For U.S., It's Win or Go Home

It's as simple as this: If the U.S. Olympic men's soccer team defeats Portugal tonight at RFK Stadium, it will advance beyond the first round for the first time in Summer Games history. A loss, and the Americans are done. A tie doesn't help them, either. Goal differential, the awkward way of breaking ties in the group standings, has no bearing.

"Our whole goal all along was to be able to get into Washington, D.C., with the opportunity to advance," U.S. Coach Bruce Arena said yesterday during a midday news conference. "Certainly we have control of our destiny now. We know we have to win the game to advance."

MEN'S SOCCER

The final few dozen obstructed-view seats were snatched up yesterday, and the sellout crowd of about 53,000—which is scheduled to include President Clinton and Joao Havelange, head of FIFA, soccer's world governing body—will be the largest to watch a U.S. team play in Washington.

It also will be the biggest turnout for soccer at RFK since the 1994 World Cup.

Tonight's dramatic showdown was made possible by Monday's Group A results, as the United States (1-1) blanked Tunisia, 2-0, in Birmingham and Portugal (1-0-1) tied Argentina, 1-1, despite being outplayed most of the night at RFK.

Portugal, making its first Olympic soccer appearance since 1928, only needs a tie to advance to the quarter-finals this weekend. But Coach Nelo Vingada says his team will not play conservatively. "We will try to play our best football," he said after Monday's game. "We've got to play to win because sometimes to play for a tie is very difficult."

It will be made more difficult if two starters injured Monday aren't available. Defender-midfielder Emilio Peixe, Portugal's most versatile player, hurt his leg early in the first half and left the game, and goalkeeper Paulo Costinha injured his hip in a collision later in the half. Both are doubtful, according to Portuguese officials.

Costinha's replacement, Nuno Herlander, had a few shaky moments, but did stop an Argentina penalty kick early in the second half. "I hope they play for a draw," U.S. defender Alexi Lalas said. "I hope they all pull back and they let us attack, but I don't think that's going to be the case. I think they have a sense of pride and a feeling that 'This is America and we're not supposed to lose to America, and we're definitely not supposed to let them in the game.'"

The U.S. team has not fared well in Olympic competition over the years, although it did come tantalizingly close to advancing to the second round in 1992 with a 1-1-1 record. Monday's victory was only its fourth in 21 Olympic appearances.

But the addition of three internationally seasoned players—Lalas, goalkeeper Kasey Keller and midfielder Claudio Reyna—has provided stability, confidence and talent to a team of mostly former college all-stars. The roster includes five former University of Virginia players, including Reyna, and one current Cavalier.

Notes: U.S. forward Jovan Kirovski's appeal to Britain's Department of Labor to play for Manchester United has been denied, leaving the 20-year-old with little option but to seek a club elsewhere in Europe. Germany's Bayer Leverkusen will have scouts at tonight's game. Kirovski had spent the past three years playing for United's reserve squad awaiting a work permit and a lucrative three-year contract. . . .

Local organizers are asking fans who have tickets waiting at the will-call window to arrive early tonight because of anticipated long lines.

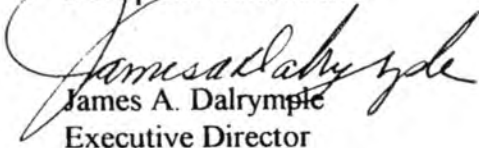

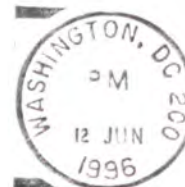

Enclosed please find the final schedule for the Olympic soccer matches at RFK Stadium this July.

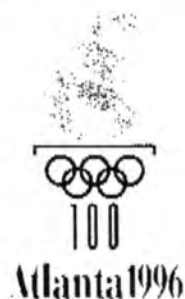

SUBJECT: Attendance at Olympic Events

Many of you, and some of your staff, are likely to be invited to attend events and functions at the Olympics this summer. Very few events will require official attendance by anyone in the Administration. In light of the very limited need for the presence of any Cabinet officials in Atlanta during the games, your attendance should be cleared with the White House prior to your departure. To insure a consistent approach throughout the executive branch, we are providing this memorandum outlining appropriate responses.

Support of the President's or Vice President's Attendance at the Olympic Games

Certain employees will be required to attend Olympic events with the President and Vice President or may be invited by the President or Vice President to be part of the "official delegation." Provided that their attendance is necessary to support the President or Vice President's participation in the events or they are members of the official delegation, such employees may attend Olympic events free of charge.

Participation in the Conduct of an Event

Certain employees will be required to be present at a sporting or other event at the Olympics due to the nature of their responsibilities. For instance, it will be necessary for federal law enforcement personnel to be present to support state and local law enforcement personnel in insuring compliance with laws, in preventing terrorist incidents, and in other law enforcement activities. Attendance at an event under these circumstances is appropriate. However, such individuals should be engaged in official activities and not merely observing the games.

Tickets to Sporting Events

As you know, the standards of ethical conduct prohibit a federal employee from accepting a gift, including a ticket to a sporting event, that exceeds \$20 in value from a prohibited source or which is given because of the employee's official position. An exception is recognized for gifts based on a personal relationship. Thus, under the gift rules you are prohibited from accepting a ticket to a sporting event where the value of the ticket exceeds

\$20, unless the ticket has been provided to you by a relative or close personal friend. Please note that the close personal friend or relative should have paid for the ticket personally, as opposed to the friend's or relative's employer. Additionally, the rules permit you to accept a ticket for which you pay the "donor" the fair market value of a ticket. You also may accept a gift that has been offered as a result of your spouse's business or employment activities. As always, you may not solicit a gift from anyone.

Because an appearance of preferential treatment may be created by attendance at certain events where tickets are no longer available to the public, you must receive approval from me, through Kitty Higgins, before you purchase tickets other than through the process available to the general public. (Tickets for certain events are still available to the general public, and you may purchase tickets to those events under the ordinary process available to the public.)

Invitations to Receptions and Similar Events

If you are in Atlanta or any other Olympic venue, either on business or for personal reasons, you may be asked to attend a reception, cocktail party, or other similar event. Such invitations should be treated like other invitations you receive throughout the year. In other words, your ethics official will need to determine whether the invitation to the particular event may properly be accepted under the gift rules.

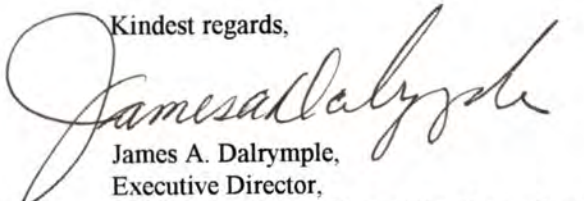

On June 19, exactly one month prior to the Opening Ceremonies of the Centennial Games, the Olympic Torch Relay Signature Car--a BMW built in BMW's new plant in South Carolina--will arrive in our nation's capital. 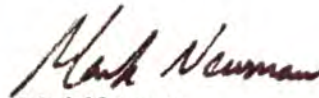
It is with great pleasure that we invite you to place your signature on this historic record of the Olympic Torch Relay when it arrives in Washington, D.C.

The Washington D.C. event will consist of brief remarks by Billy Payne, President and CEO of the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games, followed by a brief statement from yourself and the placing of your signature on a specially made decal on the car. The event would last approximately 20 minutes.
