

Point man for disasters in dark, too

FEMA chief's power is dead in Dardanelle

You know it's a disaster when the head of the Federal Emergency Management Agency can't escape the damage.

FEMA Director James Lee Witt has been without electricity or water at his farm near Dardanelle since Tuesday afternoon.

Witt's been forced to stockpile bottled water, use runoff water to flush the commode and head to nearby truck stops to take a shower.

And with his tenure at FEMA coming to an end, Witt joked that he couldn't get any relief.

"I tried to get Washington to send me a generator, but apparently I don't have enough pull," Witt said Thursday.

But thanks to another native son, Arkansas will get federal disaster funds to help pay for repairs.

President Clinton signed the disaster declaration for the state Thursday afternoon after Witt, Gov. Mike Huckabee and state emergency officials discussed using federal funds to help with repairs from the Christmas Day ice storm.

Like most rural residents, Witt relies on an electric pump to bring water from his well.

So when the power went off, so did the running water.

Witt said he's been heating and cooking with his fireplace.

When he wasn't trying to get by, he was out with his son, Yell County Judge Jimmy Witt, touring the county.

Witt said the damage amazed him. "It looks like a tornado went through there," he said.

Witt's just one customer in Yell County in the dark, and he's waiting his turn for Ozark Electric to repair his line.

"They said they're doing the best they can," he said. "I said, 'We're ready whenever you are.'"

Clintons sign on line to buy house in D.C.

WASHINGTON — President Clinton and his wife, Sen.-elect Hillary Rodham Clinton, signed a contract Friday to buy a five-bedroom, brick Colonial house near the Embassy Row area for \$2.85 million.

The Clintons will finance \$1.995 million of the purchase through Citibank, a White House spokesman said.

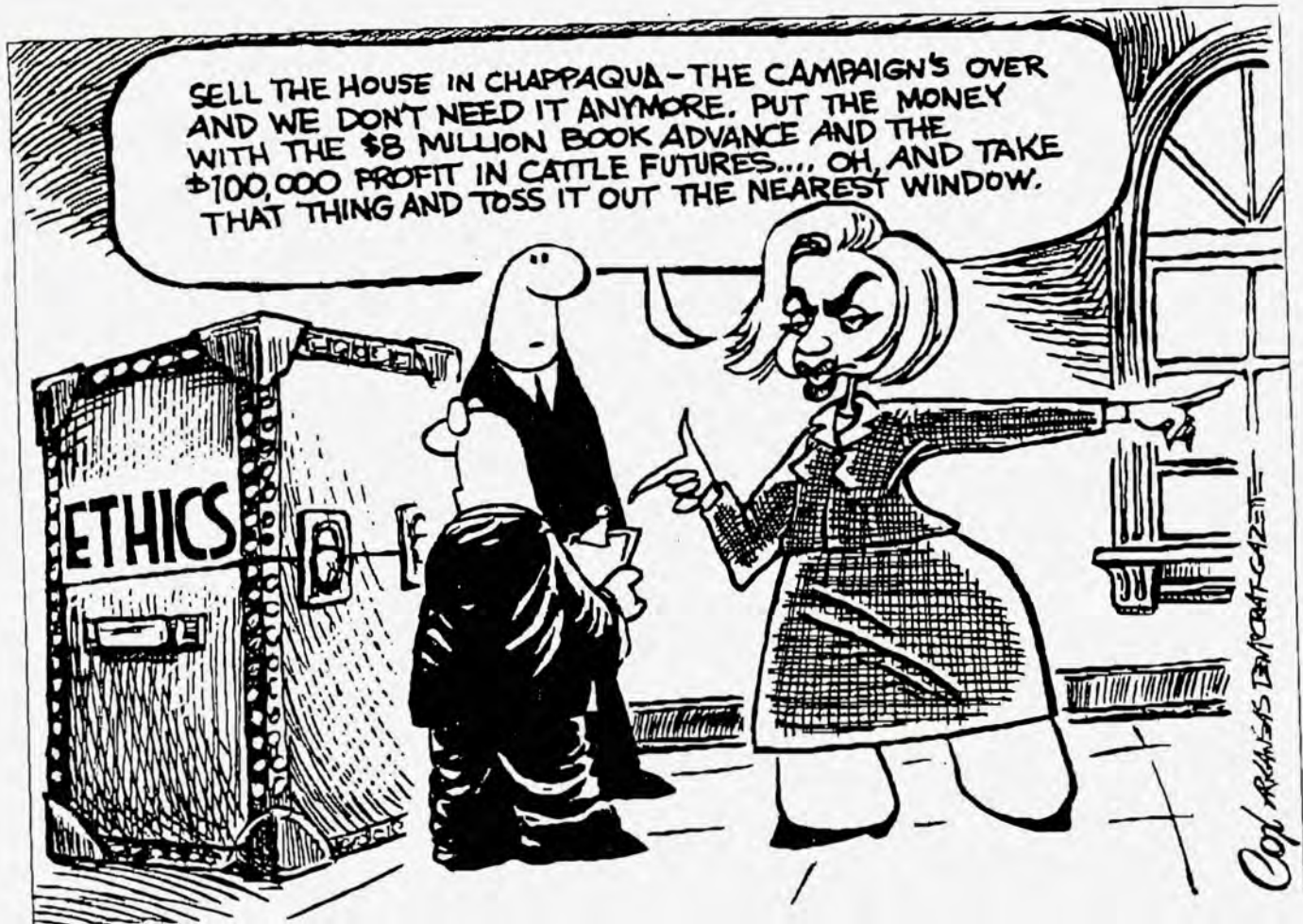
The Clintons already own a home in Westchester County, N.Y., and the spokesman said that home would remain their primary residence.

The Washington home sits on a one-third-acre lot at the end of a secluded cul-de-sac near the vice president's official residence on the grounds of the Naval Observatory.

The 5,500-square-foot home has 7½ baths, a fireplace, a pool and garage, according to a real estate listing. It includes a study and an office and was built in 1951.

It had been listed at \$3.5 million. It was assessed at \$1.1 million in 2000, and property tax bills were \$10,671, records show.

The home's owner was listed as Joseph W. Henderson, a registered Republican. He could not be reached for comment.

Clinton the new kid on stately D.C. block

WASHINGTON — President Clinton will become the first president since Woodrow Wilson in 1921 to live in Washington after the end of his term.

Clinton and his senator-elect wife, Hillary Rodham Clinton, announced Friday that they have agreed to pay \$2.85 million for a six-bedroom brick Georgian off Embassy Row, on a secluded and stately block that is home to diplomats, the wealthy and the well-connected. The house is at 3067 Whitehaven St. NW.

The Clintons, whose purchase was announced Friday by the White House, will make a 30 percent down payment and take out a \$1.995 million loan from Citibank. According to Citibank official Sally Cates, the loan carries "typical terms and conditions for a high-end residential mortgage," and the Clintons are the only parties to it. She would not supply further details.

As word spread about the deal, the calm street filled with reporters, gawkers, slow-moving drivers and joggers curious to look at what the Clintons are buying.

The 5,500-square-foot house sits at the end of a quiet, dead-end street near the U.S. Naval Observatory that is home to the vice

president.

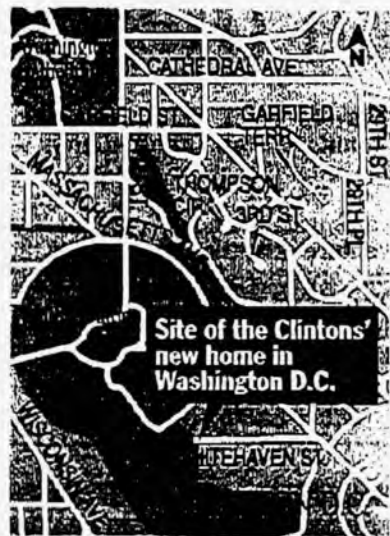
It's a reserved neighborhood, the kind of place where "No Trespassing" signs outnumber welcome mats and maids answer the doorbells in the afternoon.

The Clintons' home sits on a third of an acre. It is across the street from the Royal Danish Embassy and down the street from the Italian Embassy.

A few doors down is the office of the Brazilian Embassy's Consular Service. The embassies of Great Britain and New Zealand are close by.

Clinton friend Vernon Jordan lives two blocks away. The Clintons' neighbors on the block will include businessman and Republican fund-raiser Wayne Berman; former Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady, also a Republican; Gladys Preston, widow of World Bank President Lewis Preston; and Leo A. Daly, executive architect of the imposing new avant-garde Italian Embassy at the foot of Whitehaven.

"We will certainly welcome the Clintons to the neighborhood," Berman said. "It's fun and fascinating and interesting, and it's going to improve security on the street, not that that's an issue. I now feel my two teen-age daughters will be completely safe, with

all the Secret Service that attends a former president."

The house is red brick with white trim and has a red door decorated with a holiday wreath. The house opens in the rear onto a slate patio overlooking a landscaped formal garden and a heated pool.

The Clintons bought the home — listed for \$3.5 million — from Joseph Welles Henderson III and his wife, Lucia, who have lived there for 20 years. They are registered Republicans. Henderson is general partner of Alder Branch Realty, a family investment group that owns Northern Virginia real estate.

The Clintons also own a home in Westchester County, N.Y., bought before Mrs. Clinton began her successful bid for the New York Senate seat.

The finalists, a tough field to winnow down, represent a widespread consensus of more than a dozen of the state's most prominent political experts, including elected officials, lobbyists, consultants, and journalists.

BIGGEST WINNERS

■ First Lady and soon-to-be U.S. Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton, who, despite being a carpet-bagger married to an impeached president, rolled over her hapless GOP challenger, U.S. Rep. Rick Lazio.

The sky's the limit for Hillary now.

■ Senate Majority Leader Joseph Bruno (R-Rensselaer), who, despite landslide wins by Mrs. Clinton and Democratic presidential contender Al Gore — and notwithstanding an anti-Republican revolt in the once-solid GOP-bastion of Nassau County — was able to hang on to every contested Senate seat.

■ Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver (D-Manhattan), who survived an unprecedented attempted coup from now-ousted Majority Leader Michael Bragman of Syracuse, and then went

on to expand the Democrats' already huge Assembly majority.

■ State Democratic Chairwoman Judith Hope, who has presided over a string of statewide Democratic successes and was the first person to encourage Clinton to enter the Senate race.

■ Zenia Mucha, Gov. Pataki's controversial chief political operative, who parlayed a long career as an often mendacious and media-hostile media adviser into a job as a senior vice president

■ Gov. Pataki, who, despite two trips to Florida to help Bush's presidential effort, couldn't wipe out the enormous personal setback he suffered because of Lazio's defeat at the polls.

Pataki, an early backer of Lazio's candidacy, is now the last Republican elected official of stature on the statewide scene, and he'll be the last one left in New York after Mayor Giuliani's forced retirement next year.

Pataki was also badly damaged by his heavy-handed efforts to keep Arizona Sen. John McCain out of the GOP primary

last March, looked ridiculous when he ridiculed writer E.B. White, and has had increasingly strained relations with the GOP's grass roots.

■ U.S. Sen. Charles Schumer, who is destined to be overshadowed by Mrs. Clinton and whose repeated praise of Pataki has caused widespread unhappiness in Democratic circles.

■ State Comptroller Carl McCall, who damaged his reputation with many New York Democrats by — according to several Democratic sources — first promising to back Bragman's coup against Silver and then backing Silver instead.

McCall is also taking considerable heat in Democratic circles for appearing in public-service-type television ads with Pataki, despite his oft-stated interest in running against Pataki in 2002.

■ State GOP Chairman William Powers, who had another bad year after a long string of electoral successes.

■ Former Assembly Majority Leader Michael Bragman, who led the failed effort to oust Speaker Silver.

■ Lt. Gov. Mary Donohue. Who?

■ Senate Minority Leader Martin Connor of Brooklyn, who, despite landslide New York wins by Al Gore and Hillary Clinton and an anti-Republican revolt in Nassau County, couldn't win a single new seat in the still solidly GOP-controlled upper house of the Legislature.

Clinton, wife Hillary and daughter Chelsea spent the day in Washington, while George W. Bush readied for his cross-country move next month.

After a couple of days at his dusty 1,600-acre ranch near Waco, Bush spent yesterday in Austin, packing his personal papers into cardboard boxes.

Later, he joined his wife and twin daughters at a 5:30 p.m. Christmas Eve service at Tarrytown United Methodist Church.

To celebrate Christmas, Bush will fly to Houston and meet up with his mom and dad,

former President and First Lady George and Barbara Bush, who will accompany him to Florida, where a mini-family reunion is planned.

Florida Gov. Jeb Bush will play host at the Gasparilla Inn, a swank golf resort in Boca Grande.

On Thursday, Bush is expected to visit Washington again for another push toward rounding out his Cabi-

net, a task that's about half-completed.

Although President Clinton loves traveling, aides say he wants to get the most out of the White House before he leaves on Jan. 20, when Bush is sworn in.

"He and Mrs. Clinton and Chelsea want to spend some time here at the White House while they still live here," spokesman Jake Siewert said last week.

8 **Pols dominate spin-doctoring list**

THE Democrats nabbed many of the top dubious honors in PR Week magazine's annual "Best and Worst" review of the year 2000's newsmakers. Bear in mind that "best" often means "most ingeniously calculated," or what the public relations trade mag calls "staged" political moves.

In the "Best Publicity Stunt" category, **Joe Lieberman's** nomination ranked No. 4, while **Bill Clinton's** visit to Vietnam hit No. 7 (with a bullet).

The **"Elian Gonzales Raid"** ranked as PR Week's No. 1 "Worst Publicity Stunt," with **"[Al] Gore kissing Tipper"** coming in at No. 2 and **James Carville** for Playboy.com's rum campaign taking the No. 9 spot.

The left-leaning New York Times earned the No. 10 spot for "Worst Job by Company/Group in Overcoming Difficult Situation" for its **Wen Ho Lee** coverage and retraction,

with Bridgestone/Firestone taking the top honors and United Airlines, Priceline.com, Sotheby's and Verizon trailing.

And in the presidential battle, **George W. Bush** again bested Al Gore — this time for "Best Campaign PR job," earning the No. 1 ranking. According to one media strategy firm, "Gore failed to hammer home his best issue — the economy — while enabling the Bush team to label him as a far-left liberal with lying tendencies."

Not that conservatives didn't take their share of hits. For "Best Publicity Stunt," **Sen. John McCain's** Straight Talk Express came in at No. 8. And Senate candidate **Rick Lazio's** "challenging **Hillary Clinton** during their TV debate" rated No. 4 on the "Worst Publicity Stunt" list.

In TV, **"Who Wants to be a Millionaire?"** won the No. 1 "Best Publicity Stunt," with

the addition of **Dennis Miller** to the "Monday Night Football" line-up as runner-up.

In Hollywood, **Leonardo DiCaprio** interviewing **Bill Clinton** rated No. 3 in the "Worst Publicity Stunt" category. The "Worst Individual Publicity" honors included **Eminem** at No. 1, with **Puff Daddy**, **Diana Ross**, **Naomi Campbell** and **Cindy Crawford** helping round out the top 10.

Regis Philbin was the winner of "Best Individual Publicity," with **Katie Couric** (No. 3), **Jennifer Lopez** (No. 6), "Sex and the City" creator **Candace Bushnell** (No. 9) and **Madonna** hubby **Guy Ritchie** (No. 10) all making the cut.

For "Best Product Publicity," "Harry Potter books" nabbed the No. 1 spot. Also making the top 10 were "Heinz Green ketchup," the Chrysler PT Cruiser, Napster, and the Razor Scooter.

Jesse can learn a thing or two from Moynihan

Public taking no shine to dollar coin

The new dollar coin that bears the image of Sacajawea is proving to be as elusive as the commercial route to the Northwest that explorers Meriwether Lewis and William Clark were seeking two centuries ago when she accompanied them on a trek across the continent.

The coin made its debut nearly a year ago and by now it was sup-

posed to be jingling in people's pockets. But it seems the only sighting many Americans have had is in newspaper and TV ads.

Greg Rohde, an assistant secretary of commerce, said he first glimpsed it in Istanbul. Other than the 15 golden-colored dollar coins he got as change from a street vendor, Mr. Rohde hasn't seen it in use.

"I used a couple of them in the cafeteria here, but it always takes an explanation of what they are," he said.

The U.S. Mint said its research shows that 90 percent of Americans are aware of the Sacajawea coin in part due to a \$40 million advertising blitz in which a hip

George Washington urges people to use them. But that doesn't mean they've ever held one.

Approximately 1.2 billion coins have been made. The mint estimates that roughly 700 million are "in circulation," with the rest sitting in bank and mint vaults. But

"in circulation" means the coins have been shipped to the Federal Reserve, supplier of cash to banks, or are held by collectors. It doesn't mean they are being used as currency.

Bankers said there hasn't been much demand for the coins from retailers. And people increasingly are getting their money from ATM machines, which usually don't dispense coins.

An exception is the Arkansas

Federal Credit Union, which dispenses the coins from sophisticated ATM machines.

"Banks have a ready supply of the dollar coins for customers," said John Rasmus of the American Bankers Association. "But I don't think banks want to stockpile them unless there is a big demand for them."

The Federal Reserve estimates that about \$530 million in dollar coins — including some Susan B. Anthony coins — were shipped since last January.

"It's a chicken-and-egg problem with the dollar coin that's gone on for a year. Consumers say: 'If I get them, I'll use them.' Banks say: 'If consumers want them, they'll get them,'" said Michael White, a spokesman for the U.S. Mint.

Allfirst Financial, the first major financial institution to routinely distribute the coins, has dispensed 930,000 since August.
