The Veterans Memorial Stadium  
(the "Stadium") is pleased to confirm to you that the City of New Britain, Connecticut  
and the Stadium would be honored to serve as one of the four to six venue sites for the 1999 Women's World Cup should the United States be selected as the host country. We have reviewed and considered in detail the list of requirements for 3rd Women's World Cup, 1999 (Exhibit A, "Terms of Reference"). As required by the Terms of Reference, we specifically confirm to you that:

-- 6.1(a), 10, 11.4 The Stadium will be made available to FIFA in compliance with the Terms of Reference and free of all advertising, throughout the 1999 Women's World Cup.

In addition, under the system of law which governs the United States, it is our domain to confirm to you various matters listed below and under Section 3 and Section 4 of the Terms of Reference:

-- 3.4 The Stadium will cooperate as FIFA develops special guidelines in respect of overall security at the Stadium with the appropriate Government Departments.

-- 3.7 The national anthems of all participating teams will be played and the respective flags hoisted in the event the 1999 World Cup is played in the Stadium.

-- State, provincial and municipal taxes on gate receipts from admission tickets to the Stadium do not exceed a total of ~~twenty~~ five percent (5%).

-- The commissions charged by the Stadium as well as by the Stadium's customary tickets outlets for purchase of admission

tickets to the Stadium do not exceed ten percent (10%) of the normal ticket price.

-- 4.2(a) The Stadium has a pitch measuring 68/75 m by 105/110 m (70-75 yards by 110-115 yards) laid out with natural turf. Moreover, there shall be enough room around the pitch:

- to ensure the players' safety
- to set up substitutes' benches
- to position photographers
- to allow for ground advertising
- to facilitate the work of television and film cameramen

-- 4.2(c) The bench accommodating the coaches and substitutes from each team shall be comfortable and under cover, with seating space for 15 people. A bench with space for four seats shall be placed between the two substitutes' benches.

-- 4.2(d) The Stadium shall be equipped with lighting adequate for television transmission (a minimum of 1200 lux) and with a modern loudspeaker system.

-- 4.2(e) The media premises shall be in keeping with the status of the competition.

We recognize that the 1999 Women's World Cup is under the control of FIFA and, should the United States be awarded the event, the United States Soccer Federation. We are also aware, should the United States be awarded the 1999 Women's World Cup, that the determination of which of the various stadia in the United States will be selected as venue sites will be made by FIFA from the recommended list of stadia submitted by the United States Soccer Federation, Inc.

## **Surface:**

A new bermuda-grass surface 120 yards x 75 yards was put in place in 1991. The field features a Cambridge drainage system running east-west. In spring 1995 a sand-slit drainage system was added running north-south. The product is a state-of-the-art drainage system that is capable of removing up to six inches of water within a 24-hour period. In addition, a bermuda-surface practice field is located adjacent to the stadium. It measures 120 yards x 75 yards.

## **Seating:**

Permanent seating for 3,540 spectators is located along the east sideline, which includes 1,112 armchair seats in three sections at midfield and another 2,428 bleacher-back seats in four other sections. There is bleacher seating for 3,000 along the west sideline and 860 along the south sideline, which boosts total seating capacity up to 7,400 for the NCAA finals.

## **Other features:**

The stadium lighting, at 150 candle power, meets specifications for live television coverage. There are concession areas and restroom facilities, an enclosed, air-conditioned press box within the stadium walls. The team bench areas are located under the stadium grandstand and feature lights, electrical outlets and individual seating for player comfort. The stadium is completely surrounded by an eight-foot-high brick wall.

## **Competitions:**

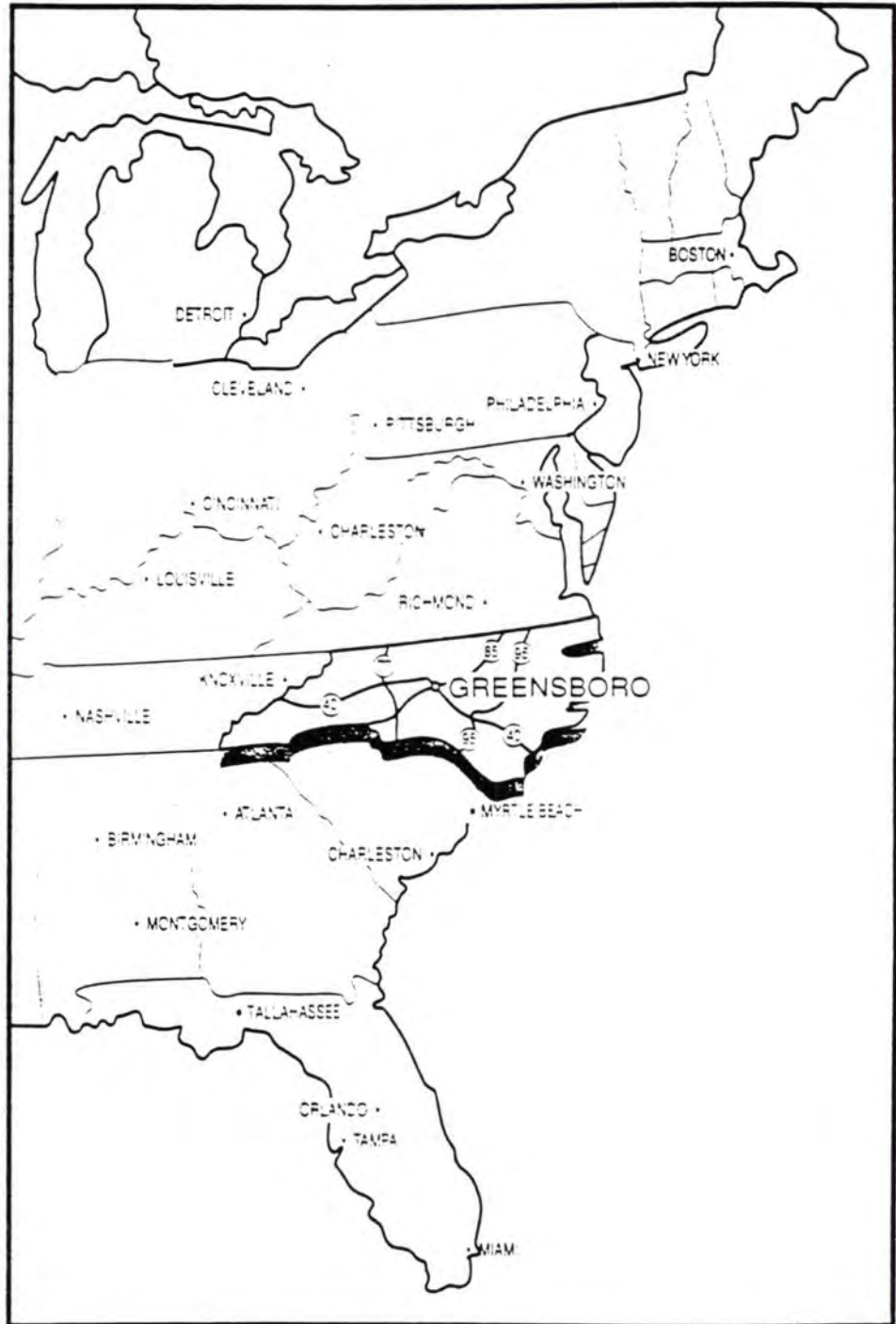
The stadium has hosted many soccer events in its brief history. In addition to UNCG regular-season contests, it has been the site for more than 30 National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) playoff games including **four national championship finals**. In 1992 it was host to an international match between the national teams of the United States and Canada. Index of Establishments on the NEW JERSEY METRO AREA ACCOMMODATIONS Spotting Map

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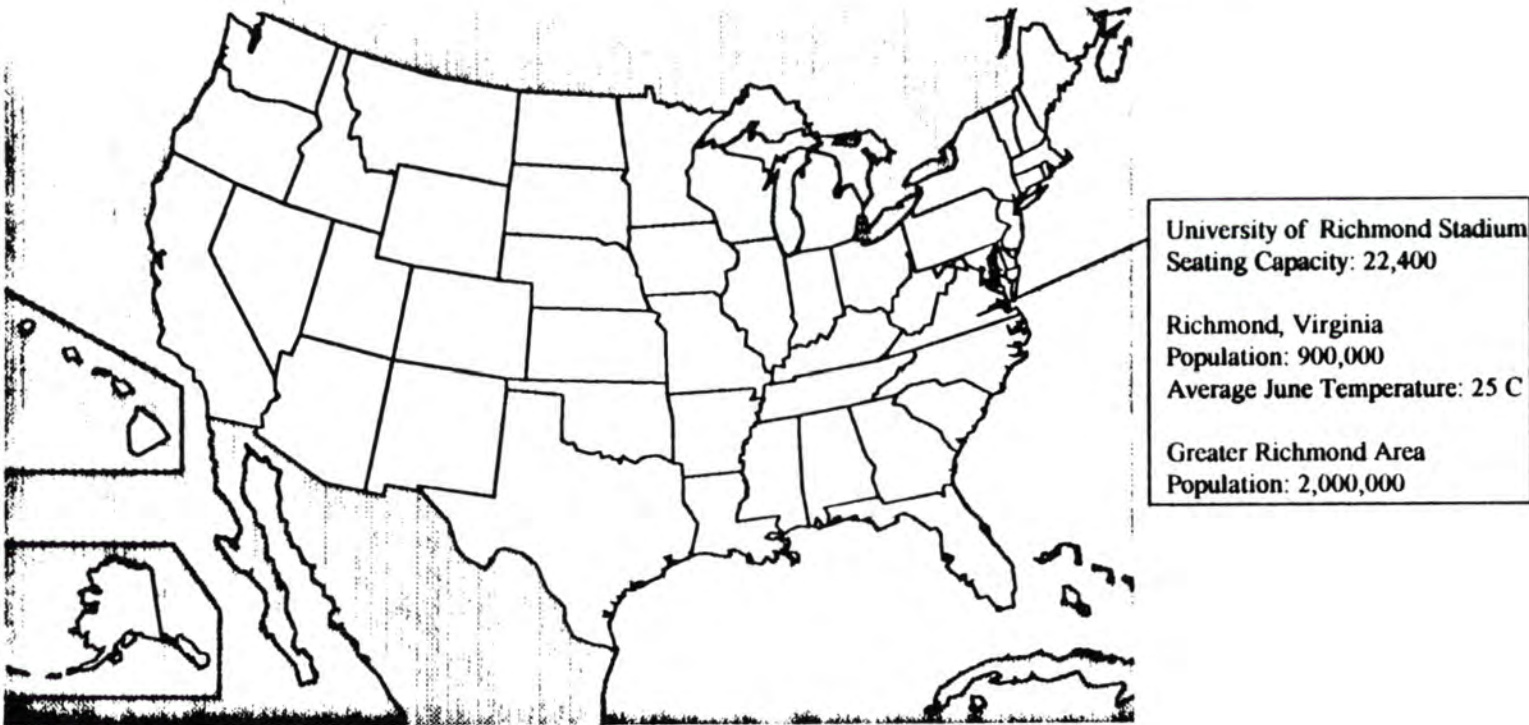
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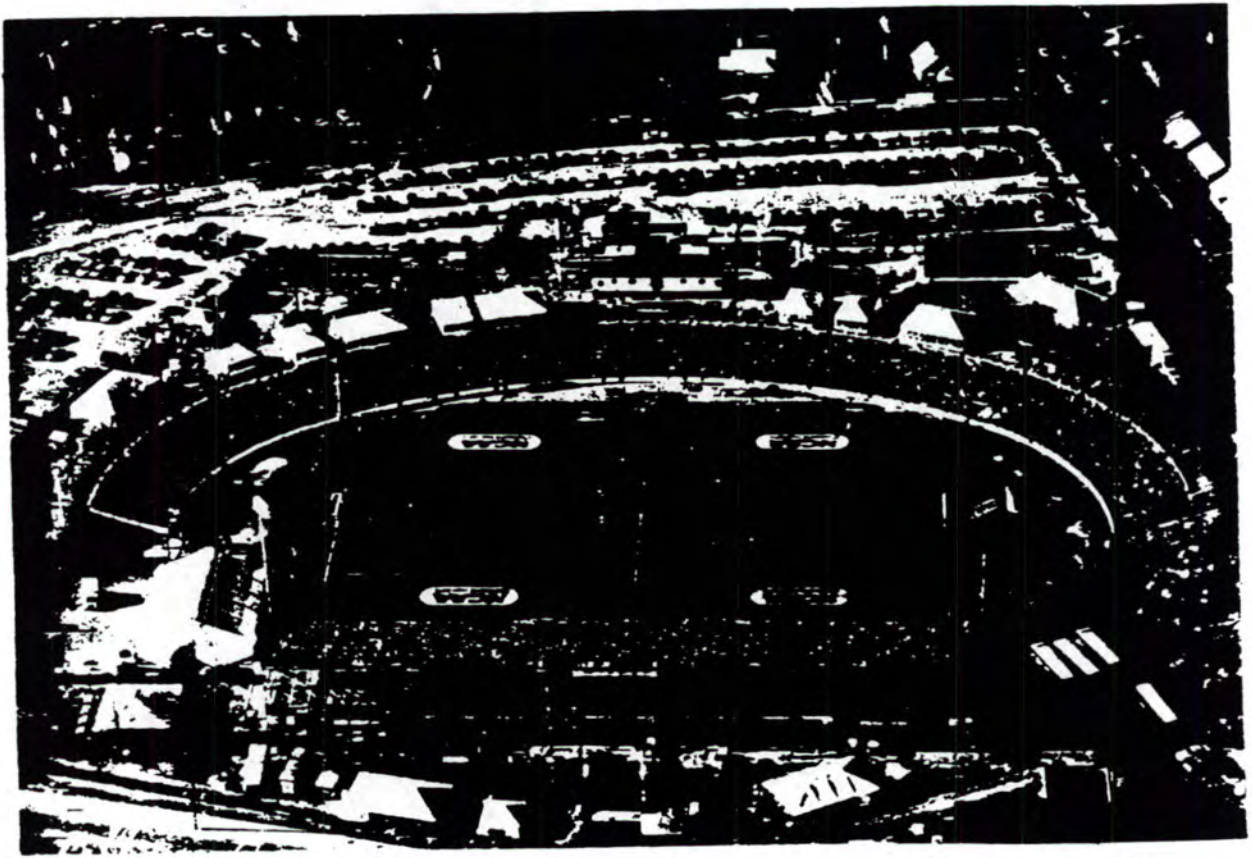

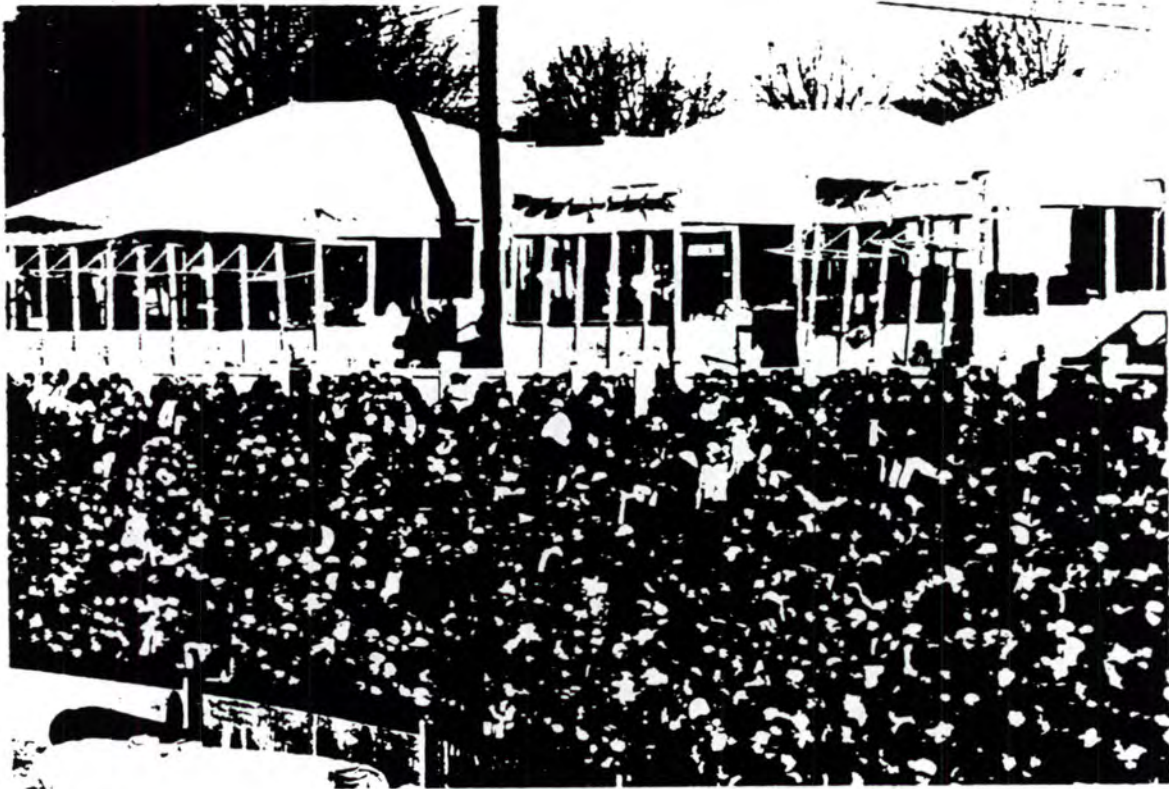

In addition to inside space, covered

roof-top space is also available as are temporary press tables, which were utilized for the NCAA Soccer Championships. A separate press tent was also used for the NCAA Soccer Championships to provide interview and workroom areas and would also be available during the 1999 Women's World Cup. More than 150 media were comfortably accommodated for the NCAA Soccer Championships. In summary, the stadium can accommodate all media requests.

Television facilities: The main press box contains a separate booth for a television crew. Camera positions are available on top of the main press box. Temporary platforms can be and have been constructed to allow as many camera positions as necessary. A number of soccer games have been televised from UR Stadium in the past and all television needs can be met.

Radio facilities: The main press box contains two separate booths for radio broadcasts. Other rooms and positions are available to increase radio capabilities.

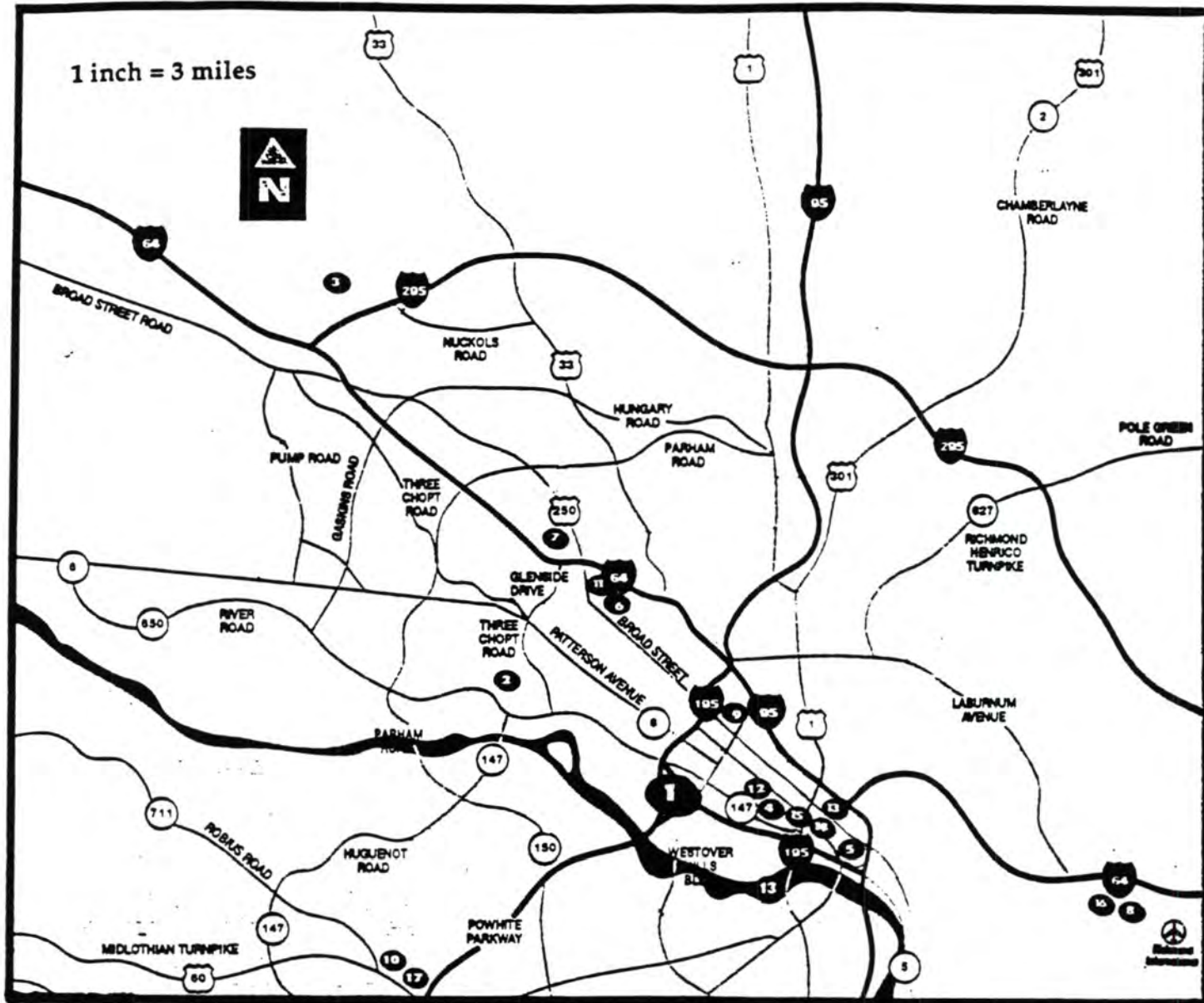

Major events attendance: Throughout its history, UR Stadium has hosted a number of events that have attracted large crowds in excess of 20,000, including football games involving the University of Richmond and other major state universities. The largest crowd in recent history was the 21,319 attending the NCAA Men's Soccer National Championships in December 1995.

Soccer games held there: The NCAA Division I Men's Soccer National Championships were held at UR Stadium in 1995 and will return in 1996. 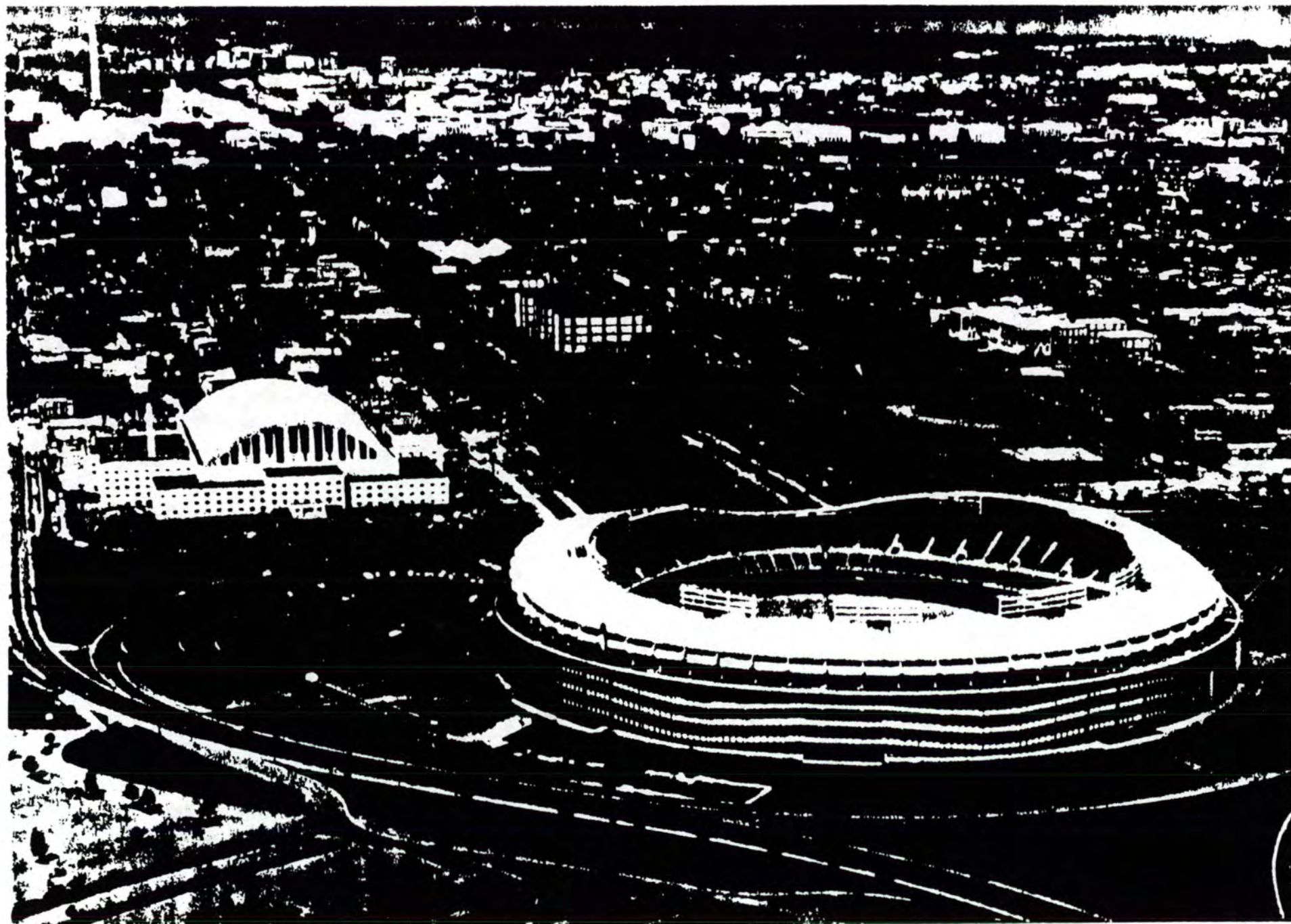
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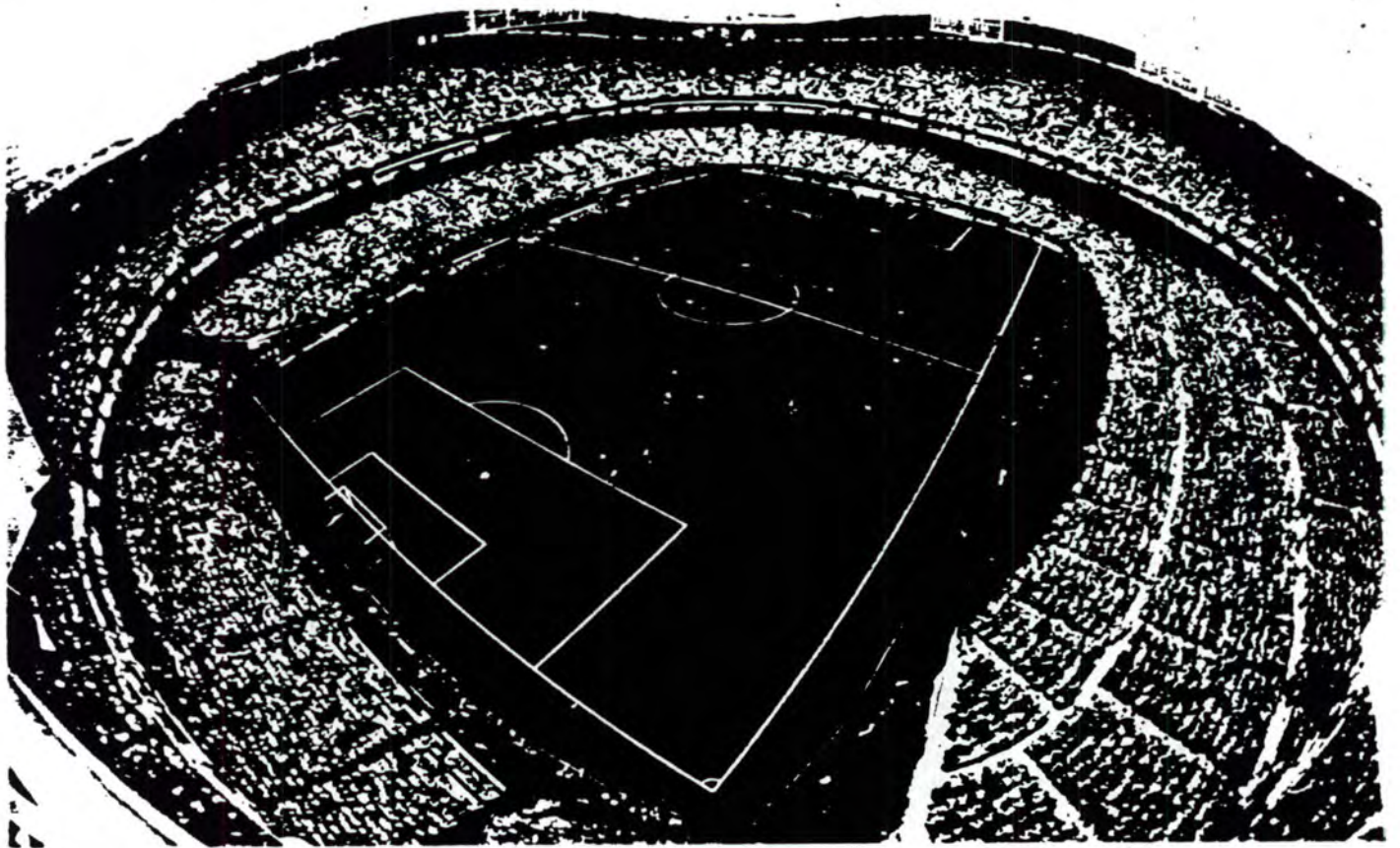

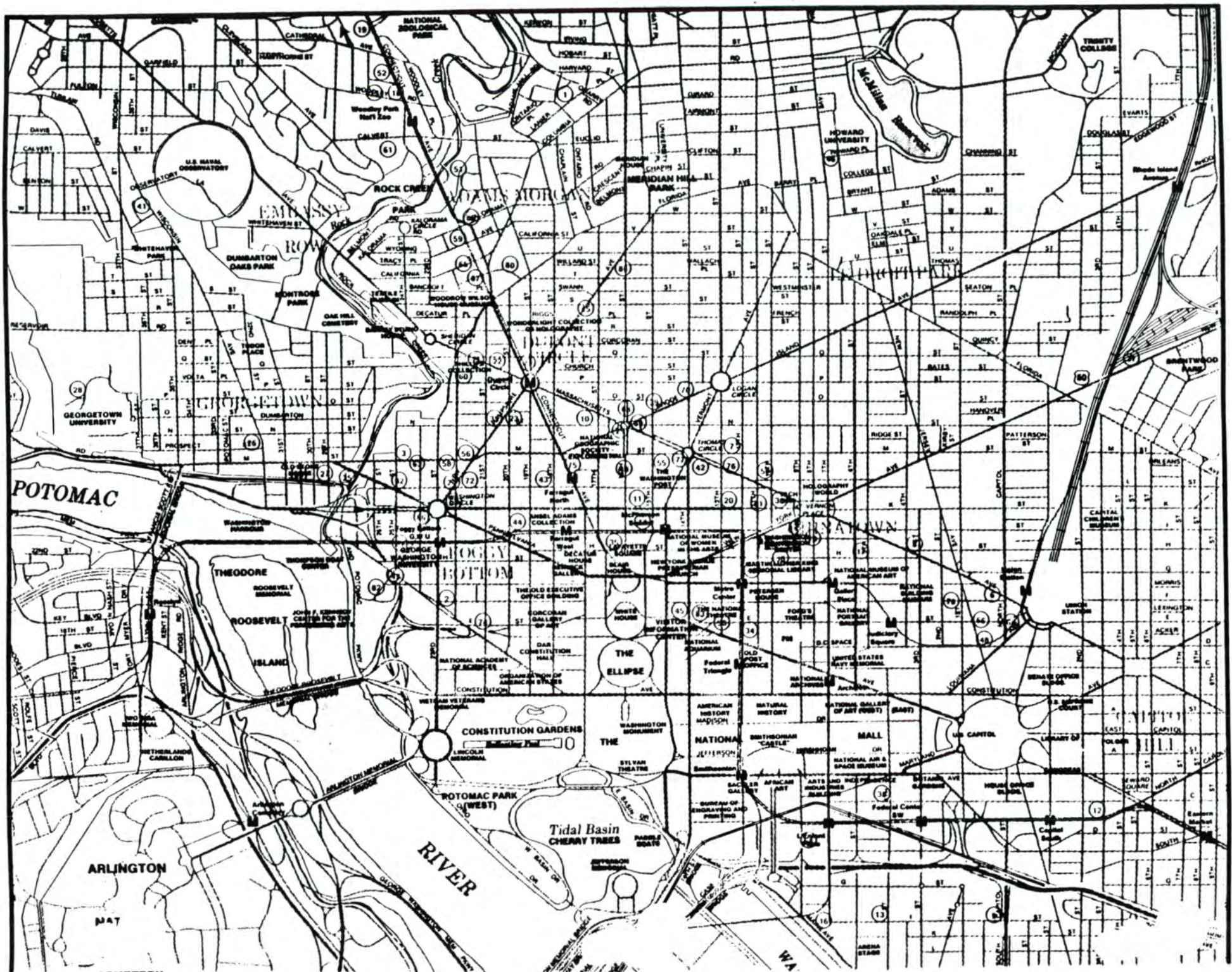
