor northwestern part of the country.

Change Under Way for Haitian Police Force (Port-au-Prince)

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti Former New York Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly, the "new sheriff in town," said Tuesday the Haitian police force is being reborn as a protector of life and property.

But Kelly said the rebirth is a long-term process that will really get under way with the opening of a new police academy in the next few months.

Haiti's police officers, who are part of the army, have traditionally carried automatic weapons designed more for battlefield combat than for arresting common criminals. What's more, Haiti's police have a long reputation for brutality and corruption.

Kelly, head of a team of international monitors charged with revamping the local police force, said the process of eliminating abusive officers from the force has not yet begun. But he said that many of the bad eggs have decided on their own that they do not want any part of the planned changes.

"I think it's been somewhat of a self-selection process," Kelly said of those with known histories of human rights abuses. "These people have not come to work."

An interim force, with new uniforms and berets instead of the military-style caps and helmets now being worn, will be on the streets in the next few weeks, said U.S. military police commander Col. Mike Sullivan. Kelly said that more substantial changes in attitude and behavior will be seen after December, when a new U.S.-sponsored police academy is scheduled to begin operating.

Some Haitian police—the force totals about 1,500 officers—are going out on patrols with Kelly's monitors. There are now several hundred monitors, mostly from nations in the hemisphere, but their number is expected to grow to more than 1,000. The Haitian police force is expected to be increased by several times its current number. The size of the other security forces, now totalling about 6,000, would be reduced, as they switch from domestic operations to traditional army duties like guarding land and sea borders.

Business Should Have No Gripes With Clinton

However disenchanted American wage earners may be with the state of the nation's politics, with stagnation in living standards and a decline in job security, American business leaders have every reason to view the first two years of the Clinton presidency as something of a golden age.

The federal deficit is in decline. Interest rates, even with recent increases, are well below the historically high levels which prevailed throughout the Reagan-Bush era. The gross domestic product has grown in every quarter since President Clinton took office and there is every prospect it will continue expanding in the foreseeable future. Wage costs have remained well under control as has inflation. Corporate profits are performing handsomely and now account for a larger share of the national income than in either of the two previous administrations.

In Congress and within the Clinton administration, the business lobbies have won just about every battle they set out to fight. Notable among their victories was the

passage of the North American Free Trade Agreement and the president's decision to separate the question of human

rights atrocities from the issue of trade with China. The Clinton Commerce Department has made export promotion a priority if not an obsession. The Treasury Department is agreeably populated with figures picked for their ability to reassure Wall Street. Congress has not yet approved the new General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade so dear to the business community, but the administration is clearly spending vastly more of its political capital to secure its passage dear to the business community than it did in its rather feeble support of the striker replacement bill, which died in the Senate to the great joy of the corporate world and to the dismay of the president's embattled friends in organized labor. Neither of Clinton's Supreme Court appointments give any evidence of an anti-business mind-set.

Neither has Clinton demonstrated any of the cultural antipathy to businessmen that has been a large part of the Democratic Party's tradition. Indeed, it is his close association with some of the leading businessmen of Arkansas that has brought the president more grief than his relationship or non-relationship with his party's left wing.

Still, a BusinessWeek Harris Poll of 400 senior business executives conducted in late September revealed an astonishing level of loathing for the president. Only 9 percent of them said they would support his re-election. Yet 81 percent said they were optimistic about the economy.

These figures seem to suggest a world of corporate mountebanks, presiding over their mercilessly downsized work forces while raking in profits and compensation packages that are growing as fast as real blue collar wages are shrinking, who regard Clinton as the worst skunk since Franklin D. Roosevelt, who enjoyed a similar unpopularity among the business elite of his day. This is especially curious because even Clinton's move to put a \$1 million cap on the deductibility of corporate executive pay had the opposite of the intended effect, causing many companies paying less than a million to give huge executive raises lest they seem cheap. It must make the president feel like a sheep who has strayed off to make friends with the wolves. They lick his face and wag their tails and they'll still eat him alive. New Democrats taste the same as old ones to them.

Dear Mr. President,

Well, I have numerous ideas but I will close for now. I just wanted you to know, that contrary to the media's assertion, you and Mrs. Clinton do not always have a negative impact on people. You both are not the stereotypical president and first lady in the traditional grandfather and grandmotherly roles at the age of 70 or 80 and people should not expect you to behave as such! You owe it not only to yourselves, as well as to all of America to get out and show everyone what your both made of!

Reading the Editorials of Messrs Charles Peters and Bob Dole regarding the current gridlock in Congress ("Congress Is Back. Now Lay the Blame." 9/12/94) I find the arguments of Mr. Peters ("Paralysis, Thanks to the G.O.P.") to be right on target - especially given the events of the last few weeks regarding Health Care, the Crime Bill, and Election Reform. In fact I am surprised that more Americans (including the press) don't call the Republican "Gridlock Strategy" for what it is - a shameless, cynical attempt to stalemate government, discredit the Democrats, and regain control of the White House.

President Clinton came into office as a "New Democrat" whose mainstream policies offered something for conservatives and liberals alike. On crime he balanced stricter death penalty provisions and "Three Strikes" with crime prevention programs and sensible gun control. To reduce the deficit he has undertaken large reductions in government spending and is "re-inventing government" while enacting badly needed increases in taxes. He has actively supported business causes such as NAFTA and GATT and has been the most effective chief executive in modern times in terms of providing hands on assistance in expanding trade for specific companies and industries. At the same time he has asked the business community to support initiatives like the Family Leave Act and employer mandates on Health Care.

In short each policy has been crafted with one hand outstretched towards conservatives and another towards liberals. The liberals have grasped the outstretched hand, despite their discomfort with some conservative policies, in the interest of ending gridlock. Conservatives, led by Dole, Gingrich, and Gramm, have, on the other hand, spit in Clinton's eye while moving further and further to the right - most often further than the Democrats are willing to go. The Republicans have no intention of agreeing to any policy that they can't call their own - and they can't call any policy their own until they own the White House again. Even now with issues like Health Care and Election Reform they openly brag about their gridlock strategy as if it is a badge of honor.

Unfortunately you and I are as much to blame for all of this gridlock as Senator Dole is. For every time President Clinton is forced to stretch out his hand a little further he is seen

as "weak" and "waffling" while Dole et al, with their uncompromising stands grinding government to a halt, are seen as "strong" and "prinoipled". This strange enchantment with macho politics rewards the pit bulls like Dole while making the compromisers look like fools. Have we forgotten that our entire system of government is built upon the ability of rational men and women to compromise?

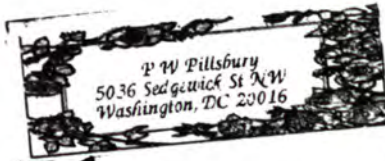

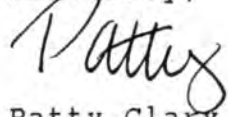

Through my personal line of communication to you, I take the liberty to send to your personal attention a self-explanatory report that I have hand-delivered to Sandy Berger and a copy of a letter I received today from my old friend and your new Chief of Staff, Leon Panetta.

As you know from past experience, I have never misled you with my information pertaining to Italy or any other matter. Today I must stress to you the importance of the Catholic world to your 1996 political campaign.

The world knows how unhappy Ambassador Raymond Flynn has been and still is being Ambassador to the Vatican. The world also knows that he is looking very hard for new employment, has health problems and complicated family problems that add to his dissatisfaction with his post. These facts combined with the tensions between the U.S. and the Vatican State leave the Catholic world angered at and disappointed with the U.S. representation.

Mr. President, whether or not you choose to appoint me as Ambassador Flynn's replacement is not the reason I address you today. To be certain, it would be the greatest of honors for me and my family if you choose me, but the real reason I write is to bring to your attention a problem that must be looked at immediately. The relationship between the U.S. and the Vatican must improve and someone that you trust has the capability to repair this relationship must be sent to Rome to represent you.

In addition, the image of the U.S. Embassy to the Vatican has to be improved. The prestige of that embassy and the intelligence available to a person capable of obtaining it through that special diplomatic post will be of extreme importance to our country and to your presidency.

I urge you, Mr. President, for the good of our country and yourself, to spare a little bit of your precious time to study this critical and urgent issue.

I know that you will answer my letter as you have done in the past and I will look forward, daily, to receive your reply.

I wish you and your family good health and success. May God bless you.

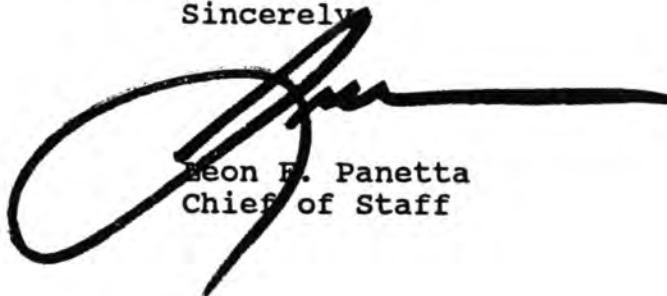

As you requested, I have obtained some information about the DNC's data base mailing list.

1. The DNC total data base consists of approximately 1.3 millions names/addresses as follows:
 - 900,000 - direct mail names
 - 80,000 - finance names
 - 320,000 non-finance names
2. Additional lists purchased by the DNC which are not included in the above 1.3 million data base:
 - 1992 Clinton primary contributors
 - 520,000 Presidential Inaugural names (of which approximately 430,00 are included in the 1.3 million DNC data base referred to above)
 - 50,000 - 1992 Clinton primary direct mail
 - 90,000 - Democratic activists
4. The DNC does not own or have control over the following lists:
 - Clinton 1992 primary supporters who are not contributors
 - Clinton/Gore 1992 general election campaign supporters who are not contributors
5. As I understand it from Marsha Scott, an entity located in Arkansas has a data base with approximately 1 million or so names/addresses consisting of your

supporters throughout your gubernatorial years as well as certain 1992 primary and general election supporters. I will get more details on this from Marsha.

As we discussed, the keeping of lists during the 1992 Presidential Primary was, with some exceptions, helter skelter, at best. Marsha Scott is undertaking to contact people who were involved in the various state primaries to reconstruct those lists as best as possible and put them into a data base in a systematic way. She and I have been working closely on this, but given your concern, we will spend more time on it.

SENATE

I. Endangered Democratic Incumbents

The seven endangered Senators, grouped by vulnerability, are:

Group 1: Feinstein, Wofford and Robb
Group 2: Kennedy and Bingaman
Group 3: Sasser and Lautenberg

* California- Dianne Feinstein (D) vs. Michael Huffington (R):

This race remains a dead heat. The first debate was on Larry King Live October 6. Feinstein received the endorsement of 75 GOPers including movie star and former Republican mayor of Carmel, Clint Eastwood and Pete Wilson's campaign co-chair John Harris. Huffington is on the air with a TV spot similar to his recent radio ad that hit Feinstein for supporting Rosemary Barkett for a judgeship claiming she has opposed the death penalty over 100 times. However, even Huffington's supporters have been forced to admit that Barkett has supported the death penalty more often than she opposed it. The press is starting to focus on Huffington and who he is and they are not liking what they find. Publications from Vanity Fair, to Time, to The New Yorker have run profiles on Huffington and the general tenor is that Huffington is a strange man who really doesn't stand for anything.

* Pennsylvania -- Harris Wofford (D) vs. Rick Santorum (R):

A Political/Media Research poll has the race tightening: Wofford now leads 46-42%. A Philadelphia Daily News poll has the race 38-38%. Wofford is again pushing health care saying he has a 7 point plan to make incremental changes; Santorum is hitting Wofford for being ineffective, as evidenced by the failure of health care.

* Virginia -- Chuck Robb (D) vs. Oliver North (R) vs. Marshall Coleman (I):

North has attacked Robb's military record - claiming Robb had an easy service at the "Eighth and I" barracks. Robb blasted back denouncing North for lying about his record. Robb did serve at the 8th and I barracks, but he also served as a company commander in Vietnam for 13 months. Robb recently received the Virginia Legislative Black Caucus endorsement and is working to energize the black vote. North has made several statements in the past days on lying to Congress and Robb's views on abortion that he was forced to retract as incorrect. Coleman is on the air attacking both Robb and North and offering himself as the alternative. The press was very positive on your appearance in Virginia last Monday.

* **Massachusetts -- Edward Kennedy (D) vs. Mitt Romney (R):**

Romney held a press conference last week attacking Kennedy for betraying the legacy of JFK by attacking Romney for his religious beliefs. Romney's father, former Michigan governor George Romney, made a surprise appearance at the press event. While Romney praised the Mormon Church's decision to allow all races to be ordained as priests, he refused to say how he felt about the exclusion of women. A recent Romney poll has the race 45-43% with Romney ahead. 52% thinks it is time for someone new to serve as Senator. Romney is also hitting Kennedy for taking corporate planes on campaign trips instead of flying coach.

* **New Jersey -- Frank Lautenberg (D) vs. Chuck Haytaian (R):**

In an unusual move, a week after launching his media campaign, Lautenberg pulled a \$600,000 media buy. The Lautenberg campaign claims they only went up on TV to force Haytaian to spend money -- Haytaian scoffed at that explanation and is saying Lautenberg is low on cash. Meanwhile, Lautenberg and Haytaian are both trading charges on Haytaian's flat tax proposal - both are claiming the other has changed his stance on this issue. Lautenberg continues to hold a double digit lead, but as always, in New Jersey, we expect this race to tighten.

* **New Mexico -- Jeff Bingaman (D) vs. Colin McMillan (R):**

Bingaman leads by 14 points, but we are still concerned about King's numbers bringing Bingaman down.

* **Tennessee -- Jim Sasser (D) vs. Bill Frist (R):**

This race continues to be tight with Sassaer holding a single digit lead. The Vice President will do a four city swing with Sasser Tuesday.

III. Endangered Republican Incumbents

Best opportunities: Delaware, Montana
Opportunity: Washington State
Declining opportunity: Texas

* **Delaware -- Charlie Oberly (D) vs. Bill Roth (R):**

The most recent poll had Roth ahead, 44% to 35%. Roth has declined all invitations to debate Oberly. Roth has taken to verbally stumbling on the campaign trail and there is speculation his staff wants to keep him off TV.

* **Montana -- Jack Mudd (D) vs. Conrad Burns (R):**

Mudd and Burns continue to attack each other over political ethics and fundraising tactics. Burns claims that his 63 lobbyist-financed trips in the last five years (including to the Kentucky Derby and a football bowl game) "helped him build relationships in the Senate and with important businesses." Mudd was endorsed by the National Council of Senior Citizens. One poll has Burns leading 52-37%, but the DSCC reports Burns' lead is under 10 points.

* **Texas -- Richard Fisher (D) vs. Kay Bailey Hutchinson (R):**

A recent Houston Post poll has Fisher's slide continuing - Bailey now leads 46-20%. Hutchinson is easily getting 23% of the Democratic vote. Hutchinson is on the air noting her opposition to higher taxes and her support for lower spending. Her ad does not mention Fisher.

* **Washington -- Ron Sims (D) vs. Slade Gorton (R):**

A recent statewide poll shows the race: Gorton-46%; Sims-35%. The DSCC has committed \$100,000 to Sims race. Sims is going up this weekend with an ad that delivers a strong Democratic message and hits Gorton on his voting record in the Senate saying Gorton "voted against family/medical leave, against college loans for middle class families. He voted against the crime bill to put more cops on our streets and he voted to cut Social Security and Medicare. It's time for a change." The race is closing, particularly among middle-income voters.

IV. Safe Republican Incumbents

Chafee (RI) leads Linda Kushner 55%-24%
Hatch (UT) leads Pat Shea 59%-24%
Jeffords (VT) leads Jan Backus 51%-32%
Lott (MS)
Lugar (IN)
Mack (FL) leads Hugh Rodham 65%-20%

Jeffords has been quoted as saying his voters are very frustrated and that their frustration is not party-oriented, but geared towards incumbents.

V. Democratic Open Seats

Best opportunities: Oklahoma, Michigan, Tennessee, Arizona
Opportunities: Maine and Ohio

* Oklahoma -- Dave McCurdy (D) vs. James Inhofe (R):

A recent Cole, Hargrave, and Snodgrass poll has Inhofe leading McCurdy 44-39%. A Tulsa World poll has McCurdy leading Inhofe 46-38%. McCurdy is on the air with a spot attacking Inhofe's character for knowingly and willingly taking an illegal campaign contribution. The ad also touches on McCurdy's Oklahoma conservatism.

* Michigan -- Bob Carr (D) vs. Spencer Abraham (R):

A recent TV poll had it Abraham 43%, Carr 42%.

* Tennessee -- Jim Cooper (D) vs. Fred Thompson (R):

Cooper, who is concerned his media campaign has not moved his numbers, is negotiating with Ray Strother to take over his television from Doc Sweitzer. Cooper's ads have tended to stress his conservatism which may be alienating his Democratic base. Thompson's ads, in contrast, have been credited with painting a populist image and igniting his campaign. The Chattanooga Press endorsed Thompson.

* Arizona -- Sam Coppersmith (D) vs. Jon Kyl (R):

Coppersmith won by 59 votes. Mahoney conceded and endorsed Coppersmith. One recent poll had Kyl leading Coppersmith 41-30%, another poll released 10/6/94 by KEAT-TV has Kyl up 39-31%. Kyl has \$3 million in the bank, Coppersmith only has \$60,000 on hand.

* Maine -- Tom Andrews (D) vs. Olympia Snowe (R):

Andrews continues to trail in this race. The most recent poll shows Andrews within 10 points of Snowe.

* Ohio -- Joel Hyatt (D) vs. Mike DeWine (R) vs. Joe Slovenec (I):

The Columbus Dispatch endorsed DeWine claiming he had an "exemplary 18 year record of achievement and public service conspicuously lacking in his opponent." Metzenbaum has just sent out a fundraising letter for Hyatt and the DSCC has committed \$680,000 to Hyatt's campaign. The DSCC has Hyatt 12 points down - Hyatt has moved up 7 points in the last week.

VI. Republican Open Seats

Best opportunities: Minnesota and Wyoming
Leaning Republican: Missouri

* **Minnesota - Ann Wynia (D) vs. Rod Grams (R):**

The DSCC says the most recent poll has the race: Wynia 46% and Grams 33%. A Star-Tribune poll has the race: Wynia - 44% and Grams - 38%. A St. Paul Pioneer Press poll has the race 44-42 with Grams ahead. Independents and moderates will decide this race.

* **Wyoming -- Mike Sullivan (D) vs. Craig Thomas (R):**

Sullivan, who has been under attack for being a friend of the President, has called on Alan Simpson to explain how his friendship with Bush led him to cast votes contrary to the good of Wyoming. This was in response to a Simpson mailing for Thomas warning voters against supporting a Democratic Senator with a Democrat in the White House. Simpson claims, that as a Senator, Sullivan will be under tremendous White House pressure to vote "the party line" and against the interests of Wyoming. Perot's United We Stand is focusing on this race.

* **Missouri -- Alan Wheat (D) vs. John Ashcroft (R):**

Ashcroft is attacking Wheat on his attendance record claiming Wheat missed 63 floor votes in 1994, including the September 29 vote to bar lobbyists from giving gifts to Members of Congress. Ashcroft is also attacking Wheat for being soft on crime because he supported educational grants for prisoners and he's hitting Wheat for supporting legislation that would extend federal benefits to illegal immigrants. Wheat's campaign is basically out of money.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund has endorsed Tom Andrews, Bob Carr, Sam Coppersmith, Joel Hyatt, Ted Kennedy, Chuck Robb, Alan Wheat and Ann Wynia.

GOVERNORS

I. Endangered Democratic Incumbents

* Florida -- Lawton Chiles (D) vs. Jeb Bush (R):

A Mason-Dixon poll has Bush leading Chiles 48-43%. While Bush leads, he is not popular with women voters. Chiles is on the air with an ad designed to appeal to women.

* Texas -- Ann Richards (D) vs. George Bush Jr. (R):

This race remains a dead heat, though Richards media has started to move her numbers up according to her tracking polls. A Houston Post poll has the race 43-41, with Richards ahead. Richards is benefitting from the support of pro-choice Republican and Independent women. On the downside, 40% of the electorate identifies with the Republican Party, while only 31% identify with the Democratic Party.

* New York -- Mario Cuomo (D) vs. George Pataki (R):

Breaking with the recent trend of polls, a Quinnipac College poll shows Cuomo leading Pataki 42%-38%. The NY Post claims that Quinnipac oversampled NY City and therefore the results are skewed toward Cuomo. A NY Times/CBS poll has the race 44% -41% Pataki ahead. The vote out of NYC is keeping Cuomo in this race. A black minister has invited Pataki to address his church which is seen as a move to help Pataki with black voters. Following in the footsteps of Christine Whitman, Pataki has promised a deep and broad-based tax cut for New Yorkers, saying he would cut the top tax rate by 25% over four years. However, he failed to say how he would pay for such a cut. A wealthy Independent candidate, Thomas Golisano, has announced his plans to enter the race. Golisano, who has said he will spend \$8-10 million of his own money on the campaign, cast his first vote just two years ago for Ross Perot. Giuliani is expected to endorse Pataki after the Columbus Day holiday, and David Dinkins endorsed Cuomo Thursday.

* New Mexico -- Bruce King (D) vs. Gary Johnson (R):

King is trailing by eight points -- roughly the level of support for the Hispanic third party candidate, Robert Mondragon.

* Colorado -- Roy Romer (D) vs. Bruce Benson (R):

Benson's previously sealed divorce records were recently released by the courts. Benson's wife claimed Benson physically threatened her during their marriage. Benson's Lt. Gov. running mate said Benson's divorce will certainly have a political impact and that it raises questions about his character. Benson is on the air attacking Romer for being too liberal -- Romer is described as a governor "who never met a tax he didn't like." The stories about Benson are taking effect - Romer now leads 53%-31%. The pollster said this is more than a bad bump from negative news stories he claims that Benson is in a dive and his money is not turning this race around for him.

* **Georgia -- Zell Miller (D) vs. Guy Millner (R):**
An Atlanta-Constitution poll showed Miller leading Millner 51 to 42.

* **Rhode Island -- Myrth York (D) vs. Lincoln Almond (R):**
A post primary poll has Almond leading York 38% to 37%.

II. Safe Democratic Incumbents

Dean (VT)

Folsom (AL)

Miller (NV) leads Jim Gibbons 49-39% (Las Vegas Review-Journal)

Nelson (NE)

Tucker (AR)

Tucker has released his financial disclosure reports, but continues to refuse to release his tax returns. Dan Burton (R-IN) is calling for a Congressional investigation of Tucker. Max Parker has dismissed Burton's actions as "bizarre."

III. Endangered Republican Incumbents

* **Arizona -- Eddie Basha (D) vs. Fife Symington (R):**
A KAET-TV poll has Basha leading Symington 50% to 34%. While among likely votes, the lead narrows to 9 points, Basha claims a screen for likely voters leaves out his base of Native Americans. The pollster agrees somewhat with that assessment and thinks ultimately Basha's lead is 10-12 points.

Opportunities:

* **Iowa -- Bonnie Campbell (D) vs. Terry Branstad (R):**
The Des Moines Register's Yepsen claims Branstad is on the comeback trail and that this race is far from over. One recent poll has Branstad up 44-42% and a Scott County TV poll has Branstad up by 12. According to Yepsen, Campbell has failed to capitalize on Branstad's rough summer (the Republican primary) and has failed to explain to the voters what she will do if elected governor. A Des Moines Register poll has Branstad at 45% and Campbell at 41%. Campbell is losing ground with women, independents and city-dwellers.

* **California -- Kathleen Brown (D) vs. Pete Wilson (R):**
State Democrats remain concerned about Brown and her campaign. Even Brown's husband has complained he can not recognize his wife as she is portrayed in her campaign. Brown still remains undefined to voters. Wilson currently leads 48-38%. Wilson has offered to debate Brown, once, on public TV, October 14 (Friday), after prime time or not at all. Brown has rejected the offer, hoping public and media pressure will force Wilson into other debates. A state judge recently ruled the gas chamber unconstitutional which continues to raise an issue that works against Brown in this race. Wilson took himself out of the 1996 Presidential race.

Longer shots:

* **Minnesota -- John Marty (D) vs. Arne Carlson (R):**

A recent St. Paul Pioneer Press poll has Carlson leading 54% to 29%. Marty is attacking Carlson for double-digit property tax increases and will try to paint him as "a lackey of the rich and privileged." Marty is trying to win Perot voters and towards that end, he called Carlson's primary opponent, Allen Quist, after the primary to wish him the best. Quist claims a call he placed to Carlson after the primary has yet to be returned.

* **Michigan -- Howard Wolpe (D) vs. John Engler (R):**

* **Illinois -- Dawn Clark Netsch (D) vs. Jim Edgar (R):**

Netsch's primary opponent, state Attorney General Roland Burris, has yet to endorse Netsch and Edgar is now receiving help from Burris political operatives. Burris' chief of staff recently hosted a fundraiser for Edgar. Burris is African-American and the support for Edgar by those close to Burris is sending an important message to the African-American community. GOP tracking polls are claiming Netsch is 36 points behind. Mayor Daley's political operation, in an effort to prevent a blood-bath, is now focusing on turning out the base Democratic vote in November. Edgar leads 52%-34%. Netsch is trailing badly among women voters - a constituency she needs.

Merrill (NH) leads Wayne King 74% to 12%

Miller -- not incumbent (SD)

Thompson (WI)

Voinovich (OH) leads Robert Burch 60%-23%.

Weld (MA) leads Mark Roosevelt 60%-29%

V. Democratic Open Seats

Best shots: (We are leading in each of these races)

* **Idaho -- Larry Echohawk (D) vs. Phil Batt (R):**

A Spokesman-Review poll has Echohawk leading Batt 48% to 33%.

* **Oregon -- John Kitzhaber (D) vs. Denny Smith (R):**

Smith recently sent out a transcript of a TV ad claiming Kitzhaber favors granting early release from prison for prisoners such as a double-killer Russell Obremski, and that Smith, as a Member of Congress, never voted for a tax increase. A quick check of the facts showed that Smith twice voted for a tax increase and that the early release program Kitzhaber supports would not effect Obremski. Smith never went up with the ad.

* **Maryland -- Paris Glendening (D) vs. Ellen Sauerbray (R):**

The Republican Party suffered a setback when the state attorney general ruled that since Sauerbray is accepting public financing for her campaign, any funds the party spends on her behalf, including in a coordinated campaign, will reduce her public funds. The Republicans are outraged and are appealing this ruling through the courts. Glendening is not accepting public financing for his campaign.

Toss-ups:

* **Pennsylvania -- Mark Singel (D) vs. Tom Ridge (R):**

As of September 19 Ridge had raised \$3.6 million and had \$2.5 million on hand. Singel has raised \$3.4 million and has \$868,000 on hand. The Singel campaign pointed out that it had spent \$2.1 million on TV time, mostly for ads that have yet to air. Ridge hopes to spend about \$6 million on the general election, about half on television. Many are reading good news for Democrats in these fundraising numbers. Pennsylvania is a Democratic state and Republicans have previously won here by massively outspending the Democrats. Singel is very competitive, money-wise. One most recent poll had Singel leading 43-37%, another poll by the Philadelphia Daily News shows Singel leading 38% to 35%. Right now, the major reason voters give for backing either candidate is party ID which means voters have yet to find any defining difference between Singel or Ridge.

* **Oklahoma -- Jack Mildren (D) vs. Frank Keating (R) vs. Wes Watkins (I):**

A Tulsa World poll has Mildren at 34%, Keating 25% and Watkins at 15%. People had expected Watkins to draw off votes from Mildren and throw the election to Keating, but so far that is not happening.

* **Tennessee -- Phil Bredesen (D) vs. Don Sundquist (R):**

An internal poll conducted for the Bredesen Campaign three weeks ago showed Bredesen trailing Sundquist by four points (41 to 45). However, a recent Mason-Dixon poll showed Sundquist leading 44% to 39%.

* **Wyoming -- Kathy Karpan (D) vs. Jim Geringer (R):**

Karpan's polling has her ahead 46-38%.

Longer shots:

* **Kansas -- Jim Slattery (D) vs. Bill Graves (R):**

The most recent poll in late August showed Slattery trailing Graves by 13 (34 to 47), with 19 undecided. We believe Slattery is currently down by 10 to 12 points.

- * **Hawaii -- Ben Cayetano (D) vs. Patricia Saiki (R) vs. Frank Fasi (I):**
Lt. Gov. Cayetano won the primary and is polling four points behind the leader, former Representative Pat Saiki, in a 3-way race. Cayetano's primary opponent endorsed him after the election.

VI. Republican Open Seats

- * **Maine -- Joe Brennan (D) vs. Susan Collins (R) vs. Angus King (I):**
Sue Collins' brother was recently arrested and charged with buying 1,000 pounds of marijuana worth more than \$1 million from an undercover agent. While Collins has said this incident has nothing whatsoever to do with her or her campaign, it has brought her further unwanted publicity. Earlier this year she was hit with a challenge to her state residency. In addition she trails in her fundraising efforts and she is far behind both Brennan and King in the polls.

- * **South Carolina -- Nick Theodore (D) vs. David Beasley (R):**
This race, a toss-up, is highlighted by us, as often as possible, to demonstrate Democratic strength in the South.

VII. Independent Open Seats

- * **Connecticut -- Bill Curry (D) vs. John Rowland (R) vs. Eunice Groark (CT Party) vs. Tom Scott (I):**
A Quinnipac College poll has Rowland at 38%, Curry at 22%, Groark at 7% and Scott at 5%, 28% are undecided. A Hartford Courant poll has the race Rowland 39%-Curry 31%, Groark and Scott trail badly. Rowland is running an ad hitting Curry for being a "liberal."
- * **Alaska -- Tony Knowles (D) vs. Jim Campbell (R) vs. Jack Coghill (I):**
Campbell is running a telephone poll that claims Knowles supports gay marriages and the rights of gays to adopt children. Knowles has said this is a lie, but Campbell has said the fact that it is a lie is irrelevant. An anti-gay group has targeted this race.

AR-04 JAY DICKEY (R) vs. JAY BRADFORD (D)

As you probably know, the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette's Brummett thinks this race is a deadheat, while others are saying Bradford trails. Dickey is home every weekend working his district hard.

AZ-06 KARAN ENGLISH (D) vs. J.D. HAYWORTH

A Public Opinion Strategies poll has Hayworth leading English, 51-35%.

GA-06 BEN JONES (D) vs. NEWT GINGRICH (R)

Gingrich cancelled a scheduled debate with Jones after Jones followed Gingrich to Wisconsin where Gingrich was campaigning for a Republican candidate and Jones hit him on GOPAC.

GA-08 CRAIG MATHIS (D) vs. SAXBY CHAMBLISS (R)

(Roy Rowland's open seat)

A Cooper-Secrest poll shows Mathis leading Chambliss 41-28% with 31% undecided.

ID-01 LARRY LAROCOCO (D) vs. HELEN CHENOWETH (R)

The latest PMR poll has LaRocco leading 45-39%.

IL-05 DAN ROSTENKOWSKI (D) vs. MIKE FLANAGAN (R)

Flanagan is complaining he is not receiving the support of the national party. Flanagan has only raised \$30,000.

KS-02 JOHN CARLIN (D) vs. SAM BROWNBACK (R)

(Slattery's open seat)

Brownback claims his poll shows him leading 50-35%. Carlin's campaign disputes this and says a recent Kansas Poll showed the race 42-42%.

LA - THE STATE

In Louisiana's open primary October 1, which is, in essence, the general election, all the incumbents were re-elected. Jimmy Hayes faced the toughest challenge and he defeated former Representative Clyde Holloway 53-40%.

MT-AL - PAT WILLIAMS (D) vs. CY JAMISON (R)

A recent Lee Newspapers poll has Williams leading Jamison 47-32%. An Independent candidate has 5% of the vote and 16% are undecided. The pollster said Williams is in good position and that his vote against gun control showed he was not tied to the President and it may be what saves his seat.

NH-02 DICK SWETT (D) vs. CHARLES BASS (R)

The GOP is convinced Swett's vote for the assault weapons ban will be his undoing, yet a recent poll showed that 73% of the voters in his district support a ban like the one that is contained in the crime bill.

NV-01 JIM BILBRAY (D) vs. JOHN ENSIGN (R)

A Las Vegas Review-Journal poll shows Bilbray leading Ensign 46-36% with 18% undecided. Political observers say Bilbray's numbers are partly due to Bilbray's support of the President and partly because a Bilbray political consultant is about to make \$7 million from a land swap made possible by a bill Bilbray offered in Congress.

NY-04 PHIL SCHILIRO (D) vs. DAN FRISA (R)

In a surprise upset, Rep. Dave Levy lost his primary to ex-Assemblyman Dan Frisa. Schiliro, Henry Waxman's AA, ran in this seat in 1992 and lost, in a close race, to Levy. Schiliro decided to sit out the 1994 election. After Levy's loss, Ferne Steckler, the 1994 Democratic nominee decided to run for NY judge instead. Schiliro has been named the Democratic candidate (Waxman will be very helpful in this race) and Levy, after indicating he would accept his loss, has now decided to contest the election. He has asked the courts to invalidate the election and order a new one.

PA-13 MARJORIE M-MEZVINSKY (D) vs. JON FOX (R)

According to a Mezvinsky poll she trails in this race, 39-35%. 11% are going with other candidates and just 15% are undecided.

TN-04 - JEFF WHORLEY (D) vs. VAN HILLEARY (R)
(Cooper's open seat)

The Tennessee Journal claims Hilleary has pulled about even with Whorley (no numbers given.) Whorley will have more money, but Hilleary has the backing of the Farm Bureau.

TX-24 - MARTIN FROST (D) vs. ED HARRISON (R)

Harrison claims his poll has the race tied at 41% each.

TX-25 - KEN BENTSEN (D) vs. GENE FONTENOT (R)

The Houston Chronicle recently endorsed Bentsen calling him a moderate in contrast to Fontenot's extremists views.

UT-02 - KAREN SHEPHERD (D) vs. ENID WALDHOLTZ (R) vs. MERRILL COOK (I)

A Desert News poll has Shepherd leading Cook with 36% to 29% and Waldholtz with 28%. Among likely voters it is a virtual deadheat: Waldholtz (the 1992 Republican nominee) 33%, Shepherd 31% and Cook 29%. Cook, a businessman, ran in 1992 for governor, as an Independent and came in second.

WA-5 TOM FOLEY (D) vs. GEORGE NETHERCUTT (R)

Foley has resisted advice to go negative on his opponent. He was up with a TV ad stressing his service to his district and the federal projects he has brought home. He is now up with an ad saying Nethercutt praised the Penny-Kasich bill in 1993 and that Penny-Kasich would have hurt health care for seniors and children and cut education funding. Nethercutt is hitting Foley for running a negative ad, Foley's people have responded it is not negative because it attacks a proposal, not Nethercutt personally. Bill McCollum (R-FL), who is looking to replace Newt Gingrich as the Republican whip, had spent \$30,000 on an independent expenditure in the primary, against Foley. Nethercutt has criticized independent expenditures and McCollum has said he will not spend anymore money against Foley. ABC news ran a piece on Foley's race Monday night and while they reported that Foley's message stressing his value to the district was having an effect, he was also oddly disengaged from the toughest race of his career. The Pullman Daily News said it is time for a change and endorsed Nethercutt.

WA-09 - MIKE KREIDLER (D) vs. RANDY TATE (R)

Kreidler is on the air attacking Tate for his anti-women positions - he opposes abortion rights and family/medical leave. Tate bested Kreidler in the open primary 52%-48% which was perceived as a referendum on Kreidler because they were the only two candidates on the ballot.
