VISIT TO JTF-FA EXCAVATION SITE

Visit to a Joint Task Force-Full Accounting (JTF-FA) Excavation Site

You will depart Hanoi and arrive at the excavation site near Tien Chau Village, Vinh Phuc Province. From Hanoi to the site should take approximately 40 minutes by motorcade and will provide a scenic view of the Vietnam countryside en route. This excavation is at the site of an 8 Nov 1967 F-105D aircraft crash site. This aircraft was on a strike mission at a nearby railroad bridge when communications were lost. There is one unaccounted-for individual that the JTF-FA team is searching for. Two of the pilot's sons from the United States will be part of the delegation that visits the site. The vehicles will drive to the site and will be met by JTF-FA Commander (Brigadier General Harry B. Axson, Jr.) and JTF-FA, Detachment Two Commander (Lieutenant Colonel Rennie M. Cory, Jr.). You will receive several short briefings at the site to detail the activities for this specific operation. You will also have an opportunity to address the press at the site. At the conclusion of the site visit, you will be escorted back to your vehicle.

Background

Detachment Two, Joint Task Force-Full Accounting (JTF-FA), is a Hanoi-based forward operating detachment of the Joint Task Force-Full Accounting which you have visited in Hawaii. JTF-FA also has detachments in Bangkok, Thailand, Vientiane, Laos, and Phnom Penh, Cambodia. The mission of Detachment Two, JTF-FA, is to plan, coordinate, and execute humanitarian efforts to account for and resolve the fates of unaccounted-for American citizens from the Vietnam Conflict. Detachment Two sustains five 740-member teams per year to investigate the fates of unaccounted-for American citizens, and to locate and recover their remains. Each team is composed of about 120 American military personnel and DOD civilian employees, about 20 Vietnamese Government representatives, and about 600 local laborers.

VISIT TO JTF-FA EXCAVATION SITE

KEY OBJECTIVES

- Demonstrate respect for our POW/MIAs.
- Underscore the importance of U.S.-Vietnamese cooperation in obtaining the "Fullest Possible Accounting" of our missing veterans.
- Demonstrate that our efforts at "Fullest Possible Accounting" are not over; recognize that we still have a long way to go and that our commitment is rock solid.
- Recognize the significant role that veterans and Veterans Service Organizations have played in bringing our relations this far.

CONTEXT OF SITE VISIT

The site will look like an archaeological excavation. Americans and Vietnamese will be working at the site together. The Joint Field Activity (JFA) representative will explain what you see. You will be accompanied by Members of Congress and leaders of veterans organizations. You should emphasize the high priority you give to "fullest possible accounting" and thank them for the support they have provided in bringing the relationship to this point. Your prepared remarks should tell the pilot's story, underscore the importance of the JFA work, and stress our commitment to continue these efforts until we have obtained the fullest possible accounting.

Two of the sons of the pilot whose plane crashed at the site will be with you. You should spend some time in private with the two sons.

BACKGROUND

"Fullest Possible Accounting" for our Missing is the cornerstone of our normalizing relations with Vietnam. This visit and the upcoming repatriation ceremony underscore the success of a consistent policy towards Vietnam that has spanned parts of three decades and five presidents and has been brought to fruition under your Administration. There are no symbols more apt, or more emotionally poignant, than these two events.

To date, 425 Americans have been accounted for since 1973; 283 sets of remains have been repatriated since 1993. We are actively pursuing close to 900 more missing Americans in Vietnam. This site excavation is part of the 63rd Joint Field Activity in Vietnam. This particular site is in a relatively accessible rice paddy, slightly less than an hour's drive from Hanoi.

On November 8, 1967, the pilot, Captain Lawrence Evert was flying the number four aircraft in a flight of four F105s on a strike mission against the Phuc Yen Railroad bypass bridge, approximately 14 miles north of Hanoi. During the bombing attack, Captain Evert's aircraft was hit by anti-aircraft fire and crashed. His last radio transmission was "I'm hit hard."

His wife and four children survived Captain Evert. The Defense POW/Missing Personnel Office (DPMO) approached the family and sought concurrence for your visit to the site. The family agreed and has been supportive of your trip. The two sons, Dan and David, will accompany you to the site. David lost his wife last year in a car accident.

HUMANITARIAN DEMINING EVENT

KEY OBJECTIVES

- Highlight U.S. Commitment to Humanitarian Demining.
- Demonstrate U.S.-Vietnam Humanitarian Demining Cooperation.
- Showcase Humanitarian Demining programs funded by the Leahy War Victims Fund, NGOs, and USAID programs.

CONTEXT OF EVENT

This event is an opportunity to draw attention to the work we have been doing to address the problem of landmines. Vietnam is one of the most severely affected countries. The estimate of landmines in Vietnam is about 3.5 million. In addition, there are about 300,000 tons of unexploded ordnance (UXO) in the country. Each year over 2,000 Vietnamese suffer casualties from landmines and UXO. The 3.5 million landmines in Vietnam are leftover from many different conflicts, not just our war.

We are bringing together various aspects of our program in one event, and you will announce the assistance we are providing to the Vietnamese, including computers and data bases that will give the location of mines and UXO. This will help the Vietnamese in their efforts to remove landmines and UXO. There will be a demonstration of these systems. There will also be an exhibition of low tech demining equipment, such as shields, protective clothing, etc. Exhibits of humanitarian assistance provided through the Leahy War Victims Fund, U.S.-based NGOs such as the Vietnam Veterans of America Foundation, Peacetreets, Catholic Relief Service, and through companies such as Ford will also be at the event.

The Catholic Relief Service demining art exhibit, which has been organized in conjunction with the Vietnamese Government's Committee for the Protection and Care of Children, will feature drawings by young children (ages 9-13) who have been victims of landmines in Quang Tri province. Four of the young artists will attend the event.

BACKGROUND

Vietnam joined the U.S. Humanitarian Demining Program in June of this year. Since that time, the State Department has begun supplying the Vietnamese Engineering Command, Ministry of Defense with several million dollars worth of demining equipment and demining training. DoD has offered the Vietnamese two separate computer-based systems that will respectively help them map and manage their demining activities and locate mines and unexploded ordnance. A delegation of Vietnamese military demining experts is nearing completion of a three-week long tour in the United States designed to educate them on available demining related training.

The Patrick J. Leahy War Victims Fund has provided grants through USAID to five NGOs working in Vietnam to provide prosthetics and rehabilitation services to civilian victims of war and civil strife. These five are: Vietnam Veterans of America Foundation, Health Volunteers Overseas, Prosthetics Outreach Foundation, Vietnam Assistance for the Handicapped, and World Vision.

A number of NGOs have been active in providing humanitarian assistance for years, including Peacetreets and Vietnam Veterans of America Foundation (VVAF). VVAF and Ford have provided a mobile unit to assist victims. Catholic Relief Service, World Vision, and other NGOs also work with victims of landmines.

The event will be attended by members of your delegation, Members of Congress, American Vietnam veterans, Vietnamese-Americans, and important figures from the Vietnamese Government and the foreign community in Hanoi.

REPATRIATION CEREMONY

You will arrive at the Repatriation Ceremony site (Noi Bai Airport) and will be met by the JTF-FA Commander (Brigadier General Harry B. Axson, Jr.) and JTF-FA, Detachment Two Commander (Lieutenant Colonel Rennie M. Cory, Jr.). You will review the inventory of remains and receive a short background on each set of remains and the contents of each remains box. You will then move to another table to view the official handover of remains from Vietnam to the United States. This handover includes the official signing of documents by a representative from the Vietnam Office of Seeking Missing Persons and by Commander Cory.

Upon completion of the signatures, you move (with the reviewing party) to position yourself for the actual ceremony where the honor guard will transfer the remains from the initial viewing table to inside the adjacent C-17 aircraft. Upon completion of the ceremony, you will walk to meet the C-17 aircraft aircrew, the honor guard, and the attending Vietnamese officials. You will then have an opportunity to address the press. Upon completion of this event, your vehicle will transport you to your next location/Air Force One for departure from Hanoi.

Background

Joint Task Force - Full Accounting (JTF-FA) was established in January 1992 to resolve the cases of Americans still unaccounted for as a result of the southeast Asian conflict. JTF-FA operations include investigations, archival research, an oral history program, and remains recovery operations. Since its inception, Joint Task Force - Full Accounting has conducted more than 2,400 case investigation and more than 375 remains recovery operations. These operations have led to the recovery of over 400 individuals believed to be unaccounted-for Americans.

Joint Task Force - Full Accounting consists of more than 180 investigators, analysts, linguists, and other specialists representing all four services and Department of Defense civilian employees. The task force's operations are supported by casualty resolution specialists and anthropologists from the U.S. Army Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii, representatives of the Defense POW/MIA Office, and augmentees from U.S. Pacific Command component commands. JTF-FA's headquarters are located at Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii; detachments are located in the capital cities of Thailand, Vietnam, Cambodia, and Laos.

REPATRIATION CEREMONY

KEY OBJECTIVES

- Honor the memory of all those who served in Vietnam, particularly the POW/MIAs.
- Underscore the importance of U.S.-Vietnamese cooperation in obtaining the "Fullest Possible Accounting" of our missing veterans.
- Demonstrate that our efforts at "Fullest Possible Accounting" are not over; recognize that we still have a long way to go and that our commitment is rock solid.
- Pay tribute to those engaged in the attempt to recover the remains of the missing.

CONTEXT OF THE CEREMONY

Your presence at this ceremony carries strong significance. The nature of the ceremony is somber and subdued. You will have the opportunity to speak briefly with and thank the men and women who work in the field to bring home our missing soldiers and airmen. As with the excavation site visit, you will be joined by Members of Congress and leaders of veterans/family organizations. You should again emphasize the high priority you have given to "fullest possible accounting" and thank them for their support in bringing the relationship to this point. Your prepared remarks should honor the men we are sending home, underscore the importance of the JFA work, and stress the need to continue these efforts until we have obtained the fullest possible accounting.

BACKGROUND

This ceremony is to repatriate the remains that were recovered during the 62nd Joint Field Activity that ended September 27, 2000. United States and Vietnamese teams excavated crash sites, potential gravesites, and conducted investigations throughout the country.

The identity of these remains is highly speculative. The identification process can take months or years and may require further excavation at the site.

To date, 425 Americans have been accounted for since 1973; 283 sets of remains have been repatriated since 1993. We are actively pursuing close to 900 more missing Americans in Vietnam.

NEXT GENERATION LEADERS ROUNDTABLE

The time and place of this meeting remain to be determined, although a casual setting such as a restaurant appears to be the best venue.

Ho Chi Minh City is the land of opportunity for young Vietnamese from all parts of the country. The next generation of Vietnamese in their 20s and 30s working in business, government, academia, the media and the arts in Ho Chi Minh City is impressive and articulate. Theirs is the first generation in recent history that is not divided by conflict and regional differences.

A small group of younger Vietnamese, chosen for diversity of experience, English language skills, and ability to express themselves will provide a window on Vietnam's future. Young Vietnamese are the basis for believing Vietnam will achieve positive change in the future, albeit gradual. They embody the world-class energy and talent leavened with a caution and tenacious patience characteristic of the culture and system within which they live and work. They share with their parents' generation a heartfelt pride in Vietnamese traditions.

Nguyen Ngoc Hanh is the Director of the Science and Technology Development Center and a member of the HCMC Youth Union Executive Board. He received a B.S. from the HCMC University of Social Sciences and Humanities, and a B.A. from the National Institute of Politics. The Youth Union is the single biggest producer of top party and government officials in HCMC. The Center headed by Mr. Hanh is the Party's attempt to foster IT business and to train young people in IT -- an illustration of Vietnam's economic transition and the Party's desire to have a leading role in IT business activities. Mr. Hanh is representative of young Party technocrats.

Truong Tan Duc is a reporter for the Saigon Economic Times and was recently elected the winner of the annual HCMC journalist's competition. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from the HCMC University of Economics.

Vu Ngan, a returned "boat person" who learned English and office skills in a refugee camp in Malaysia, is a Customer Service Manager for Cargill Animal Nutrition. She received a Diploma in Business Administration from HCMC Open University. Her skills, talent, and determination landed her a job with Cargill, where she handles customer service as well as staff duties for the general manager. Her husband is also a returnee with a good job. Ms. Ngan is a returnee success story, is knowledgeable about the livestock industry and farming, and is a practicing Catholic who lives in the city of Bien Hoa near HCMC.

Hoang Thi Mai Huong is the President of Saatchi & Saatchi Vietnam, the Director of Venus Communications, and President of Sao Kim Printing Services. She earned a B.A. in journalism from the Moscow Institute of International Relations and an MBA from Harvard in 1993. Ms. Huong was a young press officer with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Hanoi when she won a Fulbright scholarship to study at Harvard. She has been the Chief Representative of Saatchi & Saatchi since 1994 and was behind the licensing of Vietnam's first joint venture in advertising, between Saatchi and a domestic company she formed. Describing why she did not return to government service after earning her MBA, she said, "I'm not a saint." Ms. Huong is married to an American who lives and works in Vietnam.

Tran Thi Ngoc Huyen is the Vice Dean of the Department of Chemistry at the University of Natural Sciences in HCMC. She earned a Ph.D. at Linz University in Austria, researching an anti-viral substance which impedes cancer cell growth and HIV replication. A derivative that she synthesized was used in clinical tests in New York. Dr. Huyen is an advocate of hard work and a voracious reader who laments the poor research facilities in Vietnam. She is representative of young scientists and educators who struggle to do their work with meager resources.

Tran Le Nguyen is the General Director of the Kinh Do Company and Chairman of the HCMC Young Entrepreneurs Association. Young and energetic, Mr. Nguyen is the well-spoken CEO of a very successful and expanding bakery business which sells to supermarkets and through its own retail outlets. An ethnic Chinese, he is also active in charitable activities.

Nguyen Chau Giang is an Editor at the Kim Dong Publishing House. She holds a B.A. from the HCMC University of Fine Arts. A painter as well as a writer, Ms. Giang shows great promise. She has won several local and national literary awards.

Nguyen Cong Tru is a Lecturer at the HCMC University of Agriculture and Forestry. He holds a B.S. from the HCMC University of Agriculture and Forestry and a M.S. in Agricultural Economics from Cornell University. A prominent young lecturer and Fulbright returnee, he also teaches part time at the Fulbright Economic Training Center in Ho Chi Minh City.

Mai Hong Quy is the Vice Dean of the HCMC National University College of Law. Dr. Quy is a constitutional law scholar. She earned a Ph.D. in law from Moscow State University in 1990, just at the dissolution of the former Soviet Union. She has been to the United States on the International Visitors Program.

Lam Kim Son is an Export Manager for the Binh Tien Imex Corporation. Mr. Thang is the founder of a very successful building materials company which produces for the domestic market and exports, and recently opened another factory in central Vietnam. Nguyen Tuyet Mai is the Director of Vidotours Travel Company. MEETING WITH STUDENT PEER EDUCATORS

Event Description

At 9:30 A.M. on November 19, you will meet, just prior to your speech, a group of Vietnamese students in a dressing or practice room of Ho Chi Minh City's Municipal Theater. The students, from the Binh Tay Lower Secondary School, have been trained as peer educators by Save the Children (UK) to raise awareness about HIV/AIDS and related health threats. Your conversation with them will highlight their very positive contributions to the fight against important health and social threats and to encourage them to sustain their efforts.

Background

Approximately 18 months ago, Save the Children (UK) began a project focusing on HIV/AIDS awareness and education for children in Ho Chi Minh City. The project focused its efforts on Districts 2 and 6, outlying urban, working-class districts challenged by prostitution and other at-risk behaviours. The project encompasses both school and community components for children.

Binh Tay Lower Secondary School, in a heavily working class ethnic Chinese neighborhood, is located near two large wholesale markets that draw buyers from all parts of the city. It educates almost 2600 students, ages 12-15, in Grades 6-9. There are 60 classes and 126 total staff including 106 teachers. The teachers and pupils in the school have won numerous city and district accolades for academics, sport, and service. The graduation rate in 1999-2000 was 100%.

The Binh Tay School project was officially launched after a core group of 10-12 peer educators completed extensive peer counseling training six months ago. Peer educators help their colleagues at school understand their rights (based on the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child) and discuss HIV/AIDS education messages with other children including: modes of transmissions and methods of prevention, at-risk behaviours, non-judgmental/non-discriminatory attitudes toward people with HIV, and confidence in normal contact with people with HIV. The peer educators also focus on life skills education such as negotiation, risk assessment,

and empowerment to say "no". They hold group and one-on-one discussions, provide sex education through modules and kits, and counsel their peers both during and outside of school hours with the strong support of the staff.

Rampant prostitution and increasing numbers of children using drugs has increased the risk of HIV/AIDS infection. According to the HCMC AIDS Committee, about one-third of HCMC's intravenous drug users are HIV positive and an increasing number are turning to prostitution to feed their habit. THIS SECURITY NOTICE HAS BEEN AMENDED TO REFLECT THE SAME GUIDANCE GIVEN BY CONGEN JERUSALEM. PLEASE PAY SPECIAL ATTENTION TO THE PORTION IN BOLD PRINT.

Since September 28, there have been demonstrations in the Old City of Jerusalem, commercial East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and the Gaza Strip. Violent clashes also occurred between Arabs and Jews in Israel. These sporadic security incidents and acts of vandalism took place at a number of locations including Nazareth, Jaffa, Haifa, Tiberias, and Acco. We have monitored this situation closely and have witnessed a significant improvement in the security environment inside Israel proper. Therefore, the travel restriction to Jaffa has been lifted, as well as the recommendation that employees and dependents restrict their travel after 8:00 P.M.

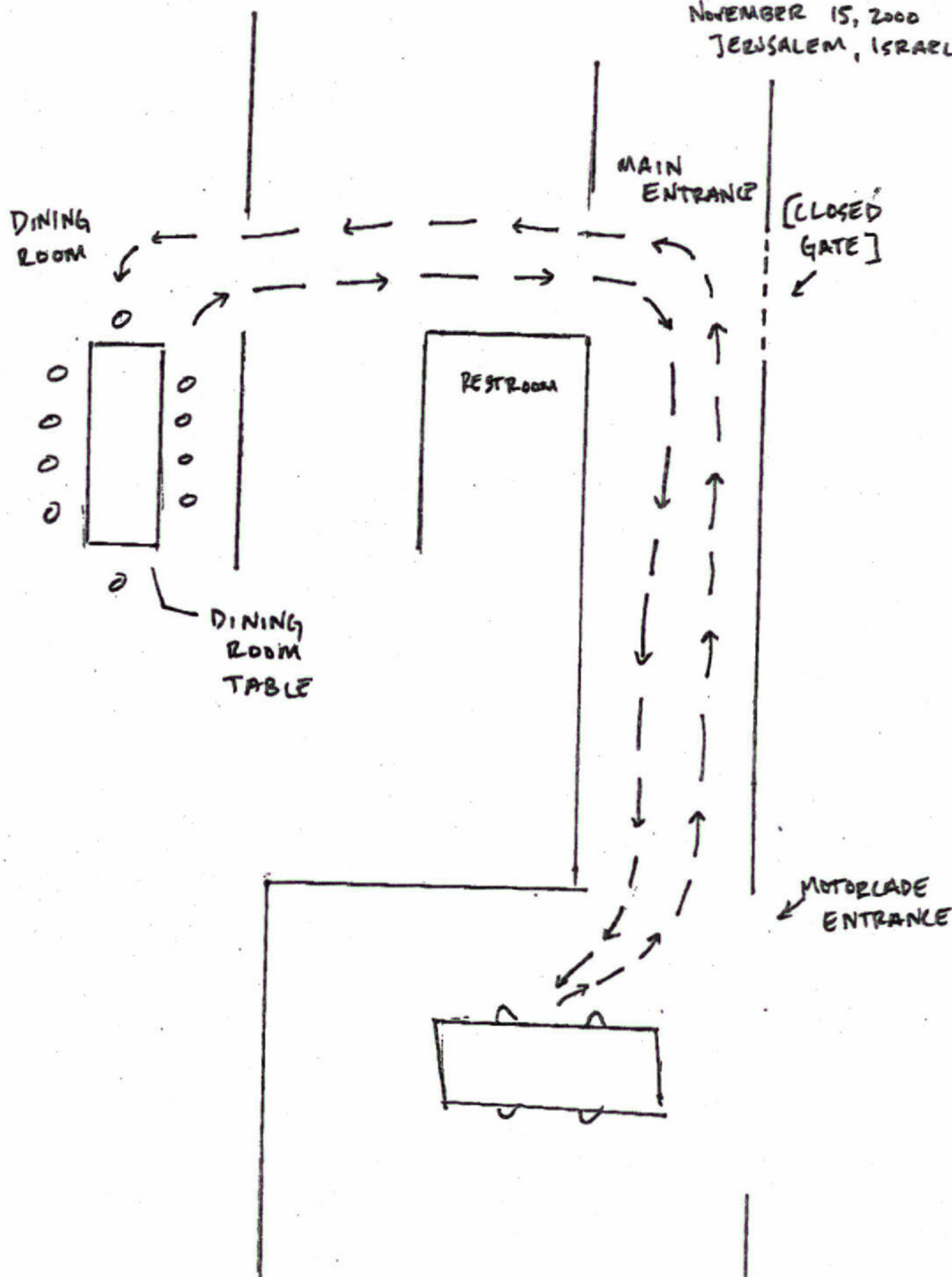
We caution that the potential still exists for further acts of vandalism and violence. We continue to be concerned at this time of a heightened potential of terrorist attacks in Israel, Gaza, and the West Bank. As a result, the following security measures remain in effect:

- American employees and their family members are reminded that **THEY ARE PROHIBITED FROM TRAVELING TO THE WEST BANK, GAZA, AND EAST JERUSALEM, INCLUDING THE OLD CITY.**
- Employees and family members should exercise extreme caution and avoid places where crowds are gathering or conditions appear unsettled.
- Employee and family members should be aware of their surroundings and should avoid the use of public buses and exercise caution around bus stops.
- Additional local guard security patrols have been added to embassy residential neighborhoods, and can be dispatched by contacting Post One at 03-519-7551.
- For updated information on the security situation and recommendations regarding travel to particular destinations within Israel, you should continue to contact the RSO.

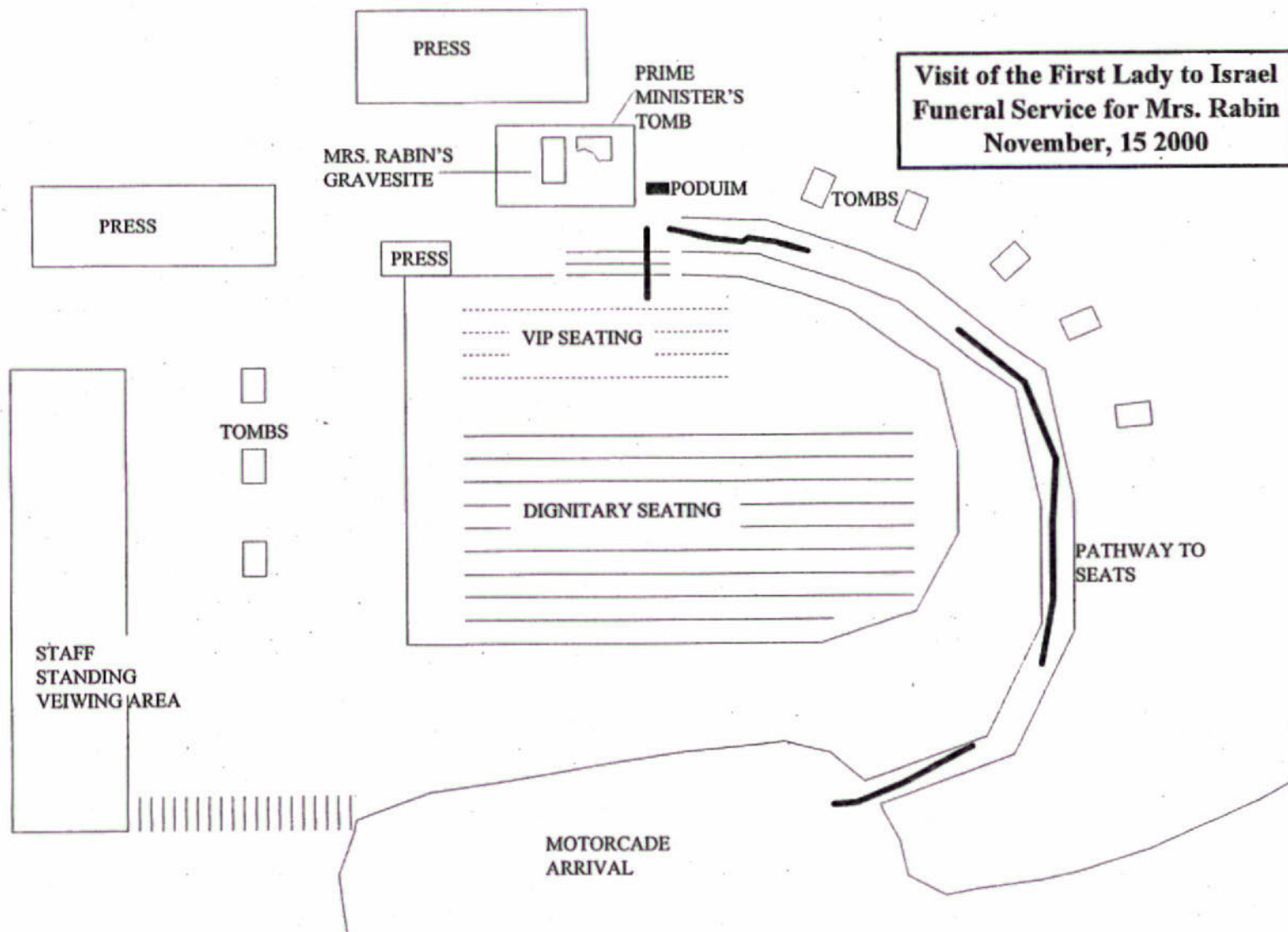
We want to emphasize that these measures are precautionary in light of the changing security situation. We are reviewing our security posture on a daily basis and will keep the community advised of any changes.

After holding, **THE PRESIDENT** proceeds to the off-stage announce position. **THE PRESIDENT** and First Lady, accompanied by Vietnam U. President, Vietnam U. Vice-President, Ambassador Pete Peterson, Ambassador Le

Bang and Vu Khoan, Minister of Trade are off-stage announced into the auditorium. **THE PRESIDENT** and First Lady proceed to their seats in the front row.

Vietnam U. President will proceed to the podium, make welcoming remarks and introduce **THE PRESIDENT** onto the stage. **THE PRESIDENT** will proceed to the podium and make remarks.
