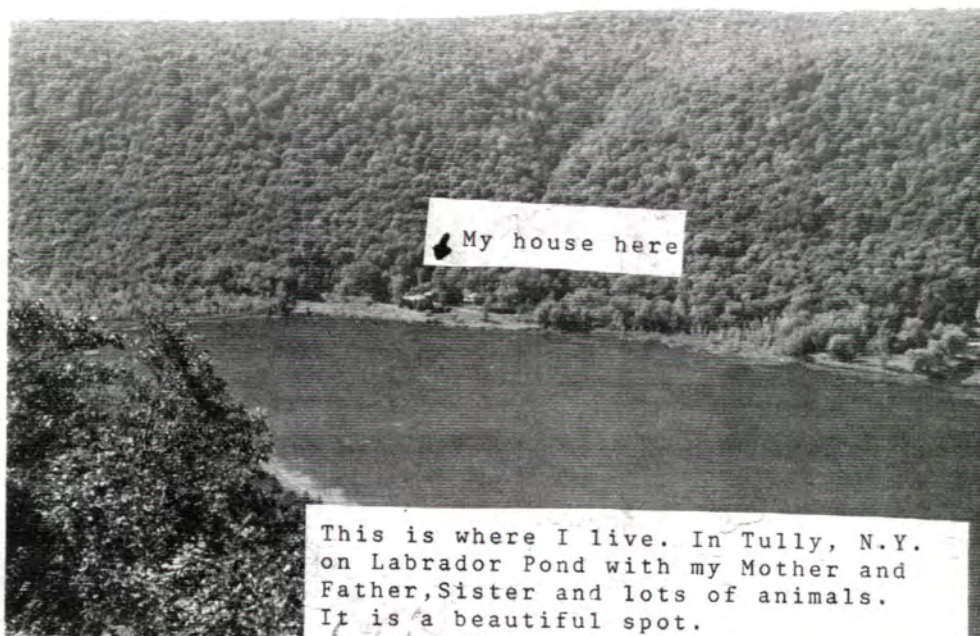

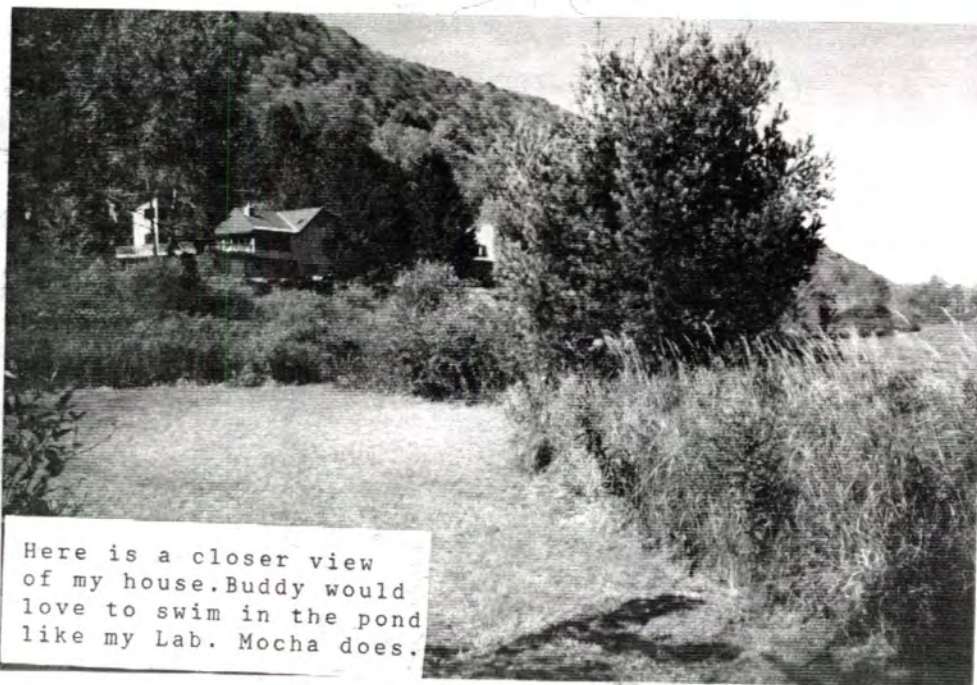

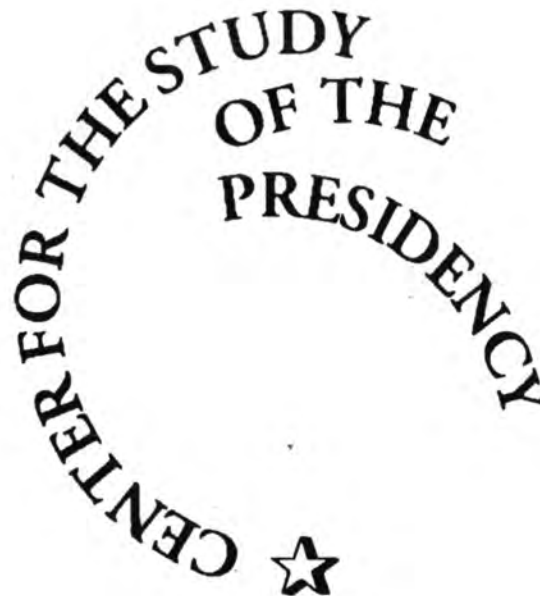

Dear Mr Schneider,

I am a journalist from Australia, engaged in writing the authorised biography of Kim Beazley, which will be coming out late next month - though we have not yet gone to the printing presses. I was given your name and number by Phillip Scanlan of Melbourne, who recommended I call you.

What I am hoping you might possibly help me with is to get a one or two sentence quote from President Clinton about Kim.

I know he and Kim are not close - the way Kim is with Tony Blair - but one of the things that has been credited with boosting the public's perception that he would be a good Australian Prime Minister, is a speech he made in the presence of the President in late November, 1996.

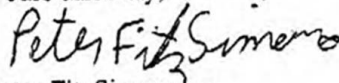
It rocked the Australian political elite back in its chair, and it was said that the President was most impressed. At the moment I quote what he told Kim's sister about it, but would infinitely prefer just two sentences from the President himself, on his own thoughts.

I realise this may be a forlorn hope on my part, but have been recently encouraged by my success in getting Tony Blair to write the foreword for the book, as well as being able to get strong quotes from both George Shultz and Caspar Weinberger about him.

For your perusal, I include both the Blair foreword, and the context in which I would seek to place the President's quotes.

If you can not help me, I thank you for your time anyway.

Beazley in reply made an essentially off-the-cuff speech from a few notes he'd jotted down the previous day, and rocked the room back in its collective chair. It was personable, had a sense of occasion, and clearly hit the mark. After pointedly also welcoming Hillary Clinton, whom the Prime Minister had ignored, he moved into the main body of his speech, drawing on his own deep knowledge of American politics and history.

"I want to congratulate you on that election victory. I always like to see a fellow win an election. It's a delight for those of us in Opposition to think that these things can occur from time to time. It was an historic one, indeed. Looking back, you are the only southern Democrat since Appomattox to win a second term. And I don't mention Appomattox in a gratuitous fashion here at all. It was a defining moment for the modern American nation, the event which underwrote America's role in the 20th century ...

"There's another reason I want to mention Appomattox, and note your status as the most successful Southern Democratic candidate for President since then. The way in which you reached out to all Americans of all ethnic, racial, cultural and religious backgrounds, and included them in your vision of the United States, is an inspiration to us all ..." He concluded: "I think you've got quite a story to tell in this country. But don't tell it for too long - get out on the beaches, get out on the golf courses. Get out snorkelling, and have a terrific time here."

Beazley sat down to thunderous applause from the assembled guests, as well as warm nods of appreciation from the American President and his wife.

"It was a great speech," notes Bob McMullan, who was there for the occasion, "which caught the attention of the elite, and that is important because it is the elite who communicate their opinion to others. It showed he had absolute dominance as an individual and as a person of international stature, leadership - compared to Howard." Lest that be viewed as simply a partisan pump-up, even so often acerbic a critic as Alan Ramsey also noted the speech as a turning point for Beazley. Ramsey was a member of the elite of which McMullan spoke, and was positively warm in his acclaim:

"For perhaps five minutes on Wednesday, Beazley looked and sounded more like a leader than in all the eight months since he replaced Paul Keating. It was a single speech, about 600 words. Yet it was a speech that did more for Beazley than maybe all the rest of the Clintons' visit did for the Prime Minister ..."

"Beazley's speech was everything Howard's wasn't: warm, humorous, self-deprecating, erudite, even passionate ..."

"It wasn't only what he said but the way he said it. Beazley has come to terms with Labor's defeat. He has settled in the Labor leadership. He is now emerging in his own right from the Hawke and Keating legacies of egomania. He knows it will be a long slog. He is starting to behave as a leader at ease with himself and his life, at least until the next election. He could, after all, be a very formidable opponent."

Clinton too, was clearly impressed. When Marilyn Wasson was introduced to him in a parliamentary corridor shortly after the function had concluded, she remembers the American President leaning close to her and saying, "Your brother can really, really speak!"

Susie Annus noticed the difference in the way people treated her husband almost immediately afterwards. "I think to that point," she says, "most people thought he was a stop-gap leader, that he was there only till Labor could find someone better, but after that speech it changed. People in the party and in the media saw him really shine in that particular forum, and were really impressed. I've probably seen Gough Whitlam, three or four times since then, and each time he says, 'that speech ... that day ...' It made a difference."

THE PRIME MINISTER

Kim was always a guy who stood out – in every way! Early on, even at University, he was streets ahead in terms of political savvy and intellect. Later, as I was still struggling to get on in the Labour Party, he made huge efforts to help me with advice, friendship and encouragement. I remember in 1982 he arranged for me – then not even in the UK Parliament – to meet Hayden, Hawke and Keating when I was in Australia, shortly before their election victory. It was incredibly decent of him, and showed what I have always found about him: no side, no love of status or position and a good friend.

Then later again, when Kim was a rising star in Government, we met regularly in the UK and Australia, discussing political issues and where the centre-left should develop.

His outstanding characteristic in my view is his judgement. He has a lightning quick appreciation of people and situations, and I have rarely found his judgement of either to be at fault. Like any of us he has ambition, but I always found he had it under control, if you know what I mean. He knows what he wants and will fight hard to get it, but he is essentially a principled and straight man. As you can see, I am proud to call him a friend.

IMPORTANT NOTICE To Applicants for Pardon

The following notice is provided pursuant to the Privacy Act of 1974 and may help you to understand what is involved in petitioning for pardon and why we need to obtain certain information about you.

The information which we request from you on the accompanying pardon application form, and in the event you are interviewed by an agent of the United States Government, is needed to help provide the basis of an informed judgment as to whether or not you should be granted a pardon. This is our only purpose in asking you to complete and sign the application and, if necessary, requesting that an investigation be made into your character and activities. You are under no obligation to furnish any information. However, unless you do provide us with all the information requested, we may be unable to process your application. Failure to provide your Social Security number will not prejudice your case.

In making inquiries with respect to these matters, an agent of the United States Government may interview you, as well as persons who have executed character affidavits or have written letters of reference on your behalf, neighbors, former and present employers, associates and other individuals who may be able to provide relevant information concerning you. While such inquiries are made discreetly and a reasonable effort is made not to disclose the underlying nature of the investigation, we cannot assure that the reason for the inquiry will not become known to some or all of the persons interviewed.

Our authority for requesting this information is the United States Constitution, Article II, Section 2 (the pardon clause); Order No. 1798-93, 58 Fed. Reg. 53658 and 53659 (1993), codified in 28 C.F.R. §§ 1.1 et seq. (the rules governing petitions for executive clemency); and Order of the Attorney General No. 1012-83, 48 Fed. Reg. 22290 (1983), as codified in 28 C.F.R. §§ 0.35 and 0.36 (the authority of the Pardon Attorney).

Executive clemency files are compiled and maintained to provide for the exercise of the President's constitutional pardon power and are routinely made available to him, members of his staff and other officials concerned with clemency proceedings. After the President has taken final action on an application, a public notice is prepared describing each grant of clemency (and may be prepared for each denial in cases of substantial public interest). A copy of each warrant of clemency is maintained in the Office of the Pardon Attorney as a public and official record.

Upon specific request, we advise anyone who asks whether a named person has been granted or denied clemency. Disclosure of the contents of executive clemency files to anyone may be made by the Pardon Attorney when the disclosure is required by law or the ends of justice. In addition, the pendency of an application is confirmed upon request, unless extraordinary considerations of privacy are presented in a particular case that outweigh the public interest in having access to this information. If you believe such privacy considerations are present in your case, you should so inform us in writing when you submit the application.

RULES GOVERNING PETITIONS FOR EXECUTIVE CLEMENCY

United States Department of Justice

WASHINGTON, D.C.

PART 1 - EXECUTIVE CLEMENCY

Authority: U.S. Const., Art. II, sec. 2; authority of the President as Chief Executive; and 28 U.S.C. §§ 509, 510.

§ 1.1 Submission of petition; form to be used; contents of petition.

A person seeking executive clemency by pardon, reprieve, commutation of sentence, or remission of fine shall execute a formal petition. The petition shall be addressed to the President of the United States and shall be submitted to the Pardon Attorney, Department of Justice, Washington, D.C. 20530, except for petitions relating to military offenses. Petitions and other required forms may be obtained from the Pardon Attorney. Petition forms for commutation of sentence also may be obtained from the wardens of federal penal institutions. A petitioner applying for executive clemency with respect to military offenses should submit his or her petition directly to the Secretary of the military department that had original jurisdiction over the court-martial trial and conviction of the petitioner. In such a case, a form furnished by the Pardon Attorney may be used but should be modified to meet the needs of the particular case. Each petition for executive clemency should include the information required in the form prescribed by the Attorney General.

§ 1.2 Eligibility for filing petition for pardon.

No petition for pardon should be filed until the expiration of a waiting period of at least five years after the date of the release of the petitioner from confinement or, in case no prison sentence was imposed, until the expiration of a period of at least five years after the date of the conviction of the petitioner. Generally, no petition should be submitted by a person who is on probation, parole, or supervised release.

§ 1.3 Eligibility for filing petition for commutation of sentence.

No petition for commutation of sentence, including remission of fine, should be filed if other forms of judicial or administrative relief are available, except upon a showing of exceptional circumstances.

§ 1.4 Offenses against the laws of possessions or territories of the United States.

Petitions for executive clemency shall relate only to violations of laws of the United States. Petitions relating to violations of laws of the possessions of the United States or territories subject to the jurisdiction of the United States should be submitted to the appropriate official or agency of the possession or territory concerned.

§ 1.5 Disclosure of files.

Petitions, reports, memoranda, and communications submitted or furnished in connection with the consideration of a petition for executive clemency generally shall be available only to the officials concerned with the consideration of the petition. However, they may be made available for inspection, in whole or in part, when in the judgment of the Attorney General their disclosure is required by law or the ends of justice.

§ 1.6 Consideration of petitions; recommendations to the President.

(a) Upon receipt of a petition for executive clemency, the Attorney General shall cause such investigation to be made of the matter as he/she may deem necessary and appropriate, using the services of, or obtaining reports from, appropriate officials and agencies of the Government, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

(b) The Attorney General shall review each petition and all pertinent information developed by the investigation and shall determine whether the request for clemency is of sufficient merit to warrant favorable action by the President. The Attorney General shall report in writing his or her recommendation to the President, stating whether in his or her judgment the President should grant or deny the petition.

§ 1.7 Notification of grant of clemency.

When a petition for pardon is granted, the petitioner or his or her attorney shall be notified of such action and the warrant of pardon shall be mailed to the petitioner. When commutation of sentence is granted, the petitioner shall be notified of such action and the warrant of commutation shall be sent to the petitioner through the officer in charge of his or her place of confinement, or directly to the petitioner if he/she is on parole, probation, or supervised release.

§ 1.8 Notification of denial of clemency.

(a) Whenever the President notifies the Attorney General that he has denied a request for clemency, the Attorney General shall so advise the petitioner and close the case.

(b) Except in cases in which a sentence of death has been imposed, whenever the Attorney General recommends that the President deny a request for clemency and the President does not disapprove or take other action with respect to that adverse recommendation within 30 days after the date of its submission to him, it shall be presumed that the President concurs in that adverse recommendation of the Attorney General, and the Attorney General shall so advise the petitioner and close the case.

§ 1.9 Delegation of authority.

The Attorney General may delegate to any officer of the Department of Justice any of his or her duties or responsibilities under §§ 1.1 through 1.8.

§ 1.10 Advisory nature of regulations.

The regulations contained in this part are advisory only and for the internal guidance of Department of Justice personnel. They create no enforceable rights in persons applying for executive clemency, nor do they restrict the authority granted to the President under Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution.

INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS ON PARDONS

Please read carefully before completing the pardon application

1. Submit the petition to the

Office of the Pardon Attorney

All petitions, except petitions relating to military offenses (see paragraph 6 below), should be forwarded to the Pardon Attorney, Department of Justice, 500 First Street N.W., 4th Floor, Washington, D.C. 20530. It is important that the completed pardon petition be entirely legible; therefore, please print or type. *The form must be completed fully and accurately in order to be considered.* You may attach to the petition additional pages and documents which amplify or clarify your answer to any question.

2. Federal convictions only

Only federal convictions are subject to presidential pardon since the federal pardon power does not extend to state offenses. Necessary information concerning the conviction may be obtained from the clerk of the federal court where you were convicted.

3. Five-year waiting period required

A minimum waiting period of five years after completion of sentence is required before anyone who has been convicted of violating a federal law is eligible to apply for a presidential pardon. The eligibility waiting period required by the Rules Governing Petitions for Executive Clemency (as published in Title 28, Code of Federal Regulations, §1.1 *et seq.*) begins on the date of the petitioner's release from confinement. If the conviction resulted in probation or a fine and no term of imprisonment, the waiting period begins on the date of conviction. In addition, the petitioner should have satisfied the penalty imposed, including all probation, parole, or supervised release. The waiting period is designed to afford the petitioner a reasonable time in which to demonstrate an ability to lead a responsible, productive and law-abiding life to the betterment of the community. Accordingly, offenses committed subsequent to the offense for which pardon is sought may lengthen the minimum eligibility period for pardons. Waiver of any portion of the waiting period is rarely granted and then only in the most exceptional circumstances.

4. Reason for seeking pardon

In answering question 17 on page 6 of the petition, you should state the specific purpose for which you are seeking pardon and attach documentary evidence (e.g., copies of applicable provisions of state constitutions, statutes or regulations and/or letters from appropriate officials of administrative agencies, professional associations, licensing authorities or the like) that a pardon will be helpful to you in accomplishing the purpose for which it is sought. Most disabilities attendant upon a federal felony conviction, e.g., the right to vote and hold public office, are imposed by state rather than federal law, and may be removed by state action. The federal pardon process is exacting and may be more time-consuming than state procedures for restoration of civil rights, and you may therefore wish to consult in this regard with the Governor or other appropriate authorities of the state of your residence (e.g., the state board of pardons and paroles).

5. Multiple federal convictions

If you are seeking pardon of more than one federal conviction, the most recent conviction should be shown in response to question 2 of the petition and the form completed as to that conviction. The information requested in questions 2 through 4 of the petition concerning any other federal convictions, including convictions by military courts-martial, should be provided on an attachment. Any federal charges not resulting in conviction should be reported in the space provided for prior and subsequent arrests (question 5).

6. Pardon of a military offense

If you are requesting pardon of a military offense only, you should submit your completed petition directly to the Secretary of the military department which had original jurisdiction in your case, completing questions 2 through 4 and question 13 of the petition form to show all pertinent information concerning your court-martial trial and conviction. You should be aware that pardon of a military offense will not change the character of a military discharge. This may be accomplished only by appropriate military authorities.

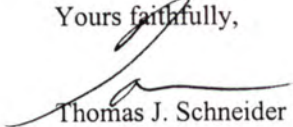

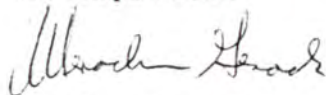
The Nazerite is a mysterious and enigmatic figure. He is enjoined from cutting his hair, imbibing wine and coming in contact with a dead person. The Bible has an ambivalent view of the Nazerite. On the one hand he is declared as holy: 'All the days of his Nazeriteship he is holy unto the Lord' (Num. 6:8). Yet at the conclusion of his Nazeriteship he is required to bring a sin-offering in the Temple (Num.:6: 14). He is both saint and sinner simultaneously. The Talmud suggests that his sin is not in concluding his Nazeriteship, but in initially refraining from drinking wine and living an isolated ascetic existence, rather than enjoying and sanctifying the permissible pleasures of God's creation.

The Nazerite is forbidden to come in contact with a corpse, even of his closest relatives. "All the days that he consecrateth himself with the Lord, he shall not come near a dead body. He shall not make himself unclean for his father, or for his mother, for his brother, or for his sister, when they die; because his consecration unto God is upon his head" (Num. 6: 6-7). Similarly, a Priest is forbidden to come in contact with a corpse, with a dispensation given only for his immediate family.

"And the Lord said unto Moses: Speak unto the priests the sons of Aaron, and say unto them: There shall none defile himself for the dead among his people; except for his kin that is near unto him, for his mother and his father, and for his son and his daughter, and for his brother and for his sister" (Lev. 21:1-3). Why does the Bible, as it enumerates the kin for whom the Nazerite may not defile himself, not list the son and daughter as it does in Leviticus as relates to the Priest?

Who is the Nazerite? He is a person who is idealistic and enthusiastic, though disillusioned with a hedonistic world and frustrated with the established order. By rejecting the pleasure of the grape and the convention of the well-kept appearance, he achieves holiness through withdrawal. That enthusiasm, idealism, impatience with the world and uncompromising standard is the mark of a young person. "And I raised up of your sons for prophets, and of your young men for Nazerites" (Amos 2:11). We often see, as we did recently in Indonesia, that the element in society most sensitive to the corrupt existing system is the youth. With great passion and courage, they have led student revolts against oppressive regimes. The Bible does not list son and daughter among the kin of the Nazerite, suggests Rabbi Yaakov Kaminetsky, for he is typically young, unmarried, and has not yet established his own family.

The Bible crowns the Nazerite with glory for his sanctity, self-sacrifice and youthful zeal. But it requires of him to bring a sin-offering for his impetuousness, isolation, and aloofness. While God calls us to holiness and demands of us exacting standards of behavior, He wants us to be open to and engaged with society, tolerant and compassionate.

Greetings! It's been wonderful to read about your European travels and all that has been accomplished in your meetings there.

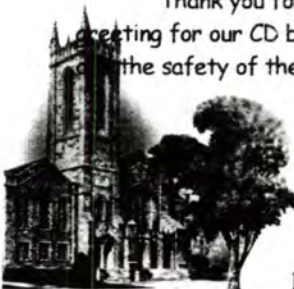

In view of Lionel Jospin's official visit this week I thought it would be helpful to let you know the state of our Third Way relations with the French.

I spoke in Paris last week (speech attached) to help cement the rapport between Blair and Jospin. I added to my text in order to show i) the similarity of their traditional values/pragmatic methods approach ii) the importance of using our current centre-left strength internationally to beat the right in the long-term.

Throughout my discussions with Jospin's people, the only aspect of our Third Way dialogue about which they were ambivalent is the American involvement. They are not so much antagonistic as bemused by our desire to include non-Europeans. For the French, everything is seen in terms of strengthening Europe in the world - its presence, profile, political and cultural identity. Why go out of our way to dilute this by introducing the Americans to our dialogue?

We shouldn't over-react to this. They question rather than reject American involvement and they do so on European identity grounds rather than ideology. They accept that Mr Clinton's thinking and policies are novel in the American context and cannot make a case for excluding Americans as a matter of principle.

The argument I used for going further and being inclusive was that Reagan and Thatcher used their trans-Atlantic relationship to great effect. They created an ideological high-tide, extending their influence and prevalence through organisation, communications and orchestration of message. Why should the right have all the best tunes? Now that we are in a new time, with a new generation of centre left leaders, why shouldn't we create for our side, by similar means, what they achieved for theirs?

This chauvinistic appeal found an echo amongst them. I think they will be more sympathetic to our plans, moreover, as long as they feel fully part of the action, that Jospin's role is properly sought and respected and that our proposals do not look like a Clinton-Blair love in.

Of course, Jospin will be cautious. He has to look over his shoulder at his own left and communist allies. He doesn't want to be embarrassed. But I think he wants to be associated with us - as long as the French Europe-first mind set is not threatened and his purist credentials are not compromised by any premature over-playing of our hand.

✓ Against this background, I hope the President will be able to introduce the subject of our Third Way dialogue in conversation with Jospin in a broad and general way and to give him encouragement and confidence without, of course, appearing to supplant existing European contacts and arrangements.

I hope this is helpful.

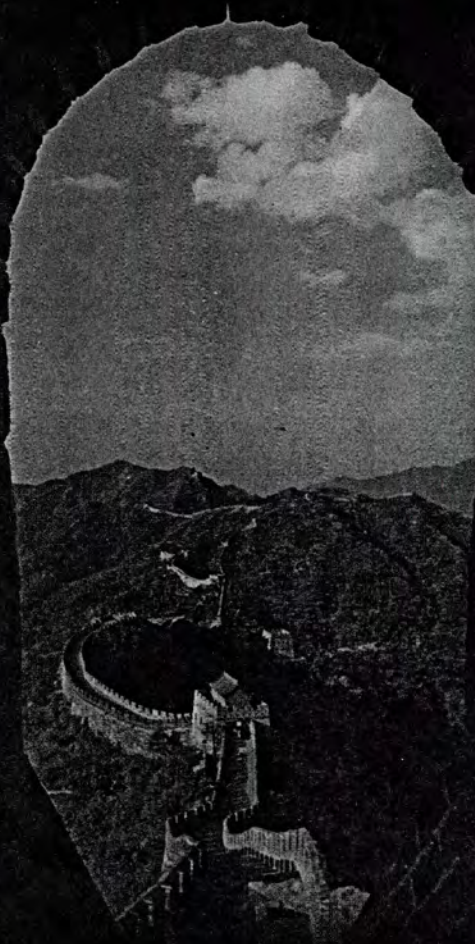

With more than 1,000,000 petition signatures for a November ballot measure, California voters also have sent a message that they believe California tribes should keep the legal, regulated, and responsible gaming they now operate.

All the strides that Indian people in California have made in the last decade, however, could be halted this year, unless your Administration lives up to its historical, legal and moral obligation to serve as the Trustee for Indian tribes to balance the scales under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act.

Pending federal enforcement actions may shut down the video gaming machines that we have operated on tribal lands for many years. The purported rationale is that California tribes have not reached tribal-state gaming compacts with the State of California. In fact, it is the State which -- for 7 long years -- has resisted good faith negotiations with the California tribes. Instead, representatives of the state negotiated a secret compact with just one tribe (a tribe that does not even engage in gaming). The State would have this one compact imposed on every gaming and non-gaming tribe in the State, while relying on the federal enforcement actions just as if they were a gun pointed at the heads of tribal leaders.

Mr. Clinton, the California tribes continue to stand ready to enter into good faith negotiations with the State of California, and we have asked Attorney General Reno to enforce federal law evenhandedly. If the Department of Justice continues enforcement actions against California gaming tribes, we believe it should apply equal pressure, including legal action, to convince the State to negotiate in good faith with the tribes. The scales must be leveled to break the impasse in tribal-state compact negotiations.

Our message is simple, Mr. President. The Indian people of California need your moral leadership to ensure economic parity and justice.

On behalf of the Indian people of California, we assemble in Washington, D.C. to declare our principles, outlined below, and to ask our Federal Trustee to balance the scales of justice now.

A Declaration of Principles by the California Tribal Governments

For over a century, non-tribal governments and big special interests have used their power to take away the land, resources and even the lives of California Indians. These assaults were called "legal" and the tribes' efforts to keep what they always had were deemed "illegal."

Now, history is repeating itself. We face a shutdown of our gaming operations, the loss of thousands of jobs for non-Indians, millions of dollars to local communities and state and local governments, and the renewed deprivation of our people. Yet for years we have asked the Governor of California to sit down with tribes and negotiate a good faith tribal-state gaming compact, one that would permit the tribes to continue to conduct legal, responsible and regulated gaming. The Governor consistently refused to do so – in our judgment, contrary to the express obligations under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act (IGRA). Now California's gaming tribes face enforcement actions by the U.S. Government to shut us down because there is no compact! Yet the same U.S. Government, contrary to its historical, legal and moral obligation as the trustee of the Indian tribes, refuses to enforce the law and require the California Governor to negotiate in good faith with us.

Where is the fairness? Where is the justice?

Recently over one million Californian voters signed petitions – in a record-breaking four weeks time – to afford us an opportunity to have a model compact that provides for *regulated* and *legal* gaming to be approved by the people. It appears Las Vegas gaming have already invaded our state with tens of millions of dollars in an attempt to prevent Indian tribes from achieving economic self-reliance. We are determined they will not be successful.

We are no longer willing to be labeled illegal or un-American or be branded criminals for our struggle to support ourselves. We are the first people to know and call California our home and the first people to love this land we now share. Our fathers and

mothers, brothers and sisters, and sons and daughters fought in every American war to defend the principles upon which the country was founded – the right of self-government and self-determination and the freedom to establish a promising future that our children and our children's children can depend on.

As representatives of the tribal governments of California, we want America's elected leaders to understand the principles that define, inform and guide our actions:

1. ***The key to our future is the protection of our tribal sovereignty and our right to self-governance.***

It is our inherent right and responsibility to protect our culture, our lands, our resources, and our children. It is a precious legacy from our ancestors and a responsibility to our children. The tribe's government-to-government relationship with the federal government, including its agencies, is not merely a philosophical statement. It is based upon federal law and recognized in President Bill Clinton's statement to the tribes in the historic White House meeting in 1994. President Clinton directed the heads of the federal agencies to work with tribes on a government-to-government basis. The U.S. Government must honor its historic, legal and moral obligation to serve as the trustee for the Indian people. Mere words are not enough. Action is required. Under the law set forth in the 1988 Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, the U.S. Government must serve as the tribes' trustees to enforce the State of California's obligation to negotiate tribal-state gaming compacts in good faith with tribal governments consistent with their rights as sovereign nations under federal law.

2. ***We stand for legal, regulated, and responsible gaming – with the objective of achieving economic self-reliance and improving the quality of life for tribal members and their children.***

California tribes stand at the brink of cultural and economic extinction. Economic self-reliance has been, and will continue to be, the true goal of tribal governments through the conduct of legal, responsible and regulated gaming operations, particularly to provide the tribes the means to achieve other economic development and (consistent with California law and its state constitution) diversity for the tribes. The U.S. Government, as trustee of Indian tribes, has a responsibility to support these efforts to achieve economic self-reliance and diversity. Achieving such economic self-reliance for Indians is one of the key purposes expressed by the U.S. Congress when it passed the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act.

3. ***We believe in sharing. We are committed to the protection of continued economic benefits from tribal gaming for all Californians.***

It is a tribal tradition to share. Sharing means sometimes ensuring that our neighbors do not go hungry or that an electric bill gets paid. This tradition did not start when we commenced gaming operations and were able to generate financial resources. When the Pilgrims faced their first winter with little food or shelter, it was the Indians who helped them by sharing their resources. Currently legal, regulated gaming operations provide thousands of jobs, an overwhelming majority of which are provided to non-Indian people; millions in retail sales and tax revenues; and substantial financial support for social programs and charitable organizations -- thereby benefiting our neighbors and local communities surrounding the tribes and Californians state-wide. For example, in San Diego County, the Viejas, Barona, and Sycuan Bands of Kumeyaay -- combining wages paid, tax revenues generated, and goods and services purchased -- are estimated to contribute \$186 million to the state and local community economies. We are proud of our legacy of sharing and are committed to seeing our gaming continue as a resource for both gaming and non-gaming tribes, our neighboring communities, and all of California.

4. ***Consistent with tribal sovereignty and government-to-government relations, we believe in working with local governments, agencies and elected officials who fully recognize and respect tribal sovereignty.***

Indian tribes are committed to working towards a process that ensures a partnership with local governments and elected officials. Such a partnership would be premised on mutual respect and assurances of no incursions on tribal sovereignty. Tribes also support strong and fair employment relations. Indian tribes continue to be committed and responsible employers, carrying out tribe-maintained fair employment policies. We want to preserve and encourage amicable relations with our non-Indian neighbors. We will continue to work cooperatively with governmental agencies that respect tribal sovereignty.

5. ***We support the Tribal Government Gaming and Economic Self-Sufficiency Act -- a model compact that recognizes and honors Indian governmental sovereignty while preserving the emerging economic self-reliance provided by Indian gaming.***

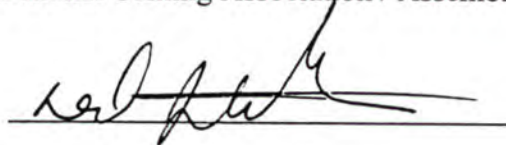
The California Governor has refused to negotiate with Indian tribes in good faith -- as required under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act. Therefore, the California Indians have been forced to place their own model gaming compact on the ballot. It is called the Tribal Government Gaming and Self-Sufficiency Act. We support this ballot measure that preserves the ability of tribes to create and sustain the emerging economic self-sufficiency provided by Indian Governmental gaming.

The model compact to be voted on by California voters provides for regulated and responsible gaming operations, licensing and regulatory standards. It also provides for the sharing of resources with non-gaming tribes as well as community programs and charitable organizations.

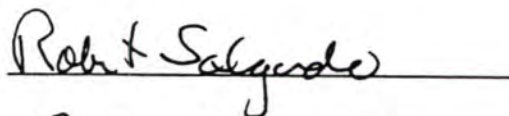
We are confident the people of California will not permit outside, powerful money interests --mostly from Las Vegas -- to alter their support for California tribes in their effort to finally achieve economic self-sufficiency through legal, regulated and responsible gaming operations.

Therefore, be it resolved: We, as tribal nations, stand together at a time when our opponents are determined to keep us powerless and in poverty. We will not allow it! Gaming and non-gaming tribes alike are affected by these struggles. We strongly support the continued operation of Indian gaming consistent with the aforementioned and mutually agreed-upon principles.

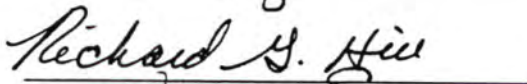

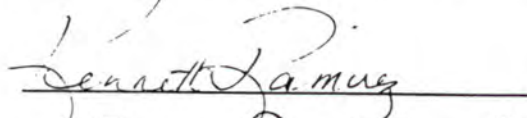
