As you may already know, the National Committee to Prevent Child Abuse is pleased to announce it will honor First Lady Hillary Clinton and four congressional members at a Washington D.C. luncheon, October 6, for their leadership in passing The Adoption and Safe Families Act of 1997. The four members of Congress are Senators John Rockefeller and John Chaffee, and Representatives Dave Camp and Barbara Kennelly. Prior to sending formal invitations, we wanted to inform you early on of this event.

As part of our tribute, we will present our honorees with the first copies of a compact disc (CD), "Love Shouldn't Hurt," which will be distributed by Quincy Jones' record company, Quest. This CD is a compilation of songs by various recording artists, which includes Michael Bolton (NCPCA's Honorary Chairman), Kenny Loggins, Wendy and Carnie Wilson and Olivia Newton-John. NATIONAL COMMITTEE TO PREVENT CHILD ABUSE HONORS FIRST LADY HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON, CONGRESSIONAL MEMBERS, AND TOP RECORDING ARTISTS FOR THEIR ROLE IN CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION

Washington, D.C., October 6, 1998 – The National Committee to Prevent Child Abuse (NCPCA) today honored First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton, Senators John D. Rockefeller IV and John H. Chafee, and Representatives Barbara Kennelly and Dave Camp for leading the effort to pass The Adoption and Safe Families Act of 1997.

NCPCA also honored a group of recording artists, producers, and songwriters, including NCPCA Honorary Chairman Michael Bolton, for lending their talent and support to a new compact disc (CD) called "Love Shouldn't Hurt." All artist royalties from the sale of the CD will go directly to NCPCA. The artists, along with the World Children's Choir, will sing the title track, "Love Shouldn't Hurt," at the luncheon. Qwest/Warner Bros. Records is set to release the CD in early November.

"Love shouldn't hurt, but for too many children, it still does," said NCPCA Executive Director A. Sidney Johnson III. "Millions of children are hurt each year by those who are supposed to be their caregivers. But we *can* stop the hurt if everyone plays a role. Today is a celebration of those who have recognized their role in preventing child abuse. We are deeply grateful to them for their support and hope others will be inspired to follow in their footsteps."

The Adoption and Safe Families Act of 1997 improves the protection and care of abused and neglected children, increases adoptions and other permanent homes for children, and supports families.

"This Act represents the most significant change in federal child-protection policy in nearly two decades. An important aspect of the legislation provides almost \$20 million in additional funding for local child abuse prevention efforts such as NCPCA's Healthy Families America (HFA)," said Johnson.

HFA is a nationwide initiative to provide home visitation services to parents at the time their children are born. The initiative was launched in 1992 in partnership with Ronald McDonald House Charities and with major support from the Freddie Mac Foundation.

Noted by the American Academy of Pediatrics as "one of the most hopeful and promising developments that has occurred in the recent memory of those working in the field of child maltreatment," HFA has a proven track record of preventing child abuse and a host of other poor, early childhood outcomes.

The First Lady, who visited an HFA site earlier this year, said that "one of our country's greatest challenges is to identify programs like HFA that work and to make them more widely available to families who would benefit from them."

Currently there are more than 320 HFA sites in 40 states and the District of Columbia. An estimated 20,000 families will receive services at sites started prior to January 1998.

Between 1985 and 1994, child abuse reports in the United States increased by 50 percent. Last year alone, more than three million children were reported abused or neglected and at least three children died each day as a result of their injuries.

The Chicago-based National Committee to Prevent Child Abuse is the only national organization exclusively working on the local, state, and national levels to prevent child abuse. With chapters across the country, NCPCA works to prevent child abuse through education, research, public awareness, advocacy, and programs like Healthy Families America.

A roster of top recording stars have lent their talent and support to a unique album calling attention to one of the critical problems facing modern society—the scourge of child abuse.

With all proceeds, including artists and producers royalties, going directly to the National Committee to Prevent Child Abuse (NCPCA), **Love Shouldn't Hurt** is set for release in mid-November on Qwest/Warner Bros. They've used their celebrity status to help raise much-needed funds and awareness about this tragic problem. We are deeply grateful to them for their support and hope others will be inspired to follow in their footsteps."

Singer-songwriter Michael Bolton also feels strongly about this cause. "I'm very excited to be a part of **Love Shouldn't Hurt**," he said. "Joining together with so many wonderful artists gives us the strength in numbers to underscore the important work of the National Committee To Prevent Child Abuse."
