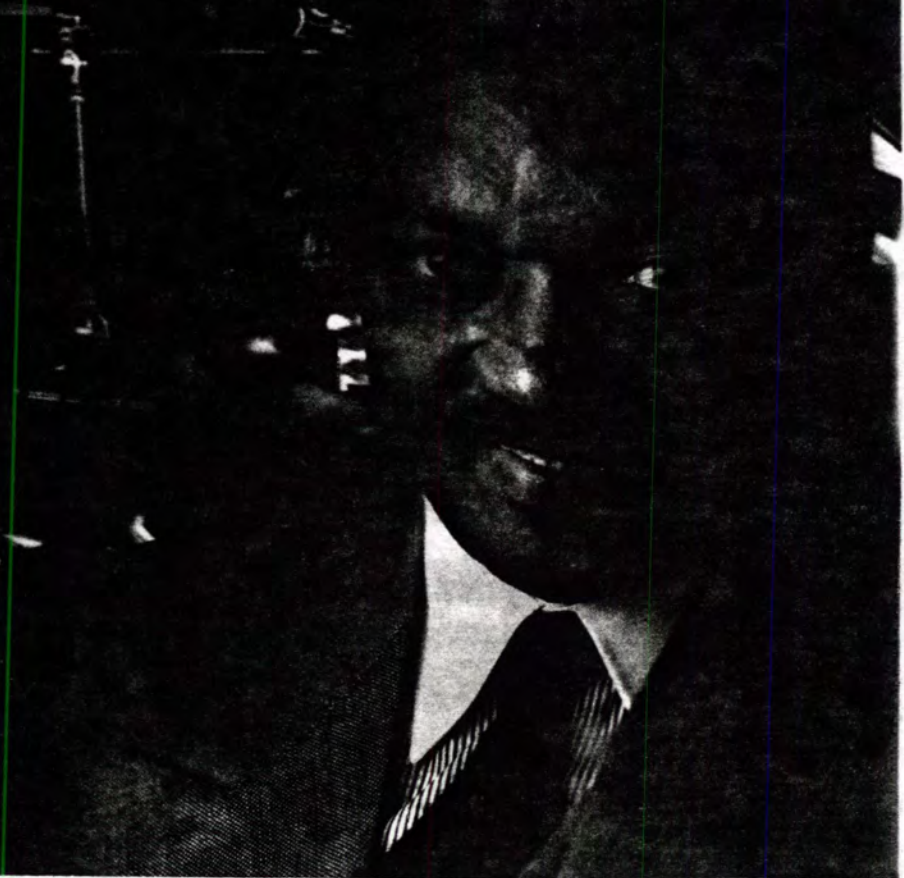

children hope and teaches them how to fulfill their dreams.

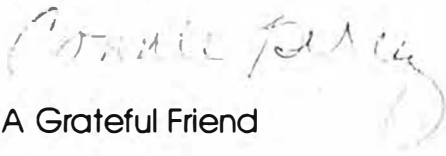
What can our country do to support the children and Dream Fund Outreach to support their dreams and help make them come true?

Dear Mr. President:

We are writing on behalf of our clients, the Yavapai-Apache Nation of Arizona and the Pueblos of Tesuque and Sandia in New Mexico, to relay their position on two issues: the so-called Enzi-Reid Amendment to the Interior Appropriations bill and Section 129 of the same bill.

ENZI-REID AMENDMENT

All our clients, and we believe most if not all tribes nation wide, are strongly opposed to the amendment offered by Senators Mike Enzi (R-WY) and Harry Reid (D-NV) to S. 2237, the FY '99 Interior Appropriations bill. We urge you to issue a veto threat against this attempt to bar the Secretary of Interior from promulgating final regulations for Class III gaming. These regulations will be effective only when a state refuses to negotiate in good faith, and they are critical to resolution of the stalemate between tribes and states. The United States Supreme Court in *Seminole Tribe v. Florida* held that the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act ("IGRA") cannot waive the states' immunity from suit. As a result, states cannot be forced to negotiate and thus often impose unacceptable conditions on negotiations by exacting concessions, using *Seminole* as leverage to gain favorable and often unconscionable terms in gaming compacts. Without the presence of alternative procedures, states have no incentive to negotiate in good faith. The only recourse left available to tribes is either an administrative or legislative remedy. No legislative remedy has emerged, and Secretary Babbitt's proposed regulations are an attempt to provide an administrative remedy.

It was never the intent of Congress or IGRA to give states a blanket veto power over an Indian tribe's right to conduct gaming. § 2710 (d) (7) (B)(vii) of IGRA specifically allows tribes to go directly to the Secretary and ask the Secretary to adopt procedures for the conduct of Class III gaming on a tribe's reservation. **By including this provision, Congress acknowledged that, if a tribe and state cannot reach an agreement, it is left up to the Secretary, in his role as trustee, to determine and then implement appropriate procedures.** This section of IGRA is in keeping

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with the Department's authority to prescribe regulations governing conduct on Indian lands.¹ Aside from being contrary to the intent of Congress and the spirit of the law, the Enzi-Reid amendment is unacceptable for a number of other reasons including:

1. **The United States has a trust responsibility.** The United States District Court for the Northern District on California, in *Chemehuevi Indian Tribe, et. al. V. United States*, declared that the United States has a mandatory obligation on behalf of Indian tribes to sue states that fail to negotiate compacts in good faith under IGRA.
2. **It legislates in an appropriations bill.** No hearings have been held on the matter. Congress should not deny tribes an administrative remedy without first having a full and open forum to discuss the matter, certainly prior to its being attached as a rider to an appropriations measure. The Enzi-Reid amendment was previously added to the FY'98 Emergency Supplemental Appropriations Act for Recovery from Natural Disasters and for Overseas Peacekeeping Efforts with little more than fifteen minutes of debate over the objections of both the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs ("SCIA"). It was rightfully removed during conference by members from both the House and Senate due to the lack of Congressional consideration of the provision. The circumstances have not changed since then, no hearings have been held by SCIA, and S. 1572, the underlying bill behind the amendment, has not gained more than a smattering of cosponsors. Given all this, we respectfully urge you to oppose this amendment and issue a veto threat against S. 2237 should the amendment be included in its final form.

SECTION 129

Section 129 of S. 2237, the FY 1999 appropriations bill for the Department of the Interior and Related Agencies, would punish those very tribes that, against all odds and as the result of their foresight, perseverance, and hard work, have prospered. Not only is this contrary to the "American Way," which has been the standard that tribes have so often been encouraged to adopt, but it flies in the face of every federal policy and every piece of Indian self-determination legislation of the past several decades. Second, Section 129 would impose on Indian tribes alone the kind of share-the-wealth socialism that Congress has, in every other way, been working hard to remove from the nation's tax and other laws. Before Congress decides to go down this road, we suggest that it examine its positions and policies regarding income taxes, which also are regularly accused of punishing success. If a reallocation of means is appropriate for America's Indians, then why not

institute steeply graduated income tax rates, under which those with greater means would pay more than those with less?

Indians now, as a group, receive *far less* federal spending per capita than do non-Indians—supposedly equal citizens—and budgets for Indian programs are shrinking at a far faster rate than others. Your FY 1999 request for tribal programs was tight to begin with, yet the Senate's proposed appropriations for Interior slash the available funding even further. Congress has at its disposal volumes of information, including shocking GAO reports, on the extraordinary needs of tribes in every possible category: crime-fighting, education, school construction, health care, decent housing, resource protection, and so on. Yet the "solution" proposed by Section 129 would cut into the assets of those tribes that, while perhaps at the "top," are at the top of the neediest group in America.

Section 129 seems to proceed from the assumption that the most successful tribes all live on easy street, which is simply not the case. The Pueblo of Sandia would fall within the ten percent of tribes whose funds would be cut under Section 129, yet life and conditions at that Pueblo are far from what that designation might lead one to expect. They continue to have many outstanding needs in the areas of health, roads, housing, violence and crime, and the environment, among others, despite their "wealth" relative to other tribes, which "wealth" is the result of hard work and constant struggles against the odds. Sandia's government needs increase daily due to the proximity of the ever-growing urban population, yet, due to constantly changing political, legal, and economic idiosyncracies, they have only *with difficulty* been able to accomplish many objectives that surrounding non-tribal governments do with ease.

We understand that there are tribes at the bottom of the scale whose members struggle on a daily basis just to survive. **If it is the Senate's sincere desire to help these tribes in the greatest need, the most straightforward way to do that would be to restore and increase appropriations for Indian programs generally.** If fairness is our government's aim, we can suggest a method to provide even greater fairness, while securing these additional funds and billions more: apply "means testing" to social security payments. Section 129 appears to reflect the Senate's blunt appraisal that Indian tribes are an easier mark than the AARP.

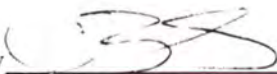
This measure was put into the Interior appropriations bill not only without consulting with the tribes but also without discussing it among the Senators themselves, without the benefit of any hearings, research, or the like. Just last year, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, at the request of Congress, formed a TPA Work Group to conduct a nationwide tribal needs assessment study and to propose a solution to such problems as may be shown to exist. The Work Group has held hearings and is still in the process of gathering and analyzing information. Why act before the results are in? What we need is a method and fair criteria to identify and provide for scores of unmet needs in Indian Country, not new laws to redistribute the lack of wealth.

JOINT COMMUNIQUE OF THE MEETING BETWEEN

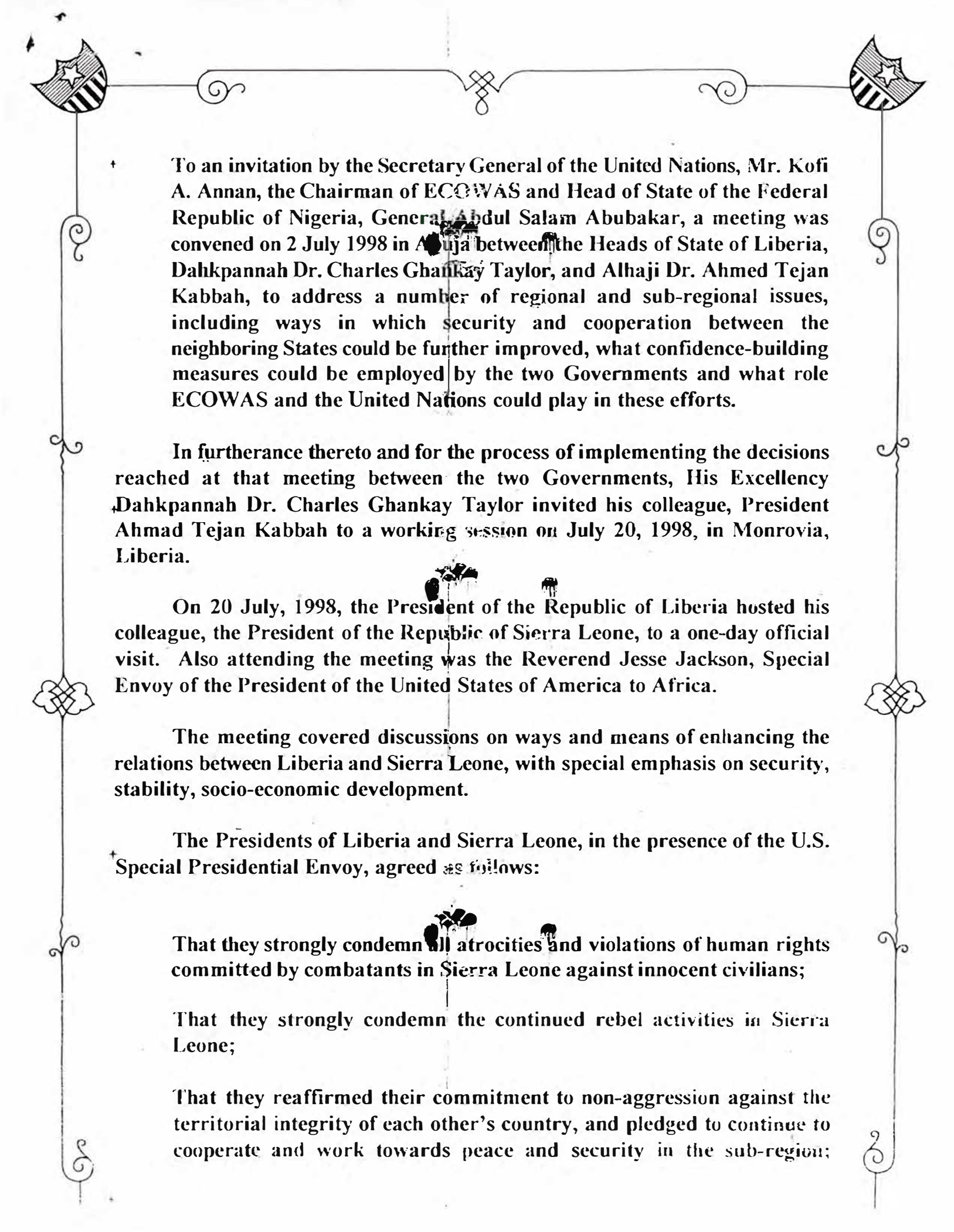

To an invitation by the Secretary General of the United Nations, Mr. Kofi A. Annan, the Chairman of ECOWAS and Head of State of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, General Abdul Salam Abubakar, a meeting was convened on 2 July 1998 in Abuja between the Heads of State of Liberia, Dahkpannah Dr. Charles Ghankay Taylor, and Alhaji Dr. Ahmed Tejan Kabbah, to address a number of regional and sub-regional issues, including ways in which security and cooperation between the neighboring States could be further improved, what confidence-building measures could be employed by the two Governments and what role ECOWAS and the United Nations could play in these efforts.

In furtherance thereto and for the process of implementing the decisions reached at that meeting between the two Governments, His Excellency Dahkpannah Dr. Charles Ghankay Taylor invited his colleague, President Ahmad Tejan Kabbah to a working session on July 20, 1998, in Monrovia, Liberia.

On 20 July, 1998, the President of the Republic of Liberia hosted his colleague, the President of the Republic of Sierra Leone, to a one-day official visit. Also attending the meeting was the Reverend Jesse Jackson, Special Envoy of the President of the United States of America to Africa.

The meeting covered discussions on ways and means of enhancing the relations between Liberia and Sierra Leone, with special emphasis on security, stability, socio-economic development.

The Presidents of Liberia and Sierra Leone, in the presence of the U.S. Special Presidential Envoy, agreed as follows:

That they strongly condemn all atrocities and violations of human rights committed by combatants in Sierra Leone against innocent civilians;

That they strongly condemn the continued rebel activities in Sierra Leone;

That they reaffirmed their commitment to non-aggression against the territorial integrity of each other's country, and pledged to continue to cooperate and work towards peace and security in the sub-region;



That they reaffirmed their commitment to foster socio-economic cooperation between their two countries.

The two leaders renewed their call on ECOWAS and the United Nations to deploy observer units to the Liberian-Sierra Leonean border to assist the security forces of both countries in ensuring full compliance with UN Resolution 1132.

The two leaders agreed to coordinate their border security activities, and to cooperate with ECOMOG forces and UN observers, with the view of creating a mechanism to enhance border security.

They also expressed the hope that the Government of the United States of America will consider providing logistical and technical assistance in support of the above mentioned efforts.

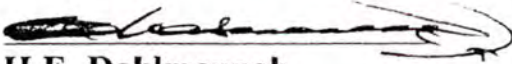
That they would continue to take measures to build confidence among the political leadership and people of their two countries.

That at the close of the working session His Excellency Alhaji Dr. Ahmad Tejan Kabbah expressed sincere thanks to the Government and People of the Republic of Liberia for the warm welcome and traditional African hospitality extended to him and his delegation.

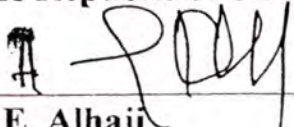

SUBJECT: American Heritage Rivers

The attached McGinty memo asks you to designate as "American Heritage Rivers" the 10 rivers recommended by your Advisory Committee and to make several additional designations that would bring the total designations to 14. *None of your advisers objects to the recommendations.*

Background. Last year, you established by Executive Order this initiative, which encouraged communities to nominate their rivers for designation as American Heritage Rivers. The response was very positive -- 126 rivers were nominated. Last March, you named an Advisory Committee to recommend 10 of the nominees for designation. You have now received the Advisory Committee's report and recommendations. On Monday, the VP is scheduled to announce your decision; you will issue a proclamation and visit one of the rivers next Thursday.

Action. McGinty asks you to make four decisions. First, she recommends that you designate the 10 rivers recommended by the Advisory Committee. They are:

- The Hudson River (NY)
- The Connecticut River (NH, VT, MA, CT)
- The Potomac River (PA, MD, DC, VA, WV)
- The New River (VA, WV, NC)
- The St. John's River (FL)
- The Detroit River (MI)
- The Mississippi River (IL, IA, MN, MO, WI)
- The Rio Grande (TX)
- The Willamette River (OR)
- The Hanalei River (HI)

Second, she recommends that you designate another group of communities along the Mississippi River, namely Memphis, TN, and Baton Rouge/New Orleans, LA, in addition to the communities of the Upper Mississippi that the Advisory Committee recommended. A majority of the Committee favored designating the TN and LA sections, but had concerns about the available resources. McGinty advises that resources are sufficient for an additional designation.

Third, she joins the Advisory Committee in recommending that you designate additional rivers. McGinty proposes three that were nominated but not presented with the 10 planned for this round: (i) the Blackstone/Woonasquatucket (MA/RI); (ii) the Upper Susquehanna-Lackawanna (PA); and (iii) the Cuyahoga River (OH). [Please note that the EO you signed governing this process specified that you would select only 10 rivers. We will have the EO amended on your behalf to account for these additional designations, should you approve this option.] McGinty believes the overwhelming response to the initiative justifies these additional designations. These rivers performed particularly well under the criteria of your EO, especially in terms of community support. Further, they advance the initiative's goal of designating a diverse set of rivers.

Fourth, she recommends that we monitor the progress of these designees for two years before conducting another round. The Advisory Committee recommended an immediate second round, but McGinty feels it is important for the first round to succeed before going further.

Thank you so much for meeting with my children Dylan and Courtney Blackburn during your recent visit to Los Angeles. Both children and I were very honored to have had this opportunity.

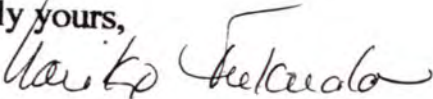

Thank you again for meeting with us and for all the great work you are doing for our country.

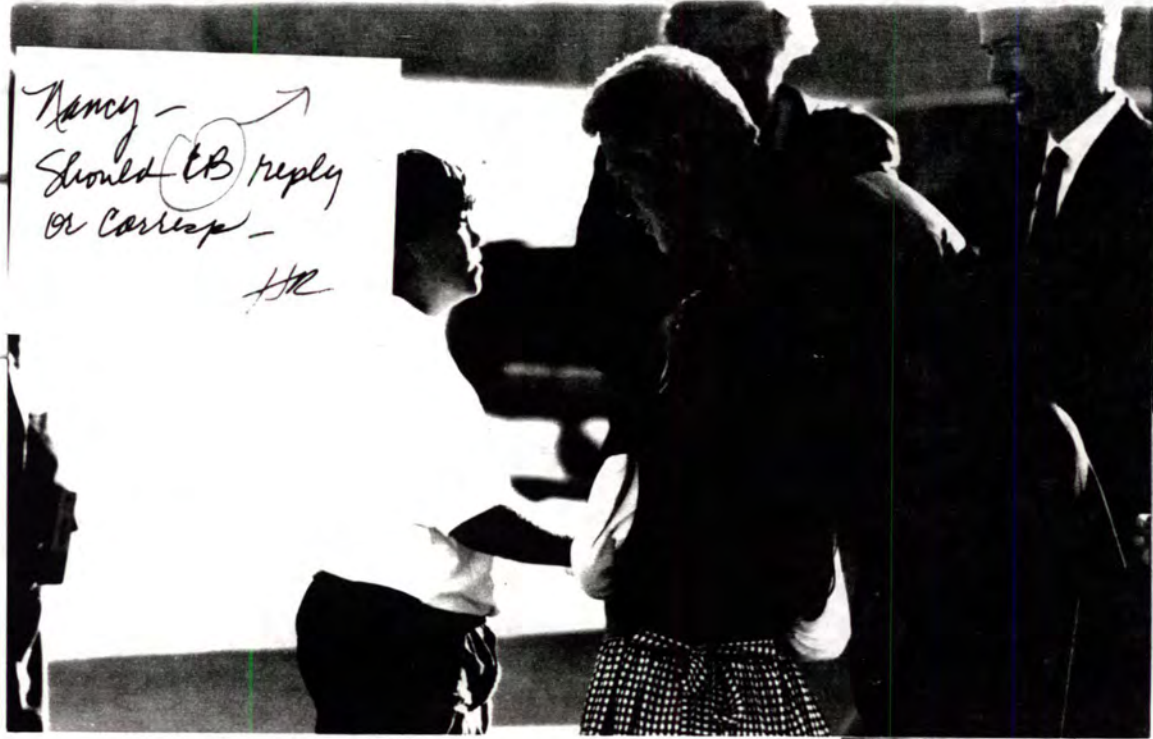

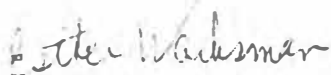

We have just celebrated the Jewish holiday of "Shavuot", literally, "Weeks", since this holiday falls exactly seven weeks after the holiday of Passover. On Passover we celebrated our redemption from Egyptian slavery, and we are commanded to then count the days and the weeks until "Shavuot" when the two holy Tablets were handed to Moses, and received by the children of Israel at Mount Sinai. Those two Tablets are two symmetrical halves with five commandments on each half. Five deal with our obligations to our "friends". Not "mankind" or "fellow men", but "friends". You knew this, Mr. President, when you said "Shalom Chaver", Good-bye, friend, in your brilliant eulogy to the late Prime Minister, Yitzchak Rabin. One might assume that it is unnecessary to be commanded not to kill a friend, but God knew that it is specifically towards the friend - or even the brother (the first murder in the Bible is of a brother - Cain killed Abel) where passions are most fierce, and can lead to murder.

We must start from the beginning, and learn that man was not created like all other creations - in pairs - but rather man was created alone, "in the image of God." Man's image, his face, is unique and individual- no two faces or opinions are the same. But man can only see himself, his image, by seeing others - only when I look at my friend, do I see myself, my own being, my image, my individuality and uniqueness. No one else can be me or stand where I stand, and each and every individual is commanded to believe that the world was created for him alone, and the world's continued existence depends on him. The Hebrew words for "alone" and "one" and "together" or "united" have the same root; "Achdut" is unity. There is no contradiction between "Achad", one, and "Yachad", together, for only by appreciating the great worth and value of our unique individuality, can we see the reflection of that value in others, and thus strive for brotherhood, togetherness and unity ("Achdut").

Man's image cannot be wiped out by death; the impression of his face, which is God's image, continues to exist, and that is my personal comfort and revenge against those who tried to wipe out my son Nachshon's image. His impression lives on in the hearts and memories of all who knew him, and we await the fulfillment of the prophet Zacharia's words "Death shall be vanquished and God will wipe the tears from our faces".

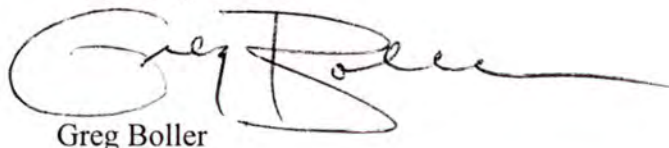

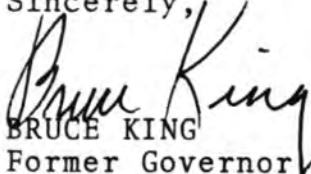
