Lavish Album Reveals **Clinton** Era's White House Makeover

Any roster of American design icons would include Charles Eames and Maya Lin. But Hillary Rodham **Clinton**? This was the unexpected, but not-to-be- ignored implication of a holiday publicity campaign by Simon & Schuster. In full-page newspaper ads, the publisher gave equal play to three new books on style. There is the architect Lin's "Boundaries," and a survey of such 20th- century stars as Eames called "Classic Modern."

A third image shows **Clinton** smiling forth from the cover of "**An Invitation to the White House.**" All this time, this book suggests, the woman who would be senator was also decorator in chief.

Over eight years as first lady, **Clinton** presided over a major period of renovation involving every room but two on the state floor of the White House. The ornate Blue Room was redone in sapphire with French accents. The ceremonial East Room's red marble was revealed under old faux-painting, and new carpets were woven in patterns reflecting plasterwork overhead that is reminiscent of the work of the 18th-century Scottish architect Robert Adam. The State Dining Room's matte gold sconces got their shine back, while gilding was lifted from mahogany furniture, and new drapes and carpet were created in a cheery Colonial Revival floral of yellow, teal and coral.

Television audiences have seen the Entrance and Cross halls re-draped and reupholstered in crimson silk. Along with the Grand Staircase, all have been carpeted in a made-for-the-cameras runner of bold tomato red bordered with gold fronds, by the **Clintons'** Arkansas interior designer, Kaki Hockersmith.

Clinton, like her predecessors, held the title of honorary chairman of the Committee for the Preservation of the White House and worked with a team of experts and appointees such as Hockersmith. But the first lady appears to have plunged in.

"I read about past renovations and knew that I would have to make some difficult choices to preserve the unique history and character of the house," **Clinton** writes. "I wanted to be actively involved on all fronts, working with experts to choose and implement the appropriate designs, styles, fixtures, and colors and in raising funds to make it possible."

The 324-page book opens with a photo of the first lady and her troops choosing among early 19th-century-style motifs for the Blue Room.

"When we first moved in," she writes in the opening chapter, "the once vibrant blue draperies and upholstery had faded to a pale aqua. We knew we had to pick a perfect tone of blue."

Over the next two years, **Clinton** shifted the hue to something more electric. She also personally fine-tuned an elaborate trompe l'oeil border.

"I suggested taking a small sample of the wallpaper and cutting a moon-shaped sliver out of it," she explains. "It worked. We did the same thing around the entire border, which provided the finishing touch."

The **Clinton** book is the most prominent of several published for the 200th anniversary of the 132-room White House. Most authoritative on antiques is "The White House: Its Historic Furnishings and First Families," by Betty Monkman, the White House curator. More complete on the era of Jacqueline Kennedy, who set up the curator's office in 1961, and created national interest in - and respect for - White House decor, is "Real Life at the White House," by John and Clair Whitcomb.

Clinton's book was completed but not released before Election Day, and it leaves gaps that only an \$8-million memoir may fill in. This photograph album focuses on a first lady who deals in fabric swatches and floral arrangements and dances at parties. She gives out recipes at the end.

"Hillary Does Martha," remarked a Simon & Schuster staffer at a White House book party in December, where 300-plus guests, museum directors, decorative arts fans and contributors were offered the run of three floors of the house, including the Lincoln Bedroom. - THE comparison with Martha Stewart, America's do-it-all diva of domesticity, was worth making. **Clinton** appears to have handled health care policy, goodwill trips abroad, her husband's impeachment scandal and a successful election campaign for New York's Senate seat while managing to entertain world leaders and Girl Scouts and shore up America's most historic house.

"Somehow, she found the time," as the president put it at the book party.

Of course, the White House has been a stage for statecraft since Abigail Adams moved in 200 years ago. Mrs. **Clinton** made her mark by modernizing and diversifying. She added the first African-American painter, Henry Ossawa Tanner, to the White House collection. She put a Georgia O'Keeffe painting in the antiques-filled Green Room. And she broke a barrier against living artists by installing contemporary sculpture exhibitions in the Jacqueline Kennedy Garden. A photographic essay, "20th-Century American Sculpture in the White House Garden," was the fourth celebratory book published this autumn.

In her first year at the White House, **Clinton** raised eyebrows by eliminating smoking (to protect the antiques) and for commissioning a collection of American crafts: handmade objects like whimsical teapots, even a stuffed lion, made of metal, glass, wood, ceramic and fiber. They were displayed briefly on the antique pier tables of the state rooms. This Christmas, she brought them back for a holiday reprise before being sent on to the presidential archives in Arkansas.

Decorative historians will debate whether the Blue Room is too blue, the red carpets overripe, and the demands of television lighting ruinous to fine decor. **Clinton** herself points out that what is important about the White House is "not so much colors and what's on the walls, but ideas."

As she noted at the book party, "what democracy means is here in this venerable house."

That being said, her design legacy ultimately may derive from a classic political strength: fund-raising. During her tenure, the White House Endowment Fund was increased from \$8 million to more than \$25 million. She projects that the interest alone should be enough to sustain renovations to come. And, the first lady has assigned all her proceeds from the \$35 book to the White House Historical Association.

History will judge whether that is sufficient to be remembered as an icon of American design. But it can't hurt. Linda Hales is The Washington Post's design critic.

Sen. Clinton Can Be Beacon for Women Pols

HILLARY CLINTON may be New York's new U.S. senator, but she is the nation's senator when it comes to women and political leadership. The most visible, controversial and activist first lady since Eleanor Roosevelt, Sen. Clinton is now the nation's premier female political icon and, according to recent polls, the world's most admired woman. With that kind of star power, she can transform the nation's political landscape by focusing on one bold goal: electing women to public office.

The sad fact is that at the beginning of 2001, eight years after the political "Year of the Woman," women hold only 13.5 percent of the seats in Congress. There are only five women governors out of 50. And fewer women ran for state-level offices in 2000 than at any time in the last 30 years.

What can Clinton do to boost these dismal numbers and bring more women to elected office? She can start by using her bully pulpit, the one that's following her everywhere. Part of empowering women to run is convincing them they can do it. In past years, New York's Rep. Shirley Chisholm won against the odds and challenged other women to do the same. Today, Clinton can be the poster woman for that message.

Women who are afraid to dip their toes in the political waters need to bathe in the first lady's chutzpah. She never held elected office. She ran in a state where she'd never lived, and lots of people didn't like her. She went into hostile territory, upstate New York, and talked with ordinary folks. Turns out they liked her-even helped her win.

Clinton's fame gives her the forum to remind women that nose-to-the-grindstone political doggedness, the kind she brought to her campaign, can trump vituperative, rock-hard opposition. Clinton can tap into the untapped

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reservoir of women's political talent because she represents every woman who has done the very thing she was supposed to be utterly unable to do.

Lack of money is another big factor that holds women back from elected office. Clinton can have a big impact for female candidates' bank accounts. She proved her fund-raising firepower with a \$26.3-million campaign. Her friends in the labor movement, in Hollywood and on Wall Street eagerly open their deep pockets for her.

Given her capacity for raising money for herself, Clinton can afford to spend a few years raising money for other women-and not just federal candidates. Women who serve in state legislatures belong to a critical farm team, ready to move into statewide offices, as well as Congress. And women at the entry level can't be forgotten. Ruth Ann Minner, Delaware's newly elected governor, started as a receptionist in the statehouse. Even a little money and attention can go a long way toward giving women a start in political life.

Getting a start would be a lot easier for women if the electoral system were changed. Clinton has taken on electoral reform, specifically the Electoral College, as a priority. She should call for changes that allow proportional representation.

Most western democracies have proved that multi-seat districts-where votes are split on a basis proportional to the party selected-result in many more women and minorities winning office. Proportional representation doesn't require a constitutional change, and Lani Guinier, a proponent of voting-system changes and an old friend of the Clintons, is still around for consultation.

Finally, Clinton has the potential to remove the most visible symbol of women's continuing second-class citizenship in political life.

She never voluntarily talks about it, and friends and staff only whisper it. But no one can doubt that this Clinton has taken the first step on the path to the presidency.

If she shines as a leader in her own right, if she begins relating to Americans from her new perch the way she did to New Yorkers on her "listening tour" early in the campaign, if she has strength, dignity and principles, not the power-hunger some suggest, Sen. Clinton could become the first woman president of the United States.

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Ross, Hillary Clinton take oath as freshmen

107th Congress convenes; common ground is theme

WASHINGTON — The first day of the 107th Congress was replete with talk of working together as Rep. Mike Ross officially joined the ranks of Arkansas' congressional delegation and Hillary Rodham Clinton became the first presidential spouse to enter Congress.

Ross took the oath of office Wednesday with his 12-year-old daughter, Sydney Beth, and his 8-year-old son, Alex, by his side. Moments earlier, he had listened to House Speaker Dennis Hastert and Minority Leader Dick Gephardt speak of how they hope

the two political parties will work together this session.

"It really feels good to be here, and being in that chamber today reminded me of what the job is all about — it's about serving all people," Ross said.

On the other side of the Capitol, Mrs. Clinton was sworn in as New York's junior senator, then received kisses from Vice President Gore and Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., the Senate's 98-year-old senior member. Watching from the visitors' gallery were President Clinton, daughter Chelsea Clinton and mother Dorothy Rodham.

The president's reaction? "Ecstatic," he said afterward.

Hastert was elected to a second term as speaker 221-206. Only one lawmaker crossed ranks — Rep. James Traficant, D-Ohio. His vote was met with a rousing cheer by Republicans. Democrats mockingly cheered, too. Democratic leaders thereupon planned to expel him from their caucus. Traficant, by the way, campaigned in Arkansas for Ross' opponent in the Nov. 7 election — former Rep. Jay Dickey, a Republican.

The leaders of both chambers talked mostly Wednesday on the concept of finding common ground.

"Many have commented about the deep wounds caused by the latest political competition," Hastert told the representatives. "But it serves no purpose to dwell on the past. After all, our country is at peace, our economy is still fundamentally strong, our people are united with a strength of purpose and by a desire to live the American dream. It's only in Washington where many still have a lingering animosity of the political parties. My friends, we need to get over it."

Gephardt pledged "to meet you halfway, and in return, we hope that great things in these two years can be accomplished for the American people that we serve."

Hastert told his colleagues that President-elect Bush's education program will be the first order of business for the new congress, but he also listed several other priorities. He said changes are needed for Social Security and Medicare to ensure their continuance. He said Congress needs to focus on improving national security. Finally, he said the House will work on what he called "fiscal responsibility," with an emphasis on tax cuts and paying down the debt. When he talked about repealing the estate tax, he got his most rousing applause from

their needs. I hope they'll do the same."

The House ceremony was far more informal than in the Senate. Children 12 and younger were allowed on the House floor. Babies drank from bottles and toddlers from tippy cups as Gephardt and then Hastert spoke. A couple of congressmen had to take the very young into the hallway so as not to drown out the speaker.

There were moments of levity during the two-hour session. Rep. Neil Abercrombie, D-Hawaii, cast the first vote in the speaker's race. "I cast my vote for Mr. Gephardt and demand a recount."

And in the Senate, the vice president gladly pointed out that his party is in the majority — at least for the next 17 days. That's when Dick Cheney will be sworn in as vice-president and can cast a tie-breaking vote. Gore recognized Daschle as "the majority leader" and Sen. Trent Lott of Mississippi as "the minority leader" — prompting loud applause from both sides.

Ross went right to work after taking the oath of office. He said he talked to officials at the Federal Emergency Management Agency for more than an hour about what more could be done to help Arkansans recover from the ice storm. Ross hopes to see more counties declared disaster areas and said he will assess all of the counties in his district to get an extensive list of damages.

He then attended a reception sponsored by Alltel Corp. and Entergy Corp.

Ross had gotten to his office at about 9 a.m. and waited about 30 minutes for a key. All House members getting a new office had to get in line, so several congressmen and their staffs could be seen waiting for their keys to arrive.

Once inside his office on the fifth floor of the Cannon Building, one of three House office buildings, Ross received a steady stream of calls. Some were from constituents who need relief from the effects of the ice storm.

Republican lawmakers. Democrats, at first, did not applaud at all. Eventually, a few did stand and cheer.

Later in the day, Democratic leaders talked about a willingness to cut taxes by a larger margin than they had previously discussed — about \$500 billion to \$600 billion over 10 years. Bush has proposed a \$1.3 trillion tax cut over 10 years.

"It's not where you start but where you end that matters," said Sen. Tom Daschle, D-S.D. "We're prepared to end up in a way that accommodates their concerns and

Ross said he had received resumes from more than 1,200 people seeking jobs. His full-time staff will number about 15.

He can't see the Capitol from his office window, only other office windows. And even that view is partially blocked by a lime-green retaining wall.

"They give them out by seniority," Ross said. "There are 14 that have a worse office, but I'm pleased with it."

Preshrunk politics

From rapid response to pre-response

REMEMBER the way Bill Clinton dazzled the press, and infuriated opponents, with selective leaks? Even leaks damaging to his own administration? That way, he could scoop the opposition, and turn even breaking scandal into "old news." But the originator of the 24-hour War Room knew what he was doing. Even bad news can be good news if selectively released. President-elect W. must have been watching down in Texas. And learning. The result? A whole mock epic of spin over the economy during the final days of the presidential transition.

Call it post-modern spin. It transcends original spin. It even rises above Bill Clinton's pre-emptive spin. It is pre-pre-emptive, a war of rhetorical first strikes. It pits president versus president-elect, Slick v. Slicker.

Here's how it works: Offering a rationale for the tax cut plan he's been pushing all along, the Elect points out that the once-vaunted economy is beginning to falter. A hefty tax cut would be just the fix to get the economy pumping again.

And with this subtle sleight of forecasting, W. can (a) fulfill his campaign pledge to cut taxes, and (b) blame any economic slump on his predecessor. We need a tax cut to deal with this forthcoming recession that hasn't yet forthcomend but which has been inherited from the Clinton administration.

Pre-empt that!

Slick as ever, and now with a used legacy to sell, Bill Clinton rose (or stooped) to the highly political occasion. As you knew he would. The economy is in good shape, he countered, doubtless hoping you haven't got your profit-sharing report yet, or don't know what the NASDAQ has been doing since April. Furthermore, if Dubya keeps talking about a recession, then it'll surely happen. It's the power of negative thinking.

If all this sounds familiar, it should. It's a technique pioneered by Slick

Willie himself. Remember how he entered office after claiming that the country was in the throes of the worst economic conditions since the Great Depression? He depicted the Bush dip in the Reagan Recovery as a catastrophe, so there'd be no way to go but up once he took office. Slick.

Now the still-Alpha Male has moved in for the pre-pre-emptive strike. Not only is the economy in good shape, but it's so darn good that the accumulating surpluses—\$1.9 trillion and counting, and we've got the charts to prove it!—could erase all of

the publicly held debt by the end of the decade. That is, if the next *Republican* administration doesn't screw it all up with a tax cut.

Tax-cut that!

The only problem with the president's counter-forecasting

is fuzzy math, as we say in Bushspeak. The guesstimated Clinton surplus of \$1.9 trillion is based on the assumption that Congress will never cut taxes or increase spending. And we all know how realistic that forecast is—like mild, sunny days forever.

The Republicans just spent the last several months campaigning for tax cuts while the Democrats spent the last months campaigning for new government programs. But to hear him prognosticate, Bill Clinton must've spent those months in a bubble, or maybe obsessed with defeating Jay Dickey. Because his budgetary projection comes from a world uninhabited by tax-cutters or spenders, Republicans or Democrats, or anything real.

It's quite a show, in a post-modern way: Dubya's battling a recession that hasn't quite materialized, and Bill's trumpeting a surplus that doesn't quite exist. We're not sure how this ever-escalating cycle of spin, pre-spin and hyper-spin will end, if it ever does. Meanwhile, the heedless economy just keeps plummeting. Or booming. Or both. Take your pick.

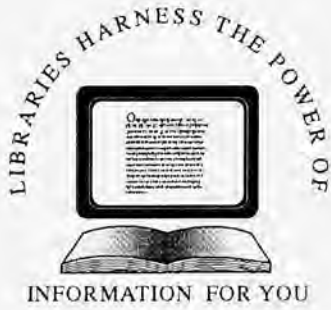
