I. PURPOSE

To make remarks at City Year's Convention (CZYGY '99) on the occasion of their 10th Anniversary.

II. BACKGROUND

Today, at Howard University, you will celebrate the 10th year anniversary of City Year. City Year is convening its 1,000 AmeriCorps members in Washington, D.C. for their annual conference that concludes their year of community service.

The corps has engaged in a five month leadership, enrichment and service curriculum called "Get on the Bus". GOTB evokes the mission, energy, purpose, spirit, and discipline of Civil Rights and other historic civic movements. There are 4 themes that will be developed throughout cyzygy: Youth Leadership, Educating & Leading Children, Social Justice and Inclusivity. These themes will manifest themselves in Immersion Excursions, Idealism in Action Forums, One America Town Meeting, and service day at Benning Terrace and Columbia Heights. The phrase "Get on the Bus" has become part of City Year and convention vernacular.

City Year's annual convention officially begins on Tuesday morning. So that you could welcome them, they arranged for the Corps members to arrive early. For four days, City Year will unite over 1500 Corps members, corporate investors, civic leaders, and AmeriCorps partners. Your budget proposes an additional \$113 million for AmeriCorps to support 69,000 members next year, growing to reach 100,000 members per year by 2000.

Dear Shirley:

Thank you so much for your help in arranging for the First Lady to speak at our special 10th Anniversary Endowment Launch on Friday, June 4th at 3:00 p.m. at Fanueil Hall in Boston. We are very excited about this, and it has given our whole effort a huge boost of momentum.

I am writing to share with you an idea that I have, that I'd love to talk to you about.

I think that in light of Littleton, Colorado, *cyzygy* presents a tremendous opportunity for President Clinton and AmeriCorps. I've seen in the past week no less than 4 "town meetings" broadcast live on national TV with young people and media leaders in response to Littleton. The President himself called for a White House conference on Youth Violence.

The fundamental issue for Littleton is that this country needs to invest in its youth! It needs a Youth Policy. It needs something that gives young people a sense of purpose, pride, values and an appreciation for others.

As you know, we already have that Youth Policy and you and President Clinton developed it:

It is called AMERICORPS!!!!

AmeriCorps has been absent from all of these discussions – at least in terms of the national media.

So, here's the idea:

The President does a "Town Meeting" at *cyzygy* with the 1000 AmeriCorps members there. He does it in conjunction with a media big shot, live on national television – that leader could be Judy Woodruff from CNN, or Tom Brokaw from MSNBC. The fundamental difference of this Town Meeting from the other ones is that the Young People he's talking to are leaders. They have answered the call of service. They have tremendous ideas about what to do about violence in our society and about how to reach our nation's youth.

In addition to the City Year AmeriCorps members, we could have other AmeriCorps members from other programs fly in and be represented. All you would need is a couple from a bunch of programs to highlight AmeriCorps breadth, depth and diversity.

PUTTING IDEALISM TO WORK

At this event, President Clinton should announce that he is asking the Congress not only to approve his request to grow AmeriCorps to 100,000 full time members, but in addition:

That he is asking the Congress for an additional \$200 million annually for a new program that would provide matching grants of \$20,000 each for 10,000 high schools to establish a community service director position at their high school. Any high school would be eligible as long as they came up with the matching \$20,000 from their local school budget, from the city or state, or even from private companies that want to adopt a high school. At an average of 1000 kids per high school, this would facilitate 10,000,000 high school students having a community service opportunity. These high school AmeriCorps community service directors could partner with AmeriCorps programs around the country to make this community service option real. City Year is already doing this in Philly and San Antonio, among other places.

This idea would give the President a chance to highlight AmeriCorps and do something very concrete in response to Littleton. I also think that the Congress would be hard pressed to refuse this small amount of funding, especially if it was done on a matching basis.

In addition, because *cyzygy* is in DC, President Clinton could ask some Republican leaders and supporters of AmeriCorps to join him for this town meeting and make it bipartisan, including:

Sen. Chafee, Sen. Specter, Rep. Chris Shays, Gen. Colin Powell, Millard Fuller, Geoffrey Canada, Michelle Engler, 1st Lady of Michigan, etc.

Anyway, I just think that *cyzygy* provides the President and AmeriCorps with an incredible opportunity. This is an audience that will be powerful and help move the dialogue in this nation forward.

What can we do to make this happen?

I seek your guidance and suggestions. I will call you soon to follow-up.

Acknowledge: introducer Steven Spaloss [*the City Year member who gave you the sweatshirt off his back in 1991*]; Howard University President H. Patrick Swygert; City Year and AmeriCorps members and alums; Harris Wofford, Eli Segal; Mark Gearan [on Friday, I signed a four-year reauthorization of Peace Corps, which passed with overwhelming bipartisan support]; Jeffrey Swartz, whose company, Timberland, was the founding national sponsor of City Year [and is setting the standard for corporate America by providing its employees up to 40 hours of paid time off to volunteer]; Mayor Anthony Williams; Members TK.

I want to say a special hello to Alan [Khazei] and Michael [Brown] and their wives, Vanessa Kirsch and Charlotte Mao [rhymes with "how"]. I believe Michael's parents, Micky and

Morton, are also here. I don't think they've missed a single City Year event in your entire 10 years.

Nowadays, Alan and Michael can't walk down the street without someone throwing an award or an honorary degree their way. But remember: not long ago, they were just two young students with one big idea. An idea for putting idealism to work. An idea for fostering the Beloved Community of Dr. King's dream.

A lot of their classmates told them their idea was just pie in the sky. Well, I guess this [*arms extended*] is what pie in the sky looks like. And it is a beautiful sight. I can't possibly tell you how good it does my heart to be here and see all of you. To see your idealism and pride. To look into the eyes of people who know they can make a difference. To see how one good idea -- and countless hours of hard work and dedication -- can blossom into something like this.

The day in 1991 I spent in Boston learning about City Year was a day I'll never forget -- and not just because of Steven's beautiful gesture. City Year was living and breathing everything I believed about the need for a change in our relationship to government. City Year was the embodiment of a philosophy we called the Third Way.

The Third Way says that government cannot solve our problems, but neither can it leave people to sink or swim on their own. It says that we must provide the tools for people to make the most of their God-given talents. It says that we must inspire people to live up to the high obligations of citizenship -- to create opportunity for those who have been forgotten, to take responsibility for their own lives, to foster community, especially at a time when our nation is growing more diverse.

That day City Year, I saw this philosophy in action. I saw citizenship at its very best. I saw that for every one of you there could be a thousand of you -- a whole generation of you. And that is why I created AmeriCorps.

As of this spring, more than 100,000 young people have answered the call of citizen service through AmeriCorps -- including those of you in City Year. It is simply remarkable what all of you have accomplished -- how many millions of "starfish" you have collected. [*"Collecting starfish," a City Year mantra, refers to each person's power to make a difference.*] Because of your success, we are now working with the Congress to reauthorize AmeriCorps and to create opportunities for 100,000 young people to serve in AmeriCorps every year. We must give more young people the chance to put their idealism to work. We must work toward the day when citizen service is the common expectation and common experience of every American.

There has never been a more important time to do it. Today, millions of average Americans are reaping the benefits of economic growth. In fact, just yesterday there was a wonderful article about all the ways young African-American men, who have faced bleak job prospects for many years, are now joining the economic mainstream. But there are still millions of Americans -- in inner cities, in rural areas such as Appalachia, the Delta and Indian Country -- for whom the prosperity of our time has yet to become reality.

AmeriCorps can make an enormous difference. By rehabilitating homes and schools and neighborhoods and lives, you have proven that you can shine the light of opportunity and of hope in places that have been hidden in the shadows for far too long. We have seen your results. Please tell me you will never let up on your resolve.

There is another vital area where I need your passion and unique expertise. I want you to help show every young person in America that national service can be a powerful antidote to the alienation that they so often feel.

In the aftermath of the shootings in Littleton and Conyers, I believe our country is more focused than ever before on just how difficult life can be for teenagers when they feel like they don't fit in. They feel powerless, and sometimes worthless. They turn inward. They retreat. They disengage.

But as you know better than anyone, when you join City Year and AmeriCorps, you become an essential part of a team. You work with your teammates on solving mutual problems. You become mutually reliant. You build trust and friendship. You are part of a culture where you turn to action, not anger... where you speak up if you're feeling isolated...where you're trained to find everyone's strengths. You're engaged in a mission larger than yourself. You see concrete accomplishments. You feel powerful; you know that each one of you is a thousand people strong. [This is a reference to the message of the event's opening skit.]

And when you reach out to younger students and your own siblings, you bring this power, this teamwork, this culture to all of them. We've all seen it – the way kids look at you when you're wearing your red City Year jacket or your gray AmeriCorps T-shirt. They look up to you. They want to join your remarkable Young Heroes program. They want to do everything you're doing. They, too, want to be able to drive in a big nail with just four swings of a hammer. They, too, want to be part of a team. They, too, want to belong.

So, today, as you begin your four days here in Washington, I ask you: Will you take a child by the hand? Will you make him feel like he belongs? Will you? I want to hear your voices! Are you ready?

Do you have the heart? [crowd will scream "check!"]
Mind? ["check!"]
Soul? ["check!"]

Together -- with all our hearts and minds and souls -- we can and must make national service a national way of life. A way of life that promotes not a culture of violence but a culture of citizenship and a culture of caring. A way of life that leads young people away from isolation, away from anger. A way of life that lifts us up to our highest ideals of opportunity for all, responsibility from all, and a community of all. A way of life that helps to bring us across the lines that divide us, into One America.

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Thank you for being what is right with America. Thank you for giving this country your heart and mind and soul each and every day.

STEPHEN SPALOSS

As Deputy Director of the City Year National Corps, Stephen Spaloss provides strategic leadership for over 1000 young people in service in ten cities nationwide. Stephen is responsible for direct management of five City Year sites which includes program development, service impact, federal compliance, budgetary accountability and revenue. Through his efforts, the City Year national corps is able to realize over 1.5 million hours of service -- as they hone leadership and citizenship skills.

Stephen, a native of Nashua, New Hampshire, is a nine-year veteran of City Year. City Year, an AmeriCorps program, is a national service organization that unites diverse 17-24 years olds for a rigorous year of full-time service, leadership development and civic engagement.

Stephen began his service in 1990 at the "request" of the New Hampshire court system. In Stephen's words, "without City Year, I'd be dead or in jail." After an initial distaste for the intensive service and integration of cultures and ethnicities, Stephen soon emerged a leader. In 1992, he became the very first alumni to serve as Team Leader where he was responsible for the service and leadership development of ten young people. His rise within the organization over the next seven years (listed below) bears witness to Stephen's tenacity, commitment to youth and community, and abilities as leader, teacher, mentor and counsel.

It can't improve and enrich the ways that we relate to human beings of a different race: the spirit which we interact with them, the love we can muster for them simply because they are human beings, the openness we have to them including the acceptance of good and evil, strengthens and weaknesses in the same person... (law) can't change the way they feel. It can't generate forgiveness or lessen hatred. It can't bury the old stereotypes and prevent new ones from taking root. It can't force people to see beyond the materials events of a day to the deeper meaning of spiritual renewal through brotherhood."

Michael and Alan have long contended that civic action and citizen service will help complete the Civil Rights Movement by changing hearts and minds, and not just our nation's laws. As many of you know, President Clinton echoed this belief last week and talked about the connection between City Year and Kosovo -- about the power of service a means to unite our world's citizens through the commonality of purpose and the exchange of ideals and ideas.

I hope that like Bradley, the realities and challenges of the world around us, compels you to greater service and "strengthens your determination" to do "what it palpably right".

I want to close with some recent remarks by President Clinton about the opportunities and challenges we face. May "Getting on the Bus" to cyzygy (in the deep programmatic and "spiritual" way) and cyzygy itself create an alternative and more hopeful image of our nation. May it underscore the promise of our future and the potential of the Beloved Community and One America.

"Now, at the end of the 20th century, we face a great battle between the forces of integration and the forces of disintegration; the forces of globalism versus tribalism; of oppression against empowerment..."

The central irony of our time, it seems to me, is this: Most of us have a vision of the 21st century world with the triumph of peace and prosperity and personal freedom; with respect for the integrity of ethnic, racial and religious minorities; within a framework of shared values, shared power and shared plenty; making common cause against disease and environmental degradation, against terror, organized crime and weapons of mass destruction. This grand vision, ironically, is threatened by the oldest demon of human society: our vulnerability to hatred of the other, those who are not like us."

Thank you for letting me share this. I am sure many of you are thinking about these issues as well.

City Year, one of the original and most outstanding AmeriCorps programs, operates intense service programs in ten cities around the country – Boston, Providence, Philadelphia, Columbia (SC), Columbus (OH), Cleveland, Chicago, San Antonio, San Jose and Seattle. Each year, City Year holds a conference, known as CYZGY, at which all 1000 City Year members from around the country, join together for four days of training and service. This year the Conference will be held in Washington, DC, to bring national attention to AmeriCorps and City Year.

To bring attention to the success of the Administration's AmeriCorps national service initiative, City Year would love to have the Vice-President participate at any point in their annual conference, particularly on May 27, the service day. The service project will involve almost every form of service from building a playground to refurbishing a park to rehabilitating housing and an after-school site in the neighborhood. More than 1000 City Year corpsmembers and other AmeriCorps members in the Washington DC area will all participate in a service project in Anacostia. In all, probably close to 2000 people will be engaged in the service activities. The service day is designed to be the media focus of the conference.

If the service day does not work for the Vice President, City year would be pleased to have the Vice President participate in any other part of the conference. The Vice President, President, and the First Lady have all participated in AmeriCorps events in the last few years. In January the Vice President participated in a Martin Luther King Day project with AmeriCorps members and launched an AmeriCorps project in San Diego. With respect to City Year specifically, two years ago, the First Lady participated in the City Year Conference in Providence, and last year the President addressed the conference in Cleveland.

Email to City Year Community

On this horrible night when over 25 children and educators have been killed or injured, I think about the life work to which we have committed ourselves -- the commitment to build bridges of understanding and tolerance between ages, races, ethnicities and disparate communities. I am reminded of Dr. King's vision of the Beloved Community and think about Camp City Year, Young Heroes, City Heroes and the Legends Teams, the "Get on the Bus" team ... idealism and the power, the passion, the courage.

I reflect upon the work of so many inspirational partners -- Team Harmony, ADL, SOS, Facing History & Ourselves, World of Difference, City at Peace, Youth in Action, GlobalYouthConnect and so many countless others who struggle with limited resources to combat our nation's most critical and awesome challenges.

And, I listen and am sickened by the horror of one Colorado teen who states that the gun man killed someone next to her "because he was black". I cringe when I hear that today is Adolf Hitler's birthday and that the young men wore swastikas on their arms. This is not America. This is not my America.

Each of you are a voice and a leader for the values, ideals and beliefs that this country desperately needs to strengthen itself from within. On many levels as measured by Wall Street and the talking heads, the future is full of promise -- booming economy, soaring stock market, limitless prosperity (for some). But I have to admit that every day I am afraid. Every day. I am seriously frightened and saddened by the landscape of our nation -- hate crimes, school violence, violence against women, the emergence of the Crips and Bloods right here in Boston, the Ku Klux Klan in New Hampshire and more. James Byrd, Jonesboro, Matthew Stewart, Paducah, Amidou Diallo and now Littleton. Never mind Kosovo. Headlines and names that gain further relevance with each passing day... seemingly closer, more real and all too familiar.

Of course, to be surrounded by idealism and the selflessness exhibited by our corps, Young Heroes, staff and partners, I am steeled against this fear by hope. And I dig deeper.

The vast inhumanity in both Kosovo and Littleton -- the horror of Matthew Shepard and James Byrd, the increase in hate crimes and gay bashing, the increase of gang violence and hate groups, the apathy and cynicism of citizens, the media, our leaders -- this is our challenge. This is our responsibility and our legacy as an organization. To confront this hatred and decisiveness and fear and ignorance with idealism and compassion and humanity and gentleness.

Ironically, Bill Bradley gave a beautiful speech today on race relations today -- embracing the issue as a candidate for Presidency and as a citizen our of national community. He stated, *"For something so palpably right to be so demonstrably hard to accomplish only strengthens my determination...divisions still remain but they are divisions of the heart more than of law...(law) can't control the most important things in*

We have learned that there is an outside chance that President Clinton may participate in *cyzygy* '99: City Year's Annual Convention of Idealism. As you know, we were extremely honored to be joined by President Clinton in Cleveland for this event last year. Your support and leadership on our behalf will always be remembered.

The opportunity to host President Clinton this year has special resonance given the recent events both domestically and abroad. The atrocities in both Kosovo and Littleton underscore the vital need for moral leadership on issues of race, prejudice and violence. The gulf between disparate communities of people serves as one of the greatest challenges for our nation and our world. President Clinton's leadership on AmeriCorps – and impassioned commitment to "*One America*" – offers a beacon of hope, as well as a proven strategy of effectiveness, during these troubled times. If President Clinton honors us by participating in *cyzygy* '99, we would like to suggest a Town Meeting on young people in service as a resource to unite our nation.

As our nation debates: "*what is at the core of our conflicts?*" and "*what can we be doing to solve this crisis?*", President Clinton has steadfastly led AmeriCorps. This spring, the 100,000th AmeriCorps member will complete their service year. First and foremost, thank you so very much for all of your efforts (both past and anticipated!) to make next Monday a reality. The entire City Year community is in your debt.

I met with Eli (Segal) this morning to discuss City Year's event with President Clinton. As you may know, Eli is one of our National Trustees and is an invaluable advisor and supporter of City Year. After hearing his feedback and ideas, I would like to present to you some thoughts. I have a great deal of respect for the level of precision, strategy and analysis involved in the development of White House events. Please know that I do this with the utmost regard and appreciation for all that you have to weigh. I hope only to allow some context and tone as the decision is made.

As you know, President Clinton will be opening cyzygy '99: City Year's Annual Convention of Idealism. It is our recommendation that this inspirational kick-off for 1,500 feature a **roundtable discussion** with the President and young people in service. This controlled forum of highly motivated, accomplished and idealistic young people will create a platform for a number of key messages:

- America has a national policy on youth and it is working -- 100,000 AmeriCorps members!
- The American tradition of service is the essence of the our country's heritage and the critical link to our future.
- Young people are a resource, leaders and are a force for positive good.
- National service and AmeriCorps are America's "national offense" against hatred, apathy, fear, isolation and violence.
- This generation is hungering for the challenge to serve.
- AmeriCorps is creating impact on the frontlines of our country's most critical issues -- education, health, public safety, and the environment. More importantly, they are creating an impact on the soul of America, by breaking down social barriers, modeling diverse leadership and cooperation, and instilling values and hope in citizens of all ages.
- AmeriCorps is a model of governance and private/public partnership -- intensely local, as well as a lever for private sector resources, activism and efficiency.

President Clinton's first visit to City Year seven years ago featured a roundtable. The dialogue, commitment and inspiration of the young people -- brought out by the President's extraordinary ability to relate and converse -- created a very special forum. Through their discussion and reflection, the case for service, diversity and youth leadership was made.

It is our belief that a roundtable is the most successful forum for generating a positive message about young people. As the nation discusses and debates Columbine, youth violence and a disaffected and isolated generation, the President can be the first to engage directly with young people. Moreover, he will be conversing with individuals who can renew our nation's optimism and faith, while validating the impact and intent of AmeriCorps. As a result of the President's leadership, the City Year national corps has contributed 1.5 million hours of service to their communities this year. That statistic, however, belies a thousand inspirational and meaningful stories -- stories that can be heard and celebrated in a discussion format.

Other attributes of a roundtable format:

- Format showcases the President's strengths
- Less formal preparation (re: speech)
- Best forum for the times (sincere dialogue vs. policy statements)
- Follow-up to the White House summit, exhibiting immediate commitment and energy to supporting young people
- A formal speech would encourage the image that AmeriCorps is just a "pep rally", interactive discussion provides depth, context and substance
- City Year can execute

Other programmatic elements would provide emotion, energy and inspiration, and would underscore the event's key strategic messages. In addition, the visual and intimacy of a roundtable can be achieved through the creation of an on-stage theatre-in-the-round similar to the Cleveland event last year.

I have attached a brief outline of the proposed event for your review.
