Professor Alice Kessler-Harris

Alice Kessler-Harris is Visiting Professor at Columbia University, where she holds a joint appointment in the History Department and the Institute for Research on Women and Gender. She was born in England and educated in Cardiff, Wales, Trenton, New Jersey, and at Goucher College in Baltimore, where she earned her B.A. in 1961. She received her Ph.D. in History from Rutgers University in 1968. Currently, she is a professor of History at Rutgers University where she directed the Women's Studies program from 1990 to 1995. Previously, she taught at Sarah Lawrence College, Temple University, and Hofstra University; and has held visiting professorships at SUNY, Binghamton, and at the University of Warwick in England.

Professor Kessler-Harris is one of the foremost labor historians in the country and has played an important role in the establishment of women's studies. She is the author of several books, including: Out to Work: A History of Wage-Earning Women in the United States, A Women's Wage: Historical Meanings and Social Consequences and Women Have Always Worked: A Historical Overview. In collaboration with others, she recently edited Protecting Women: Labor Legislation in Europe, Australia and the United States 1880-1920; and U.S. History as Women's History. Her scholarly articles focus on the history of American labor, particularly that of wage-earning women. Currently, she is completing a book on how gender has shaped twentieth century U.S. social policies, such as old age and unemployment insurance, and equal employment opportunity.

An activist throughout her career, Kessler-Harris effectively combines trade union work with academic work. While at Hofstra in the 1970s, she co-founded an education program with Bertram Silverman for the members of District 65, United Auto Workers. From 1974 to 1982, she co-directed and taught in the program, which offered working people the opportunity to earn a bachelors' degree. She was also a member of the ACLU's Academic Freedom Committee throughout the 1970s and 1980s.

Kessler-Harris has won many honors, including fellowships from the Guggenheim and Rockefeller Foundations, and the National Endowment for the Humanities. She held research fellowships at the Bunting Institute, the Institute for Social Research in Oslo, and the Swedish Collegium for Advanced Studies in the Social Sciences. Professor Kessler-Harris also holds honorary degrees from Goucher College and the University of Uppsala in Sweden. She continues to lecture worldwide on the subject of women, work and immigration. Kessler-Harris is active in several professional associations, including the American Historical Association, the Organization of American Historians, and most notably, she served as President of the American Studies Association.

Professor Nancy F. Cott

Nancy F. Cott is the Stanley Woodward Professor of History and American Studies at Yale University, where she has taught since 1975. She was born and raised in Philadelphia, PA, and earned her B.A. at Cornell University. She received her Ph.D. in History of American Civilization from Brandeis University in 1974. Her books include Root of Bitterness: Documents of the Social History of American Women; The Bonds of Womanhood: 'Woman's Sphere' in New England, 1780-1835; The Grounding of Modern Feminism; and A Woman Making History: Mary Ritter Beard through Her Letters. She has also published many articles and has edited the twenty-volume History of Women in the United States and the eleven-volume Young Oxford History of Women in the U.S., intended for middle-school and high-school readers.

Professor Cott's writing and teaching concentrates on women, feminism, family and gender issues through U.S. history. She was the first person to teach a course on U.S. women's history at Wheaton College, Clark University, and Wellesley College, and was one of the principal founders of the Women's Studies Program at Yale University. Among her honors are fellowships from the Guggenheim and Rockefeller Foundations and from the National Endowment for the Humanities. Cott has been a Liberal Arts Fellow in Law at the Harvard Law School, a Visiting Scholar at the Schlesinger Library on the History of Women, and a fellow at the Charles Warren Center at Harvard University. She continues to lecture widely on college campuses and at academic conferences here and abroad, including a recent keynote address to the annual conference of the Australian Historical Association in Sydney.

Professor Cott serves on the editorial boards of numerous historical journals, including the Journal of American History, and reference works such as the American National Biography, and is an elected member of the executive boards of both the American Studies Association and the Organization of American Historians. She has also contributed to historical documentaries, most importantly as a member of the advisory board of the public television series "The American Experience" and as a consultant on the film "One Woman, One Vote," which tells the history of women's campaign for the ballot.

This academic year Professor Cott is a fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in Stanford, California. She is completing a book on how the institution of marriage has figured historically in national public policy.

Dr. Ruth J. Simmons

Ruth J. Simmons is President of Smith College, an appointment she has held since 1995. The granddaughter of sharecroppers, she and her eleven siblings were born and raised in east Texas. Simmons graduated from Dillard University in New Orleans, Louisiana, in 1967 and received her Ph.D. in Romance Languages and Literature from Harvard University in 1973. She has served on the faculties of the University of New Orleans and California State University Northridge. While a faculty member, her teaching and research interests centered on the literature of Francophone Africa and the Caribbean. She also has written on the works of David Diop and Aime Cesaire and authored a book on education in Haiti.

Throughout her career, Dr. Simmons has been recognized as a leading practical feminist and educational administrator. In 1983, after serving as Associate Dean of the Graduate School at the University of Southern California, she joined the administration at Princeton University. She remained at Princeton for seven years, leaving in 1990 for two years to serve as Provost at Spelman College. Returning to Princeton in 1992, she served as Vice Provost until 1995, when she accepted the presidency at Smith. During more than ten years at Princeton, Dr. Simmons held a number of positions in academic administration: Director of Studies, Acting Director of African-American Studies, and Associate Dean of the Faculty. As Vice Provost, she was Deputy to the Provost and Executive Secretary of the Priorities Committee, the university's budget committee. In 1993, Simmons was invited by the president of the university to review the state of race relations on the Princeton campus; her report resulted in a number of initiatives that received widespread attention.

Dr. Simmons is the recipient of a number of prizes and fellowships, including the German DAAD and a Fulbright Fellowship to France. She is active in a wide range of educational, charitable, and civic endeavors and holds honorary degrees from a number of colleges and universities, including Amherst, Dillard, University of Massachusetts at Amherst, Dartmouth and Princeton. She also serves on numerous boards, including Clarke School for the Deaf, Pfizer, Inc., and Metropolitan Life Insurance. She is a member of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences and the Council on Foreign Relations. In 1996, Dr. Simmons was named a CBS Woman of the Year, NBC Nightly News' Most Inspiring Woman, and Glamour Magazine's Woman of the Year. In 1997, she was awarded the Centennial Medal from Harvard University.

The Millennium Council also produces **Millennium Evenings at the White House**, a series of lectures and cultural showcases that highlight American creativity and inventiveness through our ideas, art and scientific discoveries. She received her Ph.D. in History from Rutgers University in 1968. Currently, she also holds her appointment as Professor of History at Rutgers, where she directed the Women's Studies Program from 1990 to 1995. She is described as one of the foremost labor historians in the country and has played an important role in the establishment of women's studies. Dr. Kessler-Harris has authored and edited over ten books, including: *A Women's Wage: Historical Meanings and Social Consequences*, and *Women in Culture and Politics: A Century of Change*. One of her main subjects is how working women have understood their world. She has received fellowships from both the Guggenheim and Rockefeller Foundations and NEH.

Ruth Simmons is President of Smith College, an appointment she has held since 1995. Prior to Smith, Dr. Simmons served as Provost of Spelman College, and Vice Provost, Associate Dean of the Faculty and Acting Director of African-American Studies at Princeton University. She received her Ph.D. in Romance Languages and Literatures from Harvard University in 1973; her teaching and writing has centered on the literature of Franco-phone Africa and the Caribbean. Throughout her career she has been recognized as a leading practical feminist and educational administrator. She is active in a wide range of educational, charitable, and civic endeavors and holds honorary degrees from a number of colleges and universities, including Amherst, Dillard, UMass Amherst, Dartmouth and Princeton. 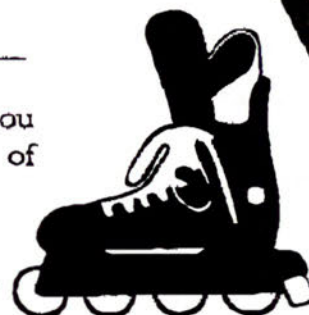
