Many of these developments have been a result of work and trials that were conducted right here at University Hospital. These techniques make what the children go through much more tolerable and are used throughout many of the major children's cancer hospitals in the country.

They held fundraisers, brought him gifts, banners, even homemade videos to the hospital. They held a car wash to buy a TV for his room. These 12-year-old

children truly amaze me. I think they are much more of an example of our public school system than the violence that is portrayed by the media.

We have met so many wonderful people that have touched our hearts in so many ways. It has restored our faith in humanity. This has brought us all much closer as a family and has made us each a better person by the experience. We as a family are supporting some local organizations in the community. They have helped our family a great deal. We have found by focusing our time and attention to help these groups has been beneficial to all of us especially Christopher. I have enclosed some information for you.

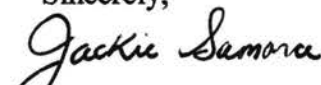
I am sure that you are aware that University Hospital is a state run facility. Their children's cancer unit serves the children of 22 counties in the Upstate area. Though the esthetics of the out patient clinic is somewhat less comfortable than those of larger clinics in the country, we would not trade the care we receive by the medical team at Upstate for anything in the world. Chris receives the same level of care in Syracuse that he would in any of the largest cancer hospitals in the country. The reason for this, in part, is because of the sharing of knowledge that exists between the hospitals that are a part of a national consortium of children's cancer centers called the Pediatric Oncology Group. It would be my hope in the future to see more improvements in clinic facilities in Syracuse.

The long-term survival rate for children with cancer has dramatically improved in the last 20 years. With that come special challenges in many areas. What the children go through to get well is not comprehensible to most. But I believe that these children grow up to be exceptional adults. They meet life with a compassion for others that most of us will never know. My hope is to do everything possible to support our littlest heroes and help them through the toughest fight of their lives.

We have been grateful by the support we have received from our church, family, friends and co-workers. We are keenly aware that not all families and children have the resources we have had to comfort their children. We hope in the future that we can help other families that are going through the same experience we are. We believe that you both are dedicated to the many issues involving our children in the country and support you both on a state and national level. If we can some how help you in these areas of concern, please let us know.

In closing, I would just like to share with you something that Chris said to me Monday afternoon on the way to the hospital. We had just come from the airport when one of your staff had phoned to invite Chris to your departure. He said to me, "Mom, I don't know why everyone thinks leukemia is so bad. I have had the best summer of my life and I'm going to get to meet the President of the United States."

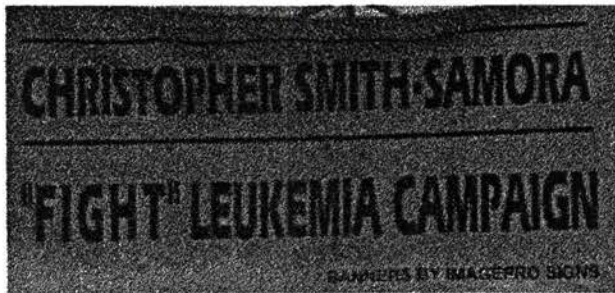

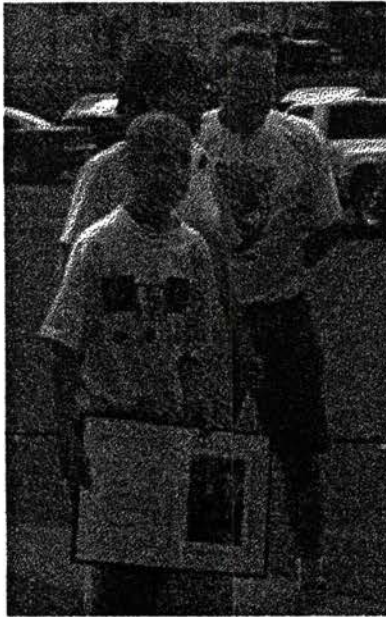

Dear Mr. President:

I have delayed writing this letter in the hope that my medical situation would allow me to continue my duties as Ambassador to Norway even in a limited capacity. However, over the past few months, I have come to realize that because of the demands of my medical treatments and on the advice of my doctors it will be impossible to fulfill my ambassadorial duties, as I would like. Having said that, I do not want to give the impression that my prognosis has changed; my doctors are now examining different types of new, radical and demanding treatments. The fact is, for the foreseeable future I will need to remain close to my medical team in the United States as they begin the next level of treatment. At this point, the doctors are still not fully aware of the side effects of the new treatment.

I must admit another reason for the delay of informing you on my status is the extreme pride and satisfaction I have felt serving as American Ambassador to Norway. I believe that during my tenure the Embassy has promoted U.S. national interests and strengthened the bonds that link our two nations. It is therefore with great reluctance, but after much consideration, that I have come to the following conclusion.

I request that I be relieved of my duties in Norway to be effective at your pleasure. I do this with great reluctance. However, I want to do the right thing. While I am not fully aware of the process in such cases, I do know that the White House and State Department must make a number of key administrative and personnel decisions sooner rather than later in the process.

How we handle the transition after my departure will be viewed by the Norwegians as another symbol of how serious we regard the relationship. It is important that we demonstrate to Norway the stability and continuity of the relationship. It is equally important for the Embassy team, which has recently experienced a period of unusually high turnover, to know that we are working together closely during this period of transition.

Therefore, I would respectfully (and after great consideration) recommend that the Department and Administration consider Jon Gundersen, my Deputy Chief of Mission, as my replacement in Norway. Over the past year (and in his previous dealings with Norway), he has gained the respect and admiration of all his interlocutors from the Prime Minister on down. There is perhaps no person in the U.S. government with the range and depth of knowledge of Norway.

I also know that a number of key people must be involved in the process. Therefore, I am sending a copy of this letter to Deputy Secretary of State Strobe Talbott, Director General Edward Gnehm and Assistant Secretary of State Marc Grossman. Rest assured that I will be as helpful as possible as you make these decisions.

In closing, I want to thank you again for the opportunity to serve our great nation. It has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life. I can only hope that, in some small way, I have contributed to the stature the United States enjoys in Norway and throughout the world.

Doreen joins me in conveying our warmest regards.

PURPOSE: To Congratulate Ben Crenshaw and the United States golf team for winning the 1999 Ryder Cup.

BACKGROUND: **The Competition:**
The Ryder Cup tournament began in 1927 and takes place every two years, with the only interruption occurring from 1939-1945 due to the Second World War. The United States and Europe take turns hosting the tournament, with this year's Ryder Cup taking place at The Country Club in Brookline, MA. The United States has won 23 of the 32 Ryder Cup tournaments, the Europeans have won 7 tournaments and the teams have tied twice: 1969 and 1989.

The Trophy:
In 1927, Samuel Ryder presented the Ryder Cup to Great Britain's Professional Golfers Association as the prize for an international competition between American and British professional golfers. In 1927, the Ryder Cup was valued at 250 pounds. Today it is valued at \$13,900. The Ryder Cup is 17 inches tall and weighs just over four pounds. The golfer depicted on top of the trophy is Abe Mitchell, friend and private instructor of Ryder.

The Course:
One of the world's most renowned golf venues, The Country Club, which currently measures 7,010 yards for major competitions, is a

27-hole layout featuring the Clyde, Squirrel and Primrose courses, and continues the lineage of outstanding venues to host the Ryder Cup Matches. The inaugural Matches were conducted at Worcester (Mass.) Country Club in 1927, located approximately 45 miles west of Brookline.

The Country Club's origins date to 1894 when Laurence Curtis and two other club members built six holes with the stipulation from The Country Club board of governors that the project cost no more than \$50. The layout was expanded to nine holes a year later by club professional William "Willie" Campbell. The course featured 18 holes measuring 5,200 yards at the turn of the century. The Primrose was designed by William Flynn in 1927, and Rees Jones lent his talents to modify the "composite" course prior to the 1988 U.S. Open. The Clyde and the Squirrel nines are customarily used for an 18-hole round, and during major championships holes from the Primrose are used in place of three holes from the other nines. The Country Club is the only club to have hosted six different USGA competitions. It has been the site of three U.S. Opens (1913, '63, '88), five U.S. Amateurs (1910, '22, '34, '57, '82), three U.S. Women's Amateurs (1902, '41, '95), two Walker Cup Matches (1932, '73), the 1953 U.S. Girls' Junior and the 1968 U.S. Junior Amateur.

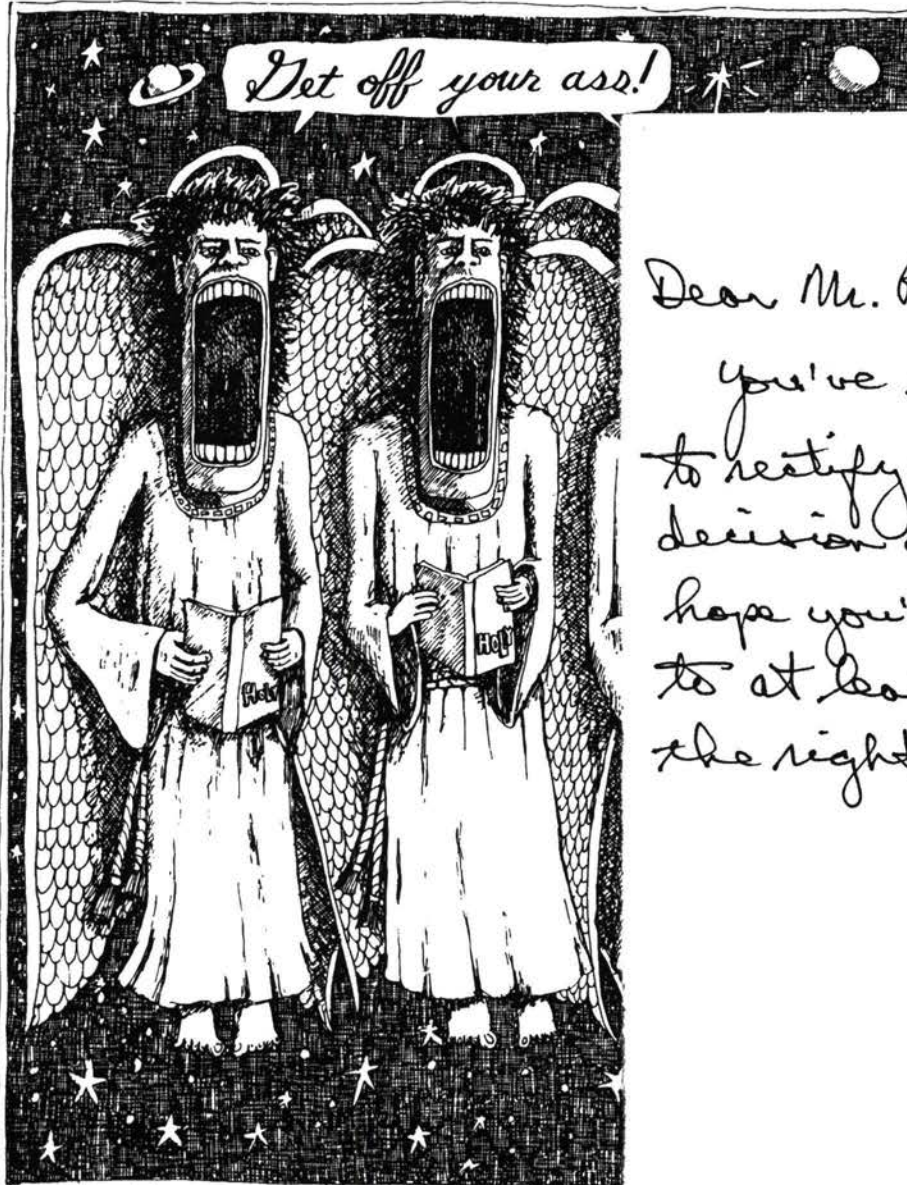

An Unlikely 'Don't Tell' Target: Lawmaker May Face Discharge

PHOENIX, Aug. 24 — By his own account, Steve May knew from the time he was in his early teens that he wanted to be a politician, specifically a conservative Republican politician. He carefully built his life, he says, to shape an attractive résumé, from his decision to enter R.O.T.C. in college and then serve as an Army officer to his efforts at building a track record as a small-business man, helping run his family's herbal-tea and natural-foods company here.

It worked. Mr. May served with distinction as a lieutenant on active duty in the Army and then entered the Reserve, and last November he was elected to the State Legislature, to represent the affluent, conservative district where he had grown up.

Everything seemed to be going just right until this winter, when the usually affable and measured 27-year-old Mr. May bitterly spoke his mind in the Arizona House, this time not as a Republican legislator, a Mormon or a soldier, but as an openly gay man.

He denounced an ultimately failed

bill that would have barred the use of public funds to pay for health benefits of same-sex partners, and also attacked the legislation's conservative sponsor, Representative Karen S. Johnson, a fellow Republican who had condemned homosexuals as immoral.

Mr. May's remarks were widely quoted here and were followed by a cover article in Phoenix New Times, an alternative magazine, that discussed everything from his youthful realization that he is gay to how he had met and dated his companion, who lives with him. The upshot was that he not only angered many conservatives in his party by suggesting that Ms. Johnson was bigoted but also brought on himself one of the more unusual investigations under the Clinton Administration's "don't ask, don't tell" policy toward homosexuals in the military.

Under that policy, recruiters are barred from asking applicants about their sexual orientation, and commanders are forbidden to undertake investigations of suspected homosexuality unless there is significant evidence of homosexual conduct.

On the other hand, homosexuals are forbidden to disclose their orientation in a public setting; indeed, their doing so is considered evidence of at least an intent to engage in homosexual acts.

Col. John R. Hawkins 3d, the spokesman for the Army Reserve, acknowledges that an investigation of Mr. May is under way, to determine whether his remarks are grounds for discharge.

Colonel Hawkins says the inquiry should come as no surprise, given the public nature of the case.

"I don't think that the individual has been, shall we say, keeping this under wraps, as to his sexual orientation," the colonel said.

In addition, Mr. May, who was first "outed" as gay when he ran unsuccessfully for the State Senate three years ago, faces the possibility that the increased publicity about his homosexuality, as well as his scuffling with party leaders, will hurt his

chances of winning re-election next year.

Mr. May said he had never hidden his sexual orientation; in fact, he joined the board of the Log Cabin Republicans, a nationwide organization of gay party members, after his State Senate run. But he always chose to identify himself with other issues, like education, rather than gay rights.

Then, after long doing everything "right," he says, he faced a perhaps inevitable choice when he heard gay men denounced during the health-benefits debate in February as disease-ridden dangers to the family who were doomed to ghastly early deaths.

During his outburst in the House, he acknowledged that it might have been politically wiser to keep quiet. "But when you attack my family," said Mr. May, whose father was once a bishop in the conservative Mormon Church, "and you steal my freedom, I will not sit quietly in my office. This Legislature takes my gay tax dollars, and my gay tax dollars spend the same as your straight tax dollars. If you're not going to treat me fairly, don't take my money."

That was followed by a string of newspaper articles, and later a confrontation with the Army in which he was informed of the investigation against him.

The sheer volume of Mr. May's public remarks on the matter makes this a highly unusual case, said Stacey Sobel, a senior attorney at the Service Members Legal Defense Network, an organization based in Washington that advises troops who

"Steve May is a pretty good guy, to tell you the truth," said Mike Minnaugh, the Republican state chairman, who is a resident of Mr. May's district, in the wealthy eastern section of Phoenix. "As an individual, I do not endorse homosexual relationships — it goes against my beliefs — but I do respect his rights. As long as he doesn't go and talk a lot about his homosexuality, he can continue to get elected."

Mr. Minnaugh added, though, that if a heterosexual Republican candidate with equally conservative credentials were to run against Mr. May in the primary next year, "that would be very difficult."

And Speaker Groscost said that "if there's a politically attractive challenger, Steve could have some trouble."

"I'm not sure that he ran before as an openly gay legislator," the Speaker said. "There's a small chink in that armor."

Mr. May says he is concerned that the party may not support his reelection. (He is already working to raise a campaign war chest of \$100,000 on his own, a huge sum for a state race here.) The experience, he says, has shaken his belief in the party machine, though not in the party's traditional values.

"I've always been Republican," Mr. May said. "I believe in the core Republican principles. I also happen to be gay. But the party has been hijacked by theocratic fascists."

The only other openly gay member of the Legislature, Representative Ken Cheuvront, a Democrat, says that in this conservative state, he was surprised at Mr. May's outspokenness concerning his homosexuality.

"Steve May is a pretty good guy, to tell you the truth," said Mike Minnaugh, the Republican state chairman, who is a resident of Mr. May's district, in the wealthy eastern section of Phoenix. "As an individual, I do not endorse homosexual relationships — it goes against my beliefs — but I do respect his rights. As long as he doesn't go and talk a lot about his homosexuality, he can continue to get elected."

Mr. Minnaugh added, though, that if a heterosexual Republican candidate with equally conservative credentials were to run against Mr. May in the primary next year, "that would be very difficult."

And Speaker Groscost said that "if there's a politically attractive challenger, Steve could have some trouble."

"I'm not sure that he ran before as an openly gay legislator," the Speaker said. "There's a small chink in that armor."

Mr. May says he is concerned that the party may not support his reelection. (He is already working to raise a campaign war chest of \$100,000 on his own, a huge sum for a state race here.) The experience, he says, has shaken his belief in the party machine, though not in the party's traditional values.

"I've always been Republican," Mr. May said. "I believe in the core Republican principles. I also happen to be gay. But the party has been hijacked by theocratic fascists."

The only other openly gay member of the Legislature, Representative Ken Chevront, a Democrat, says that in this conservative state, he was surprised at Mr. May's outspokenness concerning his homosexuality.

"He's young," Mr. Chevront said. "And all of a sudden he heard this stuff being said about gays. He dealt with it differently than I do."

Mr. May says he had no choice. "The voters want you to be honest," he said. "I'd rather just say, 'It's none of your business.' But you can't get away with that anymore."

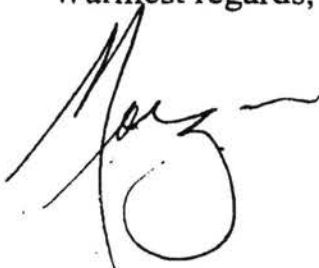

The Colorado School Shooting: The Ignored Warning Signs

(An abbreviated version of this article was read on National Public Radio – *All Things Considered* – 4/99)

As information about the Colorado school shootings slowly emerges, we still don't have answers to the two most important questions—are there unmistakable warning signs that could help us prevent such tragedies and are they rare occurrences or indications of larger societal troubles? But, the answers may be clearer than many may think. To recognize the warning signs and prevent these violent outbreaks, however, we will need to look beyond the familiar suspects.

The warning signs for mass destructive behavior are often different from those for individual acts of violence or recurrent delinquency. The most important ones are not what's often suggested—a history of mental illness, impulse control problems, antisocial behavior, the Internet, TV, music, or the experimentation or rebellion of adolescence. Instead, they tend to involve three subtle, but distinct and alarming personality changes: a “turning” toward extreme preoccupations and/or actions focusing on violence and destruction in a child who is not familiar with acting out his rage, grandiose beliefs and plans, and irrational thinking fueling the preoccupations and plans.

Some children quietly focus on violent thoughts for many years before a worrisome escalation requires our immediate help. Others go through a more abrupt change. The many physical, social, and psychological changes of adolescence can play varying roles in bringing on these especially worrisome personality changes. Importantly, these changes are usually advertised and require a rapid response. Preliminary descriptions raise the possibility that the Colorado teenagers were in the middle of such personality changes, with growing irrational preoccupations with violence and death and grandiose plans which included destroying the

whole school and a city. When illogical, violent thoughts grow rapidly without the civilizing and reality-grounding influence of a caring adult or group of peers who can pull such preoccupied youngsters back in, monstrous behavior becomes possible.

In contrast to a teenager who carries out mass murder, a child who has a history of frequent antisocial behavior, fighting, and hurting others has considerable experience with anger. Incidents of very aggressive behavior and run-ins with teachers or the law may date back to childhood. Typically, he may attack one or two people if they get in his way. The teenager who plans mass murder may not have a childhood history of frequent violent behavior. In this sense, he is less familiar with his rage. His experience with the typical use of pretend play to explore aggression in childhood may be limited. He may have episodic outbursts, but otherwise behave nicely. As a teenager, such a child may also be very sensitive, especially to rejection or slights and may show both his sensitivity and growing anger, whereas the child with a long history of frequent aggressive behavior often tends to be less overtly sensitive (more "thick skinned"). Preliminary press reports suggest that many viewed the Colorado teenagers as "nice kids" and that their preoccupation and beginning antisocial behavior grew in the last year or two, illustrated by their Internet interests and one of them openly showing his feelings on his website and making threats to a peer.

While we can't and shouldn't speculate about the families of the Colorado teenagers, there are other more general warning signs that we need to attend to. These are better known and include the lack of satisfying, nurturing relationships with peers, parents, and educators, and instead, being teased, harassed and feeling estranged or outside the group. Often, we mistakenly assume that families who appear to be functioning well on the surface are engaging in and available for the types of relationships their children require. Families sometimes make the same assumption. We all need to look beneath the surface. It's also worrisome when kids can't fully

experience and reason about the feelings and concerns that children their age typically struggle with—from anger, frustration, and disappointment to competition, caring, and excitement. If they are unable to reason about their feelings, children tend to make a feeling larger than life (somebody is unkind, and a teenager quickly assumes “they are out to harm me.”). When distorted feelings are coupled with an inability to read ordinary social signals and lack of ongoing feedback from peers or adults, feelings of failure, frustration, and being an outcast tend to grow.

The warnings become more immediate as a preoccupation with selected ideas grows—especially when the ideas are about guns, violence, suicide, or death, coupled with the exclusion of typical concerns about friendships, music, social activities, school work, or sports. The warnings become an emergency when kids have or are building weapons.

Many youths may show one of these warning signs. We need to be especially alert to children who are showing a number of them. Does knowing these warning signs mean we can predict violent or self-destructive acts? Sometimes. But to help even sometimes, we need to have people who care enough to notice the warning signs and do something about them. They need to be in all the right places—the police station when a teenager is brought in for even a minor infraction; our schools; our community centers; other places where kids hang out; and, most importantly, at home.

Knowing kids and being in the right places requires caring, well-functioning families, supportive communities with collaboration between education, criminal justice, mental health, and social services, and a society that places children, families, and communities first. Instead of knowing our kids better, however, we are farming out the care of our kids to others at earlier and earlier ages. In schools, test performance is more important than learning relationships. Mental health services for children, counseling for criminal justice system offenders, and social supports

in schools are all on the decline. More and more, kids are being treated for emotional problems without sufficient psychological or social support. Most of us are busier than ever and interests in material things are out-competing caring for others. Not surprisingly, the United States has among the highest rates of the industrialized nations of youth violence and destructive behavior, including self-destructive behavior.

X { In the face of these violent outbreaks, you have to wonder why we still tend to deny the obvious. The discussions in the media are largely about teenage cliques, new gun laws, legal culpability of parents, and music, TV and Internet violence. They are not about the deep ailments in families, communities, and society, of which these aggressive explosions are perhaps only the beginning symptoms.

How far we have to go in changing our attitudes is indicated by some of the reactions to the Colorado shootings. For an seven-year-old little boy who was being bullied by his friends and who made an empty physical threat back, the impersonal use of fear, rather than compassion coupled with firm guidance, was only too apparent. The scared little boy was immediately isolated from his peers in the classroom and put into another room alone with a somewhat large, untrained male aide who immediately threatened the little boy with going to jail if he "opened his mouth." By the next day, the little boy was suspended from school with no support or counseling for either the child or his parents. Understandably, the whole country feels more anxious and vulnerable, but the question is do we respond to our collective anxiety with tactics that intimidate, humiliate, induce fear and further isolation or do we attend to society's deeper problems, which unfortunately, are illustrated in this horrifying school response to a scared seven-year-old little boy.

It's not so complicated. What civilizes human beings is ongoing, nurturing, and guiding relationships at all levels, in families, schools, and communities. Protecting human life and

controlling aggression are not outgrowths of formal education in the traditional sense, but of relationships that teach the value of human life. Societies depend on a balance between the competitive edge used to produce economic growth and the capacity to care for others—to nurture our kids, ourselves, and our communities. In fact, we require warm, nurturing families to produce emotionally and intellectually competent adults who can make an economy work and rear the next generation successfully.

As more and more children have access to weapons (and, on the international front, more and more groups have access to advanced military technology), we are learning our lessons the hard way. The old methods, where individuals and groups could be contained by fear while being deprived of the basic sustaining experiences of life, no longer hold. Whether it's the inner city, a suburban Colorado community, or another country or group, the lessons of recent outbreaks of violence should be clear. The relationships that make individuals, families, communities, and nations fully humane are on the decline.

A PROPOSAL FOR A HIGH SCHOOL ESSAY CONTEST

**CIVILITY IN OUR COMMUNITY
AND
A COLLEGE OF ESSAYISTS**

TO BE ADMINISTERED AND FUNDED BY THE INNS OF COURT

This proposal is solely the concept of Robert G. Heiserman, attorney. This idea has not yet been shared with the Inns of Court nationally. Mr. Heiserman is Treasurer of The Rhone-Brackett Inn in Denver, Colorado. He has been authorized by that chapter to explore the concept for that Inn.

Civility, or its absence, can characterize any community. Civility is the real power of community growth and salvation. The mere symbols of strength, which grace the shield of a defender or the sword of the righteous aggressor, pale in comparison. The soul, vitality and renewal of a community rest in the celebration of individual human kindness, dignity and respect. Civility is inherent in the search for an answer to the question we hear far too often lately: why does it take a tragedy of this magnitude to bring us together?

The judges, lawyers and law students of the Inns of Court are uniquely qualified to encourage and reward the contribution civility makes to our lives. In each Inn a committee of three judges, one senior and one younger lawyer and a law student could review the essays submitted by high school students. The committee would be presided over by one of the judges in matters of fair administration and resolution of tie votes. Each Inn should confirm the membership of this award committee on an annual basis. Each Inn would be responsible for receiving, reviewing and funding the prize money for the winning entry. The essay best describing the ways civility improves our community would be selected for a cash prize of \$500 with the Inn inviting the winner, parents or guardians and a teacher to a presentation dinner.

If the Internet supported the process for submission and grading, then better use of the committee's time would be possible. Submissions could be electronically distributed and graded by e-mail. A web site could be accessed by password to make the process simpler to manage.

A second Internet implication is the creation of a college of civility essayists drawn from the winners over time. The winner each year would receive an invitation for life, renewed on an annual basis by the Inn, to be included in the reviewing and grading function. E-mail could keep the committee and its invited graders connected. This aspect of recognition for a winning essay is intended to confirm and empower high school students. It implies that those who have accepted responsible roles in community life recognize that their significance changes over time, that the high school student today is the hope for a civil community tomorrow. The prize and award are really an initiation into community life; not a dinner, a check and a plaque. Young people need acceptance and appreciation of and for their views, courage of expression and support.

A third implication would be a national **civility in our community** essay contest administered by the national organization. A grading and award committee would accept submissions every four years only from those who had been selected as winners by an individual Inn. Perhaps this contest could be timed to anticipate the Presidential campaigns. The essays might contribute to the quality of campaign issues.

A fourth implication from the Internet support would be the collection of not only winning essays from the individual Inns, but honorable mentions, as well as the winner of the presidential campaign year from the **College of Essayists**. An electronic compilation of these writings, the names of the writers and those they mention as parents, guardians and teachers, along with award ceremony photographs at the Inn or national level could be placed in a web site. Over time this archive would encourage other high school students to submit their views, provide guidance to the various review and grading committees and develop a super-yearbook.

By recognizing the value of their expressions and confirming their importance in community life, the concept of civility enhances respect for people and law. The invitation to participate in community life, for life, is intended to reward their insight and courage to speak in a special way. In another sense, this is an acknowledgement that time will move us all along anyway. Greater emphasis on civility in this sense will guide the development of community values in a positive way.

Marketing of the contest might be accomplished through relationships with the newspapers connected on-line with high school journalism programs and web sites for home schooling associations. Bookstores might provide a place to present the winners and contribute donated texts with acknowledgements of the winner. Telephone book "community pages" might annually carry a line or two from the most recent winner with a reference to the Inns of Court contest. An active area of marketing for telephone book companies has become the sale and support of Internet and electronic commerce relationships drawn from telephone listings, especially from practicing lawyers. Over time the essays might be accumulated on a CD-ROM for sale by the national organization to educators. Arrangements with regard to intellectual property interests should be resolved through ordinary legal measures protecting the interests of the authors. Decisions would have to be made by both the local and national organizations involved about permitting private contributors to add to either prize money or contributed resources to support the administration of the contest. If particular interests sought participation in the contest, then the national and local organizations might consider encouraging their own contests. If requested to do so, experience with the administration, funding and Internet support processes should be shared with other groups to enhance the positive effects of the Inns of Court **Civility in our Community** contest. Electronic media might cover the contest and award with radio interviews adding more opportunity for the views of the student winners as well as writings of the **College of Essayists**. With a minimum of effort, certificates can be developed commemorating the winning student as well as honorable mentions. Perhaps the greatest impact of all might be the recognition of community leaders who take time from pressing demands to listen to, appreciate and encourage the young people who, quicker than we know, will be looking after us. What kind of community can reinvent itself fruitfully if its future leaders take heartfelt concerns about violence in school to national political leaders only to be seated on the steps of the capitol, told they are wrong and then assured their voices mattered? Will they imitate that behavior when their children come to them with dreams of the community they want to build? A life-long commitment to belief in the value of **civility in our community** is one way to encourage growth and renewal, vitality to deal with the stresses time places on values and the vision to reinvent our society.

A final thought about the topic itself is necessary. Since the term civility has recently been borrowed as a partisan political tool, some education will be required to emphasize its greater value. This can be accomplished in the notice announcing the contest. Differences of opinion, the intensity of argument and the simple truth that democracy creates and protects diversity will provide the sizzle.

X On behalf of the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission and the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, we are compelled to write to you and Vice President Gore to respectfully request your attention to the budget needs of the National Fish Hatchery (NFH) system of the U.S. Department of Interior's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS). These letters will also be followed up with telephone contacts from some of your friends in our two states who will seek to underscore the significance of this issue.

This issue is of immense importance to our home states, the southeast, and the nation. For example, it is estimated that the 37.5 million fish produced by **Federal hatcheries in 1994 generated an overall economic benefit of \$1.7 billion to the national economy** in association with the 18.75 million days of fishing opportunity and \$879 million in direct expenditures by anglers. The total NFH operations budget in 1994 was \$30.9 million.

Closer to home, the fisheries and aquatic resources of the southeast are associated with more than \$31 billion in economic output. The National Fish Hatchery operations budget for this Region in FY 1999 was only \$6.3 million, with five of the 15 hatcheries in this Region located in Arkansas and Tennessee.

In Arkansas, ***Norfork and Greers Ferry NFH with a total annual operational cost of \$900 thousand in FY1999 produced 2.9 million trout, generating more than 773 thousand angler trips/year and \$50 million in angler expenditures to the state's economy.***

In Tennessee, Dale Hollow NFH supplies about 1.3 million trout creating fisheries in tailwaters and reservoirs for some 115 thousand trout anglers. Tailwater trout fisheries create about 632 thousand trips/year generating about \$30.5 million in angler expenditures. Erwin NFH in east Tennessee is one of several of the nation's brood fish facilities. These hatcheries play an important role in trout management throughout the nation by preserving unique strains of trout and annually providing eggs to hatcheries.

Understand that these hatcheries are not merely producing fish for put-and-take angling. There are at least 144 dams and reservoirs on streams and rivers of the southeast, most federal projects undertaken for flood control and hydropower generation. ***These federal dams have dramatically altered habitat and water flows, disrupted fish migration, and impacted water quality.***

In Tennessee, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Tennessee Valley Authority dams have altered about 1,500 miles of riverine habitat. The federal dams on Arkansas' White River have turned many miles of what was once a world-class smallmouth bass and warmwater fishery into a coldwater system incapable of supporting the native fish species. Trout, a coldwater species, which have been produced in NFHs and stocked in these waters have been partially mitigating the impacts of federal dam construction on these rivers by restoring some components of an ecosystem that would otherwise be devoid of most of its aquatic species. ***Thus, these mitigation fisheries and the production required to maintain them should be viewed as federal obligations.***

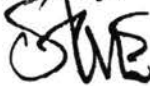
However, budget support has steadily been eroding from levels that were never truly adequate to maintain this federal mitigation obligation. In the Southeast Region of the FWS, hatcheries' operational budgets have only increased 3.3% in the last five years, a level inadequate to offset inflation. To make matters worse, the 15 NFHs in this region today have only been able to maintain current production levels as a result of the ***closure of 5 NFHs in 1996.*** In addition, in 1985 the FWS's ***second*** priority for its fishery program was ***"mitigation of fishery resource impairment due to federal water development projects"***; in 1994, a redefinition of priorities resulted in

"fulfilling mitigation obligations" being only the **sixth** priority.

We respectfully encourage you to provide the funding necessary for the National Fish Hatchery system to fulfill these federal mitigation obligations, as well as address their other priorities, by increasing the Fish and Wildlife Service's NFH operations budget by \$10 million over current levels in the Administration's FY2001 budget. The Department of Interior will very soon be sending the FWS FY2001 budget proposal to the Office of Management and Budget. We encourage you to work with OMB to insure that this funding need is addressed in the FY2001 budget, and sincerely thank you for your consideration of the needs of this issue, so important to our home states of Arkansas and Tennessee.

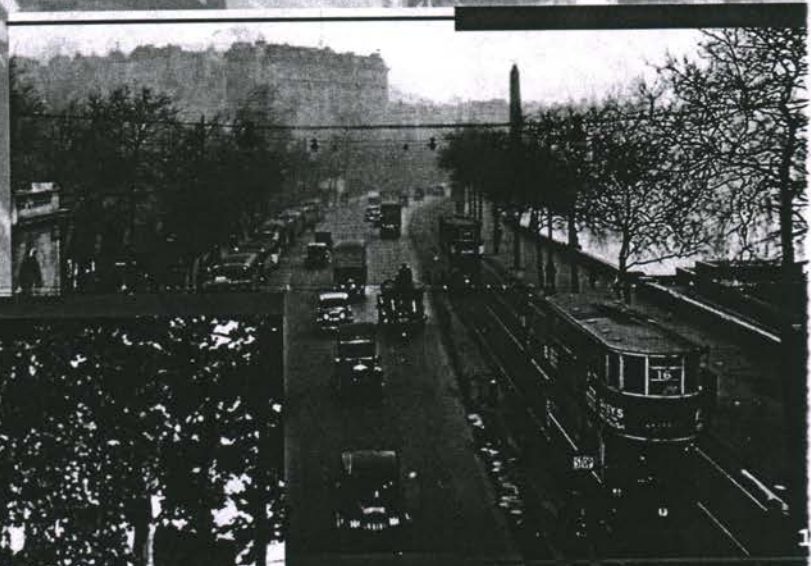

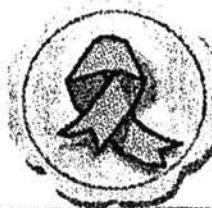
