Dear Senator Clinton:

I would be honored if you would consider me as a potential writer on your book project. I have attached my c.v., but in this letter I'd like to give my experience a bit more context.

Throughout my writing career I have tried to produce work that opens up new possibilities for women. I coauthored, with Felice N. Schwartz, a book about women in corporations, Breaking With Tradition: Women and Work, the New Facts of Life (Warner Books, 1992), based on the Harvard Business Review article that ignited the "mommy track" debate. My book Tailspin: Women at War in the Wake of Tailhook (Doubleday, 1995), focused on the crucial link between sexual harassment and the role of women as warriors, and was praised by The New York Times as "stimulating and provocative." Most recently, with my husband, Gil Reavill, I published Raising Our Athletic Daughters: How Sports Can Build Self-Esteem and Save Girls' Lives (Doubleday, 1998), which was a Finalist for the 1999 Books for a Better Life Award sponsored by the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. My next book, to be published in 2002 by the Free Press at Simon and Schuster, will be an exploration of homemaking from a feminist perspective.

Margaret Mead once said, "I must admit I personally measure success in terms of the contributions an individual makes to her or his fellow human beings." It's a philosophy I too embrace in my personal as well as my professional life. I have actively committed myself to causes where I've felt I can make a difference - a cleaner environment, feeding the hungry, raising strong, self-assured girls. Two years ago I founded a local environmental advocacy group, Hastings Waterfront Watch, that has seen extraordinary success in bringing together elected officials, technical experts and residents to work toward a toxin-free riverfront in our village.

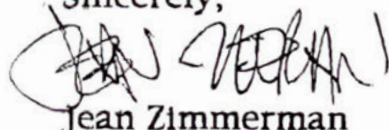
