MEMORANDUM

RE: Economic Strategy for the Northern Ireland Assembly

DATE: July 31, 1998

It has often been stated by economists in the United States that large companies have created none of the new jobs during the past 20 years. In fact, most of them have downsized in recent years. All job growth has come from small companies, many of them startups, who, in turn, have grown into key large companies. Of the 19 million new jobs created in the United States since 1993, 80 percent were created by small businesses, i.e. companies with less than 500 people. Therefore, in my opinion, the Northern Ireland Assembly would be wise to adopt the following economic and political strategy that models the great success in recent years of the American model. It is as follows:

- Undertake a dramatic program to encourage, in all ways possible, the creation, financing, and world perspective of new and emerging companies in Northern Ireland.
- Continue to encourage foreign companies to locate in Northern Ireland as an interim measure, knowing full well that they can, and often will, leave more quickly than they arrived.
- Seek out the Democratic Leadership Council (DLC) and its founder, Al From, as well as its think tank, the Progressive Policy Institute, for guidance in shaping policies that bring government, business and the work force together in a common goal to create jobs and promote economic development while coping with traditional government bureaucracies and policies. President Clinton and, ultimately, Prime Minister Blair, were elected on the DLC's policies, which have proven so successful in the United States. I am sure that Al From, a good friend of President Clinton, would be happy to provide guidance to the Northern Ireland Assembly in such matters, if asked.
