I hasten to put pen to paper immediately upon my return from Rabat to express my appreciation for your having included me in the Delegation to represent our Nation at the funeral of King Hassan II. It was a dazzling experience!

I am in great admiration with how you managed yourself through the tumultuous series of events swirling around the funeral drama. The jostling was awesome and at times terrifying with the crowds pushing and shoving. Chairman Gilman almost took a spill and I am nursing the pounding I took when the crowd broke through the barricades kicking me to a near pratfall only to be saved by the President of Burkina Faso.

Mr. President, I greatly enjoyed your tour d'horizon on the return flight to Washington. You have a daunting agenda! Good wishes for successes.

As a great admirer of the late King Hassan II and someone with rich memories of my long tour in the Kingdom, I was greatly impressed with your understanding of the strategic value of this crucial piece of real estate on the shoulder of North Africa. When we parted I mentioned how Winston Churchill felt about Morocco:

"He who controls the southern shore of the Gates of Hercules will control the under-belly of Europe."

Mr. President, some of your predecessors, not all, have understood the importance of nurturing the special relationship with America's oldest friend. I am so very pleased with your strong support for Morocco.

With renewed thanks for including me in the Delegation. On a personal note, it was a tremendously private important act of closure, which you very kindly granted me to perform.

8. Crime – Colorado Youth: David Winkler and Ben Gelz, the student co-leaders of the S.A.F.E. Colorado group you met with last week, were so inspired that they have decided to defer their first year of college and start organizing students in other states. They plan to spend the next year recruiting a larger group of high school and college students to lead a March on Washington sometime in 2000 to advocate for gun control legislation.

9. Native American Economic Development – Creation of an Access Center: Following up on your New Markets tour and the Native American Economic Development Conference one year ago, the DPC has begun work to create a Native American Economic Development Access Center, located at the Bureau of Indian Affairs. This Access Center would operate a single toll-free number that will connect Native American callers and businesses to 14 agencies' programs.

10. Livability – Better America Bonds Update: This legislation now has 89 cosponsors and was included in the Democratic tax packages in the House and Senate. In addition, the U.S. Conference of Mayors recently passed a resolution in support of this program and the National Association of Counties will follow suit next week.

11. Community Empowerment – Low Income Housing Tax Credit: Last week, the House Ways and Means Committee voted to include a 10-cent per year increase in the LIHTC as part of the Republican tax bill, over the opposition of Chairman Archer. The Senate Finance Committee also included a 10-cent increase. The House Democratic substitute would have provided a 50-cent increase in the first year, similar to your proposal.

Dear President Clinton,

We are writing to thank you for the extremely warm reception that you and your staff gave to the SAFE Trip students on July 15. All of the students were ecstatic that you spent so much time with our group. You were the most cordial and accommodating leader that we met in DC.

During the question and answer session, in the State Dining Room, Ben asked you what we could do after our trip was over. You answered that we should come back next year with more students from more states. Within fifteen minutes, we both decided to defer college for a year so that we could continue the student movement against gun violence. Our parents are very supportive of this idea, as are many students and community members from all over Colorado. Specifically, we want to plan for a larger trip to Washington next year and to organize student groups in every high school and college in the nation.

Again, we want to thank you very much for your support. Our trip to DC received a great response at home and around the country. Mr. President, we truly appreciate the position you have taken on this important issue. We thank you for taking a strong stand against gun violence. It is too bad that more of our representatives do not do the same.

I. PURPOSE

To meet with 90 Colorado high school students visiting Washington to urge passage of gun legislation.

II. BACKGROUND

You will meet with 90 high school students from the Denver metropolitan area, who have traveled to Washington, D.C. with the help of *Sane Alternatives to the Firearms Epidemic (S.A.F.E.) Colorado*. *S.A.F.E. Colorado* is a bi-partisan political action group, formed in the aftermath of the Columbine High School tragedy, whose board of directors includes several former Colorado elected officials. Their mission is to “advocate for the reasonable regulation of the manufacture and sale of handguns, automatic rifles and ammunition, while recognizing the right of Colorado citizens to own and use firearms designated for legitimate hunting, sport and defensive purposes.”

In June *S.A.F.E. Colorado* approached two recent graduates from Denver area high schools (David Winkler of George Washington High School and Ben Gelt of Denver East High School), and asked them to help organize a large group of students willing to march on Washington to ask for meaningful gun control legislation. The group includes 6 students from Columbine High School, and is accompanied by 11 chaperones including John Head and Arnold Grossman, *S.A.F.E. Colorado* co-founders, and Dottie Lamb, who serves on their board of directors. Yesterday the students attended a reception on Capitol Hill with the Colorado delegation, and split into teams to visit Members of Congress personally. They will continue these visits today. Following the White House event they will participate in a press conference with Members of Congress and meet with Vice President Gore and Rep. Gephardt.

Dear Mr. President:

The Department recently applied for a \$500,000 "One-Stop" grant from the Environmental Protection Agency to reduce industry's reporting burden and provide better public access to environmental information maintained at the state level. I want to elicit your support for funding of our grant request. A copy of the proposal is enclosed.

This grant proposal represents one of your initiatives and twenty-one (21) states have already received assistance. If we are successful in an award, the money will be combined with a \$1 million appropriation by the Arkansas General Assembly to conduct a management evaluation, develop a strategic plan, and reorganize the Department to measure performance in terms of environmental improvements. To my knowledge, Arkansas is the first state to appropriate monies specifically for improved performance measurement. Altogether, we have an outstanding opportunity to bring about some needed changes in our agency.

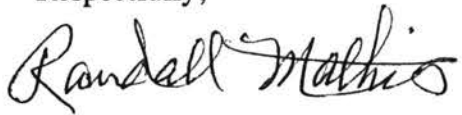

Attached is Arkansas' One Stop Reporting grant proposal for the 1999 competitive period. We have made excellent strides during the past year in data system reform; and appreciate the opportunity to participate in the One Stop Conference in Seattle.

Perhaps our greatest accomplishments impacting improved environmental data and burden reduction were the recent passage of two Arkansas Acts supporting the objectives of the One Stop Program. The first, Arkansas Act 1316, authorizes the conduct of a management evaluation, the development of strategic plan, and the reorganization of the Department to meet the objectives set forth in the Performance Partnership and One Stop Programs of the Environmental Protection Agency.

The second, Arkansas Act 1210, appropriated \$500,000 annually for each year of the fiscal biennial period. Together, these Acts have created a very real management stimulus. They do conclusively demonstrate senior leadership and the capacity to continue the implementation of the One Stop tenets. The Department will provide a comprehensive execution plan within one-hundred and twenty days following a grant award. Work to develop such plan has already been executed using current revenues.

Copies of these Acts are being provided under separate cover as a supplement to our proposal. Should you require further information, please advise.

1.0 SUMMARY. Data systems within the Department of Environmental Quality (Department) are as prolific as coordinating committees. All have been developed with various degrees of sophistication; and none, it seems, were designed to be compatible. The Department is requesting funding to continue development of a multimedia integrated data system to efficiently manage all of its regulatory program information. Funding will be used to enlarge and integrate our current permit data system, install the Facility Identification Template for States (FITS) data standard, bring disparate enforcement data into the permit data system, increase geographic data accuracy, streamline permitting processes, and expand our web presence. Activities financed through the One Stop Program will provide added information technologies for our data management restructuring, burden reduction automation of the permitting process, and improved public access to our environmental data.

2.0 APPLICANT. The applicant is the Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality, a state agency charged with the responsibility to administer environmental laws and regulations within the State of Arkansas.

Randall Mathis is the Director of the Department with sole authority to enter into contracts for the agency; Kevin Pierson is designated as the key contact for this proposal. The address and phone number of the Department is:

3.0 PROBLEM STATEMENT. In the past, data systems at the Department lacked the integration needed to detect trends, prevent pollution, assemble personnel, deploy resources, or answer inquiries concerning the environment.

The public was frustrated by the inability to assess performance by either industry or regulators, and was distrusting of both. Key limiting factors included:

- existence of information islands;
- lack of standardized facility and site locators;
- lack of standardized geographic locators; and
- incompatible computer hardware platforms and interfaces.

To ensure the financial capacity and legal authority to refine and integrate information systems, senior management within the Department submitted two legislative initiatives to the Arkansas General Assembly in January, 1999. The first, enacted as Arkansas Act 1316 of 1999, authorizes the conduct of a management evaluation, the development of a strategic plan, and the reorganization of the Department to meet the objectives set forth in the One Stop and Performance Partnership Programs developed by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency. This Act provides for the establishment of a management organization that utilizes:

- environmental indicators to measure performance;
- information restructuring for improved data access; and
- performance-based budgeting and accounting to assess effectiveness.

The second initiative, Arkansas Act 1210 of 1999, sought a five year authorization for \$500,000 annually, or \$2,500,000 to finance management improvements. Arkansas law provides that the General Assembly convene on a two-year cycle to enact laws and to allocate moneys for the next two-year period beginning July 1, 1999. The Department was successful in obtaining an appropriation of \$500,000 for each of the two-year fiscal period for an initial budget of \$1 million dollars. These Acts conclusively demonstrate senior management support of the One Stop concepts and position the Department to accelerate the integration and public access to environmental information.

Critical to this management reorganization is a significant investment in information technologies within the Department. Through the One Stop Grant we plan to develop an integrated data system to manage all of the Department's environmental program information.

4.0 PROJECT OBJECTIVES:

- The public critically needs a full vision of the environment and regulated entities; and
- The public immediately wants clear and accurate information to determine how well the environment is being managed.

Toward this end, we will enlarge and integrate our Permit Data System, implement the Facility Identification Template data standards, bring enforcement data into the Permit Data System, increase geographic data accuracy, streamline the permitting processes to reduce administrative burden, and expand our Internet presence of available public information.

5.0 PROJECT METHODS AND DESIGN:

5.1 Redeployment of Permit Data System Established by Department:

Background: The Department developed an integrated Permit Data System more than ten years ago tracking facilities and sites in the state, both permitted and unpermitted. Based on a facility identification system using a numeric county designation combined with a company serial number, the major function was to track environmental permits issued by the Water, Air, and Solid Waste Divisions, with particular emphasis on invoicing permit fees. About 18 months ago the Department started a major redesign of this system with extensive input from four different divisions. This redesign will add the ability to track activities related to the permit application process, and also the ability to track general events and activities related to permits and facilities. The new system will also have improved query capabilities for our staff.

Most of the design work has been completed, covering a relational database structure and initial data entry and query screen designs. The new design is currently deployed on a multi-user Compaq/Digital VMS system, using character-cell terminal-based data entry and query screens and a VMS-hosted database.

Purpose: Using the new design, the Department will continue the redeployment of the Permit Data System. The data entry, query, and reporting functions will be redesigned with a full client-server architecture, using a graphical front end and an NT-hosted database. Care will be given to the specific needs of individual requirements while maintaining the multimedia data lines that have been one of the notable features of the existing system.

Approach: The Computer Services Division will work with program personnel to develop software that will populate its newly defined data structures. Meetings will also be held with programmers, specific environmental program personnel and senior management to identify and address multimedia reporting requirements and concerns.

Alternative Approach: Commercial software packages are now available that are a single windows based application that can be used by all regulatory programs in an organization. These packages offer multimedia integration; electronic file rooms; work activity tracking; permit development, field inspection, and enforcement activity assistance. Benefits of these systems include immediate economies in system administration, enhancement, and training. Disadvantages include plug in and upgrade cost and decreased design flexibility. The decision to develop in-house software, purchase software, or a combination of both will be made after visiting with other One Stop states on proven approaches.

2. Integrate the County Serial Number Identifier with the Facility Identification Template Standards:

Background: The Department has used a facility identifier system called the County Serial Number for approximately twenty years. Used initially by the Air Division with the old Compliance Data System, the use of this numbering system was expanded about fifteen years ago to incorporate other media. This numeric designation became the main identification method for the Permit Data System established by the Department; and is also used to organize the central filing system.

Approach: Program personnel will evaluate the existing identifier system and the Facility Identification Template Standards. Personnel will then be assigned implementation tasks to incorporate the Facility Identification Template Standards into the Department's CSN system.

5.2 Clean and Transport Enforcement Data into the Permit Data System Database:

Background: In order to completely manage the environment of Arkansas, we have long realized that we must look at a facility across all environmental programs. Information from permitting processes must be analyzed with inspection data and the full compliance history of the facility to measure environmental impacts or determine a corrective action process. The Department has several non-integrated enforcement tracking systems reporting different types of information using incompatible definitions and assumptions. This information is stored using several different database technologies, some of which are incapable of easily exchanging data with others. The Department will design and establish the databases necessary to collect and integrate inspection, enforcement, and compliance information into a system compatible with the existing Permit Data System database. This data, coupled with permitting data, will provide a comprehensive assessment of environmental conditions and provide greater public access to environmental data in Arkansas.

Purpose: The essential task is to define the underlining data structures necessary to capture integrated enforcement information. This includes establishing a minimum and consistent set of standards and terminology between the various programs within the Department. This data will be stored using technologies compatible with the Permit Data System. Database information then can be extracted from each system and manipulated to generate a complete view for a facility, group of facilities, or geographic area within Arkansas.

Approach: Computer Services Division will work with program personnel to examine each media enforcement program and develop a consistent structure that can capture and report division-needed information while allowing data integration across media lines. The Department will develop, or purchase, the software to populate these databases and provide reports which will meet both specific program and upper-level management needs.

5.3 Expanding Web Presence for the Public:

Background: The Department maintains a "website" (www.adeq.state.ar.us) providing public information concerning the environment of Arkansas, State and Federal regulations, and general information on regulatory affairs. The depth of information on our website has increased steadily since we developed the site.

Software has been purchased for the publication of database applications over the internet; and this capability will incorporate the modified Permit Data System to illustrating permit, compliance, and enforcement information into textual reports and Geographic Information System mapping. Extensive use of the ENVIRONFACTS system developed by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency is planned.

Purpose: Establishing a mode to provide environmental data to the citizens of Arkansas will be accomplished using the framework established by implementing the Permit Data System, the Facilities Identification Template Standards, and the compliance system.

Approach: The Department has established an Internet Committee with representatives from each operating division. This committee will also make recommendations on the character of information to be maintained and presented.

5.4 Participating in One Stop Program:

Background: Arkansas will participate in all One Stop Conference activities and will share experiences with other states through written and website publications and oral presentations. Representatives from the Department have visited the State of Washington to review their accomplishments in information management and attended the National One Stop Conference in Seattle during 1998.

The Department is committed to the transfer of information on data reform among states; and will support the Environmental Protection Agency in all transfer activities and host visitors to observe data reform accomplishments by the Department.

5.6 On Line Permit Assistance, Burden Reduction:

Background: The Customer Services Division of the Department is currently providing general permit assistance through most forms of communication except Internet. The State of Washington has developed an Internet checklist through the One Stop Program that leads a prospective permit applicant through a series of questions and identifies the permits (federal and state) they will likely need for their business.

Purpose: Reduce burden of permit processes and provide business outreach

Approach: The permit assistance model developed by the State of Washington will be modified to satisfy the various regulations adopted in Arkansas. This effort will provide an interactive query tool for businesses proposing activities which may require permits from federal, state, and municipal wastewater pretreatment cities. The tool would be available over the Internet, and in participating agency offices throughout the state.

5.7 Verifying Latitude-Longitude Coordinates:

Background: Latitude-longitude coordinates are now incorporated into most facility records maintained by the Department. There is a known problem with data quality. Verifying data quality will lend a high level of reliability to the current facility database and the implementation of the Facility Identification Template Standards.

Purpose: To assure the quality of geographic data elements

Approach: Two science interns from higher education will be employed. A training program will be conducted on the use of global positioning equipment. Training will also include methods on manual calculations using quadrangle materials. The objective of this element is to obtain and verify latitude-longitude coordinates for permit discharge points and monitoring stations. The total number of facility and discharge points to be verified is estimated at approximately some 6,500.

7.0 CAPACITY AND READINESS TO IMPLEMENT THE ONE STOP CONCEPT:

The Department has initiated many excellent examples of system components and has finalized planning for additional improvements which include:

- A permit tracking system which uses a standard facility identifier based on a county number assignment combined with a serial number assignment for each permit applicant.

- The development of hazardous waste generation and management reporting software which supports electronic reporting. (These methods have been adopted in about twenty states; and the software could be adapted for other environmental reporting).
- The development of a biennial information technology plan to integrate information between state and federal agencies. (This planning activity is being performed in cooperation with the Arkansas Department of Information Systems).
- The installation of an Internet server disseminating environmental information and assistance through a website.
- The integration of environmental data with geographic and demographic data into a geographic information system-based database. Outstanding progress has been made in the divisions of Water, Air, Solid Waste, and Environmental Preservation in the use of this technology.
- The Hazardous Waste Division has been very active in the development of the "Waste Information Needs-Information Needs for Making Environmental Decisions", (WIN-INFORMED), software and database.

The strongest argument for readiness to implement the One Stop tenets is the support and leadership of senior management as evidenced by the passage of legislation to authorize major organizational and informational changes and the appropriation of \$1 million to further the process of data reform.

The One Stop Reporting restructuring combined with on going performance based management changes should prove a powerful information system as Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality and the Environmental Protection Agency move into the millennium.

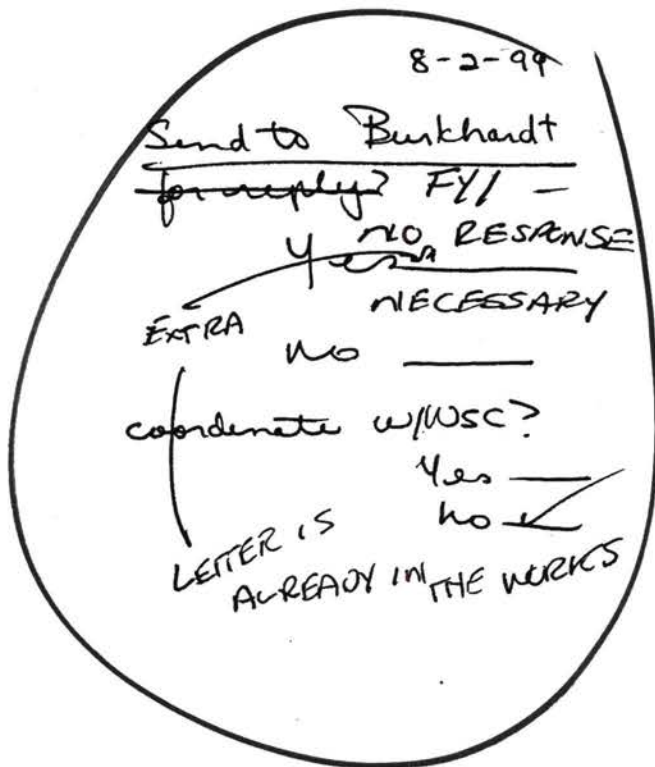

Dear Bill,

On the subject about which I wrote last week having to do with an Israeli woman living in California and now estranged from her husband who is particularly powerful in Israel. Her oldest child is with him but the other three are in California under a state court order that they cannot leave California—or else they would not be allowed to return.

After flying to Israel about ten days ago for one day in order to make a court appearance there having to do with an action he took, she then could only get a flight back to California through Toronto. At that point the INS because of another action on her husband's part has now blocked her re-entry into the US.

I know you won't want to read all of this but I am enclosing her Los Angeles lawyers brief on the subject.

In my previous letter to you I asked if it would not be possible to query Doris Meissner of the INS probably through the Attorney General about the situation. I have kept Ann Lewis informed of all this and she has made it perfectly clear that the President cannot intercede.

So here is the mother in Toronto not being able to be together with her three children, twins age 6 and a third, age 10. The situation has worsened because the nanny resigned having been threatened by the husband—although I do not have the details of that yet.

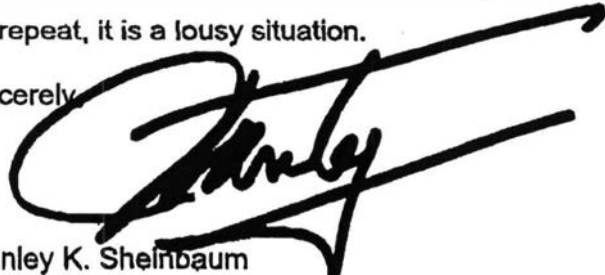
Worse, what seems to have been a kidnapping attempt on the 10-year-old occurred at a camp in Fresno. The sheriff was called in and the four men fled. I hope to have the sheriff's report of that imminently.

I just called Ann Lewis again to report these latest scares and to ask if it wasn't possible for the White House merely to ask the INS what is going on. She had earlier talked with Charles Ruff who made it clear that even asking is too akin intercession.

This is a terrible situation, and I cannot resist writing you again to press at a minimum for a distinction between mere questioning of a situation and intercession itself.

To repeat, it is a lousy situation.

This letter is about a particularly ugly situation, and I am requesting that you intercede with Doris Meissner, Director of the INS (probably via Attorney General Reno).

Mrs. Michal Mozes, whose home is in Los Angeles but is a citizen of Israel, has been a particularly good friend for the last three or four years. She has had a stormy relationship with her estranged husband, a rather powerful businessman in Israel. The immediacy of the matter at this moment is that upon her return last week from Israel she was scheduled through Toronto but now because of an action on the part of her husband is being denied entry to the US by the INS. At the same time her children are still in Los Angeles, with a California Superior Court action preventing them from joining Mrs. Mozes in Toronto. Mrs. Mozes is traumatized by all this and from what I know of the children's situation it is obviously a very unhappy one.

I am enclosing a letter from her attorney, Vera A. Weisz, which provides what I hope are all the necessary details of the situation. In addition I am enclosing a transcript of a handwritten letter by Mrs. Mozes which gives further insight into the situation.

If you are so inclined—and I trust you will be—I implore you to act fast on my request. The whole thing is unhealthy.

Dear Mr. President and Hillary,

I have been thinking about and researching your request about areas where the Department of Veterans Affairs could help with health care in the U.S. Here is a list of suggestions:

1. The VA's Electronic Patient Record is a great start and an important tool for management of patient care, for expense tracking/billing, and for research activities.
 - a. Patient care applications range from basic patient history storage/retrieval to safety issues such as drug interactions/allergies.
 - b. Expense recording allows for more accurate financial data, accurate billing, and other financial management benefits such as improved inventory management and cost allocation models.
 - c. Research benefits arise from the ability to survey various medical protocols effectiveness to the identification of public health issues such as Hepatitis C through screening of patient records for risk factors.
2. Expansion of the health care network to include, on a fee basis, medical coverage to veteran and veteran-related parties.
 - a. The most obvious would be the higher Priority Veterans without medical insurance. A series of options, not unlike private sector HMO plans, offered at some discount over private sectors plans would help provide coverage to currently non-insured veterans. These plans could offer portability and remove the problem of prior condition exclusion of coverage.
 - b. The extension of medical insurance, similar to above, to spouses and immediate families of veterans.

3. As the Principi/Dole Transition Report has suggested, combining the DOD health system into the VA (at a minimum for health care delivery in the continental U.S.), could greatly enhance the medical care benefit to our nation's service men and women.
 - a. This will, perhaps, prove the most difficult to implement due to historic biases and the reductions in staffing which should result from such a combination.
 - b. Careful alignment of the point of health care delivery and "right sizing" of the hospital facilities is a key success point.
4. The medical education and research activities are a significant contributor to the overall quality of medical care in the U.S. Expansion of research activities and partnerships with teaching hospitals could help provide badly needed support (financially and strategically) for the indigent care activities of most teaching medical centers.
5. The VA has demonstrated the benefits of standardization and blanket purchase orders through its pharmaceutical formulary. We have significantly reduced the cost of prescriptions through these activities and are beginning to go after the other components of the medical/surgical supply schedule. There are significant savings to be realized in this area, especially if DOD is integrated into VA.
6. The VA has closed approximately 52 percent of our acute care beds in the last four years. This does not mean hospitals have necessarily been closed, just rooms closed or floors closed. Some, of course, needed expensive renovation and are not really suitable to be rehabilitated. Certainly, there are opportunities to better utilize the VA's vast physical plant.

There is a terrific story to be told about the VA and its success. In many ways it is not very glamorous, more like fixing the plumbing in your home versus the more visible things like new paint and draperies, yet it is critical to the success of the enterprise. I have found the people at the VA to be terrific, dedicated, and willing to engage a challenge. As the largest health care provider in the country, the VA is a terrific resource and our staff would be thrilled to share their expertise with you.

Cousin of JFK Jr. dies of cancer at 40

Radziwill was a
TV news producer

A month after John F. Kennedy Jr. died while piloting his plane off Martha's Vineyard, the cousin he considered as close as a brother has died, too.

TV news producer Anthony Stanislas Radziwill, the son of Lee Bouvier Radziwill and Prince Stanislas Radziwill, died on Tuesday at New York Hospital after a 10-year battle with cancer.

Radziwill, the nephew of Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, turned 40 last week.

"His loss so soon after the death of his close friend and cousin, John Kennedy, is very hard for our whole family," Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., said in a statement Wednesday.

"Anthony lived a happy life of high achievement and great courage and that is how we will always remember him."

Funeral services are tentatively planned for Friday in the Hamptons, N.Y.

Kennedy was best man at Radziwill's wedding to fellow ABC News producer Carole Ann DiFalco in 1994 in East Hampton, N.Y. Two years later, Radziwill stood by his cousin's side as best man when Kennedy wed Carolyn Bessette on Cumberland Island off the Georgia coast.

Radziwill was with Kenne-

dy's sister, Caroline Kennedy Schlossberg, last month at her home in the Hamptons as authorities searched the waters for the downed plane off Martha's Vineyard.

Radziwill spent his childhood in England. He graduated from Boston University in 1982.

He began his broadcasting career with NBC Sports in Seoul, South Korea, at the 1988 Summer Olympic Games, for which he won an Emmy Award in sports journalism.

Radziwill joined ABC News in 1989 as a producer on *Prime Time Live* with Diane Sawyer and Sam Donaldson.

"He was both fearless and humane in his reporting," Sawyer said in a statement Wednesday. "He was always careful to make sure that vulnerable people were treated with great care and kindness."

In 1990, Radziwill won the Peabody Award for a story on the new Nazi movement in the United States and a second Emmy for an investigative report on the Menendez brothers' double murder case.

Radziwill joined Time Warner's Home Box Office in 1997 as vice president of documentaries. He received an Academy Award nomination this year for *Lenny Bruce: Swear to Tell the Truth*.

He is survived by his wife, Carole, of New York City; his mother, Lee Bouvier Radziwill Ross, and stepfather, Herbert Ross, of East Hampton, N.Y.; and his sister, Anna Christina Radziwill.

We are forwarding the following recent information items:

Berger Memo on psycho-social trauma of Kosovars – Responding to your request after reading Eli Wiesel's report, Sandy says that NGOs and international organizations provided about \$12 million for trauma and grief counseling. Due to your interest and interest on the Hill, agencies plan additional programs, including \$10 million for Kosovo women victims of violence (like Bosnia model) and \$10 million for children's special needs. NSC is working to identify other opportunities to provide assistance.

Eli Segal Memo on One America Conference – praises your role in transforming the welfare system and encourages you to use August 3rd Conference (and pre-conference period) to highlight the need for ongoing efforts to complete the job; recommends using the welfare reform law's third anniversary to re-issue challenges to Congress, Governors, service providers and businesses to do more; suggests the business community can be a strong ally, given their interest and optimism; thinks a strong roll-out would keep the issue current and shift the debate to the unfinished business of helping those left behind. *Media advisory with list of attendees at August 3rd conference attached.*

Thanks for taking time to come to the dinner last week. It was a memorable evening for all of us, and undoubtedly, a first – no previous president has ever enjoyed combread and ribs while discussing how to solve the world's problems with a group of African American journalists, and a former journalist.

I do have an additional recommendation for the race initiative. I believe much is accomplished for blacks and whites when political and civic leaders talk frankly about race. I was in the audience for your speech a few months ago at the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights dinner. One of my guests was a young Black lawyer. After you spoke, she turned to me, and said, "He gets it." She was so thrilled that a white politician, the president, in fact, understood the obstacles she faces as a black woman. It was similar to the reaction in the 1992 campaign when you slipped into St. Louis late on a Saturday night, and gave a speech to the National Bar Association. People there were in tears, saying it was the most frank discussion of race by a white politician since they had heard Bobby Kennedy.

My biggest fear is that after you leave office, no one will talk about race any more. To be successful, I think your race initiative must encourage the presidents who follow you to engage the nation in a dialogue about race. I also think it would be just as important to encourage other politicians - senators, governors, mayors, etc. - to talk to their constituents about race. Only through dialogue can blacks and whites put their fears and stereotypes behind them. Perhaps one way to accomplish this is to find ways that the dialogue you started has impacted real people's lives. This could be accomplished by interviewing people who attended or participated in your town hall meetings. The race report could document how their lives were changed by the dialogue. That might be enough evidence to convince other politicians that talking about race can make a difference and is a worthwhile thing to do.

As I mentioned the other night, the African American population has many needs – better education, better job training and better housing. But what is the benefit of having a good job and home if any of us can be a Ricky Byrdsong – shot down and killed merely because of his skin color? For our society to progress, we must make strides not only on economic issues, but also on our attitudes towards each other.

Enjoy the Vanessa Rubin albums; she's the hottest new jazz singer.

Campaign to Stop Gender Apartheid in Afghanistan

Policy Recommendations

1) We commend the Executive Order blocking property and prohibiting commercial transactions with the Taliban. However, the Taliban should be isolated not only because of Osama bin Laden and terrorism, but also because of their abhorrent treatment of women and girls. We urge that the sanctions should include in their purpose U.S. opposition to gender apartheid and that the sanctions should not be removed until the rights of Afghan women and girls to education, to health care, to employment, and to mobility are restored fully and permanently. We are concerned that if the Taliban turns over bin Laden that the sanctions would be removed and that the willingness and ability of the U.S. to pressure the Taliban to restore women's human rights would be diminished.

The U.S. should also place additional sanctions on Pakistan and condition trade with Saudi Arabia and United Arab Emirates until they withdraw all support from the Taliban. The Taliban depends on Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, and the UAE. The sanctions should be widened to include institutions within Pakistan, which extend expertise, ship equipment and fuel, provide funds, and dispatch personnel into Afghanistan.

2) The United States has essentially closed the door on Afghan women and girl refugees. Blocking the admission of Afghan women and girls as refugees, shores up the Taliban. Despite numerous meetings with the State Department since our meeting with the President, we are no closer to increasing the admission of Afghan women and girls overall and only somewhat closer on the scholarship program. On the scholarship program, we now have a letter from the State Department endorsing the scholarship program, but we are worried that very few women and girls will be allowed to enter the country for this program and that there has been no commitment of U.S. dollars to this program. We have found it extremely difficult to get Afghan women and girls into the U.S.. For example, we have hit nothing but roadblocks in our efforts to assist in three tragic cases of Afghan women and girls trying to gain refugee status. We believe that the UNHCR is hindering the ability of Afghan women and girls to come to the U.S.

To overcome this stalemate, we must streamline the process of admission of Afghan refugees by creating a P-2 Category that includes Afghan women and girls. P-2 status would allow admission of Afghan refugees without involvement of the United Nations High Commissioner on Refugees (UNHCR) and without the need for each person to show how they individually were persecuted by a regime which clearly persecutes classes of people along gender and ethnic lines. Moreover, the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) must set up a processing center in Pakistan to further facilitate the admission of women and girls to the United States.

The United States also must significantly raise the quota of refugees allowed into the U.S. from Afghanistan. One of the cases that we are trying to help involves a well-known Afghan woman journalist whose family members are being terrorized by the Taliban because she has spoken out against the Taliban in Afghanistan. If her family were safe in the United States, this journalist could help expose the brutalities of the Taliban to the U.S. public and policy makers. On the scholarships,

3) The Feminist Majority Foundation is assisting in the cases of several specific women and their families who are seeking admission to the United States as refugees.

The first case involves the niece of Dr. Zieba Shorish-Shamley, an Afghan-American who directs the Women's Alliance for Peace and Human Rights in Afghanistan. The niece's dying mother arranged for her daughter, Maryam Shams, to marry an Afghan-German doctor so that she could escape the Taliban. Rather than saving Maryam's life, this man, who has a record of trafficking young women in these dire circumstances, brutally raped, sodomized, and abused the nineteen-year-old for

the three months that she has been in Germany. She is now in hiding with her American aunt in Germany. Currently, she is seeking both Humanitarian Parole status from the INS in Rome and refugee status from UNHCR in Germany.

The second case is Dr. Sohaila Nader, who is an Afghan woman doctor of Hazara ethnicity seeking admission to the U.S. for herself, her two children, and her mother, who are currently in hiding from her husband who is a member of the Taliban. Her husband in his position as a Talib has used beatings, threats, and imprisonment to apply Taliban law to her and her family. UNHCR denied her application because she is not divorced from her Talib husband, who will not allow a divorce and if he gained custody of the children would prohibit the daughter from attending school and force the son to go to a madrasa (Taliban training school).

The third case is the family of the Afghan woman journalist, Nazira Karimi. After a long battle, Ms. Karimi was admitted as a U.S. refugee last year. Her widowed mother, teen-aged sister and young brother have been targeted, tortured, and threatened with death by the Taliban. Despite a Taliban decree against the Karimi family, the UNHCR denied her family's application which prevents them from entering the United States.

We have conducted investigations, special investigations, audits, and inspections that in my judgment have met the hopes and expectations of the drafters of the Inspector General Act.

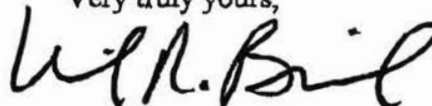
The Justice OIG plays a key role in the system of checks and balances designed to ensure that the public's business, as carried out by the 120,000 employees of the Department of Justice, is conducted effectively and efficiently -- and that the conduct of the Department's personnel meets the highest standards of honesty and integrity. It has been a great pleasure to work alongside the talented and dedicated men and women of the OIG who are so fully committed to its important mission, and to work with the Attorney General, her staff, and the other personnel of the Department of Justice.

After five years, it is time for me to move on to other challenges. I respectfully urge you to nominate promptly a candidate to replace me as inspector general so that the Senate can move swiftly to confirm my successor. I also urge you to support a level of funding that will permit the OIG to fulfill its mission, as you have in your FY 2000 budget. For the OIG to play its intended role, it must have adequate resources and personnel, which in turn requires the Administration and the Congress to share a mature vision of the constructive and important role that OIGs play in our system of government.

Dear Mr. President,

I applaud your efforts to restrict the use of World Bank funds so that communist China cannot move en masse Chinese farmers into traditionally Tibetan areas of Tibet and thus further project their political and economic hegemony over a country they took by force. This World Bank program would have been damaging to the environment in this area of Tibet also, and therefore the United States needs to continue to oppose the use of World Bank funds for this part of the Chinese program, and further to strongly encourage our allies to also oppose this World Bank program.

I beg your indulgence and ask you to consider two further issues: the island nation of Cuba is planning to complete their nuclear reactor. Members of Congress from Miami have already called attention to the extreme danger to Southern Florida that the completion of this facility represents. However, the United States has the consultant know-how and the manufacturing capacity to provide Cuba with all the electrical power capacity it needs into the future using new natural gas clean burning technology, solar photovoltaic arrays, solar thermal generators, methane generators which use solid animal waste, and wind power. I ask you to direct the relevant agencies of the government, including USAID, along with the IADB, the OAS, and the World Bank Vice President for Environmentally and Socially Sustainable Development Ian Johnson to work together for a solution that removes this clear and present danger to the United States.

Secondly, Both Shell oil and Exxon oil are asking the World Bank for funding to build an oil pipeline from the Doba region of Chad to the Atlantic coast at the port of Kribi in Cameroon. This pipeline will go through highly sensitive areas of the West African rainforest, including areas where indigenous pygmy cultural groups have lived for hundreds of generations, with the consequence that their traditional economic livelihoods will be irreparably damaged. Further, the pipeline and the necessary road network will also result in major deforestation, ground water contamination, wildlife poaching, loss of farmland, and very likely mass emigration, similar to the damage to the Brazilian Amazon that has now become so well known. Please ask the World Bank President to work out a more ecologically sensitive solution so that the environment and the traditional peoples of Africa are not sacrificed in the name of quite possibly dubious economic growth.

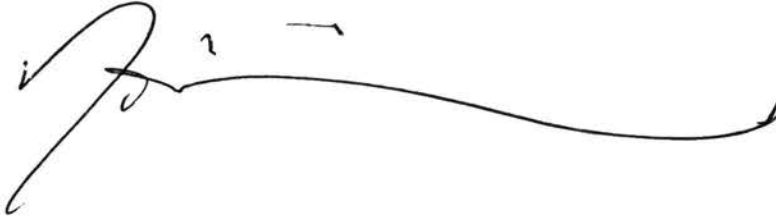

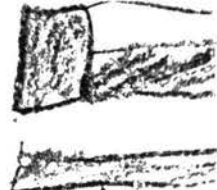
